HIGH RECOGNITION FOR THE D-C-D HIGHWAY

SOME INTERESTING FIGURES FROM THE COUNTY RECORDS

County Clerk David D. Shanks has very kindly furnished us with some very interesting data taken from the official records of Ochiltree County. The first chattel mortgage filed in Ochiltree County was entered in the books by County Clerk, Geo. M. Perry on Nov. 8, 1889. It was from Macy A. Finkle to Finkle & McGill on 23 head of cattle to secure a loan of \$300.00. The total number of mortgages filed since the organization of the county on February 21, 1889 to July 1, 1921 is 11,458. From January 1, 1921 to July 1, 1921 there has been 820 chattels filed.

The first deed was filed on April 15, 1889 and dated April 9, 1889. John A. Bernard, Grantor, Chas. A. Grace, Grantee.

There has been 90 cases on the probate files and of these practically one-third have been disposed of in the past three years.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, that an election be held on the 16th day of July, 1921, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Perryton, Texas, in the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00), Dollars, payable 20 years after date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after 10 years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum payable semiannually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of construction and improvement of the roads, bridges and streets, in the City of Perryton, Texas, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18 R. S., 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of 1921, Regular Session and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

That said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of Perryton, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

Geo. M. Perry, is hereby appointed manager of said election to be held at the Court House, as aforesaid.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts 1921, Regular Session Thirty-seventh Legislature, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

All those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Perryton, attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the court house door, and at two other public places within the City of Perryton, for at least thirty days prior to the day of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty days prior to the date of the election.

THIS COUNTRY ALL RIGHT

Recent books and pamphlets, hundreds of magazine articles and quite a bit in the newspapers all trend toward pessimism in discussing the present economic conditions, and paint a gloomy picture of the future. One English writer goes so far as to prophesy that America will soon split up into as many separate federal governments and countries as it now has states, all same Europe, and says our civilization is breaking down. All this pessimism and prediction of gloom comes from some other reason than facts, as there is little or nothing in the outlook to justify anything of the sort. It is probably a sort of nervousness or hysteria brot about by the war and war conditions. Everybody was on a mental strain for a number of years, and the whole world was turned upside down, until as an aftermath many let vivid and morbid imaginations run away with their good common sense. The federal government took hold and got to be a regular paternal government, which told us what we should do and what we should not do, what we should eat and how much, what we could say and what we could talk about, it censored the public press and the public utterances, and incidentally it raised our taxes from one billion a year to five billions. So a lot of us got to looking upon the government as a sort of step-father that should provide for us, when in fact we must not only provide for ourselves but for the government also. Every man ought to know that no one is liable to help him, much less the government; that he must help himself, by good work, good conduct, thrift and industry. We have too many "unbuilders," and other jaw artists who are traveling over the country delivering lectures at so much per talk when they ought to be harvesting hay or hunking prunes, or digging postholes, or doing something in the way of production other than hot air. All we as a people need to do is to get back to normal, mind our own business, put in an honest day's work every day, economize sanely and do as we did before the war.

Fire Insurance On Grain in Field

These policies are recognized by the Federal Reserve Bank and if a loan on your grain is needed a policy of this kind will be required; loss payable clause can be made payable to any bank, or individual that you desire.

It will be impossible for us to make a personal canvass of the County to write this insurance but a telephone call or postcard is all that is necessary for us to bind the risk for you. We are also pleased to advise that we are in position to carry this premium until grain is marketed.

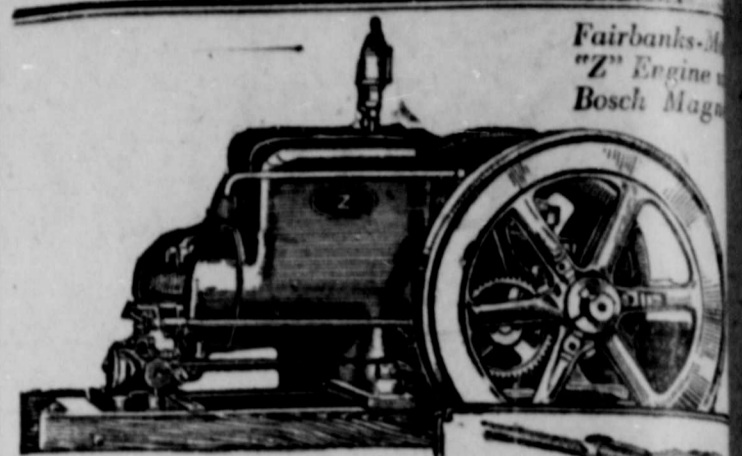

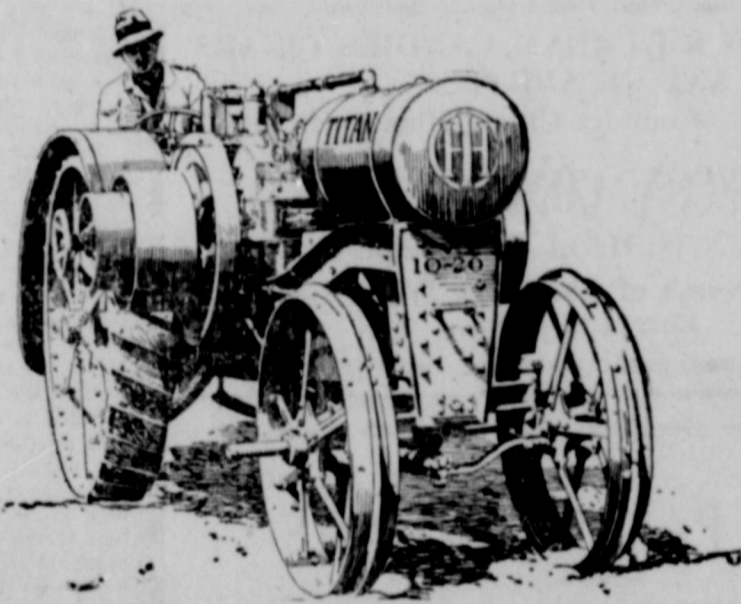

The KITCHEN CABINET

Though man a thinking being is defined. Few use the grand prerogative of mind. How few think justly of the thinking few? How many never think, who think they do! —Jane Taylor.

ONE-DISH DINNERS.

For the maidless home or the busy day there is nothing that quite takes the place of the one-meal dish. This may be cooked in one dish or served from the kitchen all on one plate.

Mutton and Vegetables. — Brown in sweet fat in a hot frying pan a pound, more or less, of mutton. When the mutton is well cooked, add a cupful or more of diced carrots, and if the onion flavor is liked, one small onion; boiling water to cover, and let simmer on the back part of the stove for two or three hours. The meat sauce may be thickened slightly and served with boiled potatoes, all arranged on a hot dinner plate.

Baked Pork Chops.—Chops or steak may be used for this dish. Slice sufficient potatoes to serve the family, season with salt and pepper and cover with the pork steak, well seasoned on both sides. Use a large, shallow baking pan to give plenty of surface to the heat, and bake in a moderate oven for two hours or until the potatoes are soft. A sliced onion improves this dish, if the family has been properly educated to appreciate this wholesome vegetable.

Spanish Meat Dish.—Arrange a layer of sliced raw potatoes in a baking dish, add a finely shredded onion, a cupful of beef gravy and slices of the meat to cover the top. Pour over a cupful or more of tomatoes and bake in a moderate oven until the potatoes are tender. Before serving sprinkle the top of the dish with a few cooked peas for a garnish and serve from a dish.

American Chop Suey.—Take one-half pound of round steak, cut in dice, and brown in hot suet fat, add one small sausage link, two large onions, one-third of a box of spaghetti and one-third of a quart of strained tomato. Boil the spaghetti, and after cooking the other ingredients for two hours serve with the hot spaghetti. Season well with salt, pepper, paprika and a sprinkling of sugar.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

The number of people who are cutting down on sweets from a standpoint of health is on the increase. Where acid fruits are also tabooed the prune will have its chance to be developed. The prune is a very wholesome foundation for any number of delectable dishes from breakfast to dinner.

Sliced Pressed Beef.—Take a shin of beef and two pounds of the round. Crack the bone, put the meat into a kettle, cover with cold water and bring to a boil. Add salt and pepper, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar, a large onion sliced and cook all together until the meat falls from the bones. Skim out the meat and bone and reduce the liquor by boiling; when one-half the quantity, strain through a coarse muslin. Pick the meat into small bits, removing all bones. To the meat liquor add a pinch of powdered mace, cloves, allspice, a dash of cayenne and one-half teaspoonful of mustard and the same of celery salt. Boil the liquor and put back the meat, mixing thoroughly. When well heated through, turn into an earthen bowl or mold rinsed in cold water; cover and weight the cover and set away to cool. Serve cut in thin slices.

Simple Dessert.—Butter slices of bread and place in a baking dish, cover with canned blueberries, place another layer of buttered bread and pour over more blueberries. Cover and wait for an hour or two, then bake until well heated through. Serve with cream and sugar. Other berries, such as blackberries, strawberries or any juicy fruit may be used in place of the blueberries.

Fruit Pudding of Leftovers.—Take one-half cupful of oatmeal, one egg, beating yolk and white separately; a pinch of salt, two teaspoonfuls of butter, six prunes stoned and mashed smooth, two tablespoonfuls of baked apple, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, a little nutmeg, one-half cupful of sweet milk. Mix all the ingredients except the egg white and bake in a moderate oven. When firm and brown, cover with a meringue, using two tablespoonfuls of sugar and the egg white. Brown and serve.
