Henry Gremminger, who did not letter in 1953, became the top end in the Southwest conference, and several of the Bruin sophomore ends, especially Tony DeGrazia, showed much improvement during the season.

Sam won all-conference honors, All American honorable mention, played with the Pittsburg Steelers and served in the Navy 42 months aboard the carrier ROY. The Boys have four children.

Boyd was formerly the coach of the Baylor freshman team and did an outstanding job in that capacity. He has coached at Baylor for the past five years.

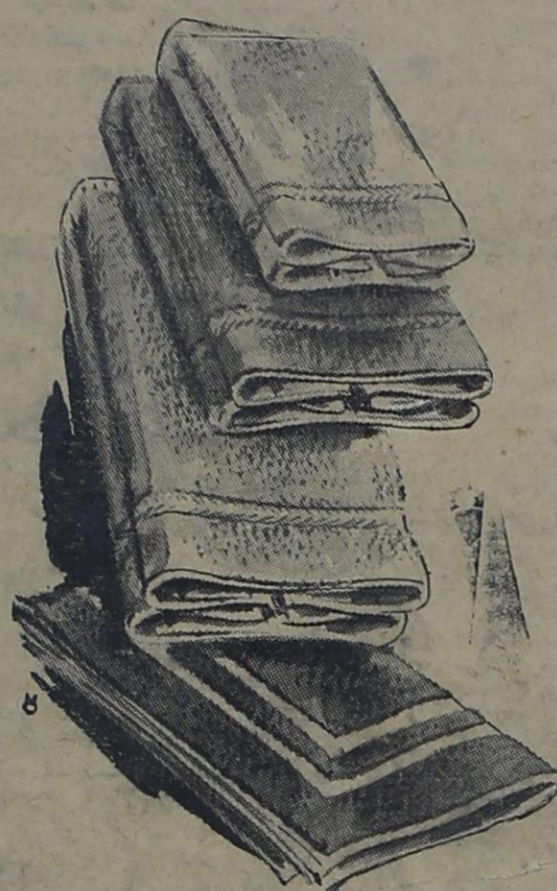
