ATTACK ON MORONES IS REPORTED WIDOW BLAMED IN WAYBURNE DEATH

FORMER LABOR MINISTER IN MEXICO FIRED UPON LATELY AND TRAIN ATTACKED, CLAIM

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 24.—Apparently authentic advices reaching New York today state that Luis Morones, former Minister of Labor, was fired upon as he was leaving a train before the assassination of President-elect Obregon and was wounded in the thigh. Delayed advices understood to have come from Pueblo also stated that a train bearing agrarians to Mexico City to participate in a demonstration in General Obregon's behalf on July 15 was fired upon by workers in a textile factory affiliated with the Mexican regional confederation of workers. General Barbosa, an agrarian leader, was reported to have been killed.

There has been tension between the agrarian leaders and labor leaders in Mexico for some time. Immediately after the assassination of General Obregon last week, leaders of the agrarians demanded the resignation of Senator Morones, minister of labor, contending that the labor leader was one of the "psychological authors" of the crime, paying the way to the assassination by his speeches against Obregon. There were even threats against Morones' life. Morones, who resigned his post in the cabinet, has been in hiding for the past few days. Immediately after Obregon's assassination he issued a statement condemning the crime, but this did not stop an outburst of anger against him by the various agrarian leaders.

Sandino Quits

SUPERIOR, Wis.—President Coolidge has been informed through a report of Rear Admiral David F. Sellers, commander of the special service squadron, that activities in Nicaragua on part of Augusto Sandino have apparently ceased entirely and Sandino himself has, at all appearances, fled the country. The report showed that the different bands which have kept the country in a turmoil since Henry L. Stimson arranged a truce between the warring factions, have fairly well surrendered and given pledges of future law abidance.

Guy Carter of Grady, New Mexico, junior student in Texas Technological college, has been awarded a tuition scholarship in the University of Chicago law school, according to an announcement made at the college this morning. MAN HELD FOR PART IN CRIME GOES ON STAND

BLACKSMITH ACCUSES WIDOW IN TURNING STATE'S EVIDENCE

(By Associated Press)
BASTROP, Texas, July 24.—With a harassed and nervous mien, Hugo Middleton, Smithville blacksmith, went on the district court witness stand here Tuesday and turned state's evidence against Mrs. Rosie Waybourne, 48 year old widow, on trial for the murder of her husband, W. W. Waybourne, retired railroad man of Smithville, found beaten to death at his home last March.

Middleton, whose blacksmith shop is across the street from the Waybourne home, testified that on Mrs. Waybourne's solicitation he got Joe Morones, Mexican, to kill Waybourne.

Widow Weeps in Trial
The red, hooded-haired widow wept during the testimony.

Middleton said she had tried to get him to put Waybourne out of the way, "because she did not love him, did not want to live with him, and carried a lot of insurance." The blacksmith said he refused but agreed to get someone else to do it.

A confession was introduced on demand of defense attorneys to "see the statement in writing."

Middleton first said that Mrs. Waybourne got him to offer \$500 to the Mexican to kill her husband. This was last fall, he said. He told of three different attempts on the life of Waybourne before the killing of March 10. Each time, Mrs. Waybourne left home to clear the way.

CRUDE SHOWS BIG INCREASE

26,222 BARREL JUMP IS RECORDED IN U. S. IN PAST WEEK

(By Associated Press)
TULSA, Okla., July 24.—With estimated daily average production of crude oil in both the Oklahoma and West Texas areas of the mid-continent fields increasing during the week ending July 21, total production in the United States took a jump of 26,222 barrels increase during the seven day period, the oil and Gas Journal will say in its current issue.

The bulk of Oklahoma's increase was in the St. Louis Pearson area where a gain of more than 1,900 barrels was registered. The Allen field increased production another 1,000 barrels to make up the state's gain. Seminole remained practically steady.

The big gain in West Texas during the week was in the Yates field, where production was lifted more than 15,000 barrels. Hendricks also had a slight gain in this section, but other West Texas fields decreased slightly.

North Central Texas, Gulf coast, Southwest Texas, Eastern and Rocky Mountain areas also had slight increases for the week. California's light oil production had a small increase but heavy oil production remained unchanged.

RIGHT TO VOTE IN PRIMARY IS DENIED BLACKS

JUDGE WEST REFUSES INJUNCTION TODAY IN SAN ANTONIO

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, July 24.—Federal Judge Duval West today refused to grant an injunction to place in the Bexar county democratic primaries by denying a temporary restraining order which would have allowed them to vote, and refusing to call two additional judges, who must sit with him to hear other phases of the case.

J. O. Wimberly, a negro attorney who was denied an absolute ballot, on the strength of a resolution of the party executive committee excluding negroes, asked for a temporary restraining order which would prevent election officials from refusing ballots to negroes.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs in the suit, County Clerk Jack Burke and John K. Webster, county executive committee chairman, attacked the petition on the ground that Judge West lacked jurisdiction.

Chalmers' constitutional. Wimberly's petition also sought an injunction on the grounds that the state law and the executive committee's resolution were unconstitutional. In order to rule on this question three judges must sit on the bench, and Judge West refused to call them in time to obtain a ruling before the election.

Wimberly sought, specifically, an absolute ballot for himself and Wednesday is the last date upon which these can be issued.

In examining his decision Judge West said:

"It does not definitely or certainly appear that the exclusion resolution passed by the state democratic committee is unconstitutional."

DATE IS FIXED FOR NOTICE OF DEMO NOMINEE

AUGUST 22 SET TODAY AND GIANT RADIO HOOK-UP PLANNED

(By Associated Press)
ALBANY, N. Y., July 24.—Governor Smith will be notified of his nomination Wednesday evening, August 22. The ceremony, which will take place on the east steps of the state capitol here, and will be broadcast by a nationwide network of radio stations. It will begin at 7 p. m., eastern daylight time, and is expected to last about one hour and a half.

After considerable difficulty in making radio arrangements because of the necessity of shifting fixed programs, announcement that notification ceremony had been agreed upon was made today by Governor Smith.

Speech Not Started

The democratic political nominee said that while he had not begun actual drafting of his acceptance speech, it, which he had promised to touch on all campaign issues he figured it would take an hour for delivery. He also calculated that Senator Pittman of Nevada would need 15 minutes for his "reaction" speech, and that another 15 minutes would be required for "incidental business."

Although the exact line-up of radio stations that will broadcast Governor Smith's speech has not been determined definitely, approximately ninety-six, covering the entire country, will be in the chain.

In addition to clearing up the uncertainty as to the date for his acceptance speech, Governor Smith at his conference today with newspaper reporters made it plain that he was not disturbed by claims of strength emanating from republican sources.

Comment Is Cryptic

"Senator Mooney says the republicans are facing the hardest fight since 1921," one reporter put in. "I didn't vote in '22," Smith countered.

"Mooney claims the republicans will carry New York by a large majority," the nominee was reminded. "Don't managers always claim everything in '22?" Smith came back. "I was elected governor four times against claims to the contrary."

"Then you don't think much of the republican attitude of confidence in the east?"

"No. I've heard it an often that it's stale," Smith retorted.

STEERS STAMPEDE ON KANSAS CITY

STREETS AFTER TRAIN WRECK; MUCH EXCITEMENT FOLLOWS WILD CHASE

KANSAS CITY, July 24.—Fifty head of Hereford cattle stampeded through the streets here early today, following the midnight wreck of a Santa Fe freight train two blocks from the Union Station. Police and motorists staged many exciting impromptu races in the downtown district.

Nine cars were piled up when the train's locomotive left the rails, and three cattle cars were wrecked open. The frightened stock scattered in all directions, and soon the police were deluged with telephone calls from excited residents.

Only a few of the cattle had been rounded up at an early hour and reports indicated the excited animals had reached the outlying residence sections.

Two steers were captured in the vicinity of the Merchants hotel at Twelfth and Baltimore streets, after they had fallen on the sidewalk, exhausted by the chase. Several others were herded into vacant lots in that section, and guards posted to keep them from escaping. One steer dashed through a plate glass window into a downtown garage and horned several cars. Timid attendants gathered, but none dared approach the wild-eyed bovine, who finally crashed through another window and fell up an alley.

One panic-stricken steer was knocked down by a street car at Thirtieth and Main streets, but got to its feet apparently unhurt and escaped.

MORE RAIN IS RECEIVED OVER SOUTH PLAINS

HIGHWAYS HEAVY AND ONE CLOSED AFTER ANOTHER DELUGE

With low-hanging clouds hovering near, giving indications of additional moisture over the section, Lubbock and the South Plains were soaking again today as the result of additional rainfall late yesterday, last night and this morning which gave more than enough relief to the crops and placed the highways in their worst condition in several years.

A total of 3.27 inches have fallen in the vicinity of Lubbock since Saturday, according to the gauge at the state experiment station east of the city. Last night's fall totaled 1.44 inches.

Highways leading out of the city were in worse condition than in the past several years, bus drivers at the Union Bus Terminal stated today. Practically all of the buses from all directions are running late and some were not able to fill their schedules late yesterday and this morning. No buses were running any farther south than Post due to the excessive waters in the little creeks and canyons between there and Snyder.

Traffic Is Halted

Officials of the state highway department posted orders yesterday afternoon prohibiting any travel of cars between Post and Snyder due to the rises in the Yellowhouse canyon near Justiceburg. Four cars were turned back.

Max Coleman Some Better, Is Report

Max Coleman, local attorney who suffered a ruptured blood vessel, as he attempted to crank his car yesterday morning, was reported to be improving this afternoon at the Elwood hospital where he is being treated.

His condition was thought to have been very critical soon after the accident and physicians expressed fear for his recovery. He rallied from the rupture, however, and was said to be much better today.

Ernest D. "Chucky" Lindsey, local man, is in the Lubbock sanitarium in a critical condition today suffering from an ulcerated stomach, according to word from the institution this afternoon. He took seriously ill early this week and has been in apparently good health prior to this attack.

HERO MEDAL FOR NEGRO IS ASKED

AUSTIN, July 24.—(By Associated Press)
Governor Dan Moody will be asked to recommend a Carnegie medal for John Lee Rollins of Austin, negro cook at the Palace, for his heroic deed of the 25th division, National Guard, who is credited with saving the life of Horton Schmidt, Austin, one of the guardsmen, seriously burned when a bucket of gasoline he was carrying caught fire from burning grass.

Rollins already has been presented with a gold watch from officers. Schmidt, carrying a leaking bucket of gasoline, broke into run when the leak was ignited from a burning patch of grass and his clothes were fired. Rollins caught him and threw him down, smothering the flames.

Schmidt is in the Fort Sam Houston base hospital.

Hayhurst was to have received his degree from the college in August and has accepted a position as coach of Brownfield high school. His home is in Bush Springs, Oklahoma. He is known to his friends as "Shorty."

Friends stated today that he spoke of visiting his mother in Quanah over the week-end and it is thought he might be there, being unable to return because of the rains. Efforts will be made to get in touch with Quanah authorities this afternoon. It was stated. Officials of the Tech are also aiding in the search for Hayhurst.

AMSTERDAM, July 24 (AP)—Commander Theodor Van Beek, doughty young skipper of the liner President Roosevelt, home of the American Olympians, is getting as big a thrill out of the visit to Amsterdam as anybody aboard the vessel.

Thirty five years ago, Van Beek then a 100-headed little boy, left Amsterdam as a cabin boy on a Dutch ship. He sailed the seven seas, ramped continents, became an American citizen and reserve commander of the American navy.

He never had an opportunity to return until Friday when he sailed his big liner right up into the heart of his native city with the American Olympic team under his care. It was a proud captain who after the Olympians had been safely established, laid aside his gold braid, fee civilian clothes and revived youthful memories.

CHAMPION SAID IN BEST SHAPE OF HIS CAREER

JOKES WITH MANAGER TO DIVERT HIS MIND FROM CONTEST

(By Associated Press)
SPECIALTOR, N. Y., July 24.—Though the supreme test of his championship career is but 48 hours away, Gene Tunney has yet to reach the irritated stage which tradition demands of a prize fighter on edge.

This unique ruler of fistiana, now self-trained to the last muscle for the defense of his crown against Tom Heeney, New Zealand challenger, in the Yankee Stadium on Thursday night, has turned to horse play to divert his mind from the contest. His victim was Billy Gibson, his manager.

Causes Fake Telegram
Knowing Gibson's aversion to flying, Tunney caused a fake telegram to be sent to his manager containing a famous aviator's offer to make a special flight up here to carry him back to New York as a reward for the deep interest in aviation.

Gibson was flustered when he received the bogus invitation. He deciphered over the message for many minutes before showing it to Tunney, who, in urging him to accept the offer, pointed out that it would be the height of discourtesy to decline the invitation of a national hero.

This argument finally overcame Gibson's objections and he composed a wire of acceptance which delighted Tunney and his assistants.

Gibson planned to leave the training camp for New York this afternoon after Tunney with through his final workout, which was to be for the sole benefit of the newspaper men. The champion, who has never been in better shape, planned to go through his usual punching bag exercises and then take on his sparring partners, Harold Mayo and Billy Vidabek, for three rounds each.

Taper off Thursday
This done, Tunney will taper off until Thursday morning, at 10 o'clock when he will take off from Lake Pleasant in a dual motored Sikorsky amphibian piloted by Bill Winston, Curtiss Field flyer who crashed into a tree near here last week, causing slight injuries to himself and Charles V. Bob, one of Commander Byrd's financial backers.

Tunney today weighed 190 pounds but he expected to drop several of them during this afternoon's workout. A day of rest, plus a night of sound sleep in his lakeside cabin, will restore the lost poundage and Tunney, Lou Pink, his trainer, said, will weigh about 190 pounds when he steps on the garden scales.

Heeney Finishes Training Period

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 24.—Hint Tom Heeney, unaccustomed to camouflaging his thoughts when interviewed, said him with questions, frankly admitted today that he is in the best condition of his fighting career, ready and eager to give Gene Tunney the battle of his life when they meet in the Yankee Stadium Thursday night for the world's heavyweight championship.

Training Is Over
The six weeks' training campaign of this good natured, rock-ribbed New Zealander is over. He is glad of it. He finished boxing yesterday. Today there was nothing for him to do but take a 15 minute workout in the gymnasium with no more work with the gloves. Tomorrow will be a day of complete relaxation with not even a gesture of training.

Heeney was in good humor. He had a cheery "On 'ello 'ello," for everybody and a grin that was infectious. His easy going disposition had returned following the mental strain of Sunday when he boxed before Jack Dempsey, promoter Tex Rickard and others. These mental clouds were swept away by the thoughts of no more training, which he regards tougher than the fight itself. He planned to go sailing on a private yacht along the New Jersey shore today.

The old hard rock, whose rugged features are furrowed with lines that reveal the near approach to the peak of condition, said he had no set plans about his task of knocking Tunney off the heavyweight throne.

Letter From Gibbons
Heeney cherishes a letter received from Tom Gibbons, once a contender for the heavyweight title, the only man besides Tunney to face Dempsey as champion and be on his feet at the finish. It will be no surprise to Gibbons if Heeney defeats Tunney. He worked with the New Zealander while in London four years ago preparing for a fight with Jack Bloodfield.

"Believe me you have a good chance," Gibbons wrote. "I'm not kidding you, you won't find Tunney the greatest champion of all time. I know that when it is all over, Mr. Tunney will know that he has been in a fight."

DEMPSEY'S ABSENCE MAY BE COSTLY

(By NEA Service)
NEW YORK, July 24.—Looking over the ten largest gates in boxing, one notes that Jack Dempsey, former champion, took part either as challenger or champion in six of the largest money fights in history.

She was persuaded to leave the water at 5:37 yesterday afternoon by Morris Inkels, manager of the outdoor pool where the swim was conducted. He believes the strain of long grind was beginning to do her harm.

When she reached shallow water, however, she displayed no signs of fatigue. She waved to friends, shouted directions to her managers, and said she believed she could have continued for 20 hours more.

Her face and limbs, however,

were badly swollen by the contact with the salt water and she was carried from the pool and taken in an ambulance to St. Francis hospital. Although it was said she was too ill to be weighed, it was estimated that her normal weight of 240 pounds had fallen to 215 pounds.

Mrs. Huddleston is 30 years old, a widow and the mother of a 13 year old son.

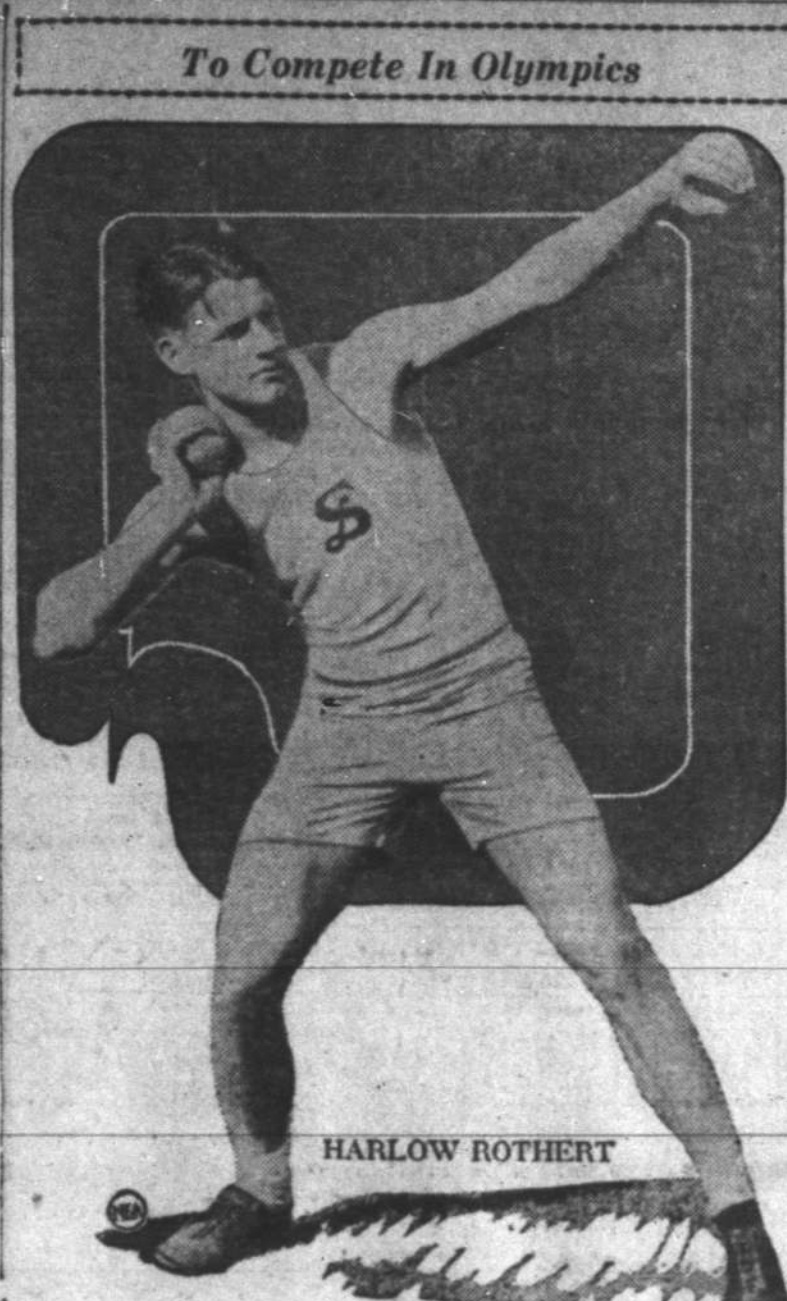

CATHOLICS LEAD WITH 18,604,850 IN 1926 REPORT SHOWS

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Membership of the Roman Catholic church in the United States totaled 18,604,850 persons in 1926, an increase of near 20 per cent over the total membership in ten years before, which was reported as 15,721,815. The figures were made public today by the census bureau as a part of its regular decennial count of religious body membership.

Catholic churches in 1926 numbered 18,939 compared with 17,735 in 1916.

Some Not Complete

Census returns for a number of the largest Protestant denominations have been announced by the bureau for 1926, but are still incomplete and such large groupings as the Southern Baptist convention have yet to be enumerated.

A total membership of 4,081,777 was reported for the Methodist Episcopal church for 1926 with 26,130 churches compared with 29,319 churches and 3,717,785 members in 1916. The Methodist Episcopal church 32nd had 18,906 churches and 2,487,634 members in 1926 compared with 19,181 churches and 2,114,479 members in 1916. The Northern Baptist convention in 1926 had 7,612 churches and 1,290,438 members against 8,148 churches and 1,232,135 members in 1916.

The Protestant Episcopal church reported 730 churches with 1,603,900 members while in 1916 it was credited with 734 churches and 1,601,821 members.

The Presbyterian church in the United States of America for 1926 reported 8,047 churches and 1,091,031 members against 8,438 churches and 1,611,251 members in 1916.

for the hired killer, the blacksmith testified.

In a conversation with Morales a few days after the killing, Middleton said he told him, "Joe, you pulled off a hell of a stunt the other night." He said he was referring to the mutilated condition of the body.

Morales told him, he said, that a steel bar off a plow was used for the killing.

Then he paid the Mexican \$500 instead of \$300, Middleton said. He did this, he testified, on instructions from Mrs. Wayburne.

E. H. Moss, La Grange lawyer, told of a visit by Mrs. Wayburne

and Middleton to his office. He said they inquired who would receive money payable under Wayburne's insurance policies and from certain real estate in case of his death.

The state rested its case and defense testimony was to begin Tuesday afternoon.

Testimony yesterday was that Middleton and Mrs. Wayburne had been paying premiums on Wayburne's \$12,000 insurance, and that Mrs. Wayburne had told friends the only reason she lived with Wayburne was because he had a job and was heavily insured. She is charged with hiring a Mexican, Joe Morales, to kill him.

Detective To Called
W. P. Rascoe, San Antonio private detective, told of being hired by the widow, a 46-year-old woman with red bobbed hair, and Middleton to "bring to justice" whoever "was guilty of the crime."

Rascoe's testimony, even that of Mrs. Gertrude Caraway, a seamstress. She said Mrs. Wayburne once expressed to her, while talking of her husband, an intention to "bump the old fellow off."

Rascoe said Mrs. Wayburne insisted that he spread suggestions around town, particularly at the sheriff's office that would divert suspicion from her and Middleton in connection with the crime.

Rascoe said he had been employed for three weeks and that Middleton had paid him \$100.

After several conferences with the two in Smithville soon after the murder was committed, he said Mrs. Wayburne asked him if he had "found out who did the killing."

The witness replied that it looked as if the woman and Middleton were guilty.

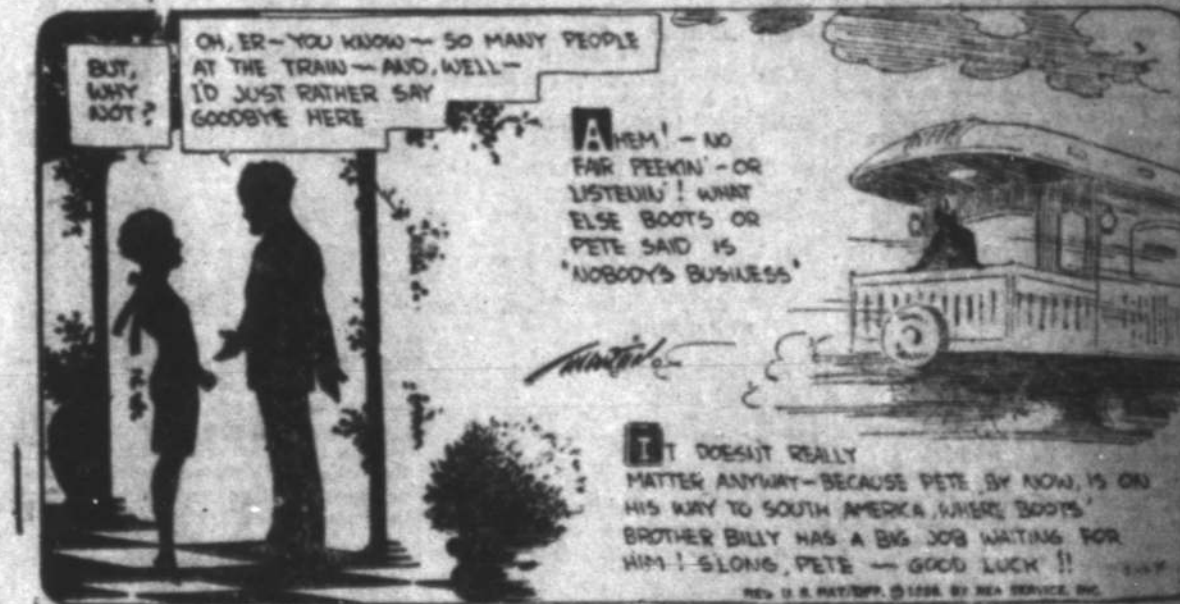
