

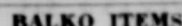

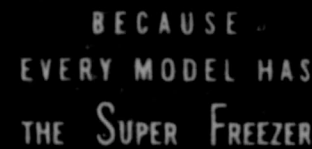

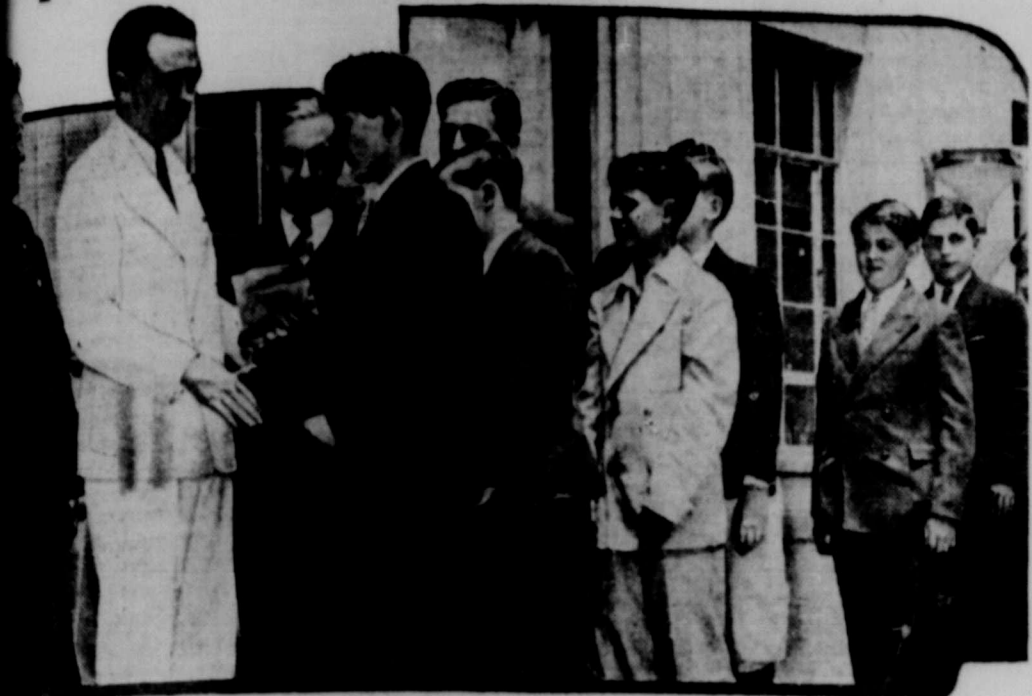

ing to data published in the Agricultural Experiment Station Bulletin No. 57, by Harley H. Acton, Director of Extension, the mean temperature in Goodwell, Oklahoma is increasing and the rainfall is decreasing.

the last twenty years the annual temperature has increased 3.5 F. based on 5 year averages; the rainfall was 2.46 inches during the years 1930-34 than during the years 1915-19.

the seasonal evaporation of an open tank was also compared to wheat grown on fallowed soil during ten years, and a negative result was found to exist. Very little was found between the wheat grown on heavy silt loam and the seasonal evaporation.

the data reported in the Bulletin show a very close relationship between crop yields and rainfall, the 6 years data from land continuously fallowed seems to be more related with this factor than the yield from milo or the corn on fallowed soil.

found that there had been a change in the wind velocity during the last 10 years, based on year average. The high daily wind velocity on Goodwell, Oklahoma was 11.5 miles per hour in 1925 and the low was 7.15 miles per hour in 1925.

analyses of dust carried by winds show this material to be richer in plant food than the normal soil, says L. F. Fly, Head of the Department of the Panhandle College, Goodwell, Okla. Data from recent studies are published in Panhandle Bulletin No. 57.

data show that winds tend to remove much of the silt and leaves a loose, coarse, surface material which is blown in drifts along fences and ditches.

Farm Loans Doubled

Crop Production Loans for First Six Months of 1935 Exceed Total for Last Year

Most of the production credit associations in Texas have more loans on their books at the half way mark in 1935 than were made during the entire year of 1934, and a number of the associations have more than doubled their volume of business this year. The record of achievement was brought out in the address of Virgil P. Lee, Vice-President of the Production Corporation of Houston, who was principal speaker at a meeting of representatives of production credit association held in Amarillo July 12, 1935.

F. P. Rogers, director of the Canadian Valley Production Credit Association, who has just returned from the Amarillo meeting, reported that representatives from five associations in this part of the state were in attendance. The meeting, which was one of a series of similar meetings that are being held at various points in Texas during the month of July, was for the purpose of bringing to the secretary-treasurers and the directors of the associations a better acquaintance with the purpose and efficient operation of the production credit system.

Production credit, which has been in operation in Texas almost two years, provides a permanent source of short-term credit on a co-operative basis to farmers and ranchmen. It is adapted to their needs; and more and more farmers and stockmen are becoming acquainted with its many attractive features, including a very low interest rate, which is five per cent at the present time.

GET UNDERPASS ON HIGHWAY 83

CONTRACT LET FOR UNDERPASS NORTH OF CANADIAN UNDER SANTA FE TRACKS

L. E. Whitman Construction Company, has been awarded the contract to build the underpass on Highway 33 and 4, north of Canadian, according to information received by J. C. Dingwell, resident engineer. The contract was awarded to the Whitman Company at approximately \$49,000.

Mr. Dingwell calls attention to the fact that several items are not covered by the bid, however, which will bring the total cost of the underpass to close to \$70,000.

Items not included in the Whitman contract include temporary false trestle; erecting superstructure spans; furnishing and erecting treated timber deck; track and incidentals; adjusting signal lines and fences; driving foundation piling and furnishing and driving test piling.

A 30-foot concrete pavement and curb 210 feet in length is included in the Whitman bid as is caliche pavement and asphalt topping from the city limits of Canadian, to connect with the paving north of the city a distance of about 1.5 miles.

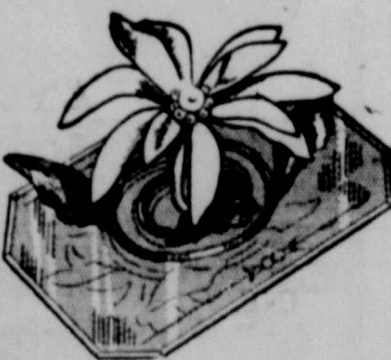
The underpass structure is to be of concrete and steel construction. It will be 122 feet 6 and 7-8 inches in length with a 14-foot vertical clearance and 30 foot horizontal clearance.

Work will likely be started on the project soon after August 1, it is believed.—Canadian Record.

FARM COOPERATIVES EXEMPT SECURITIES STATUTE

AUSTIN, Tex. — Legitimate Farm Cooperative Associations are exempt from the terms of the Texas Securities Act which requires all salesmen, agents and dealers in securities to be registered with the State. However, provision is made that the exemption shall not apply when the sale of such securities is made to non-members, or when sale of such securities is made either to members or non-members and a commission is paid or contracted to be paid such agent or salesman.

The reason for this latter provision is to prevent many unscrupulous from attempting to qualify as farm Co-op Organizations and thus evade the general provisions of the law.

The new law which seeks to regulate and control the sellers of various securities becoming known to Texas people and will result in the savings of millions of dollars annually in this State, Secretary of State Gerald C. Mann believes.

Representatives B. L. Rogers of Farnsworth, and A. B. Tarter, water of Plainview, were the House members primarily responsible for the exemption of Coops under the Act. The provision was written in at the first Committee Hearing on the bill and it was satisfactory to all the interested parties.

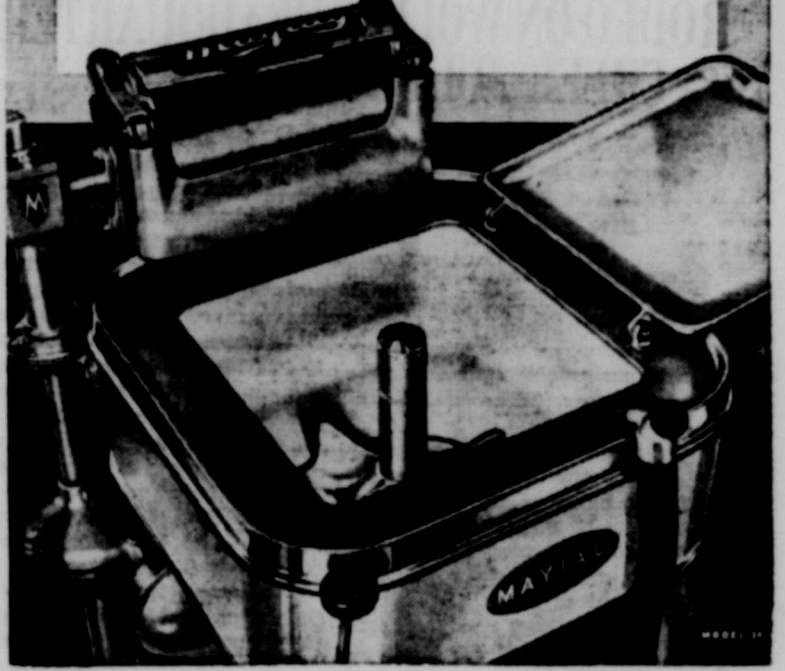

Use One Beef A Week.

Meat and meat-products will be government inspected and approved. Approximately one beef per week is used, with one half pint of milk per man per day, and several hundred pounds of bread and large quantities of fresh vegetables and other stores are to be purchased.

Although estimates vary, it has been estimated that the government will spend approximately 50 cents per man per day for food, which enables enrollees to enjoy the finest in variety and quantity. The enrollees gain from seven to ten pounds after two months in the CCC, medical records show.

Average Cost \$5.000 Daily

The average cost of food daily per man was 50.09 cents in the Eighth Corps Area, of which Texas is a part, in May 1935.

There are two distinct divisions of operation in each CCC company. Responsible for feeding, clothing, housing, educating, amusing, and medical care of the enrollees is the army. Responsible for their working hours during the day, or during any period of emergency, is the technical service, which for the Littlefield camp is the Soil Conservation Service and for Lubbock the State Park Service.

Classes Conducted

Three reserve army officers, including a medical officer, administer each camp. In addition there is a camp educational advisor with an enrollee assistant, who conducts classes, aids men in attending night school, or in taking correspondence courses.

A district chaplain and a local clergyman direct religious activities. Amusement ranges from camp picture shows on educational and other subjects to stunt nights, dances and athletics. An inter-camp program of sports competition is being planned.

The technical force is headed by a camp superintendent who assists in planning work projects and is responsible for their completion. He is aided by a crew of foremen, blacksmiths, and other specialists.

From the enrollee personnel of the camps are developed cooks, bakers, clerks, store keepers, typists, truck drivers, carpenters, and others necessary for camp and field operation.

Must Take Examinations.

Eligible for the corps are single men from 18 to 28 years of age who must be certified by the local relief organization. If accepted, they are sent to an enrolling station where they are given medical examinations. If they pass, they are furnished in complete uniforms for dress and field work, assigned quarters and work gangs, vaccinated and inoculated.

As a condition of their six months enrollment, they have agreed to send at least \$22 of their minimum \$30 per month's salary to a dependant at home. An exception to this are the sixteen men enrolled by the technical service for their particular ability in various fields; they are known as local experienced men, who need make no allotment and may be married.

Special camps are maintained for veterans. Two such camps are now located at Hereford and Canyon in the Lubbock district.

COUNTY OFFICIAL INDICTED

HUTCHINSON COUNTY TAX ASSESSOR INDICTED AS AFTERMATH OF ALLEGED ROBBERY

Borger, Texas, July 14—An 84th district grand jury returned an indictment yesterday against Arthur Huey, Hutchinson county tax assessor and collector, for alleged embezzlement of funds amounting to \$8,383. Bond was set at \$5,000 by Judge E. J. Pickens, but Huey had not been arrested late Saturday.

The charge is the aftermath of Huey's story of a robbery in which he said two men wearing dark glasses and driving a 1930 model coupe waylaid him last March 30 between Panhandle and Borger, forced him to drive off the highway, and took \$8,383 of automobile license receipts.

Following the robbery Huey said the coupe driven by the men drove up beside him and one of the men said "Put your car out of commission or I'll drill you."

Then Huey said, a man got into the back seat and hold him to drive on. After driving a short distance the man ordered the car stopped. When the car stopped off the main highway the man ordered Huey to get in the back seat. Huey then was bound hand and foot with tire tape and rope and blindfolded, he related on his return to Borger.

After an hour Huey escaped, he said, and walked to the highway and was picked up by two Gulf company employees, Jimmy Richmond and Sammy Young. Upon arriving at Panhandle, he called Sheriff Dan Hardee. Hardee was unable to find any clues as to identity of the men.

Huey said at that time he had expected a robbery, since he had received several "tips".

"I have a warrant for the arrest of Huey, but have not been able to find him", Sheriff Hardee said late Saturday.
