## Stamping Out Black Market Gas

More than 90 per cent of American motorists have endorsed their gasoline coupons, OPA said in reporting the progress made in stamping out counterfeit and stolen gas coupons. Since January 1, 926 counterfeiters, peddlers and persons who had robbed local boards were arrested, and 611 motorists who bought gasoline illegally lost their ration.

Also, 20,061 filling stations had to turn in valid coupons to make good the illegal sale of more than four million gallons of gasoline, and 1,140 other stations were denied the right to buy or sell gasoline for periods varying up to the duration of the war.

## What Joe Smith Learned About an 'Extra' Gas Coupon

The car owner who buys or uses gasoline coupons not rightfully issued to him through his local board sometimes is not aware that all such coupons come to him illegally and that most of such coupons are of criminal origin, the Office of Price Administration says.

The following case history shows what Joe Smith learned about the few "extra" coupons he picked up for an otherwise harmless fishing trip. The facts are authentic except for names and places, which have been fictionalized to prevent injury to innocent persons. The story:

On a hidden press in a small print shop somewhere in the country, one fateful gasoline coupon was printed—along with other counterfeit coupons worth thousands of gallons of gasoline. The coupons were then sent to a distribution center. There they were divided among coupon peddlers.

One peddler sold his coupons in bars to bartenders, who sold them in smaller quantities to regular customers. John Brown bought some at J. L.'s bar and remarked: "I ought to be able to make a few extra dollars on these at the shop."

At the shop, Joe Smith, a perfectly decent sort of a guy, was wishing he had extra gas to go fishing. And here was his friend, John Brown, who wanted to sell a few he didn't need. "What is the harm?" he thought. "The gas is there to use and somebody might as well have it." (Joe didn't know the coupons were counterfeit. He didn't know that 90 per cent of the coupons exchanged like this are either counterfeit or stolen.)

Joe pulled into a gasoline station and used one of these coupons to get extra gas. He didn't have the coupon endorsed in advance, so he delayed the busy station operator and then said a few unpleasant things about having to endorse it anyway.

The honest dealer checked the endorsement to see that it was the same as the license number of Joe's car. The dealer was smart and wanted to stay out of trouble. He knew that if he did take in counterfeit or stolen coupons that could not be traced, he would get no credit for them toward further gasoline purchases, his operating inventory would be reduced, and he would have to replace the invalid coupons with good ones.

The dealer pasted Joe's coupon on the "Bingo Sheet," which he gave to his supplier for more gas. The supplier deposited that sheet of gas coupons in his ration bank. At the bank, a clerk ran through the sheet to see that it was properly identified and the coupons endorsed. Then, an

The former quiet little trading post of Bellemont, on the Santa Fe Railroad, Arizona, has in recent months been converted into one of the biggest ordnance depots in the world. More than 1,500 Navajo Indians have been hired as clerks, interpreters, electricians, mechanics, chauffeurs, masons, and laborers. Into this group of Indians the Presbytery of Northern Arizona has sent a religious worker, a full-blooded Navajo, Roger Davis, who is high in the ranks of the Navajo Tribal Council. The Indians have rallied to his leadership and it is reported that the behavior around this mushroom community is exemplary. Mrs. Davis explains: "Not one Indian has been in jail for drinking... they're all afraid of my husband!"

Dr. Robert T. Henry, of Moorehead, Miss., long a Methodist leader in China, has taken over the post of executive director of the American advisory committee for the Church Committee for China Relief, with headquarters in Chungking, West China. He relieves Arnold Vaughn, who is returning to America after six years of arduous service. This Committee administers about \$400,000 annually received from American Protestant churches for humanitarian relief in China. New members recently named to the Church Committee are: Miss Sallie Lou MacKinnon of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church; Miss Ruth Ransom, Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, Reformed Church of America; Bishop A. R. Clippinger of the United Brethren in Christ; Dr. M. T. Rankin of the Southern Baptist Convention; and President P. O. Bersell of the National Lutheran Council.

As a gesture of friendship and understanding between the two nations in Asia, Dr. C. E. Abraham, Indian Christian professor in Serampore College, India, is a visiting professor at Nanking Theological Seminary, now on the campus of West China Union University, Chengtu, West China, and is speaking at many other missionary institutions in this province. Recently he lectured before the University of Nanking student body on "Christianity and Indian Culture." The government of India has also sent Indian students for post-graduate studies in Chinese schools, and one of these has been allocated to the University of Nanking.

The Summerfield Methodist Church of New Haven, Conn., is typical of a growing number of Churches that are using Sunday evenings, that might otherwise be without church services, for consideration of social, economic and human welfare questions. Recently its Sunday Evening Forum had a series of speakers on such topics as "Revolution vs. Power Politics in the Post-War World," "Anti-Semitism," "A Black Man's Peace vs. a White Man's World," "Exploring the Dangerous Trades in Wartime," "What's Wrong with the State Department," "War and the Family." Each discussion was led by an authority in that field. The Rev. J. George Butler, the pastor, has also been urging the extension of group medicine into this highly industrial city. "Adequate medical care is one of the crying needs not only of labor but of the middle class," he tells his people. "Every day in my parish I see the effects of the lack of medical attention because of the impossibility of meeting conditions imposed by the present system."

"If the church is to have any impact on the control of delinquency, its facilities must be geared to a seven-day program among its youth and adult membership," says Henry N. Pope, USO's director of services.

The Rev. C. Bertram Rappe, D. ## Navy Gunner Plays Possum and Lures Jap to Disaster

How a gunner on a Navy patrol plane lured a reluctant Japanese fighter pilot within range of a telling burst of gunfire was disclosed recently by the Navy Department in awarding the Air Medal to Martin J. Battuello, 23-year-old aviation machinist's mate first class of Calumet, Michigan.

The one-man drama was staged during a dangerous low-level bombing attack on enemy ships in Kiska Harbor. Six Zeros swarmed around the plane as the pilot pulled out of a bombing run.

One Jap in particular selected Battuello's position at the waist gun as his target. He swooped in several times, but always pulled away at a distance which showed considerable respect for the ability of the Navy air crewman. It was obvious the Jap did not desire to get too close to the Navy guns. Battuello decided to resort to theatrics.

The Jap made another pass, firing a long burst. Suddenly, Battuello's guns were silent and the Jap saw the gunner sprawl across his weapons. Eagerly, the enemy pulled up and sped into position for another run—this time to be unchallenged.

With the mid-section of the Navy plane in his sight, he roared in boldly. He was saving his fire for a sure, deadly burst. The distance closed rapidly. Battuello lay motionless across his guns.

Then, with split-second timing, Battuello sprang to life. His audience was too startled to fire at Battuello as he seized his guns and blasted point-blank at the Zero. There was a big puff of smoke and the Zero

## Youth Recreation Builds Morale

COLLEGE STATION—Recreation as an outlet for youthful energies which otherwise might graduate into delinquency is receiving practical tests in several Texas counties, according to Dosca Hale of the A. and M. College Extension Service. County home demonstration agents are cooperating with municipal officials and civic groups in planning programs for community entertainment.

A youth recreation center opened recently at Morton, Cochran County, was initiated at a public meeting called to discuss a curfew law for teen-agers. The mayor requested County Home Demonstration Agent Dorothy M. Crosslin for a suggestion and her idea of a recreation center as a solution for the problem not only was adopted but those present subscribed the nucleus of a fund to put it into operation. Finance, operations, and decoration committees, comprising adults and youths, were appointed.

The Masonic lodge volunteered the use of the ground floor of its building for the center and agreed to pay light and gas bills. Miss Crosslin was given charge of organizing the project with the assistance of the county home demonstration council and members of 4-H clubs. All furniture was donated, salvaged from junk piles, or built. Painting, carpentering and repair was done by boys and girls with the aid of the decoration committee, a local minister and the county home demonstration agent. Temporarily the finance committee plans to obtain operating funds from public donations, a basketball game and a lunch sale. Twelve civic organizations and churches agreed to furnish sponsors, the first being the home demonstration council.

On opening night, the center had been newly decorated, furnished, and equipped with table games, a piano, phonograph, and book and magazine shelves.

Miss Hale, who is a specialist in parent education and child development, reports that present high school students and recent graduates in Hansford County have organized a "Fun Club" for dancing and games several times monthly, and the Acme home demonstration club of Gregg County sponsors monthly parties for teen-age boys and girls.

## New Dope on Egg Storage

COLLEGE STATION—Recent research has caused food preservation experts to change their minds about which part of the refrigerator eggs should be stored in. Put them in the hydrator.

The studies which led to this conclusion were made by the Utah Experiment Station, according to Mrs. Winifred Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Formerly, home economists recommended that eggs be stored in wire baskets in the refrigerator.

In the project, 10 homemakers cooperated by storing refrigerated eggs in open containers, in pasteboard cartons and in hydrators. Additional eggs were stored in a kitchen cupboard. At the end of the week, the scientists found most of the eggs in the cupboard had deteriorated from Grade A to Grade C, while some were not fit to eat.

The refrigerated eggs did much better, even though the grades for them went down also. Almost half of the eggs in cartons and open containers went down to Grade C, and the remainder became Grade B. However, only five per cent of the eggs in the hydrator went down to C grade, and 96 per cent of them were Grade B at the end of the testing period.

Mrs. Leverenz explains that the hydrator probably provides the most successful storage space since eggs contain a great deal of water and they require storage that is cool, fairly moist, and free from objectionable odors and movement of air. She warns that the natural "bloom" on an egg is necessary to its keeping well, so dirty eggs should not be washed. They may be wiped with a rough dry cloth.

Incidentally, with the current surplus of eggs, Mrs. Leverenz hopes most Texas families are eating so many they need not be kept in the refrigerator long.

## Chutist Will to Jump

A Melbourne, Australia, newsman training with a parachute regiment learned that the parachutist's greatest difficulty is to develop the will to keep on jumping. The Australian News and Information Service reports. The newsman said that even after as many as six successful drops, some men found that they could not jump again.

## Woman Refugee Enlists and Frees Fighting Marine

Hongkong, Singapore, Wake, Midway, and the Philippines were once familiar to Pfc. Peggy McCain who spent most of her life in traveling and living in what are now the Pacific war areas before she joined the Women's Reserve of the U. S. Marine Corps.

Born at Fort Mills, Corregidor, Private First Class McCain left the South Pacific in 1943. She spent three years in Europe, visiting France, England, and Germany. She then returned to the Philippines where she remained until the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Before being evacuated she experienced two bombing raids in Corregidor. Enroute to Auckland, New Zealand, the troopship she was on was torpedoed, but those aboard were rescued.

From New Zealand, Private First Class McCain was sent to Australia, then to Hawaii, and finally to the United States.

Upon arrival in this country, she determined to lend her efforts to the winning of the war from which she had just escaped. She first went to work as an apprentice flight mechanic for an aircraft company in San Francisco. Then, to release a fighting Marine for combat in the South Pacific, she enlisted in the Marine Corps Women's Reserve on July 30, 1943.

Private First Class McCain is now

serving as a telephone operator at the Marine Corps Base in San Diego.

"There isn't really much I can say about my experience in the South Pacific," Private First Class McCain said. "After the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, everything happened so fast, there wasn't time to think about anything. Our one thought was to leave the battle area as soon as possible. The one emotion experienced by those being evacuated was anger. We all wanted to get to the United States as soon as possible so that we could contribute our services to averting the treachery of the Japanese."
