WHEAT YIELD DISAPPOINTING TO GROWERS

A farmer speaking of the wheat crops said they were in many places the greatest disappointment of any crop he had ever seen. Farmers everywhere had been estimating the turnout at around 25 bushels to the acre, but when harvesting began, the heads turned out to be chaff instead of grains of wheat. Black rust had ruined them, he thought.

This farmer said he would plough under about 100 acres of wheat as not worth the government tax that he would have to pay for having more acreage than he was allowed.

In other instances, wheat seems to be turning out well. It appears that unusually rank wheat made the least turnout in grain. Some wheat that appeared to be very poor, made the best showing when harvested.

Oats seems to have turned out well, which appears to carry out the contention of many grain farmers in this county that, one year with another, oats pay better than wheat, even though wheat may sell for \$1.00 per bushel while oats may sell for 25c. The difference in yield more than makes up the difference in price.

Rain halted wheat harvest over this section, but oats were nearly all either in the shock or combined.

Gerald C. Mann Flays Strikes in Cisco Talk

Vigorously condemning strikes in defense industries, Attorney General Gerald C. Mann told a large crowd gathered at the city hall Tuesday afternoon that we "must have action in stopping them."

"Strikes in defense industries must be stopped," Mann, a candidate for the United States senate, declared. "They imperil the freedom which has made it possible to strike. A defense strike is a blow at democracy."

"I urge congress to pass the bill I have advocated. I shall draw it and make it available to Congress."



and my congressional opponents are welcome to it. Until such a bill as mine is passed, the president should use his emergency powers to see that the wheels of industry continue to turn."

The able, popular attorney general outlined his proposed bill, which would eliminate strikes in industries producing defense materials, but which guarantee fair wages to labor, and fair profits to capital.

"There are three sides to this question," he shouted. "Labor has a side. Capital has a side. But above all, the American public has a side. Our men in the army camps must be adequately armed. Our country must be fully defended."

Declaring that the most compelling problem facing the nation today was that of national defense, Mann added, "we want guns and more guns. We want airplanes and more airplanes. We want ships and tanks and submarines. We want them in great numbers and we want them now."

"I want to mechanize our army so impregnable that all the powers on earth combined, could never under any possible circumstances produce an American Dunkerque."

The fiery speaker said there could be no total national preparedness unless the farmer and the worker were protected.

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Ritchey Revival Is Boosted By Crowds

ABILENE, June 11.—The Raymond T. Ritchey revival, launched here June 5 in a huge red-white-and-blue tent at South Third and Sycamore streets, almost immediately assumed the aspects of a state-wide meeting. Revival-goers were soon registered from Sweetwater, Hamlin, Baird, Breckenridge, Cisco, Coleman, Anson, Albany, Brownville and Merkel. Friends arrived early from Oklahoma City, where Mr. Ritchey has conducted several campaigns, and two families came from Boonville, Ark. Widespread publicity is expected soon to overflow the big tent. To meet this anticipated overflow, Evangelist Ritchey has ordered a 30-foot tent extension. This will make the big top more than 150 feet long. It is 80 feet wide.

The Ritchey meeting is described as a "patriotic revival." Special invitation has been extended to the men at Camp Barkeley. The Houston revivalist and prayer crusader has been a frequent visitor at the camp, working among the trainees, and praying for the sick. Prayers for the sick are offered in impressive altar services at every Ritchey service.

Cisco Auction Had Slow Day Tuesday But Big Crowd Showed Buyer Interest

A large crowd, but one of the smallest in point of sales, was the result of the Cisco auction Tuesday, when sales of calves, hogs, some cows and butcher stock amounted to only about \$1,171.62, which is perhaps the lowest week of the year. Sales usually run from \$3,000 to \$8,000 per week, Johnny Jones, one of the owners, said.

The cause given for the small sales at Tuesday's auction was the rain and muddy roads which prevented stock being brought. But the big crowd that looked like a circus might be in town, showed the interest that townsmen were taking in the regular weekly program.

It is one of the biggest events of Cisco, because it brings buyers and seller together, giving a market for what surplus stock a man may have. If one needs a cow, sheep, some beef stock, hogs, sheep or goats, one can usually find it at the weekly auction.

Appellants to Get Jail Service Credit

AUSTIN, June 11.—Defendants in criminal cases who unsuccessfully appeal convictions to the court of criminal appeals may, at discretion of the trial court, be given credit on their prison terms for the time served in jail.

It is a new law passed by the present legislature. Heretofore the trial judge has been allowed to credit jail time on penitentiary sentences only for those who did not appeal their convictions. Those who did appeal were not allowed credit after the high court affirmed their sentences.

W. P. Coldwell Retires From Postoffice After More Than 35 Years Of Service

Two McCanlies, Father and Son, Laid to Rest

W. P. Coldwell, postoffice employee, and champion farmer, retired on a government annuity on June 30—this month—after more than 35 years of service for Uncle Sam's postal business. He reaches the age of 65 on June 17 of this year.

Asked what he would do he stated he guessed he would just grow vegetables, and "piddle" about, taking it easy for the balance of his days.

Mr. Coldwell was born in Oregon but went with his parents to Kentucky at the age of six. He came to Texas in March, 1900 and went to work in the postoffice in Cisco in September 5, 1905. In 1912 he was transferred to Waco office where he continued until 1920, when Postmaster R. F. St. John secured his transfer back to Cisco, where he has since remained.

He began in the office under Gomer Williams, was transferred to Waco under postmasters Huffman and McCollum of that city, then under Cisco postmasters R. F. St. John, Bill Triplett, Frank Blackbecker, W. H. Craddock and L. H. McCrea.

Seven children have been reared by Mr. and Mrs. Coldwell, five unmarried. They are A. F. Coldwell, Strawn; Mrs. M. N. Chastain, Fort Worth; C. H. Coldwell, San Antonio; Frances, Cisco; J. E. Coldwell, Tucson, Ariz.; Lillian, Eastland; Mary, Cisco, who lacks one year in high school.

Three of the children are college graduates, and all are high school graduates except Mary. If she cares to continue she will become a college graduate. They have all graduated thus far in pairs, Mr. Coldwell said—a boy and a girl.

May Production Broke All Past Records in U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The Commerce Department says industrial production in May "brought the largest aggregate output on record."

Freight car loadings, electric power output and retail trade also set records.

"Demand resulting from the acceleration of the defense program was revealed on other business fronts so that income, production and consumption all are now in record volume," the department announced.

"Price influences of an inflationary nature which have gathered strength in recent months emerged more openly in May to bring about the largest rise since the speculative advance in the early autumn of 1939," the statement said.

"The most considerable price advance in May was recorded among farm and food products."

Rains Delay Grain Harvest And Crop Planting; Lake Waters Stand At 84 Feet

Rain in Cisco, which wrought such havoc over the Monday night, recorded only two inches by the gauge at the city hall, and raised the waters of Lake Cisco to an even 84 feet at the dam.

This is another all-time high for those waters, the record previous to this year being about 81.5 feet.

June 10 seems to be an ill-fated date in this section. Floods threatened Abilene and section some 20 years ago, and the Clyde cyclone was on June 10. Now the Albany 10 inches of rain that caused death and destruction in its wake, emphasizes that date again.

The highway department has this to say:

"Heavy rains and other causes have closed 14 highways in the state."

"Those closed yesterday were: U. S. 80-A from Albany to Breckenridge; state 283 from Crowell to Benjamin; U. S. 70 from Plainview

to Muleshoe; U. S. 84 from Muleshoe to Littlefield; state 81 from Springlake to Dimmitt; state 132 west of Muleshoe in the Panhandle; U. S. 81 from Ringgold to Bowie; state 59 from Bowie to Montague; U. S. 283 north of Albany; state 276 at Pecos; state 287 in Freestone county; state 21 from Paige to Lincoln; state 71 west of LaGrange at Colorado river, and state 24 east and west of Newcastle."

Wheat harvest, which was in full blast, was halted and late plantings of peanuts and feed crops on the sandy sections of Cisco trade territory were also brought to a stop, and still further delays were caused by too much moisture, that has kept land too wet to plough during the most of the spring months.

Gardens, corn and Irish potato crops are fine. Big yields in onions are reported.

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THE YOUNG SOLDIER

They chose well who named a certain malady "homesickness." It is a sickness. Many a young man, leaving his home and the friendly surroundings of his native community for the first time when he enters the army, is really sick with the sense of separation. Big strapping six-footers have been known to lie on their barracks bunks at night and sob from the ache of it.

They don't die of it, these soldiers, nor anybody else, except in fiction. But they suffer and there is nothing unmanly in that suffering.

One of the ways to alleviate it, and to cure the disease, is providing places where the soldier and sailor can go when he is off duty—a place where he can have clean amusement, decent surroundings, little facilities for writing home, or reading; where he can get sympathetic advice or religious consolation when he needs them.

That, roughly, is the purpose of the drive of the United Service Organization to raise an initial \$10,765,000 for camp service clubs. These centers, operated by six national voluntary welfare organizations all experienced in such work, will be off military reservations, giving the men a chance to relax once in a while outside military supervision. The Army itself provides libraries, movies, and post exchanges, but a fellow who is under military supervision 24 hours a day likes to "get out from under" it at times.

Plenty of private persons and organizations realize that, and are always ready to put diversion of a sort at the disposal of the soldier and sailor, especially on pay day. Much of this sort of diversion is laid in and offered with sheer exploitive intent.

There is only one way to beat that game and protect the welfare of American soldiers and sailors. That is to offer something better. The USO proposes to do it, and its fund drive is an opportunity for every man and woman to do something very concrete and very necessary to advance the country's defense.

The name is appropriate. It is "United," joining in one effort the work of many organizations. It has the single purpose of "Service" to men of the armed forces. And "Organization" is its keynote in a world in which only organized effort wins.

Japanese Issue Cites Loyalty as a Virtue

PECULIARLY significant are the characters on this 1940 Japanese issue, signifying loyalty and filial piety. For rumors have been drifting around lately tending to indicate that Japan's citizenry is slowly becoming dissatisfied with the military powers responsible for the long and costly China "incident."

Today a definite part of the world picture, Japan, 100 years ago, was isolated and insulated against virtually all outside civilization. Because of disturbances wrought by early Christian missionaries, the Japanese issued an edict in 1636 banning all foreigners and cutting off trade with everyone but the Dutch, who had sent no missionaries to the Land of the Rising Sun.

Commodore Perry first opened the door to Japan in 1854 and two years later an official treaty was signed between the United States and Japan permitting commerce. Other nations soon followed this procedure, and Japan was launched on a modern era that today makes her a threat to American peace in the Pacific. The stamp above was issued in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the imperial rescript on "education, given by Emperor Meiji to clarify Japan's educational policy.

ROSCOE PEOPLE
PLAN TO HONOR
BAPTIST VET.

Editor's Note—Rev. G. W. Parks is the father of Mrs. Asa Skiles of Cisco, and was once pastor of Scranton Baptist church, where he lived, and is well known to many Cisco people. He has often filled the Baptist pulpit in Cisco.

ROSCOE, June 11.—They're go-
ing to pay tribute to the Rev. G. W. Parks, veteran Baptist preach-
er, here June 14—his 75th birth-
day.

As an expression of appreciation
for his long and faithful service
to his church and to mankind,
friends of the Rev. Mr. Parks from
all sections of West Texas will pay
a visit to his modest home and
present him with gifts.

He and Mrs. Parks will receive
friends between 3 and 6 o'clock
in the afternoon.

There are few ministers in West
Texas who have performed as
many marriages or officiated at
as many funerals as Parks, who is
still most active.

Being such a keen student of the
Bible, Parks is called on to con-
duct many training schools in Baptist
churches throughout this terri-
tory. He is on the go practically
all of the time and is most active
for a man of his age.

Standing Recognized
While he prefers a simple life,
fellow ministers have never lost
sight of the work being done by
the tall, stout Roscoe preacher,
who definitely belongs to the "old
school." He gained his place in
the Who's Who of Baptist preach-
ers.

The paper had this to say about
him:

"The Rev. G. W. Parks of Roscoe
has chosen to labor in rural sec-
tions and with village and country
churches, but he is one of the
ablest preachers in our state. He
is a serious and diligent student

and theologian of unusual
strength.

"His sermons are carefully pre-
pared and filled with pertinent
scriptures which he quotes with
perfect ease and absolute accu-
racy. His discussions of the fun-
damental doctrines of our Baptist
faith would be a credit to the
strongest preacher among us."

Parks was born in Whitley coun-
ty, Kentucky, and at the age of 14
moved with his family to Alma,
Ark. It was there the young moun-
tain lad began teaching. He made
a grade of 100 in getting his first
teaching certificate and took a
school at the age of 17. He was
the only teacher.

Started At 16

He began preaching at the age
of 16, was licensed at 19, and was
ordained at 25. He is recognized
as an authority in Biblical inter-
pretation, and has been offered a
position as head of the Bible de-
partment in at least one univer-
sity. This he turned down.

Parks was educated at Pearidge
college, Arkansas, and later at-
tended the seminary at Louisville,
where he took his Th. G. degree.
He served as half-time pastor at
Scranton, the Parks family moved
to Abilene and lived there seven
years. In 1920 he was elected
pastor of the Baptist church here.

Always a deep thinker, Parks
"kinda" frowns on the present
tendency to work only for practi-
cal results, instead of giving lots
of thought to a subject.

"That's like coasting down a
hill," Mr. Parks says, "and when
you start up another hill, you lose
all your speed and come to a halt."

Still Studious

The veteran preacher is still a
student, reading and studying as
much now as he ever did, even
when in school.

"A man doesn't get too old to
learn, if he studies all the time,"
Parks says.

Besides being active in his chosen
field, Parks has played a big
part in the development of Ros-
coe, although few people actually
know of the work he has done,
since he went about it in his usual
quiet way. He served on the school
board 16 years, being president a
number of years, and helped get
the new school building.

PARTS PLANT STRIKE

DETROIT, Mich., June 11.—A
strike by the CIO's United Auto
Workers halted defense production
of airplane parts in six plants of
the Bohn Aluminum & Brass cor-
poration Tuesday with a state la-
bor mediator expressing fear of no
settlement before next week.

Four thousand men walked out in
demanding a 10c-an-hour general
wage boost. A company execu-
tive blamed the strike on subver-
sive influences, while a union of-
ficial said that certification of the
dispute to the National Defense
Mediation board had come too late
to avert the walkout. Strikers
agreed to a proposal last Tuesday
from Leo LaMotte, regional UAW-
CIO director, to return to work if
the company guarantees wage ad-
justments retroactive to Monday,

needy aged are taken into consid-
eration.

"So long as our 'infant indus-
tries' which have grown into
giants are protected, so must our
32,000,000 people living on the
land be protected. Too long has
the farmer been forced to buy on
a protected market and sell on an
unprotected market. I shall favor
continued federal aid to the farmer
and the ranchman."

"There can be no sound national
economy until the purchasing
power of the farmer's dollar is
put on a par with that of the other
man."

"Old age assistance by a system
of federal matching has been made
a federal question. When elected
your United States senator I shall
favor legislation providing equal,
uniform assistance to the needy
aged and let the federal govern-
ment see to it that such a law is
efficiently administered, justly
construed and fairly applied."

Mann scored subversive ele-
ments within the nation and
praised the federal bureau of in-
vestigation in its work of rounding
up alien foes. Reminding his lis-
teners of the elimination from the

American front of the Dillingers,
the Hamiltons, and other machine-
gun bandits of the past, by the
FBI, Mann added: "I shall also
support to the limit the FBI, in
dealing with the enemies of our
government and I shall favor giv-
ing to the FBI the men and the
means to deal effectively with the
real subversive elements within
our nation."

On an intensive state-wide
speaking tour patterned after his
campaign of three years ago when
his smashing victory for the at-
torney generalship wrote political
history in Texas, Mann had six
speeches on his Tuesday's itine-
rary. He spoke also during the day
at Fort Worth, Mineral Wells,

Breckenridge, Ranger and East-
land in the interest of his candi-
dacy for the senatorial post vacat-
ed by the death of Senator Morris
Sheppard.

Mr. Mann spent last night at the
Laguna hotel and left early this
morning to continue his speaking
tour that will take him to Baird
and to San Angelo.

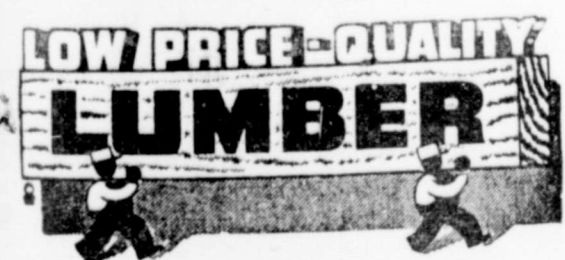

Aluminum Co. Strike Is About Over

WASHINGTON, June 11.—An agreement for settlement of the strike at the Cleveland plant of the Aluminum Company of America is announced by the Defense Mediation Board and Judge Walter P. Stacy of the board said it was hoped production would be resumed quickly.

The agreement is subject to ratification by the union. Stacy said the agreement provided for a general wage increase of 10 an hour to all employees in the plant.

The increase would raise the minimum wage in the five Cleveland plants from 72c to 73c an hour. The union had sought a general raise of 4½c and an increase in the minimum wage to 73c. Stacy said the increases would put wages at the Cleveland works on a parity with those at the company's new Kensington, Pa., plant.

The agreement also provides for a contract between the company and the CIO die casters union, to be signed forthwith.

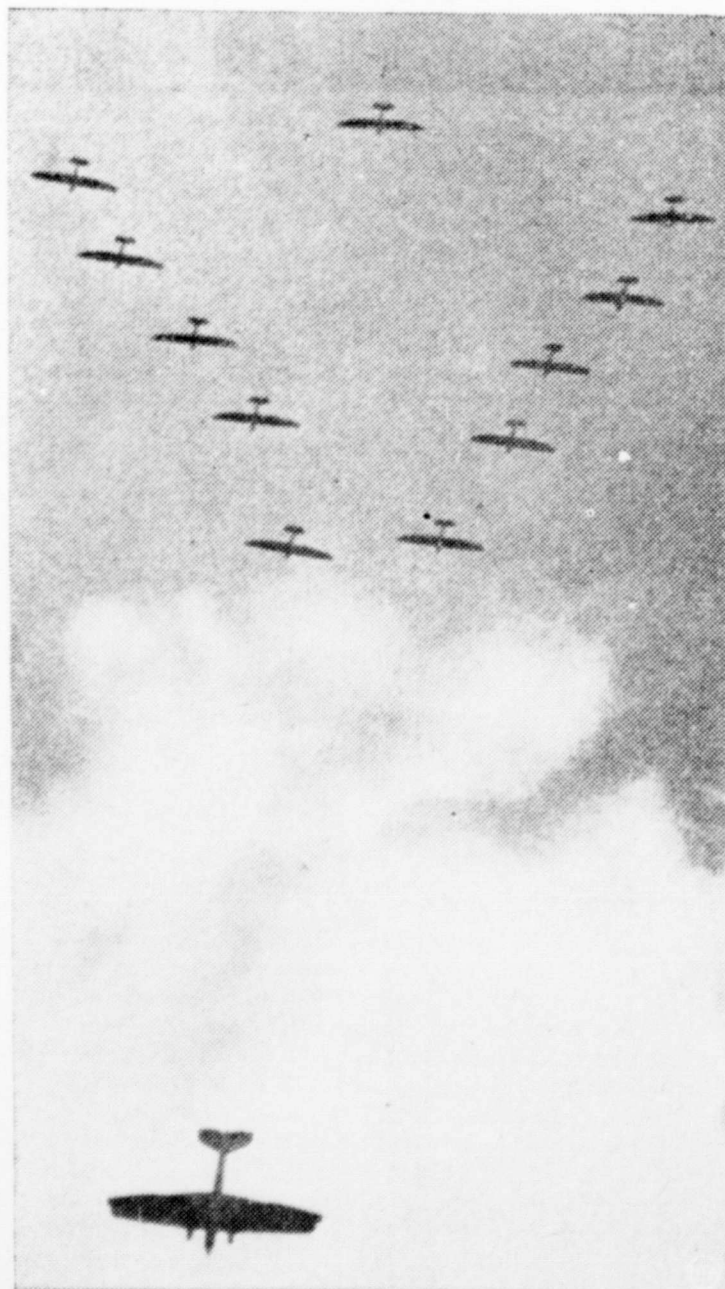

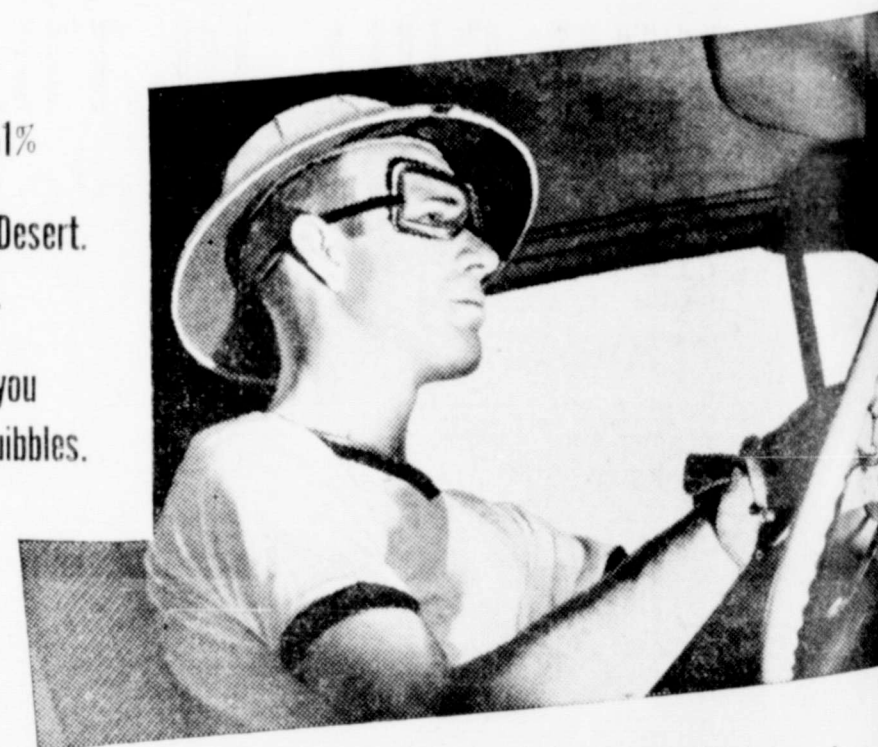
