Bridge on 7th Street Discussed by C. of C.

The directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce spent a major portion of their session Tuesday in discussing the proposed new route into Ballinger of Highway No. 23 and the new bridge that is proposed at the lower end of Seventh Street across the Colorado River. Members of the board were generally delighted with the idea that has been advanced for one of the routes.

With Highway No. 23 leading out of Ballinger over Seventh and a high-water bridge across the Colorado it would shorten the route by several miles and take a great amount of travel off Highway No. 30 and from over the No. 30 bridge on the Colorado at the end of Hutchings Avenue.

The proposed change in routing would necessitate the paving of Seventh Street from Strong Avenue to the city limits near the river. This was discussed by the directors and city officials and in case the new route is adopted by the State Highway Commission a plan will be submitted for the paving of this stretch to connect present city pavement with the asphalt-topped highway.

County Judge Paul Trimmer will be in Austin with the State Highway Commission Monday and Tuesday of next week, at which time the proposed change of this route and the building of the new bridge discussed. As soon as he returns here there will probably be some definite information to be released.

Miles Men Inventors New Cotton Chopper

L. S. Stinger and E. L. Kvapil, who live about one mile east of Miles, have perfected a new cotton chopper which is said to be working perfectly on their farms and is greatly reducing the cost on this item for them.

With this device the two farmers are chopping their cotton at a cost of approximately ten cents per acre. The inventors took a three-inch pipe fourteen feet long and had holes drilled in it fourteen inches apart. In these holes was welded a shank from an old cultivator, and on each a ten-inch sweep placed. The fourteen foot piece containing ten ten-inch sweeps was attached to a farmall and run cross-wise with the rows, cutting the cotton out ten inches apart. The machine is run some four or five inches deep and cultivates the ground at the same time that it cuts the cotton and grass out. As soon as the new machine is run across the rows, a cultivator is run down the rows and the dirt thrown back to the rows, leaving the furrows as they should be.

Stinger and Kvapil have been working about 50 acres per day with the machine and have found that it will do excellent work. The piece carrying the ten sweeps is arranged so that it can be raised by a lever at the edge of the field and the machine allowed to turn around. The inventors have not applied for a patent yet, and are still giving the machine a thorough test on their own farms only.

W. Lehmberg, county agent, visited the two farms Wednesday morning and saw the machine at work. He is very enthusiastic over the new device. Mr. Lehmberg stated that the double cultivation done by the machine was fine and that there was very little left to do with a hoe when the machine crossed the rows of cotton where a good stand was growing.

Tax Levy Limit Is Questioned

AUSTIN, June 19.—Proposals to raise the tax levy limit, in determining whether a district should receive aid under the proposed rural aid bill, occupied the attention of the Senate this morning. It steadfastly refused to budge from the seventy-five cent tax limit, in spite of amendments by Wirtz, fixing it at thirty-five cents; by Moore, fixing it at fifty cents; and by Small that would set it at one dollar. In consideration of the limit, senators veered off in their discussion of unfair tax valuations present in different parts of Texas and the whole morning was consumed in desultory arguments.

An amendment by Tom Love reducing aid to district having tax valuation equalization boards from \$20,000 yearly to \$12,500 a year, was defeated.

An amendment by Greer, proposing to allow pupils of districts unable to maintain a first class school to transfer to adjacent districts and allowing also the transfer of rural aid of that district to another, was pending when the upper house recessed.

Moody Says Wells Must Die Thursday

AUSTIN, June 19.—O. C. Wells, convicted of the murder of J. A. Mitchell at Coleman in 1927, must die in the electric chair Thursday at Huntsville. Governor Dan Moody yesterday announced that he would not interfere in the case. He recently granted Wells a reprieve of six days in order that the condemned man might "make his peace with God."

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce at the regular meeting Tuesday decided to visit the Live-at-Home Fair at Winters on Friday, June 28. Committees were named to look after the arrangements and if plans are carried out as arranged by the committee the largest delegation ever to leave Ballinger on a booster trip will go to Winters that day.

The committee plans to arrange a caravan of at least 250 cars well loaded to visit our neighbors on the second day of their celebration. The Ballinger Band will head the delegation and will assist in furnishing music at the fair during the afternoon and the early part of the evening.

Secretary J. D. Motley stated that everyone making the trip would be furnished with hat bands, arm bands and other decorative costumes to make the delegation look snappy when they arrived in Winters. The committee plans for the crowd to have an early dinner and leave Ballinger not later than 12 o'clock on that day. As soon as they arrive at the city limits, a parade will be formed and the first hours will be spent in parading and staging stunts.

J. D. Motley and Roy Reeder were in Winters Tuesday afternoon and it is very likely that the Ballinger-Big Spring baseball games scheduled for Ballinger on that day will be transferred to Winters. If this arrangement is made it will serve as a Ballinger birthday celebration also and no trouble should be experienced in getting 1,000 people to visit in Winters during the afternoon.

The committees will canvass the city in the interest of the trip and everyone is requested to be ready to state whether they will take a car and make the trip or not. The committee also plans to take the caravan in a body and not have the cars strung out over several hours in making the trip. If all cars go together it will be much easier to get them together for the parade when they arrive at the city limits and a better showing can be made. In addition to the baseball teams and the band, the National Guard company, Boy Scouts and other organizations will likely make the trip in a body.

The Winters entertainment committee has announced that everything is in readiness for the fair and that the program will be full of good entertainment. It is their first fair of this kind and people from all sections of Runnels county will be there to celebrate.

The local chamber of commerce voted their full co-operation to the Winters people in any way they may be needed to make their fair better. It is pointed out that one way to help our northern neighbors is to go on Friday the 28th in great numbers, visit every display on exhibition and get the

The Texas Senate and House have passed very bitter resolutions of condemnation in regard to the wife of a negro congressman being entertained at a tea at the White House given by Mrs. Herbert Hoover. The Senate passed the resolution several days ago and Tuesday the House passed it by a vote of 99 to 10. Listed among the ten who voted against the resolution was G. Y. Lee, representative of this district, from Eden. The resolution in part said "We bow our heads in shame and regret and express in the strongest and most emphatic terms at our command our condemnation and humiliation at said conduct, if true, on the part of the mistress of the White House and her associates."

This year nothing was planned and most of the local dusks visited in other cities where celebrations were being put on. So many of the negroes around here are busy in the fields that any program was difficult to arrange and the leaders decided to let the occasion go by without entertainment for the general public.

Colorado Sees High Production In Helium Gas

DENVER, June 19.—Colorado is destined to become the greatest center in the world of helium gas production, according to reports here that deposits of gas in the Sinbad Valley of Northwestern Colorado have shown a 7.07 per cent helium content.

The highest previous helium content discovered was 3.6 per cent.

Helium is used for the inflation of lighter-than-air navigable ships of the Zeppelin type.

Construction of dirigibles has been curtailed through lack of an adequate supply of helium gas, which is non-inflammable and absolutely safe for use in balloons and dirigibles.

Manufacture of helium has been too expensive for extensive use, but the Colorado discovery is expected to reduce the cost of production more than 30 per cent.

The federal government is planning construction of several helium plants near the source of the newly discovered supply in Montrose county, Colorado, according to reports here. These plants, it is forecast, will become the largest producers of helium gas known and will insure supremacy for the nation in the helium field, and will materially increase the government's activities in dirigible construction.

The government has three plants in Amarillo, Fort Worth and Petrolia, in Texas, and in Utah.

The Utah plant, it is believed, may be reserved for wartime necessities, as it is situated in such a remote section of the country that it would be inaccessible in the

event of invasion, and at the same time will be comparatively near the Pacific Coast, center of extensive government air operations.

Discovery of the extremely high helium content gas in the Sinbad region climaxes a governmental program suggested by R. B. Moore, former Denver resident and now a professor at Purdue University in Indiana. During the first years of the World War, England sent an official request to Moore for information and the possibilities of extraction of helium from natural gas wells being drilled in the western part of the United States. Because this country at the time was neutral in the world war, Moore was not permitted to supply the information to the British government.

But Moore urged the United States government to promote a program for the search of helium, which resulted in the erection of the trio of extraction plants in the Texas Panhandle, and now discovery of the deposits in Colorado.

SOUTH AMERICAN FLIGHT PLANNED FROM GERMANY

BERLIN, June 19.—A transatlantic flight Berlin to La Paz, Bolivia, is planned by Captains Vasquez and Luizaga, who are now in Berlin to make the necessary preparations.

Vasquez and Luizaga, who are both members of the Bolivian Aviation Corps, do not undertake to establish any new flying records, but will make the trip in five laps, stopping at Sevilla, Spain, Senegal, Natal and Rio de Janeiro for refueling purposes.

"We plan to make this flight just for safety's sake," declared Capt. Luizaga, "because this will be more valuable for future air-traffic across the Atlantic than an attempt of new records."

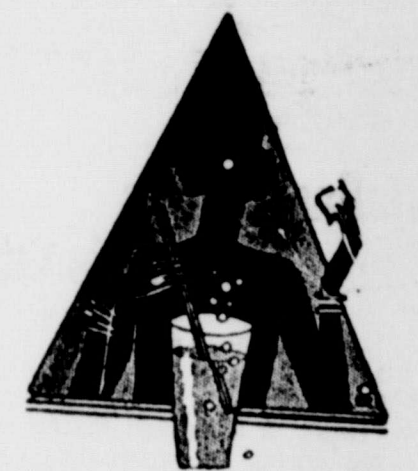

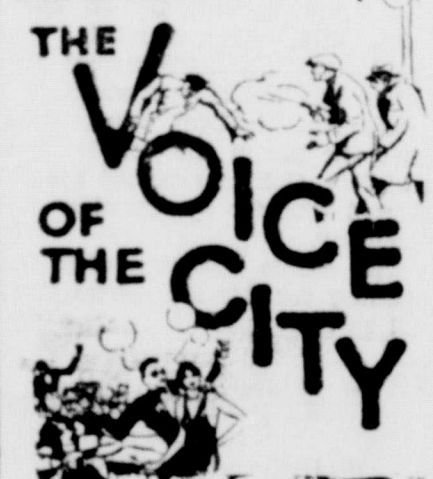
