## County Clothing Drive Will Culminate On Wednesday



Capt. H. J. Magrane whose wife is the former Emma D. Gregg of the Liberty community, is with the medical corps in Italy. He was promoted from first lieutenant to captain on March 7, and has been overseas for 14 months. He is writing a history of veterinary medicine in World War II. He is a graduate of A. and M. College with a degree in veterinary medicine. Capt. Magrane has one son, 13 months old. Mrs. Magrane's parents are Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Gregg of Liberty.

The response of Dawson County citizens in the United National Clothing Collection has been especially good, according to reports received Saturday from Judge Kilmer Corbin, who serves as chairman for the project. Judge Corbin states that good collections have been turned in thus far and reports that clothing bundles will continue to be accepted until Wednesday, May 2.

Officials are busy boxing the bundles at the Legion Hall, which is the collection point for used clothing in this city.

The donated garments will be shipped to the war-devastated countries on the basis of the greatest immediate need and available shipping space. The clothing will be distributed free to the needy without discrimination of any kind. The Far East will be included in the event conditions are such as to permit distribution of clothing collected in this drive.

The appeal is for good serviceable used clothing which will enable sufferers in the war areas to help themselves in reconstructing their broken homes and towns and join with the United States in shaping the peace which will follow final victory.

The need among the millions of war sufferers is great and urgent. The goal of the campaign is 150,000,000 pounds of garments.

If you have not yet turned in a clothing collection, make a survey now of your clothes closets and attics, and select garments and bed clothing which are not in use and take them to the legion hall.

See that your spare apparel is put to use, by donating it to the United National Clothing Drive now.

## County Baseball League Being Organized Now

President Kirk stated Saturday that anyone would be eligible to enter the league and should contact either he or Norris before the next league meeting which has been scheduled to be held on Monday, May 7, in the county court room at 8:30 p. m. Managers of each team will comprise the executive organization for the league.

At the May 7 session the group will set up all regulations and determine the policies of the league. They will set up a schedule at that time and tentative plans are for the games to open sometime around May 20, the exact date to be announced at the next meeting.

Most of the matches will be played at the local baseball park, which according to Kirk, is now being worked over. He states that they are hopeful of getting lights for the park, in order that the games can be played at night.

## Memorial For Pvt. James Suggs To Be Held Sun.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Suggs of Welch received a communication from the War Department April 28, reporting that their son, Pvt. James A. Suggs died of wounds on Cebu Island in the Philippines on March 28, 1945.

Memorial services for the young Infantryman are to be held Sunday, May 6, at the Dawson School in Welch at 3 p. m. The Rev. Forester will officiate at the services with Rev. Mont Robinson assisting.

Pvt. Suggs, who was 19 years of age at the time he died, was a member of the Infantry and had been overseas since December 30, 1944. During his tour of duty overseas he had been stationed on Leyte in addition to the Island of Cebu.

In service since July 10, 1944, Pvt. Suggs received his training at Camp Wolters and at Ft. Ord, California.

He is a graduate of the Dawson School, having received his degree from that institution in May of 1944.

Survivors include his parents; a brother, Pfc. William (Bill) E. Suggs who is a member of the Infantry now stationed on Bataan in the Philippines; a sister, Miss Lanelle Suggs, 16; another brother Bobby Ray Suggs, 11; and in addition other relatives and many friends.

## Polls For The City Charter Election To Be Open From 8 a. m. To 7 p. m. Tuesday

It is hoped that a strong vote will be cast Tuesday, May 1, 1945 when the proposed city charter will be voted upon at a municipal election to be held in the fire station of the city hall. Polls will be kept open on Tuesday from 8 a. m., to 7 p. m., thereby giving every Lamesa citizen an opportunity to voice their sentiments in the matter.

Serving as election judge will be M. Q. Martin of this city.

A charter commission was formed in Lamesa a short time ago with the following men serving on the committee: M. C. Lindsey, Wright Boyd, E. W. Renner, I. L. Ashley, Charnell Jobe, George D. Norman, C. A. Baldwin, O. W. Richardson, H. F. St. Clair, W. B. Osborn, W. K. Crawley, J. H. Norris, Walter H. Collins, J. H. Harp and Audrey Cox.

This group submitted a proposed city charter and copies of the document have been sent to the Lamesa voters. The matter of its adoption or rejection will be decided at the election to be conducted Tuesday.

Features of the charter that will bring about a change in the present governing system as explained by members of the charter commission and as set forth in the proposed charter are as follows:

It is proposed that the governing and law making body of the city of Lamesa shall consist of five councilmen, to be known as the city council of the city of Lamesa. From their number a mayor shall be elected by a majority vote.

Councilmen will be elected for place number 1 through 5 inclusive and the candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast for the place which he seeks shall be elected to the respective office for which he was a candidate. Two councilmen will be elected on even years, with three to be selected on uneven years; whereas the mayor will be elected each year. Twenty-five dollars will be paid the mayor each month, with councilmen receiving a compensation of ten dollars apiece, according to the proposed city charter.

Under regulations of the city charter it is provided that a city secretary and city manager be elected by the city council. The city manager shall have appointive powers, subject to the approval of the council and it will be his duty to select officers and employees of the city with the advice of the council.

The proposed city charter states that all ordinances now in existence in Lamesa will be observed as in the past, and that new ordinances can be passed by the city commission.

Prevailing tax rates of \$1.50 will remain in effect if the proposed charter is adopted and the tax rate can only be changed by a majority vote of the local citizenry.

The above factors are said to be outstanding points of the proposed charter for Lamesa. Interested parties in this matter express the desire that all qualified voters go to the polls Tuesday and vote in accordance with their sentiments.

The certificate was awarded because the organization surpassed their membership quota prior to December 7, 1941 and is known as the Pre-Pearl Harbor certificate.

This is the fourth document of this type which the legion has been awarded to date, having previously received recognition for their enrollment record as they reached the all time high of 121 members, surpassing the 1943 and 1944 enrollment combined. Other certificates which the legion possesses were awarded for their cooperation with the national program through the conducting of memorials and through the sponsorship of boys state, and for the sponsoring of a junior baseball league here.

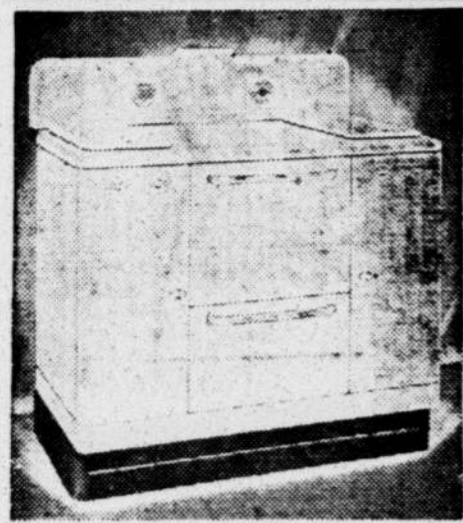

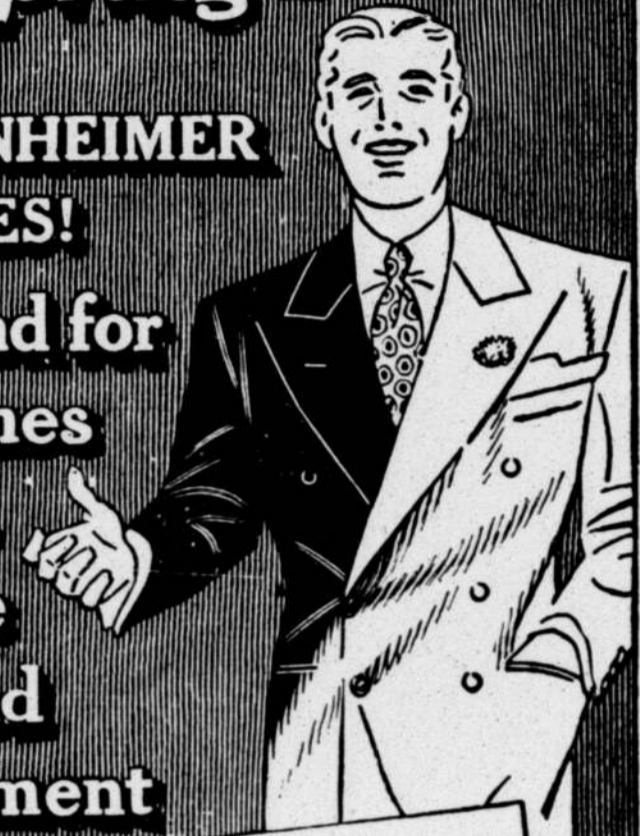

## Lamesa Women Accept Awards For Soldiers

**BIG SPRING**—How young Americans heroically continue to risk their lives to preserve their nation's precious liberties was evidenced in a solemn Retreat Ceremony at the Big Spring Bombardier School Friday evening as seven more war heroes were honored.

None of the heroes were around to hear the Department's glowing citations—two were dead, two missing in action and three internees in enemy prison camps. But next of kin were present to receive the medals and to hear with mounting pride how their beloved ones had served their country with bravery and honor.

Col. Ralph C. Rockwood, Commanding Officer, made the awards as Aviation Cadets and Enlisted Men in dress formation stood smartly at parade rest. The ceremony had been scheduled for April 14, but was postponed because of the death of the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The Air Medal was given to Mrs. Ruby C. Robertson of Lorraine for her son, F-O George P. Robertson, brother of Scott Robertson of Lamesa, a glider pilot who is now a prisoner of war in Germany. The Officer braved flak and small-arms

## Leland Payne's Widow Receives Unit Citation

Pvt. Francis Leland Payne, whose mother, Mrs. J. W. Payne lives in Lamesa, was awarded posthumously a Unit Citation with other members of his Unit by General Eisenhower recently. Pvt. Payne who was killed on June 6, 1944, was a member of an Engineer Combat Battalion which distinguished itself in battle action by extraordinary heroism. The award represents the highest recognition to be given to a unit.

The Citation reads in part: "On 6 June 1944, during the assault phase of the invasion of occupied Europe, this Engineer Combat Battalion was assigned the difficult task of clearing, organizing, developing and operating the assault landing beach sectors in order to insure the rapid movement of personnel, supplies and vehicles across the beach, and of clearing and developing a beach exit to permit the egress of wheeled traffic off the beach. During the landing, the Battalion encountered very heavy enemy resistance in the form of concrete pillboxes, gun emplacements and connecting trenches overlooking the beach, from which was maintained heavy artillery, mortar, machine gun and small arms fire, in addition to the numerous underwater obstacles blocking the shallow water and the vehicle defense line on the beach itself.

"Despite the fierce enemy fire, the Battalion set about clearing the beaches of mine fields and other obstacles and succeeded in setting up the necessary roads in order that the stranded vehicles could be moved and the exit opened for inland traffic. Several times during the early hours of the landings, elements of the battalion joined with the infantry in combating the enemy, reducing his strong points, and wiping out snipers on the face of the cliff. Only through the combined heroism, courage and skill of the men was this unit able to successfully perform its assigned missions which so materially contributed to the successful establishment of the beachhead on D-Day. By Command of General Eisenhower."

Pvt. Payne's wife lives in Healdton, Oklahoma and the citation was sent to her with a letter from the battalion's commanding officer.

Mrs. Myrtle D. Doyle of Lamesa also received an Air Medal for her husband, Staff Sergeant Jimmie Doyle, missing in action in the Southwest Pacific. An aerial gunner, Sgt. Doyle was cited for his courage during bombing missions over the Pelau Islands. He has been missing since Sept. 1, 1944.

Mrs. Marie Y. Callaway of Lamesa received an Oak Leaf cluster to the Distinguished Flying Cross for her husband, 1st Lieut. David L. Callaway, missing in action. The officer, a fighter pilot with the 8th Air Force, has been missing since June 19, 1944, when he braved a mission during miserable weather over North western France. He has a daughter, Helen, 16 months.

An Air Medal was awarded to Mrs. Emma N. Morris of Lamesa, whose son, 2nd Lieut. J. C. Norris a prisoner of war in Europe. The fighter pilot was shot down over Hungary in July 1944.

Other awards presented included: the nation's second highest award, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism under enemy fire, to Mrs. Parilee Mohler of Colorado City for her son, T-Sgt. William A. Mohler, B-26 gunner who died in action in June 1943; Mrs. Maggie G. Coburn, Big Spring, the Air Medal for her son, T-Sgt. Paul H. Coburn, who was killed in action over China; and Mrs. Irene Purser, Big Spring, the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf cluster for her son, S-Sgt. William R. Purser, now a prisoner of war in Germany.

### Plan Proposed To Sell School Land To Texas Veterans

One of the proposals for aid to servicemen returning from World War II involves money derived from the lands of Texas, according to an article by Walter P. Boswell.

A plan before the legislature would designate \$25,000,000 of public free school fund money to purchase land for resale exclusively to Texas veterans. The money in the fund comes "from revenue from state owned lands or minerals in the lands, but a constitutional amendment is required to reinvest the capital of the fund in land," explained Bascom Giles, state land commissioner.

The veteran's land fund proposed to let the public free school fund buy certain lands as an investment. It could even buy land from itself. Land purchased would remain under the free school fund. It would get its money back through sales in \$5,000 units for cash or on time on terms of one-tenth down, the balance payable at four per cent interest over a 40 year period.

Mrs. Eugene L. Green and Mrs. Don Fritz also kept a booth that day, being in charge of one in front of Penney's.

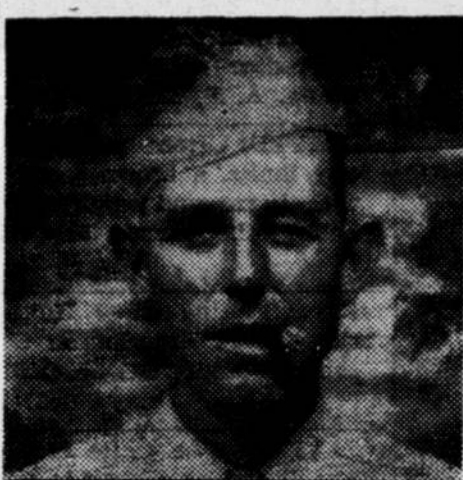

### New Shoe Stamp To Be Validated On August 1st

A new shoe ration stamp will be validated on August 1 according to information released by the Office of Price Administration last week. Airplane stamps, 1, 2, and 3 in book 3, all valid now, will continue to be good indefinitely along with the new coupons, OPA said.

The number of the new stamp will be announced later. The new stamp will come into use nine months after the last stamp was validated last November 1. This eliminates the two-pairs of shoes a year policy that had been in effect since November 1, 1943.

The longer interval is necessary, OPA explained, because of extremely heavy military demand for shoes and severe inroads on retail inventories of rationed shoes.
