Charley Chambers Charged With Joyce-Fruit Burglary—In Jail

Charley Chambers, who is charged with being one of the burglars that entered the Joyce-Fruit Store on the night of Dec. 19th, by going through the sky light, was brought to Portales from Dallas, Texas on Sunday night of this week, and is now being held in the Portales jail.

Chambers is thought to be the leader of this gang, and is the third member to be captured.

Gene Houston, of Clovis, was arrested on this charge and is out on bond awaiting trial.

Claude Clark is in jail at Leveland, Texas, on the same charge, but it will be several years before he is brought to Roosevelt county for trial as he has several years sentence in Texas.

The story of this burglary and the running down of the burglars would read like fiction, covering a trail over a good part of New Mexico and Texas.

Chambers would make no statement, except denying that he had a part in this burglary. He stated however, that he had been in seven penitentiaries in different states.

Sheriff Kernigan returned from Dallas on Sunday night with Chambers who had fought requisition.

The officers are now looking for the fourth man connected with this case.

Methodist in Their New Church Home

Sunday was a great day for the Methodist congregation in Portales for at that time the first services were held in the new church building which has been erected in the past year.

This is a structure which is indeed worthy of the pride the local congregation took in its building. The members have exerted every effort to have the building as they had planned in the beginning.

The auditorium is not yet ready for occupancy but pastor T. B. Sowell and his people have been worshipping in the Portales theatre for the past many months and they felt it would be more like home if they were able to gather in their own building even though it was in the basement which is very commodious and pleasant. Sunday morning the crowd was estimated at one thousand persons and Sunday evening was only about one hundred less than that number. The Baptist services were cancelled for the evening hour and that organization united with the Methodist in their happy services.

Several special musical selections were given at the morning service. These included an instrumental quartet by the sons and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Pat White. The young musicians are Mary Evelyn, Sarah Lucille, Elmer and Emmett White. Mrs. A. W. Freeman sang "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth" and Mrs. E. H. Brown delighted her hearers with "The Holy City".

In the evening Rev. Ball assisted with the services by reading the scripture lesson.

Work will be rushed along as rapidly as possible in order to have the auditorium ready for use in the very near future.

This is one of the very prettiest church homes in the state of New Mexico, and the city of Portales is well proud of the corner where this edifice now stands.

In the Sunday morning service Rev. Sowell invited the building committee to occupy the platform with him, as this body of men has been ever faithful in its endeavors to give to the city this beautiful church home. Twister Hits S. E. Part of County

On Friday afternoon, May 2nd, about 5 p. m., a tornado struck in the Causey neighborhood, doing considerable damage.

It tore up J. W. Slone's chicken house. Then hit Arch Merrick's place blowing away his hog shed, milk house, and other out buildings, also wrecked the windmill, did some damage to the roof of the dwelling house.

Dr. F. Croft lost his windmill, barn, chicken house, several large plum trees, and the N. W. corner of his rock house was torn out. This house had been standing 21 years.

H. P. Croft lost his chicken house, pieces of it were seen 3-4 miles away, his well drill was turned over, and the framed dwelling he has under construction was moved partly off the foundation.

The barn on the B. N. Hill place is a total wreck, the dwelling house, windmill, fences etc., are damaged.

The storm then struck Jay Wooley's place moving the house partly off the foundation. The course of the storm so far had been north, but here it turned east into Bailey county, Texas, doing considerable damage near the Watson school house.

Luckily, no one was hurt, every one having plenty of time to reach their storm cellars.

The only casualty that has been reported is George Merrick's pig, and perhaps a few chickens that have not been seen since.

Farmer Reports Growing Cotton

Mr. H. C. Scott who now lives about 25 miles southeast of Portales reports that he has 30 acres of cotton up and worked out, and 15 acres coming up this week and will plant quite a lot more of his farm in cotton.

Mr. Scott it will be remembered came to Roosevelt County about 16 months ago and rented the H. H. Wright farm 6 miles southwest of Portales and raised more than 50 bales of cotton last year, and bought a farm with the profits, the cotton was only a fair price last year and will continue to grow cotton every year and feels that he will receive a fair price for each crop as he grows them. He says he can grow cotton at about half the cost here as compared to back east where land is high and fields are smaller and weeds and grass grows so abundant in the crops. Mr. Scott feels that cotton acreage will be greatly increased here this year.

S. N. Hancock and Mr. Denhoff of Clovis, Miss Juanita Hancock and Miss Lillian Bell spent Tuesday and Wednesday in Amarillo.

On Monday sometime before noon Grover Bell was dragged to death by his horse on the old Greathouse ranch, about twenty miles west of Portales.

On Monday morning, Mr. Bell, who is caring for the cattle of Owenby and Young on their ranch at the old Greathouse place, left the ranch house to ride the pasture.

About noon the horse came in with the saddle on, but as this frequently occurred, when the rider would stop to repair fences, no alarm was felt.

About dark, when the rider failed to put in his appearance uneasiness was felt, and about day light Tuesday morning, a search party went out.

The lifeless body of Mr. Bell was found in the pasture, his left temple being bruised and one boot off.

Through the grass was a path showing that he had been dragged by the horse, and in about 160 yards was found where the horse had fallen.

Indications were that one foot was caught in the stirrup and that the fall rendered him unconscious. In about fifteen feet from where the body was found one boot and a spur a little further on. His glove, pipe and tobacco was found where the horse had fallen, and over the trail was scattered buttons and shreds from his clothing.

A coroners jury was summoned consisting of Paul Mersfelder, Lense Haragan, L. A. Tolliver, Tollis Tolliver, Lewis Terrill and Grant Gordon, who rendered a verdict that deceased came to his death by being dragged by a horse.

Grover Bell came to Portales from Tennessee about twelve years ago, and has been in the employ of the Owenby and Young cattle company for a number of years.

Indications are that death came to the relief of the injured man almost instantly, as there was no indication that he had moved from where he was found.

Deceased was a brother to T. E. Bell and Mrs. W. B. Smith of Portales.

The funeral services are being held this afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Smith, on Liberty street, at 2:30 o'clock.

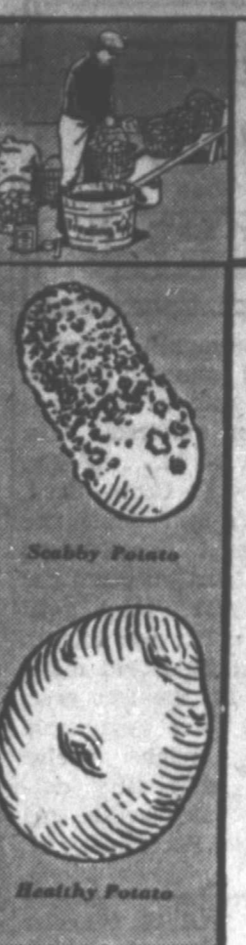

Uncle Sam Says N. M. Beer Brewer To Pay \$2,545

SANTA FE.—In the arid regions county, Uncle Sam has spotted a brewer of beer and now demands that he pay the government \$2,545 in taxes because he has no license to brew and sell beer.

It is the first suit of its kind to reach the New Mexico courts, although such actions are frequent in the Metropolitan districts of other states.

The government brought this case against Joe Duran who lives at Derry, in Sierra county.

United States District Attorney Hugh Woodward charges: "That defendant at Divers times did sell beer, the same being intoxicating liquor, and was engaged in the business of a retail dealer in malt liquor, without any licenses, without paying the tax therefor, and contrary to the statutes made and provided in such cases."

Duran was raided on July 20 of last year, 73 bottles of beer were seized, and in September he pleaded guilty and was fined \$50.

Prohibition administrator J. F. Vivian then notified him that he owed the government \$2,545 under the prohibition act as amended by the internal revenue laws, and the matter was referred to the United States District Attorney when Duran refused to pay.

The sum includes: Penalty for unlawfully operating as a retail dealer in liquor, \$500. Special tax as retail malt liquor
