C-City To Receive New Traffic Signs

Colorado City will get all new stop, yield, railroad crossing and no parking signs within about a month, City Manager James Campbell told the City Council Tuesday night during that group's regular monthly meeting.

This will consist of about 325 signs and is made pos-

sible through a grant from the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety, Campbell said.

The city will buy the signs from the Department of Corrections, (whose prisoners make the signs), buy the posts to put them on and install them, Campbell said. Then the state reimburses the city for the cost of the signs.

This is a project that has been worked on by the city council for the past three to four years in an attempt to replace signs that are discolored, missing, and many that are on poles too short or too tall.

All the new signs will be placed according to state regulations, Campbell said.

The signs was one of many topics covered by the council in a brief session lasting only 1 1/4 hours.

The council approved on second reading an ordinance on renewing the franchise of Frontier TV Cable and also approved a resolution authorizing transfer of ownership of Frontier TV Cable

Co. to Landmark Cablevision Associates.

The council also authorized Campbell to advertise for bids for water main fittings and several new fire hydrants to replace several now inoperative, with these purchases totaling an estimated \$6,000 and to advertise for bids for a new sanitation truck and refuse packer to replace a unit that is now old and creating maintenance problems. The new truck and packer are expected to cost an estimated \$13,000 which will be paid out of revenue sharing funds.

Campbell, when quizzed by council members, said he does not know yet how much the city will receive from the new revenue sharing bill approved by Congress but expects it will be about the same as in the past, about \$16,000 a quarter, some \$64,000 a year.

The council also approved advertising for sale \$400,000 in water and sewer system revenue bonds approved by voters in March. Improve-

ments of the water and sewer system has been delayed until the winter when usage of those systems is at a minimum and work will not interfere with service.

The bonds will be sold at a council meeting on Nov. 23.

Campbell also pointed out that he is working on a community development block grant request and two public hearings will be required before an application can be sent in. The city has applied for the grants once before to put sewer service on the south side but was turned down as the city did not have enough poverty.

The council also discussed at great length the solving of a traffic problem at 17th, Hickory and Vine and directed the city manager to come up with a solution within the next week while paving and curbing work is still going on in the city and while the engineer hired for the paving project is still in town.

In one other matter, Police Chief Fred McWhorter asked for and received council approval of revising police department policies. Most of the revisions dealt with internal workings of the department.

Library Acquires Texana Collection

Due to a recent purchase, the Mitchell County Library now has a rare collection of books about Texas, covering a wide range of subjects.

The books will be housed in a special section of the library where other rare books are also located. They are so rare that Librarian Mrs. Mayme Dozier says they will not be checked out but be kept for use only in the library. They will also be behind glass and kept locked but researchers may request to use them.

Due to the generosity and interest of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Dodge of Colorado City, the county library is the proud recipient of the 200-book Texana collection.

The Dodges have been living in Colorado City for the past five years, moving here from Albany where Dodge was employed at the Albany bank for years.

Mrs. Dodge, the former Ruby McGill, was at one time county superintendent of schools in Mitchell County and a book she wrote is in the collection.

Because many of the books are so rare, the Dodges have had several offers from rare book dealers to buy the books, either individually or the complete collection, for many thousands of dollars.

Due to their generosity

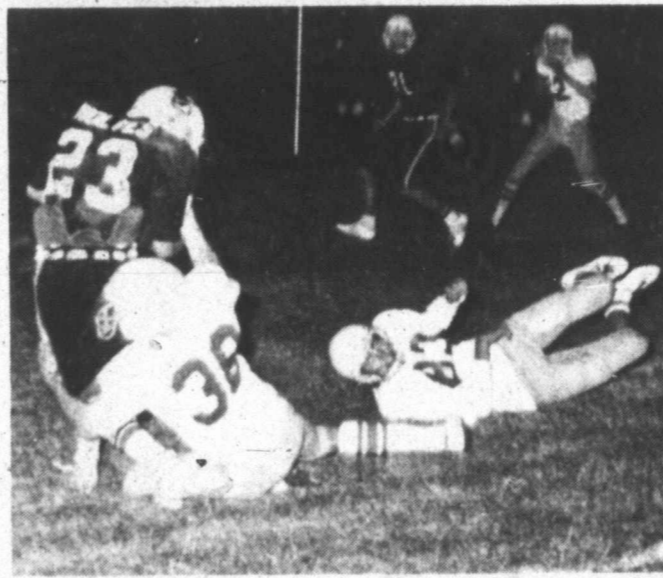
and the fact that they wanted the books to be used in Mitchell County and by the Mitchell County people, the Dodges offered to sell the books to the county at much less than half their value, representing really only a partial reimbursement of their expenses incurred collecting the books throughout the years.

The oldest particularly Texas book in the group is *A History of Texas* by H. Yoakum, printed in two volumes in 1856.

Another old work is the *Comprehensive Dictionary of the English Language* by J. E. Worcester and printed in 1847.

Other books, among many which might be of interest to researchers, is *Shackelford County Sketches*, published in 1908 and written by Don Biggers, one of the earliest newspapermen in Mitchell County who later moved from the county. Also, there is a 1903 edition of *Log Of A Cowboy* by Andy Adams and a first edition of Charles Goodnight's life by J. Evetts Haley.

Many of the books are autographed by the authors, thereby increasing their value. Another book of interest to historians is *Wild Life or Adventures on the Frontier* by Capt. Mayne Reid and published in 1859.

SHOWDOWN Wolves vs. Coahoma

This week, the Colorado City Wolves play the BIG GAME, the game for which they and the Wolves coaching staff have been waiting and preparing for during the past four years.

All the other games played were played to enjoy a victory, but this game is "for all the marbles," with the victor more than likely taking the District 6-AA championship.

That game, being billed as the Big Showdown, is against the Coahoma Bulldogs at Coahoma. Kick-off will be 7:30 p.m. Friday.

Many Coahoma fans have been quoted as saying this is the best Coahoma team ever. They are big, quick and confident.

They have won four, lost none and have one tie. They have played only one district game and won it over Wylie 33-8. The Wolves won over Wylie 33-0. The Wolves have a record of four wins and two losses with two wins and no losses in district play. Coahoma has scored 84 points and allowed only 21 points for their opponents. The Wolves have scored 84 points also, but have allowed 62 points for opponents, 55 of which came in the two losses by the Wolves.

Many Colorado City fans believe this Wolf team is one of the best ever fielded here. They also are big, quick and confident.

Personnel for both teams are just about even and it should be a real head-knocker, said Colorado High Coach Mike Farda.

Both teams run the same offensive and defensive formations. Coahoma has a powerful offensive and defensive line and they like to run the ball, Farda said. They rarely pass but can do so effectively, he pointed out.

For the Wolves, not all the players are healthy but all will probably see action in this MUST game for both teams. For Coahoma, the quarterback was injured in last week's non-district game against Crane but he is expected to play, according to last reports.

Farda received doctor's approval Monday for two players, Steve Belvin and Manuel Arellano, to suit up and play. Both have knee injuries. If all of the Wolves are ready for action for this game, it will be first time since the first game of the year as the Wolves have suffered a number of arm, knee and ankle injuries to key starters, a number of which are not yet full speed.

In addition, the Wolves are playing their seventh straight game of the year without benefit of a week off. Next week will be the week off.

However, Farda reports that the Wolves have had good workouts in preparation for the game.

Although this is being billed as the game of the year, it should be pointed out that there are several other teams in the district who could be spoilers for the winner of this game as Colorado City was last year against Ballinger.

A large crowd of Colorado City fans are expected to travel to Coahoma to watch the game Friday night.

Lights, Finances Topics For CISD

Discussion of lighting problems at Wolf Stadium was one of the items concerning the Colorado ISD school board at Monday night's regular monthly meeting.

CISD Superintendent Lloyd McKee said that he had obtained information about ways the lighting could be fixed from Texas Electric Service Company through the cooperation of local manager B. B. Hardee and T. D. Fambrough of

Sweetwater, manager of the division of custom service and operations.

They made three recommendations:

—Replace the old switch boxes thus eliminating the off-on problem but not improving the quality of lighting. Cost about \$6,000-\$7,000.

—Use present poles but install new quartz lights and new control panels. Cost about \$20,000.

—Install completely new units with metal halide lighting, new metal poles and control panels, an almost maintenance-free system. Cost about \$40,000.

McKee said the board instructed him to draw up specifications to take bids on all three methods, the board

looking to remodel the lighting system for next fall's football season. After the bids are let, the board will then decide which method is best for the entire school district.

The board also discussed financial matters, approving the tax roll for 1976 and also the audit report for 1975-76 submitted by CPA Joe Morren.

The ratio of assessment went up from 65% to 67% to meet increases in the local fund assignment and consequently the district's tax roll is up from last year's \$60 million to the current \$75,450,070.

From this base, the district will raise \$1,365,648.28 in taxes compared to about

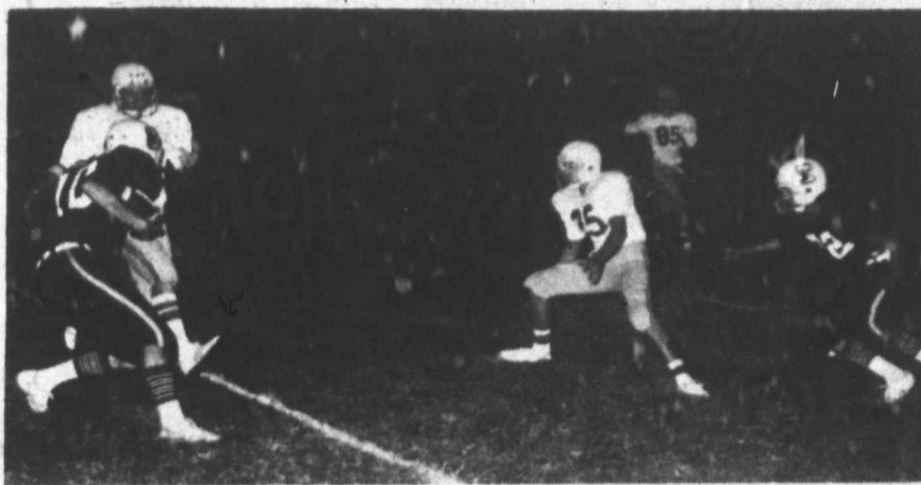

\$1,200,000 last year. Other funds come from federal and state sources. Last year's expenditures were about \$2,445,300 with some money spent on the school's building program.

The audit reported that the school's finances are in good shape and follow regular accounting procedures. McKee said that school business manager J. S. Craddock Jr. has kept a good account of the school district's money, making investments of incoming money so that the district realizes some interest on idle tax money.

A final item of discussion was McKee's report about plans for a self-evaluation next year. The board will appoint committees of parents, teachers, administrators and community leaders to set goals for the district, he said.

"The district made a full-scale study in 1970-71 for the Southern Association and will make another one in 1981-82," McKee said. "But before that, an interim study to see how well the goals are being met will be made in the next three years and the board is now discussing the self-study project."

McKee further explained that a meeting will be set up in the next few weeks to get the goal-setting underway.

His daughter-in-law, Bonnie Robertson Dodson was also raised in Mitchell County.

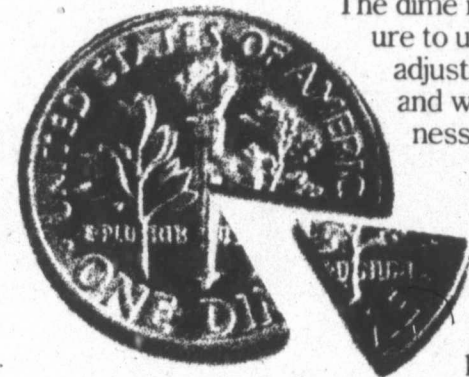

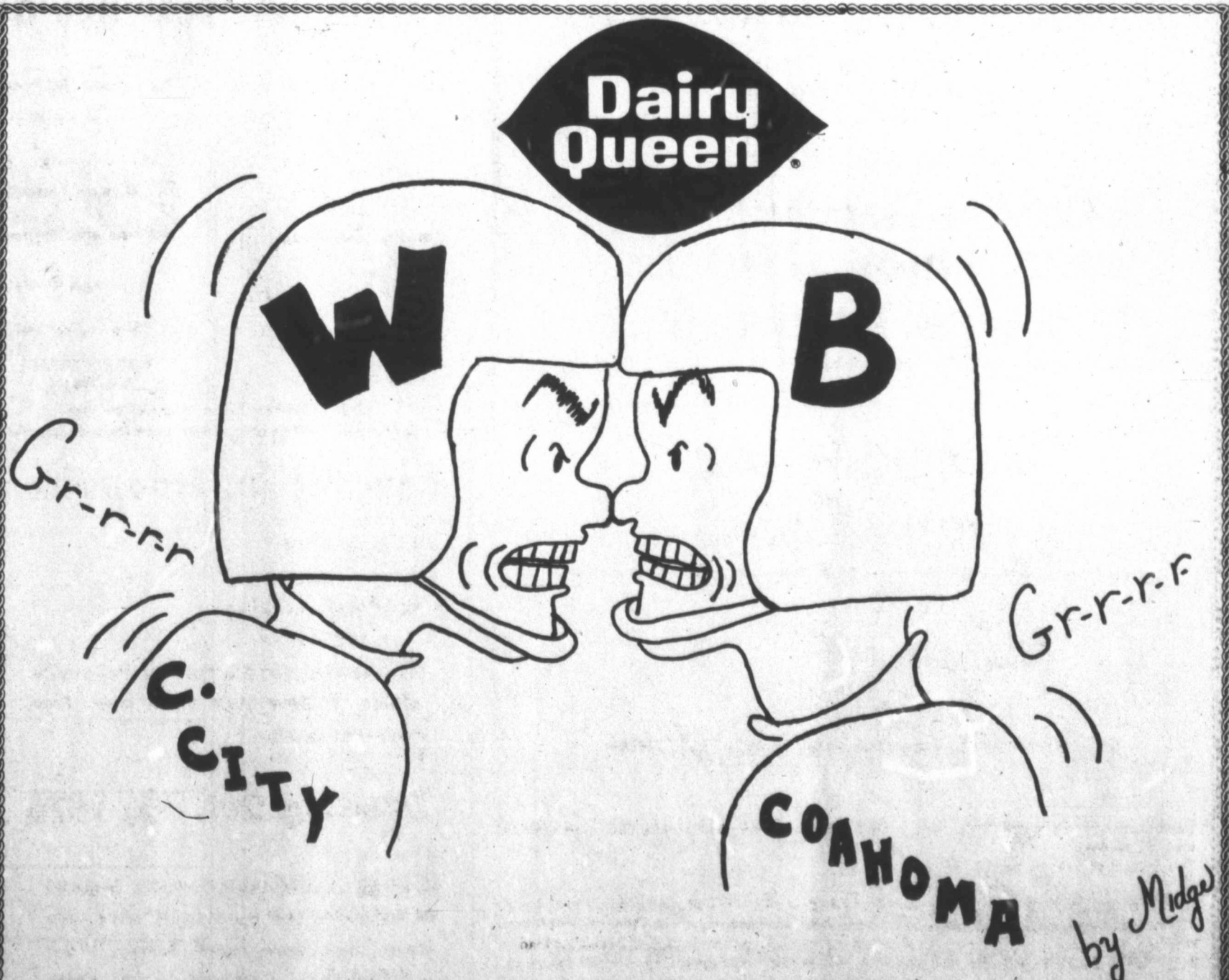
