

Bobby Williams Attends State 4-H Council At Houston



The week of June 17-21 I felt honored by representing District 8 at the 1968 State 4-H Council on the Houston University campus. We discussed the problems of 4-H throughout the state and set up the guiding rules for the clubs throughout the state.

Too many people think of 4-H as projects, but really it isn't. It is having a chance to set goals and reach them; having a chance to learn by working with others, using their ideas and always listening to my own ideas and learning to evaluate them and use them for what they are worth.

Besides discussing 4-H problems we (the state 4-H Council) were on a schedule so tight we had speakers at each meal. I never thought I would ever hear a speaker that held me spellbound until I lost all track of time, but I did, and wondered why he was quitting until I looked at my watch and discovered he had been talking for an hour and a half.

Besides having a chance to learn we also had recreation planned into each day and night. Such things as a trip to the Astro-dome and a banquet in the Warwick Hotel, which has recently had the lobby redecorated at a cost of 4 million dollars. Carpet covered the floor, walls, and ceiling. I was privileged to get a private tour of the hotel by the manager and was really impressed by the swimming pool on the third floor, the carpet in the kitchen, the Suana baths, and the price of a room for one night's lodging which was \$75.

I was deeply honored to be one of 24 4-H members out of the 95,000 in the state of Texas to be able to attend this meeting. These 24 are chairmen and vice chairmen of their districts. Boys and girls both stayed in the same dormitory as an experiment this year and the adults were instructed to not say a word about our conduct. We were told at the close of the meeting that we had proved we were responsible enough to make this work and we were commended for our conduct, in fact, they said if possible it had worked even better than separating us.

As we had our last assembly and began saying good-bye to our new friends, it was not uncommon to see tears in each others eyes. We had worked together for one week and I felt I knew them as well as I did my graduating class this year which I had been with for 12 years.

I feel that I am ready to use some of the things I learned and will be very willing to help anyone that may ask for it in any way that I can. I am only sorry that I don't have another year in Gorman 4-H in order to help my fellow members, but I'll help them all I can and I do hope that one of them will be able to go to State Council someday, too.

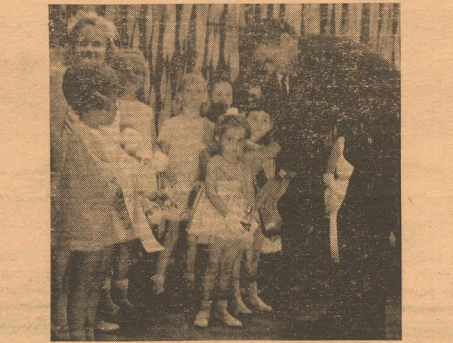

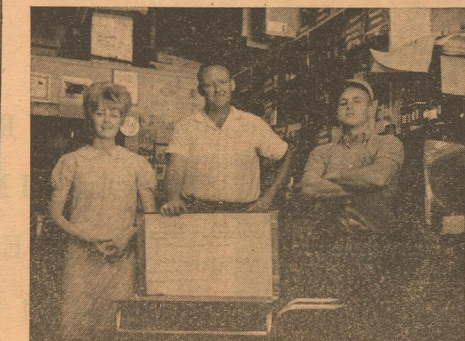

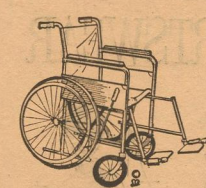
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PEANUT HULLS

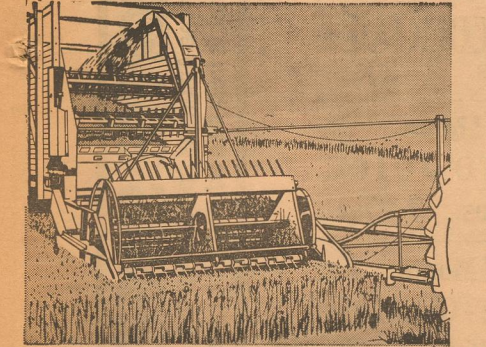

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE SECOND AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE United States says, "A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed."

FOR NEARLY 200 YEARS AMERICANS have believed that they did indeed possess such a right as guaranteed by the Second Amendment.

THE FIRST FEDERAL GUN LAW REGULATING the shipment of certain types of firearms in interstate commerce was passed in 1934. This action was the outgrowth of sentiment created by the attempted assassination of President Roosevelt in Miami, Florida in 1933.

IN 1939, IN A CASE KNOWN AS THE U. S. vs. Miller, the Supreme Court upheld the conviction of Miller for possession of an unregistered "sawed-off shotgun" as a violation of this Act.

The Amendment did not guarantee the right to keep and bear such a firearm for the preservation and efficiency of a well-regulated militia.

MORE RECENTLY, THE CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE Supreme Court writing in the New York University Law Review on the formation of the Declaration of Independence, had this to say:

"Despite these safeguards, the people were still troubled by the recollection of the conditions that prompted the charge of the Declaration of Independence that the King has 'effected to render the military independent and superior to the civil power.' They were reluctant to ratify the Constitution without further assurances, and thus we find in the Bill of Rights, Amendments 2 and 3, specifically authorizing a decentralized militia, guaranteeing the right of the people to keep and bear arms, and prohibiting the quartering of troops in any house in times of peace without the consent of the owner."

IN 1941, SHORTLY BEFORE PEARL HARBOR, Congress passed what is known as the Property Seizure Act. It was made clear in the Law that nothing contained in the Bill should be construed to authorize the Presi-

dent to requisition or require the registration of firearms possessed by an individual for his personal protection or sport, nor that registration should be required. The Law said specifically that the President or any Board, Agency, or Officer, had no right to trespass upon the people in this respect.

THE LANGUAGE OF THE BILL FURTHER STATED THAT "In view of the fact that certain totalitarian and dictatorial nations are now engaged in the willful and wholesale destruction of personal rights and liberties, it is appropriate for the Congress to expressly state that the Law shall not be construed to impair or infringe the constitutional right of the people to bear arms." When a U. S. Senator, the Honorable Hubert H. Humphrey, now Vice President, had this to say in connection with the Second Amendment of the Constitution.

"Certainly, one of the chief guarantees of freedom under any government, no matter how popular or respected, is the right of citizens to keep and bear arms... the right of citizens to bear arms is just one more guarantee against arbitrary government, one more safeguard against a tyranny, which now appears remote in America, but which historically has proved to be always possible."

IN 1963, THE CONGRESS PASSED PL 88-186, amending the Arms Control and Disarmament Act. Section 33 of this Law contains the following provision with respect to the individual's right to keep and bear arms for legitimate purposes:

"Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to authorize any policy or action by any Government Agency which would interfere with, restrict, or prohibit the acquisition, possession or use of firearms by an individual for the lawful purpose of personal defense, sport, recreation, education, or training."

IN RECENT DEBATE IN THE U. S. SENATE the Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court was quoted as follows:

"We may happily note that the Constitution has weathered a variety of crisis. Some were as acute as those we face today. Today, as always, the people, no less than their Courts, must remain vigilant to preserve the principles of our Bill of Rights, lest in our desire to be secure we lose our ability to be free."

THE RIGHT OF PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES to keep and bear arms is guaranteed not only by the Federal Constitution but by the Constitutions of thirty-five States.

ARTICLE I, SECTION 23 OF OUR OWN TEXAS CONSTITUTION, says "Every citizen shall have the right to keep and bear arms in the lawful defense of himself or the State; but the legislature shall have power, by Law, to regulate the wearing of arms, with a view to prevent crime."

AT THE PRESENT TIME A MAJORITY OF THE STATES are seeking through agreements and Compacts, uniform firearm legislation. It would seem they should have time and opportunity to work their will.

WOULD IT NOT BE BETTER TO HAVE LOCAL AND STATE enforcement to keep guns out of the hands of criminals, addicts, minors and the mentally deficient, than to have Federal police knocking on our doors?

THE POINT HAS BEEN MADE THAT WE register and license dogs and automobiles. True - by the States, Counties or Municipal governments.

Ringling Of Bells July 4th At 1 p. m.

State Municipal officials have been urged to encourage the ringing of all available bells to celebrate the 4th. of July at 1 p. m. as part of "Bells of Independence Day" which is observed throughout the nation.

In 1963 Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 was passed by Congress requesting that all bells in the Nation ring each year simultaneously on the Fourth of July at:

2 p. m. Eastern Daylight time; 1 p. m. Central Daylight time; Noon Mountain Daylight time; 11 a. m. Pacific Daylight time; and 8 a. m. Hawaiian and Alaskan Standard time.

So, remember the meaning of INDEPENDENCE DAY and ring out bells to signify our joy on this our Nation's 192nd birthday.

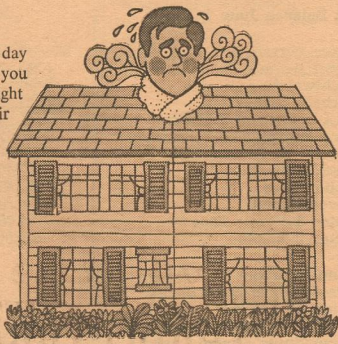
