Jaycee Hijinks In Jail

Three Jaycees—Bob Reilly, Allen Worley and Dr. John Chinn—talk through the bars of a County Jail cell to County Attorney Frank Ginzle and Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory. They were jailed for an hour Wednesday in jovial Jaycee hijinks that started with disappearance of a goat bequeathed to Jaycees who do not secure a member in their current membership drive. Worley, Jaycee president, all in a joke got Reilly and Chinn jailed for goat theft and then landed in jail with them when a complaint showed up against him for malicious evidence. All three were late for State Jaycee President Jack Miller's luncheon visit in Civic House, where, incidentally, Sheriff Gregory and Deputy Lewis Claxton were special guests.

5 CASES RESET IN OCTOBER

County Court Docket Has 5 Guilty Pleas

Five defendants pleaded guilty this week when a 12 case criminal docket was called in County Court.

Five cases were continued until next month and two more, both on appeal from Municipal Court, were returned to City Hall jurisdiction.

Entering pleas of guilty were Santiago Lujan, Floyd Wilson Iglehart, Travis Autry Witten, J. N. McKinney and Eduardo O. Rodriguez.

Rodriguez received a 15-day jail sentence and \$100 fine for transporting whiskey, beer and wine. He was arrested Tuesday by State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger.

Jailed for 10 days and fined \$25 was J. N. McKinney, who pleaded guilty to swindling by worthless check.

McKinney, charged with a man identified as Sam Courtney, admitted signing a worthless \$25 check which was cashed recently at Morgan's Drive-In Grocery by a 13-year-old juvenile already on probation for delinquency.

McKinney told the court he got none of the money and that the juvenile asked to cash the check. However, the boy said the man told him to cash it.

New charges will be filed later against the boy in Juvenile Court, County Attorney Frank Ginzle said. The other defendant, Courtney, has not been apprehended.

Temperature Stays Above 90 Degrees

Summer temperatures continued to hang on during the last week with Monday's coolest day with 89 degrees.

PROFIT REPORTED

County Fair Ends Season in 'Black'

Mitchell County Fair completed its 1959 run in the black, financially speaking.

Raymond Perdue, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee which sponsors the fair, reported the fair's financial picture Saturday.

The fair, according to the chamber's financial report, took in \$1,236.08 from all sources and paid out \$1,231.52 in expenses for a profit of \$4.56.

Major income was \$519.07 from concession prizes and equipment, \$411.02 from concession commissions, \$153 from commercial exhibit space, \$69.99 from other income, and \$83 in accounts receivable.

Sanchez, driving while intoxicated, Oct. 17; Alberto Lujan, contributing to delinquency of a minor, Oct. 16; Ophelia Jackson, possession of alcoholic beverages for purpose of sale, Oct. 14; Gerald Lee Lackey, appeal on speeding case from Municipal Court, Oct. 13.

Dismissed and returned to Municipal Court where they had been found guilty were appeal cases of Joe Royce Baker, charged with speeding, and Donald Ralph Kennedy, charged with abusive language. Each paid city fines and Kennedy had added expense of County Court costs.

New charges filed in County Court are against Manuel M. Selvera, charged with driving while intoxicated after arrest by Highway Patrolman Elmer Rogers, and Bobby C. Welch, charged with driving with worthless \$10 check on an Abilene bank made payable to W. A. Alexander last month.

Kids Day Event Set for Saturday

Kids Day comes up again on the calendar Saturday.

That means another full day of free fun for all youngsters of the community, courtesy of Colorado City Kiwanis.

Ed Rothwell, chairman for the local Kids Day observance, said the Saturday program will include free movies, free ice cream, parade with cash prizes in seven different judging classes, pet show with cash prizes in seven categories, and other attractions.

Opening event will be the 9 a. m. movie in Palace Theatre, arranged by Kiwanis through the cooperation of Bill Duckett, local manager here for Rowley United Theatres.

The ice cream treat will be the morning following, the movie, according to Rothwell.

Youngsters are requested to report at 1:30 p. m. Saturday for the parade, which will begin in front of Civic House. Best entries will receive prizes.

There will be seven separate judging divisions in the parade — kids in costume (walking), kids with pets, pulled vehicles, small riding vehicles, bicycles, organized groups such as Cub Scouts, Brownies, Scouts, Girl Scouts and other horses.

Prizes will be \$2 for first, \$1 for second and \$1 for third in all of the classes except the groups. And the cash awards to groups will be \$4 for first, \$2 each for second and third.

In the pet show at Court-house, which follows the parade, prizes in each judging class will be \$2 for first, \$1 for second and \$1 for third. The judging classes will be for cats, dogs, barnyard fowls, household fowls, reptiles (snakes, lizards, frogs, horned toads, etc.), barnyard animals and wild animals.

County Logs New Drilling Site, Oiler

One new producer and another drilling site have been logged in Mitchell County oil fields.

Completed as an oiler in Turner-Grady (Clear Fork) Field is Theiss Drilling Company No. 3 Lasseter with daily pumping potential of 66.38 barrels of 26 gravity oil plus 9 per cent water.

Production was from perforations between 2,603 and 2,796 feet over total depth of 2,855 feet after treatment with 20,000 gallons of fluid and 55,000 pounds of sand.

Site of the oiler is 330 feet from north and 1,650 feet from east lines of Section 24, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Spotted as a new drilling site is C. D. Turner of Big Spring No. 1 A. L. Wilson, a 3,500 rotary test in Westbrook Field.

The project will be two miles northwest of Westbrook on a 160-acre lease at a site 330 feet from north and 330 feet from west lines of Section 46, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

FUMBLES HURT C-CITY

Wolves Shoved Aside By Ballinger, 20-0

It happened just the way the coaches hoped it wouldn't. Colorado City moved quickly into the offensive gear, striking deeply into Ballinger territory. First to the 10-yard line, then to the three and the five.

But fumbles, dad, knocked the Wolves for a loop down there in the shadow of touchdown goal posts.

Then, Ballinger — with the churning legs of hefty Dalton Hoffman and David Brevard began to recover from two successive defeats.

Reeling and off balance, the Wolves messed up with blocking and tackling too.

Then, it was 20 to 0, Ballinger.

The last touchdown by the Bearcats by the pass route just as the final whistle sounded.

That's the way it ended. Colorado City's second defeat in two non-conference tries; Ballinger's first in three attempts.

The loss was a disappointing debut for a Coach Otis Holladay's coached team before hometown fans. But the coaches had worried all week about whether the Wolves could score early, get the Bearcats on the run.

They feared the bruising ability of three 170-pounders in the Ballinger backfield as the game wore on.

And the second half Friday night proved they weren't just whistling in the dark.

For Coach Cedric Bettis' Bearcats took control, for the most part, in the last two quarters. They scored twice in the third. Once more in the fourth.

They ran 21 plays from scrimmage in the fatal third to only 11 for Colorado City.

The only time the Wolves crossed the mid field stripe into Ballinger territory in the second half was midway in the fourth period . . . and then only to the 48 where the ball was lost by another fumble.

Colorado City, heads up at the start, moved into Ballinger territory four plays after the opening kickoff when the Wolves recovered a punt that bounced against Ballinger Center Eugene Halman.

The Wolves took over on the Ballinger 47. Three first downs, with a ground offense built mostly around tailback Jerry McKay, put C-City on the Ballinger 10. Then, Don Vest fumbled at the line of scrimmage and Ballinger recovered.

Just a few minutes later tackle Joe Weaver stormed through to block Ballinger punt and Bill Newell recovered on the Bearcat 3.

But quarterback Jay Shiner was tossed for a loss back to the eight. Vest regained to the 54 over the left side. Then it happened again, the Wolves fumbled and Ballinger recovered.

They never came close again. In fact, for the rest of the first half neither team threatened. And all total, for the first two quarters C-City had a net ground gain of 40 yards and Ballinger had 69.

In the second half, Ballinger took over. In fact, C-City had the ball on offense only one play—just time enough

LORAIN — Loraine Bulldogs led the Coahoma Bulldogs on a merry chase Friday night and came out victori-

ous, 24 to 19. The game almost became a midnight ramble when electric power failure kept the Loraine field in darkness.

However, the game was transferred to Hermleigh in an emergency move and finally started about 9 p. m. Loraine opened scoring in second quarter when halfback Gary Parnell ran the final 10 yards of a long drive. And Rankin plunged over for the first of his three 2-pointers after touchdowns, making the score 8 to 0.

In the third quarter, Loraine scored again for a 2-touchdown lead. This time Parnell intercepted a pass and ran 30 yards for the score. Rankin again contributed 2 points to increase the lead to 16 to 0.

But Coahoma retaliated in the third when Aubrey Darden, right half, darted 35 yards down the field's center for a touchdown almost untouched. Coahoma trailed 16 to 6 after its extra point try failed.

First touchdown in the fourth quarter was a repeat performance of Coahoma's previous score, with Aubrey Darden taking the ball down the center of the field and making the score with an

other 35-yard run. Score: 16 to 12.

Loraine scored again in the third quarter. Marcum handed the ball to Parnell, who ran 35 yards to make Loraine's final score. Rankin's 2 points made it 24 to 12.

Final score of the game was made by Coahoma's statue of liberty play, with less than one minute of the game remaining. Again, Darden did the running which amounted to 45 yards. The extra point kick was good as Coahoma gained its only extra point of the game.

Mrs. Edwards is a niece of Mrs. J. W. Hill.

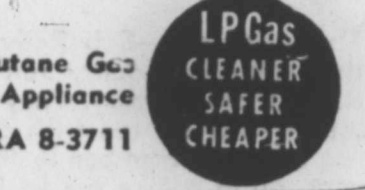

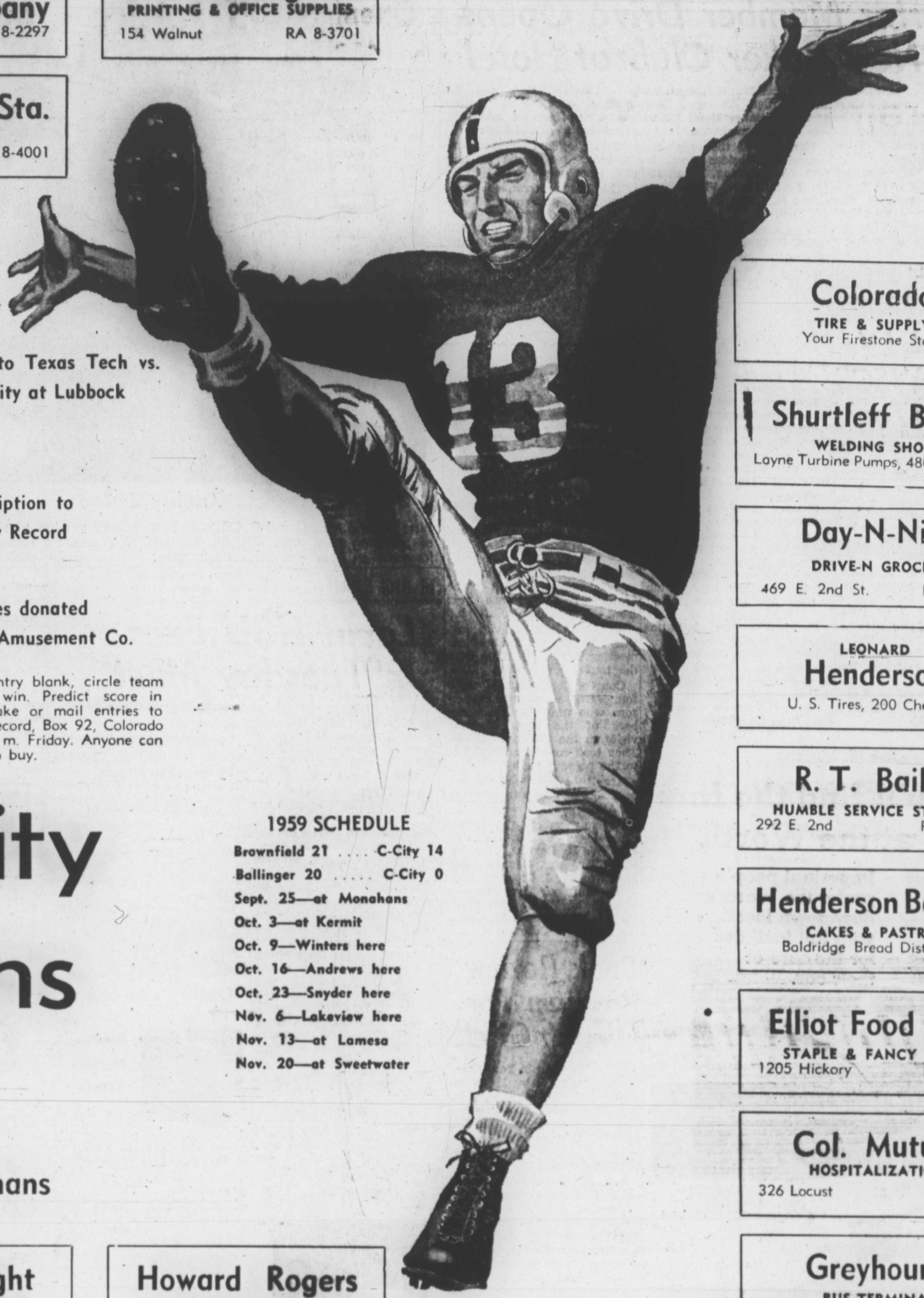

Charter Member Drive Opens For New Baker Club at Hotel

Formation of a new social and recreational club for Colorado Citizens — the Baker Club — was announced Friday by Charles Root, chairman of the organizing committee.

A drive for charter members was also launched from "campaign headquarters" in the Baker Hotel lobby — an effort which will continue for an indefinite period, it was announced.

Chartered as a nonprofit Texas corporation, the Baker Club is leasing the swimming pool, Green Room (to be re-

named the Mural Room), and the Garden Terrace Room from the Baker Hotel for the use of club members.

Members of the organizing committee, besides Root, are Mrs. Joe Gunning, Frank Kelley, Farris Lipps, Virgil Moser, Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson and Joe Bell.

A complete program of social, cultural and recreational activities for all segments of the club's membership is being planned, according to Root — poolside dining (through hotel facilities), dancing, bingo, bridge tournaments, game nights, book reviews, private luncheon parties, family dinners, plus assorted activities for children and teenagers.

Because of the availability of both the Mural and Garden Terrace Rooms, on the ground floor of the hotel different types of activities for members can be conducted separately and simultaneously, Root said.

Charter members — those applicants who are approved before Oct. 1 — will be admitted at half the cost of the regular initiation fee.

Three types of membership are being offered by the club at these fees and dues (including federal tax):

Resident — \$50 initiation fee, \$12 monthly dues;

Non-residents (persons living outside a 50-mile radius of Colorado City) — \$30 initiation fee, \$6 monthly dues.

Firm (for two or more persons from the same company)

— \$120 initiation fee, \$24 monthly dues for two, with a scale in effect for additional members from the firm.

Thus, a charter member's initiation fee would be only \$30, Root pointed out.

The Mural Room is to be redecorated and equipped with special lockers for members' use. In keeping with room's name, a round-the-walls mural will be installed (a gift to the club from Ed Baker of Fort Worth, owner of the hotel) which will depict the history of Colorado City from its beginning to the present day.

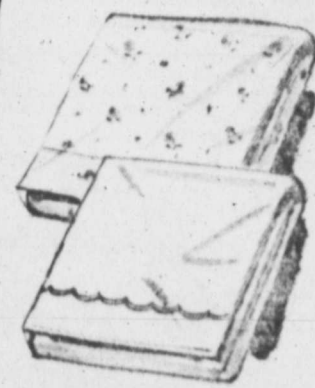

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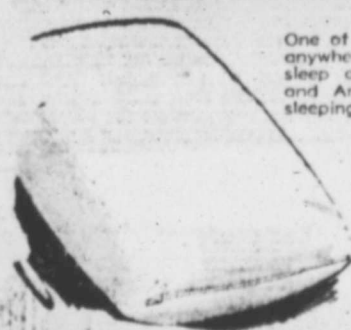

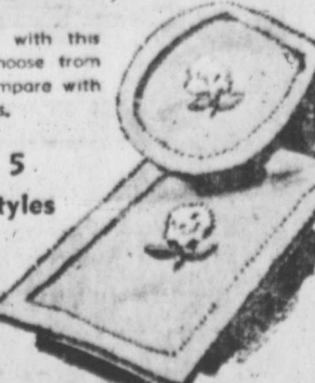

I noticed this week Mrs. America said in an interview with the press she would like the opportunity to invite Premier Nikita Khrushchev to visit her "typical" American home.

It started me to wonder about what Mr. Khrushchev's reaction to a visit of this kind would be, as he viewed the "typical" American home with its dozens of modern devices to save the 1959 mother hours of labor.

Here, we have our electric washers and dryers, to work for us while we read, our automatic ovens to turn our meals out while we visit, seek careers, play bridge. Industry works round the clock to make things easier for the American housewife. All these things, and many more, we in America learn to expect as a matter of course.

Yes, this I would like Mr. Khrushchev to see. It would be good propaganda.

But then I wonder... would he be able to see beyond all this—beyond the material coating of the electric blanket, the push-button house, the eight cylinder car. Would he see something else beyond the physical? If so, then I would tend to wince.

He might find here the key to our restlessness, our uneasiness. If he could, then the propaganda wouldn't be so good for he might see us caught up in a hurly-burly life of existence... our rushing, running here and there... never fast enough for our peers nor even ourselves. Rushing even our children in a frantic effort to get everything done which is expected of us in a 24-hour period.

We're caught—not always of our own choosing—in a cycle sometimes of working too hard and long for the mere physical aspects of life.

Then, would we really want him to visit our "typical" American home? Do our lives reflect the spiritual peace we claim to have? Or are we too busy doing everything... but seeking peace within ourselves?

And if we are, how can we possibly seek it for a nation?
