## Car Load of Portales Valley Beans Shipped to Chicago Sunday, 16th

On Friday and Saturday of last week, Lovett & Kirk loaded a full car load of green stringless beans for shipment to Chicago, going out by refrigerated freight Sunday morning.

These beans were strictly graded and packed in standard hampers. These beans were carefully graded and are of excellent quality.

In loading, the cars the hampers were placed so as to give ventilation to each hamper. The refrigerated car used in shipping was loaded before loading and on the trip to Chicago will require \$65.00 worth of ice.

This is the first car to go out of Portales to the Chicago market and it is hoped that this will open a new market for Portales Valley products.

In picking these beans on Friday, one farmer used 110 pickers. The first crop of beans has been exhausted, and the new crop is now coming on the market.

The price is much better than it was two weeks ago, and indications are that the farmers will receive a profit from this crop.

In spite of the fact that beans were selling from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hamper last Friday, some of the independent farmers were still selling to truckers at 75 cents per hamper.

The bean growers have organized to market the beans on scientific principles, and are benefitting every grower, whether they are members of the association or not, and an effort is being made to prevent field run and inferior quality of beans from going onto the market.

## Golf! Portales to Boast of New Golf Course

Thirteen past week sees the organization of a new golf club for Portales, with G. W. Carr as president, J. H. Lee secretary-treasurer, Ed J. Neer and C. M. Compton, directors.

A lease has been secured on the Frank Duching property, 3 1/2 miles west and 1 1/2 miles north of Portales.

This land is of a good tight sod and will make an ideal golf course. Work is now under way laying out the fairways and building the greens.

A membership fee of \$15.00 per year will be charged and there will be no monthly dues.

All memberships will be required in advance and no one but paying members will be allowed the use of this course.

Portales has many golf fans who will welcome the opening of this new golf course.

## Floyd Public Schools to Open Sept. 14th Late Date Permits Pupils' Aid in Harvest

STATE'S LARGEST AND BEST RURAL SCHOOL HAS MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Floyd, N. M., Aug. 20.—Superintendent Don Foster announces the opening of the Floyd schools on September 14. He said that this late opening of school will permit the students to help in the gathering of the large crops this season.

The faculty of the Floyd schools is changed in a few instances from that of the past year. Don Foster and Ray J. Lofton retain their positions as superintendent and principal of the high school for the fourth year. Other members of the faculty are: High school—Inez Medlock, Mrs. Don Foster.

Junior high.—Charles Owens, Mrs. Charles Owens.

Grade school.—Mrs. Ray Lofton, Neoma McAllister, Mrs. Gienna Tolliver, Hazel McCollum, Cornelia Hunter, Grady Tucker, Tullios Tolliver.

Mr. Foster expects an enrollment of around 500 this year. Four hundred fifty attended the Floyd schools last year. Most all of the pupils come to school on trucks.

Mr. Foster has the contract for transportation for the fourth year. He runs eleven trucks.

Mr. Foster has been improving the school grounds; the past few years by planting flowers, shrubs and trees. He has set out 18 Chinese elm trees. These trees are from three to five years old and

have outgrown the locust trees that are several years older. Since the elm trees have been on the ground, the locust and elms have had the same culture. The vines and shrubs are growing fast and within another year will cover the buildings. The vocational agriculture class has twenty head of registered Rambouillet for experiments and study. Last spring the ewes averaged 20 pounds of wool clip each. These sheep have grazed the forty acres of school land during the summer.

A new fifty by thirty foot annex is now being built on the back of the main building. This is a two-story structure and will contain four large classrooms. All of the classrooms are being salomined and repaired.

On Monday of this week the committee from the Central Labor bodies of Clovis met with the local committee and outlined a program for Labor Day, which celebration will be held in Portales on the 7th of September.

With the opening of school just eleven days off, arrangements are now being made for the housing of students who wish to come from the rural sections to take advantage of the splendid high school system of Portales.

On Monday, the 31st, will see around 1500 students enrolling in the various departments.

The estimate is that the enrollment this year will be an increase of 15 per cent over that of last term.

The high school building, the grades and the junior high buildings will all be taxed to capacity.

Portales schools have grown to such an extent that more grade buildings are badly needed and a part of the grades will have to be cared for in the junior high building.

The teachers will all have arrived by the last of next week and a faculty meeting will be held on the 29th.

The housing problem for teachers and students is taxing the city to its limits.

## Earthquake Tremors Felt in Portales Early on Last Sunday Morning

On last Sunday morning between 4 and 5 o'clock, many Portales citizens were awakened by houses rocking and windows rattling.

Rev. Clayton Root, who had experienced earthquake shocks in California, immediately recognized it as such.

Later in the day reports from different parts of the state reported more severe shocks. In Carlsbad plaster was cracked and in some sections of the state slight damage was reported.

At the Carlsbad caverns, it was reported that the cavern felt no shock whatever and not a single formation was disturbed.

In Mexico several houses were wrecked by the upheaval.

In Portales, while many were awakened by the shocks, many slept through them and were surprised by the reports.

## New Bean Crop Extra Fine

The new bean crop is now coming into the market, and the quality of these beans is far superior to the early crop.

At the packing sheds of Lovett & Kirk on Monday afternoon, beans coming in were of a quality that made the re-grading unnecessary.

On Wednesday of this week a car load of mixed vegetables were shipped to Chicago.

The production from the late beans is reported as extra good, and with the improved quality, it is thought that a ready market will be found at better prices.

## Fresh Tomatoes Now Shipping

The fresh tomato crop is now coming in and many are going out daily by express shipments.

Two brokerage firms are now located in Portales handling tomatoes, and fair market prices is the result.

Tomatoes for the cannery will be coming in within the next two weeks.

The canning factory has 400 acres contracted, and there are over 1000 acres in tomatoes in the Valley, which will result in the shipment of many car loads of fresh tomatoes.

Officers state that she is known in Thomomasi as Mrs. Wilson. Several other parties were arrested on charge of drunkenness.

### Premium List for Dairy and Live Stock Show Soon

The premium list for the Roosevelt Dairy and Livestock Show will be out in a few days. A special appeal is being made to farmers to bring in exhibits of dairy cattle, beef cattle, hogs, sheep and horses. Due to the excellent feed and pasture conditions prevailing in the county this year, stock will be in good shape to show.

The Dairy and Livestock Show has always been a factor in promoting an interest in better stock and better methods. This year, with prices low and profits out to the minimum, it is more important than ever for dairy and livestock improvement work to continue. All present the very best methods must be used if farmers are to stay in business. The Dairy and Livestock Show Committee believes that everyone will profit by bringing stock to the show, seeing what other people have and are doing, and exchanging ideas with other farmers. The show has been and will continue to be a factor in dairy development in Roosevelt county.

As has been previously announced, the show will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 17, 18 and 19, in the warehouse of the Portales Cooperative Broom-corn Association.

The business men of Portales are making good progress on the finances of the dairy show through the Chamber of Commerce and Ezra Watts.

While this section is sparsely settled, since the homesteaders gave way to the cattle interests about fifteen years ago, the farmers are again looking that way for homes.

There are many large pastures in that section, with an abundance of grass, and cattle are all fat.

Just west of Friendship is the farm and ranch of Hebe Stewart, and his cattle are all fat and in thrifty condition.

He has a good crop on his ranch, which will supply winter feed for his herd.

Leaving Friendship by way of the Wade and Martin ranch to Inez, it was found that the above ranch was well stocked with high grade cattle, and also a dairy herd of Jersey cows.

This ranch has fine grass land and near the ranch house is a large lake filled with water.

On to Inez, the J. E. Tollett farm was broken for the planting of wheat.

Mr. Tollett has one of the prettiest farm homes in that section of the county.

Crops in the Inez section were never better, much land being in sudan for hay.

Broomcorn is about ready for pulling and feed crops are heavily headed with grain.

From Inez to Dora, crops are as fine as can be found in any section of this or any other state.

From Dora to Pep good crops continue, and on each farm will be seen herds of dairy cattle and flocks of poultry.

While the cotton acreage of the county is small this year, all cotton is in fine condition and heavily loaded with bolls.

JUNK PRODUCTS

In marketing the Portales Valley products, considerable difficulty has to be overcome by some insisting on throwing junk products on the market.
Strict grading in the fields will save much expense in the marketing of the Valley products.
Every product going out of the Valley should be of a standard grade which will create a demand for vegetables and other products from this valley.
The state should establish a grading system, and prohibit the going onto the out-of-state markets any product that does not come up to this standard.
While this may work a hardship on a few, they will soon learn to take proper care of their products and command a better market abroad.
Much of the low grade products can be consumed at home and prevent them from becoming a total loss.
Every item going out of the Portales Valley should be of a quality that will become an advertisement for the Portales Valley.

CLIMATE AND HEALTH

An eastern magazine has attacked the climate of New Mexico in regard to health.
This magazine has stated that for tubercular trouble, climate has nothing to do with healing.
New Mexico has long been considered a great health resort for those afflicted with lung troubles.
Many have come to this state as a last resort and have regained their health, and are today well and strong.
The pure air of New Mexico, the sunshine of this high altitude has been beneficial to health and has been recognized as a means for those suffering from many complaints.
In spite of the eastern magazine, thousands will flock to New Mexico, and find renewed life in her splendid all year climate.
It is true that many coming here as a last resort, without means of support, become a burden on the charity of the various communities, and under unsanitary living conditions, soon find a grave.
It is poor policy to send the sick to a strange land and depend upon public charity to give them relief; but the person who is able to come here and has sufficient finance to care for them until they regain sufficient health to become self-supporting, will find New Mexico very beneficial.

FEDERAL FARM BOARD HAS BRAIN STORM

The action of the Federal Farm Board in asking all cotton growers to destroy one-third of the present crop of cotton by plowing up every third row, is nothing less than a brain storm.
The farmers of the nation have been to the expense of growing this crop and now face ruinous prices for the same, but destruction of one-third of the present crop is nothing less than criminal.
If withholding one-third of the cotton from market within the next twelve months will bring a reasonable price for the balance, that would be a good policy, and then reduce the acreage for 1932 so that the holdover would not affect the market on the new crop.
The nation has millions out of work, who will have to be fed by the government and the Red Cross.
The surplus grains could be ground into flour and meat and the surplus cotton could be woven into cloth for the feeding and clothing of that multitude of unemployed.
This would be much better than distributing cash and at the same time would aid the farmer of the nation.
Destruction of food and clothing will help no one.

On the Farms and in the Pastures of Roosevelt County

George Morrison has a fine crop this year. He is farming about 300 acres. All of his crop is maturing now and has a good chance to be a bumper crop. He has a large acreage of Grohoms this year. It has not fully headed out yet but some of the heads already measure 18 inches. He is also raising Macon Maise. This is an excellent feed crop. When it heads out one and a half bushels, then suckers sprout out from the leaves and form from six to twelve heads to the stalk. The main head may be cut and stock turned in on the rest. The stalk makes good fodder. The cattle will eat it down to the ground. Mr. Morrison is now pulling his broomcorn. He has just finished cutting an irrigation well. It is 150 feet deep. George lives with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. K. Morrison, who are old settlers in Roosevelt county.

Otto Rinne, who moved to the Portales Valley from Slaton six years ago, now has a nice farm home and a good farm. He has 125 acres under cultivation, all of this land is irrigated. He has 90 acres of cotton, 40 acres of sweet potatoes, six acres of Irish potatoes, and the rest in tomatoes, watermelons, beans and alfalfa. He also has 125 apple trees and a quarter-acre grape vineyard. O. H. Rinne, Jr., is farming 25 acres of cotton and sweet potatoes. He has some of the best cotton to be found in the county.

W. T. Meador has 72 acres under cultivation. He has 14 acres of sweet potatoes, 15 acres of peanuts, seven acres of cotton, six acres of alfalfa, and the rest in feed crops. His son Clifford Meador helps with the farming. Mr. Meador also raises good watermelons. The News representative helped eat one out in the field with Mr. Meador and Clifford. Mr. Meador has 100 Rhode Island chickens, four shoats for meat, and six cows. Mr. Meador has raised four crops in Roosevelt county. He moved here from west of Amarillo.

George E. Johnston is now busy with a crew of carpenters, building a modern potato house. This house when completed will hold 16,000 crates of potatoes. The walls will have three partitions with two dead air spaces. Mr. Johnston has four complete farm homes on his place. He farms 75 acres himself and rents 23 acres to Luther Meador, 20 acres to Ray and Spencer Crow, 20 acres to Bob Graves and 20 acres to his son, Billy Johnston. Altogether on their farms, they have 13 acres sweet potatoes, 15 acres peanuts, 15 acres of alfalfa, and 17 acres ready to drill in alfalfa. 30 acres barley which is used to pasture hogs and turkeys, 10 acres of corn, 10 acres of cotton, 3 acres of stringless beans, one acre of Irish potatoes, and four acres of melons and truck garden.

Mr. Johnston gave the News representative a large watermelon to give to the editor (it sure tasted fine). Mr. Johnston and renters have complete farming tools including hay machinery. They produce 103 tons of hay in a year. Mr. Johnston has 12 milk cows that produce 30 gallons of cream in a week. He has 30 head of young Jersey stock, 80 turkeys, 200 Rhode Island Red hens and 28 head of Poland China hogs. Mr. Johnston undoubtedly knows the irrigation farm business. He has two modern 25-horse power oil burning engines with No. 6 pumps. He sold \$300 worth of sweet potatoes last Thursday out of his field. Mr. and Mrs. Johnston have been in Roosevelt county since 1901. Mr. Johnston came from Crosby county, Texas, and Mr. Johnston came from Stevens county, Texas. 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## An Appreciation!

The following resolution was adopted by the Portales Chamber of Commerce and the Portales City Council on Tuesday, August 11th, following the announcement of the substantial donation on street lighting and also on the great reduction in the lighting cost of the public schools, city hall and pumping rate in Portales.

### Resolution

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Utilities Company purchased the municipal electric plant at Portales, New Mexico, in 1925 and were given a fifty-year franchise, with a 20-year power and lighting contract.

The lighting rate in effect at the time of purchase was one hundred per cent higher than it is at the present time, and they have practically rebuilt the entire distributing system of the City, making it a part of a vast inter-connected system, thus assuring our City of dependable and unlimited power.

We have found in our dealings with the New Mexico Utilities Company, those high ideals of clean business and square dealings that have caused us to realize their value in the proper development of our City and County.

The New Mexico Utilities Company have made various reductions in their rates, and always of their own free will and accord.

We have never had an occasion to register a complaint against the Company of any kind, either in the way of Service or of management; their managers and employees, we have found to be upright and honorable citizens, working for the welfare and development not only of their Company's interest but also for our City and State, therefore it is a pleasure to have the Company here in our City as one of our going institutions, that serves the public, and serves well, and we are glad to express our appreciation of the New Mexico Utilities Company and Judge I. R. Keiso, President of the Company, for the fine service rendered by them, and pledge our co-operation in the ongoing of their splendid program.

WHEREAS, I. R. Keiso, President of Texas Utilities Company and President of New Mexico Utilities Company, has announced the policy of co-operation with the various towns on the inter-connected electric network of New Mexico Utilities Company and Texas Utilities Company lines in the matter of working out emergency relief measures to help take care of financial problems now confronting many towns served by these companies, through no fault of the territory served; the policy in regard to emergency relief has been adopted by Texas Utilities Company and New Mexico Utilities Company, because many towns on their lines are suffering temporarily notwithstanding the wonderful crops being produced in this territory, solely because of a world-wide depression for which the territory served is in no way responsible.

WHEREAS, on this date said New Mexico Utilities Company, through Hon. I. R. Keiso and other representatives of said Company, has made known to the governing body and citizens of Portales its decision, as a voluntary action on its part, and as a donation to said City and taxpayers, effective as of August 1st, 1931, and for a period of one year thereafter, to reduce the cost of the street lighting in said City to one-half the cost prevailing on and prior to said date, and has further taken voluntary action reducing the rate for its service to our schools, which is a reduction of approximately 75% over the 1928 charges; and,

WHEREAS, said New Mexico Utilities Company has further, this date, agreed with the governing body and citizens of Portales, as a separate and distinct matter, and in no way connected with said street lighting, to reduce the cost to the City of pumping the City's water supply, so that the said pumping rate shall be and is hereafter fixed at two cents (2c) per kilowatt hour, but with the proviso and understanding that in the event the Legislature of New Mexico, or any other lawful taxing power of authority shall impose any tax on or affecting said service, increasing the cost of furnishing same, such tax shall be added to and become a part of said rate and paid by said City; and,

WHEREAS, the action of said New Mexico Utilities Company in the matters aforesaid effects a great saving financially to our city, schools, and taxpayers, the saving in street lighting amounting to \$1175.12 a year, and the saving in water pumping, and the saving to the schools, based on 1930 consumption, being \$269.84, and city citizens

hall lighting \$53.20, all aggregating \$2,241.47, and in addition thereto said New Mexico Utilities Company is one of our largest taxpayers, its current taxes to our city, school, county and state, Roosevelt County being \$2,571.46; and, this is the tenth substantial reduction made by said Company within the past six years; and,

WHEREAS, said New Mexico Utilities Company has heretofore from time to time reduced its rates in the City of Portales, each and every such reduction having been made voluntarily by said Company; and,

WHEREAS, the aforesaid action by said Company is fully appreciated by the City of Portales and the citizens thereof, and is convincing to all of said Company's generosity and of its willingness to serve the community at the lowest possible cost to do its full part freely and voluntarily to lessen the financial burden of its patrons, and at considerable financial loss, during the time of financial and industrial depression; and,

WHEREAS, we wish to say that in our opinion if all the Utilities serving the people of the State of New Mexico, maintained the same generous and helpful attitude towards the communities served by them as has always been maintained by the New Mexico Utilities Company, there would be no demand or need for any kind of State regulation, that serves the public, and we wish to express to the public and to said New Mexico Utilities Company and to Hon. I. R. Keiso and other officers, agents and representatives of said Company, our sincere appreciation of its attitude and spirit of helpfulness; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the City of Portales acting by and through its governing body and Committee of Citizens, in meeting this day held at the City Hall in the City of Portales, that we do hereby express to the said New Mexico Utilities Company and to Hon. I. R. Keiso and other officers, agents and representatives of said Company, our sincere appreciation of its attitude and spirit of helpfulness; and, we pledge to our governing body, to said New Mexico Utilities Company, and to each other our friendly and mutual co-operation in working out, on an efficient and economical basis, all problems that affect and concern our mutual interests.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be delivered to Hon. I. R. Keiso, as the President and Representative of said New Mexico Utilities Company, and a copy thereof also delivered to the Mayor and governing body of the City of Portales, and a copy delivered to the Board of Trustees of the Portales Independent School District, and a copy delivered to the Portales Chamber of Commerce.

# What's New In Salads?



**H**AVEN'T you served the same old salads in the same old way until you were secretly glad that people's appetites are like children's tastes? They like repetition in both foods and stories. But scientists tell us to diversify our eating and to be careful to train children to like a wide number of foods. And then there's your neighbor who, every now and then, serves some novelty in foods. Haven't you wanted to go her one better, and cudeged your brain for a still more brilliant recipe to serve? Hawaiian pineapple is always a resource, not only because it is one of the best fruits canned, but because there is so much of it this season that the price is lower than usual.

Summer is the time for salads, so let's look over that field, and see what new combinations have been recently devised. Did you ever hear of combining prunes, salted peanuts, cranberry sauce, maraschino cherries in mayonnaise and Hawaiian pineapple in a salad? There's a recent recipe for this combination, and its name is "Boys Salad," inspired, presumably, by the boys in which the cranberries grow. How about apricot halves, green gage plums, cottage cheese, ripe olives, green peppers, pimientos, raisins and sliced pineapple? There's a recipe for this, too, and it rejoices in the gay name of "Nosegay Salad."

### Here Are the Recipes

But it's no use going on with a list of ingredients without giving you the recipes for these new combinations, so here are those for the two

we have mentioned and for several more beside:

**Boys Salad:** Cut the slices from a No. 2½ can of Hawaiian pineapple in halves, and place, round side touching, in eight beds of lettuce. Stone sixteen cooked prunes, and fill with stiff cranberry sauce, leaving open at top to show the red. Place two on each salad, in the cavities formed by the hole in the pineapple slice. At the opposite sides pile stiff mayonnaise filled with chopped maraschino cherries. Sprinkle one-half cup salted peanuts over the tops of the eight salads.

**Nosegay Salad:** Chill ½ cup slices from a No. 2½ can of Hawaiian pineapple, and place in eight lettuce nests. Drain and chill thirty-two canned green gage plums. Chill thirty-two canned apricot halves. Place four of each alternately around the pineapple. Pile cottage cheese in center, and make a sunburst effect of alternate strips of green pepper and pimiento, topping with a ripe olive. Dress with French dressing made with the syrup from the plums and pineapple, instead of vinegar, adding a few chopped raisins.

### Fruits with Cheese

**Pineapple and Grapefruit Salad with Cheese Dressing:** Drain two 8-ounce cans of Hawaiian pineapple tidbits (or use one and one-half cups of diced sliced canned pineapple), and toss lightly with one cup grapefruit sections, one cup orange sections and one-half cup halved seeded grapes. File in lettuce leaves and pour over the following:

**Cheese Dressing:** Shake together six tablespoons salad oil, one table-

spoon lemon juice, one tablespoon syrup from the canned pineapple, salt and paprika. Smooth slowly into four tablespoons crumbled Roquefort cheese, and add two tablespoons chopped pimiento. This recipe serves eight.

**California Salad:** Place the slices from a No. 2½ can of Hawaiian pineapple in crisp lettuce leaves. Cream together one package of cream cheese and one triangle Roquefort cheese, and add one-fourth cup raisins and one-fourth cup chopped dates. Pile lightly in center of pineapple and serve with mayonnaise slightly thinned with pineapple syrup. This serves eight.

### Salads with Cider and Lime

**Cider and Pineapple Jelly Salad:** Dissolve one package lemon gelatin in one cup boiling water, and add two tablespoons sugar. Add the contents of a No. 2 can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple and two-thirds cup diced apple, and when the mixture starts to set, fold in one-third cup mayonnaise. Mold in a loaf. Chill. Serve in slices on lettuce, and garnish with mayonnaise. This serves ten.

**Jellied Pineapple Lime Salad:** Dissolve one package lime gelatin in three-fourths cup boiling water, and add the contents of a No. 2 can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple. When partly set, add one-half cup shredded blanched almonds, and mold in a flat tin. Cut in squares and serve on lettuce with cream mayonnaise garnished with a red and green cherry. Lay a cheese ball rolled in chopped mint or parsley at the side of each. This recipe serves eight to ten.

Darby and his family grew tired of watching the duel between the ram and the post-aul, so they went to town. Toward evening they returned and the first thing they did was to visit the dueling ground. They saw the man swinging—and they wondered what had become of the ram.

### Earth Shocks Hit Carlsbad, Texas Towns

Securing Tremor Falls to Damage Causes

#### HEAVY AT VALENTINE

Steps Checks, Battles Dishes at Cove City

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 18.—Severe earth tremors shook the southwest today, for the second time in three days.

The tremblers were reported at Valentine, Texas, where \$75,000 damage was done by a quake Sunday, Lobo, Ft. Worth, Pecos and as far east as Abilene, in Texas, and as far northeast as Carlsbad, N. M.

Shocks were reported at Valentine at 2:42 a. m. and at 1:37 p. m. Virtually the entire population of 500 persons rushed into the streets in terror. Many fell on their knees and prayed.

Churches were filled to overflowing. More adobe houses were damaged when walls cracked. Cracks also appeared in walls of several downtown buildings.

Terrified residents in Mexican quarters surrounded the Catholic church yard where they prayed for safety after the first shock was felt.

No damage was done by the quake at Carlsbad, although it was strong enough to stop clocks and rattle dishes. Slight damage was done by two shocks there Sunday.

Jack McFarland, San Antonio, Texas, news reels cameraman, fulfilled a life-long ambition when the quake occurred while he was making shots in the Mexican quarter at Valentine.

A cracked wall fell at McFarland's feet right into the camera, which recorded actual earthquake movies.

Western Union clocks in the El Paso office stopped when the quake was felt slightly here.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 18.—Father A. W. Forstall, seismologist at Regis college here, announced that his instruments recorded two earthquakes today.

The first disturbance occurred at 8:14 MST and lasted 14 minutes. Father Forstall said it was "severe" and off the North American continent.

The second disturbance occurred at 1:30 p. m. and lasted three minutes. Father Forstall said it evidently was a minor tremor. He believed it was either in Texas or Northern Mexico.

### Red Cross Volunteers Print Books for Blind

One of the most appealing services that is carried forward by women volunteers under the American Red Cross is that of transcribing popular and scientific books into Braille for reading by the blind.

This work was started at Evergreen hospital, where blind veterans were formerly sent.

The Red Cross now has 1,155 volunteer Braille transcribers, and last year they produced 442 titles in 1,849 volumes, or 175,000 pages of Braille.

The majority of the books go to the Library of Congress and public libraries throughout the country, although some of the books go to schools for the blind and, in a few instances, text books are transcribed for some individual scholar in order to help him complete his course in some study.

The work is supported from the Red Cross Roll Call for members which occurs each year from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day.

### Roman Highways Built for March of Legions

When the Romans set out to conquer the whole known world of their day, their practical minds turned to their assistance, and they as the long arm of their conquests spread around the shores of the Mediterranean, permanent highways throughout their empire, primarily for the swift and safe movement of their troops throughout all the countries they conquered, says a writer in the New York Times.

Their first principle was to draw a straight line between their most important camps. The Appian way, which was begun in 312 B. C., one of their greatest achievements, extended throughout the length of the Italian peninsula from the Forum in the eternal city itself to Brindisi, from which the legions embarked on their journeys to the east. The pillar set up by Pompey to mark the southern extremity of the great road may still be seen in the modern city.

The Romans built their roads by first cutting parallel trenches through the soil to indicate the width of the roadway, removing loose earth until a solid foundation was reached. Upon this four layers of materials were beaten down, the lowest usually of flat stones, sometimes laid in mortar, above which a layer of coarse concrete of smashed stones was superposed. Above this was a layer of finer stones or concrete, on which was laid a surface of fine stones carefully matched. The width of some of their roads was 14 feet, on each side of which were unpaved roadways half as wide again.

### Grecian Influence on Culture of Old Rome

Almost as far back as the history of Rome extends Greek influences are to be traced in the development of Roman culture. The Roman people were conservative and slow to cultivate the artistic sense. Rome had little creative genius. In her whole history she did not produce an artist such as Phidias and Praxiteles. The nature of the Roman was unusually practical and idealized power, law and profit. The Romans never created a distinctive style of architecture such as the Greeks. They borrowed their architecture from the Etruscans and the Greeks. The literary life of Rome has a profound effect upon mankind—Cicero with his orations, political and educational treatises; Caesar with his commentaries on the Gallic war; Sallust with his history of Rome; the poets Lucretius and Catullus. These poets, however, do not compare with the Iliad and Odyssey of Homer, the Greek philosophers Plato and Aristotle, Socrates, Xenophon and the orators Lyias and Isocrates.

### Mace Not "Mere Bauble" to British Statesman

"Take away that bauble," was Cromwell's scornful remark referring to the mace of the house of commons, and the speaker of the house in the federal capital of Australia must be some refreshing kind of modern Cromwell. Declaring that it is only a relic of barbarism, and represents nothing relating to the crown, he ordered the mace to be banished to some storeroom, a fate that has struck horror to some in England. Old Subscriber there is writing to the press to say it does represent some flavor of royalty and to inquire whether a weakening of the tie with king and mother country is indicated.

Borrowing from the bundle of whipping rods and an ax head carried before certain Roman officials, the London house has long had an ornate club called a mace as part of its regalia, and the royal arms carved on it are generally held to be merely patriotic embellishment. Though given into the custody of an executive officer between sessions, it is looked upon as the peculiar symbol of the authority of the house itself, which not infrequently has been in collision with royalty. Under the commonwealth a mace was used with carved flowers and cross and globe, but it was hastily discarded after the restoration and a mace, with the old design and the initials of Charles II, "C. R." was substituted, the identical one still in use.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
