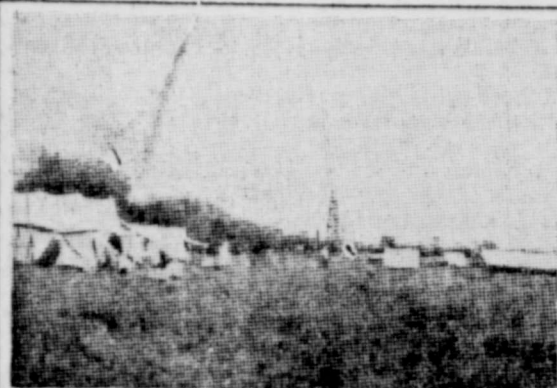

On May 9-12 Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, will hold in commemoration of its Twentieth Anniversary, the most extensive celebration ever staged on the campus, President Chas. C. Seelman announced. Centering around the principal convocation exercises to be held Saturday morning at 10:30, May 11, will be a series of events beginning Thursday night, May 9, and extending through Sunday afternoon, May 12. The Honorable James V. Allred, Governor of Texas, will deliver the principal convocation address. Bishop John M. Moore, chairman of the S. M. U. board of trustees, will preach the religious services of the Anniversary at 11:00 a. m., Sunday, May 12, in the Highland Park Methodist church.

On Thursday evening, May 9, the University Oratorio Society will present Haydn's "The Seasons," conducted by Paul Katjick in McFarlin Memorial Auditorium. Friday's events include: the annual Engineering Exhibits, lasting from 10:00 a. m.

until 10:00 p. m.; the Ardon Club plays "Bumbueppuy" and "Westward ePeople," presented in the afternoon, and "Green Grow the Lilies" given in the auditorium at 8:15 p. m. Departmental programs and exhibits will be presented from 8:30 until 10:30 Saturday morning followed by the principal convocation. The Art Department will hold an Art Exhibit throughout the celebration. A huge barbecue will be given Saturday at 1:00 p. m. to students, ex-students, and friends of the University. A series of interesting athletic events will begin at 3:00 p. m. Saturday and last through the afternoon. At 6 p. m. Saturday a number of departmental dinners will be given for ex-students of the respective schools and colleges of the University. Fraternities, sororities, the Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A. and other organizations will hold open house Saturday night. The final play or the cycle, "Night Over Taos" by Maxwell Anderson, will be given at 8:15 Saturday night in McFarlin

Memorial Auditorium. Two events will be held Sunday, the religious services and a concert by the University Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Harold Hart Todd. The concert will close the Celebration exercises.

Elaborate plans are under way to make the celebration the largest in S. M. U. history. Some twelve thousand invitations will be extended to ex-students and friends of the University to attend.

In the twenty years that have intervened since S. M. U. first opened its doors, many important and progressive changes have taken place. The university has had a phenomenal growth in all of its departments. The student body has grown from 706 to more than 2500. The faculty has increased from thirty-six members to one hundred and thirty-two. The endowment created by the University now amounts to \$2,289,700 and the plant assets are \$3,302,219, with total assets of more than \$6,000,000.

Dr. Kimbell Will Speak At Hi-School Commencement

Dr. J. F. Kimbell, executive secretary of the Baylor Medical school hospital at Dallas, will be the commencement speaker at the graduation services of the Burk Burnett high school Thursday, April 23rd, according to the announcement of Butler Westerfield, supt. this week. Dr. Kimbell is one of the most excellent speakers among the educators of the South, and he has been accorded an honored place by the teachers all over the State of Texas.

Dr. Kimbell was formerly superintendent of public schools at Dallas; and after a very successful administration in that city, he was appointed as head of the department of education at the Southern Methodist University. In the last capacity he became widely acquainted with the teachers over the State. During the last few years, he has conducted courses in education for extension credit in Wichita County; and several Burk Burnett teachers have taken such courses during his teaching.

Dr. Kimbell is well known in Burk Burnett. On several occasions he has visited this city in his business trips in connection with his present office as secretary of the medical hospital school. As has been previously announced in this paper, Dr. Sandefer, president of Hardin-Simmons will be the speaker at the baccalaureate services that will be held May 19th. The detailed program of both services will be printed in the near future.

ELECTION FOR EXTENSION OF LIGHT PLANT TO BE HELD ON MON., MAY 6th

The citizens of Burk Burnett will vote on the encumbrance of the municipal light plant for the sum of \$32,000.00 on next Monday, May 6. The purpose of the indebtedness according to the public statement issued by the council in the ordinance, is to retire certain obligations now standing and the purchase of materials and machinery in order to increase the service of the plant. At the present the Hardin Municipal plant is being taxed to its capacity to meet the demand of additional customers.

With the advent of summer the new customers and the additional service demanded will be more than the present plant can produce, according to those who are backing issuance of the obligation. The election was called when an emergency ordinance was passed during the first week of April. It provided that the indebtedness should be \$32,000 and that the paper would mature serially in eight years. The paper is to bear an interest rate of 6 per cent, per year, and payable monthly.

According to the ordinance, all qualified voters of the city of Burk Burnett are eligible to vote in the election, and the polls for the election will be at the city hall. The presiding judge for the election will be August Lohofener. His assistant

No Additional Taxes
The ordinance holds one portion that is a departure from the ordinary scheme. It provides that the holders of the obligation shall never have the right to demand the payment of the obligation out of any fund or funds raised or to be raised by the taxation of the citizens of the government. The municipal plant has been established in Burk for two years. Since that time it has operated with uninterrupted success, and the only difficulty has been the supplying of the demand that has been in a constant increase since the plant first started.

The plant was originally started by the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Hardin, who made it possible for the city to undertake the work by the advancing of credit and funds sufficient to build and furnish the original shop.

The statement issued by the authorizer Wednesday was:

"Voters please bear in mind this obligation is not in any manner a tax on your property. This election was called on account of the State law being such that the governing body of the city could not encumber the plant for more than \$5,000.00 without a vote of the people."

A STUPID CARELESSNESS

While we were standing near the edge of the Ward School playground last week, we noticed ten cars pass the school during the recess period; and of the ten cars, nine of them disregarded one or more of the signal lights placed there for the safety of the children. We commented on the fact to one of the members of the local faculty, and we were told that the situation was so dangerous that two teachers were required for constant duty at the intersections.

Of course we realize that the Burkburnett people are very busy; and that, when they get in their autos to go some place, that their tasks are so important that they can't afford to wait the extra fifty seconds that the lights require, regardless of how many children's lives that they endanger. However, to these very busy citizens of our fair city we would suggest that they re-route their journey around Ave. D so that they will not have to pause.

Personally we can think of nothing so stupid and careless as this constant disregard for the signal lights. They are inconvenient for the person driving, but they are not as useless as the average driver seems to think. The irony of the whole situation is that we have noticed that only the foreign cars stop. Cars from other states seem to respect the signals, but the local citizens have become contemptible thru the immunity that they have achieved.

SOFT BALL

The Chamber of Commerce is undertaking to sponsor the most ambitious recreational program that it has ever tried in promoting the soft ball league in Burkburnett this year. The league has obligated itself with burdens that, at first, seemed impossible to bear. However, as the organization has proceeded, the cooperation of the business men and clubs as well as the individual members of the league has made it possible to carry out the plans of the league.

Among the improvements that have been accomplished through the league organization has been the provision of the permanent steel light posts at the football stadium. Like many other schools in this district, our school used wooden poles for the first lights. These poles soon become useless. The local league has replaced these with ten permanent light standards. If nothing else is accomplished this year, that completed project will be adequate reason for the league's existence.

But more than the increased efficiency of the stadium will be accomplished. Over 150 men of the community will acquire some aches and pains in the sacred name of recreation, and the crowd will acquire some stitches in its collective side watching the antics of our leading men trying to pursue the big ball. In the end several hundred persons in the community will be entertained five nights a week. All of this leads us to compliment the excellent organization that the local enthusiasts have perfected, and the efficiency with which they are carrying out their purpose.

Scouts To Ride Katy To Washington, D. C.

The official route for the Wichita Area Scouts will be Via Katy to St. Louis, and C. & O. to Washington. The Special train will start at Waco and pick up Dallas Scouts-Sherman and Denison Scouts and Wichita Car will be attached and further cars will be added at Durant, Muskogee and McAlester.

Each Scout that makes the trip must take a three day Training Course in Wichita Falls from Aug. 16th to Aug. 18 just prior to boarding train for St. Louis. Only 34 persons will occupy a car (Chair Car) and this will make it more comfortable for the boys. As many baggage cars that are necessary will be added to the special train. Some of the food figures have been released, here is what they say it will take—250 tons of food each day, this is over 3 freight cars full. Boys will use over 1,000,000 gallons of water per day, 300,000 meals will be served each day, it will take 150,000 lbs. of meat, 900 bushels of potatoes, 70,000 eggs, 300,000 flapjacks for a meal. The camp will use over 30,000 quarts of milk per day, over 15,000 loaves of bread, over 4,000 lbs. of butter, and for each vegetable or canned fruit they will open 125,000 gallon cans of each kind, for instance if they have 1 vegetable and one fruit, then over 3000 gallon cans will be used for the one meal.

The objectives of the National Jamboree can be set down as follows: To promote new sense of National Brotherhood and stimulate friendship among Scouts and Scouters—To provide an educational opportunity for Scouts to visit Historic Shrines of National Capital—To stimulate the program of citizenship training. To give Scouts an opportunity to observe methods and program of Scouts from different sections of the country, an opportunity to see and hear the President of the United States.

Over 30,000 Scouts from the United States and over 1,000 Scouts from 70 different Nations will be assembled for 10 days in Washington from August 1st to August 30th. There will be no unofficial groups in Washington during Jamboree, and all Scouts not officially connected with some delegation are asked not to wear their uniform in Washington or to expect to participate in the Jamboree.

Wichita Area Council has been allotted 54 boys and four men, and to date only 12 boys have signed up, and all boys intending to go must have reservation in Wichita Falls headquarters before Saturday, May 3rd for after that date all unused portions of the allotment will be transferred to some Council that has more boys wanting to go than they have allotment.

Cost has been reduced to a minimum, \$47.00 for entire trip. Word has just been received that Government will provide tents, cots and blankets.

Mrs. T. L. Geeslin Rites Held Mon. Afternoon

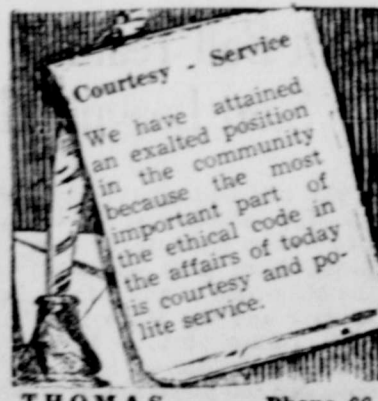

Washington Digest

National Topics Interpreted
by William Brockhart

Washington.—Much ado is being made around Washington again over lobbyists.

It is true that there are now perhaps more lobbyists in Washington than at any time in the last fifteen years.

It is true they are influencing legislation, and I think it can be said without fear of contradiction that lobbyists are responsible for a portion of the talking parties in congress.

Existence of this unusual condition in Washington carries more significance, however, than just the fact that special interests or individual interests are trying to protect themselves. From a good many sources I gather the opinion that the condition means the President's power has weakened.

It is to be remembered that when Mr. Roosevelt carried his New Deal into the White House and led the large Democratic majority over to control the national legislative body, that very fact threatened lobbyists. Very few of the so-called special interests had the courage to battle the individual representatives or senators to plead their cause. These representatives and senators were looking to White House leadership; they felt rested on the New Deal, and they were unable apparently to gauge what public sentiment would be if they openly disagreed with Presidential orders. In these days, the members of the Capitol and the house and senate office buildings were virtually deserted of lobbyists—far that is what a lobbyist is.

To the extent that lobbyists operated in the early days of the Roosevelt administration, they sought to influence Presidential decision and the activities of the brain trust and underlings who drafted the Presidential programs. Once these programs had been submitted to congress, the opposition to them largely subsided and rogues jumped to the crack of the Presidential whip. As stated above, individual members were afraid to go against White House orders and lobbyists were afraid to combat the President's popularity.

But a year ago, various interests throughout the country began to sense a feeling that they could again talk with members of congress safely. They began organizing their representatives here as they formerly had enjoyed, and little by little broadened the scope of their activities. A singular part about the present condition is the mushroom growth of the lobbyists. Supplementing their growth has been an unusual fearlessness. They are busy pushing all kinds of causes, good and bad.

Some forces estimate there are close to five hundred different groups and organizations actively petitioning congress to do this or that according to their lights. There are such gigantic lobbies as that of organized labor, agriculture and the American Legion. There are lobbies for religious and racial groups. The power interests at the moment bulk large with their lobbying activities. Individual lines of industry have their representatives here in numbers. The railroads, for example, have headquarters here for their Association of American Railroads and it is also the headquarters for the Short-Line Railroad association. The bankers maintain a legislative committee of the American Bankers' association here, and even scientific groups have their people treading water in the halls of congress, watching and waiting to be sure that nothing detrimental to their interests is done by the legislators.

It will be recalled that several weeks ago Mr. Roosevelt let loose one of the bitterest messages he has ever sent to congress in denunciation of the activities of the power lobby. At that time, the vicious character of his accusations against the power interests was attributed by many observers to his intense feeling that public utility holding companies should be abolished. He felt that cliques of financiers were taking advantage of innocent investors and he wanted to tell the country about it.

Now, however, it develops that he was shooting not only at the power group but at all so-called special interests which were seeking to protect themselves from what they regarded as flagrant violations of property rights of the established business practices. It must be said that for a few days, the President's message did have the effect of slowing down lobbying activities but the lobbyists had tasted of their own power. They are not to be frightened by any Presidential attack nor by the threat of Senator Black of Alabama to force through legislation compelling lobbyists in Washington to register. As a matter of cold fact, it is my conviction that Senator Black will find himself thoroughly circumvented in any move he may make to press for action on what is generally regarded as a ridiculous piece of legislation. It is a thirty-year-old proposal, anyway.

It all goes to show that, at least among those with the courage of their convictions, President Roosevelt is not as powerful as he was in the first year of his reign. Balking tactics in congress over the public works relief bill

was but the outward sign of courage underneath. I have reported to you before that there were underlings and expressions of discontent within the President's vast majority in the house and senate. While the malcontents are not openly criticizing the President, they are able to accomplish their purpose by delay and disagreement over what ordinarily would be very minor details.

I believe it is the consensus also that the activities of petitioners for their rights are responsible to a large extent for the creation of numerous blocs in congress. It has been observed by numerous publicists that if there is danger of Fascism in the United States, it lies in this line of blocs in congress. The natural result is to replace and break up the two old established parties. Thus far in this session there has been evidence time after time of bloc activities, one against another. This condition results in legislative malaise, and all of which result in good or even well-written legislation.

When the President came through the biennial election last fall with his majorities increased, there were those who insisted that he would have his will with congress and no questions asked. They did not reckon, however, with the potential strength of the various interests watching congressional activities. I do not believe that a careful analysis of the activities of most of these lobbyists will show improper relations between them and members of congress. They are simply asserting the right of every individual, namely, the privilege to tell his representative or senator what his opinion is. Certainly, there is a growing feeling that Mr. Roosevelt gained little or nothing when he attacked the power interests, and over their shoulder all other representation in Washington.

Now that President Roosevelt has title to \$4,500,000,000 to spend pretty much as he pleases, the question is heard around Washington more and more frequently, what is he going to do with it? The truth is that administration plans for utilizing this vast sum of money are so nebulous that no one can tell, even the officials themselves, to what use it will be put. One hears about attacking the problem of soil erosion so that the destruction by dirt storms will occur no more, and there is talk of many public works projects. When one tries to find out details of these, however, he is promptly confronted by a stone wall, either of silence or of a frank statement that only the outlines have thus far been considered.

Conversations over luncheon tables in Washington seem to indicate that actual spending of this money in any appreciable sum will not get under way for some months. In fact, there seems to be ground for belief that nothing of substantial character will take place in a spending way before next winter. And, if that is true the comment suggests, the great appropriation will be effective only in a political way next spring and summer.

It should be remembered that the amount voted the President in this one resolution which is to be spent practically at his direction is greater than the total expenditure of the federal government for any year from 1922 to 1931.

With further references to lobbying activities, it is made to appear that two organizations have done an especially good job. I refer to the operations of the American Legion office in Washington and its fight for the veterans' bonus, and the activity of the various agricultural and farm organizations who have been fighting off certain phases of railroad legislation.

The farmers, according to the best information I can get, are opposed to federal regulation of interstate bus and truck business because they feel the proposed legislation will hamper farm-to-market hauling. I suspect that the bus and truck group have persuaded the farm representatives to oppose regulatory measures for busses and trucks on the basis of misunderstanding. I have made numerous inquiries of legislative drafting experts and of house and senate leaders respecting the point at issue and all have assured me that the proposed federal regulation will in no way apply to farm-to-market hauling.

While the point made here is not at all important and when farm operators of trucks understand it they will doubtless shy away from the position they have taken, it illustrates how one organization will attract many followers to its ranks who actually ought not to be there.

Now as to the bonus proposition, it ought to be said that the Roosevelt administration is in a hole. So well has the American Legion done its job that there is no doubt in my mind at the moment respecting the outcome. There will be bonus legislation passed by congress at this session. Whether it will be signed or vetoed by President Roosevelt depends entirely upon the nature of the bill as it finally is passed.

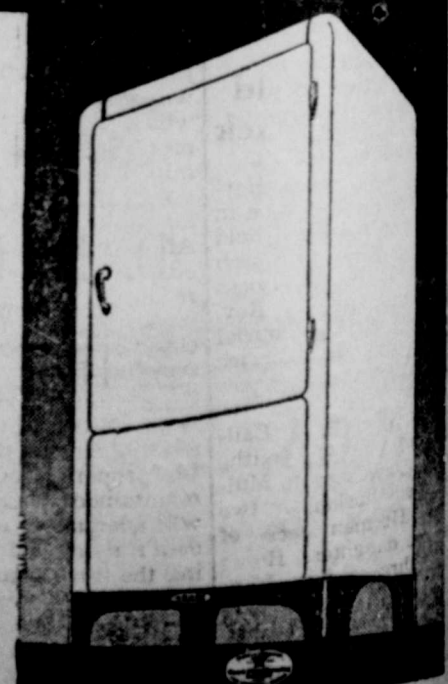

When the so-called "bridge lamp" is used to light a game of bridge, as above, its nature and purpose have been misunderstood. At right is shown a correct type of lamp for the purpose.

MISPLAYED hands, sharp words
exchanged across the bridge
table—these are frequent indications
that the "bridge lamp" has been
misnamed. So-called because its ex-
tension arm holding the shade and
bulb has been built on the principle
of the cantilever bridge, the bridge
lamp was really designed as a read-
ing lamp, and not to play bridge by,
at all.

General Illumination Needed

When this lamp is used to illu-
minate a bridge table, we invariably
find a result like that shown in the
illustration at upper left. Because
of its narrow circle of light, this

lamp can properly illuminate only
two of the hands of cards. In order
to provide light for the other side of
the table, the shade has been tilted,
causing discomfort and glare all
around.

Double-Purpose Lamps Available

For adequate lighting of a bridge
game, either the indirect torchere,
as shown, or one of the indirect floor
lamps containing a white glass bowl
within the shade, may be used. The
latter, which forms a good reading
lamp, gives both totally indirect and
semi-indirect light. Thus, it is a
double-purpose lamp, and comes in
a wide variety of styles and designs
suitable for any decorative scheme.

The indirect torchere is well-nigh
ideal for the game room or recrea-

tion room, besides doing its turn in
the living room when a moderate
amount of glareless light is desired.
Many of these torcheres come
equipped with the new three-light
bulbs, by which any of three differ-
ent amounts of light may be had at
the mere turn of a switch.

Make-shift lighting is no longer

than is make-shift furniture. The

Navy Appropriation Bill

Tuesday, April 23rd the House
began its debate on the \$460,000,000
Navy Bill. This bill follows the ex-
ample of the Army appropriation in
that it is one of the largest ever
proposed during
peace time. The
chairman of the
subcommittee ex-
plained this in part
in presenting the
bill to the House by
stating that the
present troubled
European situation
is creative of an oc-
casional for alarm.
The debate contin-
ued Wed. and Thurs
and finally passed
Friday without a record vote. How-
ever, the sentiment for the bill
was expressed in the vote of 239
to 56 defeating a motion to recom-
mit and reduce the total by 20 per
cent. This is the largest Navy Ap-
propriation in more than ten years,
exceeding last year by \$172,000,000.
The "Big Navy" men's dream of a
treaty navy seems to be a great deal
nearer now. As passed the measure
authorizes the laying down of 55
new planes and an increase in per-
sonnel of 93,000, or 11,000 more than
at present. There is also a provision
for the enrollment of 500 additional
cadets in the United States Naval
Academy at Annapolis.

Work Relief Program

A majority of the interest of of-
ficial Washington has, for the past
week, been centered around the Ad-
ministration that the President is
setting up to handle the expendi-
ture of the \$4,880,000,000 appropria-
tion recently passed. The foundation
seems to have been completed and
the "Big Three" of this administra-
tion have been indicated. Frank C.
Walker, former Treasurer of the
Democratic Party; Secretary of In-
terior, Ickes; and the director of the
Federal Emergency Relief Adminis-
tration, Hopkins. All applications
will be sent to Walker first and a
complete report on the necessity,
practicality, and legality of each
project will be made. This report
will then go to the Allotment Board,
which is to be headed by Ickes. The
method of financing is to be deter-
mined by this board and the whole
then submitted to the President for
his approval, revision, or rejection.
After this action has been complet-
ed, the project, if approved, will be
returned to the appropriate govern-
ment agency. At the same time a
copy goes to Hopkins who will be
in charge of the operations. It will
be his task to see that the supplies
relief rolls are employed, and that
are purchased, that persons on the
proper speed and progress are
maintained. This set-up, it seems,
will adequately carry out the Presi-
dent's expressed purpose of spend-
ing the huge amount as rapidly and
efficiently as possible.

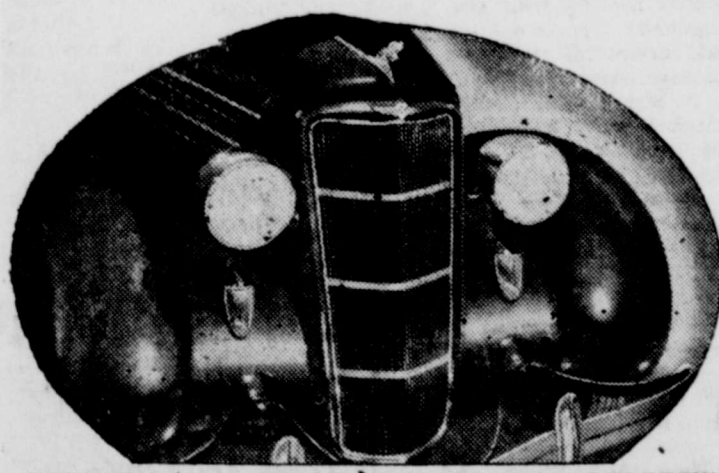

Home Demonstration Work

After hearing her explanation and seeing the chickens, turkeys, ducks, and guinea pigs about the farm, you can see why living at home is so profitable. The Gilberts' eighty baby chicks are growing rapidly in their house. The floor covered with straw and the air warmed by the previously used for heating the living room shows one that can be done without a lot of expense.

Mrs. Gilbert says the milk not used for home use brings them an average of \$46.00 per month. The spring garden includes 2500 lbs. of vegetables, such as peas, beans, cucumbers, potatoes, tomatoes, etc. Besides these, a pagoda bed was planted this year.

Each berry orchard supply family with fruit for the pantry. Mrs. Gilbert renders sufficient for family use and besides makes preserves which serve as a meat substitute, such as beef and pork. At \$2.50, Mrs. Gilbert regains the cost of a beef which she can have at \$25.00.

As you see, we do not depend on a living. We make the garden and chickens pay our bills. Mrs. Gilbert. Other members can make a go of living-at-home. It takes less than half as much to live in the country as it does in town.

Under the close supervision of club sponsor, Mrs. E. W. Pohl, and the Home Demonstration Club of Wichita County, the Sunshine Hill Club girls are progressing toward the goal of accomplishment at the beginning of the year. Five cooperators have made 9 lbs. and 5 slips in the clothing line, while the wardrobe demonstration, Penna Mae Miller, has made 10 lbs. slips, dress, step-ins, and 10 pairs of records of her clothing. To improve her storage space at no expense at all, Jennie is using orange boxes to store her clothes closet. These will take the place of a wire closet across the corner behind the Jennie Mae's bedroom. Besides wardrobe work, gardening has been planted by these girls. They have chosen the favorite vegetable and plan to have as much of it for the food budget.

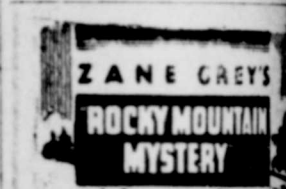
