Body found in Scurry County



LAKE CLOSED — Lake J B Thomas, close to Snyder, was closed this week as law enforcement agents search for skeletal remains and evidence after a body was found Saturday.

Going into the fourth day of the investigation in Snyder revolving around a decomposed body, little has changed. Skeletal remains were found near Lake Thomas, south of Snyder Saturday. Forensic specialists from the FBI were still on the scene Tuesday, recovering as much of the remains, which had been scattered — most likely — by wildlife, as possible.

The area in which the remains were found makes it tough for law enforcement to search, as the terrain is mostly brush and cactus. Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman, Senior Trooper Sparky Dean said it is likely the age and sex of the remains could be elusive for some time.

"They are going to send the remains either to Lubbock or Fort Worth for investigation," Dean said. "It could be some time before we have answers to some of the questions. They are treating this area like a crime scene at this point, while they attempt to recover as much of the remains, and any possible evidence, as they can."

Meanwhile, in Colorado City,

speculation and rumors have been spreading, as they did a year ago when a body was found in Big Spring. Nancy Grace has not called, not just yet, but the inevitable television crews have already arrived, further inciting the speculation by shoving microphones in the faces of the populace and asking, "Do you think it's Hailey Dunn?"

Social media sites and even the *Record's* e-mail box have been inundated with requests for the information we must be keeping from the public, when the simple fact remains, there are very few facts in this case, and there is not a single one of them at this point which points to the missing Colorado City cheerleader.

All that is known at this time is that skeletal remains have been found in Scurry County, forensic teams are searching the area for more pieces and any possible evidence and they intend to send the remains — once they are satisfied they have found all they can — to either Fort Worth or Lubbock. Unfortunately, that is all which is known at this point.

County to create new taxing district

Following a 42-minute executive session to discuss economic development at the Mitchell County Commissioners Court Monday, the court reconvened in open session and bestowed special powers on County Judge Ray Mayo.

The court authorized Mayo to publish a notice of a proposed

creation of a special taxing district for the 220 acres of land owned by Mitchell County west of Colorado City. The land sits across I-20 from the Wallace/Ware units.

The land was purchased as an incentive back when the prisons were built by the state and then returned to the county several

years ago, according to Judge Mayo.

"We have several developers looking at that section of land right now," he said. "While we may not be decided if we are going to actually create the taxing district, we know if we do not start now, we won't be able to

Railhead Trade Days excite local economy

While many in Colorado City may have heard the sound of a passing train more times than they care to remember, it is becoming increasingly clear that none of the city's youth will ever grow tired of riding the Mitchell County Choo-Choo, as they were given another opportunity to do that very thing this past weekend at the Railhead Trade Days. 'Round and 'round the

blocks of C-City the train went, as the smiles broadened on the children's faces and the spirit of community returned in the hearts of area adults.

Approximately 40 vendors and food merchants were treated to a steady crowd — at times comprised of as many as 350 people — at this year's event, as residents of the county, as well as visitors from all over, perused through

the offerings which filled the Railhead Building, and spilled out onto the street behind it. Turkey legs, wrapped in foil; barbecued brisket on a bun; as well as almost anything imaginable was available for even the most discerning devourer of properly prepared meat products.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Amanda Jo Ritchey said the Chamber estimated that as many

as 1,000-1,100 people came to the event this year.

"Overall, it was a great success," she said. "Sunday was one of our lower Sundays, but that was a result of several vendors selling out their entire stock on Saturday and not coming back."

Booths featuring wooden crosses, sports memorabilia and even some very old rocks were at the event, making it a virtual

cornucopia of must-have items, all the while garnished with a swap meet brand of the bartering system. If it was marked for \$10, chances were good you could purchase two for \$18 or possibly even three for \$25.

Jewelry adorned many a booth, as discerning shoppers with a heart for art and an eye for a bargain waded into the of

later." The court also authorized Mayo to work with the state legislature for the creation of that local district. The new tax district would allow the developer, if a deal was struck with one, to collect taxes identical to the hotel/motel tax Colorado City can collect inside the city

limits. In other business, the court approved the county's net payroll of \$66,759.85. Commissioner Bill Preston made the motion to approve the payroll, while Commissioner Jeremy Strain made the second on the motion. It passed unanimously with all commissioners present.

FROM THE CITY MANAGER'S DESK

City manager seeks to keep residents informed

Open conversation is the best way to clarify issues and create harmony in a civilized society. Seeking common goals and interests together with truthful statement of facts should result in unity of purpose. What we say must be based on facts or at least best information available at that time. That is why I am writing. It is our desire at the City of Colorado City to keep the residents well informed of the activities and plans we have for our community. I hope to have time to submit an article to the *Record* on a weekly basis so that you will know at least some of what is taking place in town. Our hope is to allay some fears and debunk some half-truths by disseminating the facts and info we have. Please bear in mind that we are human just like you and will sometimes make statements that are not reflective of our studied opinions.

Today I would like to talk about water. Right now we are in a good position with potable water. Our well

fields are holding up and plans are being made to drill additional wells to increase our production and facilitate the growth that is predicted for our city. Plans are also being made for the installation of a new water tower at the end of Austin Street north of I-20. These actions will provide sufficient water for the predicted influx of oilfield related workers on a mid-term basis. While it is true that our aquifer will probably decline rapidly as the oilfield pulls more water for the production of new oil wells, it is the only source available to Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook at this time. Plans are being made to alleviate the pressure on the Upper Dockum aquifer and should help to slow the decline of that natural resource.

Some of the planned projects are: selling the effluent water from our sewer treatment ponds (potentially one million gallons per day) to be used as frack water, desalination of the Lower Dockum Aquifer which is getting close to operational status in some spots (exact potential unknown but has huge possibilities) and

a promising fresh water project being proposed by V V Water Co. of Beeville which would bring large amounts of water from Val Verde County via pipelines to all of the Permian Basin. These three projects offer longer term provision for the water needed to keep our city and county on a course for growth.

The VV Water Co. pipeline would be a great solution in my opinion. Bringing water up from below Sonora will be costly. I believe Dr. Littlejohn said somewhere around eight hundred million dollars, that's \$800,000,000.00. It will take a joint effort from all the communities around us to make this happen. It will also take about four years to complete the 48 inch pipeline and get it to our faucets. Until that happens, we must pursue what is available to us now. That includes conserving water, recycling water and treating brackish water.

In the meantime, we can pray for rain to fill our lakes once again and pump what we can out of the ground.

PanSTARRS lights up night

Look, up in the sky; it's a bird, a plane, no, it's the comet PanSTARRS making an appearance for those willing to brave the beautiful weather Friday and Saturday night at Ruddick Park.

The first-ever comet watching party in Colorado City, hosted by Orand Carroll of Big Spring, with refreshments served by the Colorado City Kiwanians, was a wondrous success.

As the sun began to sink low in the western sky, seemingly merging its orange glow with that of the Wallace/Ware units, a faint, but enchanting light began to appear just over the horizon.

"I think I found it," Christina Griffin said to Carroll and those scanning the sky for the first

glimpse of the quick (144,000 miles per hour) comet. "Right there, is that it?"

It was indeed "it" and everyone then adjusted their binoculars to the area, as Carroll adjusted the telescopes for viewing by those in attendance.

Carroll began the evening before the sun set, by talking with the crowd, entertaining and informing them with the particulars of the PanSTARRS comet. He answered questions from those wanting to learn more and invited everyone to ask more. He had scheduled the event to share with the city something he cared about, something bigger than himself and those making an appearance. He succeeded.

After the brief period when the comet was viewable, Carroll

walked the crowd, asking everyone if they had seen it yet, and offering to help them find it if they had not.

For those who did not make it out to the event, another, much better opportunity will present itself in late November, early December of 2013. Carroll said he plans to return to Colorado City for what he described as the "greatest event" the world has ever seen in the sky.

The ISON comet is expected to surpass even the Hale-Bopp comet in the 1990's, with a tail which should stretch across a quarter of the sky, and should even be visible with the naked eye during the day.

"I wouldn't miss that one," Carroll said. "It is going to be exceptional."

Rob Junell: mountain climbing judge

Robert Junell of Midland is a federal district judge who likes to climb mountains. "I rode in rodeos for a while, then played polo for a number of years and thought I needed to retire from that, so mountain climbing was good third thing to go to."

His first two years of college were at New Mexico Military Institute. While there he got used to going over to Ruidoso to ski and hike. "I spent three years in Germany during my military years and was in the mountains quite a lot. I got my discharge in Europe and my wife and I went skiing and hiking in Switzerland."

He is still a serious skier and does ski patrol duty on winter weekends and holidays at Ruidoso's Ski Apache. "It's good to be in the mountain air. It clears your head and mind. Besides that, we're just going to be here once so why don't we grab on to all that we can. It's also a good reason to stay in shape not just for your doctor so he can brag on you, but for yourself so you can do more things. I'm goal-oriented, so having a mountain climb is a suitable goal and gives me a reason to get up early, go to the Y and work out."

The judge has climbed high mountains in Nepal, Argentina, Ecuador, Bolivia, Russia and other countries, including Kilimanjaro in Africa (19,000 feet). He climbed the highest mountain in America, 20,000 feet Mount McKinley in Alaska's Denali National Park. His main pastime is climbing Guadalupe Peak here in Texas. At an altitude of 8,700 feet, it is a thousand feet higher than the average Alp. "It's the highest point in Texas and is a great place to go for training, especially, going up and down carrying a big pack. You meet interesting people from all over the United States and beyond trying to climb high points in all the different states."

The first time he climbed it was in the fall of 2004. "I was in Pecos for court and the case fell through. I had my stuff with me and had been wanting to go, so I drove over there, about an hour and a half from Pecos. I got on the trail, ran into some fellow hikers and it seemed like it took me forever to reach the top. After getting up there, I was ready to get on an escalator to bring me back down. It does get easier. I've climbed it more than 120 times. Last year when I climbed it for the 100th time, the park rangers had a little ceremony and presented me with a plaque."

He usually makes the climb and the round trip to Guadalupe from his home in Midland in one day. "From Midland to Guadalupe Mountains National Park is a three hour drive. There are five stop lights between my house and there and four of them are in the city of Midland. The other one is in Kermit. So it's very accessible. Most of the times I go by myself. I leave at 5 or 6 in the morning, depending on what season it is. I drive over, climb the peak and I'm back by 6 or 7 in the evening."

He can climb it fast. His slowest time is 4 hours and 45 minutes. "The fastest I've done it is one hour and fifty-nine minutes. It's 4.1 miles with a 3,000 feet elevation change. I've been told that an ultra marathoner ran up the mountain in 58 minutes."

I visited with the park host, Monica Cotter, who receives her RV site and a 20-hour work week from the City of Mason. She greets the campers, gets them settled in, and performs some maintenance work at the park.

I noticed the park's campsites were

almost completely taken. I asked her if most of the campers were workers, and she pointed to a row of sites along the backside of the park where transitional workers were allowed to stay for three months. The city required them to leave for one full month at that time. Afterwards, they could return for three more months.

Another row of sites were given for free to Habitat for Humanity. Mrs. Cotter said the city does not charge them for the campsites, and each year they return and build a home in Mason. The rest of the sites were taken by visitors to the area. The park also has a golf course, rodeo ground, and walking trails.

Our Ruddick Park is every bit as beautiful as this park, and I hope that with the estimated boom coming to town, our city will take advantage of an opportunity to improve the park, and as Russell Gallahan of the Comptroller's office recently stated in a Cline Shale meeting, "Don't squander the opportunities you have in front of you."

There once was a small RV park in Ruddick Park, and if that could be updated maybe we could take advantage of this economy boost. Then at least when the boom is over, we will have extra funds going to the city from RV sites for visitors and organizations promoting trade days, car shows, cook-offs, etc.

County not to provide water for power plant, Young says

According to Mitchell County Board of Economic Development's Sue Young, the county will not be providing brackish water for the new power plant to be built in Westbrook, as was previously published.

"Mitchell County is not providing the water," Young said. "It will be a third party that supplies the water."

Young said it was unknown at this time who that third party would be. When asked about an interview with R. Ross McCausland, immediately following last week's press conference regard-

ing the new power plant, where McCausland said the project would use roughly 2 million gallons of the county's water, Young said he had, "misspoken."

According to section 2.01. of the Memorandum of Agreement between Mitchell County and FGE Texas LLC, water shall be supplied, as such:

The county shall work with FGE and their Desalination LLC to option and contract sufficient sources (water wells) of brackish aquifer water and requisite pipelines to move such water to the site of the Texas power plant in an

estimated daily amount of 2.0 to 4.5 million gallons, such volume is per phase (eg. FGE Texas I) and shall be refined after further analysis by engineers of well water and optimal water treatment designs to maximize efficiency of the water use by the power plant, for at least 40 years from the initial time of operation of the power plant. In addition to optioning sufficient water supplies, the county will assist FGE in permitting with Lone Wolf Groundwater Conservation District, Texas Railroad Commission, TCEQ and any other applicable state agency.

Friends, city remember Doug Bell

On one of the better days the county has seen this year, low winds and temperature pushing 90 degrees, a group of friends and family got together Saturday to take a cruise through Colo-

rado City. They did it to honor one they lost, one they still miss dearly. It was a year ago, to the day, that Colorado City lost high school junior Douglas Major Bell in a traffic wreck, making last year's spring break one of sorrow, as the loss was felt across the community.

Saturday approximately 50 people in more than 20 vehicles converged on the parking lot at Colorado High School, where the cruise began. From there, the procession made its way through Sonic Drive-In before making its final stop at the gravesite of Bell.

"We wanted to, more than anything, let his family know we still remember Doug," Shawn Reese, one of the cruise's founders said. "We miss him and wish he could ride with us one more time."

According to Bell's mother, Connie Bell, the message was received.

"It was heartwarming to see what they did," she said of Saturday's event. "It was nice to see he is not forgotten, that he touched more lives than ours."

Bell's death in 2012, along with another wreck the following day which killed Amos Ramon Garcia of Snyder, sparked a noticeable increase in seat belt

awareness in the community, and most noticeably at Colorado High School, where his death encouraged appeals to the students to always wear their seatbelts. Neither Bell nor Garcia were wearing seatbelts.

Counselors were made available to the students at Colorado High School upon their return from spring break to help them deal with the loss of a friend. According to high school principal Dalton West, several took advantage of the opportunity to talk about their grief.

The students made a plaque in honor of Bell, which now hangs in the ag department of the high school. In addition, Bell's classmates also had t-shirts made in his honor, encouraging their peers to wear their seat belt.

With Bell's class set to graduate in May, West said he expected them to honor Bell in some way, but it would be left up to them to decide how.

"In the past, I have seen different things in situations like this," West said. "It will be up to the kids to honor their classmate in the way they choose. I know his loss is still felt by the student body and I am sure they will find a way to honor him at graduation."

Three large oilfield companies will move to Colorado City

Three major oilfield services and trucking companies are making plans to move to Colorado City.

Bridgeport Tank Trucking Co., one of Devon's major haulers, has moved several trucks to their new yard, one mile east of Santiago's Restaurant on the south side of the Interstate.

Also, SBC Energy out of Midland, also plans to open a service

company here. Their location is on the north side of the Interstate.

A major national service company, familiar to all of us, is in the process of signing a contract and will be opening a five-acre yard north of the old Platter Restaurant. All these companies are buying or leasing land from Wood Family Properties and Industrial Park.

No RV park vote in Westbrook for now

In a surprise move last week, the Westbrook City Council chose to table an item on their agenda in regards to RV parks. It had been expected that the council would vote to not allow any RV parks within the city limits of Westbrook, but according to Westbrook's Mayor Ramiro Fuentes, that vote will have to wait for the time being.

"We tabled the motion, rather than vote on it in Tuesday's meeting," Fuentes said. "At this time, there are still some things we need to clear up with the attorney before we can do something like that."

When asked if the RV parks

would eventually be banned in Westbrook, Mayor Fuentes said he had no way of knowing.

"I could not even pretend to know how an entire city council will vote in a future meeting," he said. "For now, it is just tabled."

According to City Secretary Pansy Fernandez at Westbrook's city hall, it may not make it back on the agenda for April.

"Our next meeting will be April 6, at 6:30 (p.m.)," Fernandez said. "It is not on the agenda at this time for the April meeting and at this time, I do not know if it will be. We still need to talk with our lawyer."

Whitesides opens 2nd yard in Westbrook

Back in January, Mitchell County Attorney Ty Wood stood before the City Council of Colorado City and requested that land his family owned adjacent to the south service road of I-20 be rezoned to allow his family to build and lease yards to oilfield companies. The required heavy industrial zoning was approved at that time, and now two months later, Todd Whitesides with Mine Service

Ltd. is helping Wood and his family follow through with their vision.

Whitesides said he was preparing the yard for the Wood family, with the understanding they would lease the property to Bridgeport Tank Trucks out of Bridgeport. Bridgeport has already brought in vacuum trucks and could possibly soon bring rig pulling units. Whitesides' Mine Service is located in Rock-

dale, but has recently opened a second yard in Westbrook, and has been in business since the early 1980's.

"With the new yard in Westbrook, we are trying to hire all local people," Whitesides said of Mine. "David (Roeglin) may move here from Rockdale, but we want to do all the hiring locally."

In January, Wood told the council that his family's intentions were to build one yard, and

then once it was leased, build another, and then another. Whitesides confirmed this last week.

"Hopefully we will get to build the fresh water station out by the road as well," Whitesides said. "We are really getting busy."

He said Mine Services would be building a location similar to the one near the Colorado City limits in Coahoma, along with the possibility of more work in Mitchell County.

Warmer weather coaxes snakes out of hiding, and it's important to know what to do after a snake bite, according to a medical toxicologist at Baylor College of Medicine (www.bcm.edu).

"Many people don't realize how much of an issue snake bites are in this area of the country," said Dr. Spencer Greene, director of medical toxicology and assistant professor of medicine - emergency medicine at BCM. "In fact, our regional poison center reported 235 snake bites - including 148 from known venomous snakes - in the Houston area in 2012, and I am sure many more are going unreported."

According to Greene, the first step is avoidance.

"Never reach into a hole or a bush blindly, a snake may be resting there," he said. "It is also important to maintain an ap-

propriate distance from a snake. Most pit vipers, which include rattlesnakes, copperheads and water moccasins, can strike at a target up to two-thirds of their body length when provoked."

If you are bitten by a snake, Greene suggests the following important steps:

- Stay calm.
- Call 911 immediately to be evaluated.
- Take off anything that is constricting the affected area, such as a ring or watch.
- Position the affected area at or above heart level. This means that if you are bitten on the hand, bring it to heart level, and if you're bitten on the leg or foot, elevate it if possible. This minimizes the amount of local tissue damage and swelling, which is the most common finding in pit viper bites.

• Go to the emergency room - the sooner the better.

Greene also dispels several myths about treating snake bites and suggests heeding the following advice:

- Do not apply a tourniquet or a constriction band.
- Do not apply ice; it can cause local tissue damage.
- Do not apply heat.
- Don't cut the affected area and attempt to suck the venom out - this increases the amount of local tissue damage.
- Don't use a commercially-available extraction device. These have also shown to be ineffective in removing venom and actually increase the amount of tissue damage.
- Don't use electrical therapy.
- Don't apply any type of lotions or ointments.

The management of snake

bites has changed over the years and the newer type of anti-venom has proven to be very effective in reducing pain, bleeding complications, swelling and tissue damage, Greene says. Although anti-venom has been shown to have the maximum effectiveness within the first 12 hours of the bite, it can still be effective a few days after the bite.

At the hospital, physicians will determine if anti-venom and hospital admission is necessary.

"Ideally, patients should be evaluated by a medical toxicologist with experience in managing snake bites," Greene says.

If a patient requires anti-venom, he or she usually spends one to two days in the hospital. After hospital discharge, patients will need to follow up twice a week for two weeks to watch for any signs of recurrent toxicity.

Upon graduation, he returned to the Lufkin District to work in the Livingston Area Office. After becoming a registered engineer in 1991, he accepted the position as the district's traffic engineer.

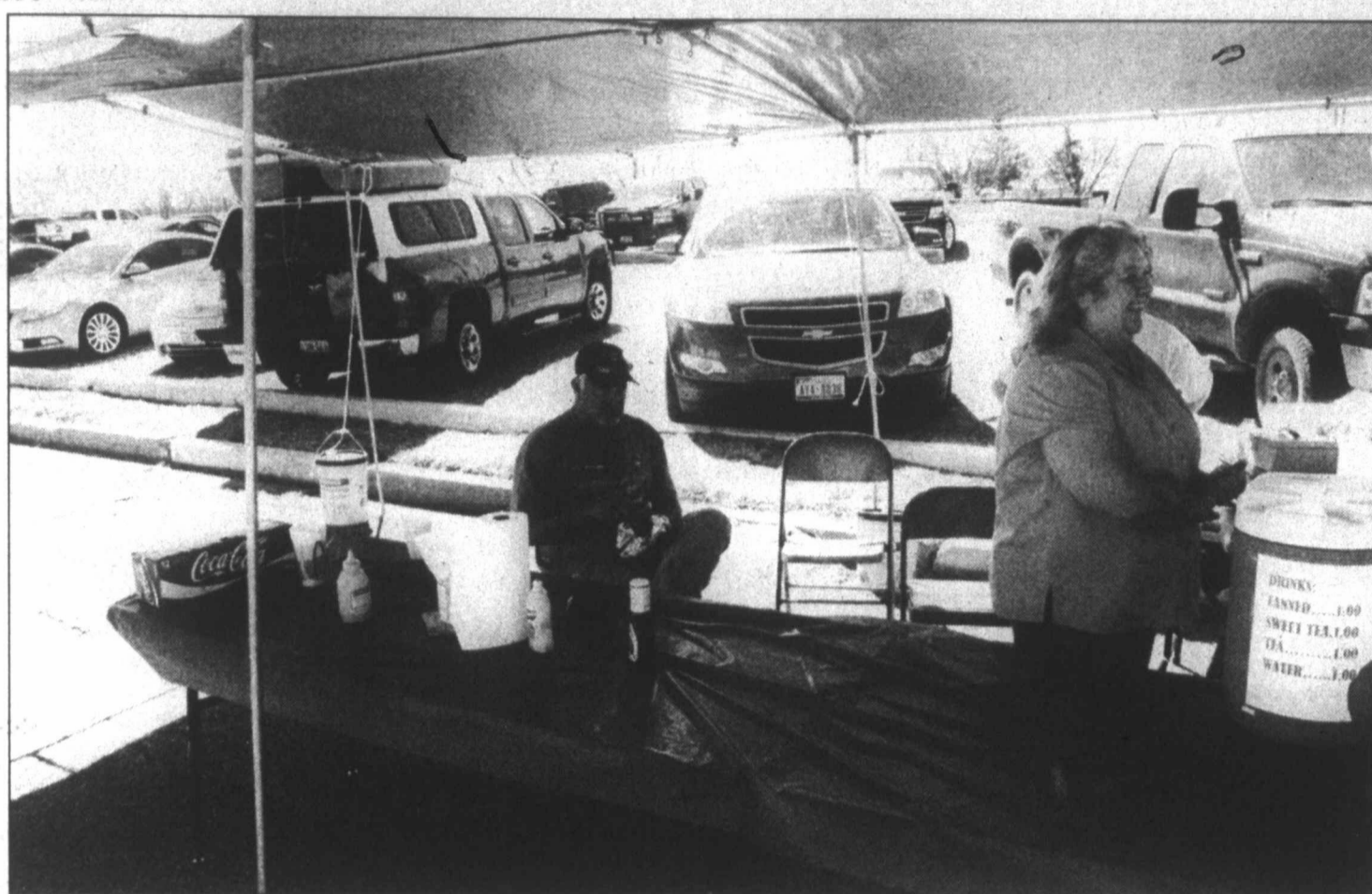

bol for Pi is a Greek letter that began to be used for Pi in the 1700s.

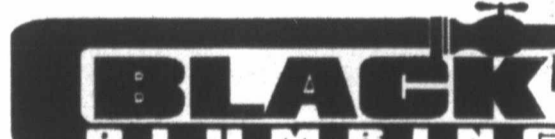

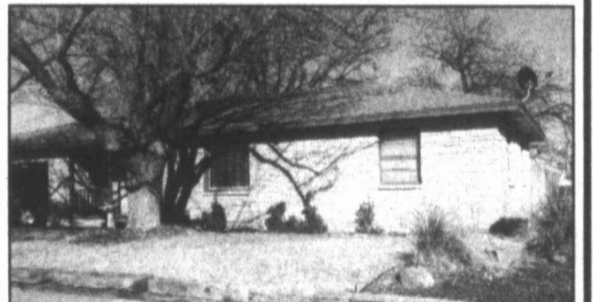

"He really competed well," Coach B.J. Graham said of Garza. "Moving up four spots is really hard to do. I was very pleased with the way he competed."

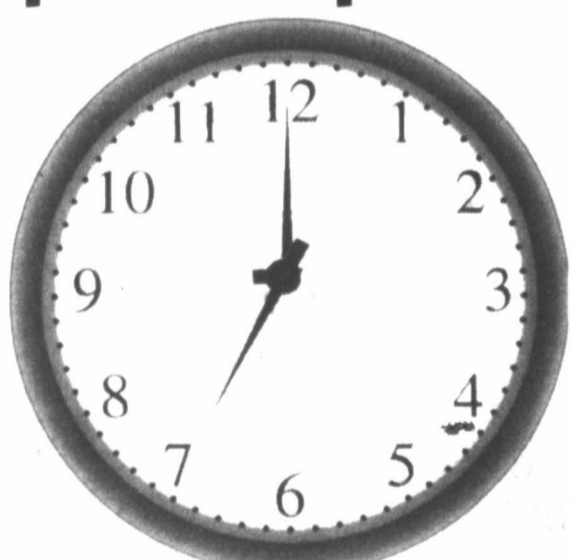
