Plans Completed For First "Appreciation Day" Nov. 5

Everything was in readiness today for the first weekly Appreciation Day program to be held in Cisco Saturday, November 5. The program was designed by local merchants to show their gratitude for the support and business given them by residents of the area.

A large crowd was expected in town on the opening day to take advantage of the bargains offered by the merchants and to participate in the other activities.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal issued a special welcome to the visitors and announced that some changes had been made in parking meter regulations for the weekly Appreciation Days. He said that traffic officials had announced that meters on Avenue E and on the side streets would not be in operation during the day and that visitors might park their vehicles in those areas without charge. The only exceptions are in the reserved areas that are marked off in yellow.

He asked merchants to refrain from parking in the free areas in order to reserve them for visitors. The meters on Ave. D will be in operation for the day and the usual regulations will be in effect.

To add color to the day, the Wrangler Band and Cisco Junior College students will hold a pep rally at the corner of Avenue D and 7th Street in preparation for the Wrangler game with Big Spring at Chesley Field Saturday night.

Attendance Of Local Schools Marks New Record For First Six Weeks

Student attendance at the local schools for the first six weeks of the 1949-50 school year was at a new high when the average daily attendance was 1,015 out of 1,043 enrolled. The high record was due to the cooperation between the teachers, the students and the parents, according to a report by Supt. Arlin Bint.

The average attendance of the high school was 96 per cent and the figure at junior high was 95.8 per cent. The average at West Ward and East Ward dropped some due to students being out of school to aid in the harvest of cotton and peanuts. The figure for the grade schools was 76.8 per cent.

The booths will be located at the Man's Store, Lemore Pharmacy and the Post Office. Mrs. D. A. Morgan is the assistant chairman for Cisco.

The Poppies are made by the disabled veterans of both world wars and afford them a way of earning money while spending long hours in hospitals.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal proclaimed Saturday as official Poppy Day in Cisco and called on the people to help the Legion Auxiliary put the sale over. He urged every citizen to purchase and wear a Poppy on that day.

Total Enrollment In Local Schools Off This Year

Enrollment in the local schools for 1949-50 registered a decrease from the total figure of the past year, according to figures released by school officials.

The total enrollment for the current year was 1,043 students in all schools, as compared with 1,146 last year.

The decrease of 103 students was attributed to the fact that the county school board transferred some 60 students, who attended school here last year, to Eastland and Rising Star, and to the fact that a number of families who were connected with oil companies were transferred to other locations.

The high school registered the largest loss when it dropped from 324 to 270. The junior high school lost 13 students, dropping from 556 to 520 students.

John Cunningham, second-year student at the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, will be guest pastor at the First Presbyterian Church in Cisco Sunday, it was announced today.

Local Teachers Report On English Workshop Held In Abilene Recently

Miss Doris Joe Pyle, Mrs. C. E. Whitaker and Mrs. E. L. Hazelwood, teachers of English in the local high school, gave a report to the faculty recently on the English Workshop for this district which they attended last week at Hardin-Simmons University. The theme of the workshop was "More and Better Reading."

Friday afternoon was devoted to a panel discussion on creating interest in reading. Cisco High School was represented by Mrs. Hazelwood, who talked on "Reading and Teaching the Lyrics and Sonnets of the Elizabethan Age to High School Pupils." The panel was followed by audience participation in which both Miss Pyle and Mrs. Whitaker made contributions.

Friday evening demonstrations were given by Dr. O. B. Stanley, optometrist, and Dr. G. C. Morlon of Abilene Christian College, on improving the eyesight and for teaching pupils of high school and college levels to increase their rate of reading from 100 to 500 or 600 words per minute.

Saturday morning, Dr. Autrey Neil Wiley, head of the English Department at Texas State College for Women, told of the beginning of the workshop idea at her school last June for improving the reading habits of boys and girls. She told of the success of the plan and announced that the idea would be worked again next June.

The program was concluded by a panel discussion by representatives of the Wichita Falls school system who told of surveys made from the first grade through Hardin College to determine the reading preference of the students.

The three local teachers said that in an effort to bring the idea before others that they might benefit, they were stressing reading through the entire Cisco school system since that seemed to be the weakness throughout the nation, not only in the grades but in the high school as well.

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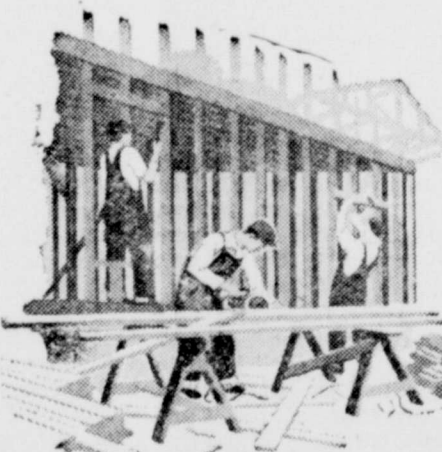

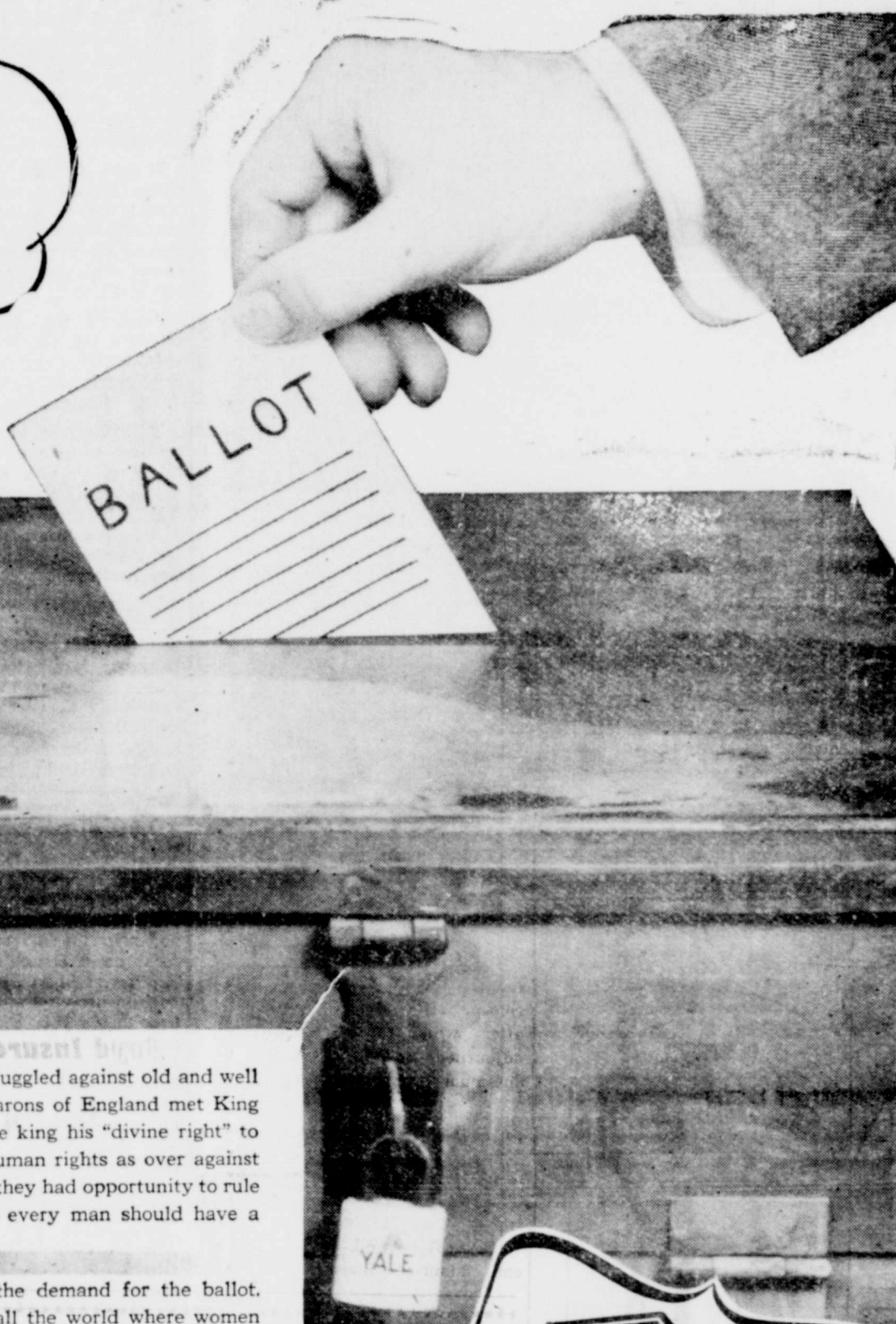

Up through the long centuries the common man has struggled against old and well entrenched powers and ideas. On June 15, 1215, the barons of England met King John at Runnimead and wrested from the hands of the king his "divine right" to do as he pleased. It was the beginning of the day of human rights as over against the rights of kings and of priests; men would not rest till they had opportunity to rule themselves. Finally a nation was established in which every man should have a voice and a vote to determine his own affairs.

Again the struggle was on when women rose with the demand for the ballot. Before World War I, there were only four nations in all the world where women had the right of the franchise. August 26, 1920, the sixteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States gave our women the same high privilege of voting that men enjoyed.

A woman is casting her ballot, symbol of man's arrival at a high estimate of the common man and woman. No single act so well typifies our advance through the thousands of years in which men have inhabited the earth.

But what are you doing about it? How regularly do you cast your ballot? The right to vote is also the duty to vote. The long struggle for human rights has miscarried when you and I do something else on Election Day which keeps us from the polls. Every man who throws away his opportunity to vote is unworthy of the heroic souls who suffered to give us the privilege. Every woman who excuses herself from taking time to vote betrays the cause of Woman's Suffrage.

Ours then is a high duty to vote. Vote for conscience' sake; vote for humanity's sake; vote for justice' sake; vote for the sake of the community; vote for the sake of the nation; vote for your own sake. Vote as you think and believe; vote for good men to rule us; vote for high causes in which we shall share; vote to determine how the affairs of the town shall be conducted. *The ballot is our weapon against every evil thing which threatens the body politic. Use it under God; it is your divine right.*

Bulbs Planted This Fall Give First Spring Flowers

Spring months are almost pure joy for garden lovers, who bring to the heart of floral beauty an appreciation sharpened by the long monotony of winter.

In the spring their efforts show a higher average of success, free from the disappointments which come later, with the weeds, the insects, perhaps a drought or other difficulties.

Yet the average garden has little to offer, compared with what it might present in the first month after the ground thaws, because only one-third of all garden owners plant the fall bulbs which bear the first spring flowers. There are not many of these and you do not need many to delight you, since they bloom when they have no rivals.

First to flower are the tiny white snowdrops which would hardly be noticed in a June garden, but when they peep through the melting snow, they give us a thrill which the most gorgeous peonies can hardly equal later in the season.

Snowdrops blossom when the ground first thaws in spring. A small group visible from a window will richly reward you. After blooming, they soon disappear and if the bulbs are not disturbed they will bloom for many years without attention.

Next after the snowdrops, how long depending upon the weather, scillas (blue squills) and glory of the snow (chionodoxas) appear, both blue and flowering so freely they carpet the ground with color. Scillas spread by self-seeding. Weeks earlier than violets, they are far superior for gardens, because their foliage quickly disappears after they flower and their tiny bulbs offer no competition to companion plants.

Crocuses blossom after the scillas with blue, yellow and white flowers. They come in white, blue and purple, and a mixture gives a pleasing effect.
