In spite of their defeat last Friday night the Bulldogs showed considerable promise and are booked to be one of the top teams in District 6B this year. The Abilene Reporter places Bronte in the No. 1 spot with Loraine second. The Bulldogs open conference play by hosting Bronte on Saturday night, Oct. 17, which will climax homecoming for Loraine exes.

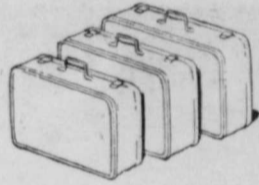

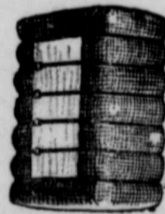
