FORMER CORYELL CO. SCHOOL MAN IS MADE C.P.A.

LEE JOHNSON BECOMES MEMBER OF ASCPC

Lee E. Johnson, county superintendent of schools in Coryell County from 1923 to 1926, has recently been made a member of the American Society of Certified Public Accountants, according to announcement from New York, where examination papers were graded by the American Institute of Accounting.

Mr. Johnson is associate professor in the department of economics and business at Texas State College for Women. He was chairman of the Denton City Commission from 1934 to 1938, and during his term of office, many changes and improvements were made. He installed a new accounting system, a city purchasing agent was appointed, and a supply depot was established.

CORYELL CITIZENS HOSTS TO SOLDIERS AS USO IS SWAMPED

Gatesville and Coryell homes and housewives came through to help carry the tremendous load of providing a Christmas for the thousands of lonely soldiers who sought to celebrate here.

Homes already crowded to capacity with servicemen, tenants and Yuletide family guests were rearranged as walls were figuratively bulging with added pressure of the servicemen who wanted out of camp after weeks of strenuous training. Urgent, last minute calls to private homes, cots in the USO, and general sacrificial sharing of privacy and family parties cared for the load. One community alone, Pirmela, provided last minute Christmas dinners or sixteen soldiers.

Over three hundred Christmas cakes poured into the USO from communities, churches and individuals of Coryell County. Christmas morning when cafes were closed to give workers a breathing spell, these cakes and Canteen cocoa provided breakfast for hundreds of soldiers. Canteen cocoa, ordinarily made of milk with plenty of stirring and great care, became the emergency drink as hundreds of cups were rapidly filled with boiling water poured over commercially prepared hot chocolate.

Throughout the day the refreshment table was loaded with cakes, candy, cookies, fruit and nuts and hundreds of boys showed no hesitancy in partaking of the food. One husky soldier, who said he had been on K rations for two weeks, ate three pieces of cake in record breaking time and complained about the pieces being too large. Following interrogation he added, "I can't eat enough different kinds."

In order to provide the necessary quarters, nickels and dimes for telephone booths and long distances calls to home folks, a supply three times larger than for an ordinary week-end was on hand. This supply melted and disappeared early Christmas Eve. Telephone officials answered an emergency call and many times the booths were emptied, the change being used over and over again.

The USO floor was mud, the air was clouded with smoke, every casual visitor was put to work,

NORTH-SOUTH FEUD IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON. — Extraordinarily bitter attacks by Senator Joe Guffey upon his fellow Southern Democrats have raised curiosity as to what he is up to.

Guffey is an old huckster for the special New Deal line of goods, and when he tries to tear up his own Democratic party without any apparent cause, all politicians naturally suspect the left wing New Deal boys downtown, who usually furnish his material, have decided on a new course of action.

The personal bitterness of his attack on Senator Byrd and other Southerners is known to reflect the anguish of the White House New Deal crowd at their inability to get the soldier vote bill through congress.

They assumed the soldiers would vote for the commander-in-chief if the collection of ballots could be handled under federal jurisdiction. But now that it is to be handled by the states—with non-New Deal Democrats or Republicans in control of practically all states—the blow is greater than people outside the political trade have appreciated.

But there is another reason. Coming up shortly in the senate will be the poll tax bill; an anti-lynching bill is in the offing, and a Supreme court decision on the white primary in Texas is imminent.

The old war between the North and South within the Democratic party, therefore, is coming up to a new series of battles, and Guffey—or rather the men behind him—are laying the ground for it.

Don't ask me to offer any reasonable accounting as to why this is so. The attacks on Byrd merely will furnish more water on his political wheel in the South. The Southerners have no intention of surrendering, and will block all action of the Guffeyites.

The charge that they are in an "unholy alliance" with the Republican Joe Pew is only remote political banter. The basis of the Guffey charge is that the former Delaware Senator Townsend, as chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee, worked against the soldier bill.

Townsend is more Du Pont than Pew, and neither Rene Du Pont nor Pierre has co-operated closely with Pew. There is no evidence that they are in a working league on any subject, and probably may be against each other on presidential candidates.

But to fight the Democratic civil war all over again once or twice each year in the senate without result, has enabled the Northern Democrats in the past to make special personal appeals to the votes of the liberal groups in their own communities (CIO likes it). This stratagem, however, seems to have outworn its effectiveness.

The same old farce, therefore, likely is to be played through again without change in the plot or ending, but with Mr. Guffey in a leading role that no one else seems to want.

UNDESIRABLE FACTORS IN SUBSIDY BATTLE

The food subsidy fight seems to be cooling. The alternatives offered are both undesirable. The idea of paying secret price increases out of the treasury of the United States in order to conceal them from the public is a policy which the administration has attempted to justify only on the grounds of necessity of avoiding a greater evil—wage increases and more direct price inflation. Some commentators have attempted to describe it as a tax on "economic business," but it is far more than that. It is a levy against all people who pay taxes.

The opposition wants higher prices, which is likewise an undesirable goal for the great majority of the people who pay them.

But, of course, the truth is you are going to get higher prices anyway with or without subsidies, because of a dominant controlling in-

ner economic situation pressing toward that conclusion (the current pending bill involves only the few commodities on which subsidies are already being paid).

The administration has not shown strong interest in compromising the matter, even though a congressional majority is obviously against subsidy continuance. War Mobilizer Byrnes went on the air in defense of the administration program ever in the face of coming defeat.

They all know very well that Mr. Roosevelt will veto the bill, that it cannot be passed over a veto, and that Mr. Roosevelt will get his subsidies anyway by plucking the money from the bottomless bag of revolving funds under the custody of the New Deal's extracurricular banker, Jesse Jones.

The subsidy opposition fears that if congress approves the administration plan—and even if not—Mr. Roosevelt may expand it into a new spending program as a means of re-election.

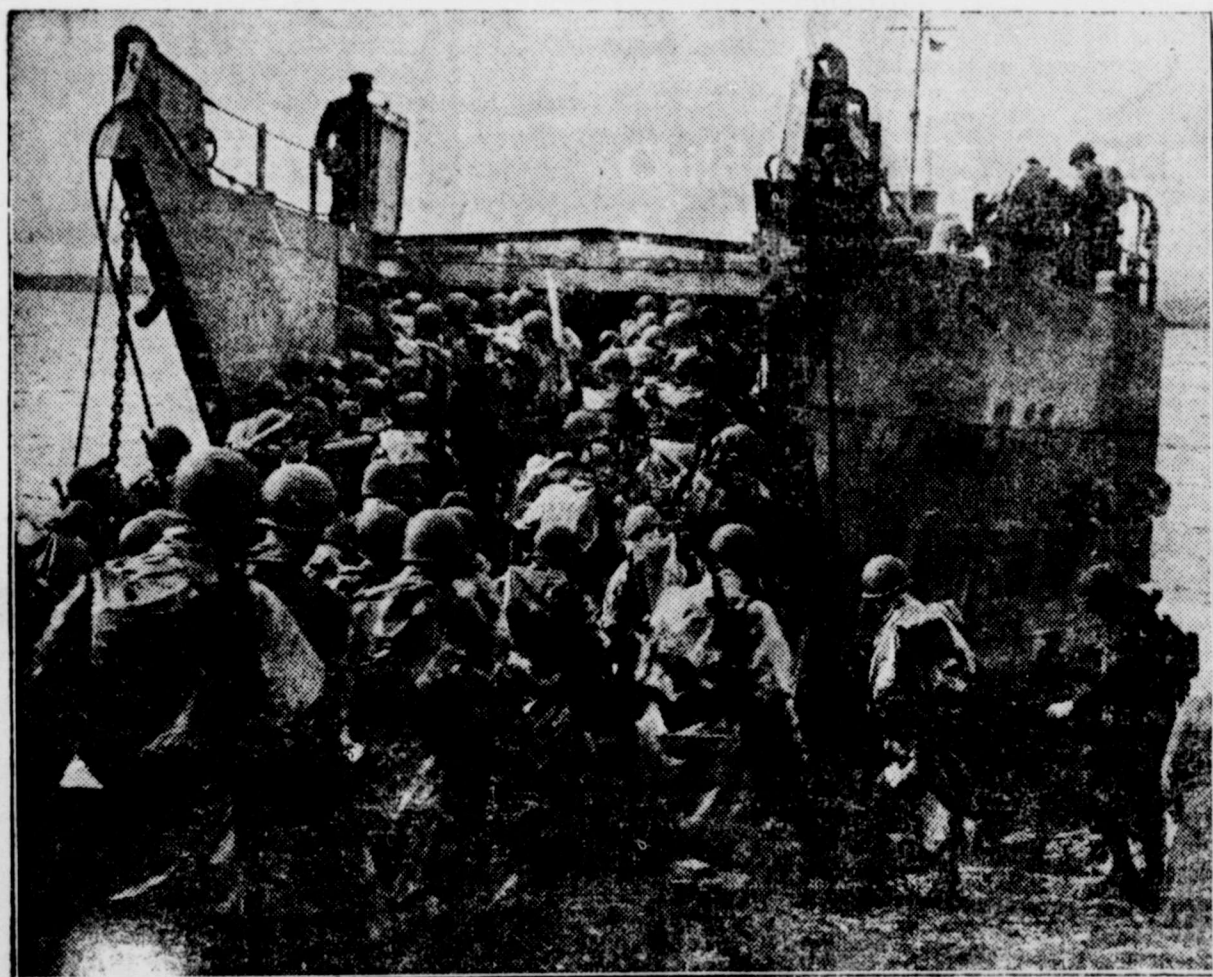

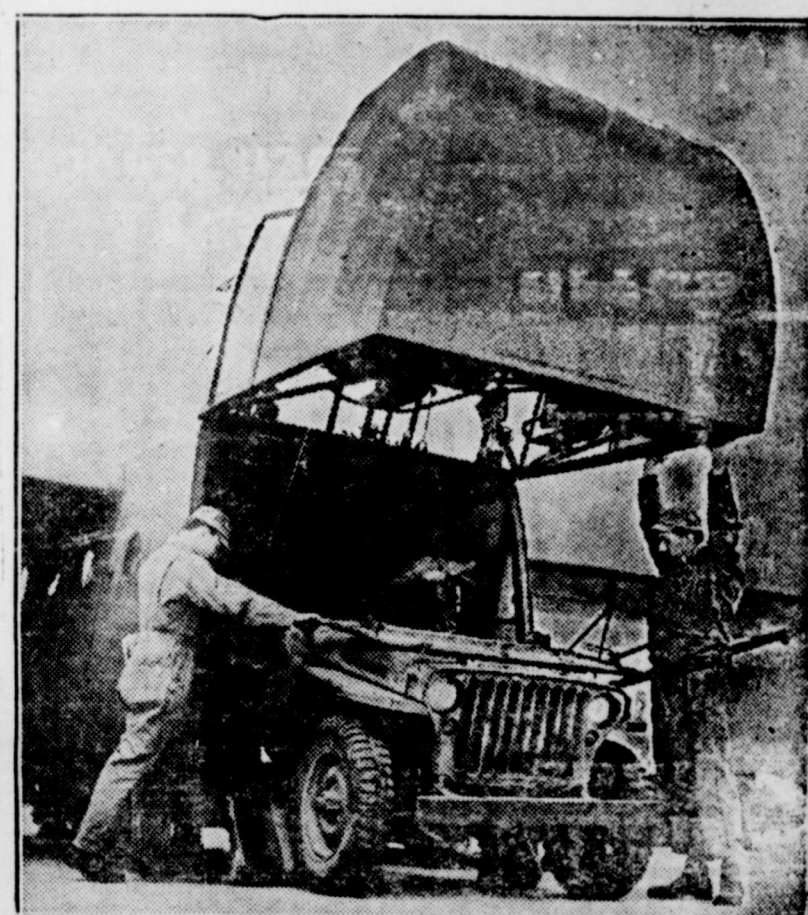

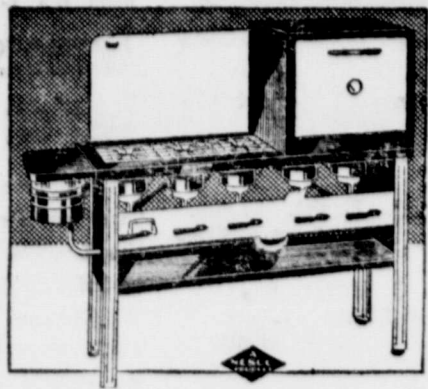

NEW YEAR HOLDS MANY IMPORTANT POLITICAL DATES FOR VOTERS TO KNOW

Those who take an interest in things political are licking their chops over the prospects held forth by 1944. There will be plenty to talk about, lot to do.

The year will be but 10 days old when things begin to happen. Events will continue throughout the year, winding up on Dec. 18, when presidential electors chosen in November meet in their respective state capitals for the formality of electing a President and Vice President.

In addition to the national presidential nominating conventions to be held by Democrats and Republicans, there will be two series of precinct, county and state conventions by both parties in Texas, each series being preceded by meetings of the county and state executive committees of each party.

Objective of the first of these conventions will be the election of delegates to represent the state in the national conventions. The other series of conventions, dealing exclusively with state affairs will follow immediately after the July and August primaries.

Republicans Meet First

First scheduled event on the 1944 political calendar is the meeting of the executive board of the Republican National Committee in Chicago on Jan. 10. This board composed of party officers and a handful of key men, including R. B. Creager of Texas, runs the Republican show between sessions of the national committee.

On Jan. 11 the Republican National Committee of 106 members is to meet in Chicago to select the date and site of its national convention. All state chairmen and vice chairmen also have been invited to attend the session.

On the same day, Jan. 11, voters of Tarrant County will use their new poll tax receipts in electing directors of Tarrant County Water Control and Improvement Districts No. 1, 2 and 3.

Louisiana will hold the spotlight on Jan. 18 when its quadrennial gubernatorial contest will reach a climax in a Democratic primary.

On Jan. 22 the Democratic National Committee will meet in Washington to select the date and site of its national convention. Texas will be represented by Col. Myron G. Blalock of Marshall and Mrs. Clara Driscoll of Corpus Christi.

Poll Taxes Due by Jan. 31

Jan. 31 is the most important date in the month for the rank and file of folks who want to have a real voice in the year's political doings. It is the last day on which 1943 poll taxes may be paid, and a poll tax receipt (or exemption certificate) is a prerequisite to voting in Texas.

Other important dates on the 1944 political calendar are:

Feb. 14—Election judges for each voting precinct to be named by Commissioners Court.

March 2—Last day for Commissioners Court to call school trustee elections.

March 14—New Hampshire presidential primary.

March 31—Last day for county tax collectors to deliver certified lists of voters to county election boards.

April 1—Election of school trustees in common, consolidated and independent school districts.

April 4—New York primary for election of district delegates to national conventions. (Delegates at large are elected at a subsequent state convention). Wisconsin presidential primary.

April 11—Illinois and Nebraska presidential primaries.

April 25 — Massachusetts and Pennsylvania presidential primaries.

Illinois Conventions Set.

April 28—Illinois state conventions to select delegates at large to national conventions.

May 2—Presidential primaries in California, Florida and South Dakota.

May 6—Democratic and Republican county conventions in Texas to elect delegates to state presi-

dential conventions.

May 9—Republican State Executive Committee meets to decide whether party will nominate by primary or convention system this year.

May 9 — Alabama, Ohio and West Virginia presidential primaries.

May 16—Montana presidential convention and New Jersey presidential primaries.

May 17—South Carolina presidential conventions.

May 19 — Oregon presidential primaries.

May 23—Democratic & Republican presidential conventions in Texas to select delegates to national conventions. Texas Democrats will have 48 votes in their national convention this year, an increase of two over their 1940

strength. Republicans will have 33 votes, an increase of seven since 1940.

June 5—Last day for candidates for state offices, and candidates for district offices, in districts containing more than one county, to file requests to have their names placed on July primary ballots.

State Democratic Meeting

June 12—State Democratic Executive Committee meets to certify names of candidates for state offices to county Democratic chairmen and to select site of state gubernatorial convention.

June 17—Last day for county and precinct candidates, and district candidates in districts composed of only one county, to file

requests to have their names placed on July primary ballots.

June 19—County executive committee meets to determine order of names on ballot and estimate expenses of July primaries election.

June 22-27 — Candidates must file first reports of campaign expenses not more than 30 nor less than 25 days prior to the date of primary.

June 24—Last day for candidates to pay primary expense assessments.

June 26—Primary committee meets to prepare July ballots.

July 3—Absentee voting in July primary opens.

July 10-14 — Candidates must file second statement of campaign expenses not more than 12 nor less than 8 days before date of primary.

July 17—In cities of 10,000 population or more, this is the last day on which voters who have moved from one precinct to another may appear before the county clerk and qualify for voting in the precinct of their new residence.

July 18—Absentee voting in July primary closes.

July 22—Democratic primary election day. Democratic and Republican precinct conventions to elect delegates to county gubernatorial conventions.

July 29—County Democratic Executive Committee meets to canvass results of July primary. County Conventions.

LITTLE PIGS GO TO MARKET

Agriculture officials are staring with bulging eyes at the telegrams received from the livestock markets. The number of hogs killed in a single day has passed the figure of 300,000, and is still going up.

November has already set an all-time record in hog slaughter of 6,900,000 (federally inspected). December will go still higher. Cattle slaughter also set a record in November, but is now tapering off. Not so with hogs.

Nothing like this has ever happened in the history of the world. Nature, plus a low ceiling price on corn and the delay in putting a ceiling price on hogs, is now scattering pork all over the landscape. This will continue through January, February, and into the month of March.

In spite of the pork flood, however, there is no surplus, and officials insist that there must be no "holiday" from rationing. OPA and War Food administration agree on this. They have had many differences in the past, but they stand together on the matter of red points.

Fact is, they have debated removing pork from rationing, but ran into so much prospective grief that they gave it up. For if housewives could buy pork without stamps, they would use their stamps for beef and butter, which are still short. Or if OPA tied the points to the product, making separate stamps for pork, others for beef, and others for butter, etc., there would be outcries from different groups, such as Jewish people, who ban pork.

Conclusion is that the ration books must be left alone, and the only way to solve the bounty problem is to make federal purchases heavier and move them more rapidly.

Army purchases of beef were extremely heavy in the beef months of September through November. Today, Lend Lease purchases of pork are growing heavy and will hold up through the "hog run" now flooding the market.

But this does not always take the meat out of storage. Lend Lease shipments to Russia can be made only when Russia is ready to eat the pork, since they have no storage space. Britain, on the other hand, can store pork, and is taking shipments faster than the rate of use.

With livestock production high, and submarine sinkings low, more beef and pork are getting to Allied fighting forces overseas than ever before.

MORE STRIKES AHEAD

There are a lot more strikes in the country than the public is aware of. The government has abandoned the policy of regular announcements of the number of strikes and the number of man-hours lost. Thus the strikes do not get into the newspapers.

But here are some figures which reveal that the no-strike pledge of labor organizations is not very effective.

In November alone, there were 120 strikes. The December figure will be only slightly lower. In the week before Christmas, 91,000 man-days were lost in plants engaged in war production. Two days before Christmas, 21,000 people were out on strike, and a number of critical items were behind schedule.

Some of the strikes have no relation to wages. Take for example the strike which Washington officials refer to as "the Baltimore back-house strike." The Western Electric plants at Baltimore are producing such highly important items as marine cables and radar wire. But white workers went on strike because white and colored workers did not have separate toilet facilities.

The war department was obliged to step in last week and take over the plants—solely because of toilet trouble. Workers began coming back slowly, but four days after the plants were taken over, over half the workers were still out.

Unfortunately, there is every probability that strikes will increase, rather than decrease in the future. Next in line demanding wage increases will be aircraft, steel and shipyard workers. John L. Lewis' victory broke the line, has stimulated demands for increases in many industries.

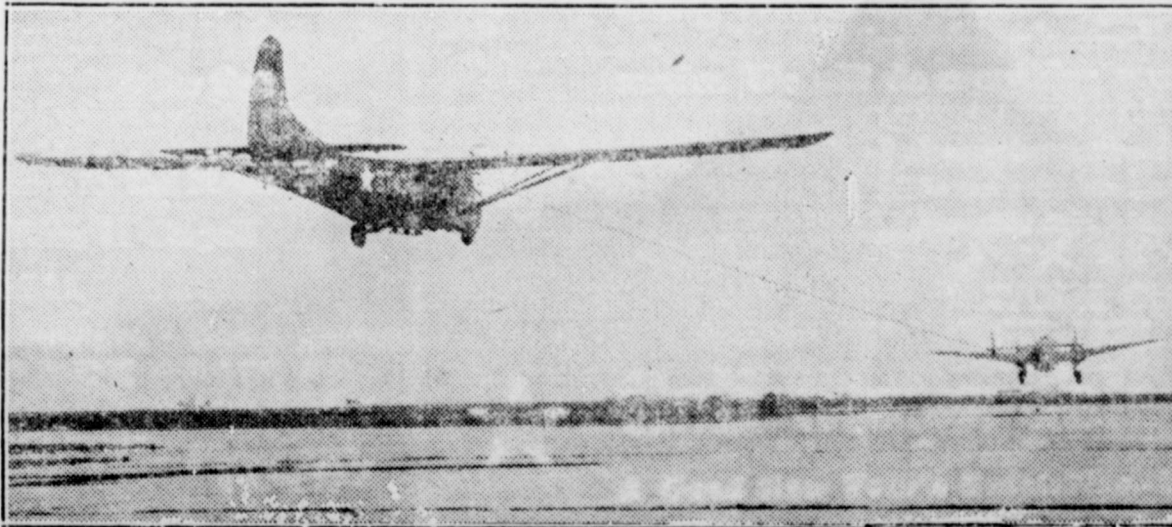

WHAT AMERICA FACES
IN YEAR AHEAD

WASHINGTON.—The official headlines have cheered us with almost daily victories through 1943, but any sober contemplation of 1944 must make us look behind them at the reality of our war effort.

In Italy, the Pacific islands and New Guinea, we have been engaged in costly, brave but token-scale fighting. A very small fraction of our massive army has even now—a month more than two years after the war started—seen the enemy. There have been official estimates that 2,500,000 (possibly about a third of our preparing army) will be overseas by New Year's Day.

Official pronouncements disclose that we had four divisions in action in Tunisia, five in Sicily, and four or five in Italy—about 60,000 to 75,000 men fighting at a time.

About half these divisions have carried on through, so that only half of them may be assumed to be additional troops. These considerations would furnish an estimate that a little over 100,000 men had yet seen action on this front.

On Guadalcanal and in the Solomons, three different divisions have been mentioned. In New Guinea, elements of two more have been officially declared. A division is supposed to have been involved at Attu.

Thus in the Pacific, the estimate could be safely placed at around 90,000 in action, plus the 19,000 regulars who fought for the Philippines.

Certainly few more than 200,000 troops—one-tenth of the land force supposed to be overseas now and only an infinitesimal 2½ per cent of the army we have been raising and training to beat the Axis—have yet been turned upon the enemy.

This does not mean their fighting has not been great and historic. Valor and greatness in combat do not rest on numbers. Nor will any future action of this war be more important than the work they had to do. The only point of this cold truth is we are still in the preparatory phase of this war now more than two years after its start.

REASONS FOR FORGETTING

That none of us has fully appreciated these facts, however, is due to several natural reasons.

In the first place, collapse of the German war machine was anticipated because of a shortage of oil and raw materials, and this proved unjustified.

Secondly, the air corps expected bombings of German cities to bring a possible capitulation due to the same reasons, and this may come any day, but it has not come yet.

Furthermore, it was wise and necessary for us to make the Nazis continue to believe new invasions of Europe were imminent, in order to keep as many Germans as possible away from the Russian front.

Finally, the profound extent of Nazi stubbornness in continued fruitless resistance to the Russians has been truly amazing. Only a nation which wants suicide could continue to face what Germany faces with the new year.

The end of the war in Europe is surely to be expected this coming year. Fuller use of our great power is practically promised officially, not on far scattered atolls but in concentrated power. Places where the blows are to be launched have almost officially been suggested.

Disappointments cannot continue to delay the inevitable. Yet if we continue only to plod along remote sandy island by island in the Pacific, and mountain by mountain in Italy, with no more than 200,000 men in action on land, anyone can see this war could last interminably (the long hard years originally forecast).

My best guess is Germany will yet crack, and quickly, that the war in Europe will certainly end in the first six months of 1944, probably the first quarter, and that Japan will last less than a year longer.

GETTING ELECTED

A young lawyer friend of mine in the Southwest decided to enter poli-

tics as a career. He started the right way, at the bottom, getting himself elected to a county board of supervisors.

At once, however, he raised the tax levy on all real estate in the county, caused an increase in the valuations and just about doubled the tax bill on all the people. I thought that would nip his political career practically in embryo. But, immediately he ran for the state legislature, and was elected almost unanimously.

Both he and I found that not a single taxpayer resented or remembered his permanent doubling of their cost of living in his community, but a small group of individuals whose lands were benefited by building a sewer through their property, thereby increasing its value, and certain farmers who obtained county roads through their property, clearly remembered his work in their interests—"development of the county." I suppose they would call it—and they whooped up almost unanimous sentiment for him. His actions paid off.

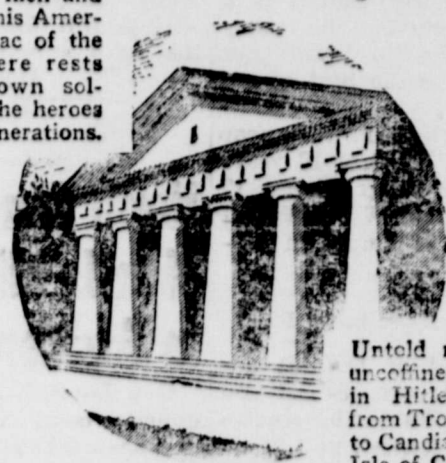

REINDEER GOOD MEAT

Reindeer are hard to get, even in normal times. But it's good to think that they make sizzling, brown roasts.

Reindeer meat has a flavor of its own, but it tastes a lot like beef or veal.

Usually, the round is preferred for roasting or steaks. The lower end of the round, being less tender, can serve as a pot roast. Being thinner than beef, the loin and rib cuts make satisfactory small steaks. These cuts also may be used as chops.

Double loin may be prepared either boned or unboned and then roasted as a saddle. The shoulder also makes a fine roast.

The big problem, of course, is getting the reindeer.

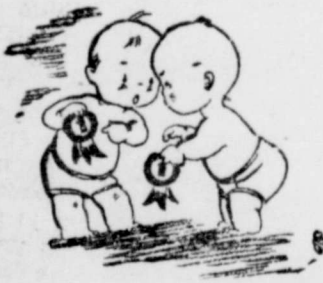

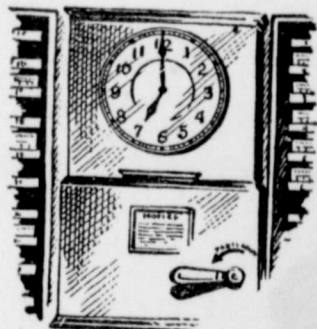
