

Rubber Crash No Curb for Stocks

Perpendicular Drop in Rubber Market Fails to Hinder Traders in Wall Street Favorites.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 4 (AP).—Speculative Wall Street, during the lightning of "bad news" today, continued to bid up stock prices, and rushed more than a score issues into new high ground. A temporary reaction soon after the opening reflected the unexpectedly large increase of \$817,000,000 in stock exchange member loans, but after the early selling orders had been cleared away, the "bulls" took complete charge.

The day's trade developments, ordinarily unfavorable enough to remove the props from most of the stock list, were ignored. A perpendicular break of 5 cents a pound in the rubber market following the removal of restrictions on British exports, an increase in the crude oil production, a further slump in railway freight loadings, and the calling of \$20,000,000 in loans proved of little hindrance to the forward march of prices.

The action of the market following the enormous increase in stock exchange member loans caused many veteran brokers and traders to shake their heads and marvel. Others took an optimistic view, citing predictions of W. C. Durant and others around New York that the loan figures would amount to \$50,000,000 before the "bull" market was over. These prophecies seemed fantastic at the time they were uttered, but reckoning from the March 31 total, loans now have only about \$40,000,000 to go to reach the top.

Reports that eastern railway executives had agreed on the trunk line merger program found further reflection in rising prices for stocks of railroads in that district. Pittsburgh & West Virginia, one of the key roads, had an extreme rise of \$15 a share to \$150. Washash and Nickel Plate reached new tops, but subsequently relinquished most of their gains.

Wright Aeronautical again performed sensationally, opening with a loss of \$5 at \$127, and closing unchanged at \$132 after having sold at \$141 and \$142 in two distinct rallies.

CITY MANAGER WINS

"Business" To Be Injected in Wichita Falls

WICHITA FALLS, April 4 (AP).—Bitter returns from one of the city's boxes, previously overlooked, assured adoption of the city manager plan of government here. Six hundred ballots had remained uncounted until 3 p. m. Wednesday.

Previous returns had indicated the hopeless defeat of amendments to the city charter providing for the new form of government.

R. A. Thompson of Dallas, former state highway engineer, is the outstanding possibility for the post of city manager. R. E. Shepherd, defeated for reelection as mayor, said Wednesday. The post probably will be filled by the city council Monday night.

Dry Crusade Cone Johnson Out On Tour

AUSTIN, April 4 (AP).—Backers of Governor Al Smith of New York, for the democratic presidential nomination, will "lead the way" in demanding a dry platform at the Houston convention. Highway Commissioner Cone Johnson, speaker of the "constitutional dry" faction predicted Wednesday.

Unless Texas in the precinct conventions says unreservedly that for its part Smith "shall not pass," the New York governor will be the nominee, he declared.

Texas is the largest and leading southern state. If Texas does not explicitly frown on the Smith candidacy, other southern states will not work against him.

The commissioner will speak Friday night in Dallas as the next stop in his stump campaign against Smith, Reed, Ritchie or any man his organization deems "Wets." He will continue to call on the voters to express themselves against such candidates.

Wife of Houston Leader Will Attend

DALLAS, April 4 (AP).—Mrs. Jesse H. Jones of Houston has accepted the invitation of the arrangements committee to attend the banquet in honor of Jesse H. Jones here April 9. It was announced Wednesday.

Mrs. Dan Moody, wife of the governor, has been invited as a special guest.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones are expected to arrive here Saturday and remain until after the banquet Monday night.

Among the friends of the Houston Democratic leader, who have been invited and have accepted are William P. Hobby, former governor, Attorney General Claude Pollard, Sidney Samuels of Fort Worth, Thomas H. Butt, Lynch Davidson and Dr. F. W. Bernier of Houston, and Charles I. Francis of Wichita Falls.

Sinclair Trial To Come On Monday

Postponement Granted By District of Columbia Judge; Senate To Halt Probe Temporarily.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 4.—Postponement until next Monday of the opening of the criminal conspiracy trial of Harry F. Sinclair growing out of the Teapot Dome lease was granted today by Justice Jennings Bailey in District of Columbia supreme court.

The delay was on motion of attorneys for the defense and, unopposed by special government counsel, was allowed primarily to enable the wealthy oil operator's lawyers to study the deposition made last week at El Paso by Albert B. Fall, a co-defendant with Sinclair at the mistrial last autumn. Fall's case has been postponed indefinitely.

Only a few of the witnesses summoned for the trial were in court, but a number of them were in the city in response to subpoenas. These included M. T. Everhart, Pueblo banker and son-in-law of Fall, who is to be chief witness for the government, and Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, who is under indictment here because of his refusal to answer certain questions before the senate Teapot Dome committee.

While the Sinclair trial is in progress the senate Teapot Dome committee will not press its inquiry into the disposition of the Liberty Bond profits of the Continental Trading company.

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DAILY MARKETS

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK.

KANSAS CITY, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—Another relatively light cattle supply, around the 11 market circuit resulted in a fairly broad demand for most killing classes and strong to 25c higher prices. Several consignments of well-finished Colorado steers have been received this week, and scattered shipments arrived from Texas. Stockers and feeder trade continued slow, but with supplies limited, prices have shown little change. Medium quality South Texas steers that had received a ration of cake on the grass, cleared at \$11.30 to \$11.75 on the Kansas City market. Receipts were estimated at 29,700 against 38,078 a week ago, and 39,747 the same day last year.

Lighter hog receipts at most points resulted in strong to 15c higher prices as a rule. The day's top reached 8.65 at Chicago on choice light weight offerings. Arrivals at the principal midwestern markets totaled 94,000 against 115,000 last Wednesday and 100,400 a year ago.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK.

FORT WORTH, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—Trading the cattle division of the live stock here was again a slow affair today. Steers were weak to 25c lower with the bulk selling from \$10 to \$10.50. Cows were fairly active at steady values. Prices ranged from 4.50 to 9.75. Slaughter yearlings were barely steady, selling from \$10.75 to \$12.75. Calves were dull with prices 25c to 50c lower. Weighty receipts sold around \$11.00 and \$11.25 and light calves \$12.50.

The hog trade was strong to 10c higher. The top price was 8.25 with the bulk selling from 7.75 to 8.10. Sows were steady at 6.75 to 7.00 and pigs dull at 4.50 to 6.00.

Sheep were steady. Weathers sold at 9.00 and spring lambs at 15.00.

NEW YORK COTTON.

NEW YORK, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—Conflicting influences in the weather news were reflected in irregular fluctuations in the cotton market today. After selling up to 19.32 early, or 16 points net higher, July broke to 19.14 compared with 19.16 at the close the previous day. The price steadied up again later, however, and closed at 19.19, the general market closing firm, at net advances of 2 to 3 points on all months except September, which was nominally 19 points higher.

The market opened steady at unchanged prices to an advance of 7 points and showed considerable firmness in early trading on the eastern belt where dry weather is thought to be needed, and rather a bullish view of references to southwestern crop conditions in the weekly report of the weather bureau.

There was some trade buying and price fixing as well as covering, on the advance which extended to 19.45 for May and 19.06 for October contracts, or about 15 to 17 points above yesterday's closing quotations. Private cable advices said trade calling and London buying had absorbed hedging and liquidation in the Liverpool market, also fair business in cotton cloths for shipment to India and China and improving demand for cotton yarn.

Exports today were 35,001 bales, making 5,976,834 so far this season. Port receipts 13,825. U. S. port stocks 1,695,546.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—Opening advances were followed by a moderate decline in the cotton market today, which in turn gave way to a moderate decline in the cotton market today. The weather in the drought section of the western belt was the main influence.

behind trading. Early indications of fair weather there carried May contracts to 19.11, 6 points net up, but when the detailed report showed precipitation in that section they eased to 18.97. The subsequent rally carried the option to 19.02 where it closed, net 3 points lower. The general market closed steady at net declines of 2 to 3 points.

Liverpool cables were about as quiet at the start but first trades were irregular, 4 points up to 4 down.

Later offerings increased when the detailed weather report showed rather good rains in West Texas and Oklahoma. Before the offerings were absorbed July had traded off to 18.77 and October 18.47, 18 to 19 points down from the early highs and below the previous close. The slight rally at the end on covering caused July to close at 18.83 and October 18.53, net losses of 2 points.

Exports for the day totaled 34,601 bales.

WALL STREET STOCKS.

NEW YORK, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—Overcoming the liquidation inspired by the, unexpectedly large increase in stock exchange member loans and a large grist of unfavorable trade news and week-end profit taking the stock market today displayed a strong undertone as more than a score issues were marked up to record high levels. Prices sagged a little at the opening, but speculators for the advance quickly assumed control and did not relinquish their advantage for the rest of the day. Total sales crossed the 3,000,000 share mark for the 19th consecutive full session.

In addition to the huge increase of \$317,000,000 in loans, Wall Street was faced with a poor freight car traffic statement, an increase in crude oil production, renewal of gold exports to France, a bad break in the rubber market and the calling of about \$20,000,000 in loans. A few of the recent favorites sold off but there were no real points of weakness.

Wright aeronautical was again the spectacular feature. Opening 3 points lower at 127, the stock soared to 141, dipped to 132, rebounded to a high at 142 and then sagged to 132, unchanged on the day.

Radio broke from a high of 192 3-4 to 182 5-8, closing at 183 1-4 for a net loss of 6 3-4.

CHICAGO GRAIN.

CHICAGO, April 4 (U. S. Department of Agriculture).—It was essentially a weather market today in wheat, with prices fluctuating rapidly, but slipping at the last on account of rains southwest. Foreign interests appeared to be selling July delivery of wheat here, and replacing it with May.

Wheat values closed irregular at 1-8 net decline to 1-8c advance. Corn finished 5-8c to 7-8 to 1c down, oats 1-4c to 1-2c off and pro-

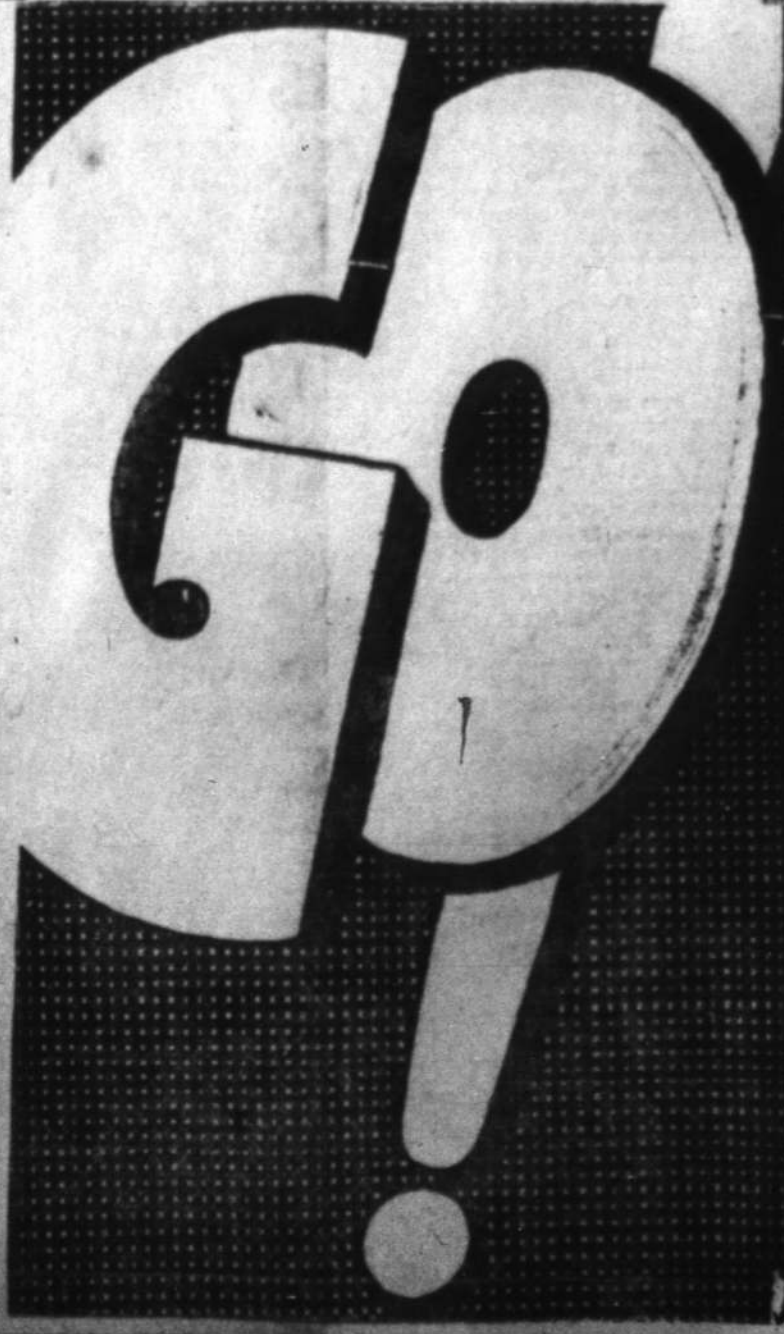
