Lorraine Residents Petition To Join Hospital District

Twenty-four Lorraine voters have asked the Colorado City Hospital District to call an election on the question of annexing Lorraine (Mitchell County Precinct No. 4) to the hospital district.

The hospital board of directors, in response to the petition from the Lorraine voters, Tuesday night in their regular meeting voted to proceed with the legal work needed to call the election.

Before an election can be called, a bill must be passed by the state legislature fol-

lowed by a public hearing. All papers will be sent to State Rep. Elmer Martin for introduction of the bill following required publication of the notice of intent to have the bill passed.

The petition signed by the 24 Lorraine voters asking for the election was presented to hospital officials Feb. 19.

If the bill is passed by the legislature and provided the need for Lorraine to be annexed is established at a public hearing, an election could be called sometime in late May.

It has come to the attention of the Record a matter that is causing great concern to residents of Lorraine is that there is the possibility that Lorraine (Mitchell County Precinct 4) could be made part of a hospital district outside Mitchell County without the voters in Lorraine having a substantial voice in the matter.

Under existing situations, the Colorado City Hospital District is in violation of its by-laws by allowing a Lorraine doctor to be a member of the staff of the hospital and by treating patients on the same basis as

it does residents of the hospital district.

Should Lorraine voters vote to join the hospital district, the cost in taxes would be as follows:

For the owner of a \$5,000 home, the cost would only be \$9.38 a year; for the owner of

a \$9,000 home, the cost would be \$16.88 and for the owner of a \$30,000 farm, the cost would be only \$56.25 a year.

The Hospital District Tax rate is 75¢ per \$100 of the taxable value and that rate cannot be raised.

Nix Files For School Board

Truman Nix, 47, head coach and athletic director of Colorado High School from 1964-1971, Tuesday filed for one of two vacancies on the Colorado Independent school board of trustees.

Deadline for filing is Tuesday with the election to be held April 7.

The two positions up for election are now held by Ed Thrift and A.K. McCarley Jr., neither of whom will seek re-election.

Nix is a native of Mitchell Co., having graduated from Lorraine High School.

He is the owner and operator along with his youngest son, Dewain, of Truman Nix & Son Texaco at Second and Chestnut.

He and his wife, Mavis, also a native of Lorraine, have two other sons, Glenn, a coach in Odessa, and Randy, a senior at McMurry, and one daughter, Kandy, 12.

Nix, in announcing his candidacy, said he wants to be of service to this community in return to all the support he has received from residents here as coach and in the business he operates.

The overall administration of the school system here is now stronger than it has ever been and Nix said he wants to continue the strong and progressive educational program that now exists.

"I know through first hand experience the problems faced by the students and teachers and I will try to solve these problems if elected," Nix said.

"My years of experience will help me reach intelligent decisions regarding the problems of our school district."

Nix has been active in many community civic affairs having served as chairman of the cancer crusade last year, president of the teenage baseball league last year and is currently vice president of the Colorado City bass club.

TESCO Construction

100,000 Barrel Tank

Work is underway at the Texas Electric Service Company power plant here on construction of an additional oil storage tank which will further insure an adequate fuel supply for the

plant's operation, according to John Martin, plant superintendent.

"The 100,000-barrel addition will almost triple the present amount of storage capacity at the plant," Martin said, "and the added capacity will give us more flexibility in purchase and delivery schedules."

Texas Electric uses natural gas for fuel in its plants with oil as a standby fuel for emergencies. The gas curtailments to electric generating stations and many other industrial cus-

tomers have been much greater this winter than ever before, due to a continuing inability of the available supply to keep up with the steadily growing demand plus a much colder winter than is normal. Some oil was used during that time by the company.

TESCO's gas supply has been curtailed less than most companies, because its contracts are with producers instead of gas companies which also serve residential and commercial customers.

Martin said the company had adequate fuel during the cold spell and the new storage tank See TESCO

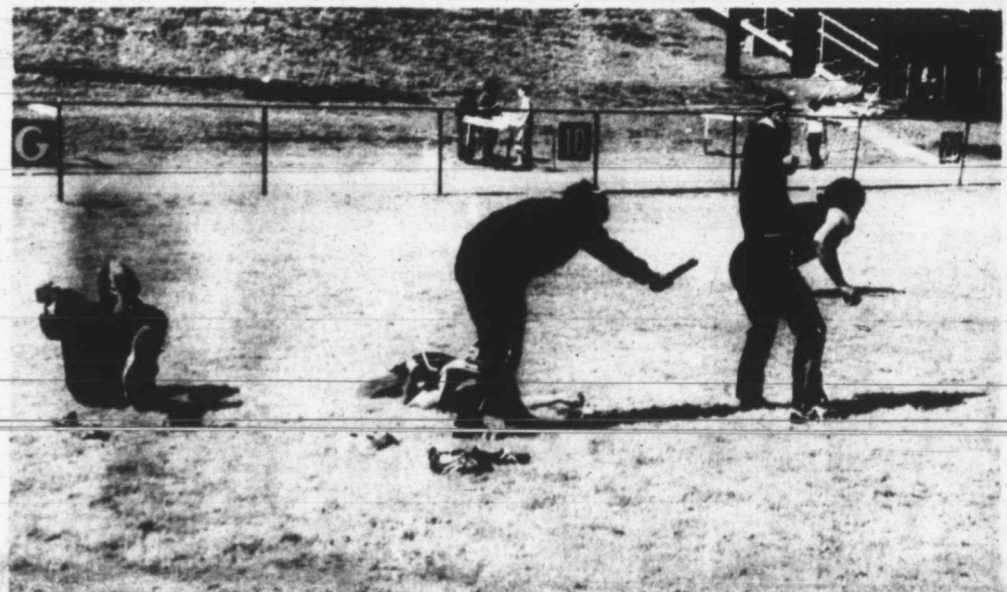

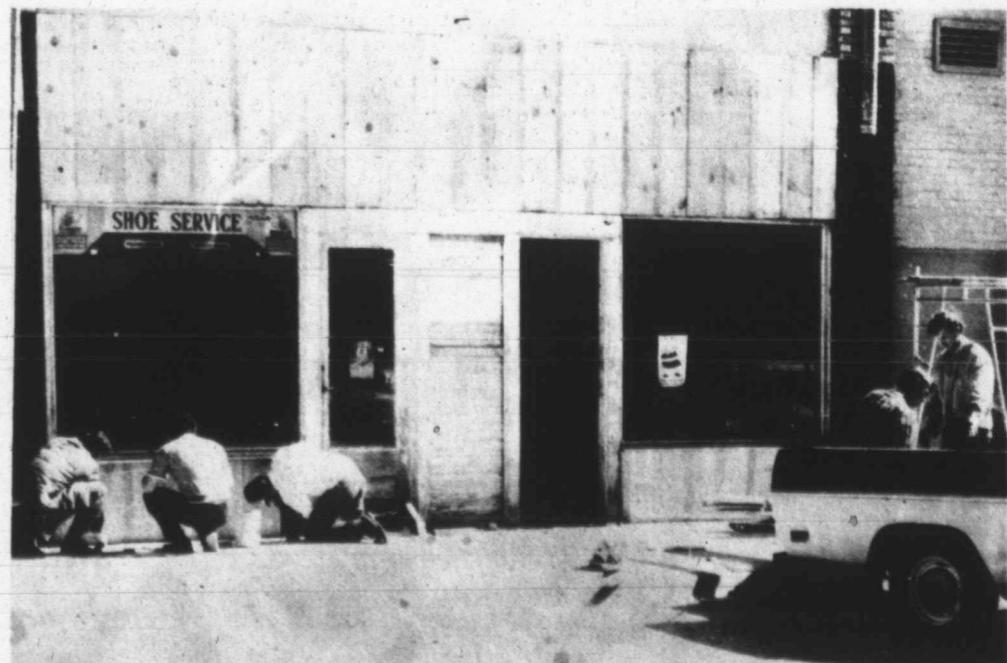

The Retired Senior Volunteer Program now has a partial list of public facilities where retired citizens may use their spare time doing volunteer work under the newly formed program.

The facilities now participating in the program are Colorado Junior High School, Mitchell Co. Mental Health Clinic, Claxton Lodge, Mitchell County Public Library and the Colorado High School Library.

students, but create interesting and rewarding jobs for our elderly people.

"In the 1-3 learning relationship the helpers would be asked to assist the child in reading, penmanship, art, math problems and scientific projects such as drawing, posters, nature observations.

"This work by the elderly would put them back into the swing of life, because children of this age group are definitely alive," the spokesman concluded.

Mrs. Bernice Hilliard of the Mitchell County Mental Health Clinic stated "It appears at the present time that our greatest need for volunteers is transportation (of students) from the schools to the clinic and return on the first Tuesday and third Friday of each month.

"Currently, I am picking up all of the students and this takes me out of the office when I'm needed. This would be a great help to me.

"With the new changes in the clinic since January, I'm not sure of the volunteer work in the office.

"I might use a typist when Ellen (clinic clerk) is on vacation or ill and a receptionist on clinic day. We are in the process of trying to work out a more simplified procedure on clinic day.

"Your services will be appreciated, not only by the clinic but our county," she concluded.

"The volunteer program would not require full-time participation but only a few hours weekly," stated Miss Nancy Easley, program director.

"And those who use their cars transporting persons in the volunteer program will receive a gas allowance."

Retired Senior citizens, 60 years of age or older, who wish to participate in this program or wishing information may call Miss Easley at the Mental Health Clinic.

The purpose of the RSVP Program is to develop a recognized role in the community and a meaningful life in retirement for older adults through significant volunteer service.

The Claxton Lodge has stated that they would like to set up a different activity each day for the volunteers to direct.

Activities under consideration are bingo, an arts and crafts class, games such as dominoes and "42". The volunteers could also transport the residents to downtown, church and other places.

The Mitchell County Public Library would like to begin a Children's Hour possibly after school hours.

The librarian at the Colorado High School Library stated that she needed help at the library.

"The seventh grade class of Colorado Junior High is very large, approximately 154 students, and this creates a situation where a teacher is forced with a 1 to 32 student relationship," a junior high spokesman related.

"The trend in education today is individualized learning which is next to impossible in a class as large as I have described above.

"We have competent aides, but still this limits the student-teacher relationship at the best to 1-20 which is still not an ideal situation.

"This is where I believe the retired citizens can be of very valuable help to us," they continued.

"We would like to see these people come in and lower our teacher-student ratio. The retired people would be asked to handle not more than a 1-3 ratio with the students.

"This not only would increase the learning process with our

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The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily
Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.

Use minimum amount of water
The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.

Cook and freeze
Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at the same temperature.

Thaw before cooking
Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

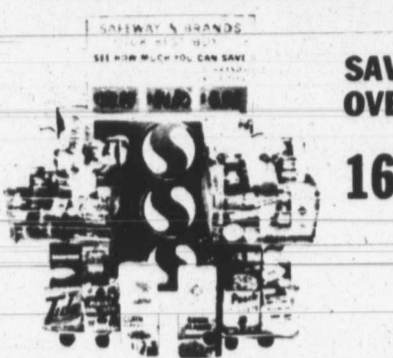

"Recycling Solid Waste" Atheneum Study Club Program

LORAINÉ — "Recycling Solid Waste", presented by Mrs. W. A. Taylor was highlight of a program presented during a meeting Feb. 20 of the Atheneum Study Club as they met with Mrs. C.R. Green.

The subject on Preserving Our Resources, was presented through the roll call when each member gave a hint of daily practice for ecology's sake.

The branch of ecology treats the relation between living organisms and their environment -- thus, by recycling waste products into other forms they are returned to usefulness, such as garbage burned, makes good fertilizer, old papers are made

into new paper, cardboard, or insulation materials.

Recycling is the recovery and reuse of solid waste materials to create new, useable products.

"Nothing is ever lost -- it is only changed into other forms and converted into new use", began Mrs. Taylor.

"Among these are old glass into new bottles, bricks or crushed glass (glasphalt) used in road paving and reusing metal from junked cars is becoming more efficient. Old tires produce oil liquids, gas, tar and fertilizer.

"The value of reclaimed materials that are readily available runs into millions of dollars. There are still many problems

to be overcome, but scientific research will find a way and millions of dollars will be earned from the practice of ecology," concluded Mrs. Taylor.

The addition of Loraine to the hospital district would mean about \$28,000 in taxes for the hospital. Tax values in the Loraine precinct are \$3,739,303.
Hospital District taxable values for Precincts 1, 2 and 3 total \$36,249,450.
The hospital district has total assets now of \$1.25 million, excluding depreciation.
Hospital Administrator Charles Root pointed out that the seven Loraine residents now work in the hospital and lodge, making a total of \$2,300 a month.
Of all patients admitted to the hospital from August 1970 through December 1972, about 30 per cent were patients of Loraine doctors.
It has been pointed out that Loraine residents would benefit greatly by being in the hospital district. Benefits, according to several Loraine residents and officials of the hospital district, include:
-- Pooling of efforts and means would provide a better hospital, including the capability of providing additional services to the citizens of the entire community. (The hospital is now attempting the expansion of many services.)
-- Additional new services would eliminate the necessity of travelling some distance to receive those services.
-- The added strength from the political and financial standpoint will provide additional security for survival of a hospital in this immediate area. This is important to the Loraine Community for two reasons:
1. The lack of availability of a hospital within a reasonable distance would be a deterrent to the growth of a community.
2. The continued availability of a hospital with a reasonable distance would increase the possibility of other doctors practicing in Loraine if and when available.
-- It would provide the Loraine citizens with the satisfaction of again owning a hospital with voting rights as to its management.
-- It would give the Loraine citizens the self-satisfaction of knowing that they are providing their pro-rata share for a program in which they are participating.
-- It would be legally permissible for the hospital district to establish any feasible type of health care facility in the Loraine area should the need arise such as the inauguration of some new governmental program necessitating facilities in the more populated areas of the district.
The hospital district was created in 1967 at which time there was a hospital in Loraine and the residents of Loraine did not desire to join in the foundation of the new hospital district. In 1970, the hospital in Loraine was closed.
Realizing the predicament of the citizens of Precinct 4, the governing board of the hospital district has been allowing the citizens of Precinct 4 full privileges without any discrimination.
The constitution and by-laws of the Hospital District provides the following.

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Community Responsibility

President Jerry Reynolds of the Mitchell County Cancer Society announced today that the American Cancer Society nationally produced \$80,000,000 this past fiscal year with Texas providing over \$3,000,000 of the amount.

"This money is one way of showing the emphasis now being placed on cancer control. New programs are continuously emerging to help save over half the lives we are now losing from cancer," Reynolds said.

According to the 1972 Annual Report of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, now available to the public, the Cancer Society has four main programs areas: professional education, public education, service-rehabilitation and research.

Professional education provides current information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to the medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached over 58,000 physicians, dentists and nurses. Also 19 clinics and 21 conferences were supported

by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer prompting early diagnosis and treatment. An audience totaling 1,575,731 persons viewed ACS educational films and heard physicians and lay speakers inform on cancer education.

The service rehabilitation program seeks to save lives, to ease the pains and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS service in Texas was 16,216. The average cost per patient serviced was \$180.

"For every dollar raised in the state of Texas, the cancer society spends 4 cents more. The 4 cents comes from the National Society," president Reynolds said.

"Fighting cancer is a responsibility and a challenge. Every one in our community has a stake in the outcome, and each has a responsibility to participate in it. The American Cancer Society provides the responsibility," Reynolds concluded.

is just added insurance in case the gas supply should get more critical in the future.

Diminishing reserves of oil and gas have limited the number of plants that can be built using these fuels, Martin says. As a result, the company is developing alternate fuel sources for power plants in its long-range plans to assure the electricity needed for growth in the area it serves.

Texas Electric, Dallas Power & Light and Texas Power & Light now have in operation a plant near Fairfield which uses lignite, a form of coal, for fuel. Similar plants are under construction by the three companies near Mt. Pleasant and Henderson. Electricity from the plants is shared by the companies through their interconnecting transmission systems.

Because lignite supplies also are limited, the three companies have announced plans to construct a nuclear-fueled power plant near Glen Rose in Somervell County that is scheduled to be operational in 1980.

drugs in his possession, or known to be under influence thereof, while in school or while participating in a school sponsored function, after notice to the violator and/or hearing before the Board of Trustees of Lorraine Independent School District and if found guilty the student may be expelled for the balance of the semester and no

credit be given to the student for the semester.

"Any student who shall have been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony or who shall have been declared a juvenile delinquent for the possession, purchasing, selling, or advertising of a dangerous drug or narcotic drug while on or off school premises or while participating in a school sponsored function

may after proper hearing by the Board of Trustees be expelled by the Board of Trustees of Lorraine Independent School District for the current semester and no credit be given to the student for the semester."
