Appellate Court Rules Beer Election Was Legal

Wheat Yield Estimates In County Area Vary

COUNTY YIELD ESTIMATES ON UPWARD TREND

Generally Everyone is Optimistic Over Prospects for Best Crop in Years

Harvest Will Be Late

Late Wheat Matures, Harvest Will Probably Extend Into Early Part of August

Opinions as to the outcome of the wheat crop in the Perryton trade are divided, and estimates on a yield are from one to three million bushels. In some instances, the wheat suffered greatly from the drought, but has taken on with the recent rains it is a between weeds and wheat. The weeds are in abundance some farmers are planning to cut with later after the weeds have been cut the wheat will be threshed. If the wheat is taller, but infested with weeds they will bind. In most instances the earlier planted wheat, which was not blighted by lack of water, is not suffering from weeds. It is heading out nicely. Much of it is from eighteen to twenty-four inches high, while the wheat which is heading down during the dry spell, coming up later from the roots, will average round ten inches. Much of it is heading out and if cool weather prevails it is estimated it will fill out and make a fair yield.

T. Stovall, county agent, estimates that 300,000 acres are planted in wheat in Ochiltree county and at one-half of this is old wheat, wheat which did not die down from lack of moisture. This 150,000 acres of wheat will average eight to ten bushels to an acre, Mr. Stovall believes. This alone would be approximately one and one-half million bushels, with one-half million acres of wheat yet to be harvested. "Some of the old wheat will average as low as three or four bushels to the acre, and some as much as twenty estimate," Mr. Stovall said.

As to the wheat which has succumbed since the rains, Mr. Stovall says this is yet undeveloped, but with continued favorable growing weather should make a fair crop. A small percentage of the wheat is being plowed up, according to Mr. Stovall. "Opinions are so varied that one does not know just what to expect," said J. H. Woodward, manager of the Perryton Equity Exchange. There are lots of activity around the Perryton Equity though, and operations are going right ahead for harvest. A general repair program is underway and new scales, (continued on back page)

DROUTH LOANS NOW AVAILABLE

Crop loans from the Emergency Crop Loan section of the Farm Credit Administration for the 1937 crop are now available, so states Miss Pauline Spencer, manager of the Ochiltree county office. Miss Spencer, who has had charge of this work for the past three years, started accepting applications for loans on June 15 and will continue until August 31.

The limit to the individual on these emergency loans, called by some "summer fallow loans," will be \$400 and a first mortgage will be required on the prospective wheat crop.

Contouring Dead Line

July 1 is the Date Set by Federal Government When Farmers Must Have Work Completed

Farmers who plan to qualify their land for No. 1 diversion payments by contour furrowing have until July 1 to complete this work, according to J. T. Stovall, county agent.

In most instances where farmers over the county have planned to contour furrow in connection with the government's program, it has already been done, or lines have been run. In some cases farmers have not been able to get into the fields due to recent rains. If a farmer is unable to contour furrow by the dead line date, his land may be qualified by some other method specified by the Federal Government.

HOPPER POISON BEING ISSUED

SUPPLY EXHAUSTED TODAY; ASK FOR FOUR TONS MORE; ONE-HALF OF COUNTY IS INFESTED

The ton of poison mash, supplied by the Federal Government and supplemented by 100 sacks of bran purchased by Ochiltree county, is being exhausted tonight, J. T. Stovall, county agent, says. The mash which is supplied to farmers at a cost to them of \$1.00 per hundred pounds is being used to poison grasshoppers. Mr. Stovall began issuing the mash to farmers Tuesday and by Wednesday evening one-half of the supply was in the hands of farmers. The mash is mixed and distributed from the old laundry building on South Main Street.

According to Mr. Stovall the ton of poison mash issued to Ochiltree county will not care for more than 20 per cent of the needs. A request has been made to the government for an additional four tons. The poison is being supplied out of the million dollar emergency fund recently appropriated.

The south one-half of the county is badly infested with the hoppers, says Mr. Stovall, and undoubtedly they will move into other sections unless drastic steps are taken. Fields bordering grass land are being badly damaged.

It is advised that farmers put out poison at once, as the hoppers are still small and have not in most instances left the section where they were hatched. As they become larger they will scatter over a wider area.

MANY APPLICATIONS FOR SUPERINTENDENCY OF PERRYTON SCHOOLS TO SUCCEED W. B. IRVIN

There has been much speculation in this community during the past weeks as to who will succeed W. B. Irvin as superintendent of the schools of the Perryton Independent School District. Mr. Irvin resigned as head of the local school system after twelve years of service, accepting the superintendency of the Lubbock schools at a big increase in salary.

It is understood that it is the intention of the board of trustees of the Perryton schools to make a definite decision regarding a new superintendent at a meeting of the board to be held tomorrow, Friday. With over thirty-five applicants for the position, the field has narrowed down to consideration of only two or three.

WILDCAT WELL AT 2,700 DEPTH

DRILLING SHUT DOWN NOW TO DRILL THIRD WATER WELL FOR MAINTAINING REGULAR DRILLING

Drilling operations on the Norris wildcat test in the southeast part of the county are at a standstill while the crew is sinking a third big water well to provide additional water for the rotary machine.

W. R. Norris, owner of the land on which the test well is located, states that it takes a young river to provide enough water for the drilling. The well is now down 2,700 feet and the engineers are pleased with the logging of the formation.

Kimmel Depends on Farmers To Recommend Farm Setup

Amarillo, Texas, June 15—Roy L. Kimmel, recently appointed coordinator for the several federal agencies serving the Great Plains "dust bowl," and who will have charge of all departmental activities in the wind erosion area in the five-state region is "depending largely on farmers to recommend a definitely constructive program to solve their present problems."

"No matter what programs may be designed to correct conditions in this problem area and to establish a permanent, and insofar as possible, a drought-proof type of agriculture," Mr. Kimmel said, "the country may be assured that we will be guided very largely by those men who live on the soil."

Mr. Kimmel said he will look to the general and special farm organizations in this area whose experience and advice will be invaluable in developing a coordinated conservation program.

COUNTY ATTORNEY FLOWERS ORDERS BEER DEALERS TO CEASE ALL SALES IN OCHILTREE COUNTY

Civil Court of Appeals at Amarillo Reverses Decision of Judge Pickens on Beer Election Contest Suit; Validates Election

BEER WAS VOTED OUT BY 107 MAJORITY

The "beer repeal" election of March 28, in which the voters of Ochiltree county, by a majority of 107, registered "thumbs down" on the sale of beer, was declared legal and valid by the Court of Civil Appeals of the 7th Supreme Judicial District, in an opinion rendered Monday. This decision reversed the decision made by Judge E. J. Pickens of the Ochiltree District Court, in the contest suit of Shearer vs. Ochiltree County, on April 27. County Attorney Oscar Flowers served notice on all beer dealers in the county Tuesday afternoon that they were operating illegally but that he would let them continue until Wednesday at midnight in order to dispose of stocks, and that if any sales were made after midnight Wednesday, he would file charges against them.

The county attorney, on Wednesday afternoon, announced that he would not force the beer dealers to cease sales until April 29, the expiration of the 15 day period from the day of the appellate courts decision, in which the court can receive an application for a rehearing. However, if the court rules against the rehearing before April 29, the closing order will be enforced immediately. Since the sale of beer was made legal in Texas, three elections on the question have been held in this county. In the first two elections, the sale of beer was legalized by a slight majority. In the election of March 20, the vote was 420 against the sale, and 313 for. Only two precincts in the county voted in favor of beer sales. Notia approving by a vote of 10-7, and Farnsworth by a vote of 8-6.

Complete Work Sheets

Approximately 370,000 Acres Covered; Most of Cultivated Land Contracted

Work sheets, showing individual farmers intentions to comply with the Government soil conservation program are being completed on Ochiltree county land this week by the county agent's office.

Approximately 370,000 acres of land are covered in the work sheets, four and one-half per cent of this is designated as idle land. An average of \$7.00 per acre will be paid to farmers of this section on 15 per cent of their base acreage where they comply with the program.

More than 99 per cent of the total cultivated land in Ochiltree county is under contract.

Amarillo Man Will Speak on Street in Perryton, Saturday, June 19, at Two o'Clock

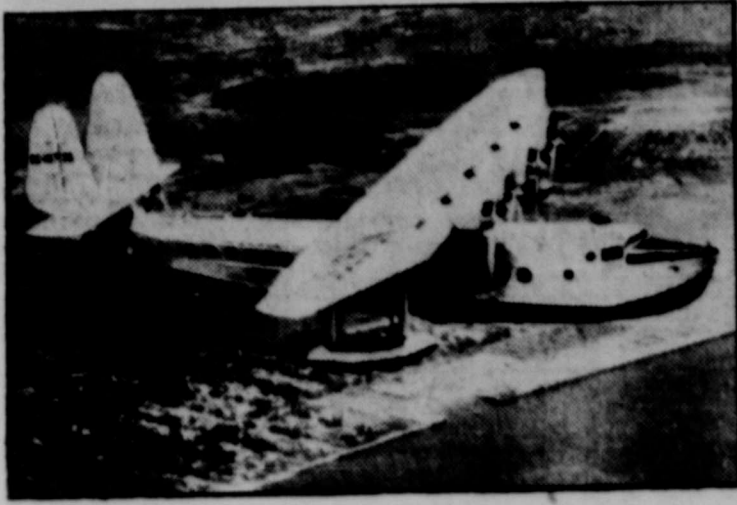

Field seeds of unknown origin are not dependable. Use seeds of known hardness.

Texas farmers will do well to buy whenever possible, seeds bearing similar state certified or state registered tag. The tag means that state representatives have visited the seed producer's plant, that they certify to the purity of the variety, the producer must fulfill strict requirements to insure the purity of the strain.

Texas now certifies several varieties of cotton, corn, grain sorghum, wheat, oats, and Irish potatoes. The plan used by many farmers is to buy enough certified seed to plant their entire acreage with the same. When reasonable precautions are observed to prevent cross fertilization and mixing, such a plan usually worth while, and the only expense is the annual purchase of small amount of seed.

The state certified tag means that the seed is true to variety and free from noxious weed seed. It should not be accepted as a recommendation of the variety representative. Farmers should plant only varieties of field seed known to be adapted to their section. This is specially true of legumes, which are particularly as to their soil and climatic requirements. County agricultural agents can recommend building crops which will yield the utmost return in soil improvement.

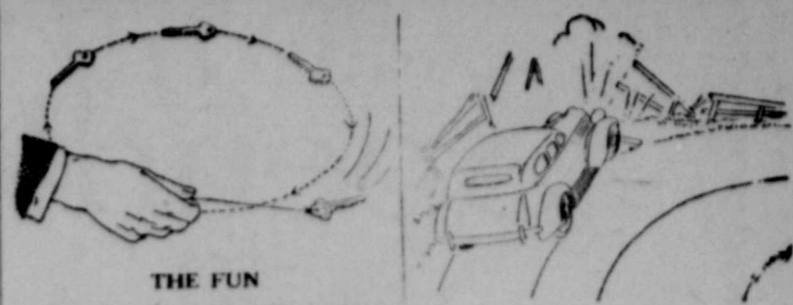

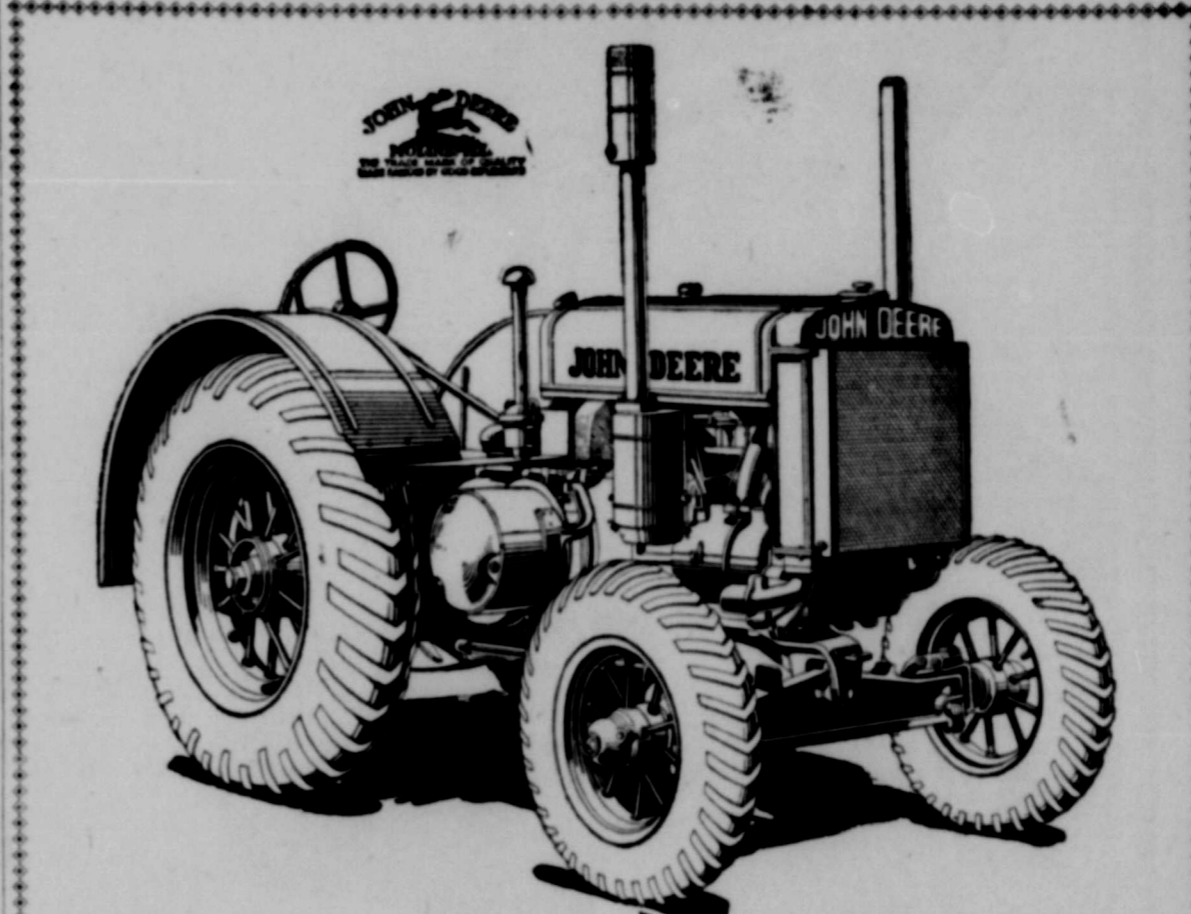


THE FUN

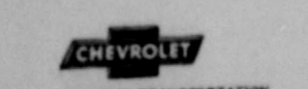

HOME HINTS

Potato chips keep better in bags that prevent strong light from reaching them than in clear or opaque waxed paper bags. A tight tin container is equally good. Potato chips kept in a cold place will stay fresh for a long time.

The spread for the summer picnic sandwiches may be made to enrich the lunch in vitamin C if grated or finely ground raw vegetables such as carrots, cabbage parsley, or spinach are mixed with creamed butter for the filling.

The most important secrets of success in deep-fat frying are: Using the right kind of fat; heating the fat to the right temperature and keeping it just hot enough during the frying; preparing the food properly before frying, especially drying it somewhat.

The best way to prevent cream of tomato soup from curdling is to thicken the tomato juice and add it to the cold milk. Soda should not be used to neutralize the acid in the tomato juice as it tends to destroy the vitamin content of the tomatoes.

For a good meringue allow 3 egg whites to a pie and 2 level tablespoons of sugar to each egg white, a few grains of salt, and a few drops of vanilla. Beat the whites until they are stiff but not dry, adding the sugar when they look glossy. Continue beating until the whites are stiff enough to stand in peaks. Spread the meringue over the top of the pie filling to the edge of the crust. Bake 15 to 20 minutes in a very moderate oven (325) until delicately browned.

ANVIL PARK RODEO JULY 2-3-5

PANHANDLE'S BIGGEST AND BEST RODEO WILL BE HELD AT ANVIL PARK RANCH NEAR CANADIAN

Canadian, Tex., June 17—There'll be very little night and a great deal of daytime when the Panhandle's biggest and best rodeo swings into motion July 2. A year of pent-up enthusiasm will be turned loose in Canadian.

The bulldogging steers and part of the Brahma riding steers to be used this year have never been in a rodeo arena, and are guaranteed to be plenty wild.

Calves for the roping contest are part Brahma and the cowboys will have to have a race horse to catch them, as they start out across the arena like a scared jack rabbit.

The world famous rodeo clown, Virgil Stapp, well known to Anvil Park Rodeo crowds, will provide the comedy in front of the grandstands.

With the grounds in first-class condition and bucking chutes well greased, all is set for the starting gun. 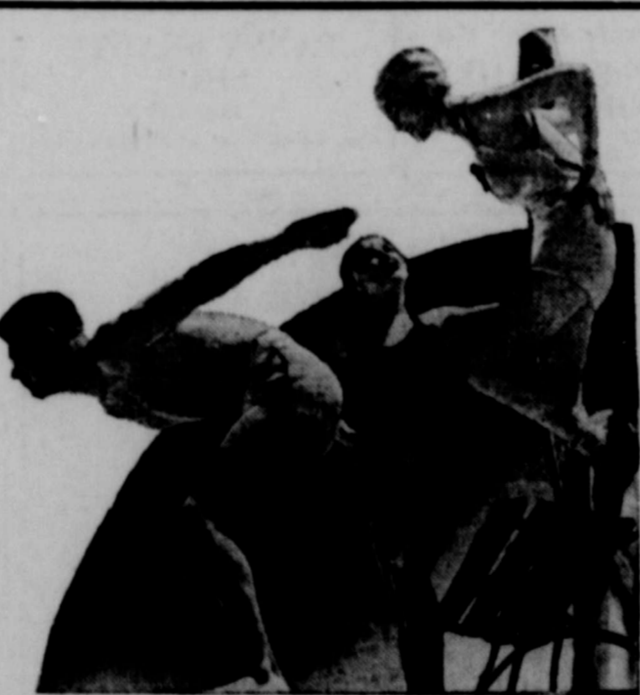

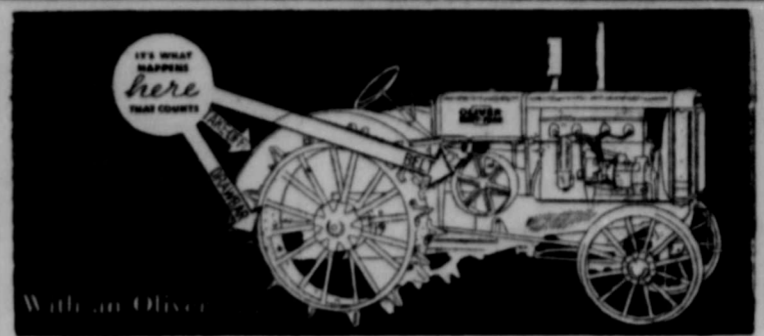

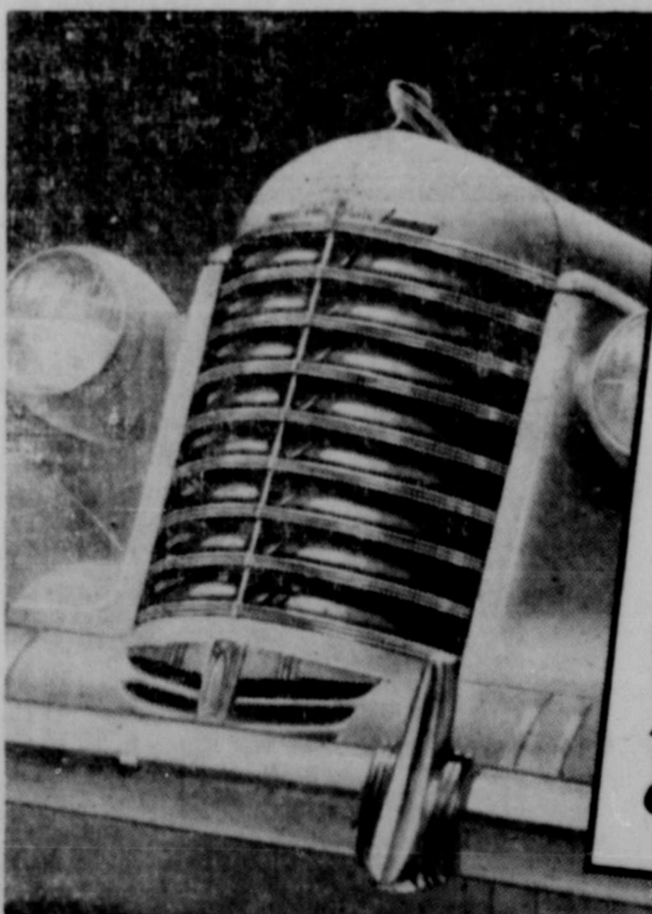

TVA Plan for the Nation Envisions Ambitious Program of New Deal

OUT of the New Deal's experiment with the TVA in the south has come a presidential proposal for a series of seven identical "authorities" which would control the great river valleys of the nation from coast to coast. Therein lies one of the most ambitious projects of the administration.

Conservation of natural resources, development of navigation, flood control and electric power throughout the country are the chief aims of this program. They are, of course, the vehicle for the President's general power policy which holds "that the waterpower resources of the nation must be protected from private monopoly and used for the benefit of the people."

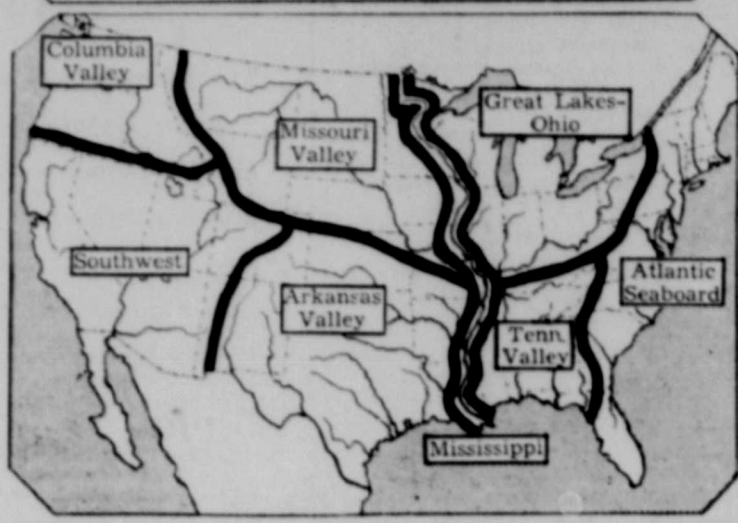
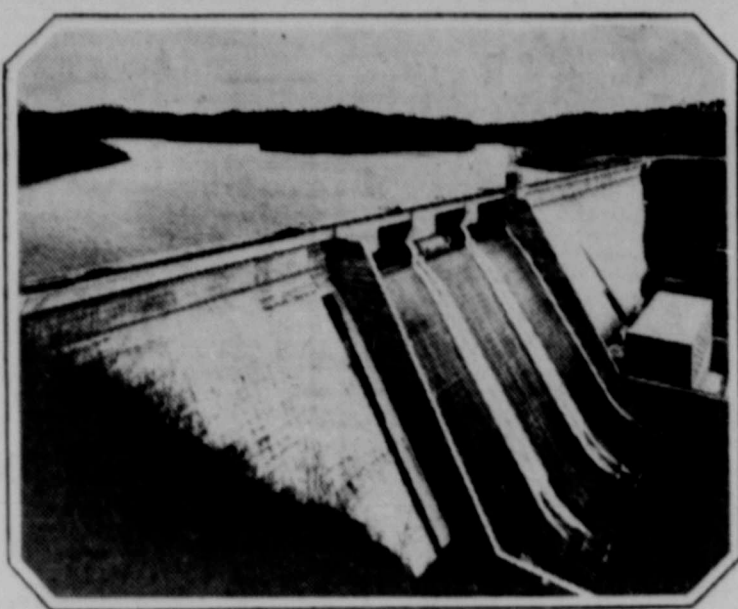
Under bills now before Congress, introduced by Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska, the country would be divided into seven major regions to initiate this program and an eighth, the Mississippi valley, would be administered as at present by the Mississippi river commission.

STARTING in the east, this would be the picture, as the map would be divided to attain the aims of the program:

- 1—An Atlantic seaboard authority, covering the drainage basins of all rivers flowing into the Atlantic from the east.
- 2—A Great Lakes-Ohio valley authority.
- 3—The Tennessee valley authority, expanded to cover territory south to the Gulf coast.
- 4—The Missouri valley authority, sweeping far into the west.
- 5—The Arkansas valley authority and down to Rio Grande.
- 6—The Southwest authority for the Great basin and the lower Pacific coast.
- 7—The Columbia valley authority.
- 8—The Mississippi valley authority, dealing with the channel itself.

The time has come, the President points out, "when we must act . . . if we would preserve for ourselves and our posterity the natural resources of a virile national life." Accordingly, he urges the setting up of these regional authorities, suggesting that they first make surveys of the needs of the nation and then formulate definite programs.

Thus, over a long term, the country would arm itself against

dust storms, floods, droughts and at the same time develop navigation and huge power resources across the continent.

IT is this question of power which will doubtless come to the front first in the program. It is the New Deal doctrine that the lowest possible rates to the ultimate consumer, especially to the farmer on the farm and in the home, will give electrical industries the biggest boom in history. At the same time, power companies see in this program a threat to their profits and expansion.

The TVA, of course, is already in the power business. Here will be formulated the yardstick for this type of experiment. And if it works, then the nation may eventually see the plan carried to every state providing present bills are enacted.

The whole picture then, as yet indefinite and extremely flexible as to detail, envisions a nation ultimately secure as to its vast natural resources; a nation which utilizes its power possibilities to the fullest and substitutes long term national planning for past policies.

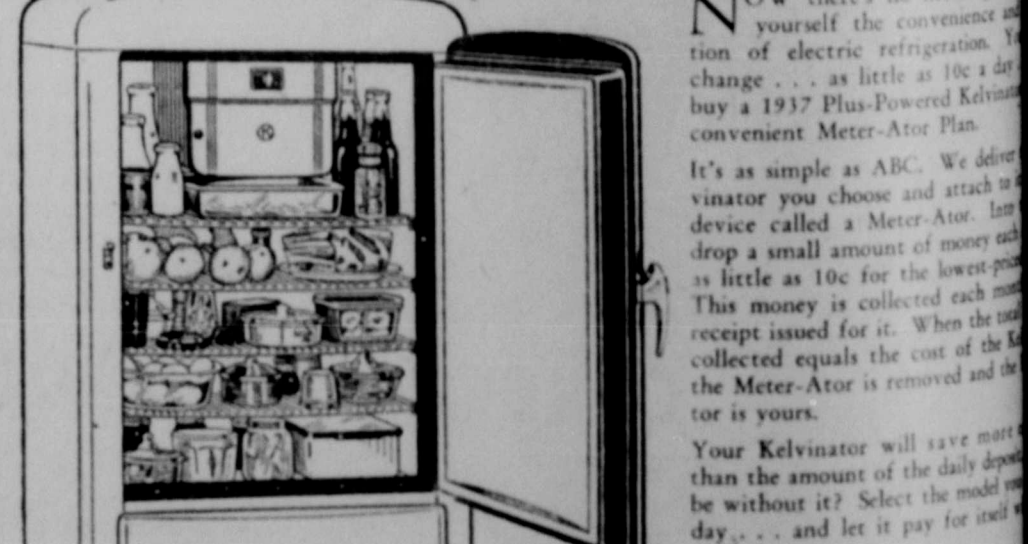

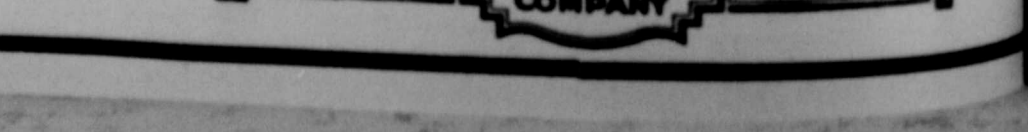

Builds Greenhouse

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Sam Hergert's estimate for wheat harvest for the Perryton trade area is 1,200,000 bushels. Mr. Hergert believes this is a fair estimate, taking into consideration some good fields and some bad.

"I have 120 acres in Beaver county, six miles north of Gray which I believe will make fifteen bu to the acre," Mr. Hergert said.

On the B. B. Kent land ten miles east of Perryton an average of twelve bushels will be made, Mr. Hergert estimated. This field comprises 320 acres, and another of approximately the same acreage located eight miles west will average seven bushels Mr. Hergert thinks.

A. J. Kelly says: "I consider prospects over Ochiltree and Lipscomb county good."

Mr. Kelly has 530 acres of wheat in Beaver county which he estimates will make ten bushels to the acre. This land is located eleven miles north of Perryton.

Wheat harvest is expected to start this month, but will probably not be in full swing until July and will likely continue on through August if the younger wheat matures and ripens as many anticipate. One grain dealer says he expects to be buying wheat in September. M. H. Crum of the Twichell community will probably be one of the first in this section to harvest as he is planning on putting combines into his field the latter part of this week or the first of next.

Mr. Kimmel will devote his attention to the special problems in the 103 counties of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas and New Mexico. The area over which he will work totals 90,779,555 acres, and involves farm lands aggregating 70,927,420 acres.

Already at work: Mr. Kimmel last week met with agricultural leaders in Colorado. This week he is to attend a similar meeting in Oklahoma City. In the week of June 21 he will meet with the Southern Great Plains Advisory Committee on land use practices.

Mr. Kimmel is a native of New Mexico, and has spent many years in various parts of the Plains region. He is a graduate of Colorado College, with a master's degree from Yale. For four years he was assistant director of the School of Public Affairs at Princeton. In 1935 he joined the Resettlement Administration to serve as assistant to Dr. W. W. Alexander. Early in 1936 he was assigned to organize the Southwest Great Plains region for the Resettlement Administration and remained to head the rehabilitation program for the area. He has served as a member of the Southern Great Plains Advisory Committee on land use practices, which has done a great deal of work in coordinating the efforts of federal and state agricultural agencies and in developing the beginnings of a sound land use program for this area.

Secretary Wallace's appointment of a coordinator to head the various conservation programs in the "dust bowl" area was in direct line with the desires of several farmer's mass meetings in recent months, the last and largest of which was held last month in Amarillo. It was at that meeting that farmers, business men, bankers, ranchers and industrialists praised work of the various federal agencies now working on the "dust bowl" problems, but petitioned the Secretary of Agriculture to appoint a coordinator for the purpose of combining the efforts of all agencies.
