## Turkeys and Hatching Eggs Help Solve Drouth Problems

"A gobble-gobble here and a gobble-gobble there," is an understatement of what you hear when you visit the J. W. Latham ranch a couple of miles southwest of Tennyson. Mr. and Mrs. Latham are presently feeding 1900 turkeys at their place.

In addition to the turkeys, they have 1,350 White Rock pullets and 150 Cornish Game roosters which they are raising for hatching egg production.

Latham explained that they entered the poultry business as a supplement to their regular farm and ranch operations, which have been critically curtailed by the drouth.

Other ranchers in the Tennyson area who are doing something about the shortage of rain on their places are Jack and Marvin Corley, who have large flocks of turkeys, which will soon be ready for market. The Corleys are old hands at the turkey business and have won numerous prizes with their birds. Others in this area who are going into the hatching egg business include Marvin Corley, with 500 pullets; Mrs. Hamp Thomas, 1350 pullets; D. L. Estes, 1350 pullets; and up Blackwell way, Reece McCarley has 1350 pullets.

The Lathams have two turkey blocks of different ages. One bunch is six months old and the other is a little over two months. They are going to market the six-months-old turkey hens this week. Latham figures they run about half and half of each sex, so he will have about 475 birds to ship this week. They will weigh 14 pounds each. The toms in the six-months-old group will be fed another ten days to two weeks. They weigh 23-24 pounds now.

Latham explained that the toms can be fed profitably for a couple of weeks longer than the hens. "The hens would gain some more," he said, "but it will take more feed per pounds of turkey than it has up to now." That's why the hens are sold first.

Another bunch of about 950 turkeys is coming along fine. In another four months they will be ready for market—just before Christmas.

## Glenn Trial to Be Held in San Angelo

Judge Joe L. Mays of 51st District Court said Monday night he has given no consideration to setting the date for the trial of Vernon Glenn of Bronte in court at San Angelo. This followed his granting of a change of venue to San Angelo as the result of a Monday morning hearing when Glenn's defense attorney asked for the change of venue.

The trial of Glenn, charged with murder in the fatal shooting of Hollis Stevens July 25 at Bronte, had been set for Sept. 10 in Robert Lee.

Motion for a change of venue followed arraignment of Glenn before Judge Mays. Glenn pleaded not guilty to the indictment as read, and immediately Carl Runge, San Angelo attorney, presented the motion for transfer on the ground that the defendant could not expect a fair trial in Coke County. With no controverting statement on the part of the district attorney, represented by Justin Keever, Judge Mays granted the motion.

## Second Primary To Be Saturday

### 12 Lettermen Expected Back With Longhorns

Twelve lettermen are expected to return to the Bronte Longhorn lineup when football training gets under way Aug. 27. The Longhorns lost eight lettermen from last year's team, but Oscar Dorsey, coach of the team, expects to be able to fill these vacated positions. Lettermen lost include All-District choices Pinkey Gentry, Noel Scott, Martin Lee, Leslie Caperton, and Johnny Smith. Others lost are Bobby, Don Glenn and Bobby Brock.

The Longhorns will again go up against tough opposition having to face three Class A teams and a tough Sweetwater "B" team. Bronte has picked up three new foes this year. New members on the Longhorn schedule include Eden, South Taylor, and Wylie. Other than these teams, the Longhorns will face tough opposition in their own district play.

Price Daniel and Ralph Yarborough, Will Wilson and Tom Moore, and A. J. Bishop and E. J. (Ebb) Grindstaff will learn Saturday night whether or not they will have a job in Austin for the next two years. Theirs are the only races which Coke countians will vote on Saturday in the second Democratic primary.

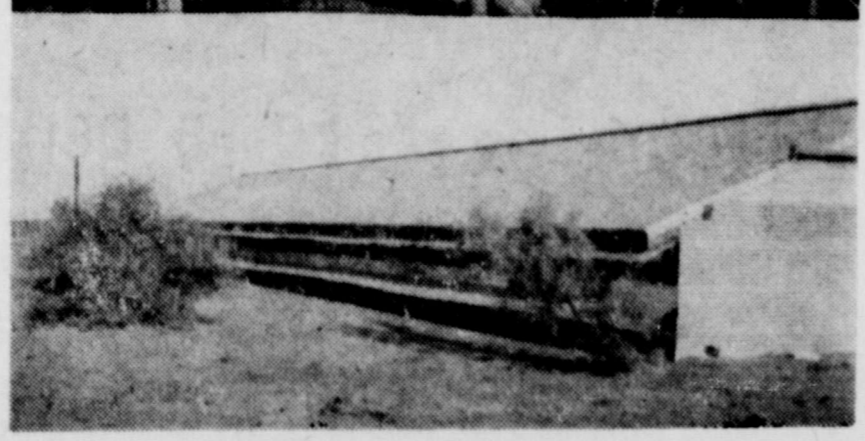
Daniel of Liberty County and Yarborough of Travis County are in the runoff for governor. Daniel led the ticket in the first primary with Yarborough coming in second. Daniel is a former attorney general of Texas and is presently serving as U. S. Senator. Yarborough is an Austin lawyer and has waged two previous campaigns for the governorship, both unsuccessful.

Wilson, who has been serving on the state Supreme Court, was high man in the race for attorney general, followed by Moore, district attorney of McLennan County.

E. J. (Ebb) Grindstaff of Ballinger received the most votes in the race for state representative from this district. He was followed by the incumbent, A. J. Bishop, of Winters. Grindstaff is an attorney and Bishop is a farmer. He has been representative from the 77th district for the past four years. Both these men have ads in this week's paper which tell in some detail about their qualifications.

Election boxes will be set up at Robert Lee, Bronte, Silver, Tennyson, Juniper, Fort Chadbourne, Olga, Sanco, Lometa, Divide, Edith, Wildeat and Walnut.

The election at Bronte will be held at the city hall, with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge.

## Bronte School Patrons to Vote On Tax Rate Saturday, Sept. 1

Saturday, Sept. 1, is the date set for an election to determine whether or not school taxes in this district will be raised to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation. The election was called after the board of trustees of the Bronte Independent School District was presented with a petition requesting it. The petition was signed by 75 qualified taxpaying voters of the district.

The election order and notice of election appear on another page of this newspaper.

An election on essentially the same proposition was defeated, 77 to 59, on July 10. Since that time, it has been brought to the attention of patrons of the school that more revenue is essential to retire bonds and keep up standards of instruction which are now in effect.

Necessity for increasing the revenue was brought out when representatives of oil interest in the district met with an equalization board and announced that they were cutting their valuations some \$600,000 this year and in all probability would cut the same amount next year. This cut would reduce tax revenue \$6,000 each year.

Humble Oil & Refining Co., the largest taxpayer in the district, was represented at the meeting by its tax man, Reuben T. Con-

ner. Conner told members of the board that his company would be willing to increase their valuations 10 per cent for one year, provided voters of the district voted the rate increase.

According to members of the board, Conner's attitude was that Humble would be willing to bear this additional taxation, if residents of the district are willing to increase their own taxes in order to help make up the shortage of money brought about by the decrease in valuation of oil properties. Humble and all other oil interests would, of course, have to pay the extra 25 cents tax, if it is voted.

Supt. Garland Black pointed out this week that the request of school officials for the tax increase is not exorbitant. He said that all the school districts around Bronte have higher tax rates than the one on which Bronte district patrons will vote. The superintendent said he thought Robert Lee and Norton districts should be comparable to Bronte, and they both have tax rates of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

Supt. Black also pointed out the schedule of courses which has been worked out for students attending Bronte High School this

## what's what by whatley

I am going to say very little this week as I received this letter from the daughter in Germany and she gave a report of a trip which they made, and I feel that you might enjoy it. But I do want to thank a reader in California, whom I have never met, for sending me the lovely birthday greeting. It came the very day of my birthday and I thought it a very lovely gesture. Also, I want to thank whoever sent me the box of snuff that came attractively wrapped from Pruitt's Store. I have no idea who did it.

Now for the letter:

"Well, we went on our trip and had a lovely time, except the weather was terrible—cold and rainy the whole time. We left here at 12:15 p.m. Thursday and we arrived at Chemsee about 7:30. We stayed there that night. It was so lovely—it's a tremendous lake—about 25 miles long, and we had planned to go sailing the next day, but it rained, so we went on to Berchtesgaden Friday morning. Oh yes, on the way down, we passed over the Danube River, and it was so ugly and muddy, and I remembered some one telling me that Johann Strauss must have been drunk when he wrote The Blue Danube, because it was never blue, but always ugly brown.

"Anyway, Berchtesgaden is far south as you can go and still stay in Germany, and it is a resort town. In fact, it is a leave and

rest center for Americans, and the military operates many of the hotels for the Americans. The town is situated between the Alps, so it is said it is higher than it is wide, because everything is sorta crowded together and goes up instead of out. So, I got to see the snow capped Alps for the first time, and although they are not the highest of the Alps, they were quite high and beautiful. Usually, the very tops were shrouded with clouds.

This place is where Hitler had his famed "Eagle's Nest"—the home with the large picture window that the newsreels used to show him pacing up and down. We could see part of the ruins of the barracks, and Billy had seen the house in 1949; but since then in 1952, it has been destroyed to keep it from becoming a shrine to the German people. We bought some pictures of it. Also, when we came down, we came on the old road which Hitler had built, and at that time, only his car could climb it, because it was so steep. He had a Mercedes especially built for it, and no other car could make it—it was quite steep!

"Then we ate and took the boys up the Jenner Mountain in the cable car. It took about 25 minutes to go up, and we were in one of the plastic enclosed cars, and it really was so beautiful, because you see for miles and miles. We got off and looked around about 20 minutes, and went to come back down, because it was so very cold. Well, we stood around a long time, and finally everyone put us ahead because we had the children, and we waited over an hour and a half, as the cable car was stopped because the wind was so bad. It was so cold, and the wind was blowing, and you couldn't see anything because the fog was so bad. I was scared to death, and wanted down from there so bad, because there was no hotel there, only a restaurant. Finally, at about 15 til 7, they sent us down, and it was so frightening, because we were just creeping along, and when you'd look down all the trees and bushes were swaying terribly. I've never

been so glad to get down to solid ground in my life!

"Saturday we took a tour to Salsburg, Austria. What a lovely city. It has 37 churches and 36 are Catholic and one is Protestant. We went through 3 of them, and they were lovely—especially the San Franciscan. The altar there was the prettiest thing I ever saw—all wood carving and gold—and we were fortunate enough to go in during a formal wedding. We took pictures, and I wish we could have had a recording of the lovely music, because the acoustics were terrific.

"Also, there was a tremendous fort on top of a mountain that we went to. It was only used as protection during a war, and not a castle. The thing that was so interesting about it was the way we got up to it. There were two cars that carried about 20 people on one track, and they worked together. When one was at the top, it was filled with many, many gallons of water, and, because it was the heavier of the two, it was sent down, and the one with people in it was pulled up. Then the one on top was filled with water and

the one below emptied, and the same process done over again. It was a little frightening, but they said there had never been an accident.

"Then, we saw the catacombs which was a church in the mountain that had hidden the Christians, beginning in the year 200. About 300 years ago there was a landslide and part of the Church is now exposed. It was really interesting to see, and before the landslide and during the years it was used, the only way it could be reached was from the fort down 1000 steps through the mountain. They still hold Mass there twice a month. The little lady that was the guide was fascinating. She looked about 70, and she gave the talk in German, French (there were 3 French people in the group that went through), and in English."

Due to the length of the letter, I am omitting the recipe for this week.

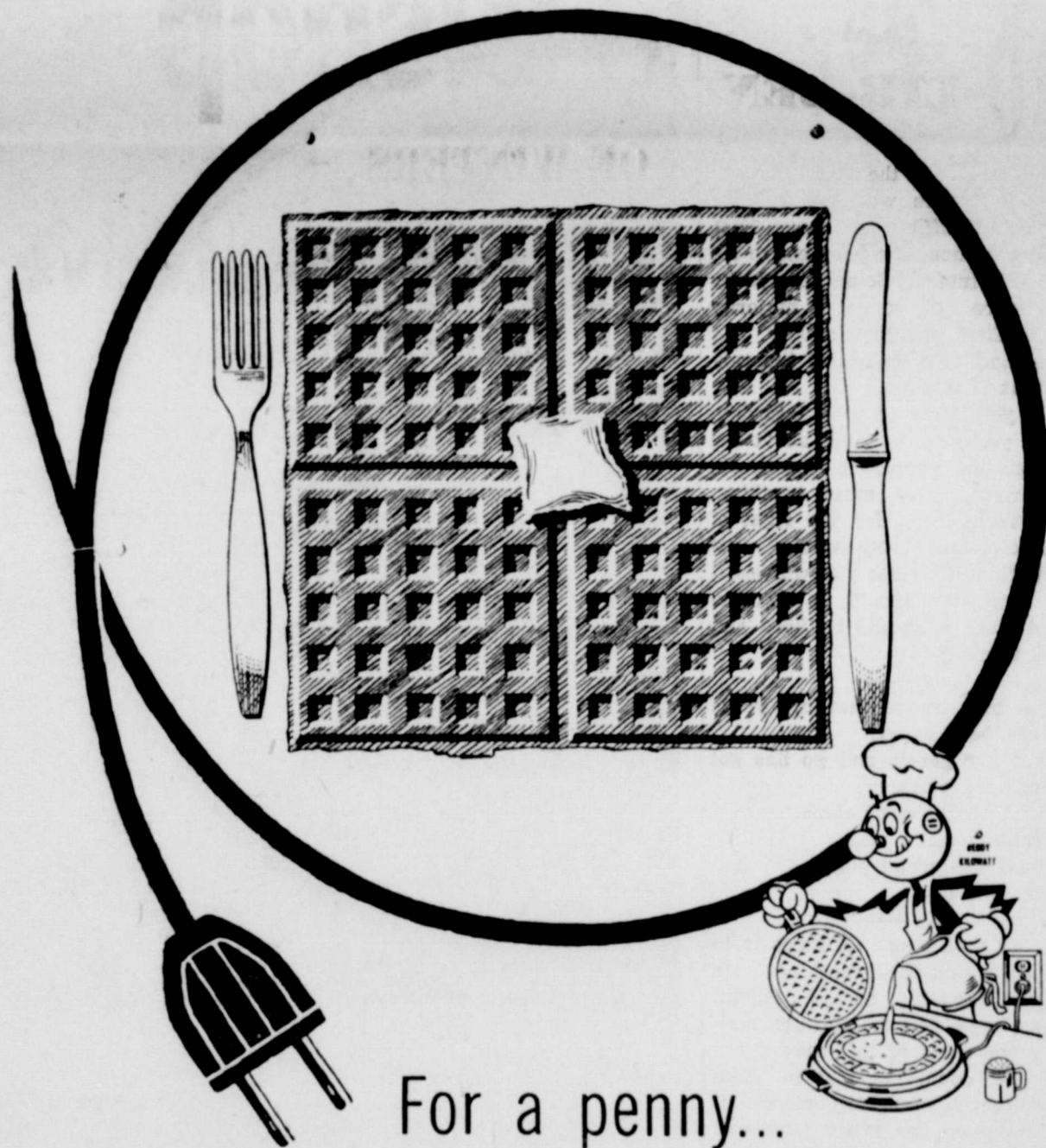

 the Lathams are going to cross the White Rock pullets and Cornish Game roosters to produce chicks which are ideal for broiler production. Their 1350 pullets are six weeks old now, and don't take up near all the room in the big house, which is 128 by 32 feet. However, Latham said when the chickens get grown he will have a house full. He said he hoped to come out with a thousand good pullets after they have been culled a couple of times and blood tested. Only the best of the birds are used for hatching egg purposes.

Latham has a guarantee of 60 cents per dozen for the eggs. He said that everything possible is done to keep the pullets from laying before they are six months old. This will allow them to reach full maturity before starting production. He is going to sell the eggs to a hatchery at Comanche.

**Lots of Feed**

It takes a lot of feed to keep 1500 chickens and 1900 turkeys happy. Latham is feeding his turkeys Power feed and said it takes about 700 pounds per day for the six-months-old birds. Only 350-400 pounds is required daily for the two-months-olds. The chickens, which are on Red Chain feed, consume about 300 pounds per day at the present time. J. W. Teague, Bronte dealer, is supplying the feed.

In addition to a good house, plenty of watering and feeding equipment and a big stack of feed, it takes 15 bales of litter to go into the chicken business. Cleaning is held to a minimum with the use of plenty of litter.

Latham said he lost 15 or 20 turkeys out of the entire 1900 which he now has. A very small loss was had on the chickens, also.

Besides their turkeys and breeding chickens, the Lathams have a "small" flock of White Leghorns, 200 young pullets and 170 older hens, which they keep "just for a few eggs to sell and for use around the house."

Did you ever stop to figure up how much 1900 turkeys would weigh? The entire flock of birds is likely to have 950 hens and 950 toms. 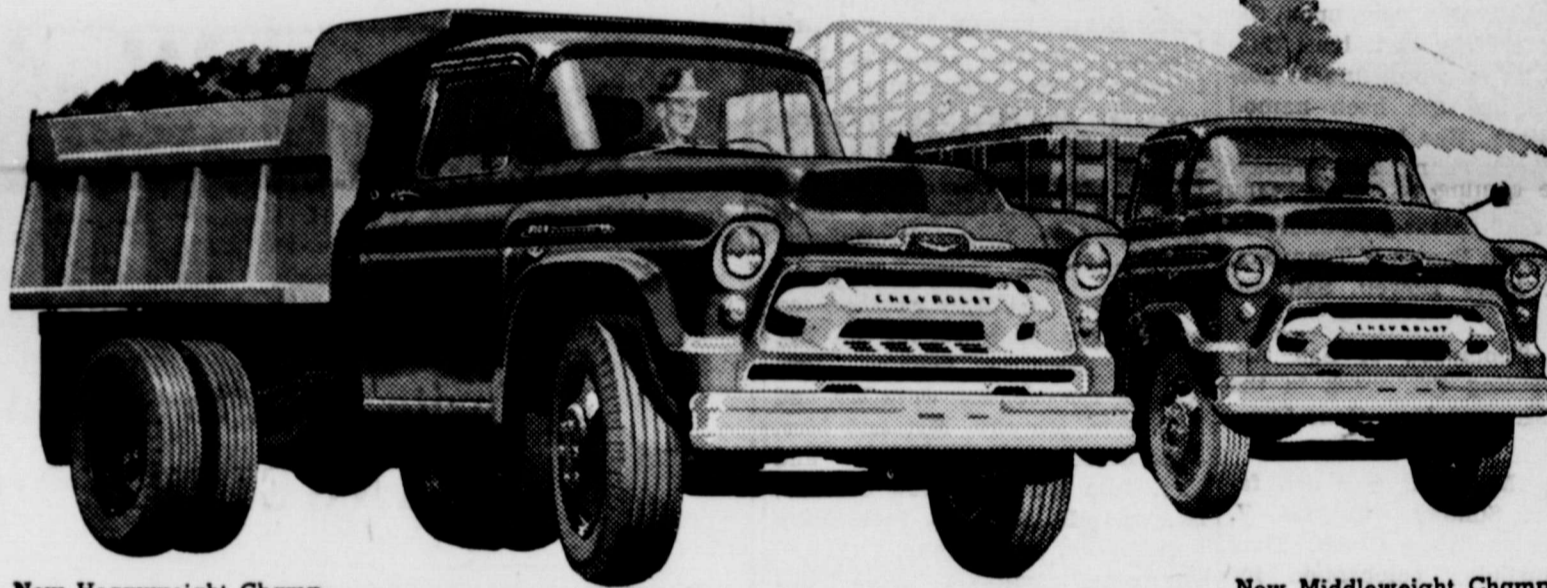

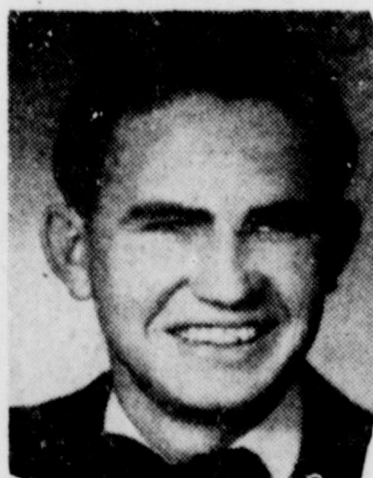

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations; providing for the necessary election and form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamations and publications.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 13, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, providing for the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature, for assistance to needy individuals, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap, and who are not receiving assistance for vocational rehabilitation, who are residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanent and total disability may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, and who are not receiving any State supported institution; providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals, providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

Melvin Evans Has 22 Years As Star Route Mail Carrier

Melvin M. Evans has wound up 22 years of delivering the mail on the Star Route from Ballinger to Bronte without missing a day of service. Evans brings the mail from Ballinger out through Maverick and carries mail back on what is known as Marie Star Route. His return trip takes him through Norton. Evans has served around 100 partons on the route and delivers from 300 pieces of mail on a light day, up to 1,000 pieces just before Christmas. Evans comes from a family of mail carriers. His father, the late L. W. Evans, used to carry the route from Ballinger to Bronte using a covered hack drawn by two horses. A brother, the late Garfield Evans, also carried the same route for a number of years. Another brother, Earl Evans, who used to carry the mail from Ballinger to

Abilene and from Robert Lee to Silver, is now carrying the route from Big Spring to Gail. Evans has had many interesting experiences during his 22 years on the route. He has been favored with gifts of fresh meat as well as locally grown fruits and vegetables. One time he found a small clock in a mail box with a note which read, "Our clock stopped so please set it." Evans and the former Sadie K. Russell were married in Ozona in 1916. They are parents of three sons and two daughters—and one of their sons is a mail carrier at Midland. Melvin Evans is a familiar figure around Bronte. He spends an hour or so most every morning visiting his friends here before he takes off on his return trip to Ballinger. ## Proposed Constitutional Amendments to Be Voted on at an Election to Be Held November 6, 1956.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11** proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."  
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2** proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. One such appointive member shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and the other such appointive member shall be well versed in finances. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be now or hereafter provided by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as may be prescribed by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.  
"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or cor-

So help me God."

So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the Amendment providing the form of the Oath of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9** proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."  
"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"All monies received and which have been received under the Constitutional Amendment as adopted by the people of Texas at the election held on November 13, 1951, and which have not been used for the purchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative Act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such monies as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board, shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all monies received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of bonds heretofore issued and to pay interest thereon, and any of such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of the State of Texas, the total Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds heretofore issued are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas.

"The additional bonds herein authorized may be sold in such installments as deemed necessary and advisable by the Veterans' Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and for interest on deferred payments on land purchased with the proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans, as herein provided, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1955; provided, however, that so much of such monies as may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose, and any of such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. This amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1957."  
Sec. 2. Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

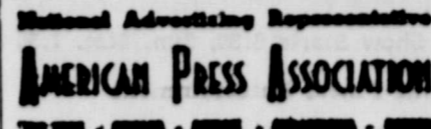

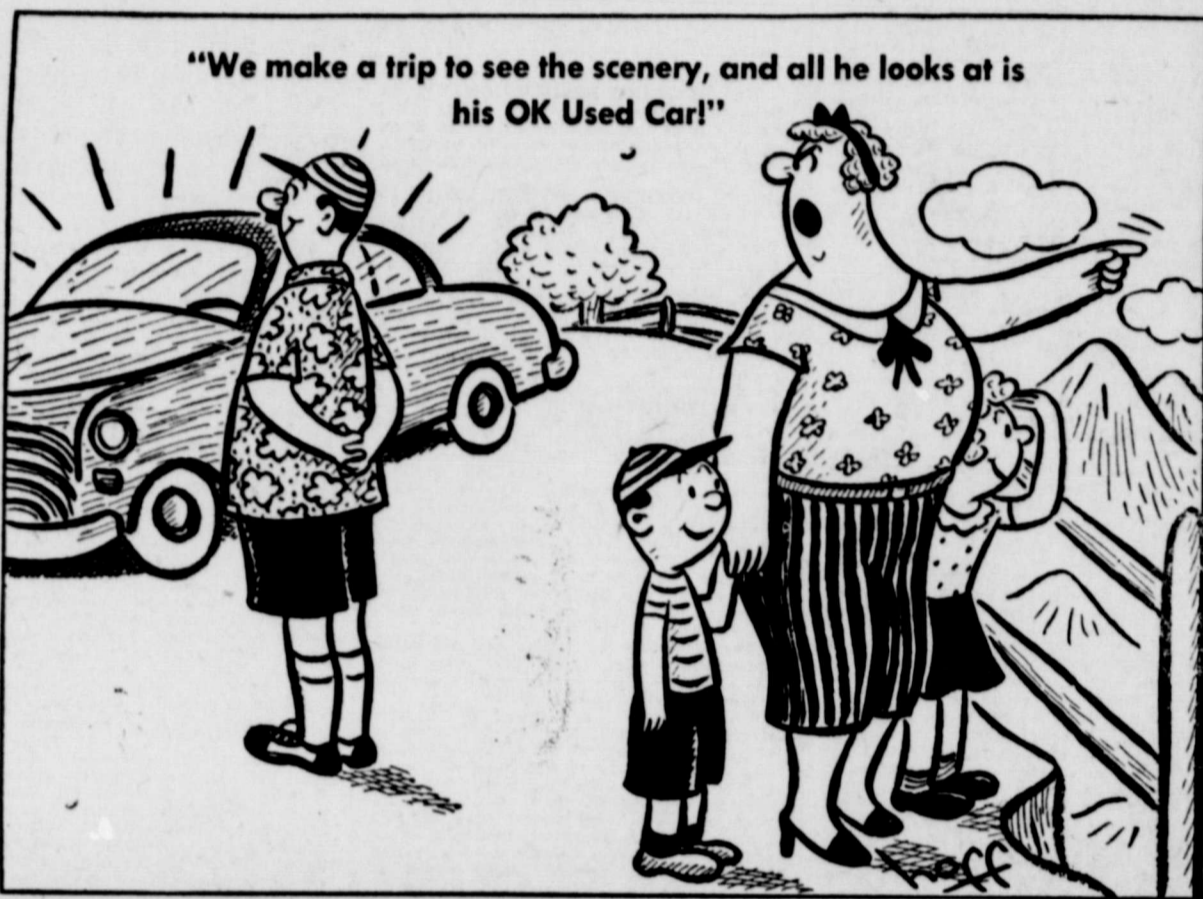

year. Under present conditions, students can get four years of English, four years of mathematics and four years of science. Black said if revenue is cut appreciably, this will be the last year in which students will have the benefit of so complete a curriculum. "We'll have to cut somewhere if this tax increase isn't voted," he said, "and the ones to lose from the cut will be the boys and girls who go to school at Bronte." A complete schedule of high school courses is being run on another page of this week's Enterprise. A plan has been worked out

whereby bonds on the new elementary school building can be retired in eight years, if the tax rate increase is voted. Considering the way oil valuations are decreasing, those who favor the increase say they think voters certainly would be wise to vote the raise and pay off the bonds as soon as possible.
