

Congress May End Session By Next Week

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—House conferees reached agreement today on a compromise \$1,413,380,000 deficiency bill with most of that money designed to pay the costs of the Korean War.

The measure carries \$1,128,000,000 for the Army, 38 million dollars for the Navy, and 235 million for the Air Force. The funds are needed largely to pay extra expenses in the services incurred in the Korean fighting.

Also included was a 10 million dollar item for a foot and mouth disease laboratory. Sen. Ives (R-NY) has said Plum Island in Long Island Sound has been tentatively selected as the site for the laboratory.

The bill is the last supplemental money measure for the 1952 fiscal year which ends on Monday.

The log-jam of Congress' money bills finally broke on a multi-billion dollar scale.

And the breakup is proceeding so fast that leaders were talking with some confidence today of being able to wind up the session—and the 82nd Congress—for good a week from tomorrow.

The House scheduled the opening of debate today on its last pending appropriation bill—10 billion dollars in new funds for foreign aid, military projects and other purposes next year.

And the Senate, which has been lagging far behind the House, was

in the throes of a get-out-of-town fever.

These were the actions the Senate took yesterday:

\$45,734,750,912 military bill approved by Appropriations Committee after brief consideration and sent to the floor.

\$3,437,895,000 compromise Treasury-Postoffice bill—passed without debate and sent to President Truman, the first of the fiscal 1953 bills to reach the President's desk.

\$1,012,547,852 State - Commerce - Justice bill—passed and sent to conference with the House to adjust differences.

\$76,886,648 legislative bill carrying funds for Congress—Approved by Appropriations Committee for floor action.

The legislative measure was scheduled to be passed and sent to conference today—the ninth money bill to be acted on by the Senate out of 11 that must be passed before Congress can quit.

In approving it yesterday, the Appropriations Committee modified a House provision which would have given the lawmakers the privilege of claiming income tax exemption on all their living costs during congressional sessions. The committee kept the tax reduction feature but limited the exemption to the first \$2,400 of such costs.

In the House, administration leaders saw little chance of restoring the 25 per cent cut made by the Appropriations Committee in President Truman's \$13,750,688,802 request for defense construction, foreign aid, atomic energy expansion and other things.

In fact, an attempt was expected to make even deeper cuts in foreign military and economic aid. The committee recommended \$5,275,940,750, including funds for governing occupied areas of Germany and Trieste.

Moreover, in an accompanying statement, the committee told the administration it should stop pledging funds to foreign countries before Congress has voted the money.

Mutual aid funds in the bill are to implement the program recently voted by Congress. The other appropriations will supplement funds already voted for the current fiscal year, ending June 30, or the next year beginning July 1.

The Senate committee action on the military spending bill—by far the biggest of all the money measures—produced a surprise yesterday.

That was because the group cut the total in the bill 472 millions below the House figure even though President Truman and his military chiefs had complained that the House total was much too low. The House reduced Truman's requests by about \$4,700,000,000.

However, the committee did knock off a 46 billion dollar spending ceiling voted by the House for fiscal 1953. This would have held spending six billions under the planned figure. It drew the heaviest attacks from the White House and Pentagon.

Immigration Bill Veto Over-Ridden

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Congress wrote the McCarran-Walter immigration bill into law today over President Truman's veto.

Truman vetoed the bill Wednesday. Co-sponsored by Sen. McCarran (D-Nev) and Rep. Walter (D-Pa.), it revises and codifies all existing U. S. laws on immigration and naturalization.

The President said he was in favor of some of its provisions, but said its flaws outweighed its good points. He said that to him the bill smacked of thought control.

The Senate overrode the veto by 57 to 26. This was five votes more than the two-thirds majority needed to override a presidential veto. The House margin yesterday was 278 to 113—17 more than a two-thirds majority.

CONTRACTS TO BE MAILED

School Board Votes Pay Hike For Teachers, Administrators

Salary raises aggregating \$43,624 for administrators and teachers were voted by the Big Spring Independent School District board of trustees Thursday evening.

Of this amount \$38,200 will go to the teaching staff in the form of a \$200 increase over the Gilmer-Alken base for their experience and training. The four full time principals were voted \$600 on the base, the superintendent \$724, and two women's physical education instructors \$400 each for extra duties they have been performing. Three not affected by the Gilmer-Alken schedule were given raises. The business manager got \$500 per annum, the tax assessor-collector \$500, the secretary to the board \$400.

Pegging of the salaries will permit the mailing of contracts to all the teaching staff. Previously they had been notified of their election, but no individual contracts had been sent out.

The board set July 10 as the date for public hearing on a budget which they approved tentatively in the amount of \$947,072 before

the raises. This will boost the figure to \$990,000.

A request from the City of Big Spring for acreage north of the North Ward school and facing on North 12th Street was tabled. Board members said they wanted to check field notes on the ground to get a visual picture of the land involved. The City wants the ground for a fire station site and indicated the surrounding area would be developed as a park. The board was considering seriously.

Adoption of the new salary structure means that the system will be on a schedule of \$2,603 for a beginning teacher with a Bachelor's degree will increments of \$54 for each additional year experience. Maximum for the teacher with a Bachelor's degree will be \$3,251. Those with a Master's degree and teaching the first year will receive \$2,828 with an increment of \$54 for each additional year of experience. The increment in this case would continue for as long as 26 years,

making the maximum with 26 years experience \$4,232.

The raise would put the schedule on a par with most systems in the state of comparable size. Before the raise was voted, however, Big Spring was the lowest of 20 systems in its class, according to a survey made by the Texas State Teachers Association.

The adjustment for full time principals will bring their annual payment above the minimum foundation program set by the state to slightly above the median \$498 for 46 schools in schools with 2,500 to 5,000 scholars. Prior to the step Big Spring was squarely on the base and thus at the bottom of the list. The adjustment in the superintendent will not put it up to the ladder. One system (Conroe) pays \$7,664 over the minimum base of \$7,476. The median over the base for superintendents in the comparable system range is \$1,240.

CHILD BACK WITH PARENTS

Kidnapping Charge Filed In Lubbock

LEVELLAND, Tex., June 27 (AP)—While the Rev. and Mrs. Anthem Wade got re-acquainted with their young son today, charges of kidnapping the boy were filed in Lubbock against a young couple.

Johnny Wade, 3, ran into his mother's arms a few minutes after midnight today. Yesterday, he had cried when officers took him from the arms of the couple with whom he had lived for seven weeks—since he was abducted last May 4 from the front porch of his home in Artec, N. M.

Charges of kidnapping were filed against Fred Rodgers Elrod, 25, and his wife, Mrs. Tommie Neil Elrod, 22. They were sworn to by Aubrey Elliott, resident special agent for the FBI in Lubbock and were filed before Mrs. Olive Fluke, U. S. commissioner, Lubbock Division of the Northern Federal District of Texas.

The Elrods were expected to go to Lubbock sometime today to enter a plea.

Both have admitted in signed

statements that they took the boy because Mrs. Elrod was attracted to him.

"I once kept a child that put me in mind of this one," Mrs. Elrod told Editor Charley Didway of the Hockley County Herald.

"I tried to adopt it but was unable to. I always wanted a child but have been unable to have one."

Mr. and Mrs. Wade drove here yesterday. Johnny, husky, brown-haired, and blue-eyed, played at the home of his uncle, Jim Wyman, until they arrived.

GARDEN CITY—People in Garden City were overjoyed Thursday evening to learn of the safe return of Johnny Wade.

Friday morning the almost miraculous recovery of the kidnapped child of the Rev. and Mrs. Anthem Wade, who served the First Baptist Church here, was still the chief topic of conversation.

As word came from newspapers and by radio Thursday, the news was spread rapidly.

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Bombers Renew Savage Assaults In North Korea

Big Three Put Final Touches In Their Reply

LONDON, June 27 (AP)—The Big Three foreign ministers put the polishing touches today on the Western reply to Russia's request for talks on German unity.

U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson, British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman checked a proposed draft line by line in a two-and-a-half hour session.

The final draft was not completed by the time the foreign ministers recessed for lunch with Prime Minister Churchill at No. 10 Downing Street. A Foreign Office spokesman said the big three discussions would be resumed later in the day. The note is expected to be completed tonight.

The foreign ministers are reported seeking a way to make the Soviet show its true hand—to pin the Russians down on whether they are sincere in demanding four-power talks on a unified Germany.

Sources close to the conference said the British and French are willing to go right ahead with a conference. Acheson is understood to be urging a preliminary meeting that could agree on an agenda before any high-level negotiations. There is a strong feeling among Western diplomats that the Russians merely want to stall for time, trying to upset the Western schedule for the rearming of Germany and its inclusion in the Western orbit.

The Soviet note, delivered May 25, protested the signing by the Western powers of a "peace contract" with the West German government at Bonn and the inclusion of West Germany in the projected European army.

It made plain that Russia would not consider any arrangement between the Western powers and the Bonn government binding on any future all-Germany government.

Precise details of the projected reply have not been disclosed. But diplomatic sources in Paris said earlier this month that the three Western powers agreed that the Russians should be asked to confer on a level below the foreign ministers on the question of elections in both West and East Germany.

The Western Allies want a neutral commission to determine whether free elections can be held in both parts of the divided country. The Russians want such an investigation by the four occupation powers only, a group in which they would have a veto.

Police Take Top Leaders

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, June 27 (AP)—Armed security police arrested two top leaders of South Africa's non-white campaign against racial discrimination today.

The campaign started yesterday and police seized 140 persons for various violations of segregation laws. The demonstrators are purposefully violating the laws and courting arrest. The idea is to arouse South Africa's 10 million non-whites to similar tactics and flood the country's jails beyond capacity.

The two leaders arrested today were Yusuf A. Cachalia, secretary of the campaign, and Nelson Mandela, a Negro who is a member of the African National Congress. Cachalia is a leader of the South African Indian Congress.

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Infantrymen Drive Off Red Battalions

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Allied fighter bombers heaped new destruction on Communist hydro-electric plants in North Korea last night. Targets included two big generating stations which previously had been spared.

U. N. infantrymen drove two Chinese battalions off two hills on the Western Front Thursday, at times using bayonets and flame throwers to rout the Reds from their bunkers.

A Fifth Air Force spokesman called the 150-plane raid on the Communists' North Korean power network a mopping up operation, but the number of planes involved and damage were impressive.

Two power plants at Changlin (Chosin) were hit for the first time. Other Air Force and Marine fighter bombers dumped bombs and rockets on a third Changlin generating station and one at Fusen which already had been smashed in raids Monday and Tuesday.

The planes struck just at sundown. Pilots said a switchyard was destroyed and the power house damaged at Changlin plant No. 1. The powerhouse and switchyard were damaged and an adjacent building was destroyed at Changlin plant No. 2.

Additional damage also was reported at the third Changlin plant and one at Fusen, two of five generating stations the Air Force said were put out of action.

Allied planes have not returned to the giant Suhoi plant on the Yalu River since Monday. This plant supplied power for Red war industries in both North Korea and Manchuria.

An Air Force spokesman said Friday all the five plants hit Monday and Tuesday are out of action now but "the time required for the enemy to restore them, if he has the capability, is not known."

The Eighth Army reported 177 Chinese killed and 107 wounded in savage day-long fighting for two strategic heights west of T-bone Hill, not far from Chosin, where the bitterest battles since autumn were fought last week.

Allied troops knocked an armor-supported Red battalion from one hill in a 5½-hour battle, then fought all day up three slopes of a second ridge.

U. N. forces were pulled off the first hill shortly before dark, but dug in for the night on the other ridge, the Army said.

Navy planes hammered Red supply and transportation facilities south of the East Coast port of Wonsan Friday.

The Navy said carrier-based planes from the Boxer, Princeton, Bon Homme Richard and Philippine Sea strafed enemy troops and buildings.

Marine pilots from the carrier Bataan off the West Coast reported destruction of more than 140 buildings in the Chinnampo-Haeju area.

Attorney Approved

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee today approved the nomination of Maurice Sanchez to be U. S. Attorney for New Mexico.

PARIS, June 27 (AP)—Two thieves were caught early today trying to steal world renowned paintings from the Paris Museum of Modern Art.

Renoir's "La Baigneuse," or picture of a woman bathing, and a Bonnard self-portrait were sliced from their frames with a razor by two young men. The men were arrested by a museum guard, Antoine Alberio, about 3 a.m.

The Renoir, owned by the Chicago Art Institute, is valued at about \$100,000. The Bonnard, owned by George Wildenstein of New York, is valued at about \$55,000.

Agents in Oklahoma Round Up Suspects

PRYOR, Okla., June 27 (AP)—State crime bureau agents, striking simultaneously at seven points, last night arrested several suspects in the ambush slaying of Mayes County Attorney Jack Burris.

Bureau Chief George Howard Wilson also announced the pickup truck believed to be the one in which the slayer escaped was found.

Agents raided seven spots in the Afton area of Ottawa County, seeking to link law violators there with the June 7 killing.

They were led by Wilson and Lt. O. K. Bivins, his chief assistant. Wilson said he was withholding names of the suspects until his investigation could be brought to a climax.

He also refused to say where they were jailed.

The pickup truck was found in Miami shortly before last night's raids started. It had been traded for a new truck early in the week.

Three shotguns seized by the raiders were turned over to crime laboratory technicians for ballistic tests. It was a heavy shotgun

charge that mowed down Burris at his home on the outskirts of Locust Grove.

Wilson disclosed that at the time Burris was killed, the seized truck belonged to an Afton man long known as a slot machine operator in the Grand Lake area.

Investigators have learned an empty pickup truck had been parked about 100 yards from the Burris residence at the time of the slaying.

The truck taken yesterday had been under agents' surveillance for 10 days, Wilson said. Iron bars on it had been removed a few days ago, he added.

Negotiators Walk Out For A Third Time

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Allied truce negotiators today walked out on the protesting Communists for the third time in a month.

Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr. declared a three-day recess and marched out of the armistice tent at Panmunjom while an angry Communist delegation loudly demanded another meeting tomorrow.

Harrison said North Korean Gen. Nam Il, head of the Communist truce team, had "great difficulty controlling himself" at the walk-out.

Harrison once got to the tent flap when Nam called "please come back. We have something to say."

The U. S. general said he resumed his seat and consented reluctantly "well, once more."

But Nam merely repeated his demand for a session tomorrow.

As soon as Nam's statement was translated Harrison and the four other Allied negotiators marched out of the tent.

"I got the impression that some of the North Korean attaches were laughing at Nam," Harrison told newsmen.

The Allies have declared three-day recesses on two previous occasions when there appeared to be no hope of breaking the long deadlock over how to exchange prisoners of war, the only major issue blocking a Korean armistice. The U. N. refuses to return prisoners who do not want to go home. The Reds demand all Allied-held captives.

The Communists insist on daily meetings, but Harrison said he refused to listen to blasts of Red propaganda every day. He calls it "drivel."

Midland County had the biggest share in the property, 43 per cent. Howard owned 25 per cent. Ector County will get 17 per cent of the return, Martin County 15 per cent.

Grafia outbid S. P. Jones for the property. The auctioneering was done by Sheriff Jake Bruton.

Truman Is Blamed For Production Halt

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Nation-wide steel strike, taking a bigger bite out of the country's economy each day, already has cost the steel companies nearly a billion dollars in lost production.

Vitality needed steel the lifeblood of industrial America, sell at \$110 a ton. Since Philip Murray ordered 50,000 of his CIO United Steelworkers to strike June 2 nearly 10 million tons of production have been lost.

It is impossible to guess how much the strike has cost America in dollars and cents. It's now hit-

ting almost all sections of the economy.

And one big steel official, Clarence B. Randall, president of Inland Steel Company, feels there isn't a chance for a compromise on one of the big, if not the most important, issue—the union shop.

In a statement at East Chicago, Ind., yesterday Randall termed the strike the only issue in the present strike.

B-36 Mass Flight Lands In England

BRIZE NORTON, England, June 27 (AP)—Twenty-one B-36s landed here today in the first mass flight to Europe of the U. S. Air Force's biggest bombers.

Brig. Gen. Joe W. Kelly of Fort Worth, Tex., who was in command, said the trip across the Atlantic went off "very smoothly—without incident." It was described as a "routine training flight."

Service Is Held For 'Old Tack'

AMARILLO, June 27 (AP)—They buried "Old Tack".

In a quiet service in the unpretentious white house where he had lived 25 years, final rites were said for Gene Howe.

The veteran Amarillo newspaperman and chairman of the board of the Globe-News Publishing Co. had been found dead two days before—victim of a bullet he had fired himself.

Only family and friends attended the rites for the man known as "Old Tack" because of his newspaper column, "The Tactless Texan."

Hundreds of messages poured into Amarillo honoring his memory as a nationally famed journalist who built a newspaper kingdom on the High Plains of Texas.

He was the son of Ed Howe, probably the most quoted of the 19th century country editors. He came to Texas in 1924 to start the Amarillo Globe and later purchased several other newspapers and radio stations.

Drouth Keeps Up Its Encore

The great Texas drouth, playing an early summer encore, continued Friday with some West Texas points enjoying relief through thundershowers.

The welcome showers marched across the Plains country and hit Wink with 1.05 inches of rain Thursday night. Lubbock got .37 inches and Childress .41. Elsewhere, Marfa had a .29 rainshower and Presidio and Del Rio reported .04 and .01, respectively.

Scattered showers were reported in the Amarillo area Friday morning.

The five-day forecast for Friday through Wednesday calls for very much the same kind of weather Texas has had during the past few days. The temperature ranges are expected to be about the same and the only moisture forecast is scattered showers in West Texas and along the coast.

Thursday's highs were 100 degrees readings at three or four points, a come-down from the 100-plus temperatures of the two weeks previous. No important changes in temperatures were expected Friday the Weather Bureau said.

Children To Participate In New Polio Experiment

HOUSTON, June 27 (AP)—An estimated 35,000 Houston children will participate in a giant experiment with a blood medicine researchers think may prevent paralysis due to polio.

The mass experiment was announced today by researchers from the University of Pittsburgh. It will be financed—at an estimated cost of half-million—by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The inoculations of the children—aged one to six—will begin next Wednesday at eight clinics.

The age bracket of one to six is that the researchers said showed 50 per cent of all polio probably will occur.

The medicine to be used—Gamma Globulin—is made from human blood. Foundation officials today emphasized it can do no harm to children.

The researchers said experiments have shown the medicine has completely whipped paralysis due to polio when given to monkeys and they said they were certain it would do the same to humans in a controlled experiment.

Half of the children in the experiment will be given the blood medicine and the other half will

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Four Bidding For Colorado Demo Support

DENVER (U)—Four prime Democratic party presidential hopefuls gathered here today in a bid for Colorado's 16 votes at the party's National Convention in Chicago July 21.

Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia arrived in Denver yesterday and promptly made a "very conservative" claim of 300 votes for the presidential nomination on the first ballot.

Russell was to be followed by Sen. Robert Kerr of Oklahoma, who will share the platform at the Colorado State Democratic Assembly and Convention today.

Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and Averell Harriman, Mutual Security director, will address the Colorado Democrats Saturday during their sessions at nearby Golden.

Russell declined to name states he expects to swing behind him. He did say he would get 52 votes from Texas, 28 from Virginia and 18 from Mississippi, plus others already pledged to him.

The Georgia lawmaker claimed 11 additional votes from North Carolina and predicted some backing from Nevada. Russell said he is counting on some of Colorado's votes.

Russell's schedule today included a breakfast press conference at 10 a.m. (EST), an address to the Colorado Democratic Assembly at 12:45 p.m. and a nation-wide radio appeal at 9:35 p.m.

Gen. Smith Heads Dimes Campaign

Robert J. Smith, Dallas, president of Pioneer Air Lines has been named Texas State Chairman of the 1953 March of Dimes.

The appointment was announced by Basil O'Connor, national president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Smith will succeed Lloyd Gregory, Houston, who served last year.

In accepting the appointment, Smith, who was a brigadier general in the Air Transport Command, pointed out that he welcomed the opportunity because of a long association with the polo work.

J. D. Webb In Special Training

J. D. Webb of Big Spring is one of 48 senior geology students getting field training under a special summer program given by the University of Texas.

The course, which ends July 16, is being given at a field station at College Station, and emphasizes petroleum geology.

Kansas Railroads To Put Embargo On Most Grains

KANSAS CITY (U)—The tremendous floods of Kansas wheat is swamping railroad yards so badly the carriers will slap an embargo on the shipment of most grain at 12:01 a.m. Saturday.

Farmers and elevator operators over the state already are piling wheat on the ground in many places because the hot, dry weather has permitted cutting of the bumper crop faster than it can be hauled away.

The embargo will apply to grain intended for storage in the markets of the metropolitan Kansas City area, St. Joseph, Mo., and these cities in Kansas: Wichita, Hutchinson, Salina, Atchison, Wellington, Arkansas City and Dodge City.

That announcement was made by R. E. Clark, manager of the closed car section of the Association of American Railroads.

He said the embargo would not apply to grain that is to be sold on the cash market, and grain for which previous storage arrangements have been made. In addition, shippers who can obtain storage commitments after the embargo takes effect will be able to move their grain.

Clark said he couldn't guess how long it would take to clear the jam of wheat-filled boxcars so the embargo can be lifted.

Deer Join Drouth To Damage Crops

MALAKOFF, June 27 (U)—The new drouth is giving farmers enough trouble these days. Another problem adds to their worries in this area.

Deer are eating what crops have survived the hot winds. But farmers are allowed to kill deer ruining their crops, although they are not allowed to eat the venison.

Navy Has 7 Planes Superior To MIGs

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of the Navy Kimball says the Navy now has about seven planes coming into production that are better than Russia's highly publicized MIG jet fighter.

The Senate Appropriations Committee made public yesterday this testimony by Kimball at a closed hearing on the Defense Department money bill for the next fiscal year.

Acheson Must Give Solons Explanation

By JACK RUTLEDGE

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Acheson is going to have to do some explaining to Congress about his reported apology to Britain for not telling that country in advance of the American bombing of North Korean power stations.

Sen. Bridges (R-NH) told the Senate yesterday the apology—if made—was "a shocking thing."

And Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.), who brought the matter to the Senate's attention by reading a London news report about it, demanded that a full text of Acheson's remarks be made available to Congress.

Knowland said if Britain wants a bigger voice in the conduct of the Korean War, he would have no objection provided the British assumed a larger share of the burden.

The London account said Acheson reportedly made the apology to about 200 members representing both Houses of Parliament during a 20-minute meeting yesterday.

Acheson was reported to have told them American officials had intended to notify the British defense minister, Field Marshal Lord Alexander, and Selwyn Lloyd, British minister of state for foreign affairs, who arrived in Washington last Saturday.

But, he is reported to have explained, due to a mixup over whether a State or Defense Department official was to make the notification neither was informed.

Further complicating the picture, the State Department said only last Wednesday the British were not informed in advance because the raid was within the scope of military action which could be taken by the United States without consulting its Allies.

The raid occurred Monday. It caused an immediate stir in Labor party circles in the British Parliament, with fears voiced that it might cause the war to spread.

The London report said Acheson justified the raid at length in his talk with the British legislators and was applauded at the end.

But there was no applause for him in the Congress.

In addition to the protests over his reported apology, Sen. Morse (R-Ore) said Acheson should be removed because the State Department was denying passports to American citizens without giving specific reasons, even to inquiring senators.

The manager said normally he closed at 11 p.m., but he ran the movie on until 3 a.m.

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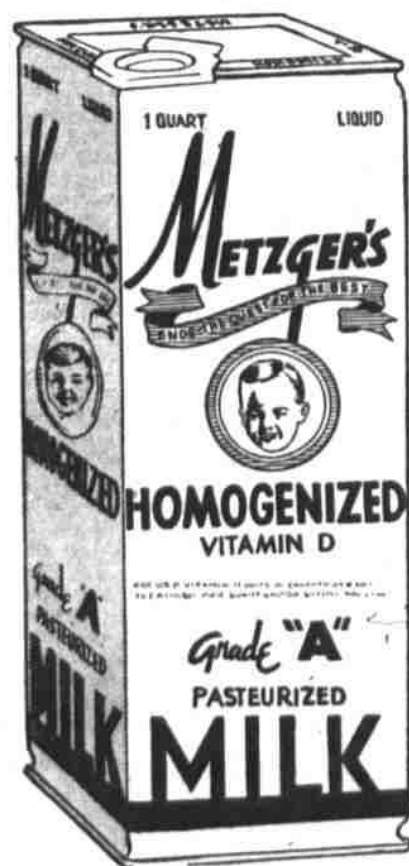
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Ike Is Stepping Up His Campaign Drive

Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, stepping up his campaign for the Republican Presidential nomination, started off on the Democrats as too long in power, and jaded by "complacency, negligence and cynicism."

His speech before an audience of 11,000 in Denver's coliseum Thursday night—radio-broadcast nationwide—was beamed especially at the nation's youth. They are sickened, he said, by "epidemic" corruption in high places but will meet moral issues of the campaign with idealism and energy.

Eisenhower said the United States has handled Russia too gingerly. Less softness, he said, might have prevented the Korean conflict and kept China and Balkan and Baltic states from slipping behind the Iron Curtain.

The speech came almost as an answer to statements earlier in the day by Eisenhower's chief rival for the GOP nomination, Ohio Sen. Robert Taft.

"I am afraid," Taft told a Washington, D. C., news conference, "that Eisenhower's backers would urge him to conduct the kind of campaign that Dewey conducted."

New York Gov. Thomas Dewey's loss to President Truman in 1948 has been blamed on "me-too" tactics which lacked fight. Dewey is working now for Eisenhower's nomination at the GOP July 7 convention at Chicago.

Taft's campaign manager, David Ingalls, said Thursday his man just about has the nomination sewed up anyway. In a statement he

credited Taft with all but three of the 604 delegate votes needed to win.

The Associated Press tabulation—based on statements of avowed and conceded alignments for the first ballot—shows Taft has 482 to Eisenhower's 404, with 129 for others and 191 uncommitted or disputed.

In the Democratic race—the convention at Chicago comes two weeks after the GOP's—there was talk of a stop-Harriman road block being fashioned by Southerners.

According to the report, some backers of Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia have been sounding out the forces of other candidates for Democratic presidential nomination. The idea: hold the line against Mutual Security Administrator Averell Harriman if he should suddenly get the support of President Truman.

Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson generally is conceded the inside track with Truman. The governor, who had been saying he only wants to be re-elected, now evinces a wait-and-see attitude.

Harriman—like Russell and Tennessee Sen. Estes Kefauver—has been rambling the country in search of convention backing. The Associated Press tally now shows Kefauver leading with 245 1/2. Russell has 134, Harriman 99 1/2, Stevenson 50 1/2, others 256 1/2 and 390 are uncommitted or in dispute.

It takes 616 of the 1,230 Democratic delegates—not yet all selected—to be nominated.

Russell and Sen. Robert Kerr of Oklahoma were making bids in Denver Friday for Colorado's 16 votes. They share the state convention platform Friday, to be followed Saturday by Harriman and Kefauver.

Mississippi's States Rights Democrats named an 18-vote delegation Thursday. Technically uninstructed, it will support Russell, who now claims he will have 300 votes when time rolls around.

Kerr backers claim at least eight of the 12 votes put together in New Mexico Thursday. They also are unpledged formally. Kerr said in Seattle he expects to be a compromise winner after a convention deadlock.

Stolen Plane Leaves Italy

FOLIGNO, Italy (AP)—A Yugoslav airliner, hijacked and landed here by three young mechanics "seeking freedom," took off early today for home.

The three Yugoslav refugees—who asked political asylum and said they wanted to go to the United States—remained here.

The other 19 passengers and five crewmen who made the unexpected visit to Italy left with the plane. All said they wished to return to their Communist-ruled homeland.

The three mechanics—Vilim Inkrit, 33, a former pilot in the Yugoslav Air Force, Bogdan Zligic, 25, and Josip Tirkic, 22—seized the plane yesterday as it was on a regular flight from Zagreb to Pola, south of Trieste in Yugoslavia. They whipped out pistols and Inkrit took over the plane's controls while the other two forced the passengers to hold their hands over their heads and guarded the radio operator to prevent transmissions.

Inkrit said he planned to land at Bologna but overshot it. Practically out of gas, he had to bring the plane down here near Perugia, in Central Italy. They landed on an old airfield now planted with grain.

They said they planned their escape for three months because "things are bad" in Yugoslavia.

Edward Kijun, second secretary of the Yugoslav Embassy in Rome, was at the field for the plane's departure today. He refused comment when asked if the Embassy planned any diplomatic action.

Chances Appear Dim For New Playpuses

NEW YORK (AP)—The way Penelope and Cecil are acting, there may never be any duck-billed platypuses born in America.

Bronx Zoo curators have been trying for two years to breed the small aquatic animals from Australia.

Yesterday they gave up for the summer season, but promised one last try in the fall.

Last year the platypuses seemed quite friendly.

But this year Penelope turned up her bill at Cecil's advances by rolling over and over in the water—a sign, said a curator, of platypus annoyance.

Paratore Heads Italian Senate

ROME (AP)—Giuseppe Paratore, white-moustached Sicilian, has been chosen president of the Italian Senate.

The veteran 76-year-old legislator and former minister of post and of finance, replaces Enrico de Nicola, of Naples, who resigned early this month after a deputy accused him of changing the wording of a law after it was passed.

The Senate requested De Nicola to return to his post but he refused.

Farm Land Spread With Weed Killer

WACO, June 27 (AP)—A potent weed killer has been spread mysteriously over 4,000 acres of Bell County farm land, agriculture experts said yesterday.

The poison, 2-4-D, is assumed to have been spread accidentally from a truck traveling along the highway between Hillsboro and Troy. The damaged area extends about 200 yards along the side of the highway.

State Department of Agriculture officials said the condition was reported this week, but an investigation has not been completed.

Protest Made On State Bar Political Poll

CORPUS CHRISTI, June 27 (AP)—A director of the organization says the State Bar of Texas is "grossly unfair" in its poll on judicial races.

Louis D. Gayer in a telegram to Cecil E. Burney, State Bar Association president, asked for an immediate meeting of the bar directors. Director Gayer said he would make a motion at the meeting that bar ballots from counties of residents of candidates be counted separately from others.

Gayer, San Angelo attorney, explained:

"This will enable the public to be informed as to the standing of the candidate at home and how the candidates stand with respect to each other among lawyers not affected by the factor of fellow residence and at the same time will give them the state-wide results."

Gayer claimed candidates from small towns were at disadvantage in the poll when opposed by a candidate from a large city.

He said if the directors do not pass his motion that he would ask that ballots not be opened until "I have the opportunity to present the same motion on the floor of the bar association's convention."

The convention is slated for Houston next week.

Neither of the principals attended the hearing.

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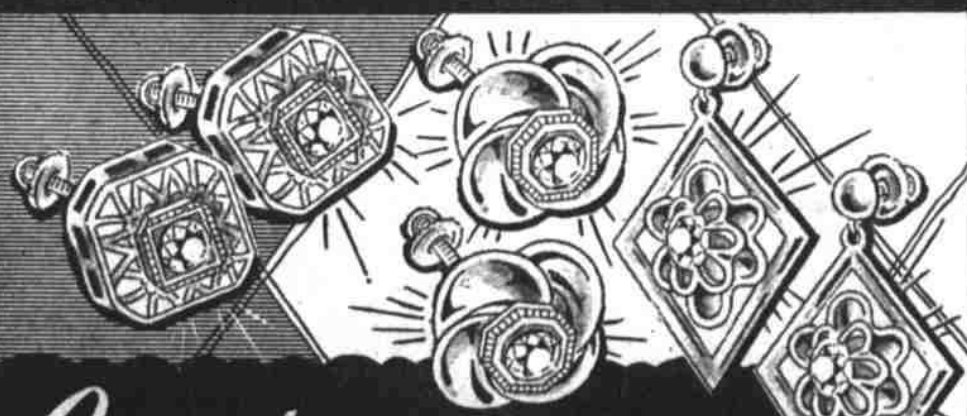
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Christ's New Commandment

THE LORD CHARGED US TO LOVE GOD
AND OUR NEIGHBOR

Scripture—Mark 12:28-34; John 13:34-35; 13:10-14.

IN THE TEN COMMANDMENTS given by Moses to the Israelites by command of God, love is not mentioned. It was commanded that the people have but one God, Jehovah whose name they were not to take in vain.

They were to refrain from work on the sabbath; to honor parents; they were not to kill, steal; commit adultery; bear false witness against their neighbor nor covet his possessions, but the word love was not spoken.

In our last lesson we studied the parable of the rich man to whom worldly goods—the riches of his toil, were to him the most important things in his life; and to take his ease his only ambition.

We often hear people say that they wish they did not have to work, or go to school. They want only "to take it easy." They do not realize that most of the pleasures of life come from work well done; of learning acquired.

"And when Jesus saw that he answered discreetly, He said unto him, Thou art not far from the kingdom of God. And no man after that durst ask Him any question."

For a scribe of the synagogue to have openly declared himself a follower of Jesus would mean his ruin, and we are not told whether this man in his secret soul, believed in the Lord or merely went on his way, admiring His reply.

To love the Lord our God with all our being and to do His will would mean loving all, as God loves us, and trying to get others to do likewise.

Later in that same week, on the day before He was seized, beaten, tried and condemned, Jesus spoke these words to His disciples: "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another."

"By this shall all men know that ye are My disciples, if ye

Best of all, the greatest satisfaction and joy of a full life comes from loving—our parents, brothers and sisters, relatives, friends, and all men, and in doing all in our power to help others. That was what the rich man in the parable missed.

During Holy Week all sorts of people were asking the Lord questions—the Pharisees and Herodians trying to trap Him so that they would have an excuse to seize and destroy Him. As He was answering questions, a scribe asked Him, evidently greatly interested in His words, "Which is the first commandment of all?"

"And Jesus answered him, The first of all the commandments is, Hear, O Israel, The Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and this is the first commandment."

"And the second is like, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. There is none other commandments greater than these."

Greatly moved, the scribe said, "Well, Master, Thou hast said the truth: for there is one God; and there is none other but He:

"And to love Him with all the heart, and with the understanding, and with all the soul, and to love his neighbor as himself, is more than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices."

have love one to another." What would be the reaction when a heated discussion of church members was going on—as sometimes happens—if one member would rise and repeat Christ's words? Just possibly angry voices would be uttered and a sweet reasonableness would control the discussion thereafter, very probably bringing compromise and agreement.

Again Jesus said, "This is My commandment — (not request, suggestion, or even demand, but commandment)—That ye love one another, as I have loved you."

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

"Ye are My friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you."

Jesus laid down His life for His friends—the greatest act a man can perform. We frequently read of persons who do the same, mothers giving their own lives for their children, husbands sacrificing themselves for wife or children, friend for friend or comrades.

But Christ laid down His life, not only for these close friends and associates, but for us all. Surely we should be not only willing, but eager, to obey this new commandment given by Him, to love one another! How many Christian congregations are known to be followers of His because of the love they show for one another?

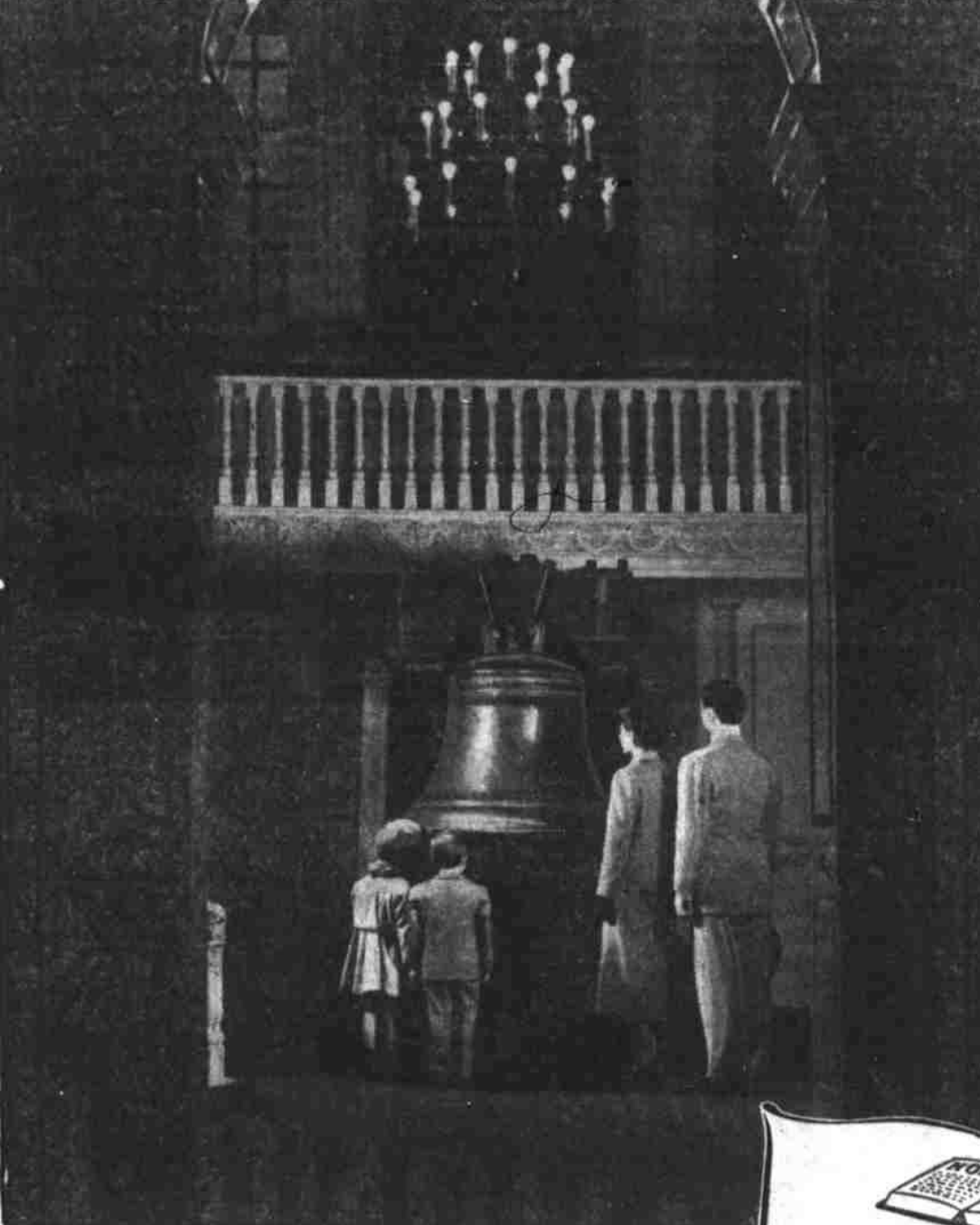

SOUTH STILL SUFFERING

Refreshing Breezes Cool Off East Half Of Nation

By The Associated Press

Refreshing breezes from Canada cooled off some areas in the nation's sunbaked eastern half of the country today. But for millions in the East and South there appeared no quick end of the early summer heat wave.

The death toll from the record breaking hot spell in the last two days mounted to 44. Thousands of persons suffered heat prostrations. The prolonged hot weather in the South increased the threat of severe damage to crops.

Temperatures were generally around the 100-degree mark again yesterday in most of the vast area hit by June's oppressive weather. All-time high records for the date

and for June were topped in many cities.

But the cool air which earlier moved across the Canadian border into the Northern Plains pushed southward yesterday across the Great Lakes region and into parts of Indiana, Illinois and Ohio. Temperatures in the 90s for three days, dropped as much as 20 degrees.

There also was some cooling in parts of New England and Eastern New York State.

The hot and humid belt extended from Southern and Western New England southward along the Atlantic Coast and westward to the Lower Great Lakes region, the Ohio and Middle Mississippi valleys, the Central Plains states and

over the Gulf States.

A storm swept into New England from Canada last night and within minutes temperatures tumbled as much as 20 degrees from record highs which reached 100 degrees during the day.

At the same time, violent thunderstorms hit eastern parts of New York State and cooled off the wilted areas. There were drops in readings from 90 to around 75 in less than 30 minutes.

The cool front may bring relief for some of the Middle Atlantic states today. No 100-degree heat which hit the area yesterday was in prospect. It was 102 at Lock Haven, Pa., yesterday; 100 in Harrisburg and 98 in Philadelphia.

But no relief from the hot and muggy weather appeared immediately for New York City after yesterday's record-breaking June 26 mark of 97. It was a steaming 88 above at 1 o'clock this morning with humidity at 60 per cent.

Thousands swarmed to beaches seeking relief and many Long Island roads were jammed with New York City residents driving home early today. The heat buckled highways in several places, increasing the traffic jam.

New Jersey reported 10 deaths from the effects of the heat in the last two days. It was 102 in Newark yesterday. There were seven heat deaths each in Ohio and Pennsylvania; four each in New York and Massachusetts; three each in Maryland and Tennessee; two in Indiana and one each in Alabama, Georgia, Iowa and South Carolina.

Hospitals in the Washington D.C. area reported 183 persons had been treated for heat prostration in the last two days. The number included 13 firemen who were overcome fighting a warehouse fire in 101-degree weather yesterday.

Thirty-five soldiers at Camp Gordon, Augusta, Ga., were treated at the post hospital yesterday for heat prostration. The mercury climbed to a sizzling 107 yesterday, one of the highest readings in the country.

Miami reported a high of 89 as compared with a record of 91 for June 26. But readings above 100 were general in the Deep South. It was a record 100 in Jacksonville and 98 in Tampa.

Other top marks in the South included 108 in Birmingham, S.C.; 102 in Richmond; 100 in Nashville.

St. Louis continued to swelter, with a high of 99, the same reading reported in Kansas City.

Fine Getting Closer To Eisenhower View

HARRISBURG, Pa. (U. S. — Gov. John S. Fine of Pennsylvania says he formerly was "inclined to be against" Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower but now he is "getting closer and closer" to the views of the Republican presidential aspirant.

Fine, in a radio interview yesterday, still refused to say who he favors for the GOP presidential nomination. He has indicated he will make his choice known before convention time.

"Until Eisenhower's return from Europe, and until he answered a number of questions and made some speeches," Fine said, "I was inclined to be against him. I felt he might be in favor of a program in Europe which would continue the tremendous expenditures we've been making."

"Since his return I have lessened that chasm of thought because of what he said. Let me say I'm getting closer and closer to Eisenhower."

The governor refused to say this means he's drawing away from Sen. Robert A. Taft.

An Associated Press poll made this week of Pennsylvania's 70-vote delegation to the convention shows 32 delegates favor Eisenhower, 24 lean towards Taft while 14 remain undecided or unwilling to express an opinion. Gov. Fine is generally credited being able to guide the votes of some 32 delegates.

Fine said he believed the more conservative Republicans are for Taft while "those who might be described as belonging to the progressive group" of the party favor Eisenhower.

"Although I am a regular or-

ganization man I believe I have been aligned with the policies of the independent thinkers of the party. I would say that more of the independent thinkers are for Eisenhower than for Taft."

In the course of the broadcast Fine denied that a "feud" exists between him and Sen. James H. Duff (R-Pa.), one of Eisenhower's staunchest supporters.

"There's absolutely no foundation at all for that sort of talk," Fine said. "We're very friendly, although of course, I don't approve of some of the things he's done, and he doesn't approve of some of the things I have done."

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Jury Probing Lattimore Tip

SEATTLE (U. S. — A federal grand jury, working behind closed doors, was due to begin probing today into the motives back of a Seattle man's false tip on Owen Lattimore.

The tip, given to the Central Intelligence Agency and passed on to the State Department, was that Lattimore planned a trip to Russia.

It caused the State Department to clamp a travel ban on the Johns Hopkins University professor and Far Eastern expert who has been a target of Sen. McCarthy's (R-Wis.) accusations of Communist influence within the department.

Lattimore has denied any Communist attachments or that he intended making such a trip.

The Seattle Times, which first reported a Seattle man was the source of the tip, said yesterday the false informant was an employee of a travel agency here. His name was not disclosed.

The man is not in custody, but may be called before the grand jury.

Attlee 'Crashes' Committee Meet

LONDON (U. S. — Conservative Parliament members were holding their usual weekly secret strategy conference in a House of Commons committee room.

Suddenly the door opened and a slight figure, head bowed in thought, walked in, stepped on the platform and made for the chairman's seat.

Shouts from the astonished Conservatives woke the intruder from his reverie. Labor party leader Clement Attlee beat a hasty retreat.

Attlee, en route to a similar meeting of his own party in a nearby room, had opened the wrong door by mistake.

The story of the incident, which occurred Wednesday, leaked out today.

Lightning Ignites Oil Storage Tank

Big Spring firemen extinguished what could have been a 1,000-barrel oil fire about five miles north of Vealmoor on the Seaboard-Tom Good lease Thursday morning.

The fire, started from a lightning bolt Wednesday night was in a gas vent at the top of an oil storage tank. It caused no damage.

Workmen in the field attempted to put out the blaze with carbon dioxide extinguishers before summoning the fire fighters. Firemen cooled the vent pipe with water, then extinguished the fire with chemicals.

Fire Capt. A. D. Meador said five of the 1,000-barrel tanks were connected for storage in the area, although only two were full of oil.

Casualties Listed

WASHINGTON (U. S. — The Defense Department today identified 32 Korean War casualties. A new list reported nine killed, 20 wounded, one missing and two injured.

Jury Says Child's Death Was Due To Natural Causes

PHILIPPI, W. Va. (U. S. — A coroner's jury ruled last night that 3-year-old Gary Randall Bolger died of natural causes.

George Washington Bolger, the boy's father, whom police had held on an open charge, was released after the inquest verdict.

When his son died Wednesday night, police said Bolger told them he accidentally hit the boy in the chest with a heavy boot, thrown at his wife during a quarrel.

The jury said tonight, after hearing Dr. S. D. Wu report on an autopsy he performed at the request of Coroner Michael Stump, that the boot did not strike the child.

Dr. Wu said the child had a heart ailment and there was no indication of any bruise or blow on the body. He said he believed the boy's condition was such that he would not have lived long regardless.

Police Chief James Paugh said the father had believed he hit his son but evidently the boot struck a couch on which the boy was sitting.

Kerr Thinks He To Be Second Choice

SEATTLE (U. S. — Sen. Kerr (D-Okla.) said yesterday he expects to win the Democratic presidential nomination as a "second choice" after a deadlock develops at the National Convention.

He told a group of party leaders at his one-day stop here that the Democratic nominee will have an easier time because "on the other side Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) and Dwight D. Eisenhower are killing each other off."

Kerr said he did not believe the people of this country would support any retreat toward isolationism.

Snowplow Bids Are In At 103 Degrees

RICHMOND, Va. (U. S. — The temperature reached 103 degrees in Richmond yesterday but officials of the State Highway Department weren't given the day off. They were very busy studying bids on snowplows.

Girl Electrocuted

WEYMOUTH, Mass. (U. S. — Three-year-old Linda Pekkanen was electrocuted yesterday when her perspiration-soaked body became wedged between a short-circuited floor lamp and a metal radiator. She was chasing her pet kitten in the living room of her home.

In line with market prices around the country, livestock prices were down at the Big Spring Livestock Auction Company's sale Wednesday.

Thin graded cattle were cheaper by \$2 to \$3 cwt. Butcher cattle remained steadier than any other line.

Butcher bulls sold for \$23.50, butcher cows up to 20.00, canners and cutters from 10.00 to 16.00 and fat butcher yearlings from 29.00 to 33.00.

Heavy fat butcher cattle sold for 30.00 to 31.50, stocker steer calves up to 36.00, heifer calves to 26.00, cows besides calves for 14.00 to 19.00 and hogs from 19.00 to 19.50.

The run was estimated at 900 cattle and 75 hogs.

Mother, Son Killed By Lightning Bolt

NAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (U. S. — A mother and her 6-year-old son were killed by lightning yesterday while they were washing an auto.

Witnesses said Mrs. Ocie Mae Bryant, 31, and her son James, were washing the family auto in their back yard when the bolt struck the car. There was no rain falling at the time, but a series of thunderstorms moved into the area later.

Elmer Finally Gets On Plane

ALBUQUERQUE (U. S. — Elmer, the horned toad, was just a lounge lizard on a luxurious airliner today, getting around a law which for a week has kept him from Massachusetts.

It all started when some West Newton Mass., third graders asked for a real New Mexico horned toad. New Mexico picked Elmer. But someone dug up a law forbidding shipment of horned toads from the state.

Yesterday, Massachusetts Gov. Paul Dever conferred with New Mexico Gov. Edwin Mechem, with Dever inquiring mostly about Elmer's ancestry.

Elmer was incensed. After all, he's a genus phrynosoma (horned toad), which is more than the Cabots and Lodges can say. That satisfied Dever, and an attorney general's opinion that no horned toad has ever been prosecuted for jumping the border satisfied Mechem.

There was one gimmick: Elmer had to have a traveling companion. Beautiful airline hostess Jean Adams filled the bill nicely. They took off last night.

HCJC Gets Inquiry About Foreign Student Facilities

Howard County Junior College has no foreign student scholarship aids, but it would be interested in students from other countries.

This is the crux of a reply by B. M. Keese, dean-registrar of HCJC and its acting administrator, to James J. Passarelli, executive director of the Iran-America Society.

Passarelli had written from Tehran, Iran asking about the admission of foreign students, whether any sort of aid was available, an approximate on living costs, whether special help would be

available at first to overcome lack of familiarity with the English language.

The Iran-America Society is the agency through which Iranian students who are interested in studying in the United States must channel their applications. It is a cultural unit designed to strengthen the friendly relations of the two countries.

Keese sent the HCJC catalogue together with admission forms. He explained that there is no scholarship specifically for foreign students at this time. However, there are some scholarships in individual courses in languages and speech.

He estimated that living expenses would be at least \$100 a month for such a student. The possibility of securing part-time employment to help a visiting student was complicated by a U.S. ruling which precludes gainful employment of those who are in the country on student visas.

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Post-Season Ban Halted By Court
FORT WORTH, June 27 (U) — An attempt by the University of Texas Interscholastic League to ban post-season high school all-star games was thwarted by the Second Court of Civil Appeals today.

The Court affirmed a permanent injunction granted by the Western District Court at Fort Worth restraining the league from enforcing a rule prohibiting participation of high school students and personnel and use of school equipment and facilities in post-season games.

The court's opinion, written by Chief Justice Earl P. Hall, held that the league is a voluntary organization, not sanctioned by statute, and is without authority to enforce the restraining provisions of the rule.

"If the league's motive in striving to stamp out all-star football games such as the Old Bowl game at Wichita Falls is for the best benefit of the school the same may be controlled by statute," Hall wrote.

Guy Bush Recalls Ruth's Last Home Run Of Career

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (U) — Guy Bush remembers only too well the 714th and last home run the late Babe Ruth hit in baseball's major leagues.

Bush was the pitcher who served up that circuit clout, and he explained during a recent visit here that "the last time I saw the ball, it looked like a marble."

The date was Mar. 24, 1935, at Forbes Field in Pittsburgh. Bush was hurrying for Pittsburgh while Ruth—virtually at the end of his record-setting career—was outfielding for the Boston Braves.

Ruth cracked three homers that day in what proved to be his own flamboyant farewell. The first one was off Red Lucas. But it was that last one which etched itself in Bush's memory.

"The ball sailed high over the upper deck in right field, and I guess it must have rolled for miles," said the former major leaguer who now manages the Battle Creek, Mich., Belles of the American Girls League.

He could have added that it was the first time anyone ever had driven a ball out of Forbes Field at that spot. The feat was not duplicated for another 15 years.

Shortly after that big May 24, Ruth quit as a player. The very next day, in Cincinnati, he went down on strikes three times and popped up once in the face of St. Johnson's low, slow curves.

The 49-year-old Bush, who hurled for 14 years for the Chicago Cubs in addition to serving Pittsburgh, the Boston Braves, the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati, loves to recall his experiences.

But on a stop here with the Battle Creek Belles, the conversation returned again and again to Ruth's last homer.

Bush always has felt that there was something distinctive about being the pitcher who served up the last "fat" one to the game's greatest slugger. It was number 714 in the Bambino's career.

Sal The Barber Cools Off Torrid Brooklyn Dodgers

Even on the hottest day of the year, Sal Maglie is "Mr. Zero" to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Joey Maxim cools off on watermelon. City kids romp beside an open hydrant. But those Dodgers get the chills in 93-degree weather when The Barber stops his razor.

These have been rough days for the 35-year-old "Barber" of the Polo Grounds. Since he last fended a Brooklyn batter with loving care, May 27, he hadn't won a game. In fact he was knocked out five straight starts and even bounced once on relief.

With the tender solicitude of a father greeting a long-lost son, he welcomed the visiting Dodgers last night at the Polo Grounds by chilling them without a hit for six innings. Maglie finally wound up with a three-hitter, 3-0, that boosted the New York Giants within three games of Brooklyn.

This is no sudden thing—this deep love of Sal for his Brooklyn clients. It dates way back to the Mexican War—baseball war, that is—when he scurried south of the border for more dough. Since his return to the majors, Maglie boasts a 12-1 record over the enragated Dodgers. The only time they beat him was in April of 1951 during the Giants' 11-game losing streak. It took a 10th inning homer by Carl Furillo to do the trick.

In winning his seventh in a row over the Dodgers, three this year and four in the last part of the '51 season, Maglie ran his string to 27 consecutive shutout innings against the boys from Brooklyn.

So far this season the Dodgers haven't scored a run off Sal. Maglie, of course, was much too smart to attribute his sudden return to form to the sight of a Brooklyn uniform.

"I made up my mind to just throw that ball with a good follow through," he said in the clubhouse. Big globs of sweat dripped down his face. "I just decided to throw hard as long as I could and let them hit it. Then we'd see what happened."

What happened was mostly nothing. He threw only 45 pitches in the first six innings as he worked on a no-hitter. Jackie Robinson finally broke the spell with a lead-off single in the seventh. Billy Cox and foy Campanella added singles in the ninth but they didn't present a threat because Robinson grounded into a double play between the hits.

When the statisticians told Maglie he threw only 85 pitches, he wasn't surprised. That was the kind of game he hoped to pitch.

"The fewer pitches the better off you are on a hot night like this," he said. "Now I'm out of the slump. Everything is going to be all right."

It was the third straight time Manager Charlie Dressen over-matched Rookie Ben Wade by tossing him into a main event with Maglie. Wade has grounds for complaint because nobody got him a run yet in the three duels.

Wade gave up all three runs, two in the first on a triple by Bob Elliott following Dave Williams' double and Hank Thompson's single. Elliott, Monte Irvin's replacement, also drove home the final run with a tremendous fly to Duke Snider near the bleachers in left center following Hank Thompson's

triple in the third.

That was the only game in the National League and there was only one in the Americans as the teams traveled.

Vic Wertz hit a tremendous first-inning home run with two men on to start Detroit on the way to a 6-0 win over the St. Louis Browns. The ball landed on the pavilion roof in right center, well beyond the 405-foot mark.

Bill Wright, ex-Red Sox, made his first Detroit win a stylish six-hit shutout. Only one man got as far as second base as he outpitched Ned Garver.

First Things Come First, Banker Reminds Fisherman

AUSTIN.—First things come first, even in fishing. That's what I found over in East Texas during the past week, fishing with Tom Baker, Nacogdoches banker and president of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

We were on an ideal little lake between Nacogdoches and Lufkin. I always like to fish brushy spots, and put my Dynamite top water right among a bunch of dead limbs from a fallen pine tree. I had read in a book that such a spot was ideal for a black bass.

With the plug bobbing about I expressed wonder about what I would do if a bass should take it. It was then Baker gave out his philosophy.

"Always take the first things first," he said. "First you have to get a strike. When you get a strike you want to be sure the bass has taken the plug. Then for your third step, you set the hook. After the hook is set, then you can worry about getting out of the brush. In that way you never have but one worry at a time. Most any man can stand up under just one worry, but when you worry about a lot of things, then not even fishing can settle your nerves."

I tried it, but it was awfully hard to concentrate on just one worry, when you put a plug into a tree top in good bass water, especially where there are some bass that are supposed to be in excess of six pounds. I didn't get one of those since, but found several of about the right size to suit me—especially

when fishing in the brush. I've fished ranch ponds in West Texas and farm ponds in East Texas. Each has its own especially spot in my affection. But I'd take either one, sight unseen. And I'll probably keep on worrying about more than one thing at a time. For instance right now I am thinking of two other places where I'd like to fish. Why can't I quit worrying and settle on one?

Incidentally, in the past two weeks I've seen a lot of fishing water throughout Texas. So much in fact, I am beginning to wonder why anyone would ever want to leave Texas for fishing, except for trout. And personally I'd just as soon get a nice black bass, or even a Gulf trout as any mountain trout I ever saw.

The surface water inventory, meaning more fishing places, has increased many fold in the last several years. In some parts of the state the lakes are now, but right not throughout all of East Texas, all the way from Texoma on the Red River to Dan B on the Neches, the lakes are pretty well filled. Perhaps some day it will rain again in West Texas.

Sidney Dobbins, manager of the Waco Chamber of Commerce, and his friend Virgil Walker last week went to Arkansas, where they heard there were some big bass hitting. It was a field day for Sidney and in the first afternoon he took five bass ranging from three to 5½ pounds in weight. He used Dipsey Doodle, made in Arkansas. In the two days he and Walker got as many fish as they had expected to get in a week, and came home.

Lepard Seeking Olympics Berth

Leon Lepard, state high school 880 champ from Big Spring and middle-distance ace at Abilene Christian College three years, bids

for a position on the United States Olympic team tonight in the Olympic trials in Los Angeles.

Athletes qualified for the trials by placing in the military championships, the national collegiate meet, and the national Amateur Athletic Union championship.

Lepard earned a place by winning the Armed Forces 800-meter May 31 and tonight will be out to sack up one of the first three places in the event. The first three in each event will represent the U. S. in the Olympic games in Helsinki, Finland, in July.

He also finished fifth in the national AAU.

Running in Lepard's preliminary heat tonight will be Ted Wheeler of Iowa, Lon Spurrier of California, Reggie Pearman, Stacy Siders and Don Gehman. Pearman won the national AAU 800 meters last Saturday.

From this six-man heat, four will advance to the finals—also to be run tonight.

Lepard was drafted in October before finishing his fourth season with ACC. During his junior year, Lepard won the 880 at the National Association of Intercollegiate Track meet in Hutchinson, Kas., and fourth in the NCAA meet. He also anchored the famed ACC mile relay to an undefeated season.

Kefauver Addresses Jaycee Convention

DALLAS, June 27 (AP)—Convening Jaycees heard Senator Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) in a speech before a gigantic luncheon today and continued the super horseplay which has shook Dallas for four straight days.

Kefauver spoke before a luncheon crowd that jammed the 85,000-square-foot Automobile Building on the Texas State Fair Grounds. He thus put himself at the mercy of 6,000 hilarious celebrants who yesterday heard President Assistant John R. Steelman.

Steelman left for a Mexico City rest soon after completing his speech.

Only occasionally as Steelman spoke did a Jaycee raise his .45 caliber pistol and fire a volley of blanks.

Earlier, downtown Dallas had rocked to the "Parade of States," one of the high spots of the 32nd annual convention of the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. Parading Jaycees and the thousands of spectators that lined the streets joined in the high jinks as the 52-block-long spectacle was unveiled.

Today, two of the candidates for Jaycee president—Horace E. Hunk Henderson of Williamsburg, Va., and Douglas L. Hoge, Cincinnati, O., were to meet in a Western style pistol fight. Everybody hoped they would use blanks.

Most of the demonstrators at the auto building yesterday joined the parade for Henderson. Only Ohio and Mississippi delegates demonstrated for Hoge. Henderson, slight and blond, was to step out of the Adolphus Hotel today at the same time Hoge, husky and bespectacled, was to step out of the Baker, on the opposite corner of the roped-off street.

Winner of the duel will be the one who, according to a sound meter, gets off the most shots.

Yesterday, Oklahoma Governor Johnston Murray took one look at a horse picked out for him to ride in the parade. "No," he shouted. "What rodeo did you steal that horse from?" He rode in a convertible.

Chairman R. W. Kemler of Marshalltown, Ia., asked Jaycees to "let's not fire our pistols while Senator Kefauver is speaking to us. Not in the building here, anyway."

The Senator was to arrive here at 10:30 a.m., CST, make his luncheon speech after meeting the Jaycees in the Adolphus Hotel, and then meet with Democratic Party delegates from 2 to 2:30 p.m. A press conference was scheduled for mid-afternoon and Kefauver's departure was to come soon after.

Beckworth Due To Campaign Here Saturday

Lindley Beckworth is scheduled to bring his U. S. Senate campaign to Big Spring on Saturday afternoon.

His itinerary calls for a stop here at 4 p.m. at which time he will speak on the east side of the Courthouse block.

Beckworth, who is now Congressman from the Third District of Texas, visited here briefly several weeks ago, but he did not have a speech scheduled at that time.

In all, he has covered over 225 counties in the state during his campaign and he usually makes at least half a dozen speeches per day.

Before arriving in Big Spring Saturday he will speak in Pecos, Monahans, Odessa and Midland, and then will go from here to appearances in Colorado City, Sweetwater and Roby.

Beckworth, 38, has been in Congress since 1938. When first elected from the Third District he was the youngest member of the House.

Taxi Rates Going Higher In New York

NEW YORK (AP)—New Yorkers will start paying more for taxicab rides as soon as Mayor Vincent J. Impellitteri signs a bill approved yesterday by the city Board of Estimate.

Cab prices will jump from the present 35-cent fare for the first mile to 45 cents, with each successive mile boosted from 20 to 25 cents.

Deserter Being Held In Jail At Crockett

CROCKETT, June 27 (AP)—Wilbur Crenshaw, 46-year-old farm worker who deserted the Army nine years ago because he disliked a lieutenant, was in jail here today waiting to be picked up by the FBI.

Crenshaw—who admits he's illiterate—said he left the Army because the young officer called him "an ignorant s.o.b."

He never went back, although he started to 17 times after he walked away from a Rockford, Ill., bus station one night in 1943.

Each time he thought he'd return to Camp Grant, near Rockford, he thought about the lieutenant. "I knew I couldn't face that lieutenant again," he said.

"If I saw him, I knew I would have to climb him. And if I did that I knew I'd get life," Crenshaw told a newsman after Houston County Sheriff Loyd Lovell, a boyhood friend, arrested him yesterday.

Since he deserted, Crenshaw said, he worked on farms in Texas, California and Arkansas. Many times he returned to his home, Crockett, but no one ever asked and he never told how he left the wartime service.

After he was gone only 28 days he returned to the camp, got up to the gate, but lost courage to face the lieutenant, he said. He made 16 more trips to the camp—some of them after the war was over.

Each time, he said, his courage failed him.

Crenshaw said he felt relieved to be in jail and "was sure glad Loyd saw me."

"I hope wherever they send me I can go to school," he added.

And about that lieutenant, he said: "I don't know his name, I know he's from New Jersey though, 'cause he kept talking about Mottie."

Politics Frank In Philippines

MANILA (AP)—Politics, Filipino style, has a flavor of disarming frankness.

The House last night voted a \$45 million public works bill. President Elpidio Quirino, the House speaker and Senate president each were granted \$500,000 to allot as they see fit. Each congressman and senator was given a \$125,000 slice to spend in their respective districts.

No one quite knows where the money is coming from. They do know that this is a year when the President, all congressmen and nine senators must stand for reelection.

WAVE Almost Gets Duty On Carrier

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—The report-for-duty order at the Norfolk Naval Air Station seemed routine enough, but when "White, D." appeared, it was obvious something was wrong.

"D" stood for Dorothy—and a pretty Wave isn't the sort of thing the Navy usually quarters in the forecastle of an aircraft carrier.

A typist along the line had left out the designation "W" for Wave. Miss White's orders were hastily changed.
