From Camp Travis

"No mind that has not been educated to taking in information readily", says Lieut. Col. E. E. Haskell, Commanding Officer of the Ninetieth Division Training Camp now being held for student candidates for army commissions at Camp Travis, "can be expected to digest the many branches of study here." Given physique and character, education, has stood first in the qualifications demanded of the candidates for admission to the camp.

Among the features of the camp for the first week is the fact that thus far not a single man has tired and asked to be dropped out, in contrast to previous camps where resignations began to trickle in as soon as the warmer work appeared on the schedule. According to the officers in charge of administration and those in charge of instruction, the men are wading into the work with a will.

Candidates have the benefit, not only of their previous training in the fundamental infantry drill, which is the basis of all military instruction, but of imported instructors from the allied fronts, and of the most complete complement of artillery material that has been devoted to training purposes thus far, a battery of the Third Field Artillery, Regulars, having been placed on duty at the camp.

During the recent cold snap, all activities were confined to the indoors as far as was possible in order to protect the health of students. For that matter officers and men fare alike, so far as quarters are concerned. All are housed in substantial wooden barracks.

Those who find the course too hard and fall behind, will not be summarily kicked out, but will have the choice of remaining and buckling down to their best or of withdrawing and returning to their former status. The fact, however, that a student elects to remain and does stay out the course of instruction does not insure him a commission. Men may at any time be relieved from the school, to use the official phrase, upon showing by their misconduct their unfitness for commissions. All candidates who stay to the finish will have to pass successfully the final physical examination

April 5th. Ratings of all men in the camp, with recommendations for commissions by a board headed by the Camp Commander will follow the physical examination.

The recent cold spell found no suffering at Camp Travis. The soldiers of the National Army in training there have reached that physical condition where, with ordinary precaution, excessive covering and heating is not required to keep them comfortable. However, there was plenty of coal, wood, covering and good exercise to keep the blood circulating. An example of the splendid physical condition of the men, coupled with their morale was shown in the avidity with which they devoured the drill work of the days when the first snow and ice for many years covered the drill grounds in and about Camp Travis. Within the barracks the men were comfortable. There were fires in the bunk rooms and fires in the bath houses. Not a single portion of the regular existence of the soldier was interfered with, and not a man was the sufferer because of the cold winds and wet grounds.

they took it upon themselves to go sleigh riding on Almo Plaza. Everything has cleared away now and we have as tropical a climate as anyone could wish for.

A few visitors have been down since I last wrote. Of course it is useless to say that we were glad to see them and hope that more of you will pay us a visit before we leave for France.

Our 16 weeks of extensive training was up yesterday noon and you should see the remarkable difference in Uncle Sam's National Army today and the day it landed, although there is room for improvement.

American Forces Now Large.

There were 1,428,650 enlisted men and 110,865 officers in the United States Army at the opening of 1918, more than one and a half times as large as any force ever before mobilized by this Nation, according to a statement by Secretary of War Baker.

During the war with Spain the Army of the United States at its maximum strength aggregated 272,000 men and officers. The Army in the field and in training now is practically six times as great as the maximum number under arms in the Spanish-American War.

About 45,000 officers were commissioned from civil life in the two series of training camps nearly eight times as many as the number of officers in the regular Army April 1, 1917.

750,000 Negroes Called.

Eight per cent of the 9,586,508 men registered under the selective-service law are colored. Of these nearly 209,000 have been called and more than 75,000 have been certified for service.

Out of every hundred colored men called, 36 were certified for service and 64 were rejected, exempted, or discharged, while out of every 100 white citizens called, 25 were certified for service.

A School Pig.

What is your school doing to help win the war? Have you begun to make your children feel, Mr. Teacher, that they have a definite part to play in this great world conflict? Do they feel that they are a part of it—that they are helping to win by supporting our boys at the front?

Are you teaching them the great necessity of eliminating all waste and conserving in every way possible? Mr. Hoover has told us time after time that food will win the war. Is your school and are your children, helping to win the war by saving food?

What are you doing with the scraps from your lunch baskets? There should be few scraps, but always there must be some that is not palatable.

This food that is not palatable for people is palatable for pigs. Have you a pig at your school to eat that part of the food too frequently thrown away?

There are approximately eight thousand rural school districts in Texas. Think of the help these eight thousand schools can give by raising a pig at every school. Almost any two hundred pound pig will bring \$30.00. If every school were to raise a two hundred pound pig this year the schools would produce \$240,000 worth of meat for our soldiers.

There are two economic reasons that make this project distinctly worth while. In the first place, our great task in America at present is to make everybody realize the necessity of food conservation and food production. The school has an excellent opportunity to do this thru the feeding of a pig on scraps. Hogs are becoming scarce in the country and we need stimulate greater production.

A rural school in McLennon County raised two pigs in one year. Can't your school do half as well?

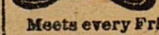

WHAT THE RED CROSS IS DOING AND WHAT YOU CAN DO

BUREAU OF MILITARY RELIEF.

The following is a brief resume of the Red Cross activities among the seven army cantonments located in the Southwestern Division. These activities developed since a trip taken by the Director through camps from October 23rd to November 1st.

Approximately 125,000 sweaters from Washington and from the St. Louis Supply Department have been distributed, almost equally among the different camps.

Three aerial squadrons of 225 men each at Camp Hicks, Fort Worth, and three aerial squadrons, also of 225 men each, at Camp Kelley, San Antonio, Tex., have been completely equipped from our St. Louis supply house with sweaters, helmets, mufflers, comfort kits and socks. These men are all under orders to sail for France. Five hundred and sixty-eight articles, sweaters, socks, etc., were sent to the 12th Field Artillery, Camp Doniphan, Fort Sill, Ok., from St. Louis. This is the former Battery A of St. Louis. Col. Rumbold commanding, who personally made the requisition.

Five hundred suits of pajamas have been distributed at Camp McArthur, Waco, Tex.

A number of special donations from individual chapters for particular regiments have been distributed by the Red Cross field director. These consist of several thousand articles.

Several hundred individual requests from soldiers for warm clothing, principally sweaters, have been investigated, and when found bona fide, have been supplied.

At Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, a sudden drop in temperature greatly increased the sickness, resulting in many cases of pneumonia. Our field director bought 1,100 comforts and collected from neighboring chapters about 1,000 more, with which the hospital authorities were able to keep their patients warm. This field director has telegraphed for 15,000 more sweaters.

A similar drop in temperature has

caused the field director at Camp McArthur, Waco, to telegraph for blankets. One hundred pairs were expressed to him that night from the St. Louis warehouse and he was given authority to meet the emergency by buying others if needed.

Other activities have been as follows:

Reports of meningitis at Camp Funston and Doniphan caused the director of military relief to telegraph the commanding general, offering to send Red Cross nurses and supplies. These offers were followed by a request from Camp Funston for 15 face masks and caps for the attendants to wear. This request was immediately filled. From Camp Doniphan in reply came a telegraphic request that the Red Cross supply heating appliances for an incinerator for the meningitis cases. It was installed the following morning. This brought the following acknowledgment:

"My Dear Mr. Stoner:

"I greatly appreciate your prompt action in arranging for the hospital supplies requested by me in my telegram. I thank you on behalf of the Thirty-fifth division, as I do also for your proffer of future assistance. Yours truly,

(Signed) "TERRY, Commanding."

The Department of Military Relief is co-operating at every camp and cantonment with the military authorities in every detail looking toward the health and comfort of our enlisted men.

THE SNOW.

A small amount of snow fell here Saturday night. This was followed all day Sunday and into Sunday night by one of the best and prettiest falling snows we ever saw fall on the Plains, or even in the old States. It melted all Sunday morning, but began to stay late in the afternoon, when more snow fell in about two hours than we ever saw fall in that length of time. The snow was estimated at between four and five inches, altogether.

We understand that the top of the ground was nice and moist in the high grass part of the county from the other snow, and this one will give them plenty of moisture to plow, and insure early grass. In the short grass portions, most of the other snow drifted off the land, but this one is thought will give them a very good top season.

We are predicting great things for old Terry and the South Plains in general this year, as the year has started out right. Besides Foster says the conditions are now removed that resulted in extreme drouths in the southwest and too much rain in the north and east last year. Also, you will notice that our own southwest prognosticator, H. A. Halbert, the watermelon and pecan king, of Coleman, Texas, is predicting a favorable year this time, and predicted a drouth last year. Even our own experience tell us that one extreme follows another, and that we will have abundance of rain this year.

We might say that Mr. Halbert also predicts two rains or snows in Feb., which is quite unusual for that time of year, and we believe plenty of rain will follow the rest of the year, and that we will be blessed with the usual bumper crops for the next few years.

Rain and Crop Prospects for 1918

One year ago I gave the farmers warning of a dry season for 1917 and many papers kindly published it, though skeptical of my predictions. Some farmers heeded my warning and came out better than those who did not. The year, however, exceeded all expectations and precedents as to the length of the drouth. The drouth should have ended with heavy rains all over Texas, in late summer or early fall, like all other preceeding years ending in the figure 7. This prolonged drouth has greatly discouraged the farmers and made them dubious about planting a crop for 1918. The stockmen are more seriously damaged by the prolonged drouth than the farmers who can recuperate their losses more easily than the stockmen.

The dry fall curtailed the sowing of wheat and winter oats and the acreage of wheat will be small in Texas, but there is plenty of time yet to sow oats. The wheat

has yet a bare chance to make a profitable crop. The snow and light rains that the severe blizzard brought on the 10th to many localities in Texas will start the wheat off in many places and bring it up in others and other rains I have predicted for January will keep it growing and bring up all wheat not already up. February will be a fairly seasonable month and if my forecasts come true we will get two good rains and probably two more light ones, distributed through the month. Oats should be sown on a large scale during this month and up to March 10th. Much corn should be planted during this same period.

Subsequent months will be seasonable enough to make fairly good crops of all kinds with heavy rains to floods in July and August in Texas. All insect pests were at a minimum during 1917 and will be less during 1918 about the only advantage the drouth has brought. Hence cotton can be planted in many localities with safety where it had been abandoned heretofore on account of the boll weevil.

This is the way I see it, Mr.

Editor, and if you think this will encourage my brother farmers, I will be glad that you publish the above general forecast.

RED CROSS RUSHED HELP TO STRICKEN IN HALIFAX HORROR

TWO RELIEF TRAINS EN ROUTE 12 HOURS AFTER EXPLOSION WRECKED CITY.

FOOD AND CLOTHES ABOARD

Doctors and Nurses Accompany Specials Sent From New York and Boston—Care Provided for Destitute.

More evidence of the prompt dispatch with which the American Red Cross, which opens its Christmas membership drive for 2,000,000 more members in the Southwest division Monday, Dec. 17, continuing until Christmas eve, rushes relief to the stricken is revealed in the Halifax disaster.

Twelve hours after an explosion of munitions aboard a vessel in the harbor had exacted a toll of 4,000 men, women and children dead and as many more injured and maimed special relief trains left New York and Boston carrying aid to the injured and destitute.

Immediate Relief Steps.

Immediately following receipt of news of the holocaust in Washington the Military Relief and Civilian Relief departments of the Red Cross were in telegraphic communication with their representatives at the scene of the disaster, and with the Red Cross workers in New York and Boston were making ready the relief trains.

Aboard the relief trains were nurses and doctors connected with the Public Safety Committee of the state of Massachusetts, all of whom had experience at the Salem and Chelsea fires a few years ago.

The special train which left New York, flying the Red Cross flag and marked "Relief for Halifax," consisted of four baggage cars and coach. There was one carload of food, two and one-half carloads of clothing and one-half carload of surgical supplies.

Rush Food and Clothing.

Among the specific relief supplies rushed to Halifax were 10,000 blankets, 500 cots, 100 cases of clothing, 20 cases of bandages, slip pillow cases, 10,000 sweaters, 5,000 socks, warm clothes for children, coffee, canned soup, condensed milk, flour, 60 cases of surgical supplies and 20 cases of disinfectant.

An entire base hospital, with nurses, doctors and full equipment, accompanied the train from Boston. This base hospital had 800 beds.

As soon as it was known that a great disaster had taken place officials of the Red Cross got in touch with Nova Scotia authorities. The following telegram was sent to the Mayor of Halifax:

"American Red Cross is ready and anxious to render service and assistance. Will you indicate what is most needed and most practical that we might do?"

RED CROSS AND Y. M. C. A. CO-OPERATE WITH HUTS

Arrangements for thorough co-operation between the American Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. in the equipment and management of army hospital recreation huts have been completed. Under the agreement the Red Cross provides and equips the "huts," and in each "hut" a Y. M. C. A. representative, with his staff, will conduct the regular association activities.

A Red Cross staff also will conduct its own regular activities, and Red Cross workers will have charge of such part of the recreation work as is carried on in the wards of the hospitals with which the "huts" are directly connected.

Red Cross Navy Hospital.

The American Red Cross has established at Philadelphia the first general Red Cross hospital in this country. It contains 250 beds and is now being used by the United States navy.

Special Aid to Italy.

The American Red Cross responded promptly to the emergency created by the Italian retreat. The War Council, in a telegram to Ambassador Thomas Nelson Page, promised every effort which the Red Cross could make could be applied immediately to the relief of Italy.

New Uniforms for Nurses.

Owing to the limited laundry facilities in France, it has been decided that American Red Cross nurses with base hospitals and other military hospitals in France shall wear gray uniforms instead of the usual white.

ARCHITECT DRAWS RED CROSS PLANS, CARRIES THEM OUT

LOUIS LABEAUME, ST. LOUISAN, HELPS PUT OVER GREAT MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN.

HE THANKS NEWSPAPER MEN

Declares This Publication and Other Influential Papers in Southwest Made Success Possible.

The man behind the publicity behind the solicitors who got 3,250,000 new members for the Red Cross in the Southwestern division, comprising the states of Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas, is an architect, which is intended two ways. He is Louis LaBeaume of St. Louis, architect by profession, architect of the fortunes of the Red Cross in the Southwestern division and one of the most earnest and most capable of Uncle Sam's talented \$1-a-year army.

When it became apparent that the United States government had need for men of affairs to direct the various activities of the Red Cross Mr. LaBeaume volunteered his services.

George W. Simmons, manager of the Southwestern division of the Red Cross, complimented Mr. LaBeaume highly upon the fact that he was a potent factor in the tremendous success of the membership campaign of the Southwestern division. Mr. LaBeaume says:

"The remarkable results achieved in the Southwestern division during the Christmas membership campaign are due in no small measure to the loyal support of the press. Newspaper proprietors and editors throughout the division have given generously of their space. The results show that chapter publicity directors have been on the jump and have kept Red Cross enthusiasm at fever heat. Every man, woman and child who took part in this campaign must feel a glow of satisfaction and pride in the consciousness of work well done. It is the continuation of this spirit which will bring victory to the cause for which we are fighting. Even though the campaign is technically over, we urge you to keep up the good work."

POWER OF THE PRESS.

The power of the press largely was responsible for the splendid showing made by the Southwestern division of the Red Cross in the big Christmas membership campaign. The Southwest was given the task of getting 1,162,000 new members. As a result of the splendid publicity campaign directed by Louis LaBeaume of St. Louis and the businesslike organization effected by John L. Johnston and George W. Simmons, chairman of the campaign and Southwestern manager of the Red Cross, respectively, this district got nearly three times its quota of members, leading all the other 12 divisions of the Red Cross in the United States.

Mr. LaBeaume very properly gives proper credit to this newspaper and other newspapers of the Southwest for the splendid results obtained in the campaign.

In these times, when self-abnegation is absolutely necessary in every walk of life, it is a pleasure to record that the newspapers of the Southwest are doing their share to help win the war. In the campaign just closed the newspapers contributed their valuable space to the cause, while Mr. Simmons, Mr. Johnston and Mr. LaBeaume contributed their services and their time.

TWO OBJECTS ARE SOUGHT IN FRENCH RELIEF WORK

The American Red Cross assumes that the work done by the organization with the French must fill fundamentally two requirements:

First—That all activities contribute to the successful conduct of the war. Second—That they relieve suffering caused by the war.

Work done with the civil population may have a more important bearing on the military situation even than work done with the forces, for men in the field will be able to carry out their work better with the knowledge that those left at home are being taken care of.

If the American people can get a real picture of the misery among those who have been and are being driven out of their homes and dumped in poverty upon other parts of the country, oftentimes ill or maimed, they will gladly do all in their power to help.

Bain Price and Frank Crowder fed cattle all day that day and are not making any complaints of being frozen, so much for a boy having grit enough to do the duty, he has promised his employer to do.
