Alcorn Says Unrest in the Country Running Far Deeper Than Realized

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur reports on a new phase of unrest in the country, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor: I knew there was unrest in all sections of this nation but I didn't know how deep and how far it had gone until I read a small item in a newspaper last night which a neighbor had wrapped some vegetables in he'd brought me, a favor I'll return if anything ever volunteers to grow in my garden. You can't tell, something might come up on its own.

According to it, a judge in some state, I forget which, fined a lawyer \$100 for being 15 minutes late to court.

This is revolutionary. It strikes at the heart of the whole system of jurisprudence. Everything has exploded this summer.

I had thought that if there was any right imbedded in the American system which was completely beyond challenge and incapable of ever being changed, it was the right of a lawyer to never be ready when court opens.

I had thought that the Constitution itself set forth the fundamental principle of law that the more jurors and the more witnesses cal-

led on a given case and the more time the lawyers had to prepare, the more likely some lawyer is to argue he's not quite ready and the case should be held over till the next term of court or till next Monday at least or if he can't do better till 2:30 this afternoon instead of 9 this morning.

But for a judge to fly in the face of history and fine a lawyer \$100 for being 15 minutes late in arriving at what likely could be a postponement anyway, only indicates how deep-running the feeling of revolt and overthrow of customs has become. Enforced in all the courts of the land, it could help reduce the national debt.

I tell you, if President Kennedy hears this, he'll be back at his desk after his European trip realizing this country is seething with more change than he had suspected.

You can fine a prospective juror if he's not sitting in court and sitting and sitting when the time comes to start a case, but the idea that all the lawyers should be ready is so un-heard-of and so contrary to tradition that it's practically preposterous.

Believe me, I'll be glad when this summer is over and things can level off.

Austin. — Creation of many new lakes in Texas has resulted in a money problem for the State Highway Commission.

Commission Chairman Herb Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs, expounded on the situation when a Nacogdoches delegation headed by Carl Monk and Co. Judge F. L. Harris came to Austin to ask for a farm-to-market road from Nacogdoches to McGee Bend Reservoir, now 59 per cent complete.

Petry said cities and lakes are draining heavily on state road funds. He pointed out that the State Highway Department worked up a plan for access roads to McGee Bend in 1959. That work has been proceeding in cooperation with the surrounding counties. But there was no new Nacogdoches County road in the plan.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer stated that the farm-to-market road law specifically authorizes use of that money for building roads to recreation areas, Petry said some people call these fish-to-market roads.

RED REGISTER — Attorney General Carr is taking steps to force Texas' only known communist to register. But he has not decided where to bring suit.

A 1951 law requires any communist remaining in Texas as long as five days to register with the Department of Public Safety. No one ever has registered.

Two weeks ago, U. S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy notified the man, a resident of San Antonio, to register within 20 days under a Federal registration law, or face prosecution.

Carr picked up the ball and decided to try to make him register under the unused state law, too.

DIVIDEND DECLARED BY CAMPBELL SOUP CO.

Camden, N. J. — The Board of Directors of Campbell Soup Company today declared a quarterly dividend of 55c a share on the company's capital stock, payable July 27, 1963 to stockholders of record at the close of business on July 12, 1963.

Liquor Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. reports that his agents filed 743 cases last month. There were 738 convictions, with 28 jail terms, for violations. Fines came to \$46,172 during the month.

The Lubbock district, mainly dry, was as usual the location of the largest number of cases among 18 enforcement districts.

INSURANCE UP — Recommendations for higher auto insurance rates have been made to the State Board of Insurance, by insurance companies, and the Board's own staff.

Losses under current rates prompt a general statewide increase averaging 8.6 per cent. But there are variations.

Farmers and ranchers, who have chalked up a good non-accident record, will get substantial cuts. They will range from 20 to 30 per cent, in various parts of the state.

City drivers will face higher rates for their public liability insurance. Statistics show that where there are more cars there are more accidents.

State is divided into 26 rating territories. Drivers living in safer areas will pay less for their insurance.

Board will announce its decision soon, and new rates will take effect on August 1.

SEWER AID — State Health Department has compiled a list of 37 cities awaiting word that Congress has appropriated money to continue the federal-aid program for construction of sewage treatment facilities.

These cities have applied for \$4,067,626 worth of grants to help them build \$15,980,384 worth of projects.

Approximately 200 horses, many bearing two riders, were in the parade at 4 p. m. Thursday to get Bogata's annual rodeo underway.

Following the car at the head of the parade, was Depot's new fire truck, driven by Kenneth Burks. Bogata School Band followed the truck. A gay, flower-decked float bearing Miss Linda Screws, rodeo queen, and runners-up in the contest for queen, Misses Dereca Jo Choate, Barbara Baird and Elise Walker, was next.

Miss Nancy Bell, another contestant in the queen contest, performed with the band and did not ride the float with the other lovely girls in evening gowns.

The contest was sponsored by M and M Florist and the float was their handiwork.

Jessie Gray and L. R. (Hoopie) Randolph were Bogata standard bearers. They were trailed by riders of the Red River Junior Horse Club of Clarksville, with a member bearing their standard.

Members of Mt. Vernon Riding Club were also present and riding under their own flag. Sheriff Slim Hulen of Clarksville, was the last rider in the long parade of horseman. Also featured in the parade was new farm equipment.

An estimated 6,000 people attended the rodeo. One of the interesting features of the show this year—and a new one—was the crowning of a Queen. Miss Linda Screws was crowned Bogata Rodeo Queen by Pleas Turner, member of Bogata Chamber of Commerce, in ceremonies in the arena Friday night.

Miss Screws won the title in a contest sponsored by M and M Florist. Gene Dumas of Magnolia, Ark., and "Wild Willie" from Dallas, were names of the clowns whose antics distracted the bulls, giving cowboys thrown by the animals, time to get out of the arena.

Dumas did a splendid job under a great handicap. He had a broken leg suffered prior to the Bogata show.

Bill and Roy Duvall, brothers, brought the two horses here from Coalgate, Ok., show, arriving at Bogata about 3 a. m. Thursday. After penning the horses in a rope corral at the arena, they left for Mt. Pleasant to spend remaining hours of the night. A couple of hours later, illness of the animals was discovered and a veterinarian summoned.

Despite his efforts one of the fine animals died. It was later disclosed that the Duvalis had no insurance on the dead horse which they owned and had ridden in dogging contests last year, winning more than \$6,000 in prize money. The second animal, a mare, survived the illness. Leased by the Duvalis, she was insured for \$4,000. Riding strange horses, the cowboys took second and sixth places in the dogging.

Changes In Sales Tax On July 1

Changes in state sales tax took effect Monday. That is good news for diabetics, news paper readers, farmers, coffee stand operators, churches, and the state treasury.

Noticeable changes will be for clothing buyers. There will be no exemption on outer wearing apparel costing less than \$10.

Another change will tax autos at 2 per cent of the trading difference instead of 1.5 per cent on the sale price.

Druggists will have one of their big worries removed by the revision: Collecting the tax on insulin from diabetics.

Newspaper subscribers won't have to search for pennies when it's collection time—subscription rates will not be taxed.

Coffee shops will have to pay only the taxes they collect if more than half of their sales are 24 cents or less.

Meals sold by schools during school days and dinners sold by a church at a church function are non-taxable.

Farmers must sign a certificate indicating that machinery will be used for agriculture in order to get exempt from tax. Farmers will not have to pay a tax on herbicides, defoliants and dessicants, items formerly taxable.

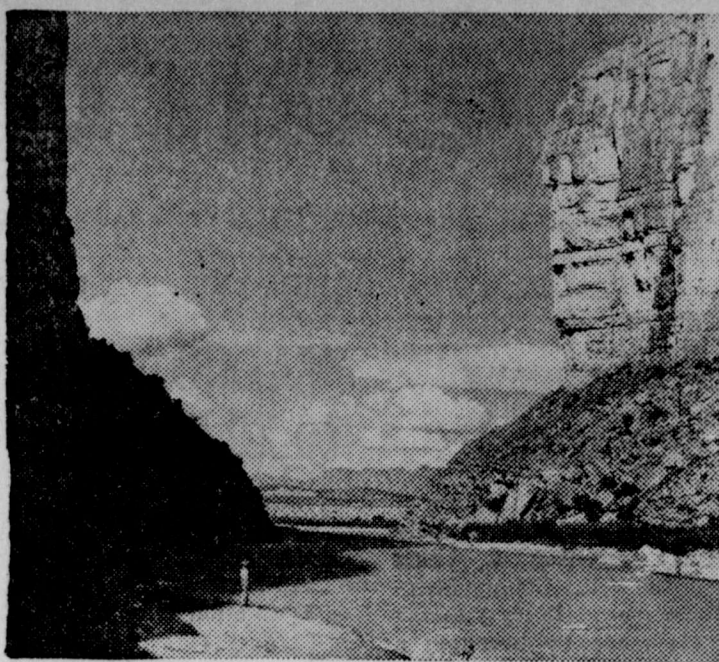

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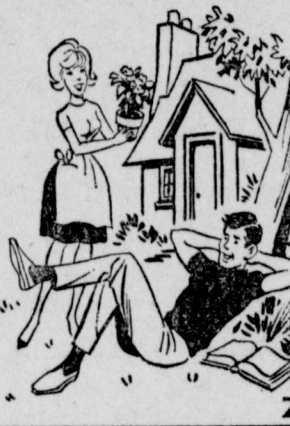

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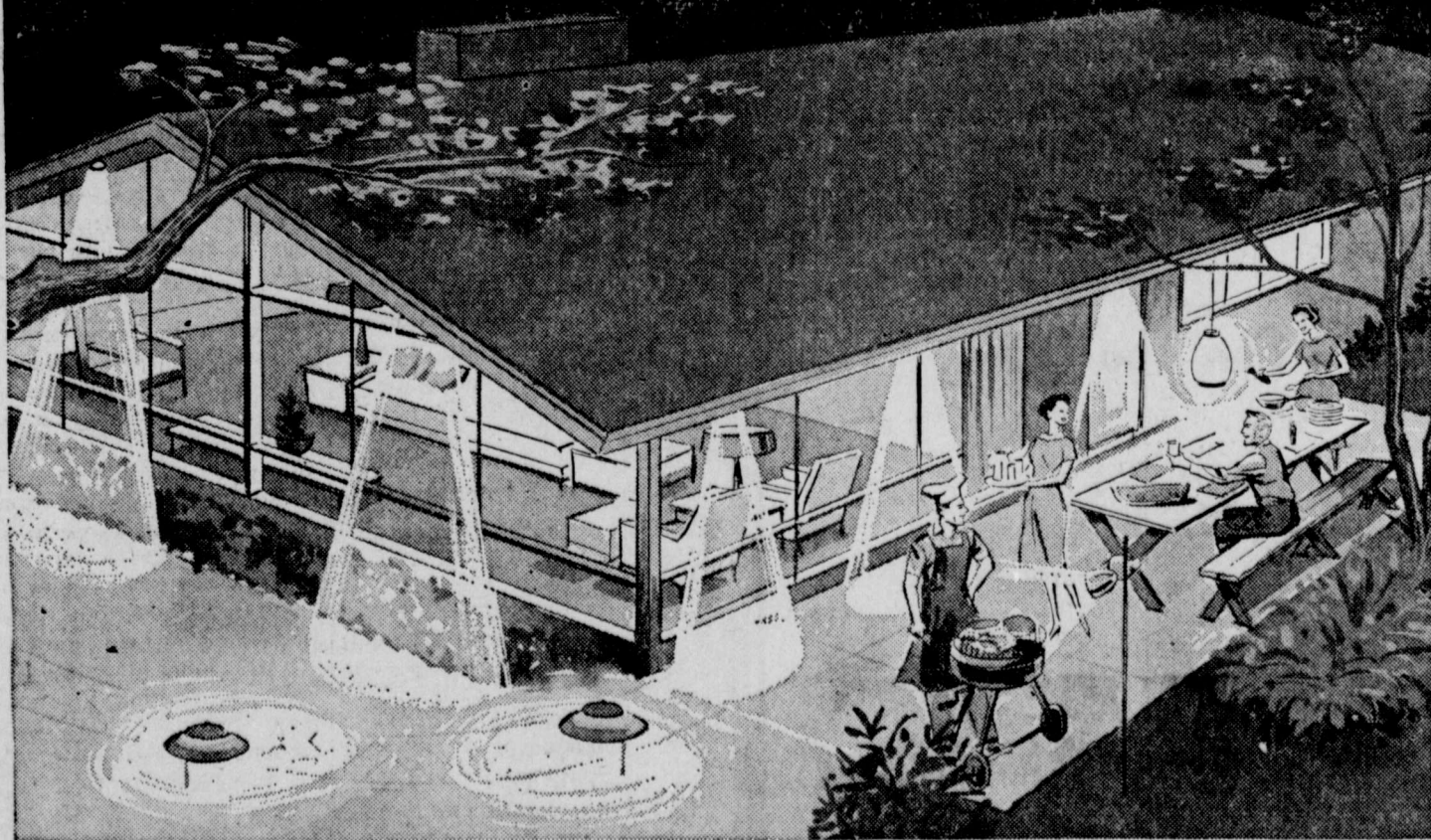
