New Board Members Take Oath Of Office

Hart Board of Education met in regular session Monday, April 14. Ballots from the school board election held April 5 were canvassed and accepted as reported. A total of 238 votes were cast with Weldon Davis receiving 176, Jerry Kittrell 174 and Cecil Ray Jones, 97.

Oath of office was administered to the new board members by Superintendent Ted Averitt. New officers were elected with Harold Bob Bennett being named the new president, Mike Reed, vice president and Neoma Wall, secretary.

Ike Moore, Joyce King, Frances Duke, Sue Rogers and Ann Bell met with the board to give a departmental report of the "Plan A" program in the Hart schools.

The academic award committee presented their report to the board. The board voted to give the freshmen

and sophomores a sweater as an academic award. Juniors and seniors will have a choice of receiving a sweater or a personalized dictionary and thesaurus.

The board voted to accept the transfer students for the 1980-81 school year.

Approval was given by the board for the 1980-81 school calendar.

Board voted to set the fee for the summer driver education course at \$30 per student.

The athletic budget for the 1980-81 school year was approved as presented by Athletic Director Eddie Hooper in the amount of \$16,600.

A called meeting was set for April 21 at 7 p.m. to tour the buildings and discuss summer remodeling and improvements.

Thomas Keith Hoskins of Groveton was employed as head boys basketball and assistant football coach for the 1980-81 school year. Hoskins was employed by the Crawford ISD two years as a high school biology, junior high science/English teacher and head boys basketball coach, varsity assistant football coach and golf coach.

He was employed for the 1979-80 school year with Groveton ISD as head basketball coach, varsity football assistant and varsity track assistant. He received his education from C.E. King High School in Houston and a BS degree from Howard Payne University. He has three years coaching experience. Mrs. Hoskins is also in the teaching profession as an elementary teacher.

Local girls participating in district track meet were sent to Farwell for field events and to Bovina for the running events, due to weather conditions.

In the discus, Janet Black was first with 81'8 1/2". Robin Bowden was seventh in the event.

Linda Washington posted 30'11 1/2" for a first in shot put and also won the 100 meter dash, with 13.8.

Hart's 440 yard relay team won fourth with 58.2. Making up the team are Sheila Mata, Nena Castillo, Anna Steiert and Linda Washington.

Anna Steiert placed fifth in the 100 meter hurdles.

Janet Black and Linda Washington will compete at Regional this weekend in Odessa.

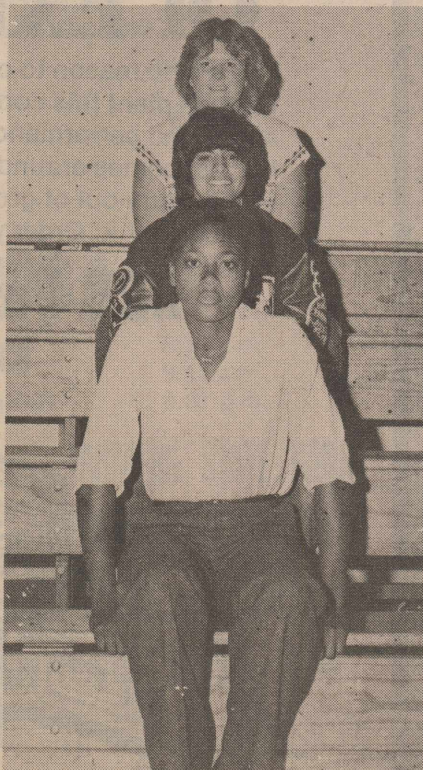

Longhorn trackmen capture second place in the Littlefield track meet last weekend, compiling 122 team points. Littlefield took the meet with 154.

Belt and Gonzales finished in the one-two spots in the 880 run with performances of 2:11.9 and 2:16.3. Gonzales also won first place in the mile run with a time of 5:16.7. His 59.0 was good for third place in the 440 yard dash. Belt finished third in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles with 46.5 and fifth in the high jump with 5'6".

Newsom sailed into first place with a 17.3 performance in the high hurdles and first place in intermediate hurdles with 42.9. From the Counselor's Office

Mary Brooks, secondary counselor, attended a guidance workshop last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo. John Lucas and Sue Mihalik were there from the Texas Education Agency to work with area counselors on guidance plans, career education and group guidance techniques.

The workshop was very beneficial, particularly in the area of career education. We are hoping to begin next year to infuse career education into our curriculum. This will soon be compulsory, but it would be to our advantage to get an early start. The Service Center provides assistance and materials for implementing the program.

As the school year enters its final stages and forty students are finishing their public school careers, there are many final touches that need to be administered. For those seniors who are planning on furthering their education, either at a vocational school, junior college or regular four year college, now is the time to apply for financial assistance.

If a senior is uncertain about his plans, he should go on and apply for the assistance so it will be available at the right time. The availability of assistance could encourage a decision in favor of college. Financial assistance for college is NOT welfare, but it is money that has been made available by taxpayers for those who need it.

If a student belongs to a family of four with an income of \$25,000 or less, there is a possibility that he will qualify for assistance. College is expensive and times are hard, so we would encourage every senior who is remotely considering going to a school next year to fill out an application.

The information on the financial aid application will come from the parents' income tax form. It only takes a little time and a stamp to apply. Applications are in the counselor's office. We welcome any parents who have any questions concerning

financial assistance or the costs of college to come visit with us.

Seventh, ninth and eleventh graders were given achievement tests in January. Scores are in and the students in these grades will soon be receiving their scores. There is an individual score sheet for each student to take home. Scores will be explained to the students. We encourage any one having questions concerning these scores to come speak to us about it.

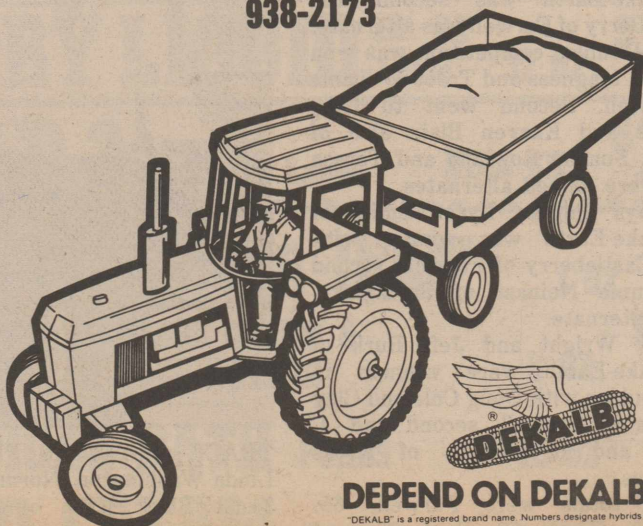

HOMEMADE BARBECUE SAUCE

Film On Abortion To Be Shown Here

First in a series of five films entitled "Whatever Happened to the Human Race?" will be shown at Hart school band hall beginning at 8 p.m., Tuesday, April 29. The film will deal with the subject of abortion.

The film, based on a book by the same name, written by Francis A. Schaeffer and C. Everett Koop, M.D., is being shown to many church congregations and other organizations nationwide. Dr. Schaeffer and Dr. Koop analyze the widespread implications and frightening loss of human rights brought on by today's practice of abortion, infanticide and euthanasia.

Practices once considered "unthinkable" are now considered acceptable,

they say, and challenge the viewer to "become a person in this impersonal age, a human in an inhuman era". The very thought of the wholesale practice of infanticide, euthanasia and abortion is repugnant to everyone who holds to the Judeo-Christian belief in a Supreme Being; so much so, in fact, that it is difficult for us to accept the fact that these practices are now being carried out in laboratories and hospitals across our nation, and the right to do so is being argued daily in the halls of our courts.

Tax payers in Hart Independent School District are notified that April 30 is the deadline for filing exemptions for residential homesteads, 65 years and older and disabled residential homesteads.

Persons who owned their own residential homesteads on Jan. 1 may qualify for homestead exemption for tax purposes in the amount of \$5,000 of market value.

Persons 65 years and older and disabled persons who owned residential homesteads Jan. 1 may qualify for exemptions in

the amount of \$10,000 of market value. Only one \$10,000 exemption is allowed although persons qualifying may file for both the residential homestead [\$5,000] exemption and the 65 and older or disabled exemptions [\$10,000] for a maximum of \$15,000.

Persons who did not receive an application for the tax exemptions and wish to apply may come by the school tax office or call 938-2143 and ask that a copy be mailed.

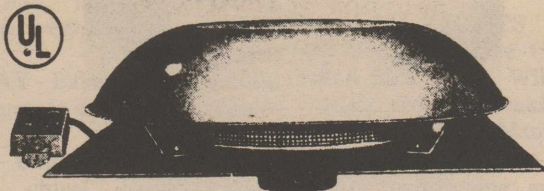

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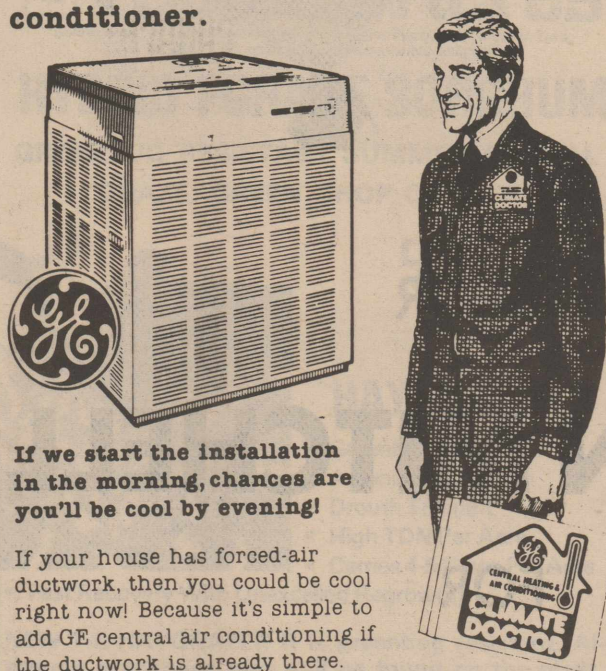

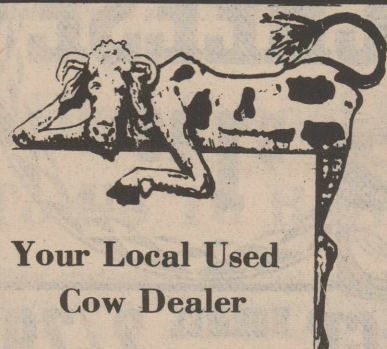
