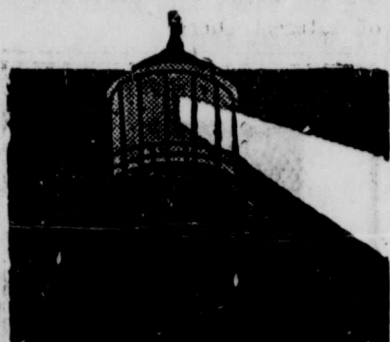

Citizens of Lorraine on Saturday, August 23, will either take a step forward or a step backward. If the majority votes for the improvements to the water system I believe the step forward will be made. On the other hand if the majority votes against the improvements I believe it will be a step backward for the town.

The State Department of Insurance in Austin says Lorraine's water mains are deficient and the storage facilities are also deficient, and there are other deficiencies in the system. The Department of Insurance recommends that the proposed improvements of the water system be made in order to give the property of the town fire protection. If the improvements are made the Board says the base fire insurance rate in Lorraine will be reduced 11 cents.

The reduction in fire insurance rate is a good inducement to vote for the improvements. But there is another reason. The improvements will provide more water for a large number of customers through the larger mains and the added storage facility of 100,000 gallons will give the security needed for adequate fire protection.

Let's take a step forward on Saturday August 23, by voting FOR the improvements to the water system and the issuance of \$85,000 in bonds to pay the cost.

He married Rose West in Eastland April 4, 1915. He had owned and operated an auto parts business in Colorado City for many years until selling the business to George Mahoney several years ago and retired because of ill health.

REV. McGUIRE, FORMER PASTOR HERE DIES WED.

The Rev. Nathan Ellison McGuire, 76, died at 12:50 a.m. Wednesday, August 6 in Sunset Nursing Home in Stephenville after a long illness.

Rev. McGuire was former pastor of the Lorraine Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in Stephenville Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Emil V. Becker, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Stephenville officiating, assisted by the Rev. Keith Rosenbaum.

Burial was in Oakdale Cemetery, Stephenville.

Born Jan. 2, 1893, in Bell County, he had lived in Erath County 19 years, moving there from San Angelo after ill health forced him to retire from the pastorate.

He married Adellia Doyle Jan. 10, 1914.

Rev. McGuire and his wife and daughter, Eloise, moved to Lorraine and he began his pastorate at the First Baptist Church in March, 1927.

While here Rev. McGuire was in inspiring leader for the Boy Scouts. He took them on camping trips to the creek and favorite outdoor scenic spots and these boys, now more than grown, recall the good moral lessons learned.

Bro. McGuire was a 1927 graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and taught public school here. After pastoring the First Baptist Church here 2 and one half years he accepted a call to the Immanuel Baptist Church in San Angelo, and later pastored other churches in that area before ill health forced him to retire.

Survivors include his wife; two grandchildren; four brothers, Ralph and Ocie, both of Rochester, Ernest of Weinert and David of Austin; four sisters, Mrs. H. J. Paul of Lockhart, Mrs. Annie Paul of Knox City, Mrs. John Hamilton of Lyford and Mrs. J. B. Bennett of Fort Worth.

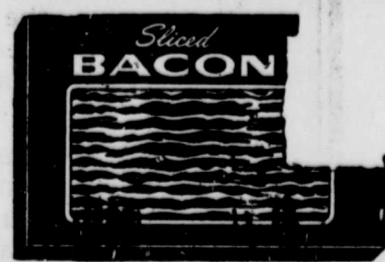
