Colorado, Loraine and Westbrook ISD held commencement exercises Friday, May 30 for 90 graduating seniors.

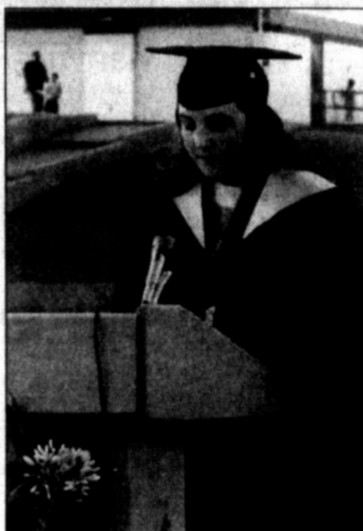

### City manager's contract sparks protest in meeting

Changes in the city manager's contract came under fire at the called city council meeting last Thursday.

Changing the city manager's status from employee to contract labor would resolve some retirement issues and would also save the city 7 1/2 percent in employer's fees for social security.

"When we first asked Steve to come back, we should have put him on contract labor instead of offering a pay package," said Robert McNeal, District 2 councilman.

McNeal said the current plans could have caused problems with Shutt's retirement.

"By going to contract with him, he's making the same money, but the city is saving 7 1/2 percent by not having to send in social security," McNeal said.

Mandated regulations require the city to match funds for employees, but not contract laborers. "It's a win-win for both of us," McNeal said.

According to city attorney Lois Rockefeller, an interim worker

### County grass fire chars over 500 acres

Grass fires in Mitchell and Sterling Counties kept volunteer fire fighters from the surrounding areas busy Monday afternoon.

Sterling City sent a call to the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department to help battle a grass fire Monday afternoon around 4:30 pm.

The blaze started in Sterling County on Highway 163 on the Sterling-Mitchell County line, but quickly spread into Mitchell County due to west winds, according to Tom Carlock, assistant fire chief.

## Retiring teacher offers encouragement

Colorado Independent School District will be losing the benefit of several experienced teachers this fall.

Janet Mayo and Gail Evans from CMS and Orphie Conner from CHS are retiring this year.

Conner has taught for 29 years, 27 of which have been in the CISD. Her first two years of teaching were in Houston. "Then I retired for 13 years to stay home and raise my children," Conner said

She started teaching adult education at Wallace in 1977. Conner began teaching 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade U.S. and Texas History at CMS in 1981, but found she didn't enjoy teaching U.S. History. When the opportunity to teach a history class at the high school level, she took it.

She credits her husband, Ronney, who also taught history for many years at CHS and Bob Reily as her history mentors.

"Ronney is a very smart man.

He'll stay up late watching Discovery Channel. He knows so much more history than I do," she said. "They have made me brighter and better."

Conner has served as UIL coach in Spelling Vocabulary, Social Studies and Journalism.

"The most rewarding part is being with the kids," she said, liking the opportunity to challenge the students through UIL. "It's intense study you can't get in a regular classroom."

While Conner also taught TAKS remedial ESL and communication application classes, she said UIL was "all-consuming," not surprising for the coach of UIL state winners.

The main difference between her early days of teaching and today is the emphasis on technology.

"Students have to know technology," she said, adding she

## Commissioners to interview JP applicants on June 9th

Following an executive session concerning personnel, the county commissioners agreed to interview applicants for justice of the peace on Monday, June 9 beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Six applicants are scheduled to meet with the commissioners' court for the position left vacant following the resignation of Kay Richmond in May.

Richmond served as justice of the peace for Precincts 2 and 3

The court approved the payroll totaling \$58,558.57, continued the lifting of the burn ban and voted to continue to advertise for sealed bids for a used tractor for Precinct 3, to be opened at 9:00 a.m. on June 23.

The court also approved a budget amendment for \$35,000 from the available funds to the Board of Economic Development.

## Ireland trip offers rare opportunity

The luck of the Irish will be with a group of Colorado High School students, parents and grandparents as they embark on a 11 day trip to the Emerald Isle.

CHS principal Jeremy Ross and his wife, Jincy, will be arranging the Ireland tour June 2009 through Education First educational tours.

"It takes a year for us to get all the funds raised," Ross said, "and we still have some spaces available."

The tour already has 50 people booked with an additional 6-7 on a waiting list.

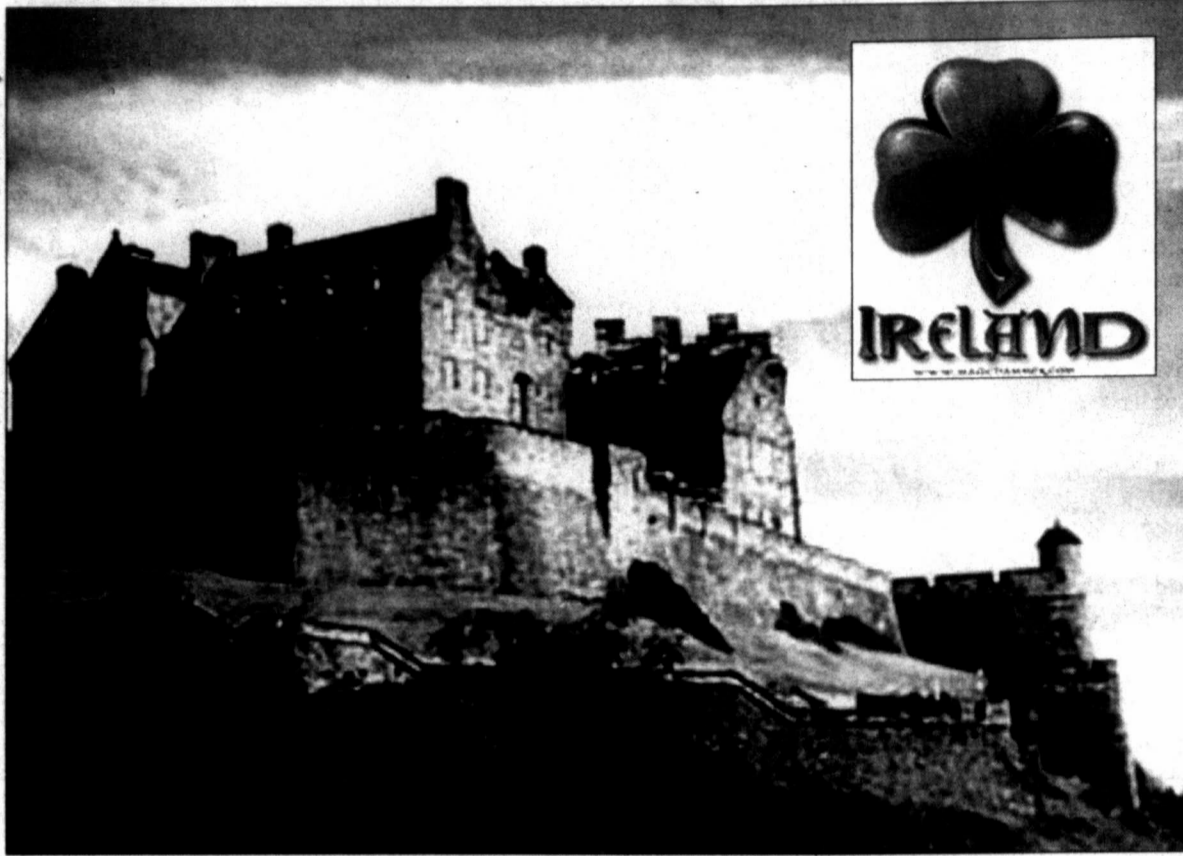
"If we can get five more on the waiting list in the next couple of weeks, the tour company will open up another 25 seats," he said.

The tour is scheduled to leave June 24, 2009 and return July 4th.

Rising gas prices will force the tour company to raise their fees dramatically in August, but participants who sign up now will be grandfathered out for the '09 tour. "So if you want to go, you need to sign up now," Ross said.

The current trip price is \$2,800 per student and \$3,100 per adult, and includes round trip air fare, breakfast and dinner, hotel and lodging costs, ground transportation, group tours, and entrance fees for the castles.

Participants will experience the wonders and beauty of Killarney

Lakes and the Lake District in Edinburgh, Scotland; sightsee in Shannon and Dublin, Ireland, take a ferry ride to North Wales and a night train to London for a two day excursion before returning home.

Other highlights include the Bog Village, Mcgillycuddy's Reeks, the Book of Kells and Windsor Castle.

Beyond just being a fantastically fun trip, students can earn college credits as well.

"Students can receive high school and college credits by completing a certain number of assignments before and during

the trip," Ross said.

Part of Ross's preparation for making the trip an exceptional experience for his students is researching the places they will visit beforehand. "I get a couple of books that have details about the things we're going to see. It's a cultural learning trip," he said.

## Livestock program has July 18 deadline

WASHINGTON, May 23, 2008 - U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Teresa Lasseter recently announced that livestock producers have until July 18, 2008, to enroll in the 2005 - 2007 Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). Signup began on Sept. 10, 2007, for the two programs that provide aid to livestock producers who suffered eligible livestock or livestock feed losses between Jan. 1, 2005, and Dec. 31, 2007, because of a natu-

ral disaster.

"The deadline to enroll in the 2005 - 2007 Livestock Compensation Program and Livestock Indemnity Program is rapidly approaching," said Lasseter. "I encourage all eligible producers to enroll soon because sign-up ends on July 18, 2008."

The LIP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred the death of livestock because of a natural disaster. The LCP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed costs because of a natural

disaster.

## Emergency farm loan applications accepted

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepted applications for Emergency Farm Loans resulting from damages and losses caused by fires and high winds on January 1, 2008 and counting.

Mitchell County has been named a contiguous county where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance.

Farm Loan Manager, Justin B. Holland, asks farmers who want to apply for emergency loans to submit their applications as soon as possible. The deadline for applications is January 15, 2009, but if farmers wait too long, a backlog will develop and cause delays.

Generally, farmers who have lost 30 percent of their production due to designated disaster are eligible for emergency loans. The FSA office is located at 103 W. Florida Avenue in Sweetwater.

## KWLF takes summer hiatus

Mitchell County residents will miss the sound of the "wolf" on Fridays as K-WLF takes a break during the summer.

The student-run television station will be off the air during the school summer holidays, according to Coach Harold Sowa, CMS teacher and sponsor.

The local news station began five years ago with just a camcorder.

"We did a little every day, mixing it in with the career investigating classes," Sowa said.

"The students did little stories, videotaped the year book and the kids just took off."

Then the group took a field trip to KTXS. "We can do that," Sowa said.

The KTXS news studio was a great help, giving pointers on obtaining equipment.

"KTXS' own Gilbert Corsey came down and interviewed us. Then we turned the tables on him and the kids interviewed him," Sowa said with great satisfaction. "He thought it was different (to be the interviewee)."

Although K-WLF is operated and run by the Middle School, Colorado City high schoolers got

involved, as well.

"The high school built the news desk, set up our green screen and equipment and installed the lights under the desk," Sowa explained.

Part of the news team's job was to interview local veterans as part of CMS' Real History, Real Heroes program. "We've done a lot," Sowa said. Those archived tapes are available for public viewing.

Charter Communications and Channel 6 have been instrumental in giving K-WLF air time on Fridays.

"It wouldn't be possible to be on the air without them," Sowa said. "They have helped make our program run," he said, explaining Channel 6 has a lot of folks who help the students troubleshoot technical problems.

Seventh grader Jake Johnson, K-WLF's sports editor, runs the second period class, assigning stories to all the anchors, as well as running the mixing board and remote recording.

"He knows how to run the show and edit film," Sowa said.

"I learned in class," Johnson said. "It's pretty easy." Johnson likes the hands-on approach in Coach Sowa's television/journal-

ism class. "You don't have to learn out of a book," he said.

Johnson said his favorite story concerned Brett Favre's retirement, which he researched on the internet.

While Sowa's students have a good time preparing the television and radio shows, they are also helping to improve their TAKS skills. "It covers all aspects," Sowa said. "They think it's fun versus work."

K-WLF's famous cooking show was Principal Mark Merrell's brainchild.

"We covered the main dishes across the United States and started in Washington with a chicken dish with some French name," Sowa said. "We sold our first dish for \$20."

Twenty dollars may seem like small potatoes, but the proceeds from the cooking network purchased the station's new teleprompter.

The format for the cooking show takes two days of intense preparation.

Students decide on Monday what dish they'll be preparing and assign ingredients. On Wednesday, they assemble the food and

put the script together.

"They rotate jobs, so everyone learns everything," Sowa said.

The intense preparation begins on Thursday as the students prepare the dish ahead of time.

The show is aired live on Friday, as Destiny and Kristine Gaona demonstrate how to prepare the featured dish. Included in their repertoire are interesting facts about the state where the dish originated.

"The coolest thing is I've had more parents tell me they are enjoying their students wanting to cook and partake in the kitchen," Sowa said. "They have a new interest because of the class. It's something anybody can do."

"K-WLF is always looking for guest chefs, so if anyone is interested they can call Gail Younger at the Middle School at 728-2673 and we'll get them on the air," Sowa said.

## Program expands horizons

### TUMBLEWEED SMITH Running 100 miles uphill

Pat Johns of Plano, Texas, is the only person who has run the 100 miles Himalayan marathon four times. He started running 33 years ago for weight control. After getting a job in the corporate world just out of college, he put on some extra weight and found himself at 215 pounds.

Now he weighs 195. He calls himself a Clydesdale. "It's a category for runners who are big, old and slow," says Pat. "I've never really wanted trophies. All I want to do is complete the race. I usually finish in the middle of the pack."

He says running is a progressive disorder. "You start running a little bit, then you do a 10K, then a half marathon, then a full marathon, then you go crazy and start doing some of the ultra marathons. My first was the Pikes Peak event where you run up to 14,000 feet, then turn around and come back down again. After I did that one three times, I thought I was ready for the Himalayan run."

Pat felt confident when he got to the India-Nepal border where the race takes place. Then he met people who swam the 4000 mile Amazon River and ran the 1100-mile Iditarod on foot in 30 degree below weather.

It was then he decided to delve into the motivation of the people running the race. He decided it's not about running. It's about life. Pat left the corporate world a couple of years ago and is now an internationally recognized motivational speaker.

He got his start by speaking to a couple of Rotary clubs in the Dallas area, telling about his experiences as a runner and relating them to life. Pat has written a book, "Footprints In the Shadow of Giants" which features some of his philosophy and photographs.

He says the Himalayan 100 is the most beautiful of all the 60 marathons he has run. On the trail, runners can see the four tallest peaks in the world. It is a grueling race. "It's 104 miles over five days," says Pat. "The first day is the worst. It's 24 miles with a 8,000 foot vertical gain. We go from 6,000 feet to 14,000 feet at about a nine degree angle."

"The second day is a 20-mile run, the third day is 30, then the last two days are 13 and 17 miles runs. A lot of people fall and get scratched up pretty bad. I've seen some terrible ankle, knee and wrist injuries. It's just amazing what people are capable of doing."

In his presentations, Pat stresses the fact that we are trained to believe that we're limited and can't do things. But the reality is that people are limitless and can re-condition themselves to believe that anything is possible.

The first time Pat ran the Himalayan marathon in 2000, 60 runners from 15 countries competed. Half of them were from the US.

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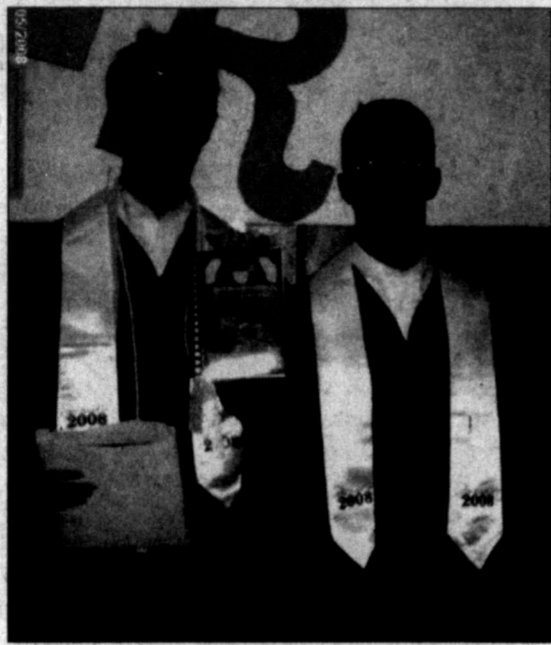

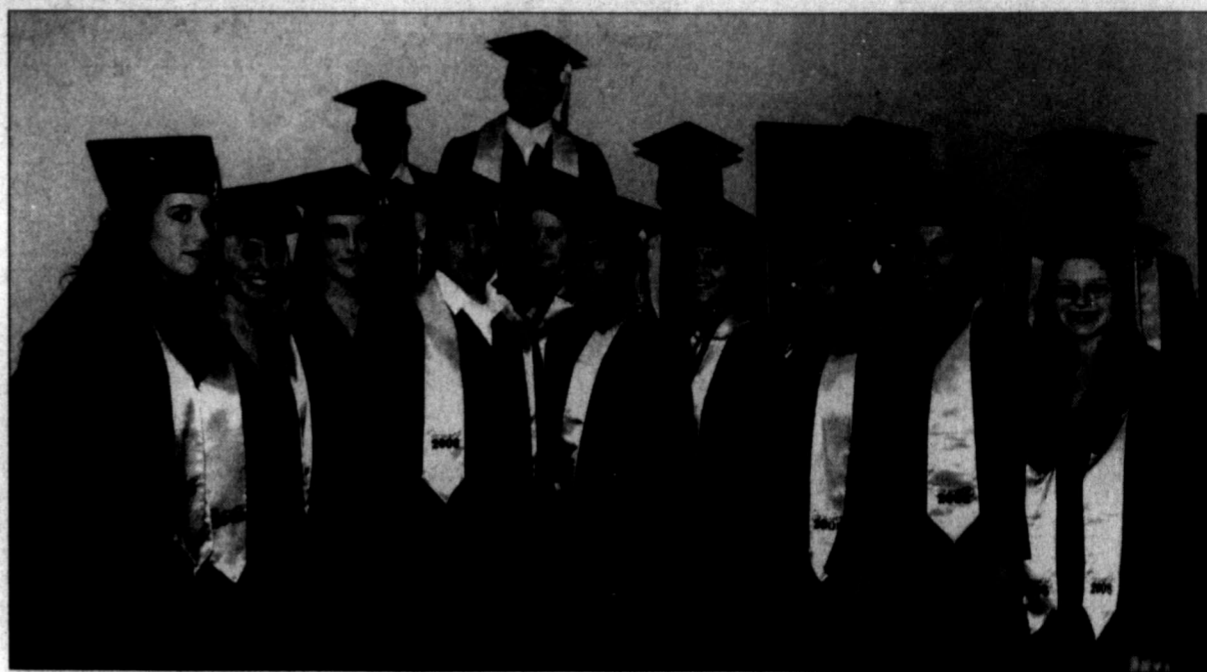

Commencement exercises were held in the Loraine school gym with speeches by valedictorian Kenny Esquivel and salutatorian Whitney Martin.

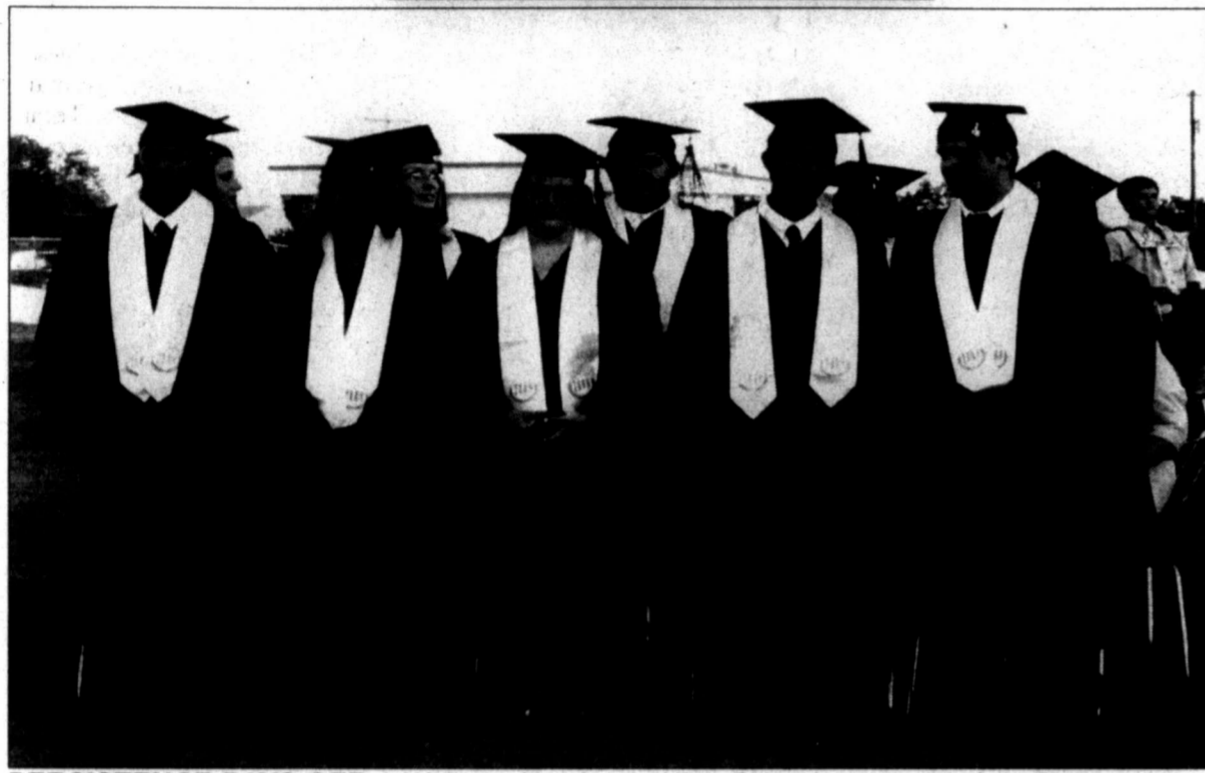

Three units from Colorado City responded, along with assistance from Loraine and Westbrook. The Loraine Fire Department sent two trucks and Westbrook sent one truck.

Local farmers with spraying rigs also lent a hand, as well as Sterling City, who sent four trucks after finishing with another fire.

Before the Highway 163 fire was extinguished, Sterling City was called out on two additional fires.

"We called Precinct 2 Commissioner Guelker and he sent his precinct water truck," Carlock said. "Two maintainers from Sterling County also greatly assisted in getting the fire under control."

The three and a half hour blaze claimed 500-700 acres.

growth by 2025 to reach a little over 5,000, according to McNeal. "The recommendations addressed the need to have adequate housing, which we really don't have," he said. "To keep up with anticipated growth, we need to address 100-110 houses annually for renovation or fixing up."

Other improvements included new water towers, renovation and new sewer lines by the Interstate and improvement of water pressure near the interstate.

Dakan's objections to the report centered on the practicality of financing the new housing.

"We can accept their report, but we don't have to do it," she said.

The complete proposal will be submitted at a public hearing at the Civic Center on June 10.

An additional \$50,000 was approved by the council to cover the cost of 85-90 additional 2 inch meters, which had not been anticipated nor included in the

original bid by Census.


"We thought we needed just a few 2 inch meters," McNeal said. "It turns out we needed about 85-90 more, which are quite a bit more expensive than the smaller residential meters."

Discussion about the unsatisfactory work of the sub contractors, which have no ties to Census, led the council to cut ties with the company hired to install the new meters. The rest of the meter installation is being handled by city employees.

"We want to commend our city employees," said McNeal. "They're working short handed and are doing a good job getting the meters installed and keeping up with everything else."


The council also voted to prohibit the multicolored electronic changeable message light emitting diode billboards currently permitted by TxDot.

could see both the good and bad aspects of technology. "The students can get information from the computer and do projects, but not all information is reliable."

"Good or bad, we are changing," she said. "It's hard to stay up (with technology) because that's money. I failed the computer class, so I guess it's a good thing I'm retiring," she joked.

An admitted "old-fashioned" teacher, Conner used numerous library books as resources in her class. "I told the students library books are the base. Everything on their computers is from this."

"The beauty of my teaching is that I don't have favorites. Every year was great," she said, speaking of memories. "Some years were more challenging than others. Looking back, it was the students that made each a fun year."

Conner added that "If I had an awful year, it had nothing to do with the classroom."

Her advice to new teachers "is to enjoy the students. The subject matter is important and necessary, but you are teaching people and if you're not enjoying being with them, it's a wasted attempt."

"Kids are not passionate about the subject matter. Before you can teach them, you have to reach them and let them know you care about them more than you care about the subject matter," said the former Teacher of the Year.

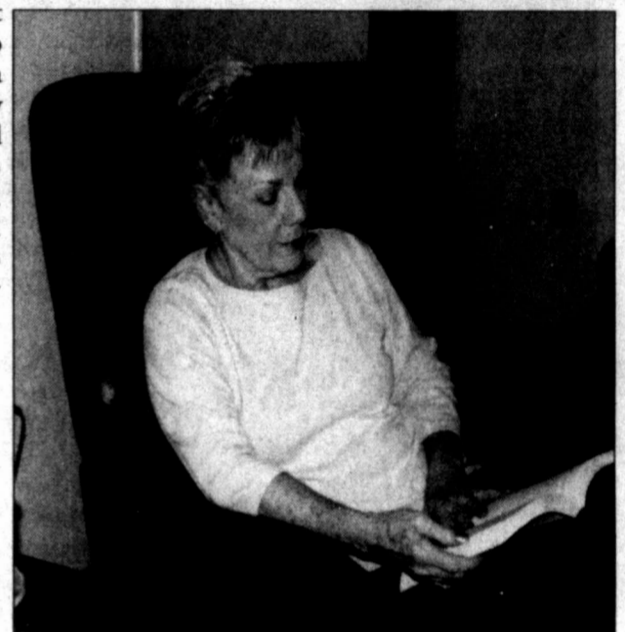
Conner said her life experience as a mother, substitute and teacher of adult education gave

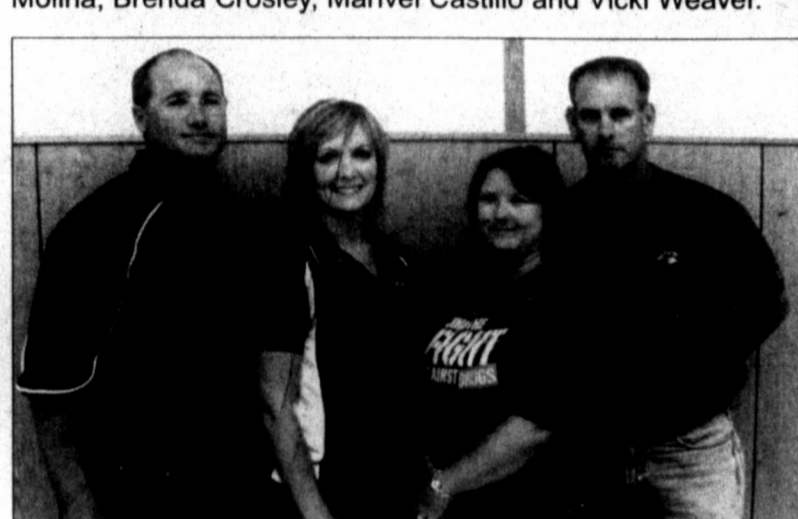

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, AMENDING ORDINANCE 86-09 BY AMENDING THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 13: SECTION 13.03.026 UTILITY METER CONTROL; EMERGENCY SHUT - OFF VALVE; DEFACING, BREAKING INTO OR TAMPERING WITH WATERWORKS SYSTEM TO ESTABLISH A PENALTY FOR ANY PERSON VIOLATING THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE DEEMED GUILTY OF A CLASS C MISDEMEANOR AND SHALL BE PENALIZED ACCORDING TO PENALTY FOR CLASS C MISDEMEANOR, V.T.C.A., PENAL CODE, SECTION 12.23 REPEALING ALL PRIOR ORDINANCES OR ORDINANCE PROVISIONS IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR THE AMENDMENT.

**WHEREAS**, it is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations in addition to the existing Chapter 13 of the Colorado City Code of Ordinances concerning the utility meter control for the citizens of Colorado City, Texas; and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary to prescribe these additional rules and regulations for the control of the utility meters; now, therefore,  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS:

Chapter 13, Section 13.03.026 Utility meter control; tampering with waterworks system shall read as follows:

a. **Control of meters.** All meters, cutoffs, goosenecks, valves and meter boxes connected with the city's water main and service pipe, including those furnished at the expense of consumers or property owners shall remain under the direct control of the city.

b. **Tampering with meters.** It shall be unlawful for any person other than those authorized by the city to connect, disconnect, move or tamper with any such meter, or to turn on or off the water at the cutoff, valve or meter; or to open or tamper with any meter box.

c. **Emergency shutoff valve.** The consumer shall install and have approved a "stop and waste" valve inside of the property line at a location accessible in case of emergency and shall not use the curb valve at the meter in lieu thereof.

d. **Defacing, breaking into or tampering with waterworks property.**

(1) **Property.** It shall be unlawful for any person in any manner to deface the houses, walls, machinery or fixtures connected with or pertaining to the city waterworks and its system.

(2) **Water system.** It shall be unlawful for any person to break, damage or tamper with any part of the water system of the city for any purpose whatsoever, or in any other manner maliciously interfere with or prevent the running and operation of such system and the water supply therein.

e. **Penalty.** Unless otherwise stated in this ordinance, any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a Class C Misdemeanor punishable as according to penalty for Class C Misdemeanor, V.T.C.A., Penal Code, Section 12.23. Each transaction in violation of any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

#### EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall become effective no less than ten days following passage of the ordinance and after publication of the descriptive caption and the penalty section of this ordinance in a local newspaper twice within a ten-day period in accordance with Section 29 of the City Charter. Please be advised the City of Colorado City is now publishing this notice as required by the Local Government Code 52.013. Ordinance 2008 - 09 was approved at the May 13, 2008 City Council Meeting.

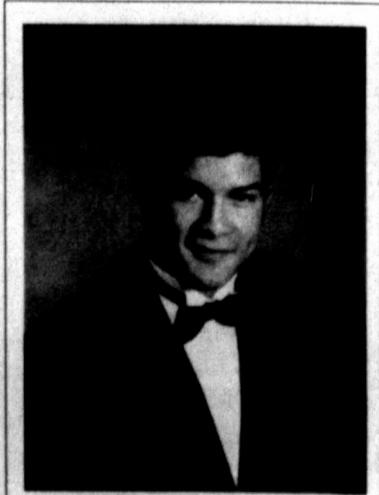

## OLYMPICS TRIALS BOUND Ollison to compete in Olympic Trials Friday

Former Colorado High star athlete Hann Ollison has been drawing a lot of attention here lately. And, he very well should be!

The 2005 graduate of CHS will have a lot of eyes on him once again this Friday when he will be making his first attempt at grabbing a spot on the Olympic track and field team. He will compete at the Olympic Trials being held this weekend on the campus of Rice University in Houston.

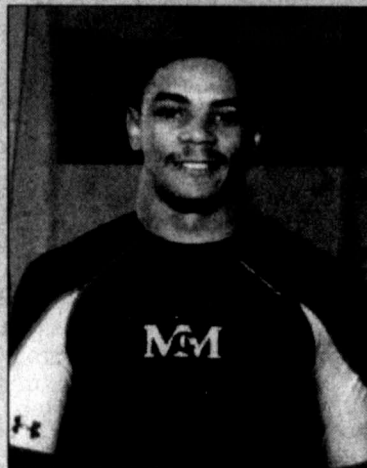
Before this year at McMurry University in Abilene, trying out for the Olympics was the farthest thing from his mind. He had not clocked anything lower than the low 48's in the 400-meter dash, a race that he did not even normally run consistently during his brilliant high school years or at McMurry. He had always shined in the 100 and 200-meter dashes.

His attitude about not being good enough for the Olympic trials took a drastic turn for the better a few weeks ago when he competed in the Abilene Christian University Twilight Meet which is open to anyone and everyone. This meet attracts the best of the best in Division I, II and III, as well as those not affiliated with any college team. His coach, Barbara Crousen, encouraged Ollison to compete in the meet to see how he would stack up against some of the best runners in the United States. Though he did not win the competition in the 400-meter race, he did clock a 46.50 which was his best time ever.

Ollison told his coach after the meet, the race gave him a lot of confidence that he had not had previously.

"I told her after the meet that I had proved to myself that I could be a 400-meter runner," said Ollison. "Before that competition, I had always thought that the 200-meter race was my best race. The runners there really pushed me to dig down deep."

When he competes this Friday, he will have to

dig just a little deeper to qualify, however. He will need to shave another half second off his best time as it will take a 45.95 to reach that threshold. Though that seems like a lot to do, you have to remember that before three weeks ago, his best time in the 400-meter was in the low 48's, and he cut almost two full seconds off that time when he ran a 46.4 in the National Championship meet a week or two ago.

Though he is realistic, he is confident that he can do well and is treating every opportunity as a win-win situation. This is only the first of two opportunities the gifted athlete will have in making the Olympics.

"I didn't even know whether I wanted to attempt to qualify or not when coach Crousen told me about the upcoming trials," said Ollison who is called Mr. DI around the McMurry campus.

"I had pretty much accomplished what I wanted to do this year. I won the indoors and outdoors, and the team won a national championship. And besides that I still have another year of eligibility left here at McMurry.

Don't think, however, that sports are all he is accomplishing at the Division III school. Ollison, who had scholarship offers from schools such as Texas Tech, Abilene Christian, Angelo State, and UT-Arlington, is carrying between a 3.3 and 3.4 GPA while working toward a degree in exercise science and education major. The recent National Championship track meet where he clocked his best time ever with a 46.40 unleashed the confidence he will need going into the Olympic trials.

"After winning the title, I am really hungry for more," said Ollison. "It's also made me a lot more confident in my abilities. I have heard for so many years that there is nobody in our conference. Well, we are the national champions so nobody can say that now."
