## TART RELIEF WORK APRIL 16

NEW PROGRAM STARTS AFTER  
EXTENSIVE SYSTEM OF  
COUNTY-DISTRICT  
MEETINGS

The termination of CWA activities on April 1st, necessitated the creation and installation, by the auditing department of the Texas Relief Commission, of a materially changed accounting system.

This system is now being installed in the various counties for the carrying out of the new executive system. Institutes of instruction have been held in the counties during the week by staff auditor representatives of the Texas Relief Commission for the familiarization of county representatives with the new operating system. At these group meetings some county representatives attended.

During the past week, 41 institutes of this character were held with attendance running from 35 to 100 persons at each meeting. Although primarily these were held for the purpose of making clear to county personnel, the salient points and operating principles of the new relief accounting system, many public spirited citizens attended who were interested in the administration of relief to the indigent of Texas.

In addition to the number of interested private citizens, there were, at these meetings, administrators, department heads, accountants, and case investigators representing the 254 counties of the state.

From April 1st, to April 16th, the work of relief to the destitute will be done by direct relief and certain emergency work projects that have been certified as approved by the administration. The two-week period beginning April 1st, will give county relief organizations valuable experience for the proper handling of the new program when they become effective on April 16th.

**Attendance Meetings**  
The primary function of the new relief program, according to Miss E. Dresden, Director of the Texas Relief Commission, will be to provide work relief to the destitute who are able to work, on projects that are approved, which will enable them to earn up to their estimated budget requirements and to provide direct relief to those who are physically unable to work. The ultimate goal toward which the new program work will be to provide the indigent family to eventually become self sustaining.

Dale Yates, Ochiltree, won second in senior boys rural declamation. Mary Madolyn Sherman and Anna Lee Lovett, Perryton, won second in typing.

In the track competition, the following places were won by local boys: Philo Butler placed second in 100 yard and 440 yard dashes; Billy Pletcher placed second in shot put; Vincent Hobbs placed second in broad jump; Arley Schwab placed fourth in the mile run; Nathan Newman placed third in high jump; Alvis Morris placed fourth in broad jump and David Jantzen, Waka, placed fourth in the 220 yard dash.

## Hold Music Festival

Goodwell College Eleventh Annual  
Affair Stated For Three Days  
This Week

Goodwell, Okla., April 16.—The eleventh annual spring festival will be held at Panhandle A. and M. college on April 19-22. Fifteen schools have entered in the contest.

The events of the festival are free to all contestants, and their lodging is furnished. Students, coaches, teachers, and parents from all over the Panhandle are expected to attend.

Seven large pennants and a big silver trophy will be given to individual winners.

In previous years scholarships have been awarded to the winners in the voice and piano contests. June Burks of Hooker holds a scholarship in piano which was offered by the college last year.

One of the features will be the religious play written by Jerome K. Jerome, "The Passing of the Third Floor Back", which will be given April 22.

Contests will be held in instrumental music, vocal music, dramatics, bookkeeping, typing, and short-hand. Professor H. H. Loudonback and Prof. Allan Schirmer of Winfield, Kansas, will be the judges of the music contests.

The invitation track and tennis meet will be held April 27 and 28 at Panhandle A. & M. college. This event will be larger than ever before, since teams from a wider area have entered.

The number of participants will be greatly increased by the addition of the Junior High class in the various events. In previous years the meet has been for the High School only.

## ANNOUNCE EXAMS FOR BOOKER RURAL CARRIER

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Booker, Texas. The examination will be held here and the receipt of applications will close on May 4.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 24 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. THE EXAMINATION WILL BE OPEN ONLY TO CITIZENS WHO ARE ACTUALLY DOMICILED IN THE TERRITORY OF THE POST OFFICE WHERE THE VACANCY EXISTS, WHO HAVE BEEN ACTUALLY DOMICILED THERE FOR SIX MONTHS NEXT PRECEDING THE CLOSING DATE FOR RECEIPT OF APPLICATIONS, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.

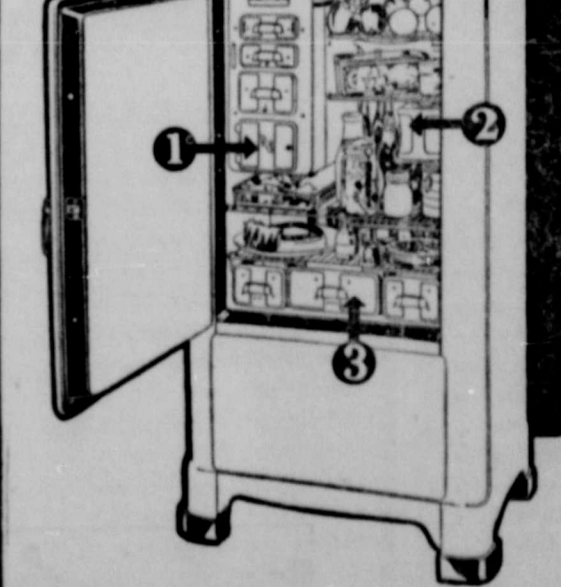
