

Commissioners' Race Highlight Of Election

Absentee voting ended Tuesday for the runoff election in the Democratic Primary with 110 votes polled: 57, Precinct III; 52, Precinct I and 1, Precinct II.

The runoff election polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday.

Local positions for County Commissioner, Precinct One and Three will be determined in this election.

In the Democratic Primary, held May 3, 192, absentee ballots were cast with a total vote of 2,295. Of this total vote, 799 votes were cast in Precinct One and 692 votes were cast in Precinct Three.

From a field of three candidates in Precinct Three Commissioner's race, the two top vote getters were Julian Mendoza, who polled 285 votes and incumbent Paul Hunter, who polled 310 votes.

Because neither of the candidates polled votes which constituted one-half majority of total votes cast in that precinct, these candidates names will appear on the runoff ballot.

In Precinct One, incumbent Commissioner Marcus Vest announced his intentions to retire, leaving that race to a field of five candidates.

Paul Logsdon received 268 of the total votes cast and Murrell Blassingame received 212 votes in that race.

Precinct One voters will cast their ballots in the County Courthouse. Election judge Billie Marie Long and alternate judge Emma Wil-

liams will officiate.

Precinct Three voters will cast their ballots in the Housing Authority Building. Election judge Olson Sweat and alternate judge Jesse Munoz, Jr., will officiate.

Because of runoff ballot positions in state offices, voting will take place in all precincts.

Precinct Two voters will cast their ballots in Westbrook School with election judge Doug Barber and alternate judge Keith Williamson officiating.

Lorraine's Lions Club Building will be the location of the Precinct Four voting box with Ted Le-fever and Mrs. Royce Beights serving as election judge and alternate judge.

Precinct Seven voting box will be located in the Oak Street Baptist Church annex. Election judge will be Billie Ruffin with Juanita Vest serving as alternate judge.

State offices on the ballot will include: Associate Justice, Su-

preme Court Place 1, John C. Phillips and James P. (Jim) Wallace; Judge, Criminal Court of Appeals, Place 1, Mike McCormick and W.T. Phillips and Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, Tom Davis and Edith Roberts.

All registered voters are encouraged to go to the polls Saturday and exercise the privilege of selecting government officials to represent their individual points of view.

Rodeo Arena Readied For July Competition

Plans for completing the rodeo arena and bleachers were among the top priority in discussion during the monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Monday night.

It was reported that c-iron for the bleachers has been delivered and two weeks after poles are set in the ground, the bleachers will be completed.

Also, the bucking chutes for the arena are due to arrive any day and once this is done, a painting party will be held to put the finishing touches on the arena.

Chamber President Brad Rose reported that rodeo buntings will be leased to merchants soon to decorate the town in an effort to create a festive atmosphere during Fiesta Day, July 22 and for the

rodeo days, July 23, 24, 25 and 26.

Senior Citizens at Wallace Center are planning to make pillows to be rented to spectators at the rodeo for \$1 each. In return, they will receive 60 percent of the rental and the Chamber will get 40 percent.

Director Chris Hubbard reported that he has located an electric eye to be used for timed events. The electric eye will be available at very little cost from a La-mesa Group.

It was also noted that lights have been donated by David Marion to be added to the lights at the rodeo arena.

Joy and Mac Morris also attended the meeting. They are heading up plans for the annual July 4th Fly-in and reported that plans are going smoothly with three aerobatic pilots

planning to put on performances and four planes will be used to give plane rides at a cost of \$5 per person.

They also reported that efforts are being made to get military planes out of Dyess Air Force Base, radio controlled model planes demonstrated by an Abilene group and parachutists from Abilene.

It was pointed out that the Chamber's Ambassadors will be in charge of the gate. Price of admission is \$2.50 per adult, \$5 a car load. Cost for breakfast at the Fly-See RODEO Page 4

School Awarded Classroom Funds

Runaway Bolts And Is Recaptured Monday

Local authorities were led on a merry chase Monday afternoon by juveniles involved in two separate incidents.

Assistant Chief of Police Jerry Cowin and Sergeant Jimmy Roundtree had detained a young man hitchhiking, suspected of being a runaway.

They were in the process of checking his identity when they received a report of a vehicle running through a fence and leaving the scene.

The officers placed the youth in the back

seat of the police car and went to the hit and run location.

Witness at the scene reported a pickup driven by a young boy, whom they identified, had torn down about 60 feet of fence and had not stopped.

While investigating this incident, a second call was monitored reporting a pickup driven by a young boy was involved in an accident on the old Buford Road north of Interstate 20.

Highway Patrolman James Burson was the first officer at the scene. He found a witness had contacted the ambu-

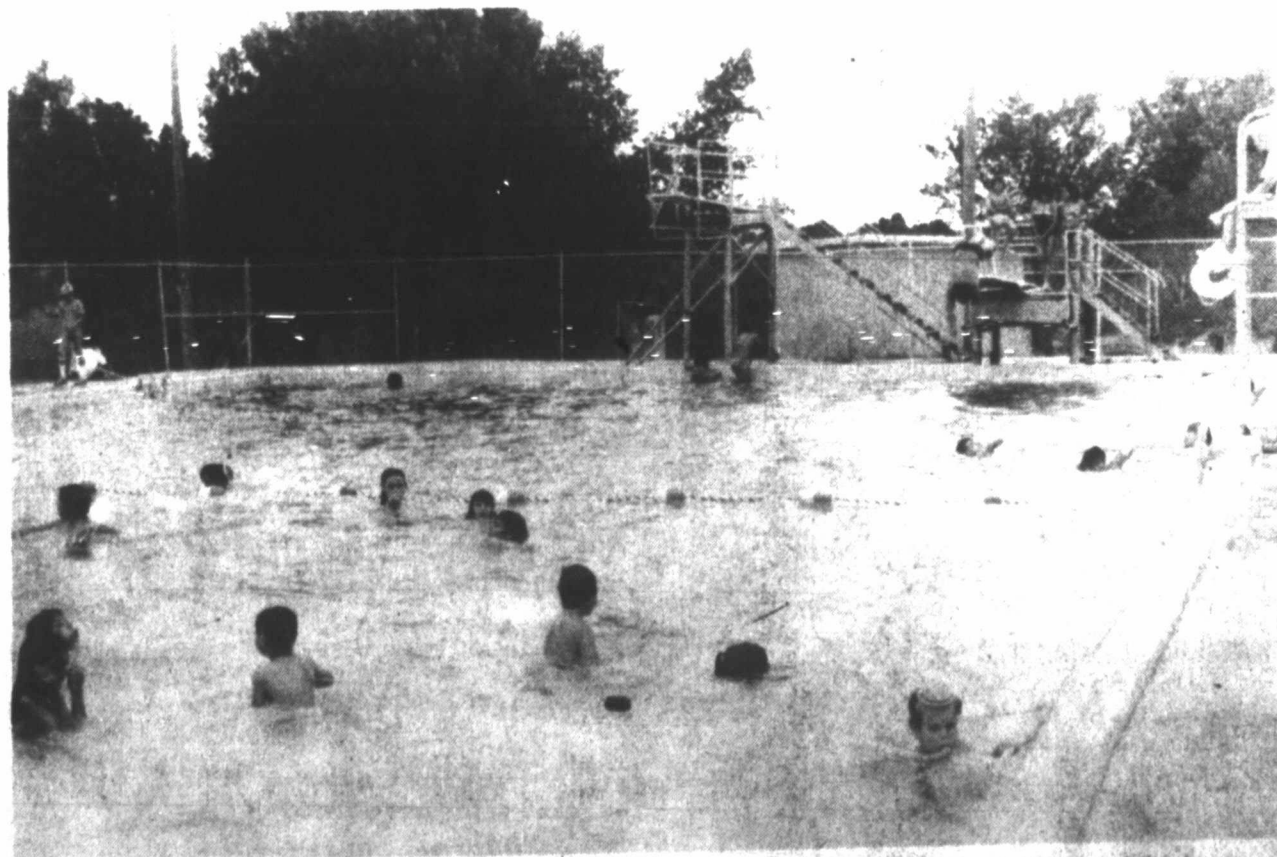
lance service and the two young boys occupying the pickup had been taken to the hospital with injuries.

The pickup was overturned in the ditch and he found evidence the boys had been traveling at a high rate of speed, topped a slight rise in the road and lost traction and control.

He said the pickup turned sideways in the road and turned over.

Because the location of the accident is within the city limits, city police were contacted and the case turned over

Sales Tax Rebate Increase Explained As "Tinkering"

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said May rebates to Texas cities of the one percent sales tax will amount to \$38.7 million.

Bullock said that while most cities will receive a larger check this month compared to the same period last year, he doesn't believe it's because the state's economy is growing at a robust pace.

"We've been tinkering

around with our processing system to improve it over the past few months and, as a result, fund allocations and rebates have shot up from time to time because of improved handling of tax accounts," he said.

Colorado City received \$11,977.34 in rebate for the past quarter as compared to \$4,971.01 for the same period in 1979. The 1980 payments to date total \$51,455.03 as compared to \$31,005.30 in 1979. This indicates a 65 percent increase.

Coahoma received \$1,152.34 in rebate for the past quarter as compared to none in the same period in 1979. The 1980 payments to date total \$8,191.30 as compared to \$6,337.20 in 1979. This indicates a 29 percent increase.

Lorraine received \$599.99 in rebate for the past quarter as compared to none for the same period in 1979. The 1980 payments to date total \$2,142.26 as compared to \$1,053.24 in 1979. This indicates a 103 percent increase.

Snyder received \$38,235.11 in rebate for the past quarter as compared to \$15,970.26 for the same period in 1979. The 1980 payments to date total \$211,614.71 as

compared to \$158,069.55 in 1979. This indicates a 33 percent increase.

Bankers Hours Changed

Customers of the City National Bank in Colorado City will find banking more convenient since Monday.

"We have made several changes in operating hours in an effort to better accommodate more of our customers," Chairman of the Board of Directors Charles Thompson said.

In addition to the normal business hours of 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. weekdays, the drive-in window is now open from 8:30 a.m. through 6 p.m. weekdays.

Inside and full banking service hours have been extended on Fridays to include an additional two hours from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

The previous drive-in banking on Saturday and late hours on Thursday are no longer available.

These changes in business hours were implemented at the request of management and vote by the Board of Directors according to Vice President George Womack.

Total Effort Asked For "Project 100"

City Manager Ray Mason will begin "Project 100" Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall when he meets with presidents and chairmen of local groups and organizations.

"Project 100 was the result of numerous surveys and consultations with the West Texas Council of Governments.

If successful, it will commemorate the 100th birthday of Colorado City by cleaning up "eyesores" throughout the city.

After Thursday evening's instructional meeting, persons representing groups and organizations will be requested to inform their individual groups of plans for the project.

"Another gathering will be held about the middle of June," Mason said. Members of the groups and organizations will be invited to attend this meeting and assignments will be given to begin "Project 100."

Mason will assign to these various groups an area in which to work along Highway 80 between Lone Wolf Bridge and the City cemetery.

"We hope to combine our total energies into one effort," Mason said, "to make Colorado City a better place to live."

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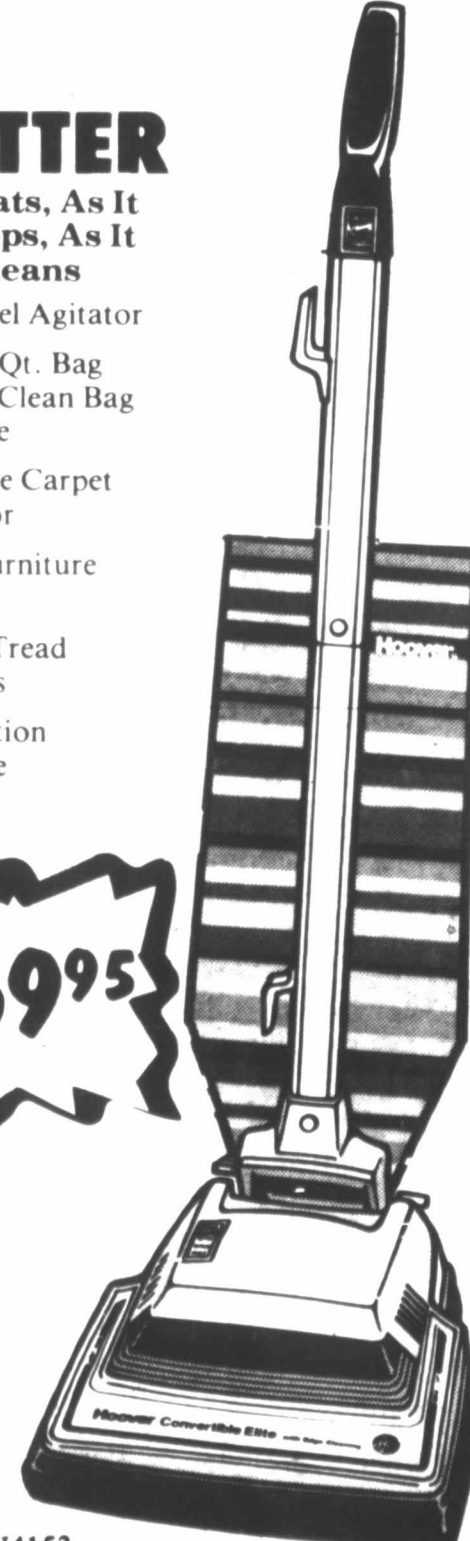

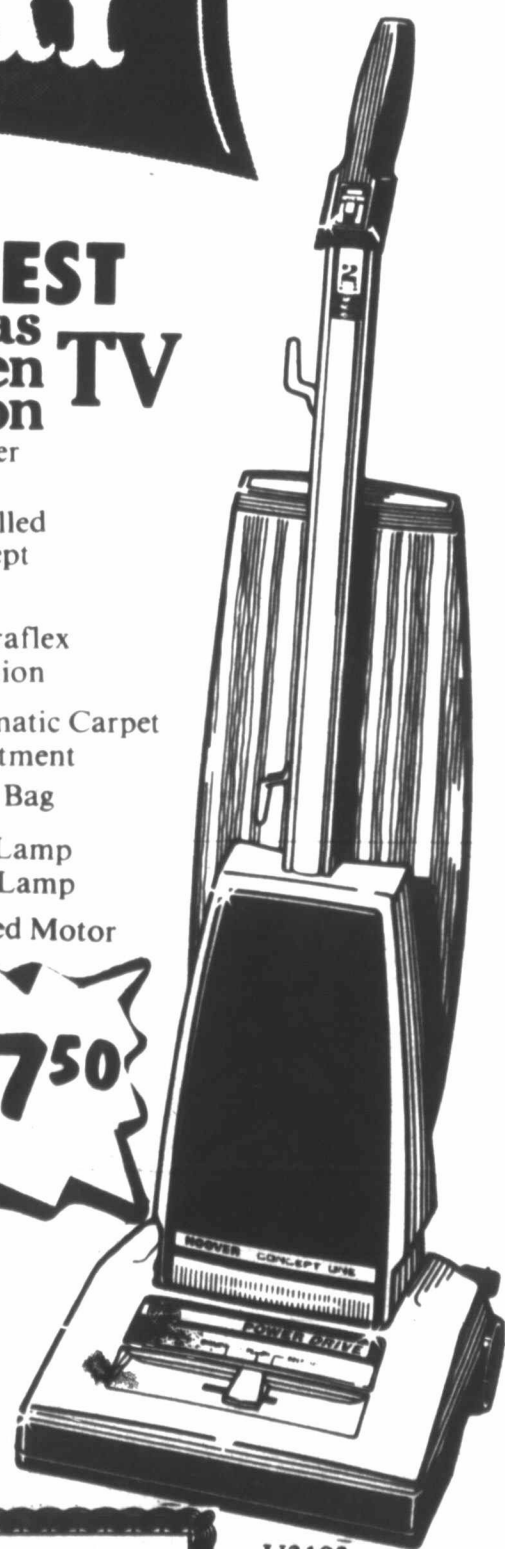

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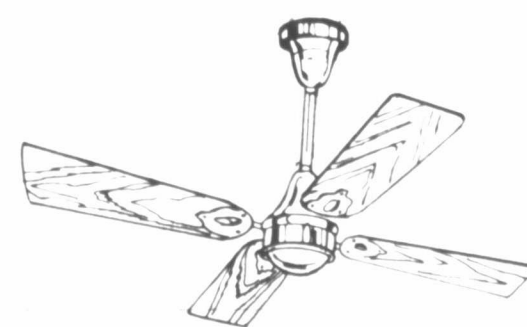
