Proper Amount of Feed for Flock of Chickens

As to how much to feed, a question frequently asked, we can do no better than refer to the advice offered by the United States Department of Agriculture. "The feeder must use his own judgment in deciding how much grain to give the hens, as the amount of feed which they will eat varies with the different pens and at different seasons of the year. They will eat more feed in the spring while laying heavily than in the summer and fall when laying fewer eggs. A fair general estimate is to feed about one quart of scratch grains and an equal weight of mash (about 1 1/4 quarts) daily to 12 hens of the general purpose breeds, such as the Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds or Wyandottes, or to 16 hens of the smaller or egg breeds. This would be about 7 1/2 pounds of scratch grains and mash daily to 100 Leghorns and about 9 1/2 pounds each to general purpose flocks. If hens have free range or large runs containing green food a general purpose hen will eat about 75 pounds of feed a year and a Leghorn will eat about 55 pounds, in addition to the green stuff consumed."

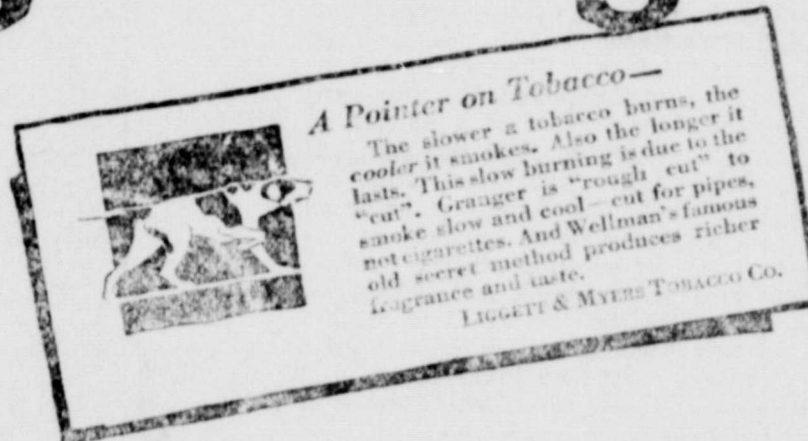

Waco, Texas.—With the opening of the Cotton Palace only a few days away, directors and heads of departments at their last meeting announced that everything was in tip-top shape for the opening of the exposition on Saturday, October 25.

On the opening day Austin College vs. Baylor will be the football card, and the reputation made by the Sherman boys last year is a guarantee that they will give the Baylor team some tense moments during the Cotton Palace game.

On the following Friday, October 31, Coach Paul Tyson of Waco High will lead his Gold and White representatives out on the Cotton Palace gridiron to give battle to Waxahachie High. The latter team has championship ambitions and they realize that one of the most important tasks before them to realize this ambition is the defeat of the Waco High.

A. & M. vs. Baylor.

On November 1 the game of all games is the Cotton Palace attraction. On this day the A. and M. team, backed by 2,000 or more cadets, will make their annual pilgrimage to the Cotton Palace to give Baylor battle. The old rivalry among the student bodies of these two institutions still exists and the Cotton Palace game furnishes the only opportunity for students, ex-students and sympathizers to encourage their favorites.

Twenty thousand persons witnessed last year's A. and M. Baylor game, and it is confidently expected fully that number, and possibly more, will witness this year's contest. In addition to the A. and M. student body, thousands of ex-students of both institutions will make their annual trip to Waco on November 1 for the football classic of the year.

Reunion A. and M. Ex-Student.—On this day will be held the annual reunion of A. and M. Ex-Students, this organization having voted to meet each year in Waco on the date of the Baylor-A. and M. game. The local A. and M. Club of ex-students has been advised to expect a large attendance of those who have in past years attended A. and M.

The second Saturday has also been designated as Traveling Men's day and elaborate preparations are being made for the coming together at the Cotton Palace of the traveling men of Texas. Local "Knights of the Grip" are preparing to extend every courtesy to their fellow business hustlers on the day set aside for their pleasure.

Announcement has been made that horse races will be the attraction in front of the grandstand on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the first week.

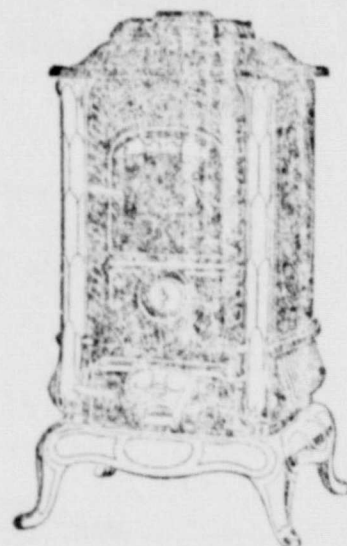

SAYS STRIKERS ENTITLED TRIAL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, October 20.—Railroad employees who joined the shopmen's strike in 1922 were entitled to a jury trial when charged with contempt of court, it was held today by the supreme court. That part of the Clayton Act which provided that employees may demand a trial by jury, was declared by the court to be constitutional and valid.

The relationship of employer and employee do not cease, the court held, when workmen go on strike, and the provisions of the Clayton act for protection therefore apply under such circumstances.

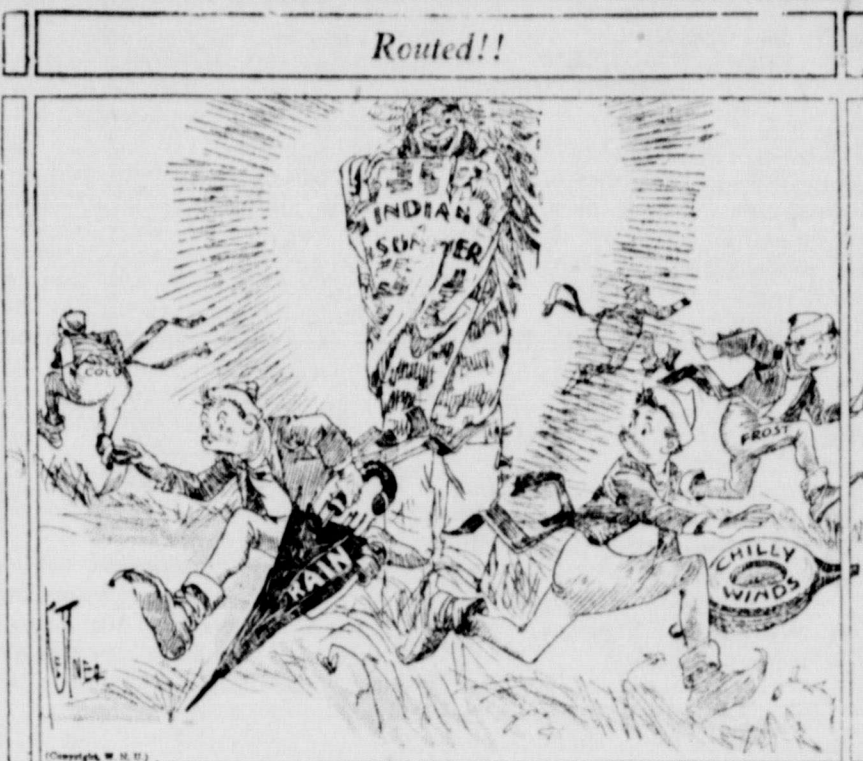
YOUTHS ARE CAUGHT STEALING GASOLINE

LOCAL MAN GETS DEATHS BY AUTO LETTER BY ZR-3 SHOW INCREASE

One of the first letters to be brought across the Atlantic Ocean in an airship was received here by G. A. Ladwig this week. The letter came across the ocean from Germany in the ZR-3, which brought mail, and the letter was postmarked "Mit Luftschiff ZR-3, Befordert." The post mark was stamped on the letter with a cancelling stamp and in the left upper corner was a little sticker bearing the words, "Mit Luftpost." It required two 50-cent stamps to bring the letter.

The ZR-3 was piloted from Germany to the United States and delivered to the American government as a payment of \$2,200,000 on reparations as provided for in the peace settlement. It was the first airship to fly across the Atlantic, making the 5,000-plus miles without a stop and at an average speed of 61 miles an hour.

The letter which Mr. Ladwig received came from a wholesale house and in part said:

"There is no doubt that you will be greatly surprised to receive this letter from us, for, as far as history making is concerned, this is the first time that mail has come from Europe via airship."

"We thought that you would be interested in having a stamp of this kind, as we are almost sure this epoch making event will be a great souvenir to you."

From Friday evening until Saturday night more than ten inches of rain fell. Cellars were flooded and orange groves were knee deep in water. The seawall crumbled in at some points, and much other damage is reported. Saturday night shoppers waded home in their bare feet.

FILIPINOS WAR ON CHINESE

(By Associated Press)
MANILA, Oct. 20.—Governor General Leonard Wood, after touring the city today to observe the situation created by a clash between the Chinese and Filipinos, ordered four companies of constabulary held in readiness to suppress any outbreak beyond control of the police.

Sporadic cases of attacks on Chinese continued throughout the morning, and two Chinese were stabbed and mortally wounded when the crowd gathered near a railway station.

Anti-Chinese feeling is intense among the Filipino residents of the city, but the police believe that they will be able to prevent any serious outbreak. Approximately 1,000 Chinese stores here remained closed today.

LARGEST MAN IN TEXAS DIES

GREENVILLE, Oct. 20.—Sam Harris, age 45, weighing 720 pounds, died of pneumonia today at his home at Farmersville, Texas, near here. Harris recently returned to his home from Ballinger where he was traveling with a show when he became ill.

Last year Harris purchased his own casket, having it specially made. The funeral will be held Tuesday and a motor truck instead of a hearse will be used for carrying the body to its last resting place. It was said that the door must be removed from the Harris home before the body can be moved out.

The deceased was widely known over Texas, and throughout the nation, and he was held in the highest esteem by his neighbors and those who knew him best.

"Father died at eleven-thirty last night," so reads a telegram from Lester Harris to Mrs. Myrtle Bryant. The telegram was from the son of Sam Harris, who was here with his father last week, and the message reported the death of Sam Harris at his home near Farmersville.

Sam Harris was the "Fat Man" with the carnival which played at the Runnels County Fair last week. The man was stricken ill after the carnival reached Ballinger, and remained here until Thursday, when physicians advised that he be carried home.

The deceased was the largest man in Texas. He weighed 698 pounds, and was only six feet and two inches tall. He had been on exhibition throughout the country for several years as an attraction at fairs and with carnival companies. He had also been the subject of many physical examinations, and visited Mayo Brothers hospital where numerous X-ray pictures were taken, and where the doctors made examinations.

The man was reported to be in a serious condition when he left Ballinger, and he realized his condition. He told friends that he "had given his last show, and that the time had come for him to go home."

**Mrs. Ferguson Answers
Charges Made By Butte**

TEMPLE, October 18.—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic candidate for Governor, Saturday issued a statement in reply to the charges and insinuations being made against her and in connection with her candidacy by Dr. George C. Butte, who was nominated by the Republican Executive Committee as her opponent for the governorship.

She denounces as false certain statements made by Dr. Butte and designated as both infamous and contemptible certain insinuations uttered by this man, who proclaims he stands upon "the mountain top of a broad patriotism."

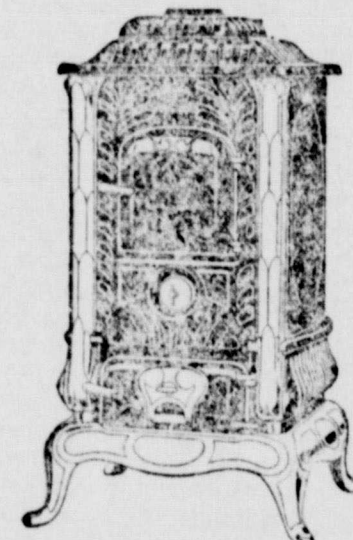
