



General Urges Avoidance Of 'Narrow Nationalism'

BRYAN, Dec. 19 (AP)—A French Air Force general urged avoidance of "narrow nationalism" in a graduation address prepared for 108 Bryan Air Force base cadets today. The base trains jet pilots.

Among those addressed by Lt. Gen. Pierre Fay, chief of staff of Allied Air Forces Central Europe, was his son, Michel Paul A. Fay of Paris, five other Frenchmen and eight Norwegians.

"Although your elders exercised their profession within the framework of a purely national force, except during brief periods, it is highly probable that the same will not apply to you," said Gen. Fay.

"Even in peacetime, and right from the start of your career, you will be an integral part of an international force. Here again, you must go one step further than your predecessors, improving even on the team spirit to achieve a spirit of inter-allied co-operation."

He said "narrow nationalism will lead you to stress those things that separate you rather than those that draw you together."

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BIG SPRING

Pact Is Signed To Run Texas State Railroad

PALESTINE, Dec. 19 (AP)—The Texas & New Orleans Railroad has signed a new 10-year contract for operating the state-owned Texas State Railroad.

The T&NO has operated the 35-mile line between Palestine and Rusk for 32 years under lease.

Board Member K. A. Anderson, Palestine, said yesterday the new contract will be effective Jan. 1 if ratified by the governor.

It provides for the T&NO to pay the state \$1,000 monthly plus 50 per cent of any annual net income exceeding \$24,000 with an option for an additional 10-year lease at \$1,500 per month.

Under the contract which expired July 21 no such monthly payments were provided for. The new contract was signed Wednesday by Anderson and board member E. M. Decker Jr., Jacksonville banker and oilman.

The board chairman, Alva Saunders of Dallas, said last night he refused to sign the contract, and added, "The taxpayers of Texas aren't getting the money out of that railroad that they should."

Saunders said the state has received only \$3,116.82 from operation of the railroad in the 32 years it has been operated by the T&NO. He said if it were a privately-owned road that state and county taxes alone would total some \$77,000 per year.

Decker said the attorney general's office had approved the new contract and the State Railroad Commission has approved the contract's rates and division provisions.

"I think it's a good thing for the state of Texas or I wouldn't have signed it," Decker said.

Hearing Set On Injunction In Rail Dispute

DAINGERFIELD, Dec. 19 (AP)—Hearing was scheduled here today on a temporary injunction preventing striking engineers and firemen of the Texas & Northern Railroad from picketing the main gate of the Lone Star Steel plant.

The strike began late Tuesday night. Supervisors of the T&N, wholly owned subsidiary of Lone Star Steel, took over operation of the eight-mile line.

Pickets appeared before main gate of the steel plant and before its railroad entrance. They withdrew from the main gate when they were served injunction papers issued by Dist. Judge Sam Wilson, Mt. Pleasant, shortly after the strike began. Pickets remained at the railroad entrance of the big East Texas steel plant at nearby Lone Star.

A disagreement over contract terms brought on the strike. The company granted wage increases sought by the Brotherhood of Engineers and Firemen but refused to make the increases retroactive to July 16, 1951, as asked by the union.

The T&N is the only means of transportation to market railroads for heavy products of the steel plant.

Five People Killed In Auto Crash Near Odessa Thursday

ODESSA, Dec. 19 (AP)—A California en route to Indiana and four members of a Crane, Tex., family were killed in one shattering auto collision yesterday.

The accident occurred about 1 p. m. 13 miles west of here on Highway 80.

The dead: Wilmer W. Graves, 26, of Hayward, Calif., driver and sole occupant of a car pulling a trailer.

Murley Ernest Harwell, 25, Crane, Tex., water pumper for Phillips Petroleum Co.

His wife, Wanda Louise, 22, and two daughters, Gloria Dawn, 4, and Glenda Vow, 3.

Harwell died about two hours after the crash. The other four died in the grinding accident.

State Highway Patrolman John White said Harwell's car apparently went out of control on the rain-slick road while he was rounding a curve.

The auto skidded sideways and the Graves vehicle, rounding the curve in the opposite direction, smashed into it.

TB Patient Plays Santa Claus Via The Telephone

GALVESTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—A tubercular patient at the University of Texas medical branch hospital is having fun acting as Santa Claus' assistant.

The patient, confined in an isolation ward, was given the job by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. The Jaycees installed a telephone by the patient's bed and assigned him to call the more than 5,000 youngsters in Galveston County who have written letters to Santa Claus.

The bed-ridden patient estimated last night it would take him five days to get through the list but added "It's the biggest Christmas fun I've ever had."

Truman Says Policies Checked Further Expansion By Commies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—President Truman stoutly defended today the foreign policies of his seven years in the White House and declared they have produced "a situation in which it should be clear to the Soviet leaders that they cannot gain their objectives by the use of force."

"We have demonstrated to the Communists that their expansionist efforts will be checked," the President said, adding:

"They know this nation is becoming strong. They know the strength and unity of the free nations is mounting. They can gain nothing from war but catastrophe."

Truman conceded there have been in his administration some mistakes and a few failures in international relations, but he said those who criticize such losses as the fall of China to the Reds rarely look at the whole balance sheet.

This appraisal of foreign accomplishments since 1945 was in a speech prepared for ceremonies at the National War College, training school for staff officers. No advance announcement of the talk was made and reporters were told they could not attend, but the White House gave out a presidential text.

Truman acknowledged that many serious perils lie ahead, but said these should not be exaggerated any more than they should be underestimated.

"We need not be panicky today about the state of the world," he said. "We are not on the losing side. The world is not about to collapse around us."

He spoke of the Communist refusal to agree to Allied proposals for a truce in Korea, and said this confronts the U. S. with "a terrible and a serious problem." But while it is being dealt with, he went on, "Let us not lose sight of how much we have already accomplished by fighting in Korea."

Truman continued: "I believe the Communists were bent on testing the authority of the United Nations and the strength of the free countries, by force, sooner or later. If the test had not come in Korea, it would have come somewhere else. But it came in Korea and that was where we had to meet it and stop it."

"If the attack had been allowed to succeed, the United Nations would have been shattered, and all our hopes of building up a collective security system for the free nations would have been destroyed. If we had failed to meet the test there, the free world today might well be in retreat before communism on a dozen other fronts."

Truman Stands Pat On Remarks About Ike, MacArthur

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman, who once changed his mind about whether Dwight D. Eisenhower should succeed him, hasn't changed it about the President-elect's trip to Korea.

He said so at his news conference yesterday. He had nothing to add or take back, he said, from the remark he had made a week earlier. He had said then Eisenhower's campaign announcement he would go to Korea was demagogic, and that Eisenhower had to go through with it.

The President had no comment on Wednesday's meeting between Eisenhower and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who says there is a way to end the Korean War.

Eisenhowers Pick Washington Church

WASHINGTON (AP)—President-elect and Mrs. Eisenhower have selected the National Presbyterian Church on fashionable Connecticut Avenue as their place of worship in Washington. Seven presidents have attended services there.

The church's present minister is Rev. Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, who served with Gen. Eisenhower in the European Theater in World War II.

The church, announcing its selection by the Eisenhowers yesterday, said Dr. Elson will go to New York soon to confer with them on details of a pre-inaugural private service for members of the immediate family Jan. 20.

Presidents who have worshipped at the National Presbyterian Church are Jackson, Pierce, Polk, Cleveland, Buchanan, Grant and Benjamin Harrison. The church has long had a "President's Pew."

U.S. Only Market For Mexican Cattle Along Rio Grande Border

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 19 (AP)—The National Stockmen's Association told the government yesterday that the United States is the only market available for cattle in the Mexican states along the Rio Grande.

The association asked for an export quota of 500,000, about the number exported before the border was closed in 1946 because of foot and mouth disease. The ban was lifted Sept. 1.

The cattlemen said animals in the states along the U. S. border cannot be fattened in Mexico and they cannot be shipped to Mexico City. They said the U. S. market was the only opening for such cattle.

Marilyn Won't Let Picture Be Used On Trays

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 19 (AP)—If a plastics manufacturer carries out his plans to market bar trays showing actress Marilyn Monroe in the altogether, the young movie actress swears she'll sue him.

The trays would bear the nude calendar photo for which Marilyn says she posed when she was hungry and behind in her rent. The manufacturer claims she gave full consent for use of her name, portraits and pictures "for advertising and trade purposes."

He says he would sell the trays for about \$15 each, thus restricting them to places "with a lot of class and dignity. . . such as bars of bachelors and lovers of art." He'd also use the photos on bar glasses.

Marilyn's studio said yesterday its lawyers are planning to institute legal action "against companies and individuals engaged in unauthorized commercial exploitation of the Marilyn Monroe calendar photographs."

State Dept. Aide's Wife Appeals Her Drinking Sentence

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP)—The wife of a State Department official has appealed her conviction on a

drunken driving charge, automatically halting a three-hour jail sentence and \$150 fine.
The jail term originally was 30 days but Arlington County Court Judge Paul D. Brown suspended all but three hours. He told Mrs. Foy D. Kohler he wanted her to see "the inside of a jail."
Witnesses testified Mrs. Kohler

and her husband, a State Department policy planner, appeared intoxicated when their car knocked down a telephone pole early Dec. 6. The couple said they were en route home from a party.
The State Department said Kohler had with him at the time, in violation of security rules, a brief

case containing secret documents. It was turned over to a department security officer.
Kohler paid an \$8.25 fine on a charge of public intoxication. Bond of \$500 was posted for Mrs. Kohler yesterday. A hearing on her appeal is scheduled two months hence.

Lattimore Pleads Not Guilty To Perjury Counts

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Owen Lattimore loudly declared, "Not guilty!" today in answer to a seven-count perjury indictment based on his sworn denial of Communist sympathies.

The two words—almost a shout—were all Lattimore said during a brief court proceeding, but his attorney, Thurmond Arnold, had plenty to say about publicity the case has received.

U. S. Dist. Judge James R. Kirkland, before whom Lattimore was arraigned, said the trial of the Far East specialist probably will begin sometime in early March.

The judge gave Lattimore until Feb. 16 to file motions attacking the indictment returned Tuesday by a grand jury, charging he lied when he denied to senators he had been a Communist sympathizer or promoter of Communist interests.

Bond was fixed at \$2,000 which was provided in the form of negotiable Treasury notes.

Edward F. Hummer, a Justice Department attorney who had presented the case to the grand jury, suggested that Lattimore "be restricted to the District of Columbia and Maryland." Judge Kirkland spoke up:

"Mr. Lattimore, you may go anywhere in the world but be back on the date of trial."

Attorney Arnold asked that the judge admonish the Justice Department for newspaper stories dealing with the case, but the judge refused. He said he would not admonish the department or the press generally, but that if there was contempt of court it would be dealt with summarily.

Sullivan's Condition Is Greatly Improved

Condition of Judge Charles Sullivan, presiding judge of the 118th District who has been ill for several weeks, was described as "greatly improved" today.

Judge Sullivan expects to return to the bench early in 1953. Meanwhile, visiting judges from neighboring districts, are presiding over court sessions here.

Anastasia Called By Gotham Crime Probe

NEW YORK (AP)—Albert Anastasia, reputed boss of the old "Mafia" mob, was expected to testify today before the New York State Crime Commission.

The name of Anastasia, often mentioned as a power on the Brooklyn waterfront, has cropped up throughout the hearings sifting evidence of gangster rule along the miles of Port of New York docks.

Subpoenaed to testify earlier in the probe, Anastasia asked to be excused because of injuries received in a recent automobile accident.

Yesterday's testimony linked Anastasia with the unsolved 1939 murder of a reform-minded longshoreman. Other witnesses revealed how mobsters controlled the waterfront and even dictated to the AFL International Longshoremen's Association.

Also figuring prominently in the testimony was the name of William O'Dwyer, recently resigned U. S. ambassador to Mexico, onetime Kings County district attorney and former mayor of New York City.

One witness yesterday was Edward A. Heffernan, assistant city corporation counsel who was an aide to O'Dwyer when the latter was district attorney in Brooklyn.

Heffernan said he made a six-week study of the Brooklyn waterfront in 1940 which disclosed that gangsters ran the ILLA locals there and pocketed dues and other union funds.

Heffernan said he submitted his report after a meeting between O'Dwyer, Joseph P. Ryan, ILLA president, and the late Emil Camarda, an ILLA vice president.

Heffernan testified that O'Dwyer told him to "close the case."

Asked whether any hoodlum mentioned in his report ever was prosecuted by O'Dwyer's office, Heffernan replied:

"I don't think so."

Sitting in with Eisenhower and Martin were Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana, in line to be majority floor leader, and Rep. Leslie C. Arends of Illinois, who probably will be assistant leader.

Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio and other Senate GOP leaders will get together with Eisenhower soon for a similar conference on the legislative program being drafted by the new administration.

After the House group's meeting with the general, Halleck told a news conference the Truman administration "has just about destroyed the whole program of stabilization."

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Solons Favor Limiting Scope Of Treaties Made By Nation

WASHINGTON (AP)—A far-reaching, possibly historic move to limit the scope of United States treaties attracted strong support today from incoming congressmen throughout the country.

Lawmakers replying to an Associated Press survey went on record 8-1 as favoring a move by Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio) to amend the Constitution so as to prohibit the U. S. from entering into binding international agreements in such fields as human freedoms and social and economic rights.

Supporters agree enthusiastically that some such ban is needed to insure a yielding of American rights fees say the amendment would just delay and hamstring international co-operation and the conduct of foreign affairs by the U. S.

Bricker's argument is that the field of human freedoms and social rights is an internal matter which should be governed only by domestic law—by the Constitution itself and by state and federal laws passed under the Constitution.

Although the Ohio senator concedes that no treaties signed so far have regulated domestic rights of Americans, he insists that treaties now pending before the United Nations—if finally ratified by the U. S.—would restrict freedom of the press, freedom of speech, trial by jury and other rights guaranteed in the American Constitution.

The language of Bricker's proposed amendment drew fire from the State and Justice Departments in the last session of Congress on two grounds:

1. The proposal would erect a barrier of undue delay and restriction in international co-operation and the conduct of foreign affairs by the U. S.

2. The amendment is not necessary, because if a treaty ever conflicted with the Constitution the Supreme Court would hold the Constitution is supreme and that section of the treaty would be invalidated.

An Associated Press survey of opinions among incoming congressmen showed overwhelming sentiment in favor of the principle of the Bricker proposal, but some doubt about the language and just how far it should go in restricting treaty-making powers.

Bricker is rewriting his proposed amendment and promises to make it his top order of business in the new Congress, convening Jan. 3.

In the survey, senators and representatives throughout the country were asked, "Do you believe the Constitution should be amended along the lines of the Bricker resolution to specify that treaties may never take precedence over rights and guarantees in the Constitution?"

Ninety-seven House members definitely replied yes, and 41 were inclined favorably—a total of 138. Only five said no and 10 others were inclined toward opposition, a total of 15—10 Democrats and five Republicans.

In the Senate, 59 senators sponsored the resolution in the last session. Thirty-four indicated support in the survey and five—all Democrats—indicated opposition.

Replies from supporters included many comments such as "absolutely, very definitely, wholeheartedly, highly essential."

Replies from 52 representatives and 17 senators did not show sentiment either way. The remaining 270 new Congress members could not be reached or did not respond.

In addition to limiting the scope of treaties, which must be approved by the Senate, the Bricker proposal also seeks to restrict international agreements entered by the U. S. President or State Department outside the formal treaty process.

Bricker said many presidents have been accused by Congress of using executive agreements instead of treaties to circumvent the law.

His proposed resolution would have barred such agreements "in lieu of treaties." It also provided that any executive agreements would expire automatically one year after the end of the term of the President making the agreement, unless extended by Congress.

The Yalta and Tehran pacts in World War II are examples of executive agreements criticized by some congressmen.

Bricker's proposed amendment had two other sections:

One providing that treaties may not delegate U. S. legislative, executive or judicial powers to an international organization; Bricker said this section possibly is too restrictive, and he is rewriting it.

Another providing that no treaty or executive agreement shall alter or abridge federal or state laws unless Congress approves, and then only to the extent approved by Congress.

John Foster Dulles, secretary of state in the incoming administration, has agreed with Bricker that treaties "can override the Constitution."

In a speech in Louisville last April, Dulles said, "Treaties, for example, can take powers away from Congress and give them to the President; they can take powers from a state and give them to the federal government or to some international body; and they can cut across the rights given the people by the constitutional Bill of Rights."

Dulles did not specifically endorse the Bricker resolution. He said the whole problem should be explored.

The Constitution says in Article 6, Paragraph 2: "The Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land."

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), opposing the Bricker proposal, replied to the survey: "Treaties which we sign, by law under our Constitution, become a part of our law. This is particularly essential in this day and age where our international affairs have become so much an everyday part of our life as a nation."

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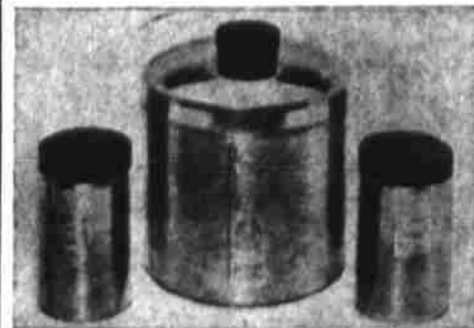

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Acheson Faces Tough Decision On John Vincent

By EDWARD E. BOMAR
WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson returns today from Paris to confront a difficult decision: whether to fire career diplomat John Carter Vincent as recommended by the Loyalty Review Board.

Officials said Acheson might seek an immediate preliminary conference with President Truman, but that any decision on the issue may be put off pending further study.

The board, top loyalty tribunal in the government, has found there is reasonable doubt as to Vincent's loyalty. The finding was made public on Monday by the State Department, which said the President would confer with Acheson when the secretary returned from this week's meeting of the North Atlantic Council at Paris.

Vincent has been suspended and recalled from his post as minister at Tangier, Morocco. He appeared personally at a secret hearing in September by the board, which waded through a mass of testimony bearing particularly on the stage of Vincent's career when he was one of the government's top officials on relations with China.

Vincent was completely cleared by the department's own loyalty security board last February and returned to his Tangier post with the expressed "full confidence and the best wishes" of the department.

Acheson has the authority to accept or reject the recommendations of the review board. He accepted a similar recommendation last December in the case of John Stewart Service.

Another phase of the problem is that the department has been criticized of late on the ground that it has not supported diplomats under fire in Congress and elsewhere.

Guam Governor To Quit On Jan. 20th

AGANA, Guam (AP)—Carleton E. Skinner disclosed he will resign by Jan. 20, the day the new Republican administration takes over in Washington.

The Guam governor said yesterday he informed Secretary of the Interior-designate Douglas McKay of his intention to quit when they met at Honolulu last week. He said he had asked that announcement of his decision be withheld until he could report to the Guam Legislature.

Skinner quoted McKay as saying he had no one in mind for the post.

Four UHF Stations To Get Transmitters

NEW YORK (AP)—Ultra high frequency (UHF) television takes a giant stride today, with four stations receiving transmitters for sending programs on channels newly opened to video.

They will race to get on the air as quickly as possible, and the winner will be the nation's second UHF station and the first with commercial equipment.

Station WFPQ-TV in Atlantic City, N. J., is claiming the honor in advance, saying it will have its transmitter installed and test signals on the air within hours, possibly by midnight, with regular programs starting at 5 p.m., EST, Saturday.

All four stations have trucks and engineers waiting at the Camden, N. J., plant of the RCA Victor Division of Radio Corporation of America.

Lad Back In The Marines

READING, Pa. (AP)—The in-again-out-again boy of the Marine Corps, 17-year-old William H. Houston, is in again today.

Houston, whose father Marine Maj. John Lester Houston, was killed at Iwo Jima in 1943, enlisted in Jacksonville, Fla., when he was 15.

He had almost completed boot training at Parris Island, S. C., when his age was discovered and he was discharged. Not to be discouraged, Houston enlisted again at Reading when he was 15.

"You here again?" they asked at Parris Island as they gave the lad his second honorable discharge. During his present enlistment Houston told Sgt. Norman Persing he was 17, the sergeant asked "You're not kidding now?" Houston assured him he was serious. He heads for Parris Island again in a few days.

Olivia Reaches Top

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Two Oscars and 35 starring roles after her movie debut, Olivia de Havilland has reached the film heights. She impressed her hand and footprints alongside her signature in wet cement in the forecourt of Grauman's Chinese Theater yesterday, together with those of other movie greats of today and yesterday.

By early afternoon they hope to be rolling toward their stations with their prized equipment. The other three are WSBA-TV, York, Pa.; WBRE-TV, Wilkes-Barre, Pa.; and WSBT-TV, South Bend, Ind.

The first UHF station on the air was KPTV in Portland, Ore., which started Sept. 19, but it temporarily is telecasting with equipment used by RCA for its experimental station at Bridgeport, Conn.

The engineering products department of RCA Victor said additional transmitters for UHF stations on the production line and would be shipped as fast as completed and tested. Other manufacturers, including General Electric, have similar equipment in the works.

The new UHF stations will be watched with close attention by the industry to learn what telecasters and set owners in other parts of the country can expect when additional stations of that type go on the air.

Ultra high frequencies were opened to TV the first time when the FCC last summer ended its 3½-year freeze on permits for new stations. It set up 70 new UHF channels to supplement the 12 very high frequency (VHF) channels that had previously been in use.

The new UHF stations cannot be tuned in by most sets now in use without converter attachments or, on models designed for the purpose, internal adjustments. New sets to tune in both bands now are on the market.

Ex-Circus Fat Lady Dies In California

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The death of "Dainty Doty," onetime 585-pound fat lady of Ringling Brothers circus fame, was disclosed yesterday.

The 43-year-old circus attraction died Tuesday at her home here. In private life, she was Mrs. Owen Jensen, wife of a circus tattoo artist.

In recent years, her weight had been considerably less than its circus peak. She made medical history on Aug. 12, 1949, when she gave birth to a 9-pound, 4½-ounce son by Caesarean section. She weighed 350 pounds then. Besides her husband, she leaves another son, Richard Strindberg, 21, by another marriage.

Alaniz Is Free Under Bond In Floyd Slaying

ALICE, Dec. 19 (AP)—Nago Alaniz, Alice attorney, was free today under \$15,000 bond on a charge of murder filed in an ambush slaying of Jacob S. Floyd Jr. last Sept. 6.

The attorney, underweight and looking haggard after the long imprisonment since his arrest Sept. 11, quickly disappeared after posting the bond ordered by the State Court of Criminal Appeals. Lower courts had refused to order that he be released.

He refused to answer when reporters asked if there was anything to rumors that he was a marked man.

Local officers indicated they would make no special effort to give Alaniz protection while he is out on bond before his scheduled trial Feb. 2, 1953.

"I don't know, I don't know," was the only answer the nervous attorney had to questions of where he was going, or what he would do until the trial. He and his wife jumped into a car with their two children and sped away—closely followed by a car driven by his brother, Luz Alaniz of Beeville.

The official order from the high state court that Alaniz be released on bond was received here about 1:40 p.m. A hearing was set for 3 p.m. At the hearing Alaniz presented a bond signed by D. C. Chapa and Lorenzo Garcia, both of Duval County, and was promptly released.

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 19 (AP)—Murder charges were to be filed here today in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Mary Ruth Boesikes, 57, who was found dead in a yard adjoining her home here yesterday.

Reputed Waterfront Boss Is On Trial For Perjury

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Federal Court jury will be called upon today to decide whether Edward J. Florio, a reputed New Jersey waterfront boss, made an honest mistake or deliberately lied to a grand jury.

Florio is on trial here on a two-count perjury indictment growing out of his testimony before a New York grand jury investigating racketeering on the waterfront in the New York area.

Barring unforeseen hitches, the case should reach the jury by early afternoon.

Florio, 57, took the witness stand yesterday and swore he thought he told the truth when he appeared before the New York grand jury Oct. 23.

As soon as he found out he had made a mistake, he testified, he asked for a chance to correct his testimony.

Florio, organizer for the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) in New Jersey, testified he was "confused" when he went before the grand jury the first time.

The question for the jury here to decide is whether Florio willfully lied when he said he did not receive two checks for \$1,000 each from Lawrence C. Howard, president of the Macirema Operating Company, Inc., a stevedoring firm.

He said his nephew, Gerald Lamby, got the checks.

In his second appearance before the grand jury—and from the witness stand yesterday—Florio said he was originally mistaken about Lamby getting the checks. He said Howard refreshed his memory on the point that he, not Lamby, got them.

Howard said the checks were for Florio's co-operation in getting seven shiploads of sugar unloaded promptly. He said Lamby never worked for his company.

Florio said Lamby helped round up workers to unload the sugar and that Lamby got the money. The checks were made out to Lamby, but bore the endorsements of both Lamby and Florio.

Florio said this was so because Lamby didn't have a bank account. If convicted on both counts, Florio faces a possible maximum sentence of 10 years, a fine of \$10,000, or both.

The case was transferred here from New York because Florio's attorney contended a "hostile atmosphere" against Florio had developed in New York growing out of the State Crime Commission's hearings on racketeering on the waterfront.

The pilot, who bailed out at 3,000 feet, but whose parachute didn't open until he was only about 300 feet off the ground, was Lt. Paul L. Brown, 28, of Sweetwater, Tex.

His back was sprained and an ankle injured when he landed in a creekbed.

Brown's base is nearby Moffett Field.



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Boston Gunman Is Involved In Brinks Robbery Of 1950

BOSTON (U)—Joseph J. "Specs" O'Keefe, 44-year-old Boston gunman has been nabbed by the FBI as one of the masked men who robbed the Brink's Boston headquarters of \$1,219,000 on the night of Jan. 17, 1950.

O'Keefe was named in affidavits filed by the FBI with the Federal Court in Boston.

The affidavits became available to newsmen late yesterday as O'Keefe fought a contempt of court charge resulting from his refusal to answer pertinent questions before a grand jury hearing evidence in the robbery.

One of the affidavits, signed by John B. Greene, a special agent of the FBI who heads the Brink's investigation, says that he "has reason to believe that Joseph J. O'Keefe was one of the participants in the robbery."

A second affidavit says that \$60,000 in Brink's loot was hidden in a house occupied by O'Keefe's

sister, Mrs. Mary A. Hooley, 37. A third affidavit sets forth that on July 19, 1950, the \$60,000 was transferred to the home of a Mary O'Keefe, identified as Joseph O'Keefe's wife.

A fourth affidavit tells of an alleged telephone conversation between O'Keefe, then serving 90 days in a Pennsylvania jail, for carrying weapons in his car, and Mary O'Keefe.

Agent Greene says in the paper, "He (O'Keefe) asked his wife whether or not she had been interviewed by federal enforcement officials and she said she had."

"He asked whether or not anything was found, and she answered: 'No,' and later he told her: 'Just take good care of the baby. You know what I mean.'"

Federal authorities said there is no O'Keefe baby.

One of the affidavits asserts that the \$60,000 of alleged Brink's loot was hidden in an "overstuffed baby stationary chair and footstool or in a leather zippered overnight bag" in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Hooley, O'Keefe's sister and brother-in-law.

Milk Production At A Low Level, Ag Dept. Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (U)—The Agriculture Department said today U. S. milk production is at a modern-day record low level in relation to needs of the rapidly increasing population.

Milk production was estimated at about 116 billion pounds this year, or about the same as 10 years earlier. However, during this 10-year period, population has increased by more than 20 million.

"How to meet the increasing demand for dairy products is a matter of grave concern to all who are interested in the nutritional welfare of our rapidly growing population," said a report by the department's Bureau of Dairy Industry.

Consumers would be in a bad way for dairy products, the report commented, if research hadn't shown industry how to use a much larger portion of the milk output in the form of various human foods.

Ten years ago, for example, only about 50 per cent of the non-butterfat portion of the milk produced was used in human foods. Now more than 70 per cent is being used, largely as dried milk. Formerly, much skim milk was used on farms for livestock feed.

Fate Of Health Plan Rests On Ike Views

WASHINGTON (U)—The fate of a new plan to make it easier for people to meet doctor bills appeared today to hinge on whether President-elect Eisenhower is for it and how strongly the American Medical Association may be against it.

The plan, developed by President Truman's Commission on the nation's health needs, is built largely around voluntary, prepaid medical insurance financed in part by federal and state governments.

Senators interested in the health problem said they doubted the new program could get through Congress if the AMA decides to battle it. They said the one thing that might get it enacted would be definite, unambiguous words from the new President that he wants it.

Eisenhower has taken no stand so far on the voluntary, pay-in-advance health plan. During the presidential campaign, he spoke out against what he termed "socialized medicine" and for improved medical service for the people.

The AMA up to now has taken a stand in opposition—on only one phase of the program. AMA President Louis H. Bauer said a recommendation that the government

buy health insurance for some social security beneficiaries out of social security funds spells "compulsory health insurance" and eventual control of health services by "big government."

The AMA intends to thumb through the entire report before commenting on all of it.

Truman, who battled through the years for a compulsory health insurance plan financed by payroll taxes on employers and employees, found the new proposal satisfactory. He said he hoped it would be carried out.

Whether his endorsement will have weight with the incoming Republican Congress is, of course, questionable. Truman couldn't get compulsory health insurance approved even when the Democrats ran Congress.

What the health commission proposes is a broad new system, backed by 1½ billion dollars of federal and state funds every year, to help bring medical care within the reach of everyone who wants it on a prepayment basis.

States and individuals could come in or stay out. If they came in, it would be under standards set by the federal government. But the insurance plan would be run largely by local and state boards.

Icy Roads Prove Undoing Of Kidnapper Of Sheriff

AMARILLO, Dec. 19 (U)—A 20-year-old two-gun kidnapper of a sheriff and a wrecker driver, smashed two automobiles after stealing one of them at gun-point and then meekly surrendered last night at Vega, Tex., 40 miles east of here.

Icy Panhandle roads proved the undoing of the youth who said he was from St. Louis, Mo. Early today no charges had been filed.

It all started when Wrecker Malcolm Vaughn of Amarillo received a call about 10 p. m. from a man who said he turned his car over west of Amarillo.

Vaughn picked up the caller and drove to the accident scene but Potter County officers there told the driver not to move the vehicle until Highway Patrol officers investigated.

Vaughn said that as soon as the

county officers left, his customer pulled a gun and said, "Here's a .38 that will get the car set up."

But the wrecker driver broke his cable righting the car and was unable to tow it. The gunman ordered him to drive west in the wrecker.

Just before reaching Bushland, 13 miles west of here, the youth got out of the wrecker and allowed Vaughn to return to Amarillo.

Vaughn notified police, but meanwhile the gunman hitched a ride with Sheriff Day Thompson. As they drove west, a Highway Patrol broadcast warned police to look out for the armed hitchhiker.

That was when the youth pulled his gun again and ordered the sheriff to the side of the road. He ripped the radio from the car and threw the vehicle's keys away. They he ordered Thompson to stop the next westbound auto.

Brandishing his gun, the youth made the unidentified man and woman in the car alight and left the trio stranded on the road.

Marshall Dave Hillburn and Deputy Sheriff John Ivy, traveling east on Highway 66, had heard a state police broadcast and gave chase when they met the gunman in the speeding auto.

The stolen car, traveling at high speed, skidded on a stretch of icy pavement, left the highway and overturned.

Hillburn and Ivy advanced on the wrecked car with drawn guns. The quarry surrendered quickly and was placed in the Vega jail.

The biggest throng is expected for the Cotton Bowl in Dallas Saturday afternoon when Lubbock meets Baytown for the Class AAAA title. Rains that started falling in Dallas Thursday night will be warded away by game time, the weather man said, and 20,000 are anticipated when the two powerhouses clash for the big prize of the year in schoolboy football.

At Waco, where Temple and Breckenridge battle Saturday afternoon for the Class AAA championship, 15,000 or more are due unless bad weather continues.

Huntsville and Yoakum clash Friday night at Brenham in semifinals of Class AA with 6,000 forecast. Saturday afternoon Stamford and Terrell play at Abilene in the other semifinal, and 6,000 to 8,000 are anticipated.

Deer Park beat Cedar Bayou on penetrations in a 13-13 tie Thursday night at Baytown to push into the finals of Class A. The Deers edged Cedar Bayou three penetrations to two as a crowd of 5,000 watched.

Deer Park's opponent in the finals will be determined Saturday afternoon at Brownwood when Wink plays Van. A crowd of 4,000 is anticipated there.

Lubbock and Temple are favored to win the AAAA and AAA titles but the margin is thin—three points in each case. Lubbock is defending champion while Breckenridge was the AAA king last season.

Deer Park scored with only 22 seconds to go last night in tying Cedar Bayou. It was a 66-yard drive with Bobby Rector smashing over from the one-yard line.

Deer Park took the lead in the second period after recovering a fumble on the Cedar Bayou 14-yard line. Sammy Blount cracked over right tackle for the score and kicked the extra point. Harry Gilstrap, Amarillo sports writer who never was very complimentary in his appraisal of Longhorn League play, although he never troubled to see any of the teams play, has given the circuit a left-handed compliment.

In a recent column, Harry pointed out that the Longhorn League had representatives from all clubs at the recent Minor League Convention in Phoenix, whereas the proud WT-NM wheel had but four delegates in attendance.

(That may be the reason, incidentally, the decision to re-align both leagues has been delayed.)

"Ever since the Longhorn League was organized, the WT-NM folk have taken a patronizing attitude toward it. But the West-Newmex visitors at Phoenix seemed to be in private agreement that the Longhorn definitely should have us outclassed in 1953, unless the WT-NM's radical new player rule is revised.

"In past seasons, the Longhorn clubs usually have been glad to get players who weren't quite good enough to make our lineup," commented one veteran owner. "Next year, it probably will be the other way around; we may be asking them for help."

Do tell.

If worn-out ball players far past their prime, going downhill at an alarming rate, provide the fans with good baseball, then Gilstrap and his mob are right.

The youth program long since installed by Longhorn League owners not only provides better baseball. It's less expensive.

Sure, the big places like Amarillo and Lubbock can wonder why the number of veterans in that club are being reduced. They can take the losses that run into five figures year in and year out and not complain.

But the little operatives suddenly decided they were cutting their own throats by paying AA and AAA salaries to Class C ball players.

It's a question of survival with most of the teams in that august organization. Some one should tell Gilstrap the facts of life.

JULIAN MORGAN APPLIES FOR JOB HERE
Julian Morgan, who masterminded the Sweetwater Longhorn League entry for a spell a couple of seasons ago, is one who applied for the job as field boss of the local baseballers.

Morgan not only has fine references but a good record to back him up.

Last season he joined Ardmore of the Sooner State League with half of the campaign gone and the club mired in eighth place. Three other managers had been tried and found wanting. The same club played 598 ball for Julian the remainder of the season.

In 1951, Morgan skipped the Laredo club in the Class B Gulf Coast League. Though the team was last in club field and seventh in hitting, it wound up fourth place in the standings and proceeded to win six playoff games.

He's 34, has been in baseball 14 years and boasts 4½ years experience as a manager.

IN CRUSHING ITALIANS

American Doubles Team Looks Good

SYDNEY, Australia (U.S.)—Considering they were playing together for the first time, Vic Seixas of Philadelphia and Tony Trabert of Cincinnati looked like a remarkably promising doubles team today in crushing the veteran Italian pair of Gianni Cucelli and Marcello del Bello in clinching victory for the U. S. in the Davis Cup tennis interzone final.

The scores of 6-4, 6-3, 6-2 indicate the green American team got progressively sharper as the match went on. Their teamwork was poor in the opening set, but towards the last they were sweeping their befuddled opponents off the court.

Such a knowing Australian critic as Jack Crawford, who once was one of the world's greatest doubles stars, commented afterwards that the new American combination looked good enough to give the Aussies plenty of trouble in the challenge round at Adelaide 10 days hence.

Seixas played on a sore, slightly swollen right ankle which he hurt when he fell in yesterday's singles match against Fausto Gardini. To spare the ankle he mainly served only at halfspeed and suffered the only American service break in the opening set.

Trabert's booming first serve was going in and he won five of his seven services at love.

The two Italians, who proved themselves mighty trenchermen during their visit to Australia, put considerable fire into their play in the first set and had the crowd cheering when they broke Seixas' delivery to square it at 4-4.

But at that point they began to run out of gas whereas their tall, young rivals stepped up the pace and it rapidly became no contest.

In the first set the Italians won eight clean points merely by knocking the ball between the Americans who stood staring stupidly at each other.

Tony at Vic must have rigged up some signals after that because they didn't let it happen again in the last two sets. They broke Del Bello's service twice to win the second set and gave Cucelli the same medicine in the third set.

Seixas, the U. S. team captain, expressed great satisfaction with the showing he and Trabert made their first time out. "Unless something happens," he said, they will undoubtedly pair against the Aussies.

"Of course," he added, "we need a lot more practice together but we have time to get that starting Monday in Adelaide."

With the interzone final already decided, Seixas said he would stay out of tomorrow's concluding singles and let Ham Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., take his place against Del Bello who will substitute for Cucelli.

Turpin No. One Middleweight; Olson Coming

NEW YORK (U.S.)—With Sugar Ray Robinson retired—positively—the next step is an elimination tournament to set up a new middleweight champion.

Already the wheels are turning for an international tournament involving all the top contenders. For once, the National Boxing Association and New York State Athletic Commission seem to be in agreement.

Robinson took a backhanded slap at the New York commission yesterday when he released his "complete and unequivocal" retirement through Abe Greene of Paterson, N. J., commissioner of the NBA.

New York stripped him of his title Dec. 4 for not defending within the six-month limit.

Greene's announcement said Robinson selected the NBA as the medium for his official retirement because it represents the majority of the boxing commissions of the world and because it has been extremely helpful to him.

George Barton, NBA president, told Greene by telephone from his St. Paul office that the American title should be cleared up at once by a contest between Bobo Olson, ranking challenger, and Ernie Durando, Paddy Young and Rocky Castellani a runners up, the survivor to meet the winner of a Randy Turpin-Charles Humez bout in Europe. The NBA favors speedy action with no more than 90 days between bouts.

Bob Christenberry, New York chairman, also was making plans for a tournament by reviewing the outstanding contenders.

"Turpin is No. 1 on everybody's list," said Christenberry. "And Olson is the outstanding contender. Then there are Humez, Durando, Young, Castellani, Walter Cartier and perhaps some others."

Jim Norris, president of the IBC, announced Dec. 10 plans to hold a tournament. In addition to the names Christenberry mentioned Norris may include the winner of tonight's Billy Graham-Joe Gardo bout. Graham, although a 148-pound "middleweight," wants to mingle with the heavier boys.

Over in London, promoter Jack Solomons has been talking of a June 9 Turpin-Robinson bout on the word of George Gainford, Sugar Ray's manager.

Robinson explained some of the reasons for the confusion surrounding his retirement plans. Ever since last August when he underwent a minor operation on his nose and had scar tissue removed from around his eyes, there have been stories that Ray never would fight again. Gainford has continued to make stout denials.

After the New York commission vacated the title, Gainford wrote a letter disclosing plans for a Robinson-Turpin fight in Europe. The commission agreed to review the case if Gainford presented documentary evidence.

"A lot of very big people, and I mean very big people in boxing, put a lot of pressure on me to go through with the Turpin match," said Robinson. "But I felt I should have made this announcement long before. Finally I made up my mind all of a sudden. I didn't want to be like a lot of others who didn't retire in time."

Robinson said he was retiring because "at this stage of my career I don't feel I can give my followers the best I have. I don't want to let them down." In his last fight, June 25, he collapsed in the 103-degree heat, a 14th-round TKO victim of Joey Maxim in a bid for a third title.

Robinson's future is set. He owns a beer and ale distributing agency, a bar and grill, a lingerie shop, a barbershop, cleaning establishment and a real estate office in Harlem. He started a career as a night club entertainer Nov. 8 and is booked for a long tour that will take him to Detroit, Chicago, Las Vegas and Miami Beach after the holidays.

One of the all time greats of the sport, the 32-year-old former welterweight and middleweight king lost only three of 137 pro fights.

Pattison Is Given New Grid Contract
LUBBOCK, Dec. 19 (U.S.)—C. R. (Pat) Pattison will begin a new five-year contract as Lubbock High School football coach on Feb. 1.

In a surprise action yesterday the school board offered him the new five-year term. He still had a year to go on the old contract. The action squelched rumors that Pattison planned to resign at the end of the year or the end of his present contract.

"This is the nicest Christmas present I've ever received," he said.

He also denied rumors that he planned to accept a job offered by another school.

"I can truthfully say I've never even considered going to another school," he said.

Canadian Ship Wallowing In North Pacific

VANCOUVER, B. C. (U) — Her rudder damaged and buffeted by a heavy wind, the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company freighter Maplecove wallowed helplessly in rough North Pacific waters today.

Help was en route to the 10,000-ton ship which gave a position 1,200 miles off the British Columbia coast. But officials estimated it would take the tug Island Sovereign of Vancouver at least four more days to reach the ship.

The Maplecove radioed for aid yesterday while inbound to Vancouver from Yokohama. The ship's master, Capt. R. A. Leicester, reported the Maplecove was in no immediate danger although it could not be controlled.

A Canadian weather ship stationed 200 miles west of the position given by the Maplecove reported later that winds of 55 to 60 miles an hour were blowing.

Three or four other ships are reported in the Maplecove's vicinity to speed relief should she indicate conditions have become more hazardous.

Santa Claus Is Given Healthy Boost In Pay

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — Santa Claus has won a \$25-a-week raise.

Ernie Fast, head of the AFL American Guild of Variety Artists in the San Francisco Bay area, said the big, jovial men who play St. Nick for department store shoppers are getting \$100 for a five-day, 27 1/2-hour week this season.

Many of the Santas are old vaudeville actors.

Strategy Aims At Ending Filibusters

WASHINGTON (U) — Senators trying to figure out how to smash filibusters are considering strategy that could throw the opening session of the new Senate on Jan. 3 into an uproar.

Behind their efforts is a desire to clear the way for civil rights measures. They hope to deprive opponents of their most trusted weapon, the filibuster, which can be used to talk legislation to death.

A leader in the move, Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), said today Republican and Democratic senators who favor making it easier to shut off debate have been invited to confer here Dec. 30.

Humphrey told a reporter that one course of action under study is to move at the start of the session for the adoption of new Senate rules—a maneuver aimed at eliminating Rule 22.

Under Rule 22, a halt can be called to a filibuster only by the votes of 64 senators, or two-thirds of the entire membership. Opponents contend it is almost impossible to apply.

What's more, Rule 22 provides that no debate limitation whatever shall apply to proposals to change the rules—so that any move to change it can be talked to death.

Tentative opening-day strategy outlined by Humphrey to cope with this roadblock to civil rights and other legislation involves some fast parliamentary footwork.

Here's what Humphrey expects would happen if the plan were put into execution:

At the outset of the session a motion would be made to adopt new Senate rules; the vice president, who is Senate presiding

officer, probably would rule that the motion was out of order, relying on all past precedents that the Senate, because only a third of its membership changes at one time, is a continuing body and so already has its rules.

An appeal would be taken from the ruling of the vice president; only a majority vote is necessary to overturn such a ruling and Humphrey is hopeful that the necessary votes could be obtained.

If the vice president were overruled, the effect would be to leave the Senate without an yokes.

Humphrey said in the case ordinary parliamentary rules would apply and any senators attempting to filibuster against the adoption of new rules no longer would have the protection of Rule 22.

Bing Is Rehired As Met Opera Manager

NEW YORK (U) — Rudolf Bing, who modernized and streamlined Metropolitan Opera productions, has been hired for another three-year term as general manager.

Oakwood Bank Robbery Suspect Arrested In La.

OAKWOOD, Dec. 19 (U) — Police trying for a fast solution to the \$14,376 Oakwood bank robbery pressed the hunt today for a jailbreaker and planned to question a suspect arrested in Louisiana.

The bank was robbed in swift, efficient fashion early Wednesday by two men, one believed to be a Latin-American.

A large, bloodhound-led posse failed last night to find the 30-year-old jailbreaker wanted for questioning in the robbery. The fugitive, Charles G. Davis, escaped Nov. 2 from the Baytown jail where he was being held on an auto theft charge.

Police said Davis is a parole violator from Alabama.

Earlier, a suspect in the robbery had been apprehended in Villa Platte, La., and Deputy Sheriff Ivan Bell of Leon County was bringing him to Centerville today.

The widespread search for Davis began northeast of Houston in Harris County yesterday afternoon. A Houston homicide lieutenant, Frank Murray, had noted that Davis resembled one of the bank robbers. A deputy sheriff reported that he had seen the fugitive in Baytown.

Murray also said the second man involved in the robbery was described similarly to a man known to be an associate of Davis. He was described by police as a "Fort Worth police character."

A pair of khaki pants and a plaid shirt, found in the woods four or five miles from here, were among the meager clues police had.

The shirt was identified as one worn by one of the robbers.

The two men forced three bank employees to lie on the floor while they scooped up cash a few minutes before the bank was scheduled to open.

A 1949 Ford was used as the getaway car but the men abandoned it soon after the robbery and were believed to have switched to a light green Chevrolet.

A Galveston address and a Latin-American name was found in a letter in the pocket of the shirt. One of the men was described by bank employees as being dark complexioned.

A letter from a mother to her 19-year-old son in a small Louisiana town was found in the pants.

Harbor Is Cleared

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (U) — Exits and entrances to Belfast Harbor were clear today after tugs pulled the 15,000-ton tanker Caltex Wellington off a mudbank. The oiler, owned by a British company, blocked passage in and out of the port when it ran aground yesterday. It was refloated at high tide last night.

Former Resident Freed In Murder

Leo Walling, formerly of Big Spring, was acquitted of murder in Los Angeles, Calif., Thursday noon.

He had been tried on a charge that he had slain Irene Black in a low rate hotel last September. The victim's nude body had been found in the hotel and Walling was picked up later on tentative identification of a bartender and a taxi driver

that he had been with the woman earlier.

Clerk of the hotel, however, could not identify him. Walling claimed he could not remember anything that happened during a two or three day period in which the slaying was said to have occurred. He had, he said, been drinking heavily.

Clyde E. Thomas Sr., Big Spring attorney, was due home from California today. He had gone to Los Angeles as a member of the defense counsel.

Thieves Don't Want To Cash The Checks

TULSA, Okla. (U) — Two bandits kidnapped at gunpoint an American Airlines messenger who was on his way to make a \$100,000 bank deposit but handed the money bag back when they discovered it contained only checks.

Detective Lt. Paul Livingston said the men left Joe Wing, the 20-year-old employee, bound and gagged in their stolen automobile yesterday after driving him around the city for about 45 minutes. Wing worked free and telephoned his employer.

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Emmanuel--God With Us

"HE SHALL SAVE HIS PEOPLE FROM THEIR SINS"

Scripture--Matthew 1.

 HOW MANY of us can trace our ancestry back very far? There is said to be no accurate genealogy for Abraham Lincoln before 1700; nor for George Washington before 1600. In our lesson Jesus' ancestors are traced back thousands of years.

Many Americans have ancestors who came over with the very earliest settlers. Others whose people crossed the ocean later or who themselves are immigrants, may have even longer genealogies back in their former homelands, but all become Americans, loyal, faithful citizens of our "melting pot."

The chapter assigned as today's lesson is very short and about half of it is taken by the genealogy. The rest relates to Joseph's reactions to his realization that Mary, his affianced wife, was going to have a child.

St. Luke tells us of the declaration to Mary by the angel that

"And she shall bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call His name Jesus; for He shall save His people from their sins."

The angel also told Joseph of the ancient prophecy, so he, "being raised from sleep, did as the angel of the Lord had bidden him, and took unto him his wife. They did not live together as man and wife, however, until after Jesus' birth. He took the dream as a revelation from God and a token of His favor, which it was.

Our editor says that the name of Jesus is the Greek form of the Hebrew word, Joshua, and Joshua is an abbreviation of the name Jehoshua, from two words--Jah and Yasha, meaning "to save."

Let me quote from a sermon by the late J. D. Jones, who is quoted at length by the editor of our notes. It should bring our Father and His son, Jesus, nearer to us:

"The kinship between God and

A wise man, Joseph, to do nothing hastily that he might regret later. The angel of the Lord said to Joseph, "Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary, thy wife; for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost."

man is deeper and more vital than the difference. God breathed into man the breath of life, and he became a living soul. In the image of God created He him. God is spirit, and man is spirit, too.

"It follows from all this that if God must reveal Himself, it is in and through man He must do it, for only in man can He do it adequately or fully.

"He can show His power in the material universe. His wisdom in the field of history; but to show His love, His self-sacrificing and redeeming love which is His essential nature, He had to reveal Himself in the person of Man. Man's nature makes it possible for Him to do so."

In conclusion, let us remind ourselves that "Abraham was called of God; David was anointed king by God; Christ was fore-ordained by God through the prophet. He was conceived by the power of the Third Person of the Godhead. He was given two names that providentially reveal the love of God for lost men, His coming was announced by the angels of God."

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If men did that we would need no other laws, no enforcement officers, no armies, and Christ's Kingdom would prevail on earth as in heaven. "And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength." — Mark 12:30.

There is "discontent and rebellion" in Czechoslovakia, on the admission of no less an authority than the Communist premier, Antonin Zapotocky, printed right out loud in the Czech Communist Party's own organ, Rude Pravo.

President Klement Gottwald recently admitted that the production of milk, eggs and farm goods had fallen lower than it was in 1947, before the Reds came to power.

The West has had recent reports that Russia's industrial demands on Czechoslovakia have been draining the nation and creating chaotic conditions. The living standards, once the highest in Europe, is in a shambles. "Hunger demonstrations" in defiance of the Communist police have recently been reported.

The fact that the Red masters of Czechoslovakia have come right out and admitted that all was not well with the country departs from standard Communist practice, which is to depict conditions as heavenly.

Why do they make such an admission?

Certainly not to serve as an alibi with the Kremlin for failure to meet quotas. Moscow probably knows as much about the internal condition of all its satellites as the satellites know.

They may admit it as the prelude to a new blood purge, as an excuse for new oppressions upon the people. Ruthless suppression of public disorders is a Communist specialty, but even a totalitarian dictatorship feels the necessity from time to time to explain away its failures to the people.

There is no doubting the plight of the satellite peoples. Russia has been exacting ever-rising industrial quotas out of them in its drive for military preparedness. Its flunkies who function in Prague and Sofia and Budapest and Warsaw are little more than collection agents whose principal jobs, held under the tolerance of Moscow, is to exact the last full measure of sacrifice out of the people in order to build up Russia's military potential.

Three ideas are slowly taking hold in Asia, even among front-line Communist troops in Korea, according to two editors of U. S. News & World Report who went to Korea with Eisenhower and stayed behind to interview United Nations fighting men.

The information on which these conclusions are based was gathered from captured or deserting enemy troops. It adds up to a belief among enemy troops that the U. S. and its allies will eventually win because of these factors—to quote U. S. News verbatim:

First, the U. N. has greater fire power.

Second, discipline and unrest and the poverty of Communist-controlled North Korea are increasing—and the enemy troops are aware of the relative prosperity of South Korea.

Third—and most important—the Communists are at last convinced, much to their own surprise, that the U. S. is in to stay. The idea is spreading across the enemy front that the U. S., led by Gen. James A. Van Fleet, is outlasting the Com-

munists in patience, coolness and determination.

The report goes on to say: "It is a hard thing to understand, but the steady blood-bath of Americans and South Koreans and others is chipping away the Asian idea that the Communists are all-powerful. The idea that the U. S. could not fight a sustained war of pressure is going down the drain."

These men found this war, in its present static state, "horribly deadly and mean." In spite of their growing conviction that they can't win, the enemy troops continue to fight with courage and determination. They are "tough and strong," and any notion that they are eager to surrender is "just not so."

Destroying the widespread Asiatic belief that Communists' armies are invincible is no small gain. Building up the conviction that the United States of America and its armed forces are not to be trifled with is something we should foster by every means. Our men are laying the foundations for that with their blood and stamina.

WASHINGTON.—No one can doubt that the most difficult assignment in the new administration has fallen to John Foster Dulles who will be President Eisenhower's secretary of State. It is not alone that Dulles must work out a new and constructive foreign policy.

Almost equally difficult will be the second phase of his task—rebuilding not only the State Department but the Foreign Service. The demoralization of the agency for executing foreign policy is all but complete.

This has not happened with thunderclap suddenness. For nearly three years, under a succession of attacks, the department has steadily deteriorated in effectiveness, in morale, and above all, in independence of thought and judgment. The suspension of John Carter Vincent, a Foreign Service officer for 28 years, on the ground of "reasonable doubt" of his loyalty, comes as a final confirmation of the department's plight.

Those With Same Number Of Dollars As In Pre-War Days Find Going Toughest

Or would it?

Call it "making a dollar worth 100 cents again," and it sounds fine. Call it "inflation," and a lot of people get worried.

When you talk of a "52-cent dollar," you mean that before the war 52 cents would buy as much in goods and services as one dollar now buys.

The pre-war dollar brought more finished goods. It also brought more goods or labor he says for sale.

A Virginia farmer says of inflation: "I'm not having more money. I know it runs right through my fingers when I go to the store. But I like the feel of more of it in my hands."

And a Bloomington, Ill., man writes "Our dollar is worth 100 cents. Always has been and always will be."

None of this is intended as a defense of inflation—which does pose one any good, just gives them the nice feeling of having more money, all of which runs right through their fingers.

It might be well for the American nervous system, now raw and twitching because of the seeming endlessness of the fighting, to adjust itself to the idea Eisenhower may not be able to produce a miracle.

After all, he promised none. He said he's got to Korea, which he did, in search of an answer. When he returned, he didn't say he had found one although he would hardly tip off the enemy by saying much publicly, anyway.

Neither Gen. Eisenhower nor Gen. MacArthur has suggested he had any intention of talking with Truman about a solution.

But when Truman clouded up and rained all over both generals he probably dampened any notion either might have had about exchanging ideas with him.

So if Eisenhower and MacArthur came to any conclusion in their get-together Wednesday it is something which both men probably will keep to themselves, insofar as Truman is concerned.

If that is a correct guess then the country will have to wait until after Eisenhower's inauguration Jan. 20 for any evidence that he has found any way at all to end the Korean War.

It seems clearly established that Eisenhower will hold firm to this government's present position: The Allies will not hand over to the Communists prisoners who don't want to go back to them.

On this point the armistice talks broke down. For whatever the reason, the Communists refused to budge and the fighting has continued.

And the fighting seems destined to continue unless they yield on the prisoner of war issue or are whipped into yielding on the battlefield by a new and tremendous Allied offensive.

Before such an offensive could begin Eisenhower would have to plan for it and consider the consequences, both in starting it and if it failed.

If it should fail after the loss of many lives—and a big offensive would cost more lives, for a while, anyway, than the present kind of fighting—Eisenhower would be criticized at home.

life had started out auspiciously enough. For a time he earned his living as a farm hand and cowboy and supplemented his income by assisting U.S. deputy marshals in their work in the Indian Territory. But something happened to change his attitude, for in 1894 he organized an outlaw gang which he led in many bold robberies in the very country he had formerly helped to "protect."

The new career didn't last long. Less than six months, in fact. In January, 1895 Sheriff T. D. Love of Borden County captured Bill Cook in New Mexico, and the criminal was sentenced to a forty-five year term in federal prison.

Other members of Cook's gang ended up in the same way, or worse. One Henry Munson was killed by an Indian; Lon Gordon was killed by officers while resisting arrest. A long prison term took care of "Chicken" Lucas and Texas Rangers captured "Skeeter" Baldwin, who had fled to Texas after Cook's capture. In the excellent "Album of Gunfighters," Marvin Hunter tells about a stranger wandering into a sheep camp where Hunter, then only a boy, was on guard alone. The visitor stayed for two days, making himself useful. Hunter did not learn until much later that he had "harbored" the notorious "Skeeter" Baldwin.

No doubt things are going badly in New York. But one of the reasons they are going so badly is that the United States, in this interval between the two administrations, is unable to play its necessary part.

is to muddle through until the adjournment of this session of the General Assembly, it is likely to make the underlying trouble in Tunisia even worse in the future.

When we take the position that anything can be discussed in the U.N. but that this is the kind of question about which nothing should be done in the U.N. then—unintentionally, of course—we are putting a big premium on irreconcilability and violence. For our formula is bound to raise the ob-

What is it that is going so badly in the U.N.? It is that alongside the older conflict with the Soviet bloc there is now a widening schism between the North Atlantic democracies and the nations of Asia and Africa

This second conflict, this division within the non-Communist world, is a very serious matter. The effect is to provoke irreconcilable trouble between the native people

It may be that there is a better approach to a problem of this kind than to split legal hairs over whether or not there is not an "emergency question." It would be far more important the matter not as lawyers and litigants, but as citizens and as a more responsible

It is only too plain that the Soviet Union is counting heavily on this second conflict within the non-Communist world to turn the balance of power against the Atlantic alliance. If things go on as they are now going, the Soviet's expectations may well be fulfilled.

This second conflict has come up in New York in the form of a dispute between France and a bloc of Arab-Asian states as to whether the U.N. could or should intervene in the Tunisian question. The French government has refused to participate in the discussions on the ground that the Tunisian question is internal within the French union. The Arab-Asian nations have argued that the relationship between the Bey of Tunis and France is an international question.

This is a dangerous dispute in the sense that its tendency is to provoke a collision between an immovable object, which is France, and an irresistible force, which is Arab nationalism. The net effect is to stiffen French resistance and to incite the nationalist rebellion.

Was it necessary that the U.N. should find itself in this position? Is there no other way of dealing with a question of this sort when it is brought to the U.N.? For if there is not any other way, then the darkest prophecies may well be justified.

We found that we were faced with a dilemma in which, contrary to our interests and to our sentiments, we were asked to take sides. The policy we adopted was intended to be a compromise. As against the French we said: Let the Tunisian question be discussed. As against the Asian bloc, we said: Let among some of the discussion except words that require no

Other natives went out and located the lion, finding it dead from the spear wounds. There was much shouting when the body of the beast—which was believed to be the man-eater—was placed on a huge bonfire and burned.

A fence failed to keep the animal out. Raised platforms were built, but the lion made high leaps to the sleeping places, and each time added a new victim to his list.

Two half-breed elephant hunters happened to visit the village, but they failed to shoot the monster. One of them, known as Hui Janjie, was awakened by low growl. 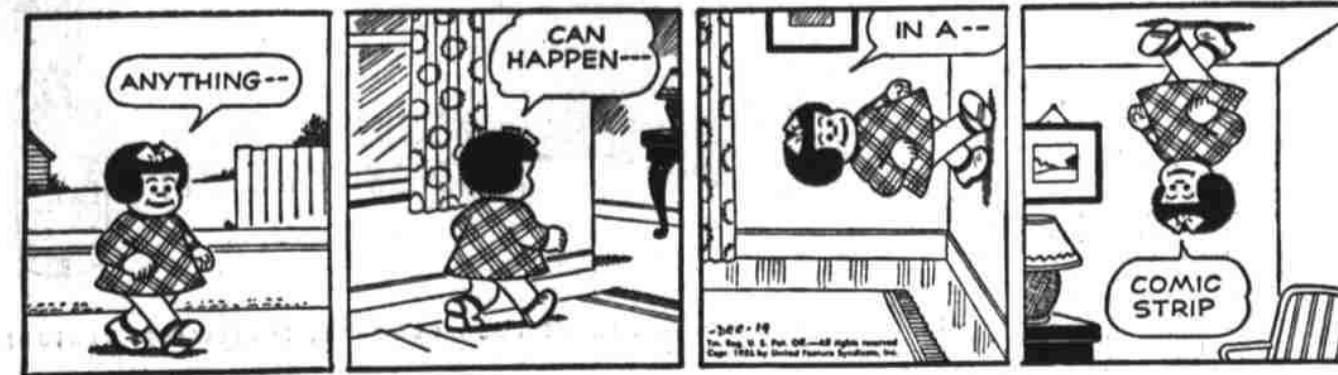
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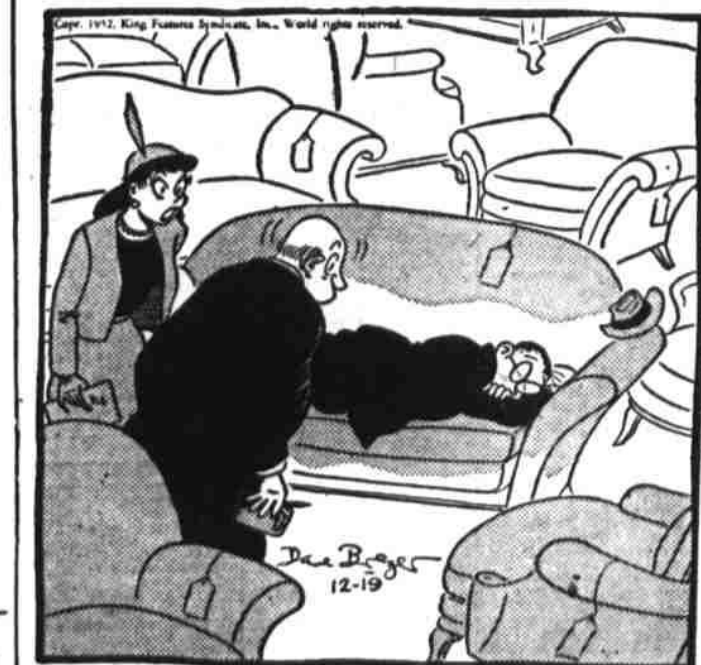
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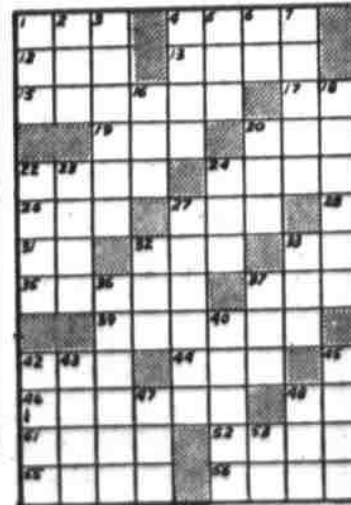

AP Reporter Is Science Winner

WASHINGTON (AP) — Alton L. Blakeslee, an Associated Press science reporter, and Morton M. Hunt, a free-lance writer, have won \$1,000 awards for the year's best science writing.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science yesterday named them to receive the annual AAAS-George Westinghouse Science Awards. The prizes will be presented in St. Louis Dec. 29.

AUSTIN, Dec. 19 (AP)—One of the top executive posts in the attorney general's office will go to a woman when incoming Atty.-Gen. John Ben Shepperd takes over Jan. 1.

Shepperd yesterday announced appointment of Mrs. Mary K. Wall, Austin, as his legislative and reviewing assistant. Mrs. Wall will be the first woman to hold a high executive post in the department. She has been an assistant attorney general since 1950.

SUPPLIES MOVING AT A FAST RATE

Air Force Depot In France Finally Gets Into High Gear

USAF DEPOT, Chateauroux, France (AP)—Still working in mud without hangars and warehouses, 4,300 American airmen and 1,800 French civilians in this big 17-month-old supply base are finally delivering the tools of air warfare at a fairly normal pace.

Since January, supplies issued to American Air Force units in France and to America's Atlantic allies have increased 100 per cent. The tonnage, which for security reasons is secret, has nearly reached that of the big U. S. Air Force base at Erding in Southern Germany, Maj. Gen. Joseph B. Hicks of Lander, Wyo., depot commander, said.

The depot's second job, maintenance of U. S. aircraft, will get under way this month when at least part of a 8,500-foot concrete runway is opened for use.

Happiest of all to see the runway open will be the crews of the C47 and C119 Air Force cargo planes which have been landing for more than a year in a soft grass-covered field at this depot.

"It's a miracle that a plane hasn't hit a hole or sunk into a soft spot and tipped over on its nose," one airman said.

The new runway was built to Air Force specifications to handle jet fighters and the biggest U. S. Air Force bombers.

This air depot will be the biggest U. S. Air Force maintenance and supply base outside the United States, Gen. Hicks told this correspondent. Nouasseur in French Morocco will be a bigger U. S. airbase but it is also an operational point. An argument between the U. S. Air Force and the Mutual Security Agency over who was going to foot the bill for construction work here

delayed the development of the base last spring.

"We have the money now," Hicks said, "But we cannot make up for the time lost."

A prefabricated supply warehouse of 1,200,000 square feet at \$1 per square foot has been ordered from a Dutch firm. Construction is to start next spring and be completed in eight months.

Until the building is up, millions of dollars worth of supplies will sit outdoors in packing cases or in canvas woodframed huts.

"Loss from weather damage is slight because the material is packed in America for outside storage," Hicks said. "Loss from pilferage—particularly clothing—is greater."

The base has fencing to enclose the supplies but it has not yet been put up. French and American sentries guard the stock.

In addition to the main big warehouse, the base is letting contracts for a 55,000-square-foot electronics repair shop, a 15,000-square-foot hazardous processing building, two hangars of 50,000 square feet each for servicing aircraft, and a huge 165,000-square-foot hangar capable of holding America's giant B36, B52 and B60 bombers.

But the construction work that interests the GIs here most is being done by the U. S. 86th Aviation Engineer Battalion setting up 45

U. S.-made quonset huts which will house 1,800 airmen now living in tents.

"By the end of January we will have about 500 men remaining in tents," Hicks said. In addition to the quonset huts, renovated French Air Force barracks are being used to house GIs.
