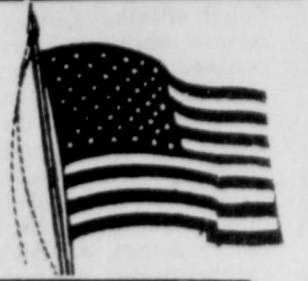

Happy Day! Water Rates Cut 40% For The Summer Months

For The Summer Months

Floydada's city council made a decision Monday night that may help the looks of Floydada in many ways this summer. . . . like green lawns, beautiful flowers, and even gardens as they lowered the resident water rates 40%.

The decrease is for a three month period and does not include commercial users.

The council felt that the city's residents would take advantage of the rate cut and use more water.

The details of the water rate cut are as follows:

The following rate will apply for three months beginning with the May reading and will reflect in the bills received July 1, August 1 and September 1. The City reads meters between the 8th and 21st of each month and for a customer to determine when his summer rate begins and ends, he should notice the "service to" day on his water bill.

For instance if the "service to" date is May 21 the summer rate begins that day and ends August 21.

Gin Notified of Fuel Shortage Affecting Electrical Power

The council agreed to send Ray Gene Ferguson a letter stating that although they would not cut off electric power to the Floydada Cooperative Gins this fall, they could not promise service due to the fuel shortage.

At present the city power and light plant supplies electricity to what was formerly known as Floyd County Cooperative Gin and Scott Gin. The council agreed that it could supply the electrical needs of Scott Gin. Southwestern Public Service

took over what is known as formerly Farmers Cooperative Gin's power needs this past gin season.

The council felt that priority for electrical power should go to the residential and business area.

Police Chief Reports To Council

Chief of Police Tom Hopper met with the council and said the arrest of a teenage boy resulted in solving many, many local burglaries in the past year. He said much of the stolen items were recovered. Hopper said he had good men on his police force and felt that everything was going okay.

Considerable discussion centered around a 30 mile speed limit in Floydada, especially from the Silverton Highway west down Missouri street to the light at Second Street. The council also received a petition from the residents in the 600 block of West California Street. The petition stated that some 18 children were playing in that block and cars were often seen breaking the speed limit.

Emphasis is also going to be made in slowing traffic in school zones.

Other Business

In other business the council approved paving on Fourth Street between Kentucky and Mississippi Streets.

Approved using Green Thumbers to enlarge tennis courts in the city park and baseball back stops for adult play in the East 14th Park between Grover and Lee Streets.

Okayed membership to SPAG for \$410; Mayor Parnell Powell representative and councilman Frank Goen alternate representative.

Appointed a committee to plan new fire station building composed of city manager Bill Feuerbacher and councilman Leroy Burns, plus fire chief Bill Marquis and fireman Dale Kincer.

Agreed to allow Wiley Griggs to repair the roof of the city hall building.

All councilmen were present.

In order to get weedsoly cleaned up the council agreed that the city would mow vacant lots of 50' x 150' size for \$2.50.

Feuerbacher told a Hesperian reporter yesterday that he needs 158' of 2" pipe, 320' of 1 1/4" pipe and 64' of 3/4" pipe to build the baseball backstops. The city is buying the wire.

Welcome Showers Aid Floyd County Agriculture

showers came to almost all of the county.

Lockney reported .61 of moisture and Floydada .41. There were some unofficial reports in the Lockney area of almost an inch of moisture.

Some farmers in the south part of the county have stands of grain sorghum and cotton coming up.

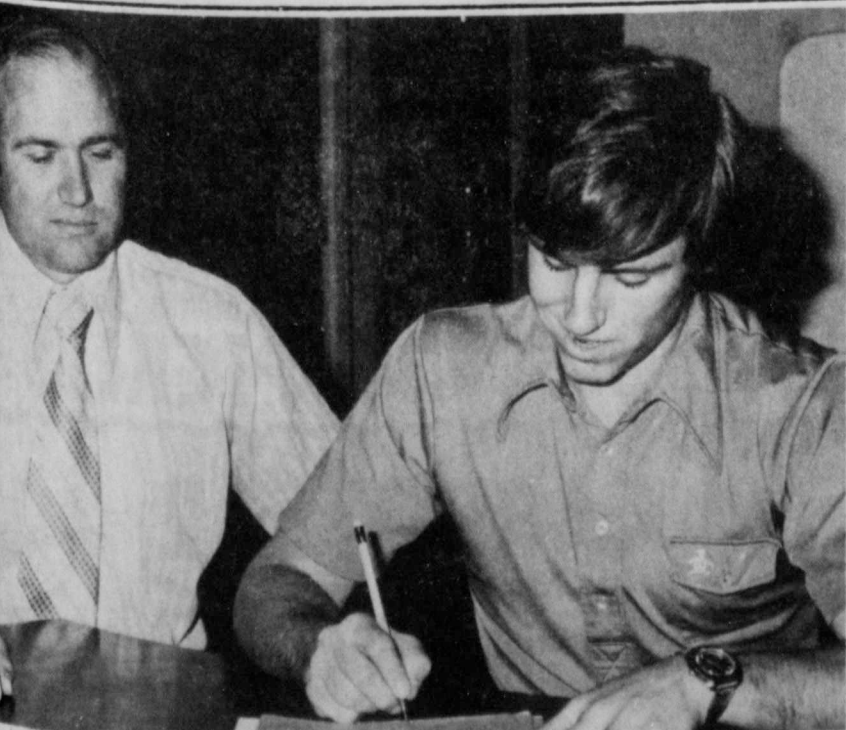

Floydada High School track star Jay Jones has signed a track scholarship with West Texas State University in Canyon and will attend WTSU next fall.

Jones was fourth in the state in the mile run as a junior in 1972, clocking 4:28.4 at the state UIL meet, a school record for the mile.

This year, the senior miler won every meet he entered except the regional meet,

where he placed third. Jones turned in his best time of the year, 4:30.5, at the regionals although he was sick with a strep throat.

He was a track team captain in 1973 and "a real leader and a fine track boy," according to FHS track coach Joe Paty, who said he thought Jones would make WTSU a "real hand."

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT PLAINS WEATHER IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, INC. OF P.O. BOX 1627, PLAINVIEW, TEXAS 79072, who holds License No. 73-6 of the State of Texas intends to engage in an operation designed to decrease hailfall by artificial methods, for and on behalf of Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc., and will conduct such program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over or within which equipment may be operated shall include Floyd and Lubbock counties.
2. The target within which hailfall is intended to be decreased is described as follows: The outer boundary commences at the intersection of Farm Road 400 with the southern boundary of Hale County; thence eastward along the county line to the intersection with Crosby and Floyd Counties; thence northward along the Hale County line to the intersection with Swisher County; thence eastward along the county boundary to the intersection with Farm Road 378; thence southward along Farm Road 378 to its intersection with U. S. Highway 70; thence due east 2 miles; thence due south to the northern boundary of Crosby County; thence westward along the county line to the intersection with Lubbock and Hale Counties; thence southward 8 miles along the Lubbock-Crosby county line; thence due west to the intersection with Farm Road 400; thence northward along Farm Road 400 to the intersection with the Hale County line.
3. The equipment, materials, and methods to be used in conducting the operation are a weather radar system, cloud seeding aircraft and flares for dispensation of silver iodide nuclei near cloud base.
4. The person who will be in control and in charge of the operation is Jonnie G. Medina, Plainview, Texas.
5. The operation will extend during the period beginning about June 5, 1973, and ending about November 30, 1973.

Twelve students have enrolled in the Cable Pressurization course at the Electrical and Telephone Training Center at Texas A&M University's Research Annex.

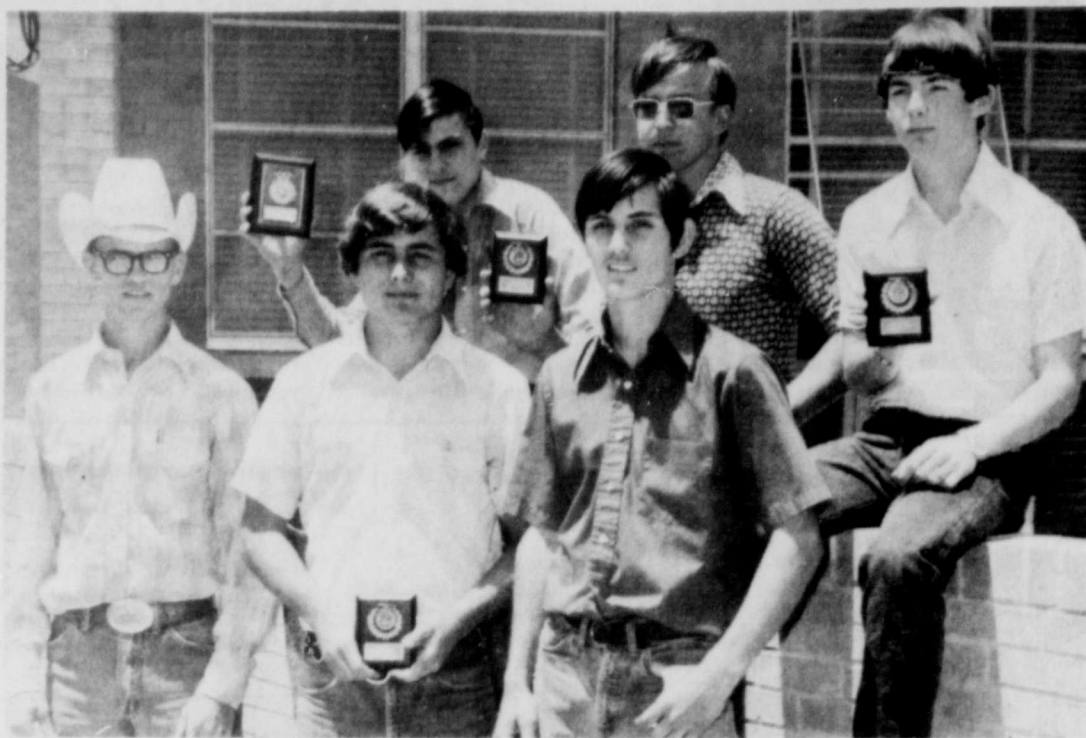
The two-week course is being conducted by instructor Marvin Moss and personnel from the Engineering Extension Service, a division of TAMU.

CUTTING MEAT COSTS
Meat prices tests homemakers' skills as planners, shoppers, and cooks. Get the most from meat purchases by "stretching" them.

Although Americans generally consume more, a person needs two three ounce servings of meat daily.

There are several methods and "extenders" for providing this amount while satisfying family tastes.

Though a family member might complain about a three-ounce serving of steak, that same amount of meat in a stew, soup, casserole or salad goes much farther.

Cookbooks and other literature furnish numerous recipes for such meat dishes to help consumers stretch purchases.

Another "extension" method involves combinations of protein-rich dry beans, lentils or

dry peas with less meat. For example, bean soup with ham and bacon or hot dogs are hearty, economical and nutritious.

In addition, less expensive types of meat are budget stretchers.

Ground meat, for instance, combines well with different foods. Hamburger patties easily furnish the three-ounce meat serving.

For families preferring large meat patties combine one of the following with ground meat before making patties — oatmeal, crushed cereal, bread crumbs, cracker crumbs or even rice. Add a beaten egg to hold mixture together and form patties. Cook as desired for tasty, nutritious patties.

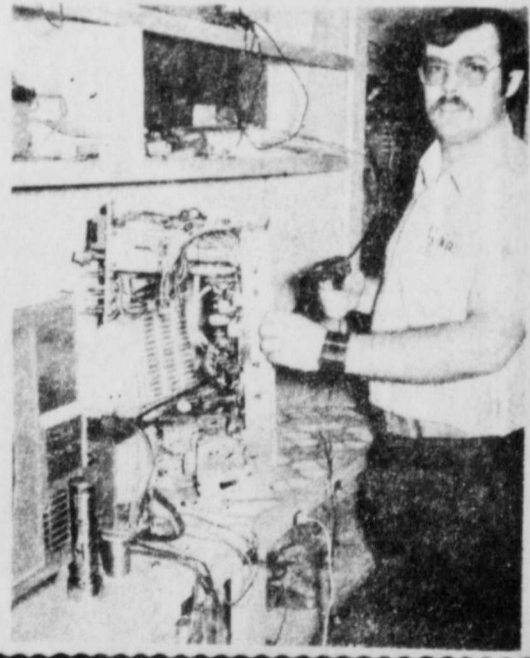

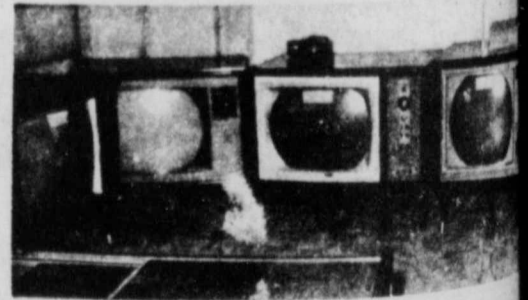
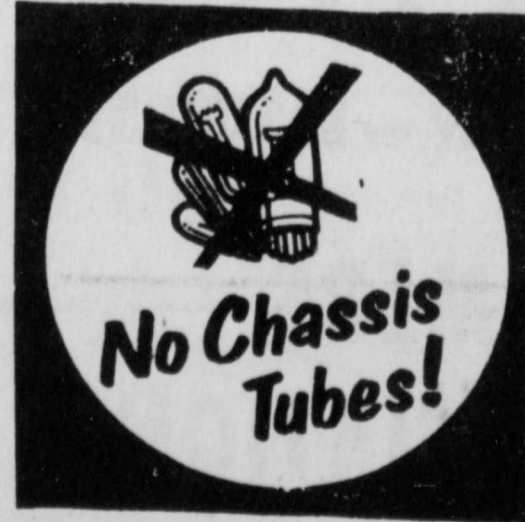

Lockneyite To Go On Tour

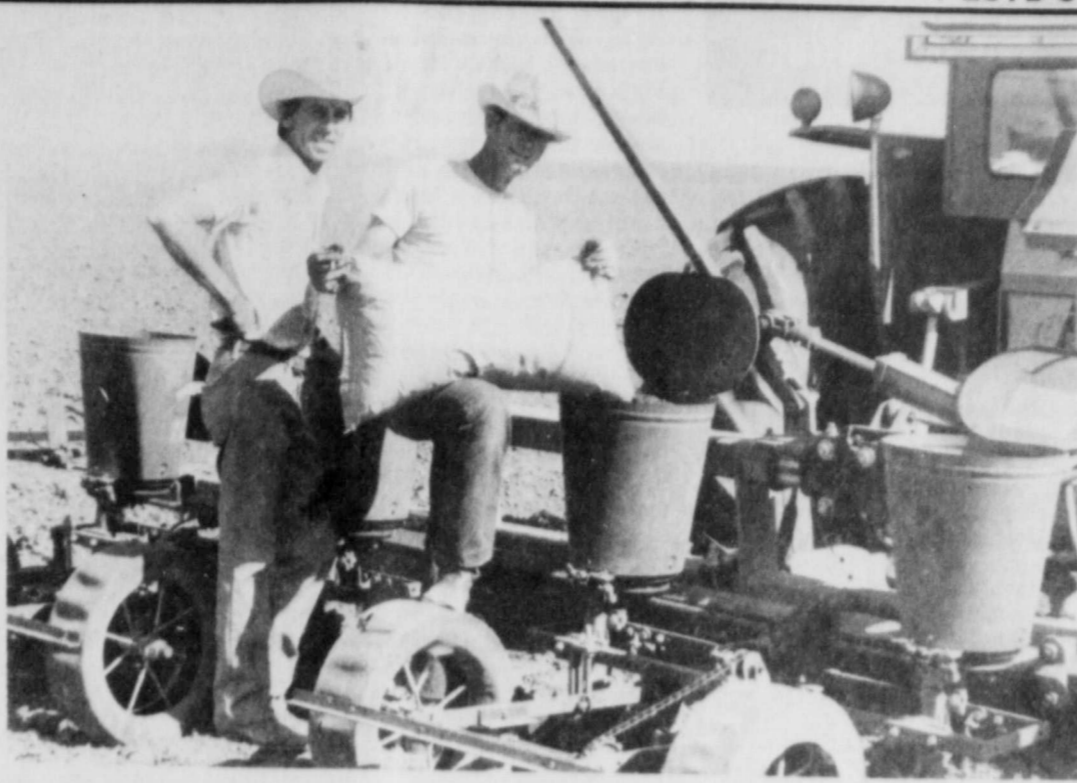

Perry played football for Lockney since the sixth grade, and last season he was a starting offensive tackle for the "hustling horns."

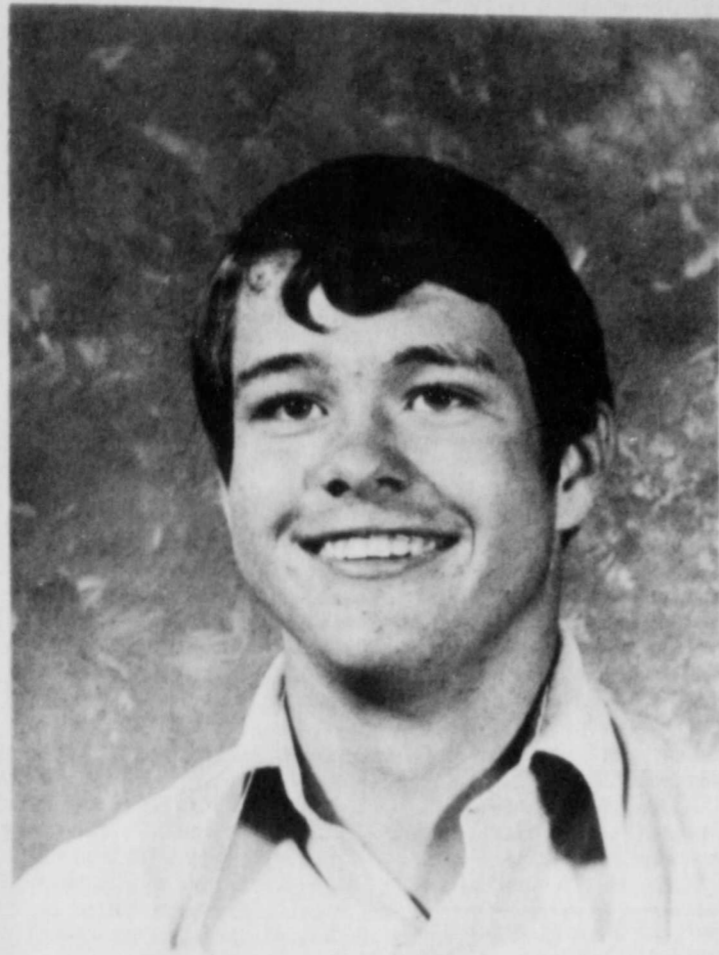

One Killed In April Accidents In Floyd County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1973 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in one person killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety, Region #5, for April, 1973, shows a total of 544 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 283 persons injured as compared to April, 1972 with 445 accidents resulting in 44 persons killed and 232 persons injured. This was 99 more accidents, 20 less fatalities and 51 more injuries in 1973 at the same period of time.

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The cotton section of the farm bill reported May 8 by the Senate Agriculture Committee "is a far cry from an extension of the present program, which had industry-wide support," says Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock. "and it has features we will not want to support without careful study."

Prior to the committee's going into executive session, Senator Herman Talmadge, democratic committee chairman from Georgia, repeatedly voiced the intent and belief

that the committee would report a simple extension of the current law. Therefore, no one outside committee membership had any advance notice or opportunity to comment on the committee's May 8 action, Johnson points out.

Full details of the bill, which Talmadge hopes to get on the Senate floor by June 1, are not yet known to PCG. But it is understood that price support payments for cotton would be the difference between a 43-cent "target price" and the average spot market price for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton, 3.5 to 4.9

micronaire, for the first five months (August through December) of the cotton marketing year.

PCG's calculations for the years 1966 through 1972 show that High Plains producer income from allotted acreage would have averaged slightly better under this formula than under the flat 15 cents per pound payment in effect under the Agriculture Act of 1970.

"But there are several reasons why these calculations might be misleading," Johnson cautions.

"For example," he says, "whatever past averages may show, there isn't necessarily any direct relationship between the August-December average price quotations for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton and the average price paid to farmers for High Plains cotton.

"Therefore it is conceivable," he continues "that under the Senate's bill the High Plains crop, which averages about Strict Low Middling Light Spot 31/32 inches and normally carries a micronaire discount, could sell for 14 or 15 cents per pound, and because of the price structure for the longer staple, higher grade,

earlier sold cotton, qualify for little or no support payment."

With a target price of 35 cents, even the unreliable averages compiled for 1966 through 1972 would indicate a drastic reduction in producer returns on the High Plains. Quoted price average for High Plains cotton, 1966 through 1971, was 20.03 cents per pound. The five-month average quotation for SLM 1-1/16 inch cotton for the same years was 25.75 cents.

The cotton loan level under the committee's version of a new farm law, according to presently available information, would remain at 90 percent of the average world market price, with the secretary retaining authority to make adjustments as he might see fit.

Minimum base allotment would be set at 10 million acres, the same national allotment as that of 1973, but first reports indicate the Secretary would be given new authority to restrict plantings above the base allotment should he anticipate a carry-over above 7 million bales.

Other program provisions, including set-aside requirements and payment limitations, may or may not be in

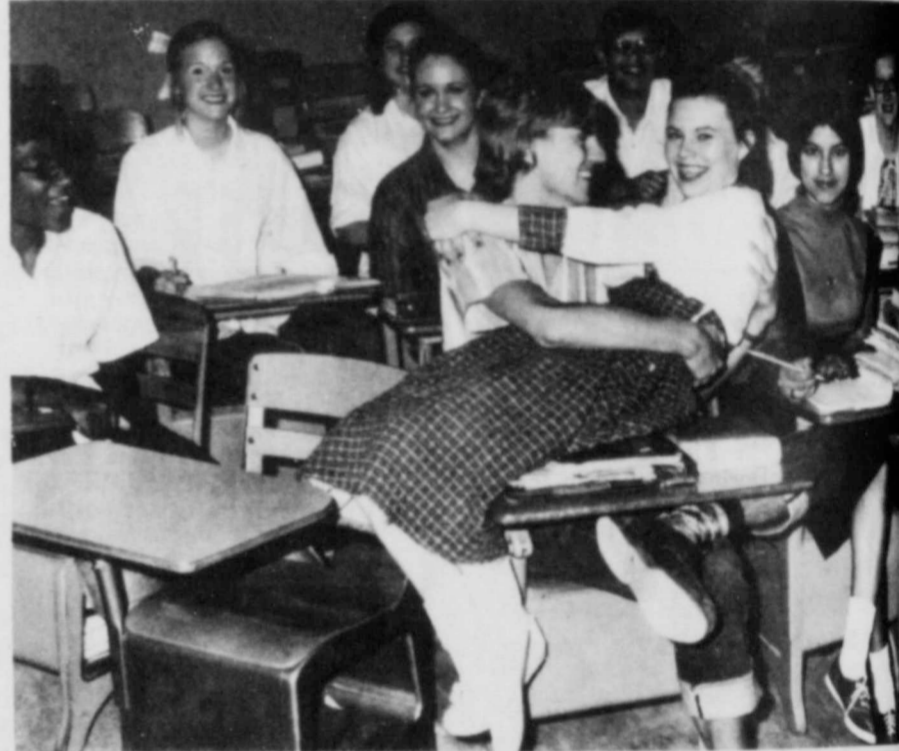

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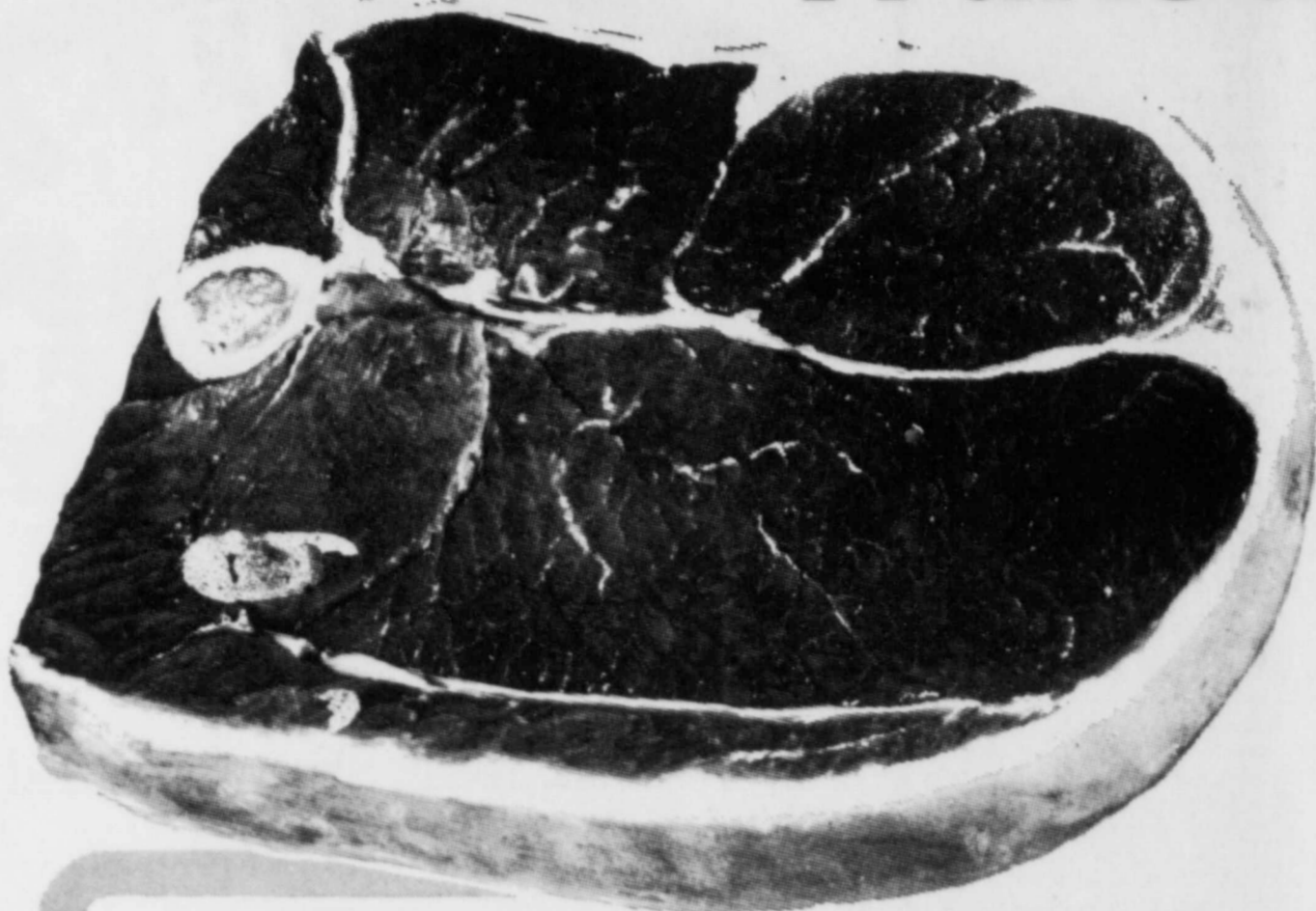
