LACY TERRELL... and Hoe

A BETTER HOE—"Build a better mouse trap and the world will beat a path to your door." That may not be the exact quotation, but it's close.

Lacy Terrell, who operates a welding and machinery repair shop at County Line, 10 miles west of Abernathy, did not build a better mouse trap, and the world may not beat a path to his door, but he did make a better weed-chopping hoe.

Necessity was "the mother of

invention" in this case. One day several months ago, Terrell found himself in need of a weed-chopping hoe, and he couldn't find one, so he decided to make one. Using metal from a cross-cut saw he had brought from Arkansas years before, Lacy made the "pilot" model of the improved product he is holding in this picture.

Since then he has made and sold many of the improved hoes to farmers in the County Line area. Lacy sold one to a man in Lubbock, and the next time he saw him, he wanted eight more.

On a trip to his former hometown, Mena, Ark., a service station man saw one of the hoes in Lacy's car. Showing it to another Mena man, the station attendant jokingly said "Here's a man looking for a place to build a hoe factory." "If he'll put the factory here I'll take a \$1,000 stock," the Mena native replied.

Lacy makes the hoes in three different weights, and sells them for \$2.25, which is about the price of factory-made hoes. (Staff Photo.)

Hale County Records 153 Rural Accidents In 1960

Hale County's auto accidents during 1960 were slightly below the figures for 1959 accidents, deaths and injuries, with December a rather high month in statistics.

In December the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 18 rural traffic accidents in this county. These wrecks accounted for one person killed, eight injured and a property damage of \$10,175.00.

For the entire year of 1960 in this county there were 153 accidents accounting for five persons killed, 92 injured and a property damage of \$82,980.00.

In 1959 there were 156 accidents accounting for six persons killed, 128 injured and property damage of \$108,449.00.

"The Texas Department of Public Safety closed its Operation Death-Watch period of ten days at midnight January 1, 1961 with 83 traffic deaths as compared to 97 during the holidays the year before. Progress Report On Building Work Given at Board Meet

An up-to-date report on the progress being made on the construction of new school buildings and facilities was given during the School Board meeting Monday night, January 9, stated Noel Johnson, school superintendent. It

was stated that the general contractor, A. P. Kasch and Sons of Big Spring, has finished except for refurbishing the old cafeteria into dressing rooms for the Junior High boys, and into a warehouse (for central receiving point), and renovating the old dressing rooms under the bleachers of the old gym. They will be used by the Junior High girls athletic squads.

The new Primary building will be occupied Monday, it was stated. At that time all buildings will have been occupied, but none have yet been officially accepted. None will be officially accepted until all construction work has been completed, school officials announced.

Atmar Atkinson, architect, met with the School Board at the last meeting, and also gave a current report on the progress being made on the construction of the buildings.

Open House Set

In other business at the meeting, the School Board set Sunday, March 5, as the date for Formal Open House for all the school facilities. Open House will be observed from 2 p. m. until 5 p. m. on that date. It was pointed out that that day is the beginning of Texas Public Schools Week.

In other action at the last meeting, the school board members approved tentative plans for developing the Primary playground site purchased from the Church of the Nazarene. Additional playground equipment will be purchased to equip this area and another playground area west of the new building.

The Primary playground area on the site where the old Nazarene Church building was located is protected on the north by the Intermediate building, and on the west by the new Primary building.

To Be Fenced

Superintendent Johnson stated that the street sides of the playground areas will be fenced to insure the safety of the children from the street areas.

Lubbock Woman To Speak Here

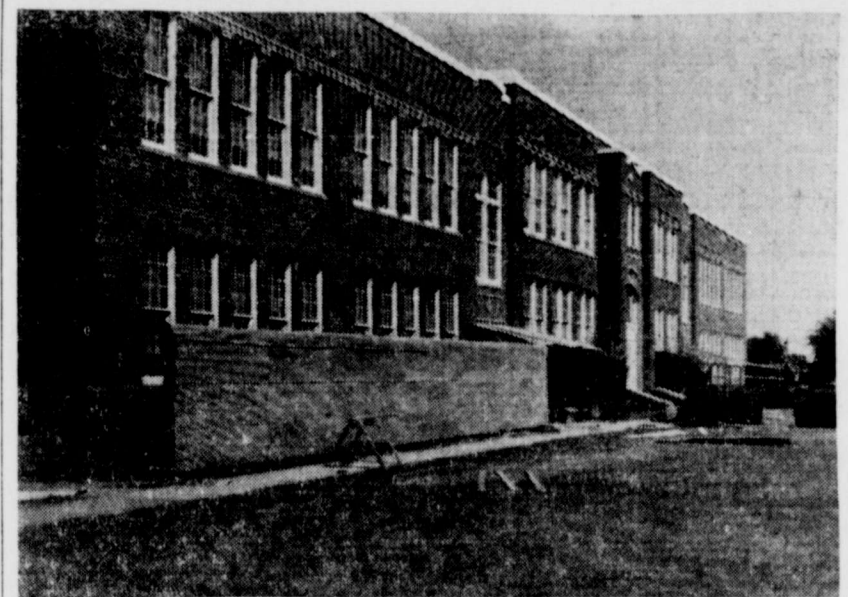
Mrs. Ernest Whatley, Lubbock, will be the speaker at the January 30th meeting of the Fellowship of Christian Women.

Building To Be Demolished Soon

The School Board met in a special session Monday night, January 16, for the purpose of accepting bid proposals for the tearing down of the old red grade school building. Only portion of the old structure to be left will be the old gym and old cafeteria (the latter being refurbished into dressing rooms and warehouse area).

The School Board has been negotiating with several salvage firms for the demolition of the old building.

It was stated that experiences of other schools have shown that unoccupied school buildings to be demolished present a hazard, and it is the thinking of the Abernathy School Board that a restraining fence should be constructed, immediately, around the portion to be taken down.

New Cafeteria Now In Use

The new cafeteria was occupied over the weekend and the first meal was served to the students Monday, stated Noel Johnson, superintendent of the schools. Between 500 and 600 students was averaged per day during the lunch hour at the old cafeteria. Monday, 810 students were served in the new cafeteria, it was reported.

It was stated that the students were served fried chicken in the old cafeteria Friday, and hot dogs in the new cafeteria on Monday. The new cafeteria has not officially been accepted. None of the buildings will be officially accepted until all construction work has been completed, it was announced.

The new cafeteria, which features an all-electric kitchen, is entirely modern throughout. Equipment for the kitchen was purchased from the El Paso Hotel Supply, of El Paso.

From the Old To the New

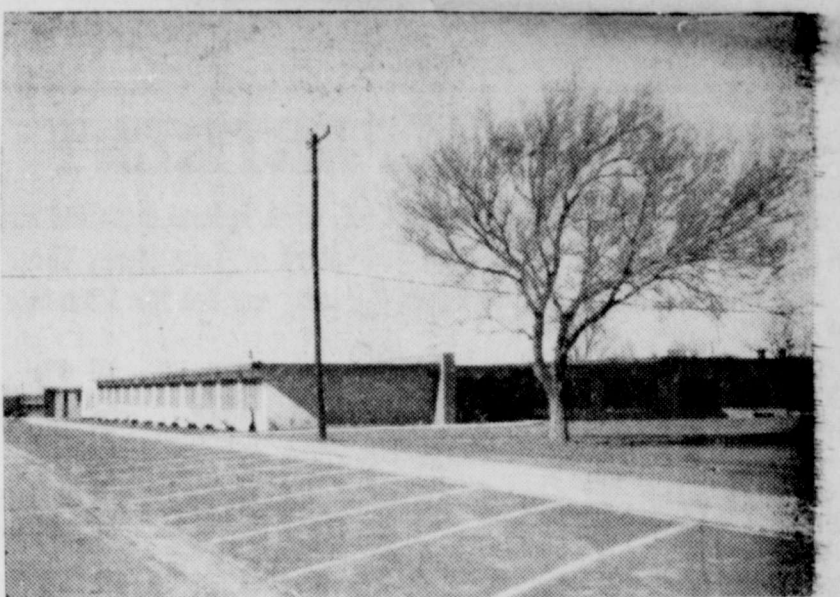

Research Foundation**

Dr. Tom C. Longnecker, Director of the High Plains Research Foundation, was on an Agronomy panel discussion of fertilizer usage at the annual meeting of the Agricultural Ammonia Institute in Memphis, Tennessee, January 11th and 12th.

A report on the 1960 research on Flame Cultivation was presented by Dr. Tom C. Longnecker, Director of the High Plains Research Foundation, at the Texas Butane Dealers Association's annual meeting in San Antonio, on January 13th and 14th.

The first complete year of research in the elimination of weeds by flame cultivation was conducted at the Foundation in 1960. Flame research was done on cotton, grain sorghum, corn, castorbeans, soybeans, onions and potatoes during the year.

This research program is continuing in the lower Rio Grande Valley by the Foundation during December 1960, and during January and February, 1961. It is being directed by Dale Price, Agricultural Engineer of the Foundation. In addition to continued research on grain sorghum and cotton, a number of vegetables are being included. Two years' research in one is made possible by this program.

Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist, and Paul M. Belcher, Laboratory Technician for the High Plains Research Foundation represented the Foundation at the annual meeting of the Certified Seed Growers of Texas at Dallas from January 5th to the 7th. They participated in the variety testing programs on cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans and corn.

**FARMERS AND RANCHMEN
PARTICIPATE IN GREAT
PLAINS CONSERVATION PLANS**

College Station—More than 2,000 farmers and ranchers in 352 counties in the 10 Great Plains States made contracts with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to develop soil and water conservation plans for their lands during the fiscal year of 1960. These contracts covered more than 5½ million acres, the USDA said.

This brought the number of plans and contracts to almost 4,900 covering over 13 million acres at the end of the fiscal year. An additional 3,084 applications covering nearly 2 million acres, had been filed at year's end.

The program is designed to speed-up soil and water conservation measures, through a complete farm or ranch plan of operations, that will bring about a greater degree of agricultural stability in the Great Plains where drought, high winds, blizzards, hail and rains are not infrequent. It applies to designated counties in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming.

Lynn Pittard, soil and water conservation specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that currently, 915 farmers and/or ranchmen in 85 Texas counties have applications on file and that active contracts total 2,157. These contracts cover approximately 4.1 million acres, Pittard said.

Included in the contracts and plans, developed with assistance from the Soil Conservation Service are such practices as converting cropland to grass, planned range reseeding and many other permanent-type conservation practices.

In carrying out their conservation plans, under contracts ranging from 3 to 10 years, participants establish one or more of 24 practices eligible for cost sharing, Pittard said.

The Great Plains Conservation Program, Public Law 1121, became law August 7, 1956. First contracts and plans were signed in December 1957.

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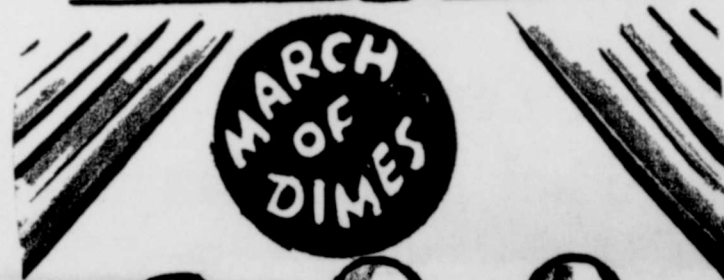

"For this man was counted worthy of more glory than Moses, inasmuch as he who builded the house hath more honor than the house. For every house is builded by some man; but he that built all things is God. And Moses verily was faithful in all his house as a servant..." (Heb. 3:1-6)

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas' 57th Legislature began on a note that's likely to continue for some time—difficulty over money.

Many House members felt their colleagues had made an awkward start in an awkward situation when they voted themselves salary raises as the first item of business. House voted 97-to-45 to put into effect the \$4,800 a year legislative salaries made possible when the people approved a constitutional amendment last November.

Objectors were quick to point out that (1) the state general revenue fund was at that moment \$85,249,931 in the red and (2) many lawmakers campaigned on an "economy in government" platform.

Rep. Raymond Bartram of New Braunfels said he felt the people would rather legislators take care of teacher salary raises and medical assistance for the aged before spending extra money on themselves.

H. B. 1, the legislative salary and expense bill, would divert some \$2,600,000 from the cigarette tax and drivers license funds. Money had to be "found," since the general revenue fund, as fast as it comes in, has to pay the state's "hot checks."

Down the road are even more fireworks as the legislature searches for \$200,000,000-plus to take care of the wants of other state agencies and services.

TURMAN SPEAKER—Farmers and teachers have one of their own in one of the most important of state offices.

Rep. James Turman of Gober was elected Speaker of the House by a vote of 83-to-66. Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen, whose support was largely from conservative House members, was the losing candidate.

Turman and his family operate a 103-acre farm in Fannin County. He is a former grade school teacher and worked his way to a doctor of philosophy degree in education. For a time he was assistant to the president of Texas Women's University at Denton.

As Speaker, Turman's first big job is appointing House committees, due to go into action about January 23. By his elections, he can influence to a considerable degree how certain legislation will be handled.

SENATOR ROBERTS HONOR—ED-Sen. Ray Roberts of McKinney is president pro tempore of the Senate for the present session.

His job, largely honorary, is to preside over the Senate in the absence of the lieutenant governor. Also, he is second in line of succession to the governorship. By tradition, during each president pro tem's term, the governor or lieutenant governor leave the state so the senate president can serve as "governor for a day."

Senator Roberts, a World War II Naval hero, is a farmer and realtor.

GRIST FOR THE MILL—Texas Legislative Council, an influential joint House-Senate study group, will offer a mass of proposals for new legislation.

Among recommendations:
1. Some streamlining, but not a wholesale re-writing of the state constitution. This will be a disappointment to groups working for steps toward a new constitutional convention.

2. Limitations on the annexation powers of cities and towns.
3. Increased facilities for juvenile guidance and care, including a home for dependent Negro children, facilities for mentally ill juveniles and regional training centers for delinquent youths.

4. Higher minimum coverage requirements for automobile insurance. Present minimum is \$5,000. A raise to \$10,000 or \$20,000 was suggested.

Another study group, a special Senate committee, recommended

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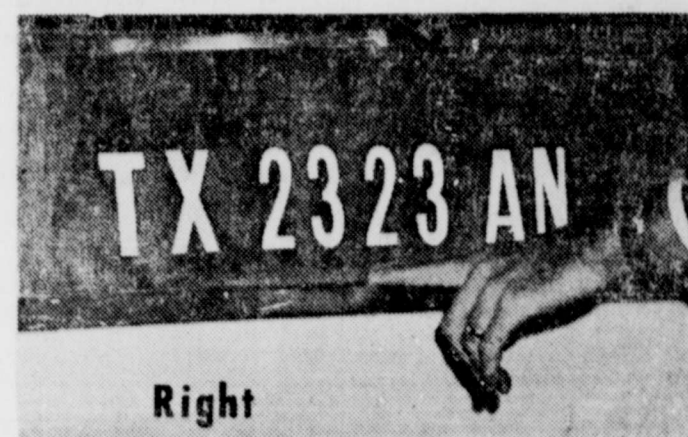
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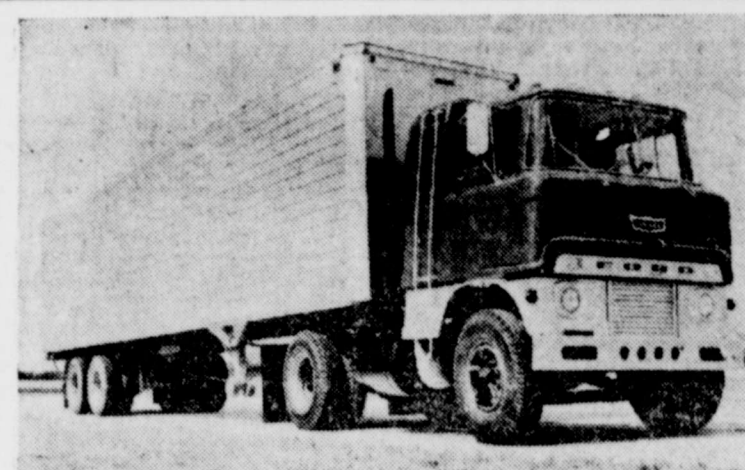

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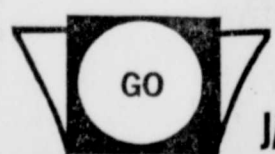

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Hale County Employees Given Increase In Their Salaries

Hale County employees will find salary raises in their semi-monthly checks beginning the 15th of this month.

The Commissioners Court last week approved salary raises that probably average around \$10.00 monthly for employees. It was the first "across the board" salary hike in this county since 1956.

There were some raises of \$5 a month and one of \$40. The top increase went to Justice of the Peace Clarence Lewis and upped his pay to \$390 monthly.

County Judge Lee Nowlin said raises of \$10 monthly were "in the mill" for county officials. The proposed raises for officials must be advertised to comply with state laws, Judge Nowlin pointed out, and that step will be taken in the near future.

Indications were that the officials' salary raises would go into effect Feb. 15, Nowlin said.

M. L. Rea, county treasurer, estimated that the raises for officials and employees would add \$1,050 per month to the county payroll.

County commissioners and all officials except the county judge will draw \$6,632.50 yearly when the increases are in effect. Commissioners are provided automobiles but under a new arrangement none of their pay is designated as travel expense.

The county judges salary will be \$8,182.50. No travel pay is designated for that official.

The tax assessor-collector is allowed \$30 monthly for travel and incidentals.

"Red Vests" On Duty At Road Work

The Texas Highway Department has announced a highway safety measure designed to protect the motorist by making him see red—literally.

The Department said it will require flagman directing traffic at highway construction and maintenance projects to wear bright red vests and to use a flag of the same color.

The men in the red vests will begin appearing on Texas highways by mid-February, when Highway Department employees working on maintenance jobs will don the eye-catching apparel. Made from fluorescent red nylon, the new vests are designed to make flagmen more easily visible and recognizable to motorists both day and night. At night the vests and flags will be supplemented by flares.

Red flags have been used by flagmen in the past but the fluorescent color and the vests are new requirements, made "to insure added safety and convenience for the public in the movement of traffic to and through highway construction and maintenance operations," said D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer. He hailed the new vests as a safety measure not only for motorists but also for highway workmen.

Collage Station. The estimated 1961 meat production will provide consumers of the U. S. with the largest supply of meat in history, both in total and per person. If the estimates prove correct, Lloyd Bergsma, extension livestock marketing specialist, says consumption of red and poultry meats would exceed 200 pounds per person for the first time in history.

Bergsma says livestock producers will be faced with a generally downward trending market during 1961. Prices during the first half of the new year will not feel the effects of increasing supplies as strongly as those for the last half. He expects slaughter cattle to average near 1960 levels during the earlier months of 1961, but increasing supplies of grass cattle and more competition from expanded hog production are expected to have their effect by late summer. The greatest price drops are forecast in the lower grades of cattle.

The specialist expects a con-

tinuation of the herd build-up, which started in 1958. But, he adds, weather conditions can play a mighty important role. Cattle-men can be expected to react quickly to changes in crop and pasture conditions, since cattle numbers on the farms and ranches of the nation are now at an all time high.

On the brighter side, Bergsma says consumers have, partially at the expense of other meats, increased their consumption of beef and he sees a continuation of this strong demand. This trend should help ease the downward pressure on prices resulting from the expanded supplies. The increased domestic supplies of stocker and feeder cattle will continue to reduce the level of cattle and beef

imports, says Bergsma. Lower cattle prices do not necessarily mean that profits will be absent in cattle enterprises. But, Bergsma suggest to producers they study the price indicators when planning their operations.
