Pastor's Retreat Scheduled To Meet With Cisco Church

WORKERS CONFERENCE HELD WITH CHURCH AT BLAIR LAST MONTH

On December 14, 1933, the Workers' Conference of Sweetwater Association met in all-day session with the Blair Church. Moderator C. R. Joyner called attention to the fact that just one year ago, December 14, 1932, the Workers' Conference was meeting with the Blair Church.

After the morning session, a bountiful dinner was served out in the sunshine on the east side of the church. The ladies of the Blair Church proved themselves to be gracious hostesses throughout the day.

After dinner the members of the Sweetwater Associational Auxiliary convened in the church building for the monthly meeting of the executive committee. President, Mrs. C. C. Compere, presided throughout the meeting. On motion by Mrs. George L. Paxton, with second, Mrs. O. H. Cooper was elected secretary pro-tem in the absence of the recording secretary, Mrs. W. R. Derr. Mrs. W. F. Jones, Caps, opened the meeting with prayer. Mrs. Compere introduced Mrs. Johnny Walker, wife of the pastor of the Blair church. Mrs. Walker pleasantly greeted those present. Mrs. Compere in earnest words urged the women to make definite plans for their work of the coming year, and strive through divine guidance to carry out their plans, finding joy in service.

Mrs. H. J. Hanks, corresponding secretary-treasurer, explained the newly-adopted plan for sending the Lottie Moon Memorial money; namely, that each society treasurer after seeing that her church gets credit for the full amount given by her society, shall send said amount direct to Mrs. Olivia Davis, State secretary-treasurer, Dallas.

Mrs. Paxton and Mrs. Joiner, district and associational chairmen of benevolence, spoke on Buckner Orphans' Home, the great need there for money and clothing and urged as liberal an offering as possible for the orphans at Christmas time. Sweetwater, Merkel, Caps, and Sweetwater First Church, having remembered Brother.

The W. M. U. watchword for 1934, "Be Strong and of Good Courage," — "For Jehovah, Thy God is with Thee," was emphasized in the prayers, devotionals, and in many of the reports and talks.

The morning devotional, one of deep spirituality, was led by Mrs. Mack L. Wyatt, who chose as her theme, "Be Strong and of Good Courage." No less soulful was the devotional of the afternoon given by Mrs. J. A. Lunsford, who spoke on "Jehovah, Thy God is with Thee."

Mrs. George L. Paxton brought words of welcome on behalf of the hostess church. Mrs. D. C. Fulkerson, Sweetwater, responded for the visitors present.

Beautiful special music, interspersed the program. During the morning session, Mrs. J. M. Chandler and Miss Anna Morris, with Mrs. Ruby Morris Miller at the piano, sang "If I could only tell the Glory." In the afternoon Mrs. J. M. Chandler, with Mrs. Floyd Lowe accompanying, sang "How Long Must We Wait?" At the close of the hour given to Christian education, Simmons University girls' quartet, composed of Maxine Higgs, Pauline Melton, Dorothy Doughty, and Natalie McClure, delighted the audience with two numbers, "Talents," and "In the Garden."

Reports of the past quarter's work were brought by the presidents of the societies or by some designated representatives, as follows: Mrs. Jentry S. Holmes, for First Church, Abilene; Mrs. W. R. Derr, substituting for president, Mrs. J. O. Teasley, Immanuel Church, Abilene; Mrs. G. T. McDonald, representing president, Mrs. P. E. Walker, Southside Church, Abilene; Mrs. Burl Scott, Sunset Church, Abilene; Mrs. D. W. Arnette, University Church, Abilene; Mrs. W. F. Joiner brought a verbal report for the society of Caps church; Mrs. O. R. Dyer, reporting for president, Mrs. T. E. Collins, of Merkel church; report of Ovalo society, Mrs. F. A. Hollis, president, was read by the Asso-

ciational corresponding secretary, Mrs. H. J. Hanks; President, Mrs. R. C. Crane, brought a message from Sweetwater First church society; verbal report was made for Lamar Street church society, President, Mrs. Ed. Burks, for Trent; Mrs. R. F. England, president, from Tye; and Mrs. J. Reynolds, president, brought a message from Tuscola society.

The high points of these reports were: The observance of the Lottie Moon Week of Prayer by the missionary societies and junior organizations, resulting in increased attendance, renewed consecration and more generous giving; boxes of good clothing and cash offerings at Christmas were sent to Buckner Orphans Home; the remembrance of our Associational ministerial beneficiary, Rev. A. A. Lee and wife, with love, money and clothing at Thanksgiving and Christmas-time; interest and contributions growing in the 100,000 Club; increase in subscriptions to Baptist Standard and missionary magazines; number of tithers growing; and a more hopeful outlook for the work of the young people's organizations. The general tone of these reports and discussions of them showed a deeper realization of the privilege of being "laborer together with God."

DR. WALT JOHNSON SCHEDULED TO SPEAK ON DAILY PROGRAM

A series of Pastor's Retreats, four in number, to be held in the period of January 15 to March 2, have been announced by Secretary J. Howard Williams. The first of these retreats will be held at Sulphur Springs, beginning January 15 and continuing through January 19. The other retreats will be held at Beaumont, Cisco, and San Marcos, the exact dates and the programs to be announced later.

Dr. Walt N. Johnson, said to be one of the greatest living exponent of Stewardship, is to appear on the program of each of the meetings.

At the Sulphur Springs retreat Dr. J. M. Dawson of Waco, Dr. Walter H. McKinzie of Austin and Dr. Wallace Bassett of Dallas will deliver lectures each day.

These retreats held last year proved to be great spiritual feasts to the pastors of Texas. The entire time is spent in fellowship, prayer, Bible study and old time preaching and singing.

Finishing Enlistment Campaign

Secretary Williams in a general communication sent to the pastors this week, urges the churches to wind up the enlistment campaign, with the end in view of enlisting every church to contribute to the general denominational work once each month; or at least to contribute to the program quarterly, or semi-annually.

The secretary is optimistic over the prospects for the coming year. He calls attention to the fact that over 20,000 baptisms were reported by 79 of the 107 associations in the recent summer evangelistic campaign; and over \$97,000 given by Texas Baptists to Foreign Missions last Southern Baptist convention year.

"It is my candid opinion," he states, "that we face a great year. I cannot help believing we are going to write unusual history. We will not be bewildered by the present confusion of the world. Expedients and stratagems may ease things momentarily, but the world will never know peace and prosperity until the principles of the Kingdom of God are permitted to operate."

POPULAR PASTOR OF DE LEON CHURCH GOES TO TEXARKANA

Because he was tendered an invitation to come to Texarkana at a splendid promotion in every way, Rev. David M. Phillips, pastor of the De Leon Baptist church, resigned his pastorate here Sunday at 11:00 o'clock, and will take up his duties with the Texarkana church the first Sunday in January.

Rev. Phillips and his wife came to De Leon in July, 1932. The 18 months they lived in De Leon were fruitful months for them and also for the De Leon church. During his pastorate here 130 names were added to the church roll, and a financial budget of approximately \$4,000.00 raised, which included the payment of a debt of approximately \$750.00 on the splendid brick parsonage.—De Leon Free Press.

Divorce and Nudism Threaten Home, Says Dallas High School Principal

Sex irregularity, divorce, nudism and the attitude of the Russian Government were denounced as enemies of the home by E. B. Comstock, principal of North Dallas High School, in speaking before the Parent-Teachers' Association of Vickery Place School Thursday evening.

As discussing "Safeguarding the Home," Mr. Comstock widened the range of his shafts to include the fecundity of idiots, immigration from Southern Europe, racial mixture, and ideas which he attributed to an unnamed American Judge and to the British Earl, Bertrand Russell.

"We are in a state of chaos," he declared. "Fireside affection is coming to be looked upon as passe and the marriage vow as something archaic. Chastity and modesty are being cast aside to a great extent. The bacchanalian dances of old Rome have been revived here in America in nudist colonies. Our homes are being threatened with ruin."

"The danger of our present system is shown by the number of divorces. In 1932 we had one divorce for every five marriages. In North Dallas High School one student in every five comes from a broken home. No other nation in the world, pagan or Christian, has a record such as that."

"The home is the place where romance culminates, and there romance should stop. No aspiration is more noble than that to have a home of one's own."

"In America we have paid little attention to the kind of racial stock we are producing. There are in this country 10,000,000 people who never will be able to write because they are subnormal. The morons and idiots are reproducing faster than the Harvard graduates. Only 52 per cent of the women in 'Who's Who in America' are married, and of fifty outstanding women leaders named by Ida Tarbell only five have children."

"We are like ancient Greece and Rome in that we allow the lower classes to rear the children."

The above story, which appeared in Sunday's issue of the Dallas News, is of special significance, coming as it does from a prominent school man, not a preacher. It is a hopeful sign when outstanding laymen over the country begin to speak out at the meetings of civic organizations.

One of the many nice Christmas presents sent to Buckner Orphans Home was a carload of beef sent by the rugged cowmen of the Pecos country. A plea was made to the First Baptist Church, Pecos, by Pastor E. H. Ratliff, which resulted in the sending of a car of fat cattle to the children. The Texas and Pacific Railway transported the car from Pecos to Dallas free.

The children of the Eliasville church of which the editor is pastor, enjoyed sending a Christmas box to the orphans home. A nice cash offering was also sent in by the church. The Eliasville church in adopting its budget included only local causes, with the understanding that outside causes are to be cared for in four special offerings. Two already taken include the co-operative program and orphans home. The other two will include an offering for Christian Education and another offering for the Fall round-up.

A Midland cowman has estimated that it takes nearly a half ton of cow hides to buy a pair of fancy shoes. This ranchman bought a pair of shoes for \$5.00, and sold a calf hide weighing twenty-five pounds for thirty cents. Believe it or not at this rate it would take the skins of 16.6 calves or 415 pounds of hides to buy a \$5.00 pair of shoes.

Rev. Roger Baxter of Arkansas was with Pastor J. L. Roden and the Gorman church and filled the pulpit on Sunday morning of Christmas eve. At the morning hour an offering was made for Buckner Orphans Home.

The Fisher County Association sent a car load of feed to the Orphans Home during the holidays.

The Rotan church held a Christmas eve service in the form of a song sermon. This type of worship is growing in favor all over the country.

The church at Pecos had a Christmas pageant, "Christ's Message to the World." The wise men, the shepherds, Bethlehem, the angels, the Nativity, and the interspersed of Christmas songs, gave a real Yuletide atmosphere to the congregation.

Reliable information is at hand indicating that two-thirds of New York's 329 hotels are bankrupt. Some of the biggest financiers in the land became investors in the colossal Waldorf-Astoria and encouraged others of small means to invest in this and other hotels. It is estimated that \$5,024,000,000 are invested in hotels throughout the country. Before the depression this was yielding 26 per cent on the investment. Now a majority of the hotels cannot pay interest on their mortgages. And yet these men criticize the churches because some of them contracted debts that they cannot pay. The facts are that the churches represent, as a class, the safest and best investments, and those that are hopelessly in debt are usually in their sad plight because business men encouraged over-building.—Arkansas Methodist.

The general chairmen of committees reporting were: Benevolence, Mrs. W. F. Joiner; Relief and Annuity, Mrs. J. R. Fielder; Personal Service, Mrs. Z. C. Steakley; Periodicals, Mrs. Ellis Martin; and Librarian, Mrs. Elton Rhodes.

Mrs. Mrs. J. E. Burnam, in bringing her report on Mission Study, submitted a recommendation which was unanimously adopted, namely, that the Sweetwater Associational W. M. U. shall hold an associational mission study institute at the Southside Baptist church, Abilene, on Thursday, February 15, 1934. In order that the women of the hostess church may not be encumbered with too much serving, it was voted to ask each woman attending to bring a covered dish for the noon lunch.

Mrs. E. D. Dunlap, Associational young people's leader being absent, her report was read by Mrs. D. C. Fulkerson. This report showed growth along several lines.

Perhaps the only low note sounded throughout the day's session pertained to the oft-repeated failure on the part of those whose duty it is to send the specified reports containing the information which is so vitally necessary for the carrying forward of W. M. U. work.

Mrs. H. J. Hanks, the efficient and dependable corresponding secretary-treasurer, submitted her quarterly report and gave the society presidents the amounts of their new apportionments, which were accepted as read. Mrs. Hanks' report appears in full in this issue.

The executive committee, meeting in session during the noon hour, recommended, and it was voted by the Auxiliary, to have the District and Associational expense fund paid twice annually, in October and February—each society member paying, if possible, 50 cents per year to this fund. Recommendation number two was also adopted. This recommendation provides that each society president shall ascertain from the treasurer of her church the full amount given by the W. M. U. of her church to the co-operative program during the past year, and, if possible, increase this amount ten per cent during the current associational year, October 1, 1933, to October 1, 1934.

Mrs. N. A. Moore, after giving her report on Christian Education, introduced Dr. D. M. Wiggins, Dean of Students of Simmons university. Dr. Wiggins, in his address, convincingly portrayed the high standards of scholarship and character building, the dominant characteristics of the work of this institution.

Miss Stella McCullough, Superintendent of Nurses at the West Texas Baptist Hospital, Abilene, told most interestingly of some of the work being done there, paying a high tribute to the efficiency of the present corps of nurses under her supervision.

Mrs. W. C. Ashford closed her report on Missions with the introduction of Miss Blanche Rose Walker, thirty years a missionary in Kaifeng, China, now in the homeland on a year's furlough. Miss Walker's talk was one of great spiritual uplift, coming from the heart of one who lives the completely surrendered life to the Master's will.

Mrs. D. C. Fulkerson, chairman of resolutions, in happily chosen words, expressed on behalf of the visitors, appreciation of the many courtesies extended.

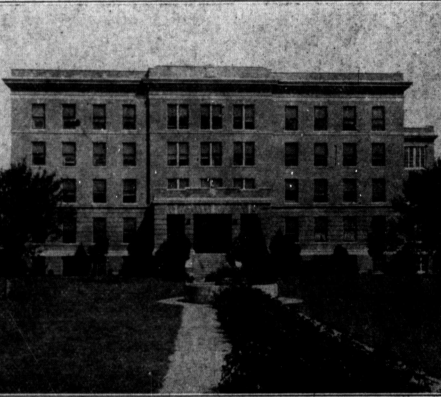

First choice was given to a volume called "Sermons for Everyday Living," written by A. W. Beaven, president of Colgate-Rochester seminary, New York City, and also president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

The book given second rating was written by a Texas minister, Rev. R. C. Campbell, pastor of the First Baptist church at Lubbock. The title is "Modern Evils."

The committee's third choice was "Christianity and Communism," written by H. G. Wood, well known English author and lecturer on New Testament at Selly Oak college, Birmingham, England.

Gets Honorable Mention

Honorable mention for January went to "Our Movie-Made Children." The volume is a digest of a six-volume report of a committee working under auspices of the Payne Foundation, a large fund dedicated to promotion of the welfare of the youth of the nation.

The Book-of-the-Month committee was organized last summer for the purpose of promoting a better class of reading in religious circles.

Curriculum Revision Study To Be Offered At Simmons

Simmons university will offer work in curriculum revision during the coming summer session, announces Dr. D. M. Wiggins, head of the local department of education. The local university will cooperate with the state department of education in its recently launched program for revision of curricula in elementary and secondary schools in Texas.

Following recent meeting of education professors of Texas colleges, at which a report was made by the commission on the curriculum, the state department insisted that all colleges and universities offering teacher training courses place this work on the summer schedule for 1934. This move is in line with the program to revise curricula in the public schools of Texas.

To Train Teachers

"The first step in this movement," said Dr. Wiggins, who attended the meeting at Austin on December 21, "is to train teachers and administrators. The state department is insisting that all teacher training institutions offer during the summer of 1934 courses orienting teachers and administrative officers in curriculum revision."

"This is a statewide movement to revise the offerings of elementary and secondary schools for functional purposes and particular emphasis is being placed on revision by the Oil Belt Educational association."

Principal L. E. Dudley of Abilene high school, president of the Oil Belt association, has announced that the entire program of the spring meeting of that body, to be held in Big Spring on March 16 and 17, will be turned over to the study of curricula. Thus teachers of this section of the state are taking the lead in this statewide movement.

In conjunction with the work to be offered this summer, Dr. Wiggins said that in all probability a conference of superintendents and principals of this section would be held at Simmons during the summer for the purpose of discussing this problem.
