widow, the former Emma B. Clington, native Pennsylvanian with whom he became acquainted while pursuing religious study at the Baptist Seminary in Nyach, N. Y.; a son, Finlon Williams, law student in the University of Texas, and a daughter, Madelon Williams, teacher in the Salt Branch school.

Other survivors include his mother, Mrs. C. F. Jennings, four brothers, and three sisters at Berea, Ky. None of whom were here for the rites.

Brother Williams was born at Berea, Ky., January 15, 1877. He began his active Christian work at the age of 27, at which time he was residing in California. He went to Nyach, N. Y., where he attended the Seminary for two years. At this time he met Miss Emma B. Clington, to

whom he was married in Los Angeles, Cal., on April 21, 1909. The couple celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary last April, at which time they were at home to a large number of friends from over this section of Texas.

For a number of years Brother Williams gave his life to city mission rescue work, first in Los Angeles and later on in San Francisco. He then moved to Fort Worth where he attended the Southwestern Baptist Seminary, and during this time did city mission work in Fort Worth. He was later associated with Dr. L. R. Scarborough in evangelistic work.

For a number of years Brother Williams was associated with the Hogg evangelistic party, and later with the Hamm evangelistic party. During

these years he traveled over large sections of the United States in these soul winning campaigns.

After retiring from the active work of an evangelist Rev. Williams moved to Abilene to educate his children in Hardin-Simmons University. He served as pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church in this city for about two years, and since that time has served rural churches near Abilene and has done evangelistic work at the same time. He had only recently resigned as pastor of the church at Talpa, and at the time of his death was pastor of the church at Salt Branch, near Merkel. During the world war, he was with the Army Camp Post at Ft. Worth where he was pastor to a large number of soldier boys. Later he

went to Houston where he worked with Dr. J. B. Leavell as associate pastor of the First Baptist Church. He later went to El Paso and served the First Baptist Church of that city in the capacity of associate pastor. He came from El Paso to Abilene in 1926 and has resided here since.

S. J. T. Williams, during his ministry of about thirty years, served the cause of Christ well. He loved his Master; he loved lost men; he loved his friends, and he made hosts of friends wherever he lived. His going is not only a loss to the family and loved ones, but it is a distinct loss to the cause of Christ in Texas and the South, where he spent his life in earnest labor.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER  
FOR MOODY INSTITUTE  
The recently installed president of the Moody Bible Institute, of Chicago, Rev. Will H. Houghton, D. D., has issued a call to the alumni and former students of the Institute in all parts of the world, and to the friends and defenders of the evangelical faith everywhere, to set aside January 18, 1935, as a day of prayer that God may richly equip the Institute to meet its increasing responsibilities in these difficult but significant times; that it may be kept true to its historical doctrinal standards; that its work in the field through the Extension Department may be able to render a widening service; that the Founder's Week Conference, February 5 to 8, 1935, may witness old-time power and blessing; that the great D.
