CAN AUDIO-VISUAL DO?—When this question was asked twenty years ago, only speculation could be made. Today, however, we can answer with facts based upon research in contemporary classrooms. Learning that is mechanized is almost always forgotten, whereas experiences are almost always retained, as in the case of the audio-visual method. Hico schools are well equipped to furnish these rich experiences for students. In the picture above is shown Gary Wootton, a film strip, a movie projector, an overhead projector, a record player, and a set of slides on a tripod stand. Four different rooms

are furnished with black-out curtains so that the projectors may be used more effectively. There is a beaded screen and aluminum screen that may be moved from room to room and some of the rooms have permanent screens. In addition to the above mentioned, each room is furnished with a bulletin board that is being used to advantage. You will also see models, mock-ups, specimens, posters, photographs, flat maps, sketches, cartoons, diagrams, graphs and project charts used throughout the school. The science laboratory has a micro projector with which the teacher may project any slide either prepared or live, on a screen large enough for all of the class to see at one time.

Final Filing Dates for City School Elections Near

Monday, March 1, and Wednesday, March 3, are final filing dates for the two elections to be held on City Election Day, April 1. The March 1 date is for the election of Mayor and the March 3 date is for the election of City Council members.

Now candidates had filed for the positions to be voted on Wednesday. Candidates have authorized their names on the city election ballot. M. Bullard, Jim Jameson, C. Howard for councilmen, E. Bullock for mayor. The aldermen are seeking re-election to second terms on the ballot. Bullock is seeking the office of mayor, now occupied by Randall, who declined to run for re-election this year after serving the past two years in capacity.

In the school trustee election, names of Ray Cheek and J. E. Wootton were filed early last week, followed by the filing by W. F. Hafer for a place on the ballot at mid-week. Cheek and Wootton are seeking re-election.

Election Is Called To Consolidate

Notices were posted Wednesday following an order by County Judge W. E. Tate, calling for an election to be held Saturday, March 22, for the consolidation of the Duffau School District with Hico Independent School District No. 903.

The election was called by the county judge after a petition had been presented calling for the consolidation.

The election will be held at the Hico City Hall, with A. A. Brown as presiding judge.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of the State and County and who are resident voters in said District shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Similar action was taken at Duffau.

The petition was presented to the county judge Friday, February 21, and the election order was dated February 26.

County Centennial Plans Materialize At Monday Meeting

The meeting in Hamilton Monday night to crystallize plans for a Centennial Celebration for Hamilton County saw enough good ideas advanced and approved to give an outline of how it will look in general, with many details not yet resolved.

Dr. C. B. Cathey accepted the post of general chairman and named some of the committees who will supply the work, money and detailed plans.

Though not in final form the celebration will likely start with sale of hats, canes and buttons for men to wear and apron and bonnets for the ladies. One of the larger buildings in Hamilton will be taken over and a space assigned for a booth for each community in the county. These booths will be headquarters for that community and will enable those interested to find information about every phase of the celebration in which it is participating.

An effort will be made to have a continuous flow of entertainment by re-creating the atmosphere of the old time saloon with soft drinks, domino tables, a restaurant serving food in the building and many games for children and teenagers. It is planned to give one or more square dances, hold an old-time fiddlers contest, have barbershop quartets, and short plays of the old tear-jerker type.

Space for community booths should be requested from W. B. McPherson Jr., who will be general secretary.

Ending the celebration a pageant would be presented in which important historical events would be re-enacted and people who have rendered outstanding service will be honored if living, and the memory of many now deceased would likewise be honored.

Anyone having knowledge of an event or personality which they consider to be good material for this pageant could outline a story and file it with Mr. McPherson for possible inclusion.

SOCIAL STUDIES—The Social Science Department of Hico High School offers two one-unit courses and two one-half unit courses. The one-unit courses are World and American History, both of which are required for graduation. World History is required for freshmen students and American History is required for junior students. One-half elective courses are offered in Civics and Texas History. These courses are open to seniors and are taken by 90 per cent of that group. The State Department of Education has ruled that all students graduating in 1961 and those after must have one-half unit in Civics plus the courses in

World and American History. This requirement will cause no change in Hico's offerings since the school has been offering the prescribed courses for years. An effort is made to see that the social studies students acquire a basic knowledge and understanding of the geography, history, economics, and government of the world today. The only subject with wider student participation than social studies is English. At the present time 78 of the 103 students are taking a social studies course. All of the high school social studies courses are taught by A. A. Chandler, as they have been for a number of years.

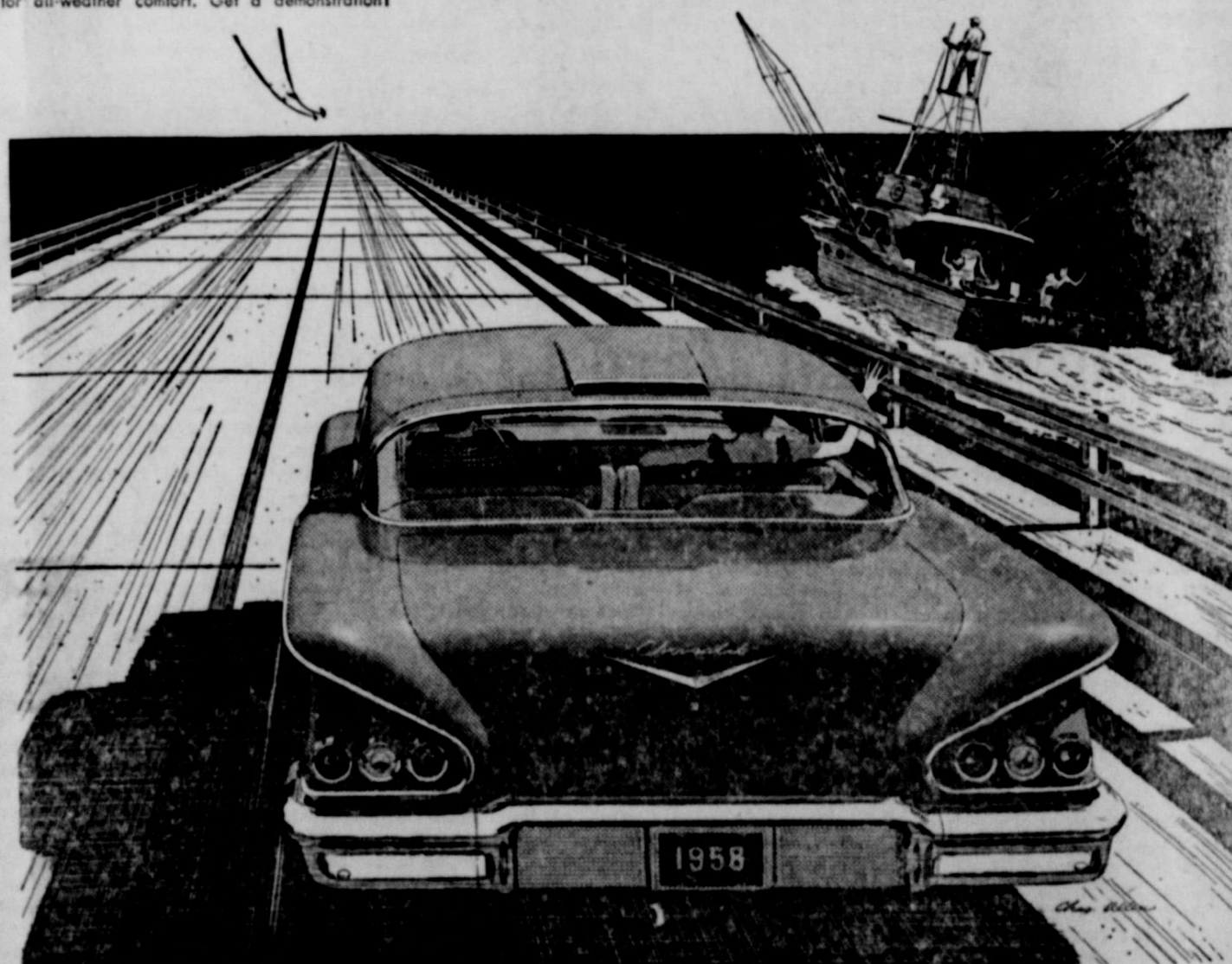

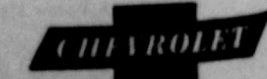

PHYSICS CLASS—In this picture you see the physics class at work establishing the point and the steam point in the experiment to create the thermometer. Physics is the science that deals with the physical changes in matter. Ten students are enrolled this year under the supervision of Mrs. W. P. Brummett. The lab is completely equipped for scientific research and is used by high school students. Chemistry, on alternate years by Mrs. Brummett, is primarily with the chemical changes occurring in matter. Last year was the first in several years that the course had been offered. Fifteen students took advantage of the course, using the new triple beam balances, chemicals, and modern research charts to develop and try their scientific minds. Biology is also taught annually, Mr. Ross Hall being the teacher. All the Sophomores are enrolled in that course this year. Biology is the study of the origin of plants and animals. Many forms of these may be grown in the laboratory and studied under the micro-projector.

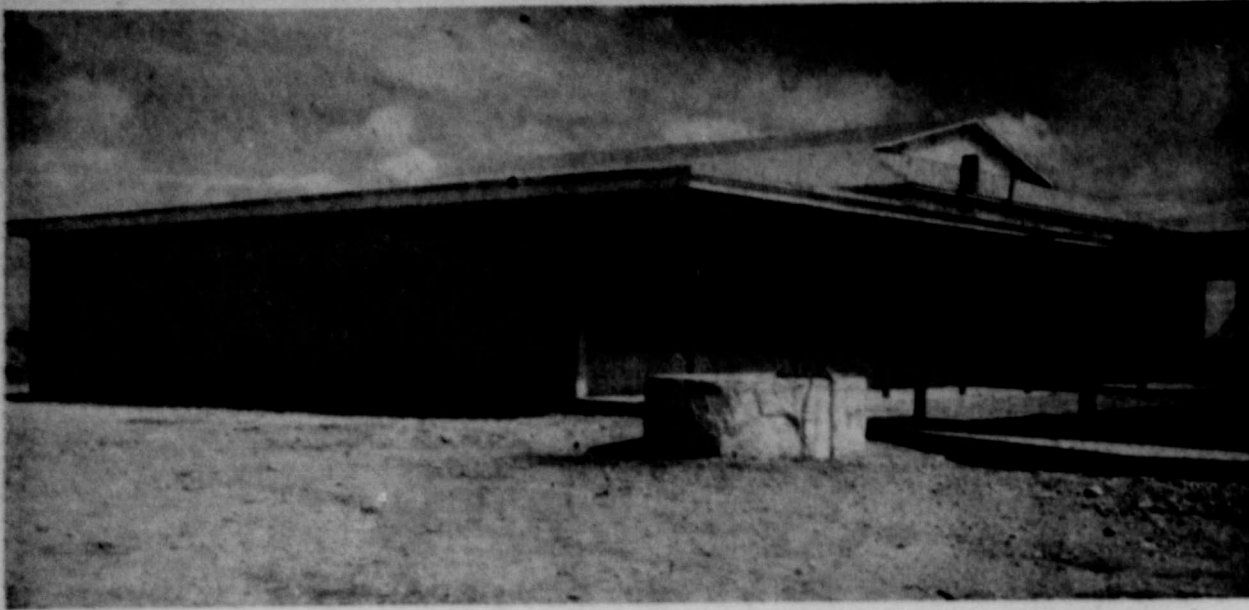

\$45,000.00 looked hopelessly too small a sum to secure building needs at Carlton. Yet after a determined community got behind the effort the task was put over.

The real building program got underway only this past summer. Behind this was a long period of planning. To begin with there was an old, out of date, 2-story building which was poorly lighted and even more poorly heated. Standard instructional equipment was conspicuously absent.

To start things moving a contract was made with Malone Construction Company of Waco to wreck the existing two-story building down to a one-story structure and building a new four-room elementary unit. Local labor was used on the job whenever possible. Much material was salvaged from the wrecking process. Enough sheeting was salvaged to deck the roof of the old building and of the new building. Most of the roof framing for the new building also came from salvage materials. Cost figures were watched from the start. Much was saved by careful buying of materials. Sub-contracts were let on wiring, plumbing, painting and flooring.

The net result was that not only was the old building remodeled into a modern high school building, with up-to-date lunch room, auditorium and the new four room modern elementary unit constructed, but new furniture for the entire elementary unit was purchased and a new roof was put on the gym. This was all for the \$45,000 amount.

A considerable amount of the building materials were purchased through the local firm of Barnes & McCullough.

Next Thursday night the Carlton School celebrates with open house. The people can be justly proud of a job well done. At the beginning of the 1955-56 school year the school's accreditation was in danger. Today the school has a plant and equipment that has caused the Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency to place full approval on Carlton's School Program.

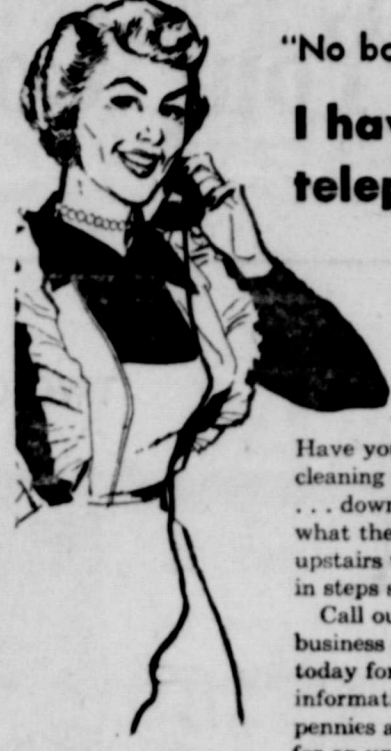

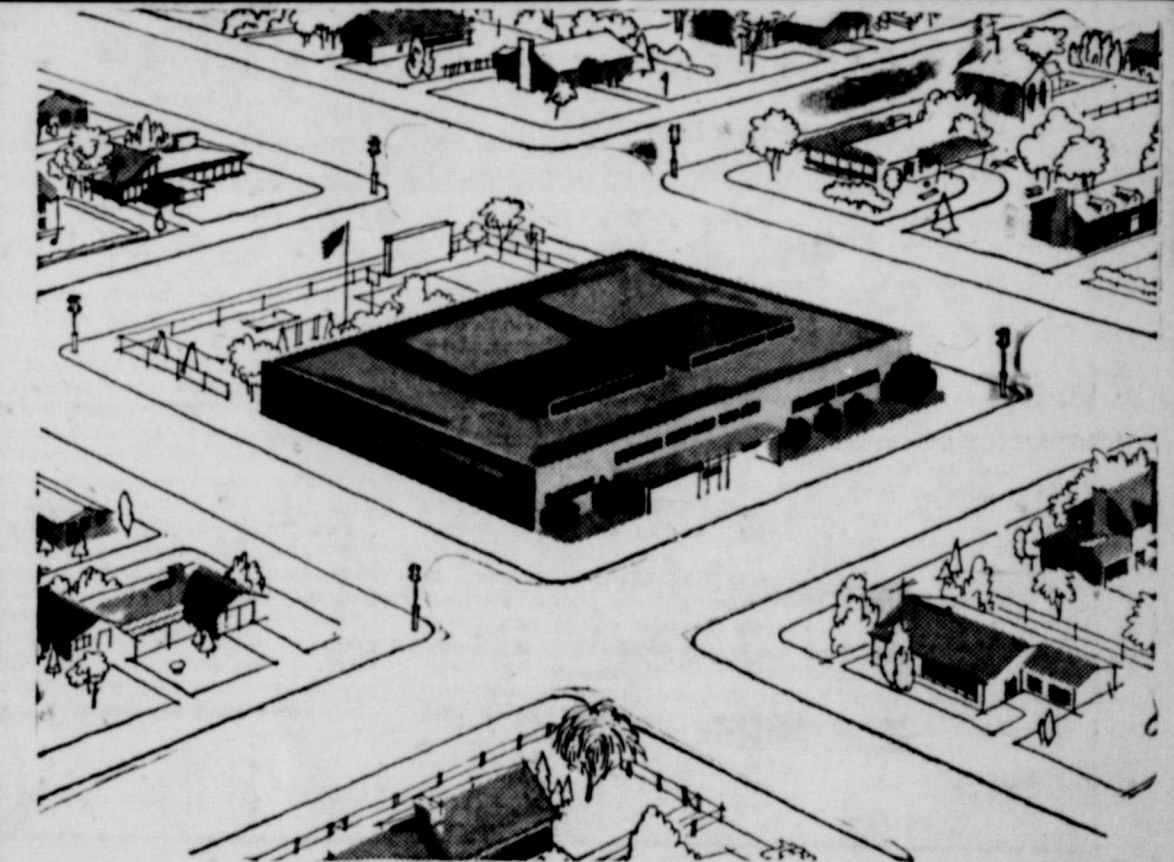

TWO OF THE COURSES OFFERED IN THE LOCAL SCHOOLS ARE FFA AND HOMEMAKING

Homemaking education in high school is centered on home activities and relationships which enable youth to assume the responsibilities of homemaking as family members today and later as they establish their own homes. The major purpose of vocational homemaking education is to prepare youth and adults for the occupation of homemaking. The program is designed to assist youth and adults in acquiring homemaking skills and an understanding of human relationships which will help them achieve satisfying home living. The basic goal of homemaking education is to help the individual to live a useful and satisfying personal family and community life. Good citizenship is stressed in pupil-teacher planning and working together and in respect for the rights and privileges of everyone. Skills are acquired by beginning with simple problems until experience has been gained. Then more difficult problems are presented. Instruction in all aspects of home and

family living are provided in the courses. There include personal, family and community relationships; clothing, feeding and housing the family; management and family finance; health, home care of the sick, and first aid and child development. Instruction takes place in the homemaking department and the home. Classroom experiences are planned in terms of the needs of youth and the home and school situation. Home experiences reinforce class experiences with real life situations, and are planned cooperatively by the pupil, teacher, and parents. Future Homemakers of America offer further opportunities for youth enrolled in homemaking to develop initiative in planning and carrying out experiences related to the home. The summer phase of the homemaking program is an extension of the regular school term. Experiences are provided for youth and adults in connection with the total homemaking program during the summer months.

The breed has advanced from seventh to third place in numbers of registered animals among the breeds in just three years. a new litter in May. Other FFA members with Yorkshire breeding projects are Bobby Boone, Doyle Crews, and John Ryan. Several barrows have been fed and premium prices are usually paid for the breed. Jordan purchased a very outstanding young boar last fall and some of the chapter members hope to try some crosses with the Yorkshire. Most of the boys will exhibit their projects at the local stock show in the latter part of March. All students of Vocational Agriculture must have a project in order to receive credit for the course and breeding projects are especially encouraged for degree advancement in FFA.
