EXHIBIT OF FINE PICTURES TO BE DISPLAYED HERE

150 Reproductions of the Works of Great Artists Will be Exhibited to Students and General Public

Mr. V. Z. Rogers, supt. of schools, has announced that an exhibit of 150 of the finest reproductions of recognized masterpieces of art has been engaged to be placed on display to local students and the general public March 6-10.

A small admission charge will be made, and the fund thus raised will be used to purchase pictures for the school buildings.

In making the announcement, Mr. Rogers said: "It has been the privilege of students and the general public to enjoy the masterpieces of music and literature for generations; but an enjoyment of the masterpieces of art has, until very recently, been restricted to those who were wealthy enough to travel throughout the world, visiting the museums in which the original paintings hang."

"Recent improvements in color photography and printing now make it possible to bring the art of the world to even our small towns and villages through the medium of faithful reproduction. These reproductions are true to the originals in every respect, with the possible exception of size. Even the most delicate variations in color are maintained. In most instances the brush strokes in the original pictures are clearly discernable."

"I feel that we are fortunate indeed to be able to bring to Lamesa a collection of these splendid pictures."

TORNADOES TO PLAY PAMPA FRIDAY NIGHT

The Golden Tornadoes, Boys basket ball team, district champions of their district, will meet Pampa High School basketball district champions of their district at Pampa, Friday night this week for a first game of a series of three to decide the bi-district championship, so states V. Z. Rogers, superintendent of the local schools.

The second game according to arrangements, will be played in Lamesa the evening of March 3, and in the event a third game is necessary it will be agreed by officials of the two schools to meet on a neutral court.

Mr. Rogers states that on account of the limited space in the local gymnasium for the March 3rd game only the first ticket purchasers could possibly be admitted, and that tickets will go on sale and as soon as sufficient tickets are sold to fill the space, no more tickets will be sold. He further states that on account of it being a bi-district championship matter, that heavier expenses are involved, therefore, the public may look for possibly a fifty cent price on the ticket, but even at that, it is pointed out, the game will be worth the money, as these are two of the best teams in the state, and possibly the best in West Texas.

Mr. Rogers further states that this is the first time since possibly 1922 or 1923 that such honors have come to the local high school basketball squad. "In those days," he states, "no bi-districts were decided, but the district winners went direct to the state meet. Now the process of elimination calls for bi-district games."

DAWSON COUNTY GAME PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

The Dawson County Game Protective Association at its regular meeting in February decided to put on a hawk killing campaign. Dan Davis, Edd Haymes, and A. G. Barnard were appointed a committee for this purpose. The persons presenting the largest number of Hawk's feet by the first of May will be awarded prize which will be announced later. Hawks may be killed by any method, but the game warden of this district recommends the use of small steel traps in the following manner:

Place the steel trap on top of the post commonly used by the hawks for lighting. The steel trap is to be baited with rabbit or chicken by tying to post beneath the trap. The committee has made arrangements to furnish these steel traps to those wishing to catch hawks at actual cost which is about ten cents each. These traps can be used by the purchaser for catching rats or predatory animals around the farm. The following merchants have agreed to give donations on the prize: Ed A. Noret, Dan Davis, George Canon, A. G. Barnard and any one else desiring to make a donation will please see the committee.

Edd Noret at the Army Store has agreed to sell these traps at cost and any one wishing them may see him or the committee, or if you care to enter this contest, please see the committee about this. However, it is necessary for you to register if you turn your hawks feet in by May first.

TORNADOES WINNERS OF DISTRICT CAGE TITLE

The Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes won the District basketball championship Saturday by defeating the Ropesville High team in the finals of the district tournament 35 to 27.

Ropesville's determined but erratic defending champions wilted before Lamesa's Golden Tornado in the last three minutes of play Saturday night at Texas Technological college gymnasium and the Dawson county team won the district 2 interscholastic league basket ball tournament. The score was 35 to 27.

Lamesa earned its way to the final contest by running rough shod over Shallowater 58 to 31 in a morning semifinal. Ropesville tounded the Lubbock Westerners in the other second round game 37 to 25.

Possibly Coach Gregg's purple and gold clad Lamesa, first weer impressed by Ropesville's 1932 district pennant and climb to the state semifinals. The Lamesa-Ropesville tilt was a crazy scramble from first to last, with galleries whooping and the performers themselves usually a bit frantic. There were flashes of carefully drilled defense and goal shooting but, for the most part it was instinctive play. As the game grew old the 1932 champions began to loosen and the Tornado gained in speed. Lamesa presented surprising poise those last few minutes. The Golden Tornado was composed of "money players" Saturday night and, when it seemed stonned, it swirled on through.

Sturdiant, Tornado center, tossed a goal from field in the first minute. Payne, Ropesville captain and guard retaliated to even it. The see-saw, which was not broken until the last period, began. At the quarter post, the score was 11-11. Lamesa added two points from scrimmage. Shots from all angles and positions were drumming the backboard almost constantly. Payne swished the net for two and another draw score. The Tornadoes tried a few long shots and missed. Sturdiant made a charity goal and untied it. Payne and Hitt rang the iron from the field. Ropesville led at half time 17-14.

Britt, an outstanding player, reopened with a field goal for Lamesa. Shuttling from one end of the hard wood to the other, the clubs punched at the hoops. Ropesville increased its lead. With the quintet in green and white leading 25-21, Lamesa began to venture well past center without leaving a guard behind. Britt whipped in a field goal from the side. The period ended with Ropesville safe 25-23.

Sturdiant changed that with three scrimmage shots.

The score became 29-25 with the edge Lamesa's. Ropesville's Captain Payne sank a field goal. It was 29-27. With a minute and a half to play, Gresham replaced Britt, ousted on fouls. The reserve forward shook the hoop for two points. Sturdiant did it, too. Gresham repeated to prove he was no flash in the pan. It ended there. Billy Key's champions of last season were champions no more.

Coach Pete Cawthorn of Technological college presented a gold and a silver basketball, respectively, to the captain of the winning and the runnerup club.

A Tornado forward, Britt, was high scorer of the tournament. His three game total was 47. Sturdiant and Payne tied for scoring honors in the final game with 13 points.

Warning To Boys Who Fly Kites

A warning to the parents of boys who fly kites was issued this week by officials of the Texas Electric Service Company, who called attention to the danger that is incurred by flying kites near electric wires. Serious accidents have resulted from kites becoming entangled in wires and the subsequent efforts of boys to get them down.

"Boys should be cautioned to fly kites in open places," the power company officials declared. "If kites become entangled in the electric wires, under no circumstances should boys try to get them down. The Texas Electric Service Company will gladly send out trained men who understand the dangers of high voltage current to remove the kite."

"Kites with metal frames and the use of fine wire instead of cotton string are two other great hazards, for if the metal frame or the wire string comes in contact with electric wires, serious injuries may result and electric service to a large part of town may be interrupted."

Employees of the power company may visit local schools in the near future with a verbal explanation of the hazards of kite flying.
