## Council Pays City's Street Paving Bills

### Parsons Applies For Councilman

Percy Parsons, director of Parsons Funeral Home in Olton, will be the only announced candidate in the city-wide alderman election set for Sept. 26, according to Mayor Parley Myers.

Parson's lone application was received at City Hall Friday--only one day before the filing deadline. His will apparently be the only name on the ballot, along with space for possible write-in choices for the post.

City Councilmen called the special election three weeks ago after the resignation of Lester Thompson who moved to another city.

### Highway 70 Project Costs Not Included

Aldermen approved payment of the city's share of a \$60,206.33 bill for recent improvements to 20 sections of street during a special meeting here Tuesday night.

Action was formalized in an ordinance calling for settlement of Olton's \$15,155.83 involvement in an expansive street improvement program okayed by the council in May, 1966.

Most of the money--\$11,217.10 of the municipal payment--will go to High Plains Pavers Inc. of Plainview, general contractors.

The remaining \$3,938.78 is earmarked for McMorries & Associates of Amarillo, project engineers.

Councilmen last year approved a \$60,000 15-year bond to finance the city's part of the improvement bills which is expected to approach 45,000 before all proposed street and highway alterations are completed later this month.

They paid \$25,841.19 of the total in October when a seal coat was engineered and applied for various city streets prior to the installation of curbs, gutters and paving this summer.

Property owners along the recently completed improvements will share the remaining \$45,050.50 in assessments. Each resident effected will

pay \$4.30 per foot of property fronting on the improved streets and \$3.95 per foot of property along improved side streets, according to terms of a city ordinance which mapped out original plans in May of last year.

Councilmen Tuesday night also passed a resolution releasing property owners along sections of Ave. G, and Sixth St. from assessments for improvements outline in the original resolution but never actually carried out along those roads.

Final plans did, however, include sections of 10th St., fifth St., and a mile strip of U. S. Hwy. 70 through North Olton which were not part of the first paving contract.

Payment terms outlined in the ordinance signed Tuesday night did not provide for a \$2,140.60 indebtedness for so-called "hardship" cases agreed to by the city in connection with recent street improvements.

The new ordinance also did not provide for payment of \$1,650.33 in improvement for city property along U. S. Hwy. 70. City residents along the highway will share the remaining cost of the \$20,907.37 project--some \$19,254.04.

Engineer Bill R. McMorries of McMorries & Associates appeared before the council to answer questions concerning the proposed ordinance.

He explained that the document would, in effect, signify the city's acceptance of the work completed thus far, adding that contractors remained liable for all repairs or alterations that might be required for the next 12 months.

It also authorized the major and city secretary to issue certificates of special assessment on property outlined in the ordinance, he said.

City Engineer Henry Hague of High Plains Pavers reported to the council that curbs and gutters along Hwy. 70 had already been installed from Ave. M east to FM 168.

He added that request of property owners along the strip for drive way entrances other than those specified in the state-approved project plans would

### Testimony Recessed In Election Contest

Dist. Judge Pat Boone Jr. recessed the trial of the Earth-Springlake Hospital election contest until Sept. 7 following a lengthy first day of testimony which ran from 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. in 154 District Court in Littlefield Saturday.

Postponement was made to bar conflicts with other cases already scheduled for trial before the new date.

Testimony opened--and closed--with a parade of witnesses called by Lubbock attorney W. Reed Quilliam Jr., council for 22 voters in the May 27 vote creating the district who petitioned the court in June to have the balloting investigated and called again.

Petitioners, in a suit filed against County Judge O. J. Mangum and County Attorney C. R. Wilkinson, cited what they called "grave irregularities" in calling and conducting the election which made it impossible to determine the true results.

County officials soon filed a reply to the charges, claiming that petitioner's contentions were either unsubstantiated or beyond the jurisdiction of the court to decide.

Judge Boone, in a ruling handed down before witnesses were heard, held constitutional provision of the Texas Constitution which allows persons 60 years old or older to vote without registering in cities of less than 10,000 population.

The action overruled a contention of the petitioners that the provision was unconstitutional--a basis on which they claimed several persons had voted in the election illegally.

Testimony, beginning with County Clerk Charles Jones, centered around Jones' legal right to serve as absentee voting clerk for the original vote.

Other topics of questioning, with Jones and those who followed him, included the justice or legality on the part of the commissioners court to establish a single voting box for the proposed district.

Petitioners claimed the single ballot box made it impossible for some eligible voters to reach the polling place which was, in some cases as much as 25 miles away, according to the petition.

Quilliam also quizzed witnesses on commissioner's reasons for naming the proposed district the Earth-Springlake Hospital District. Petitioners charge the district's name, along with other aspects of the election, was part of a "design" by the district's proponents to mislead many voters into thinking the election affected only

Investigating Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson said the Bennett auto apparently ran under the back of the truck as Cordero attempted to turn left off the highway onto the dirt road.

Parson said witnesses told him the accident occurred after the car passed another vehicle which had been between it and the truck.

## New School Year Begins

Olton school teachers became part-time "parents" to 1,153 youngsters Monday as the first week of the 1967-68 term got underway.

The change, while bringing work for both students and instructors, will mean a vacation of sorts for real parents who have been surrounded by their younger generations for the past three months.

Supt. Ray Schultz reported the new enrollment figure following the end of annual registration Friday and said he expected fewer than a dozen additional students to come into the system in the next week or two.

Total enrollment is down 94 students below the 1,247 registration figure set at this time last year.

An approximate 10 percent drop was recorded on both high school and elementary levels from last term, while junior high attendance is expected to remain about the same.

Largest student reduction came at H. P. Webb Elementary where Principal Fred Gordon enrolled 566 pupils in grades one through six compared to 631 last year. He said he expected

five or six new students later this week.

Supt. Schultz, anticipating the smaller elementary enrollment this term had already eliminated a second and third grade teaching position to match the reduced personnel demands of a smaller student body.

High School Principal Joe Turner scheduled 277 new students last week--compared to 307 in 1966.

Of the current total, 64 are seniors, 64 juniors, 76 sophomores, and 73 freshmen.

Junior High Principal Carl McClure's student body has

grown by one from 309 last year to 310 after registration last week.

Sixth grade accounts for 120 of these students, seventh grade, another 104, and eighth grade, the remaining 86, he said.

## Noted Evangelist Plans Nazarene Revival Week

A week-long revival program will begin Sunday at the Nazarene Church of Olton under direction of revivalist Clifford Mayo of Lubbock.

Sunday services are scheduled for 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. with weekday services beginning at 9 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. through Sept. 10.

Mayo is a widely known evangelist, having conducted campaigns over most of the United States, in Mexico, Guatemala, Africa, Jordan, and Israel.

He was evangelist for the United Wesleyan Crusade in Dallas, in the summer of 1961, where capacity crowds packed the building. He was evangelist again in 1963 for this group.

Mayo has been called on to conduct six area-wide youth crusades with numerous denominations participating.

In the summer of 1966 he conducted two United Crusades Various denominations that

have participated in sponsoring him in United Crusades are Methodist, Free Methodist, Wesleyan Methodist, Congregational Methodist, Evangelical Methodist, Baptist, Nazarene, Pilgrim Holiness, Assembly of God, Presbyterian, Salvation Army, and Evangelical United Brethren.

He spends his summers in camp meetings, united crusades, and foreign evangelism. Most of the year he spends conducting individual church crusades across the nation.

### Mustangs Run Past Frenship

Olton Mustangs easily ran past the Frenship AA varsity--560 yards past, in fact--and racked up four scores in scrimmage play there Monday night.

The contest was the second and final competitive practice before the boys get down to the serious game of football in the season opener with the Morton Indians in Morton Sept. 8.

Most of the scoring was off the toe of halfback Steve Spain who booted three extra points in three tries. A fourth attempt was fumbled.

Halfback Benny Akin added to the score with a 29 yard field goal.

Frenship managed only 37 yards against a determined Mustang offense and defense which head coach Don Beck said appeared improved over their performance against Springlake last week.

Each team staged 45 plays in the one-sided match.

"We did a lot better this time," reported Beck, "both offensively and defensively."

The coach said the passing game also showed promise. Four runs and three pass plays advanced the ponies more than 50 yards each during the game.

He added, however, that the pony defense made several errors Monday which would have probably cost them considerable yardage against a stronger opponent.

### Season Ticket Deadline Near

Deadline for obtaining guaranteed reserve seat tickets for the 1967 Mustang football season is 5 p. m. Friday, according to School Business Manager Elmer Moore.

Fans holding season tickets last year may have the same seats again this year through that time.

Prices, the same as last season, are \$7.75 for adults and \$4 for children for admission to the five scheduled home games.

Home contests will include games with Hereford, Friona, Floydada, Memphis, and Dimmitt.

Moore reported many of the 420 available seats remained to be taken.

## OLTON PRODUCERS GET CROP SUPPORT CHECKS

Olton area farmers Monday began receiving \$3,300,000 as their shares of \$14,033,000 paid out to Lamb County growers involved in government support programs.

L. D. Aten, office manager

of the U. S. Dept. of Agricultural Stabilization and Soil Conservation in Littlefield who directs payments, said the estimated figure for this corner of the county was down about 10 percent from last year's record \$3,607,273.61.

He added that his office began advance payments in the area totaling about \$4,000 Feb. 1, with the remainder beginning to arrive in producer's mail boxes this week from ASCS processing headquarters in New Orleans, La.

Government programs in this region, bounded by Circle on the west, Fieldton on the south, the Castro County line on the north, and the Hale County line on the east, would involve about 600 producers, he said.

Certification in the area included approximately 41,000 acres of cotton and 47,000 acres of grain, according to ASCS records.

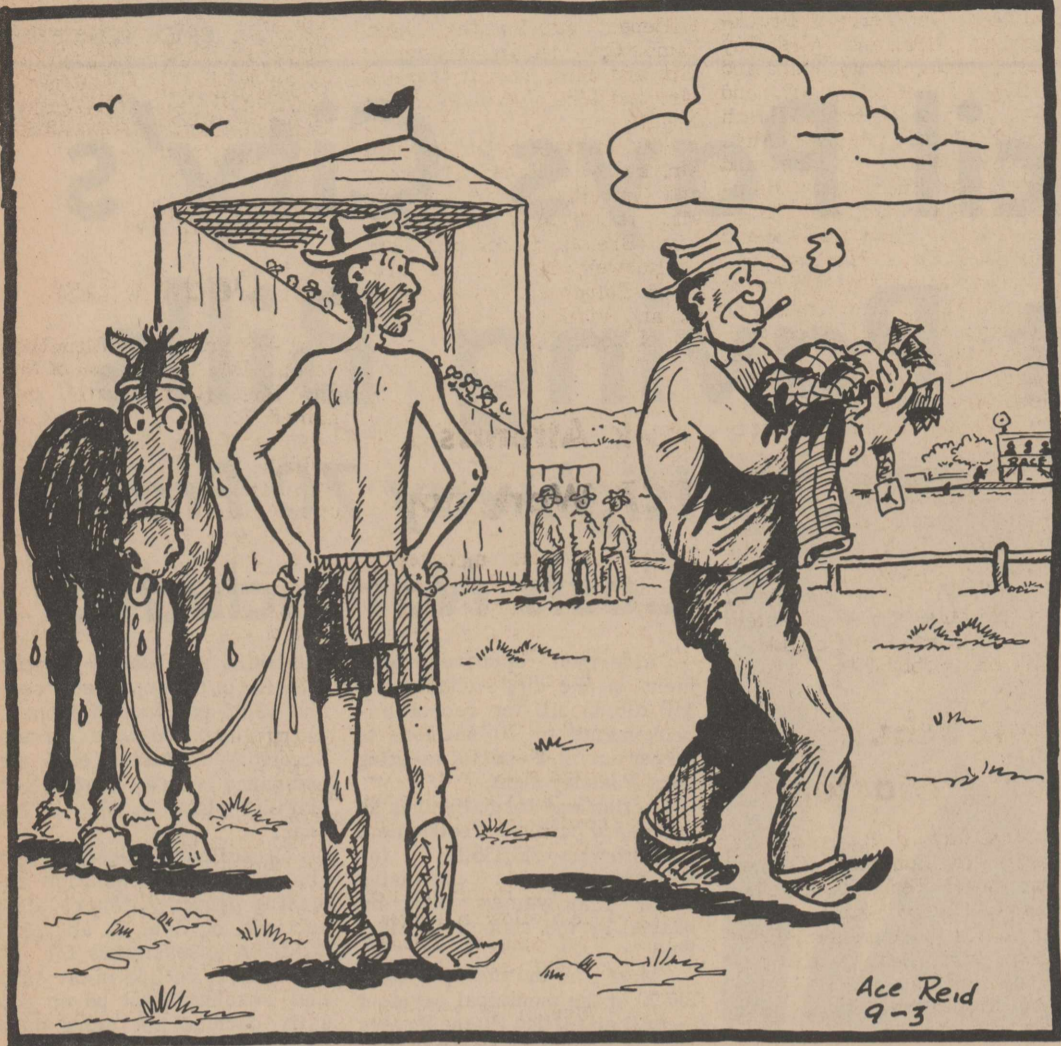

Limit Set For Migratory Birds

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission recently set the season and bag limits on migratory birds which includes ducks, coots, geese, brant and sandhill cranes.

Hunters are cautioned that a fully-feathered wing must be retained on all waterfowl whether taken in Texas or imported. Legal shooting begins one-half hour before sunrise and ends at sunset.

The season for shooting ducks and coots will be Nov. 18 through Jan. 6 with a bag limit of four which may include not more than one wood duck, one canvasback and two mallards. Possession limit will be eight and may not include more than two wood ducks, one canvasback and four mallards.

There will be no open season on black-bellied tree ducks and fulvous tree ducks.

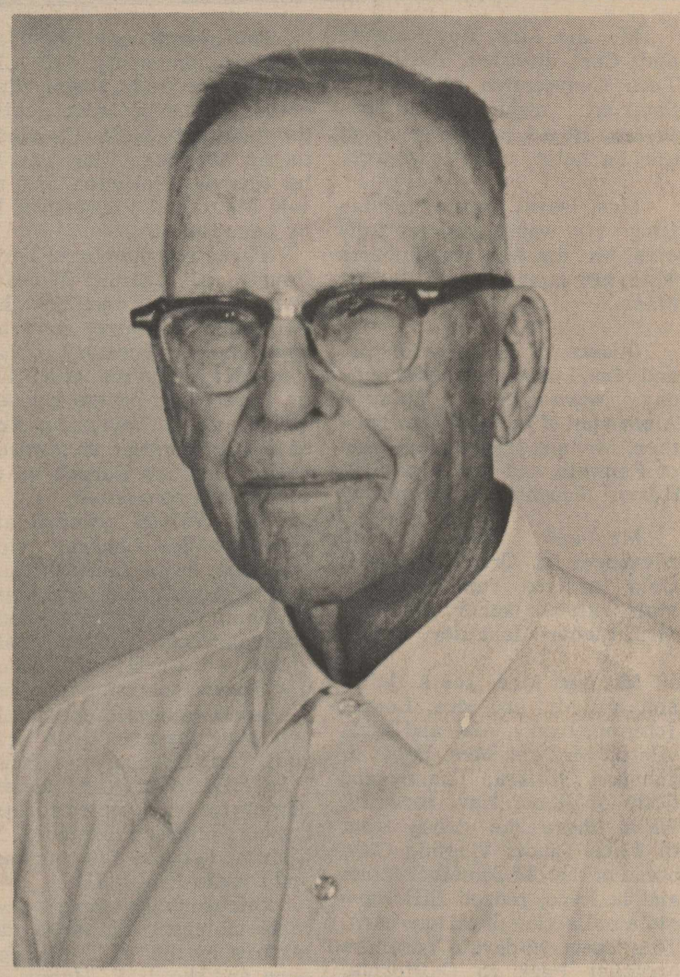
Daily bag limit of American, red-breasted and hooded merganser ducks is five per day and may include not more than one hooded merganser. The possession limit is 10 which may include not more than two hooded mergansers.

Daily bag limit on coots will be 10 per day with a possession limit of 20. Geese and brant season will be Oct. 24 through Jan. 6 with a bag and possession limit of five. East of U. S. Highway 81, which connects Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, San Antonio and Laredo, hunters may take not more than one white-fronted goose or Canada goose.

West of U. S. Highway 81, hunters may take not more than one Ross's goose, or in the alternative one white-fronted goose and one Canada goose or two Canada geese. Sandhill or little brown cranes may be hunted Nov. 4 through Jan. 2 with a daily bag limit of two and a possession limit of four.

Sandhill cranes may be hunted only west of a line beginning at the International Toll Bridge at Del Rio and continuing northward along U. S. Highway 277 to its junction with U. S. Highway 87 at San Angelo. The line then follows U. S. Highway 87 to its junction with U. S. 287 at Dumas, then northwesterly along U. S. Highway 287 to the Texas-Oklahoma state line.

Spotlight On Senior Citizens

Hoe Hand Not For Hire At Any Price -- At Age 89

Farmers having difficulty finding experienced hoe hands this time of year might consult C. T. Mason.

Though he turned 89 last week, he says he loves to hoe and has been doing so almost every day this summer and every summer for years.

Mason does not actually hire out his services. He donates them to his son Clarence, who farms Mason's land on the west edge of Olton, in exchange for the fresh air and exercise it gives him.

"I look forward to the hoe job every summer," Mason admitted with a grin. "I love to hoe. It exercises you all over."

Mason is quite accustomed by now, no doubt, to working that particular section of land. After all, it has been his since he moved here more than 43 years ago.

Born in Plevna, Ala., Aug. 23, 1878 he first saw his new home state of Texas on the first day of the century--Jan. 1, 1901. He made his home in Vernon for 18 years before moving with his wife and five children to Olton to farm.

His children include Clarence Mason of Olton, Mrs. W. R. McDonald of Witharhall, Mrs. W. E. Emmett of Vernon, Mrs. L. J. McBea of Plainview, and Mrs. Leon Hines of Mr. Shasta, Calif.

He will quickly admit that times have changed, even though some of his work habits have not.

The 300 acres on which he works, for example, sold for \$30 an acre in 1924 (a higher price than normal for the day, he recalls, which he was willing to pay to be close to schools here).

Time has since increased the mar's age by almost twice and the value of his land by at least 20 times.

Mason said he "officially" retired from farming in 1941 after which he became an avid angler.

Until about a dozen years ago, his fondness for fishing took him as far away as Hot Springs, N. M. for a week at a time in search of his favorite catch--crappie.

He now contents himself with a half-day's stay at a neighbor's lake or tank casting for catfish.

Mason also passes his time reading everything from Readers Digest to the Farm Journal when he is not visiting the fields or in town.

He says he is probably the most faithful reader of the Olton newspaper, having begun his subscription when the paper was first established here in the late 1920s.

Mason added that he also does basic deep-breathing exercises. They could explain how he managed to blow out all 89 candles that decked his latest birthday cake during a party given by his children.

"That's like part of the advice I give people who want to know how to live so long," he quipped. "Just keep breathing!"

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

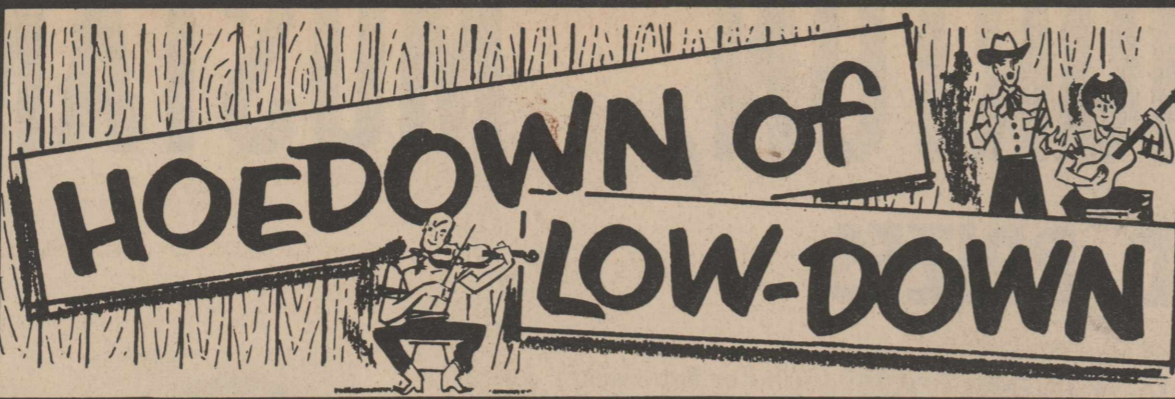
"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."
