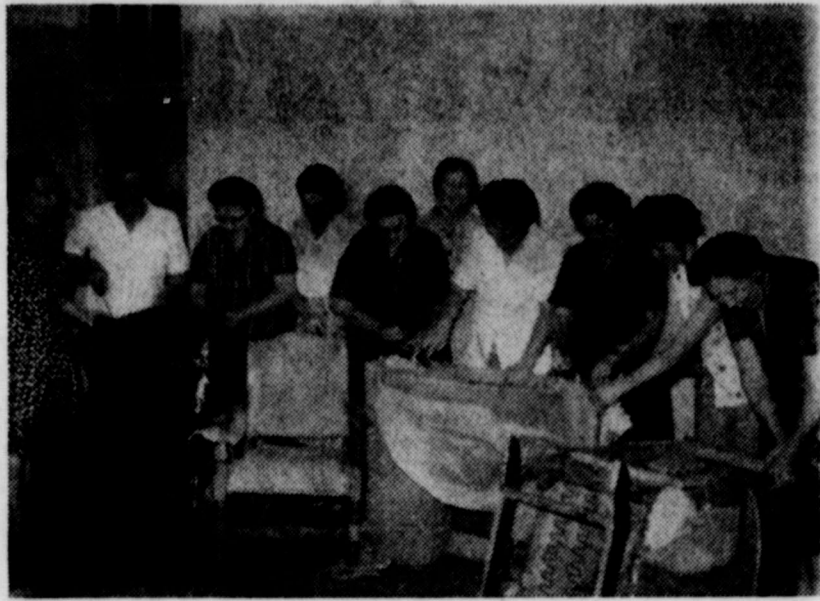

## Henry's Selling Beef from Champ At Angelo Show

Henry's Food Market in Bronte has on sale this weekend beef from the reserve champion steer in the heavyweight division at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show. The prize animal was exhibited by Gerald Geisweidt, 15 year old Mason FFA boy, who also had the grand champion of the show. The steer dressed 594 pounds.

The steer was purchased by Premium Packing Co. of San Angelo, and was purchased from that firm by Henry's. In addition to the reserve champ, the local food store bought ten other choice show calves which were on exhibit at Angelo. J. L. Perry, speaking for the Bronte store, said that they will have about 5,000 pounds of the show cattle beef on sale. They have ads in this paper offering the beef in both small quantities and in half and whole lots.

## Board Discusses Hospital District For West Side

In a meeting of the board of directors of Coke County Memorial Hospital Tuesday night at Robert Lee, the subject of forming a hospital district for the purpose of operating the hospital was discussed.

Judge W. W. Thetford met with the group and reported that he had investigated the matter to quite an extent and had discussed it with the commissioners court. Judge Thetford said all the county commissioners talked favorably toward such a move and he was interested in obtaining the opinions of board members. They spoke unanimously in favor of attempting to make the change in the operation of the county hospital.

Judge Thetford said the formation of a hospital district would take an act of the Texas Legislature and a majority vote of voters in the area which would make up the district. Opinions of board members seemed to favor having the district made up of commissioner precincts 1 and 3, since they are in the area served by the hospital, and most patients come from the two precincts.

## Morrow Breaks High Jump Record At Ozona Tourney

Jim Morrow, broke the high jump record at the Ozona track meet last Saturday when he topped the cross bar at 6 feet, one-half inch. The lanky sophomore appears to be headed for state this year in the high jump event. He missed an opportunity to enter state competition last year when he tied for top place in regional competition on a 5'10½" jump, but lost on the toss of a coin.

The 440 yard relay team placed third at Ozona. The team is composed of Roy Stout, Barry Curlee, Tommy Glenn Sims and Royce Lee. Lee also placed third in broad jump. Stout was sixth in the 100 yard dash, and Weldon Broussard was sixth in high jump.

According to Coach N. M. Curlee, the track and field team is coming along well, and he expects to have the members in top shape by the time of the district meet April 10 and 11.

The team will compete at Rotan this Saturday.

## Type III Vaccine To Be Given Here

Type III Sabin oral polio vaccine will be given to all residents of the area on March 29, according to information released recently by city health officer, Dr. John R. Harris.

The serum will be administered at the school, as has been done with Types I and II. It will be given under supervision of Dr. Harris, with Mrs. Joy Bagwell, Dr. Harris' office nurse, in charge.

As with the first two types, the medicine will be given on a sugar cube and will be easy to take, Mrs. Bagwell said. Controversy as to the safety of the Type III vaccine has been prevalent in some areas, Mrs. Bagwell said, but no ill effects have been reported anywhere in this area. She urged everyone to take the vaccine.

Mrs. Bagwell added that it is necessary for a person to have all three types of vaccine in order to enjoy complete immunity from polio.

## Golden Heritage Men Meet with Bronte Group

Representatives from Golden Heritage, Inc., a Dallas firm which operates homes for the aged, met with the Bronte Lions Club Industrial Development Committee Tuesday afternoon to discuss the possibilities for placing one of the homes here.

Joe E. Labay, president, and Richard S. Perkins, executive vice president of the firm, were here, and spoke very optimistically to the local men. The meeting, held in First National Bank conference room, was attended by Matthew Caperton, committee chairman, D. K. Glenn, L. T. Youngblood, Ben Oglesby, Norman R. Kiker and Marvin Bryant, members.

Perkins told the committee that his firm would make a survey of Bronte and determine if it will be economically feasible to place a 30-bed home here. He said the committee could look for a report from him in the next few weeks.

Labay said the payroll and other local expenses of the home would put about \$40,000 annually into the community, in addition to extra financial benefits given by visitors who will spend money here.

## Ditmore Buys Building And Laundry from Sims

Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Ditmore announced this week that they have purchased the building on Highway 277 belonging to R. H. Sims. The building houses an automatic laundry and formerly was used for the Sims Hardware store.

## H D Agent's News Dept.

In studies made by the Clothing and Housing Research division of the Agricultural Research Service, it was found that staphylococcus aureus, a common cause of pneumonia and skin and kidney infections, remained alive on wool for 127 days, on cotton 84 days, and on acetate tricort 51 days. Escherichia coli, the common intestinal bacterium and related to paratyphoid and typhoid organisms, remain alive on wool for 67 days, on cotton 32 days, and on acetate tricort 7 days.

Mycobacterium butyricum, a member of the group in which the organism causing tuberculosis belongs, remained alive for 84 days on wool, 70 days on cotton, and 34 days on acetate tricort.

Since many family washes are not long enough or hot enough to kill these harmful bacteria, it is necessary to look for a laundry aid or disinfectant which will not harm the color or physical characteristics of the fabric, which will not leave residue that is toxic to the skin; and which will kill many types of bacteria and still remain reasonable in cost.

The Clothing and Housing Research Division reported finding three disinfectants which reduced the number of bacteria when used in warm water laundering. They were a quaternary ammonium compound, a phenolic disinfectant; and the antibiotic, neomycin sulfate.

Quaternary disinfectants consistently reduced the number of bacteria. Since this type of disinfectant is inactivated by most detergents, it should be added at the beginning of the rinse cycle. For a washing machine which uses 15 gallons of rinse water, the homemaker would add 4 ounces of the 10 per cent commercial disinfectant.

The phenolic disinfectants also reduce the number of bacteria. It makes little difference whether they are used in the wash or rinse cycle. Approximately one cup per load of these sanitizers would be used.

It is important that the antibacterial agents should be used whenever there is a sickness in the home or the community. The sanitizers need not be used in every wash, but they are a protection when contagious diseases are in the family or the community, or when you are not sure about the sanitation of public equipment being used.

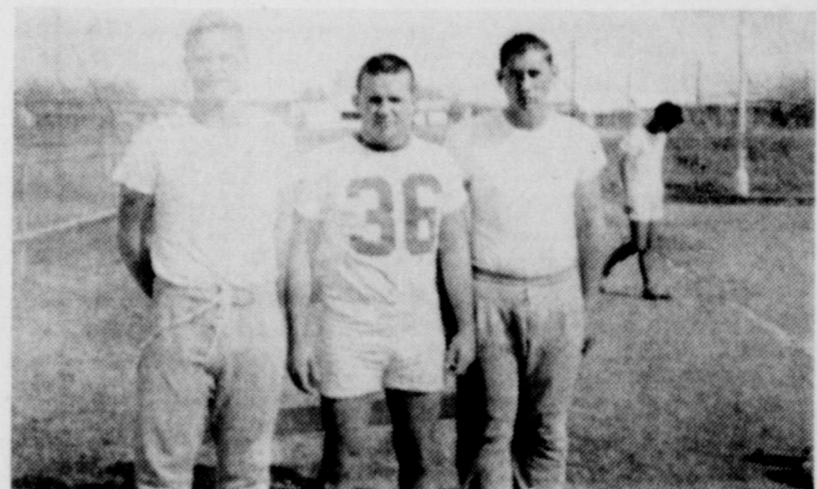

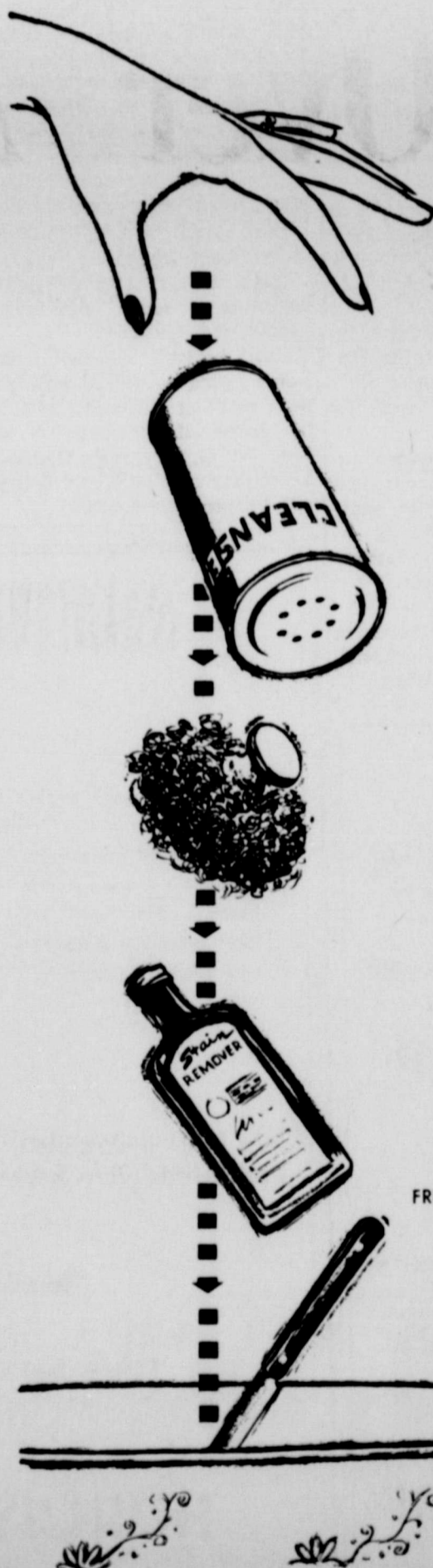
