CHAIRMAN OF THE CENTRAL HEALTH COMMITTEE

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COTTON PLANTING LAW EXPLAINED BY CHEEK

Pointing out that his recent opinion to the State Department of Agriculture on the cotton acreage law has been misinterpreted in certain particulars, Maurice Cheek, Assistant Attorney General, says that it was not intended in the opinion to hold that no land which was planted to cotton in 1931 can be planted in cotton next year.

Because of the number of inquiries received by the Attorney General's Department and the Department of Agriculture, Mr. Cheek's statement is published in full:

"The law provides that a person may plant 30 per cent of the area of each separately owned tract of land in cultivation in planted crops in 1931, a 'separately owned tract' being the total amount of land in a single county which such a person owns, leases or has any other title to, including the right of possession or control. A farmer can plant to cotton in 1932 land on which cotton was planted in 1931, but the total acreage in cotton in a single county must not exceed 30 per cent of the total area in cultivation in 1931 in that county.

"The opinion does hold that the meaning of the law may not be evaded by planting the entire acreage in cotton in 1932 by having only 30 per cent of the total rows of cotton in 1932 as were planted in 1931. Total acreage to cotton is the determinant and not the spacing of rows. A farmer with 100 acres in cultivation in 1931 may plant 30 acres in that land to cotton, even if all of his cultivated land was in cotton this year. He can not, however, under the law, plant the 100 acres to cotton, but reduce the number of rows to 30 per cent of the rows planted to cotton in 1931."

Mr. Cheek calls attention to the fact that the unit for determining the per cent of the planting is not each farm which a person owns or leases, but the total amount of acreage which he owns, leases or has other title to in each single county. The total acreage in each county is the unit upon which the per cent of planting allowed is based.

TEXAS LEADS IN SHEEP

"The United States, with approximately one-twelfth of the world's sheep, is the third largest sheep-producing country, being exceeded only by Russia and Australia," says a bulletin recently issued by the University of Texas. "Domestic sheep production practically balances the American mutton consumption."

"The number of sheep in the United States expanded from 35,591,000 head in 1922 to 50,750,000 head in 1930, an increase of 38 per cent. Approximately 69 per cent of the sheep are found in the Western range states. More than one-half of the total supply of mutton is consumed in the area east of the Ohio and north of the Potomac rivers.

"Texas is the leading sheep-producing state in the Union. Approximately 5,550,000 head, or about 11 per cent, of the nation's sheep are located in the state. The number of sheep in Texas increased 89 per cent from 1923 to 1930. More than 95 per cent of Texas sheep are Rambouillet and Delaine, both of which are fine-wool breeds. More than nine tenths of the total sheep production of the State is conducted on a large scale and is concentrated principally in the Edwards Plateau region."

FAMILIES GROWING SMALLER

According to the 1920 census, Mills county had 1870 families and they averaged 480 persons to every 100 families. In 1930 the number of families had increased to 1976, but the persons per family had decreased to 420. In the state as a whole the figures were 460 persons per 100 families in 1920 and 420 (exactly the same as the Mills county average) in 1930.

GOOD RAIN FALLS HERE THIS WEEK

Three-quarters of an inch rain fell here early Tuesday morning accompanied by a high wind. Two days of threatening weather preceded it.

The rain, was timely and will benefit crops and seasoning for crops, it is said. Ranges were also freshened and water holes were replenished.

The rain was general over this section of the state as shown by reports from surrounding towns as follows:

ITALIAN REPRESENTATIVE TALKS WITH PRESIDENT

Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy, who arrived in New York Monday, went immediately to Washington and he and his beautiful young wife were presented to President Hoover soon after their arrival in the capital.

Elaborate plans had been made to protect the young diplomat from any anti-Fascist demonstration. Charles Lindbergh had been hurriedly sent for from Florida to fly Grandi from New York to Washington, but the fog prevented. However there were no disturbances along the route.

Grandi, who is only 36, is the youngest foreign minister in Europe. He is a war veteran and has been a right hand man of Premier Mussolini from the very beginning of the Fascist movement. He is generally believed to be the man most likely to succeed Mussolini eventually. As he speaks fluent English, his conversations with President Hoover are being held in English, thus doing away with the necessity of an interpreter as in the case of Premier Laval's recent visit, when Secretary Stimson interpreted.

The exact reason for Grandi's visit has not been made public, but it is believed that it is to talk over Armament reduction and the revision of war debts which were apparently agreed upon by President Hoover and Premier Laval. It is also considered likely that he will sound out American financiers as to the possibility of securing a loan for Italy.

MRS. W. M. JOHNSON DEAD

Friends of Mrs. G. H. Frizzell here received the sad news yesterday of the death of her mother, Mrs. W. M. Johnson at Weatherford. Mrs. Johnson, who was over 90, had been very frail for some time, and for the past several months had been confined to her bed. She was one of the pioneers of Texas and leaves friends throughout the state. Mrs. Frizzell had been at her bedside since Sunday. The funeral will be held in Weatherford Friday.

At Nice, France, the Nizam of Hyderabad, reputed to be the richest man in the world, Monday gave \$200,000 in cash and a million dollars' worth of jewels to Prince Abdul Medjid Effendi, former Caliph at Estambul, and supreme spiritual ruler of 300,000,000 Mohammedans, in return for the marriage of the former Caliph's daughter and niece to the Nizam's two sons.

At the same time the ruler of Hyderabad, whose wealth is estimated at more than \$2,000,000,000, increased the former Caliph's living allowance to \$2,000 a month. Ever since Medjid was exiled from Turkey by Mustapha Kemal, seven years ago, the Nizam has been paying \$1,500 a month to the weaver of Mohammed's mantle.

A double wedding uniting Prince Azam Jah, heir of the Hyderabad throne, with the 18-year-old Princess Durai Shehvar, only daughter of the former Caliph, and the Nizam's younger son with Princess Nilufar, 16-year-old niece of the former Caliph, was celebrated with Oriental splendor Thursday.

The event takes on added interest in as much as the ceremony will be performed on the Nizam's birthday by the former Caliph himself in his capacity as Caliph of all the Mussulmans. It will be the first time he ever officiated at such a ceremony.

The Princess Durai Shehvar, who has been living on the charity of friends ever since her father lost the Turkish throne, becomes potentially the richest girl in the world by this marriage, for her fiancé is destined to inherit his father's colossal wealth, estimated to exceed the combined fortunes of the Rockefellers, the Fords and the Morgans.

In India the Nizam has diamonds by the bushel, it is said, and incalculable quantities of gold, gems and other property piled up by Mogul Emperors through the centuries.

Eighty per cent of the food consumed by the Texas prison system is now supplied by the system itself.

President Hoover has announced a reduction of fifty-nine million dollars in the naval budget to be presented to Congress. No men will be eliminated or ships dropped, he said.

After being adrift in an open boat without food or water for three days, eleven sailors were rescued in the Carvibbean Sea Thursday. The mariners had been sighted by an aviator only a few minutes after their ship had sunk, but he was powerless to help them.

A government commission in Finland has reported that it finds the dry law of that country insupportable. It recommends the legalizing of wines and beer. Finland has had prohibition since 1919.

Abilene was selected as next year's convention city by the Texas Baptist Convention in session last week at Waco.

In Denver, Colo., wintry weather swept down and snow storms were reported throughout the Rocky Mountain area. It was 15 degrees below zero on the summit of Pike's Peak Wednesday.

THANKSGIVING

With the approach of another Thanksgiving, there appear the usual questions as to just what we have to be thankful for now. The perennial pessimist can point at unemployment and the breadlines, at low prices and closed banks, at hungry children and poorly clad parents, at high taxes and inefficient government—and so on. He can view with alarm the war clouds that are rising in the East. In fact with a little imagination such a man can paint a picture of destruction and decay that will appear to presage the early disintegration of our present civilization.

But fortunately his opinions are more largely theories than facts. Ask him to point out the people he knows who are starving, and he will talk about Dallas or Detroit. Ask him to name the total of the taxes he is paying, and he will more than likely disclose an amount that is absurdly small in comparison with the benefits he is securing from a stable government—in schools, police protection, insurance reduction, roads and the like. But convince him, you cannot, and it is a waste of time to try.

This country has always been going to the dogs (in the opinion of some people) from the dark days of Valley Forge when the malcontents clamored for the dismissal of Washington, on through the troublesome times of the War of 1812, the severe business depression of the year 1821, the panics of 1837, 1843 and 1857, and the Civil War.

There are men and women still living who survived the horrors of that war only to be confronted with the terrors of reconstruction under carpet bag and negro governments in addition to the rigors of a financial and industrial depression in the 70's that lasted for seven years. Compare their lot with yours before you take your stand at the wailing wall today.

The times are bad, but they are intolerable only to those men and women who have been pampered and spoiled by too much good fortune. Conditions are always comparative. The man who has been living luxuriously from oil royalties provided by a bountiful nature and placed fortuitously within his grasp, finds it cruel to be forced to manual labor when that income dwindles and fails. But the man who has been accustomed to earn his bread by the sweat of his brow will welcome the work that the erstwhile rich man finds too hard.

Thousands of families are having to economize now more than ever before. To most of them the experience is a salutary one, however, and will not be looked upon with as much regret as they now believe. Many successful men can look back to a time which tested their strength and resources to the limit, but which gave them the experience and knowledge with which to rise to still greater achievements later on.

Boys and girls have been growing up amidst luxuries undreamed of by their parents in a year or two. It is undeniable that much of the unrest and discontent of the younger generation since the World War has been largely due to the easy conditions under which they were being brought up. A few sacrifices, more contact with the sterner realities of life will just as undoubtedly restore them to sanity and to usefulness. In fact such a change is already becoming noticeable.

More than anything else at this Thanksgiving, we American people have cause to be thankful for resourcefulness, endurance and faith—qualities which many times before have lifted this nation from the depths of depression and despondency, and will not fail us now.

ATTORNEY GENERAL

HITS CONNIVANCE OF TRADE COMMISSION

Denouncing the federal trade commission for its alleged connivance in the approval of a huge oil monopoly, Attorney General James V. Allred has declared:

"This is not the first time that a bunch of Republicans in high federal office have approved violations of the law. The looting of Teapot Dome was accomplished with approval of federal authorities."

In an ouster suit filed Thursday by the attorney general against 15 oil corporations, it was alleged that the federal trade commission had colluded with the American Petroleum Institute and the defendants by approving a n unlawful "code of ethics", which the state maintains is but a guise to cloak an oil trust combination agreement.

The attorney general ridiculed the defensive statements of officials of the American Petroleum Institute that their "code of ethics" for the oil industry was legitimate, having been promulgated by the federal trade commission to improve practices in the industry.

"Mussolini or the king of England would have as much power to authorize the violation of laws in Texas as the federal trade commission would," declared the 31-year-old attorney general.

Payrolls of 673 Texas firms on Oct. 15, showed 79,215 workers employed, a gain of 2.1 per cent over the total at the corresponding time in the previous month, according to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas. Average weekly wages paid each worker amounted to \$25.84, compared with \$25.87 for the corresponding firms on the monthly report of September 15.

Approximately \$25,000 was raised at a mass meeting Tues- day night to complete the \$200,000 needed to establish a new bank here. The assets of the Citizens National Bank will be taken over by the new bank when the organization is per- fected. Now the bank organi- zers must raise \$27,000 from stockholders of the old Coggin National Bank, then obtain pledges from depositors in the former Citizens National Bank that they will restrict them- selves in making withdrawals.

Through streets crowded with people one of the most color- ful parades staged in Brown- wood for years passed Wednes- day morning in celebration of Armistice Day. The streets were lined with United States flags. Included in the parade: Colors, American Legion mem- bership, American Legion Aux- iliary, members of the U.C.V., members of the U.S.D. Decorating the Thanksgiving Table

THANKSGIVING is family re- union day when we not only recall the good things of the year but also express the season's glad- ness with color, and merriment and the big turkey on the dining room table. Mother Nature has much to contribute, and the rooms may well, at this season, be decorated with golden chrysanthemums, autumn leaves, poppies, and even garlands of the red cranberry.

Attention to detail in preparing the Thanksgiving table gives an added attraction to the dinner. A basket of fruit in the center is very colorful. One of orange cardboard, easy to make, the base oblong, sides triangular and decorated with a border and handle of braided gold- on cellophane gives a joyous and holiday glitter to the table. The handle and four corners should be adorned with sprays of autumn leaves, either real if available, or cut out of paper and mounted on wires.

Individual favors may be made to match the centerpiece, small nut cups of braided cellophane being a pretty idea, and bon-bon dishes made from double nut cups held together with a braided handle may be covered with amber colored paper and a gold cellophane ruffle. Even the napkins can be made more decorative by using two small around one end, a scheme that has also a practical application for it furnishes a napkin clip as well. Orange ribbon with two or three leaves can be used for the same purpose.

In braiding the handle material, cut the roll into strips 4 1/2 inches wide. Crush each strip by draw- ing it lengthwise through the hand; then braid them together and braid them. Then wrap the braided braid around the center of the basket and the handle, using some to run around the edge as a border.

IF WE APED THE BRITISH

Clinging tenaciously to cus- tom, the British House of Com- mons yesterday proceeded to re-elect its speaker of the last session, Edward Algernon Fitz- roy. If the same tradition pre- vailed in our own House of Rep- resentatives the scene on the next Dec. 7, granting the ful- fillment of Democratic desires, would be about as follows:

The curtain rises, disclosing Jack Garner of Texas, hiding behind one of the back seats in the chamber near the cloak room. Amid complete silence William Tyler Page, clerk of the House, rises and solemnly points a finger at Representa- tive Collier, of Mississippi, floor leader to-be. Mr. Collier rises and nominates Mr. Garner for speaker. The clerk again does some pointing, this time at Rep- resentative Snell, of New York, a Republican. Mr. Snell, taking the cue, seconds the nomina- tion. Then Messrs. Collier and Snell, representing the Demo- crats and Republicans, ap- proach the shy and shrinking violet personified by Mr. Gar- ner, pluck him from his seat and, each seizing his arm, gently propel his resisting form to the speaker's dais.

Throughout the march to the "throne" Mr. Garner must con- tinue to enact the role of an exceedingly unwilling recipient of the honor. A vivid imagina- tion is required to visualize Mr. Garner struggling against at- tempts to force him into the speakership, but this is what he would have to do to fulfill the British tradition. Then, finally landed on the dais despite his opposition, he would not im- mediately take the speaker's chair. Instead he would make a little speech of self-deprecation exposing a bad case of inferior- ity complex. He would tell the members he was wholly unworthy of the honor they were forcing upon him, that he could not understand why they ever selected him when there were so many others with a better claim to preferment. Fi- nally, however, reassured by shouts of encouragement, he would overcome his reluctance and meekly accept the insignia of office.

Fortunately for the dignity of the House, we don't follow the British custom in electing a speaker. They don't think it's funny over there. But over here any ceremony represent- ing Mr. Garner running away from the speakership would necessarily degenerate into a roaring farce.—Boston Trans- script.

OIL: Far Cry from the Days of the Blacksmith Shop

CHAPTER XVII
WHEN the motor car first ap- peared on the roads, the black- smith was the handyman, and early car owners depended upon him for necessary repairs. The automo- bile repair business grew rapidly; and as faithful old Dobbin gave way to the motor car, the blacksmith shop was transformed into an automobile repair shop.

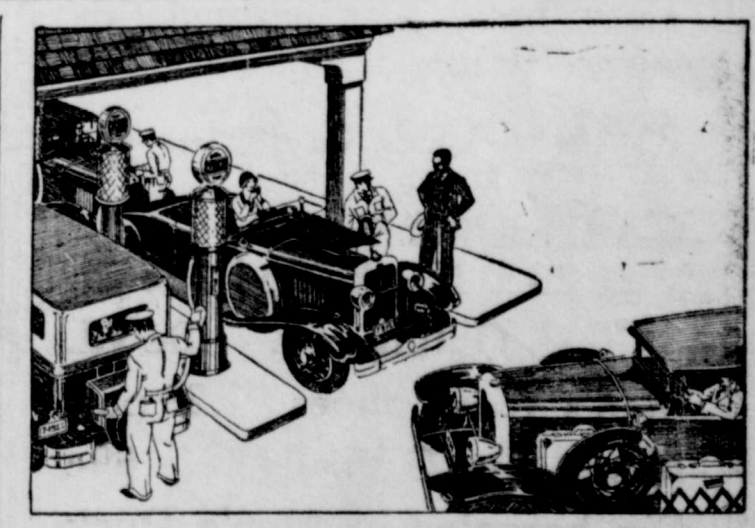
It was natural, therefore, for the first motorists to expect the repair shop to supply their oil and fuel requirements. From the first gasoline pump and tank installations at repair shops has grown our present extensive distributing system, with its conveniently located filling stations. Advent of the Gasoline Pump As manufacturers began to improve their cars and frequent expenses for repairs were to some extent elimi- nated, skepticism concerning automo- bile transportation soon disappeared and the manufacture of motor vehicles proceeded by leaps and bounds. The first pumps installed were serving the motorist well; and sensing the in- evitable demand for better and more extensive fuel and oil service, oil companies were quick to establish more of these outlets.

Thus pumps began to spring up everywhere along the main arteries of travel. Garages, accessory and tire shops, hardware stores, and other stores that catered to the motoring trade secured this equipment and co- operated to perfect fuel supply ser- vice. When the auto appeared on the back road, the gasoline pump was there to meet it—either at the farm house by the crossroads or beside the village store.

Convenience of Filling Station

The gasoline pump at curbside and filling station has had much to do with the growing use of motor cars. It has made possible the dispensing of motor fuel when and where needed, and with a minimum of labor; and has been an important factor in keep- ing gasoline prices down.

Contrast this convenient method of distribution with the system pre-

vailing in Europe until a few years ago. In London, in Paris, and in other European cities the motorist received his fuel almost exclusively from cans stacked high upon the sidewalk in front of various establishments—a slow and precarious method.

We take the gasoline pump for granted. It is a symbol of gasoline supply recognized by every motorist. The motorist drives alongside the pump and asks for ten gallons of gasoline. He sees the pump handle turn, the visible bowl drained or a flow meter registers, and in a few seconds his tank is full of gasoline.

The modern gasoline pump serves with uncanny accuracy. The handle on a piston type pump operates with mechanical precision much the same as our automobile engine. A piston operates within a cross cylinder full of gasoline. Turning the crank handle raises the piston within the cylinder and forces the gasoline out through the discharge hose. The desired quan- tities are obtained by varying the length of the piston stroke.

The visible bowl type of pump measures the liquid gasoline by means of calibrated markings on the inside of the glass. The metered pump operates with air pressure, and with a flow meter registers on a dial the amount delivered to the customer. Is the electric pump a dial is set, a but- ton pressed; and the customer gets the tank of his car filled in a few seconds.

Pumps Are Tested

Measuring devices, of whatever type, are tested by local or state sealers of weights and measures, who adjust the piston stroke to the proper height, the markings on the bowl to the proper place, and the flow meter to register accurately; and then seal the pump so that it cannot be tam- pered with. Hundreds of thousands of pumps are annually dispensing mil- lions of gallons of gasoline with ac- curacy that accounts for every spoonful.
