### Large Crowd Saw Lobos Whip Kangaroos, 25 to 0

It took the Cisco Lobos a quarter and a half to overcome a combination of their own fumbles and a stubborn Weatherford defense Friday night at Chesley Field and start scoring, but from that moment until the game ended 25 to 0 for Cisco there wasn't any doubt of the outcome. The Lobos scored four touchdowns and one point after their total, and registered eight first downs to four for the visitors.

But mid-way of the first period, after a promising Cisco drive had bogged down in errors, it looked as though the scrapping Kangaroos were going to capture initial scoring honors. Cisco had fumbled the opening kickoff, fumbled the first attempted running play and was forced to kick from the Lobo six.

The Cisco line rose up on its own 32 and held the threat with a net loss to Weatherford of three yards and Tipton brought the Kangaroo punt out to his 14 yard line, from which point Cisco got up steam. Tipton plunged for three, Harrelson ran 18 yards around right and Sauls picked up 15 more in a left end ramble. Old Man Fumble set the Cisco boys back four yards from this point and two five-yard gains left them a deficit of four yards on fourth down. Sauls downed Jackson of the Kangaroos in a punt return on the Weatherford 25, which looked safe enough, but on the very first play of the Kangaroo series, Griffin broke into the open for a 50-yard gallop to Cisco's 25 where Tipton finally dragged him down. It was Weatherford's most spectacular play of the game.

The threat was dissipated by Randall and King, and Weatherford's pass try on fourth down with 11 yards to go, was batted down by Tipton, Cisco taking over. Cisco started going again on Harrelson's 17-yard run, but was forced to punt when another miscue lost five yards, the quarter ending without a score.

#### First Touchdown.

Cisco scored its first touchdown on a running attack that clicked from Weatherford's 43. Tipton started the drive with a sparkling 20-yard gallop around right end and Harrelson carried to the 13 yard in a slashing off tackle thrust. Tipton cracked center for seven and Farley, blocking back, who holds down one of the most difficult assignments on the team, plunged five yards to the one yard stripe, from which point Harrelson, who scored three of the Cisco touchdowns, plunged over.

The Cisco line, with Noble, right tackle, Hill, right guard, Pence, right end, Fields, center, and Penn, left tackle, nobly assisted by King, snubbing at left end for Williams, and Randall, replacing Baum at left guard, smothered Weatherford's subsequent offensive consistently, so that the Kangaroos lost as much as they gained.

#### King a Power.

King was almost personally responsible for the second Lobo touchdown when, in the third

quarter, he blocked a Weatherford punt, recovered on the five yard line, and then took a short pass and dragged his tackler over the goal line. Johnson, snubbing at leftback for Tipton, who was injured after playing a bang-up game, tossed passes to Harrelson for the next two scores. Harrelson took the first in the end zone near the last of the third quarter, and he scored the fourth touchdown in a spectacular 55-yard gallop after Johnson had found him with a right zone pass.

Pence, Cisco end, accounted for the only point after touchdown when he booted the final try squarely between the uprights, to bring the final Cisco score to 25.

#### Second String Enters.

The Cisco second stringers took over after this score with half a quarter playing time, and Weatherford produced its second and most serious threat of the game. The neophytes, mixing plenty of fight with blunders of over-eagerness, gained glory enough when they successfully withstood a drive to their four-yard line and took over on their 12 as the game ended. Twice they drew 15-yard penalties for unnecessary roughness, and they fumbled their offense consistently, but they kept the slate clean for Cisco, and their appearance was one of the most entertaining features of the contest. Coach Fischer made it clear that the future Lobos were on their own, win, lose or draw in their portion of the game, and the kids dug their cleats into the sod and delivered.

The Lobos face their most difficult assignment of the season so far when they meet the high-powered and undefeated Brownwood Lions at Brownwood next Friday night.

Saturday's mail brought the Daily Press a letter from overseas that concerns a Cisco girl, Miss Gloria Graham, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E. L. Graham, who has been abroad for sometime with a group of USO entertainers of the armed forces. The writer, Radio Officer Lou Batch of the USS. Hames Shields, had the following to say of the Cisco young woman, a gifted musician:

Batangas, Philippines, October 14, 1945.  
The Daily Press,  
Cisco, Texas.

"Upon glancing at the heading of this note, 'Men from your home town,' it may surprise you people of Cisco, Texas, to find me mentioning Miss Gloria Graham. Here is a little information you folks at home may like to hear concerning Gloria and what she has been doing for the past five months.

"Gloria attended TCU and then went to New York to study music. She was working on a music scholarship when she volunteered her services under the USO to go overseas and entertain the armed forces. She obtained her leave of absence with three other music students, Genevieve Kniester of Indiana, Shirley Mesmer of New York and Margaret Purvis of Vancouver, B. C. In the short time these girls have been overseas, they have presented their girl string quartet at Honolulu, Guam, Saipan, Tinian, Iwo, Palau and Batangas.

"I witnessed their performance at the Hill Top club (A.R.C.) in Batangas. After their much-acclaimed presentation I was forced to use 'grapevine' telegraph to obtain enough information about a Texas girl, for I was very quickly pushed aside by an overwhelming crowd of admiring GIs. Through it all, Gloria presented a charming picture of femininity that was eagerly accepted by the men stationed here in Batangas, awaiting their assignments to Japan or home. Gloria was the first woman to be seen wearing civilian clothes, and you can well understand the reason for the men to crowd around and talk of home. I was indeed greatly surprised to hear an affected southern-Texas drawl issue from men that came from as far north as the Mason-Dixon Line, just to talk with Gloria and to have her talk to them.

"People of Cisco, Texas: Gloria is shining well for your city and state and after she returns to New York to complete her music scholarship, she will return to you with stories much more entertaining than I would be allowed space to relate."

### Hayes to Fly to Gatesville For Funeral Service

Dr. Lawrence Hayes, preaching in the revival at Cisco First Baptist church and pastor of Gatesville First Baptist church, will be called home this afternoon for the funeral of L. B. Brown, prominent Gatesville citizen, who died suddenly there Friday night. The trip will be made by plane.

### House and Senate Conferees Agree on Tax Reduction

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—House and Senate conferees compromised a dispute over corporate tax relief today and agreed on legislation to give \$5,920,000,000 in individual and business tax cuts next year.

Both houses are expected to approve the conference recommendations early next week, although the bill proposed tax reductions nearly \$1,000,000,000 above the limit suggested by the administration.

The conferees agreed on a bill which would cut individual income taxes by \$2,644,000,000 in 1946 and corporate tax liabilities by \$3,336,000,000. The \$5 auto use tax will be repealed, but excise tax rates will remain at present levels.

Under the compromise, 12 million taxpayers will be relieved of all income tax liability next year and surtax rates will be reduced three percentage points, with a new graduated scale ranging from 17 to 88 per cent replacing the present scale of 20 to 91.

### Learning to Fly Has Been Made Easier Recently

Learning to fly, obtaining a license, and enjoying the airplane, have been made easier through changes in the civil air regulations, says Joe Coulter, manager of the Cisco airport. Seven recent changes are as follows:

1. Flight Examiners appointed by the C.A.A. may now give private pilot flight tests.
2. Certified instructors may now give private pilot written examinations.
3. Any registered physician may give the physical examination for a private pilot.
4. Minimum age for private pilot certificate has been reduced from 18 to 17.
5. Meteorology and navigation are no longer included in the private pilot's written examination.
6. Spirals, simulated forced landings and several coordination exercises have been eliminated from the flight tests of private pilots, and the required angles of bank in power turns have been lowered.
7. Logging of every flight is no longer required.

#### G-M MAKES OFFER.

DETROIT, Oct. 27 (UP)—General Motors tonight for the first time asked the CIO United Auto Workers to accept a 45-hour work week during the reconversion period. The company offered as inducement a six per cent wage increase.

### THIS DIZZY WORLD.

There are two ways of looking at the unprecedented wars which have swept the world in these last few years. The most common view, perhaps, is that we have just been going through another of the periods of general unrest which seem to sweep large regions of the world from time to time, very much as physical plagues did in past centuries. But it may have been, and may still be, much more than that.

These last wars, forced upon mankind by predatory groups, with particular emphasis on the Germans and Japanese, may be regarded, perhaps, as literally a "War for the World." From it the more law-abiding groups, which include the United States of

America and most of our western nations, have barely escaped.

Even yet we are not secure against large, half-civilized groups of mankind who would disregard law and order for their own imagined benefit.

It is not only a small world, with our deceptive modern transportation and scientific knowledge and the material power now available, but it is a very precarious world, with moral hazards. And probably never, since man's cherished dream of Eden arose, has the fate of mankind been so unpredictable.

### THE WELL-MENDED SHOE.

The shopper going forth to buy a new pair of shoes this autumn will be disappointed in the selections available. Shoe dealers are pinched by a shortage of footwear which will not be likely to let up for several months. Manufacturers report that the factories are not retooling rapidly. Many retailers think rationing should continue indefinitely, fearing that if it were lifted a wave of buying would clean out the existing limited stocks.

Officials are finding it difficult to make decisions about the end of rationing. Many housewives, however, prefer to let rationing controls come off gradually. They will welcome the day when there are no more. Who wouldn't? But their common sense, applied to the experience of these rationing years, inclines them to the belief that gradual relaxation works better. One extra shoe stamp before

the end of the year, for example, might turn out to be more satisfactory than complete freedom coming before stocks are adequate to take care of it.

Wise women are having the family shoes resoled and heeled while awaiting the final word. A mended shoe is always better than a run-down one, even if there is a new pair in the closet.
