CO-OPS OFFER
PROTECTION TO
WOOL CROWERS

Growers Urged To Be Con-
tent With Advances
On Clip

BOSTON, Apr. 19.—Cooperative marketing offers more protection for wool growers during the present depression period than at any time in history, according to J. Byrnes Wilson, McKinley, Wyoming, general manager of the National Wool Marketing corporation, which has 35,000 growers-members. Heavy tonnages of cheap cash wool would be detrimental to the market at this time, he declared.

Low prices for all commodities, including wool and no immediate prospects for increase means that independent channels will endeavor to obtain raw material as cheaply as possible and at the cost of producers, Wilson said. He urges wool growers to be content at present with initial advances on their 1932 clip and to wait better conditions rather than sell their wool directly to independent buyers at a cent or a fraction of a cent above the advances growers may obtain.

At this time the cooperative is making advances in some states on the basis of 75 per cent of the value of the wool. Advances already have been made on several million head of sheep in the principal wool producing states.

The past year and a half have been difficult for business progress and severe setbacks have been encountered by every industry," Wilson said. "Even when there is little encouragement to offer for immediate business revival, it is no reason that growers should be expected to make undue sacrifices of their wool. The nation's wool producers are sorely pressed and unless they receive more returns for their efforts, they will be forced out of business. The growers will not get more returns if they scatter their clips at very low prices to independent dealers who are more interested in personal profit than in the future welfare and prosperity of the wool growers. These dealers would immediately glut the market with cheap wool and would be responsible for further price softening.

"Wool growers should constantly keep in mind the fact wool is in a strong statistical position and that this commodity should be among the first to register a price advance when general conditions are bettered.

"The cooperative is making every effort to bring benefits to its 35,000 members. New outlets are being sought to increase consumption of wool. We do not tolerate underselling the market. Stimulation of the buying public to use wool clothing has been undertaken; better working relations with large mills have been established and we have sought for a better understanding with all branches of the wool industry.

"Banks and financiers of the wool industry have come to appreciate the value of the National Wool Marketing Corporation in recent months, because we have fought against low prices and given away quotations for the growers' wool. Recently, bankers in San Joaquin Valley of California refused to allow the sale of wool to buyers and commission men because of their cut-price attitude. The growers have decided to pool their wool. The buyers were either making direct purchases or were dealing on commissions."

J. A. Hill, nationally-known wool authority of the University of Wyoming, tears the mask from existing evils of the wool market in a review of conditions in a recent issue of the Wyoming Wool Grower, a sheepman's paper. His comment follows:

"The dealers are waiting until the coops establish the rate of advance that can be made this year. After that it is believed that the dealers will then try to establish a cash price a cent or even a fraction of a cent above the cash advance of the crops. Whether the private

NEW RULING ON CONTRACTS FOR ROAD BUILDING

Highway Bureau to Bar
Out of State Firms
In Contracts

AUSTIN, Tex., Apr. 18. (AP)—The Texas Highway Commission today issued an order requiring that all contracts for State highway construction be awarded to Texas contractors.

The term Texas contractors was specified as "any person, firm, corporation or association engaged in road contracting in Texas and which has done work of construction or improvement on Texas highways at least six months prior to the date of this order."

The order will not effect projects to which the Federal Government contributes a portion of the cost.

It will have the effect of barring out-of-state contractors who have not been operating in Texas for at least six months, from receiving awards of State highway contracts.

COURT HALTED FOR CANDIDATE TO MAKE TALK

Judge J. A. Drane Calls
Recess to Give Speak-
er His Chance

McCAMEY, Tex. Apr. 13.—Sounds like a page out of the past but this is what happened.

Judge J. A. Drane of the 109th judicial district court, put the brakes on the wheels of justice in Crane City Tuesday morning long enough for J. C. Fuller, Marfa attorney and candidate for the Senate from this the 29th senatorial district, to make a campaign speech.

Judge Drane knows that the district is as large as some eastern states and that it is with much difficulty and considerable expense that a candidate for the Senate gets around in a campaign. He also knows that there are issues due to come up in the next session of the State Legislature of vital interest to West Texas. So when Mr. Fuller walked into the court room, the judge called a halt of court proceedings and without expressing any preference for any candidate or an opinion on any issue asked Mr. Fuller to give an address. Mr. Fuller responding, made a plea for lower taxes and fewer laws.—San Angelo Morning Times.

Month Of March Shows Decline In Bankrupt Firms

Austin, Texas, Apr. 21.—Not only did the number of firms which went into bankruptcy during the month of March decline by 3.7 per cent from the month previous to a figure 15 per cent below that for the corresponding month in 1931, but the total liabilities of the failing concerns also showed substantial declines, according to the report on commercial failures from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Average liabilities per failure of the 89 firms which failed during March amounted to only \$16,316, or 23 per cent less than during the previous month. Average liabilities per failure in March a year ago amounted to \$19,000. The small size of the firms which failed during March is reflected in the total liabilities, for they were only \$1,289,000 as against \$1,734,000 in February and \$1,767,000 in March, 1931. The average weekly number dropped from 21 to 20 in March.

Groceries and meat markets accounted for seventeen of the failures for the month, while dry goods and clothing stores included in the bankruptcies numbered 11. There were eight each drug stores, men's wear shops, and automobile supplies and garage shops; and seven general stores closed their doors.

Dun's Review reports that during the month of March 2,951 firms went into bankruptcy in the entire United States; these firms had total liabilities of \$84,900,000, while in March 1931 there were 2,604 failures owing \$60,390,000.

MOHAIR POOL BOARD MAKES GOOD REPORT

Details Of Sale Plan Is
Not Yet Ready For
Publication

An encouraging report to warehousemen on the mohair market situation was made in San Antonio by the committee of three which recently went to Boston to negotiate sales from the warehouse mohair pool, according to Judge C. C. Belcher, Del Rio member of the committee.

Judge Belcher issued the following statement concerning the committee's report:

"The Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association of Texas held a meeting Monday at the Gunter Hotel in San Antonio. The purpose of this meeting was to receive the report from the Texas Mohair Committee composed of J. A. Schreiner, chairman, C. C. Belcher and Fred J. Horner.

"This committee of three have been in the East for the last two weeks conferring with the various mohair users, the National Wool Marketing Corporation and some members of the Farm Board.

Pool Unbroken

"At the meeting which was attended 100 per cent by the members of the mohair pool, it was agreed that the mohair pool would stay together indefinitely and that only the selling committee would have the power to sell or dispose of any or all the mohair in this pool.

"The details of the plan the committee is working on now is not to be made public at present. All the members of the board seemed very much encouraged by the report made by the committee. Everyone is satisfied now with the results so far under the adverse conditions.

"There are 4,190,000 pounds of mohair in the warehouses at present, and it is expected that there will be 5,200,000 in the entire mohair pool when all the hair is delivered to the warehouses. There are about 750,000 pounds of mohair not in this pool which is still in country or has been disposed of to date, making a total of less than 6,000,000 against over 8,000,000 a year ago, or 25 per cent decrease in production."

It is estimated now that the entire mohair production for the United States will not exceed 14,000,000 for the year 1932 against almost 19,000,000 pounds in 1931, or a decrease of over 25 per cent. In some quarters it is estimated that the decrease will be nearer 40 per cent than 25 per cent when the final deliveries are made this Fall.—Del Rio Evening News.

First it was prohibition then the sales tax, and now the spotlight is turned on the bonus bill. Congress has certainly held the public attention this fine year 1932. Things like tariffs, foreign policies, and reconstruction corporations are dull affairs, and old John A. Citizen don't care much what happens to them. They are handled mostly in the halls and cloakrooms and seldom attract more than passing attention.

But when things come up that involve the "personal liberty" of that great body, the common people, Washington correspondents unbutton collars and go to work. There are bound to be headlines and feature stories—the kind that ordinary folk dote over.

Just now the bonus is in the air. You read about it in your favorite paper, hear about it on your favorite corner or radio station. The bonus is all over, it's everywhere—except in the pockets of those who say they want and need it. And that's where the rub comes in. There's a wide spread between wanting a thing and getting it sometimes—and this bonus fight is one of those times.

Strong opposition has developed to defeat the Patman bill. Opponents are no more bent on blocking passage of the bill, however, than the veterans are determined to see that it goes through. Neither side is letting any moss grow under their feet in trying to gain advantages.

In Texas it is significant that most of the big dailies are opposed to paying the bonus now, while a majority of the smaller dailies and weeklies are lined up behind the veterans. Some say that to pay the soldiers off now will wreck the country's financial system. Others say it is already wrecked; that all that is necessary now is to recognize the fact.

Be that as it may, it's going to be one grand and glorious fight before it's over. To the winner goes the spoils.

This is your government, all talk to the contrary notwithstanding. You can do with it as you please. Your voice is in Congress; it will speak for the majority. If you are interested one way or the other tell it to your Congressman or Senator. Get a soapbox, rent a hall, do what you want to do—but don't do anything that you'll be sorry for later. Let's have free speech and freedom of the press. Let's hear from Vox Populi.

Let's go, Texas! Okeh! America.

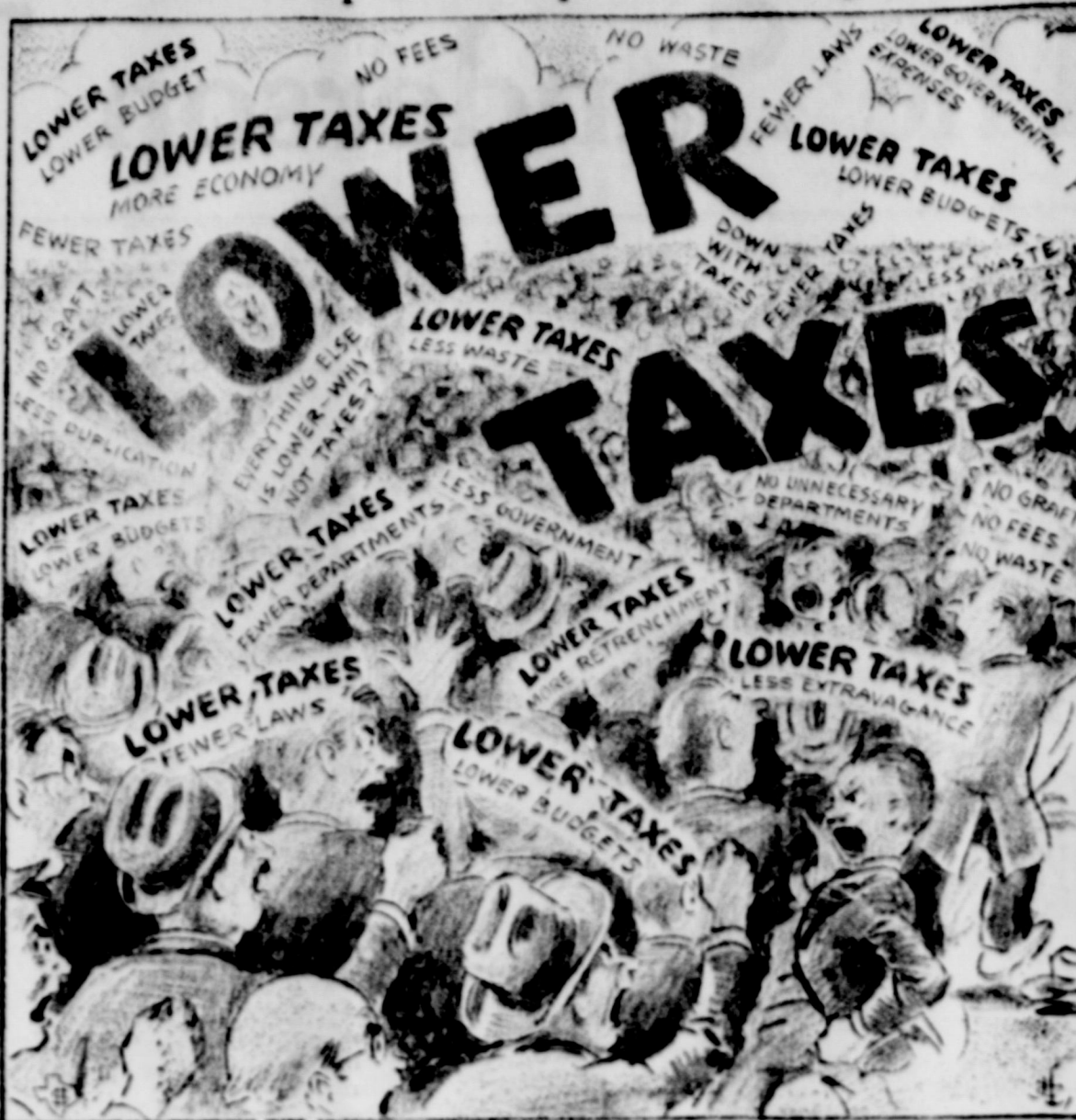

The People Rise Up In Their Might



::: TEXAS INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITIES :::

In the belief that the Bermuda onion crop of North Texas black lands are commercially potential of developing into a business of several million dollars a year, a large storage company will establish one of its five main plants in Dallas. Onion growers last year lost heavily by lack of storage facilities, which forced them to market their crops fresh from the fields. Those held in storage brought much higher prices later.

What substitution of cotton for jute would mean to Southern cotton growers is seen in the fact in a recent year the United States imported nearly a billion pounds for use in sacks, cotton bagging and cordage.

New Texas industrial incorporations: Pass City Mills, El Paso; Amarillo Screen Co., Amarillo; Producers Dairy Products Co., Big Spring; Wilson Spring & Bumper Works; Ft. Worth.

Although Texas in 1931 produced 86.6 per cent of the total mohair crop of the United States (16,400,000 pounds out of 19,111,000 pounds total) there is not a single manufacturing plant in the State for any phase of its processing.

In support of the program of Progressive Texans, Inc., all directors of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce of that organization will wear Texas-made clothing—suits and hats from Dallas, shirts from Sherman, underwear from Greenville, shoes from Fort Worth. The Lufkin meeting, April 17, 18 and 19, is expected to attract a large crowd from over East Texas and a most

interesting program has been prepared for the session.

San Angelo Foundry & Machine Co., has increased its capital stock from \$40,000 to \$50,000. Heiningson Bros., New York, will establish an egg cracking plant at Lamesa in the West Texas Milk Products Co. building. Ludlow Sales Corporation, Boston, has leased a warehouse at Texas City and will remodel and equip it for the manufacture of bagging and bags.

Commercial Pulp & Paper Co., which has taken over the Yellow Pine Paper Mill plant at Orange, will expend \$75,000 in improvements and will manufacture all types of high grade paper from pine and rice straw, raw materials which are available in plenty nearby. The remodeled plant will have a daily capacity of forty tons.

Methods of manufacturing starch from sweet potatoes, equal for textile and perhaps other purposes in value to imported high-quality white potato starch, have been developed by the Federal Bureau of Chemistry and Soils. Ninety per cent of the sweet potato crop of the United States is produced in the South and

RECIPES AND MENUS

By Department of Home Economics
Texas State College for Women
(CIA)



DENTON, Apr. 21.—One of the newer types of teas is the seated or high tea. When this type of entertaining is done, the hostess has the opportunity to show a more personal form of hospitality than the average tea offers. This tea is served at the tea hour and all guests are seated at the tea table with place cards designating their places.

Usually a two course tea is served. The first course consists of a salad, sandwiches, olives, wafers, nuts, and tea or coffee. A plate containing the first course may be placed before the guests are invited into the dining room. The beverage may be served from the table by the hostess. When this course is completed the maid removes the plates and places the dessert course, a frozen dessert, cookies and mints.

MENUS

Sunday — Breakfast: Grapefruit, waffles, bacon, coffee.
Dinner: Fried chicken, boiled new potatoes, asparagus on toast, lettuce and tomato salad, strawberry Bavarian cream.

Supper: Toasted cheese sandwiches, chocolate, cookies.
Monday—Breakfast: Tomato juice, poached egg on toast, coffee, cream, sugar.

Dinner: Broiled steak, corn soufflé, corn meal muffins, caramel pudding.

Tea: First course—Chicken salad, parsley butter sandwiches and olives, cheese wafers, salted almonds, tea, spiced lemon.

Second course—Cranberry frappe, fudge cake, mints.

RECIPES

Strawberry Bavarian Cream: 1-4 c cold water, 1 c crushed strawberries, 1 t lemon juice, 1-2 c sugar, 1 1-2 c heavy cream, beaten until stiff, salt, 1 t gelatine. Method: Soak gelatine in cold water for five minutes, and dissolve by standing cup containing mixture in hot water. Strain into fruit juice mixed with lemon juice. Add sugar, and when sugar is dissolved set bowl containing mixture in pan of ice water and stir until mixture begins to thicken; then fold in cream. Turn into wet mould and chill.

Parsley Butter Sandwiches: 1-2 c butter (creamed), 1 t chopped par-

sley, 1-4 t grated orange rind. Method: Combine ingredients. Cut fresh bread in slices, lengthwise of loaf. Remove the crusts and spread thoroughly with the filling. Roll into small rolls and wrap in oil paper until ready to use.

Cranberry Frappe: 1 q cranberries, 1 pt. water, 2 c sugar, juice of 2 lemons. Method: Cook cranberries and water together for ten minutes, then force through sieve. Add the sugar and the juice of the lemons, cool and freeze to a mush.

Caramel Pudding: 1 c brown sugar, 2 c milk, 1-4 flour, 2 eggs. Method: Mix sugar and one and one-half cups of milk. Scald in a double boiler until sugar is dissolved. Mix flour with beaten egg yolks and the remaining half cup of milk and add to the hot milk, stirring constantly until it thickens. Remove from the fire and fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Chill and serve with whipped cream.

KEEPING CHILDREN IN SCHOOL

Because of the tendency even in normal times for students to drop out of school between semesters, the President's Organization on Unemployment Relief is urging communities, school authorities, service clubs and other cooperating agencies wherever possible to renew their efforts to encourage and assist young people to continue their studies.

Last summer, following a conference with practically all leading national educational associations and other groups, the President's Organization strongly urged the wisdom of keeping children and the youth in school in this period of unemployment and out of competition for jobs with heads of families. Most gratifying cooperation was given by school authorities and by national and local organizations.

While there was a slight decrease in enrollment in public elementary schools last year as compared with 1930, high school enrollment increased from 4,030,000 to 4,354,815, a gain of 324,215, or approximately 8 per cent, according to figures compiled by the United States Office of Education. Enrollment in vocational schools and courses increased more than 60,000, and the aggregate enrollment in state colleges and universities showed a gratifying increase.

At a recent conference of cooperating organizations a decision was reached to stress school attendance at this time in the hope that these gains may be maintained.

buyers succeed in establishing a cash price that is only 8 or 10 per cent above what is computed to be a 75 per cent advance on the current prices in Boston is still a question. However, if they do, it will probably mean that still lower prices will rule in Boston.

"As usual, this is the time of the year when the grower is faced with the question of whether to sell his wool or to consign it through the cooperatives, or even through private dealers. Whatever the other factors may be, in the problem, there is one outstanding, that is, if the growers insist upon making an early sale for cash at home there has not in years been more danger of so completely demoralizing the market as to make the tariff non-effective than there is now.

"Even if it should be known that wool is going to work steadily lower through the year and if the growers, as a whole, adopt what would be a good decision for isolated individuals, they would do themselves a great deal more harm than could be done by holding back the wool and supplying it slowly as the market would absorb it. In years past it has been impossible to finance such holding movement, but at present, through the National Wool Marketing Corporation, it is possible to do so."
