FARM SECURITY FOOD PROGRAM IS IMPORTANT

The farm security administration continues its food security plan by extended meetings. It plans to extend its program to include all farm families.

The program is outlined by Secretary Wickard as follows:

1. Put small operations to work producing more food by eliminating deficiencies with credit, improving family health by nutrition program and medical care, and secure security by debt adjustment and better tenure arrangements.
2. Full production in co-operation with war effort on information and plans for food increase.
3. To develop appropriate food processing, marketing, storage, and transportation.
4. Facilitate and assist in solution of farm labor problems.
5. Help provide use of farm land by helping farmers obtain leases for purpose of producing food.
6. To help meet food deficiencies by co-op groups.

The first of these meetings was held at Branton's Gun, where 75 people heard Gov. I. Lane, rural

supervisor, explain that every phase of farm security would be more food; that every farm plan this year must show production to the maximum.

Mrs. I. R. Parrish, home management supervisor, and Miss Louise Jennings, assistant, discussed food storage and other vital subjects.

The program was made more interesting by educational films. These films consisted of "All Children Must Eat," "Food for Strength," "Food Storage," "Caring of Meat," and "Hot Care."

Similar meetings are scheduled for Okra and Pioneer on Sept. 14th and Colony Sept. 15.
