Bids Awarded On City's Civic Center

The meeting was arranged by officials of Texas Electric Service Co., after TESCO learned that Colorado City is desperately in need of more housing.

In a surprise move, the city council of Colorado City Monday night accepted the highest of four bids to build the city's new civic center at 2nd & Oak.

consisted of precast concrete panels with the walls being five inches thick.

Sadler recommended to the council that the bid of B. D. Click be accepted because he believed that this was the best building for Colorado City's needs.

was taken representatives of Speed Fab-Crete and CRS Construction protested, saying that Click's bid was not accompanied by a bid bond.

The need for new housing has become increasingly evident over the past few years as every house in town is now occupied.

The contract was awarded to B. D. Click Construction of Abilene with a bid of \$148,470. B. D. Click was represented at the bid opening and letting by David Allen who said construction should start immediately and will take some 150 days to complete.

The building bid by B. D. Click was a standard type building with 12-inch solid masonry walls out of mission stone with a beefed up foundation.

The buildings bid by CRS Construction and Speed Fab-Crete

A power failure at Texas Electric Service Company's substation on the east side of Colorado City near the cemetery occurred Monday morning at 7:03 a.m. and lasted about an hour, leaving Colorado City and part of the surrounding area without electric service.

Insulators and fuses at the sub-station were blown when a cat got into the lower level of the station. Servicemen restored service about an hour later, gathering up pieces of wires and insulators and re-using the sub-station.

Trash Problems Discussed

Trash containers, blowing trash and purchase of a new garbage truck were topics discussed by Colorado City businessmen in a special meeting Tuesday afternoon.

(Mike) Burt, street superintendent Walter Mitchell and a representative of Packmore Manufacturing of San Antonio, Ed Edwards.

The problem resulted from the main line fuse blow-out on the 69,000 volt line from the power plant to the sub-station. Voltage is stepped down to 12,500 volts for use by the city and also by Lone Wolf Electric. Lone Wolf's service was stopped because the sub-station is the delivery point to the electric co-operative.

Servicemen quickly made emergency repairs then moved in a mobile sub-station until complete repairs could be made, explained Robert Chambers with Texas Electric.

The problem of trash blowing out of containers that are unsatisfactory and often with out lids could be solved by use of closed containers requiring special machinery to handle. City merchants, by a consensus, decided to update the present system, perhaps putting teeth into city ordinances and issuing guidelines for containers and fenced-in pick-up areas.

The present garbage truck was purchased in 1947 and a new one must be bought soon, said Sadler. Packmore's representative explained that the closed containers and truck that their system uses would cost a total of \$30,000 but could be charged on a monthly rental basis of \$17.50 or \$19.20, depending on the size of containers. Sadler estimated the cost of a new truck similar to the present one would be \$10,000. He also pointed out that the present operation for garbage costs \$49,000 per year from a budget income of \$40,000 to \$42,000, running at least \$7,000 in the red.

The problem concerns everyone in the city, but merchants were discussing ordinances and containers for commercial use only.

The meeting was held to get merchants' opinions before deciding on purchase of a new truck.

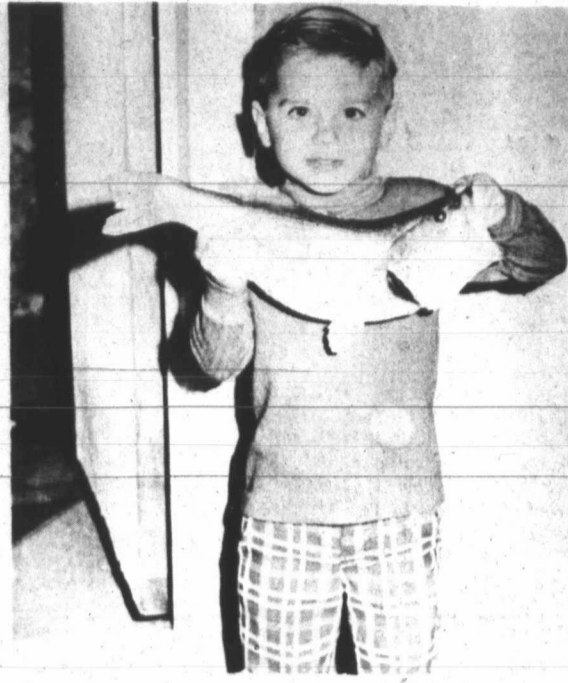

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabo, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election. Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed. Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

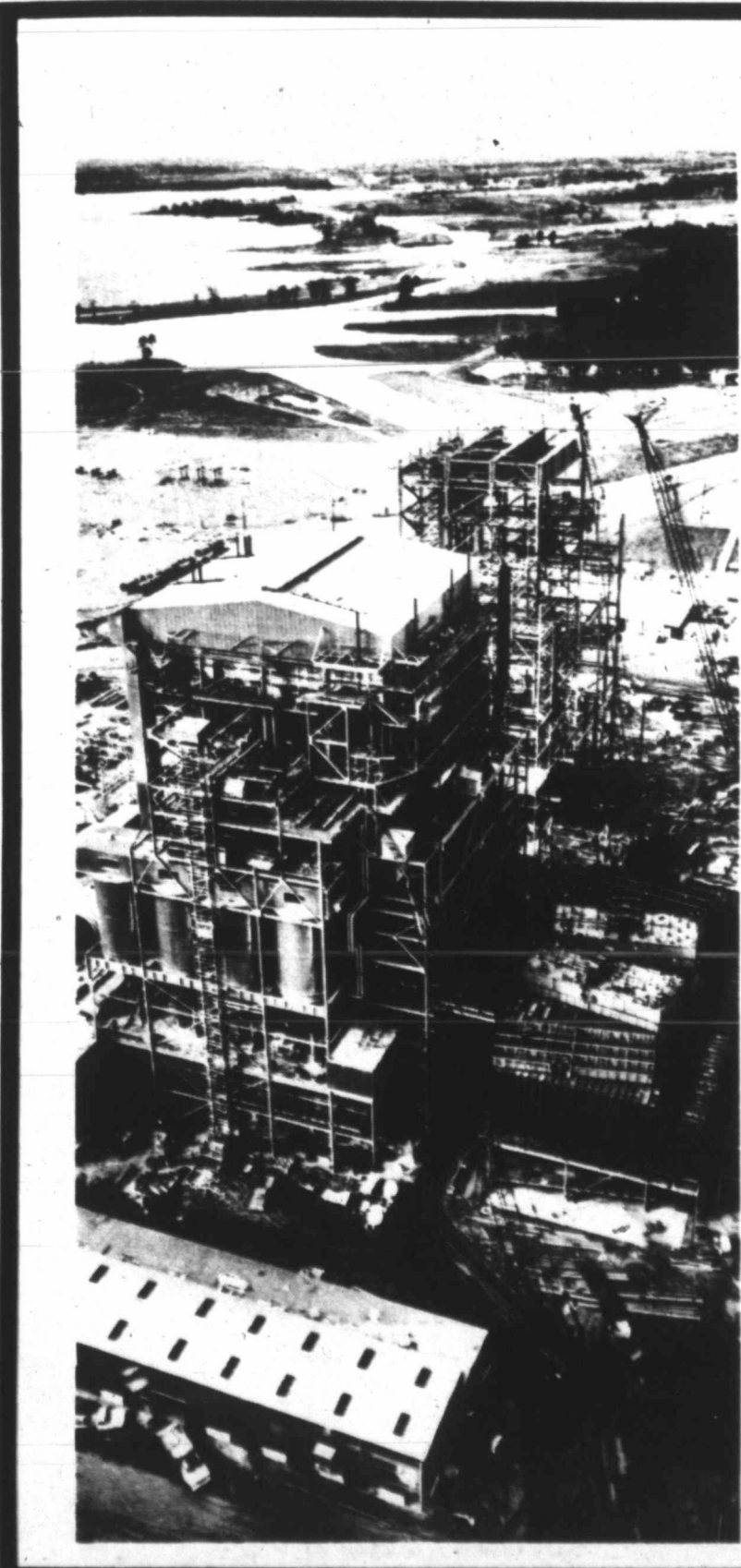

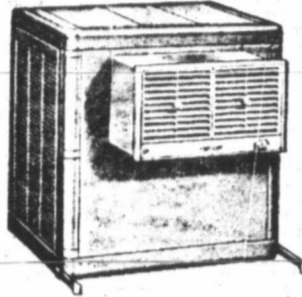

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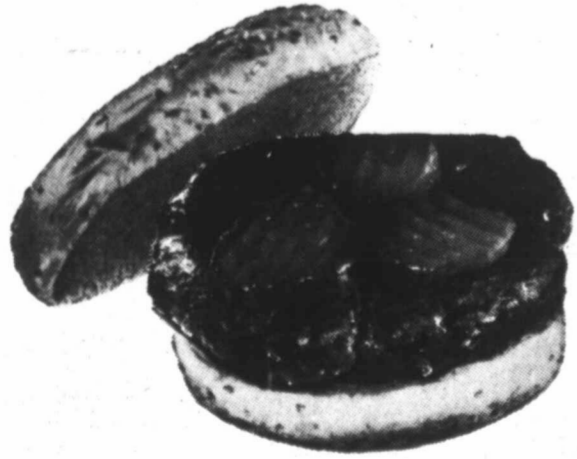
