Legislature to Consider Many Bill During Week

(By International News Service)
AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—Establishment of an agricultural experiment station within 25 miles of Abilene is sought in a bill introduced in the senate by Oliver C. Cunningham of Abilene.

The measure recites that the farm is to be for dairy, poultry, pecan crops and other natural products and requests an appropriation of \$75,000 for the establishment. The station may be located in Taylor, Jones, Callahan or Shackelford counties and is to consist of not less than 320 acres and to be under the direction of the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—A drastic anti-Sunday movie bill which more than doubles the present penalties for violation, has been introduced in the house by Representative F. H. Pendergast of Marshall.

Under the Sunday blue law now in effect, the penalty for violation is from \$20 to \$50, but under the terms of the Pendergast bill the fine would be not less than \$200. The bill also would make it the duty of the sheriff to make arrests for all infractions of the law. If the sheriff should refuse, then the county attorney would be directed to have the sheriff comply with the terms of the law.

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—In presenting to the house a bill providing for an elective highway commission, Representative Elwin Gerron of Waxahachie indulged in outspoken criticism of R. S. Sterling, chairman of the highway commission and the administration of the affairs of the commission. Gerron was joined by Representative W. T. Graves of Stephenville.

The Gerron-Graves bill provides for an elective commission of five members to be elected from five districts on primary election day, 1930, and each member shall receive a salary of \$5,000 a year. The chairman would be selected from among the five members.

Every contract for highway construction would be signed by the state highway engineer and approved by at least three members of the commission, the bill states. Bonds in the sum of \$5,000 approved by the governor, would be required of each member.

The present highway commission consists of three members appointed by the governor and they receive \$2,500 each as compensation.

Governor Moody has announced that he would veto such a bill as that offered by Gerron should it pass in the legislature.

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—Representative Polk Hornaday, of Harlingen, Monday will introduce in the house a bill seeking to authorize private corporation to own citrus groves and nurseries and to market such products and to conduct all business incidental to this line of endeavor.

Under present laws, the bill points out, Texas statutes do not authorize private corporations to compete with foreign corporations in this great industry of the Rio Grande Valley.

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—A fight on the relocation of the Texas penitentiary system will be staged on the floor of the senate by Julien C. Hyer of Fort Worth, unless it provides for the "sale of the present state farms in 160 acre tracts and on 40-year, low term interest rates." Penitentiary system reform bills are scheduled to be introduced in the senate soon.

This plan, the Fort Worth solon pointed out, would prevent the sale at low prices to speculators and would be of aid in providing revenue for the sustenance of any new system that would be adopted.

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—One of the most beneficial educational bills that will come under the consideration of the Forty-first Legislature will be the measure introduced in the senate providing for school trustees' terms to be three years,

Election Interest Is On Increase

Plans are all ready for the voting here tomorrow on the bond issues totaling \$187,500 for the improvement of the water system, building a new city hall and refunding \$42,500 worth of outstanding warrants.

The ballots are printed and a good number of absentee ballots were cast Saturday on the issues.

Each issue will be voted separately. The first issue on the ticket is for the issuing of \$110,000 worth of bonds to enlarge the present lower dam and create a lake approximately four and one-half times the size of the present entire water supply, lay some new mains, install more fire hydrants and build a new water tank of 250,000 gallons capacity.

The second issue is for the issuing of \$35,000 in bonds with which to build a new city hall and fire station.

The third issue is for the refunding of the \$42,500 outstanding warrants into bonds.

Last week two mass meetings were attempted to be held with only a handful of people present to hear the information regarding the three issues. Until the past few days there has been very little talk about the election and the present amount of discussion on the coming election does not indicate a very heavy vote.

According to the information given from the city commission and city engineer this entire amount of improvements of \$87,500 can be done with only a 6 cents advance in the present tax rate which would make the rate for the coming year \$1.30 on the \$100 valuation.

Falls' Condition Delays His Trial

Houston and New Orleans are On New Air Route

HOUSTON, Jan. 14.—Air mail and passenger service between Houston and New Orleans will be inaugurated January 23, according to an announcement by W. N. de Wald, operations manager of the St. Tammany Gulf Coast Airways.

The mail plane from Houston will connect at New Orleans with the air mail from Atlanta and New York.

Wildcat Drilling Active at Present

ABILENE, Jan. 14.—More wildcat drilling operations are actually under way now in Taylor, Jones, Fisher and Nolan counties than at any time since the early part of 1927, according to local oil men.

Some 30 or 40 holes are on the way down or preparing to spud in. The latest to prepare for drilling is the Texas Company's W. H. and E. E. Hall location in southeast Fisher county, between Eskota and Longworth. A report current here is to the effect that the Phillips Petroleum Company and the Amerada Corporation have joined the Texas in this test.

Amendment Offered On Highway Bond Issue

Hoover Considering Citizens Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The fact-finding commission, composed of outstanding citizens, to conduct a thorough and non-partisan investigation of every phase of prohibition, will be appointed by Hoover as soon as he steps into the presidency on March 4. The personnel of the committee is occupying almost as much of the time of the president as the selection of his cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Action on the Jones resolution proposing a citizens investigation of prohibition enforcement was postponed by the senate judiciary committee today when the point was raised that might be offensive to President Coolidge. Administration leaders suggested that it might be improper to ask President Coolidge to sign a bill authorizing his successor to conduct an investigation of prohibition enforcement during his (Coolidge's) administration.

Insurance Meeting Called Jan. 22nd

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—Notice was given by the Board of Insurance Commissioners of a meeting to be held here January 22 to consider 18 proposed changes in the Texas general basis schedules and the approved form of rules and regulations.

Proposals to allow credit for fire stops in frame and brick veneer buildings, foam fire extinguishing apparatus, all metal gin machinery, and for transits in wall and roof construction will be included in the hearing.

Changes in schedules of average distribution clause, warehouse charge in brick mercantile schedule, ratings of linter warehouse at cotton seed oil mills, galvanized iron works, tin box and tin factories and naval stores will also be considered.

Consideration of city key rates will also come before the meeting of the board.

HOME AFTER 20 YEARS
ARRESTED FOR MURDER OF
BOYHOOD SWEETHEART

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky., Jan. 14.—The human desire of Norris Fort, 38, to see his relatives here again after hiding from the law for 20 years resulted in his imprisonment for the alleged murder of his boyhood sweetheart a score of years ago.

Although Fort claims that the girl was killed by accident in a scuffle over a revolver which she had, he said he was glad he was no longer forced to dodge the law. "It is a terrible thing to know you are wanted for some crime and cannot face your loved ones," said Fort. "I wandered for 20 years, working for only a few weeks at a time on jobs in Tennessee, Louisiana and Florida for fear I would be detected if I stayed too long in one place. Then I just had to come back to see my people."

Three Hundred Years of Progress in

Since the first candle snuffer made its appearance about 300 years ago humans have given much thought to the perfection of methods, and devices for staying the devastating powers of fire, and dating from the crude snuffer the world has known and used myriads of instruments for this purpose.

Bucket brigades, hand pumps, and

chemicals have been used in turn. We have known the man drawn engine and hose company, then the horse-drawn, and now the motor driven vehicles which serve this purpose, and now science is seeking other methods than these, is delving deeply into the flame destroying properties of chemicals, and gases, with the view of eventually devising a system of fire fighting which will

eliminate much of the costly and ponderous paraphernalia now in use. At the moment, the latest fire fighting agency is Lux, a system which employs gas that smothers flames, and in which fire can not exist. This gas is dry, it is harmful only to the flames, and it does its work quickly, effectively, and without the attendant mess that water always causes.

MACON, Mo., Jan. 14.—Officers of the Mark Twain Memorial Park association, who raised the money and purchased more than 100 acres on the lowlands near Florida, Mo., and who did much improving before turning the park over to the state, are hoping that something will be done by the legislature to make the park what it was at first intended for—a worthy memorial for Missouri's greatest writer if not one of the greatest in the world.

The little house where Clements was born at Florida, it is said, threatens to go to decay.

"Dad" Violette, one of the originators of the park idea, has done all he can, but now his sight is failing and he cannot look after the little structure the way that he would like to.

If the state will remove the house to the park and provide a proper setting, Mr. Violette will be glad to have that done and will ask nothing of Missouri for the house, although it is said that he has been offered large sums for it, by people of other states.

Missouri sits idly by while the press of the state is attacking the state of Missouri for the way it is looking after this project. One of the editors of a certain newspaper made the following statement:

"Missouri sits idly by while the birthplace of Mark Twain, most illustrious of all American literary geniuses, goes to ruin. This, too, with a state park only a quarter of a mile away and scads of money in the state's park department treasury from which to draw the small sum needed for moving the house and providing it with fire-proof shelter.

"Missouri should rise above such parsimony as it practices in cultural matters like this."

Yale Scientists To New Mexico On Fossil Hunt

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 15.—An expedition of Yale scientists will enter the waste lands of the Southwest next spring to seek fossil remains, especially in what are rated as the craters of extinct volcanoes. The expedition goes because "the most remarkable fossil that has ever come to light" has reached Peabody Museum of Anaconda, New Mexico. Great discoveries are expected to follow the expedition's progress.

The newly arrived fossil is "Nothorhynchium," a ground sloth reckoned extinct since Pleistocene times. That, according to Professor Richard S. Lull, director of the museum here, means all the way from 500,000 to 1,000,000 years ago.

Ewing Waterhouse, of El Paso, found the fossil 100 feet below the entrance to a cavern full of bat guano. Other similar extinct volcanoes are scattered through the region and these also are to be explored.

The cavern from which the fossil here came starts with a crater rim 200 feet above the surrounding country. The rim is broken on the east side by a gap which forms a regular passage into the interior with gradually narrowing walls. In the floor of the passage is a pit of which the aperture is eight feet in diameter, covering the entire width of the gap.

Waterhouse and two companions descended into the hole and the fossil was exhumed. Yale bought the remains.

The further exploration of the passages near the crater and other craters is to be undertaken jointly between the museum here and the United States National Museum at Washington. In discussing the possibilities of the expedition Professor Lull says, "It is hardly thinkable that our sloth was the only unfortunate of his day to blunder in. At any rate the rodents we know ate him must be there."

"One is fascinated by the possibilities which the imagination conjures up of further exploration in the sloth pit and the chance of finding other sloths, together with associated extinct, perhaps even traces of human existence, all of which may point to a late survival of this strange type. There is, however, no tradition among the living Indians which could possibly refer to its existence."

"Only two other ground sloths have been discovered in which any of the soft parts have been preserved," says Professor Lull. "One came from the extreme south end of South America, and the other from Big Bone Cave in Tennessee. The Yale specimen shows more than any other discovery has revealed and because of the entirety of the skeleton."

UNDERGROUND RIVER IS BOON TO SUGAR COMPANY ON HAWAIIAN PLANTATION

HONOLULU, Jan. 14.—An underground river which was discovered on the Island of Kauai more than a year ago when experts from the McBryde Sugar Company were in search for additional sources from which to irrigate their cane is continuing to flow with no indication of easing up or stopping.

The "river" which is really an underground stream flowing to sea through a gigantic lava tube has proved a boon to the plantation. It is four feet deep and six feet wide and averages between 26 and 30 million gallons of water daily. Its source appears to be the high rainy sections of the island which lie in the vicinity of Mount Waialeale, which has the distinction of being the rainiest spot on earth with an annual rainfall of more than 400 inches.

OKLAHOMA'S OLDEST MAN

ALLEGED TO BE 116 YEARS

GUTHRIE, Okla., Jan. 14.—"Uncle Tommy" Sloan, who celebrated his 116th birthday at his home here recently, hopes he has celebrated his last birthday.

"Uncle Tommy" is said to be the oldest man in the Southwest. But his thoughts have turned to the world beyond and he believes he is "dying by inches." Although seldom ill, the centenarian is confined to his home by the heat in summer and the cold in winter.

Sloan has spent an even 100 years in America. He was born in a small Irish fishing village and lived there until he was 16.

Glands Cannot Make Aged Man Sweet Sixteen

PARIS, Jan. 14.—"Faust was a myth and even monkey gland treatment is incapable of making part of that myth a reality."

Dr. Serge Voronoff, whose grafting operation is generally believed to restore youth, admitted that science cannot make gray-haired persons feel like "sweet sixteen."

Mental vigor and not the lost years of romance, he explained, is what most patients hope can be borrowed from African simians. "Not more than 5 per cent of the persons who come to me to be operated upon do so because they desire to appeal to the opposite sex," he said.

Dr. Voronoff said he made these reflections after witnessing Arnold Bennett's play, "Professor Satoll-yon," in which Dr. Faust shakes off 80 years and falls in love with a 19-year-old student.

"The gland operation cannot even guarantee a fresh complexion," said Dr. Voronoff. "If a patient's wrinkles are smoothed out it is an accident."

"The operation is a boon to persons who need intellectual stimulus in that it overcomes physical fatigue, which affects the mental machinery."

"But the affect of the gland may not be permanent. Some patients feel the need of a new operation after three or five years after the first grafting."

"Arnold Bennett in his play apparently intends to convey a moral which impresses me. There is an ethical problem in the fact that Dr. Fausting ruins a girl's life. Is it right to prolong or renew the life of one of evil character? My answer is a question. Should a surgeon refuse to operate on an unquestionably bad man?"

"Transforming old men into youths is an interesting fancy in literature but it is not based on scientific facts."

leon's marshals, later King of Sweden, and still later, ancestor of Estelle Manville's husband, sneak off to India when a young man and play havoc with the dancing girls in the native temples?

According to this diary, Bernadote not only went to India, but down there he became involved in an espionage affair of serious proportions, and, simultaneously fell violently in love with an Indian dancing girl.

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—A collection of the smallest publications in the world have been placed on exhibition in the public library here. The collection is said to be worth \$100,000.

The smallest book in the group is a translation of the Rubaiyat of Omar Kahlil, which is five-sixteenths of an inch square, less than an eighth of an inch thick and contains 48 pages, on each of which are three verses.

Miniature newspapers, some of which are smaller than a postage stamp, are also in the collection.

Among others are Gallie's "Madonna Christina," the smallest book ever printed with movable type, a 4,000 year old Babylonian clay tablet, inch size histories of the world and a miniature stamp album.
