Stocks Are Again Sent To Bottom

SELLING ORDERS ARE FLOODING 'STREET'

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—A fresh flood of selling orders poured into the securities markets today, and prices broke sharply, although trading was orderly in character.
More than two score issues on the New York stock exchange, including most of the recommended leaders, fell \$5 to \$1 a share, and showed little sign of recovery in the early afternoon trading. The stock exchange ticker, which had kept fairly well abreast of the market in the early trading, was running 35 minutes behind at noon.
Sales Are Heavy.
Total sales on the New York stock exchange in the first two hours were 3,340,700 shares.
Auburn Auto broke \$41 a share. Allied Chemical \$25. A Reduction \$21. Columbia Gas \$20. Brooklyn Union Gas \$19. American Telephone \$15.75. and Union Pacific, Norfolk & Western, Atchafalaya, American Tobacco common and the B stock, Westinghouse Electric, American Water Works, Dupont, J. I. Case, and International Silver sold down \$10 a share, or more.

BROKERS HOPE FOR CATCH UP SOON

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(P)—New York's financial district, burdened with millions of trades and far behind in their business transactions since the stock market collapse of two weeks ago, hopes to come out of the chaos by next Monday.
Despite the election holiday forces of all brokerage offices were at work yesterday and exchange floor specialists labored during the morning to adjust trades and settle delinquent contracts.

Hours Shortened
With stock exchange hours confined to between 10 a. m. and 1 p. m. today, Thursday, and Friday and with complete suspension of trading Saturday member firms expect to catch up with their books by Monday. Extra forces still are on duty to expedite this work.

TWO HELD ON STOCK SALES

HALF MILLION DOLLAR DEAL RESULTS IN ARRESTS

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 6.—Two alleged swindlers, H. L. Skinner and E. J. Chambers, were under arrest here today, despite their denials of any fraud in connection with the sale of stock said to total nearly \$500,000 in value, in a proposed 17,000 acre summer resort project near Manitou, Colo.
The men were arrested here last night in a fashionable apartment by detectives accompanied by Sheriff B. L. Strawn, Garden City, Kas.
It is charged Skinner and Chambers operated in Garden City, Wichita, Kas., Ponca City and Tulsa, and other cities of the southwest.
The prisoners asserted they had lost money with other investors in the summer resort project.
According to their story an attempt was made to finance the resort with sales of stock in Wichita and Garden City.

"Good-Will Motorcade" Visitors Feted In City

WIDELY KNOWN MEN INCLUDED IN ENTOURAGE

R. L. BOBBITT, ERNEST COX, D. E. COLP ARE GUESTS OF CITY

Arriving in this city today at noon, the Texas Good Will Motorcade, including in its group some of the most prominent officials of the state, were guests of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce at the regular weekly luncheon program of the local Rotary club at Hotel Lubbock.

The program was one of speeches headed by Hon. Robert Lee Bobbitt, attorney general of Texas. Ernest C. Cox, state commander of the American Legion, and D. E. Colp, chairman of the state parks board.

Bobbitt a Rotarian
Mr. Bobbitt, taking as his subject "Rotary Today," explained to his listeners the direct meaning of Rotary, in this country and in those of foreign countries. "I think I appreciate as you do, the fundamental meaning of Rotary. I think there is no finer work than trying to mold in our lives a relationship of service. Rotary does that and in my work as governor of the 47th district of Rotary International, I have had a great deal of experience in dealing with men and I have never engaged in a finer work.
"Living, walking and working together for the betterment of city, state and nation—that is Rotary. If we can apply these principles to our every day living, be frank and straight forward in our dealings, there is no power on earth that can tear down the fortress we will build."

Obligations Due Vets
"It is just as patriotic for a nation to spend its money in times of peace trying to mold a feeling of cooperation as it is in times of war. We owe an obligation to the boys who fought and died 'Over There' in bringing a better understanding between the peoples of the earth. IX ARE DEAD AS AIRLINER HITS GROUND

TWO OTHERS HURT IN MISHAP TO GERMAN AIRPLANE

(By Associated Press)
MARDEN PARK, Surrey, Eng., Nov. 6.—Six persons were killed and two injured in the crash of a big German airliner bound for Berlin from Croydon today.
Three of those killed were passengers and three were crew members.
One of the two survivors was Prince Eugene Schaumburg-Lippe, second cousin of a former reigning Prince of one of the oldest German royal houses. He was acting as second pilot. The Prince was injured but is expected to recover. The other injured man, Lieutenant-Commander Glen Kidston, widely known racing motorist, suffered from cuts.

Plane Is Burned
Names of the three passengers killed were given as Messrs. Milne, Jasper and Jones. The crew killed were Pilot Rod Schinka, Mechanic Ulrich and Wireless Operator Niklas.

The crash, which was followed by the machine bursting into flames, is believed to have been caused by the pilot's flying into a hillside during a fog.
Behind the remnants of the airliner was a large tree which had been torn from the ground by the last lunge of the big machine. The crash and the burst of flames followed instantly.
The plane was owned and operated by the German Luftthansa company, and was en route to Berlin by way of Amsterdam and Hannover. When she took off from Croydon everything about her seemed in proper order, according to an Imperial Airways official.

JURY LISTENS TO PLEAS IN MURDER TRIAL

BLOOD-STAINED SUIT, PISTOL SHOWN TO MEN OF JURY

WEATHERFORD, Nov. 6.—A jury was listening today to eight hours of argument before deciding whether R. H. Hamilton was justified in shooting to death his son-in-law, Tom Walton, jr., 21, last May 4 in Hamilton's Amarillo law office.

On a table in front of the jury among other physical evidence, was the blood stained tan herringbone suit the husband of Hamilton's 17-year-old daughter, Theresa, was wearing when he met death. Next by lay the .44 caliber revolver with which four shots were fired into Walton during what Hamilton, as a witness, described as "a mortal battle" over possession of the weapon.

As attorneys told the jury their interpretations of the case, Hamilton's 9-year-old daughter, Mary Gail, by his side, sat with his hand crossed, chewing cinnamon bark. He

Change of venue was denied Lester yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, when Judge Mullican overruled the motion of W. F. Schenck and C. C. Triplett one minute after the last witness had testified for the state.

The state used 11 witnesses while the defense used 13.

Witnesses Are Heard
All except one of the state witnesses testified yesterday afternoon that they believed discussion and publicity of the case had not been too widespread to disqualify a jury in this county.

Neil H. Wright, local insurance man, testified that he had been influenced in forming an unfavorable opinion by newspaper accounts.

COUNTRY CLUB IS TO EXPAND

NEW MEMBERS ARE TO BE SELECTED; WILL ENLARGE HOUSE

Proposals for extensive improvements and plans for increasing the capital stock to \$50,000 and to secure 100 more members for the organization were discussed lengthily last night by stockholders of the Lubbock country club.

The expansion program outlines a new club house, dressing rooms at the swimming pool, a custodian's quarters and a bridge across the lake in front of the club house. Improvements to the club's 18-hole golf course are to be made with the end in view of making this course inviting to the holders of international tournaments.

Driveways Planned
Landscape designs call for driveways and approaches to the bridge that is to span the lake, the largest body of water in Lubbock county.

Recognized as one of the beauty spots of the South Plains, the country club site is imposing to the lover of outdoor sports. It is located a proper distance from the city, about four miles north, and near the municipal airport. Comprising 160 acres, the country club site was purchased eight years ago when the club was formed. Fed by natural springs, the lake is well stocked with fish.

After approval of the tentative plans by stockholders, directors of the club were empowered to work out all details and Peters, Strange & Bradshaw have been employed as architects.

Dr. Fred W. Stauder is president and Hub Jones is secretary of the organization.

PERCY HOWARD AWAITS EXECUTIONER

CONVICTED SLAYER, WHOSE APPEALS BROUGHT HIM DEATH SENTENCE, IS NONCHALANT

HUNTSVILLE, Nov. 6 (AP)—Percy Howard, whose two successful appeals from a conviction for murder have boosted his sentence progressively from four years in prison to electrocution, looked nonchalantly in the death cell of the Texas state penitentiary today as his hopes for executive clemency waned.

When Howard was convicted ten years ago of the murder of N. V. Nixon, a taxi driver the state charged that Howard forced Nixon to watch preparation of his own grave. Howard was sentenced to four years in prison.

He Makes Mistake
Dissatisfied with this sentence he appealed and was granted a new trial which resulted in a conviction and 45 years sentence. He appealed successfully again and drew a third conviction, this time with the death penalty.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY SWEEPS ELECTIONS IN DOZEN LOCALITIES

VIRGINIA AND NEW YORK ARE BACK IN LINE

WALKER DEFEATS TRIO OF OPPONENTS FOR MAYOR'S OFFICE

(By Associated Press)

Virginia returned to the democratic fold in yesterday's gubernatorial election by a majority more than twice the size of that which carried it into the republican column in the presidential election a year ago.

New York City re-elected its democratic mayor, James J. Walker, on the crest of a tidal wave which swept before it three other candidates.

The democrats were victorious in the mayoralty contest in Indianapolis, electing Reginald Sullivan, and another democrat, James M. Curley, was elected mayor of Boston, in a race with two other democrats running in other and non-party tickets.

Detroit Elects Bowles

In the bitterly contested election in Detroit, Charles Bowles defeated John W. Smith for mayor in a contest conducted on non-party lines.

Charles H. Kline was re-elected mayor of Pittsburgh in a republican sweep of that city and Allegheny county.

Continued republican control of the New Jersey legislature was indicated by slow returns from the elections in that state while the democrats gained three votes in the New York state assembly.

Joe Shouse, chairman of the democratic national executive committee, interpreted the result in Virginia as indicative of a turn to the democrats in this first election since the republican landslide of 1928.

AID FOR FARMERS ARRANGED, CLAIM

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 6 (AP)—Readiness of the Federal Farm Board to aid farmers in the orderly marketing of their crops was expressed here yesterday by Carl Williams, representative of cotton growers on the board, in an address at the Georgia State College of Agriculture.

Plans for the government to assist in stabilizing prices of agricultural products in the United States through the farm board appointed by President Hoover were outlined by Mr. Williams.

"The \$50,000,000 voted to the board by Congress is to be lent to co-operatives, and the farm board expects to get it back with interest," he said.

"Control of the marketing of farm commodities by the farmer through a cooperative agency is the aim of the board and for that purpose it will lend its money."

MacDonald Winner In First Skirmish

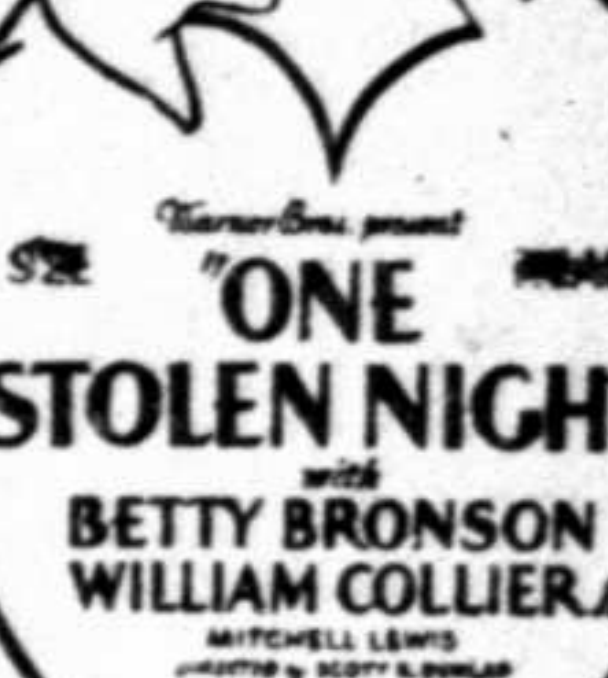

Don't believe it, Mary Louise. Just keep your faith in yourself in spite of the teasing. They don't in the least know how it hurts and, besides, dear, you know that you are the ace when you are particularly sensitive. A few years ago, probably, or a few years hence, you would not take the teasing so much at heart.

Your family probably would be heartbroken if they knew how the teasing affects you. It may be, too, that they are afraid of making too much of you, or letting you see that they are fond and proud of you, and so they go to the other extreme.

It's queer how people torture the things they love best, isn't it? Haven't you seen a man tease a dog? He thinks a lot of the dog, but he will torment him unmercifully, thinking, apparently, that the dog enjoys it as much as he does. And you'll see the same thing with a baby. Adults will sometimes play with a baby, teasing it until the poor little thing is a nervous and physical wreck.

We have to be tolerant of such people, Mary Louise, although they make us want to scream and rave. They are ignorant. I don't know what you can do about it, dear, unless you show your relatives this article.
