Details of Pool Operations of Tax-Exempt Certificates Explained By Assistant Here

The following statement was made by J. H. Jordan, Administrative Assistant in Cotton Adjustment in the county agent's office in Coleman:

"Inquiries have been received recently regarding the method of accounting for certificates in the place of certificates lost, destroyed, or stolen. The regulations do not provide for issuance of duplicate certificates, and no replacement certificates can be issued in the county office.

Mr. Jordan also offers this explanation of the Cotton Tax-Exempt Certificate Pool Operation: "Cotton states whose production this year, according to official crop estimates, will exceed their Bankhead Act allotment will need to purchase only enough tax-exemption certificates to cover 431,223 bales of this extra production, whereas states whose production will be less than their Bankhead allotments will have for sale surplus certificates for the 1,639,474 bales difference between their production and their allotments. Consequently, while every effort will be made to secure as large a return as possible for holders of excess cotton tax-exemption certificates, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration reiterated that it would be mathematically impossible for each certificate turned into the national surplus cotton tax-exemption certificate pool to net its owner anywhere near as much as \$20 a bale. On the basis of the September 1 cotton crop estimate, states with estimated cotton production below their Bankhead allotments and the indicated excess in one-bale certificates are: Florida, 1,683; Mississippi, 59,728; Louisiana, 89,028; Texas, 845,530; Oklahoma, 358,831; Arkansas, 241,669; Missouri, 34,205. Total 1,639,474 certificates.

"States with estimated cotton production above their Bankhead allotments and the indicated deficit in one-bale certificates are: Virginia, 6,177; North Carolina, 127,307; South Carolina, 100,791; Georgia, 58,346; Tennessee, 17,875; Alabama, 80,625; New Mexico, 13,305; Arizona, 13,463; California, 8,795; all other minor cotton states, 4,539. Total 431,223 certificates. The Government will not purchase any of these surplus certificates, but all of the money taken in by the pool from the sale of surplus certificates will be distributed among producers who surrender certificates to the pool, after deducting expenses, and each producer will receive his share in the proportion that the poundage surrendered by him bears to the total poundage in the national pool. The surplus certificates that are not sold will be returned, on a similar pro rata basis, to the producers participating in the pool. They may be used next year in the event the Bankhead Act is continued another season.

In the cases of purchases and sales of surplus tax-exemption certificates within a county, the owner of the excess certificates will receive the full amount of 4 cents a pound, or approximately \$20 a bale, for any certificates he may sell. Regardless of whether sales are between individuals or through a pool, the purchaser must pay the full four cents a pound rate. This payment must be made in cash except on individual sales made within a county when other considerations of equal value may be exchanged for certificates. All transactions must be made through the office of the county assistant in cotton adjustment. Any transfer or assignment not in accordance with regulations is illegal and in such case both the person disposing of the certificate and party acquiring it are subject to penalty for violation of regulations for each certificate involved and such certificate is subject to cancellation. No one is entitled to possession of certificate except cotton producers and transfer is legal only as stated above.

FARMERS WANT CONTRACTS ON HOG AND CORN

Mrs. Gilmore gave an interesting article from the Outlook, and Mrs. Morgan gave the leaflet entitled "The Negro in the Rural Community."

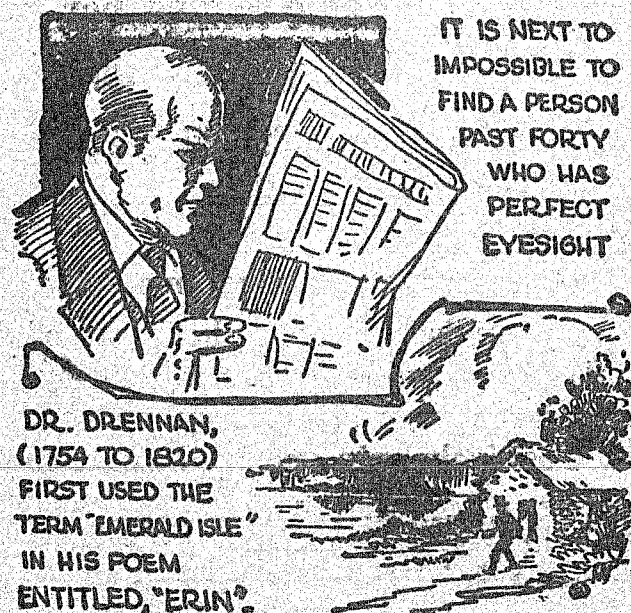

NIGHT AMENDMENTS TO BE SUBMITTED

In the general election to be held Tuesday, November 6th, there will be eight constitutional amendments submitted to the electorate of the state for approval or rejection.

Some of these amendments are probably worthy of consideration and approval, but the public in general knows but little about them. We doubt if one-half the voters in the state have ever read the proposed amendments, and if they have read them, perhaps but little attention was paid to them. Personally, this editor has not studied the proposed amendments as closely as we should, and to date, has not decided just how we will vote on the important documents. We plan to give an expression on each proposed amendment prior to the election, but our physical condition will have to improve considerably before we can apply ourselves to the close study of them.

The following was read at the funeral.

J. L. Stewardson was born March 1, 1867, at Shelbyville, Ill., and came to Lavaca County, Texas in 1877, and to Coleman County in January of 1879, settling on the Stewardson ranch. He was married to Miss Sarah Elizabeth Munn, June 7, 1899. To this union three children were born: Ted, Hardy, and Mrs. Jesse Lewellen, all of Shields.

He was converted in 1917 and joined the Shields Baptist Church. He died October 14, 1934, at 4 p. m. at the age of 67 years, 7 months, and 14 days.

He is survived by his wife, three children, three brothers, George, Arthur, of Fort Stockton, and Sam, and one sister, Mrs. Sam Harper.

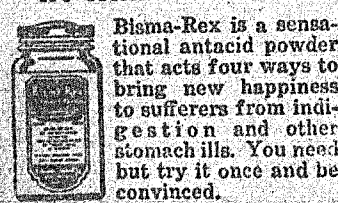

DALLAS DOCTORS TO REMOVE 184 POUND TUMOR

DALLAS, Oct. 23.—Dallas surgeons will attempt this week to remove one of the largest tumors recorded in medical history—184 pounds—when they operate on Sophie Johnson.

Her abdominal tumor is said to weigh at least 10 pounds more than the largest local surgeons have been able to find on record. The operation will require several days, since sudden removal of the tumor would prove fatal, Dr. L. H. Leberman, surgeon, said.

Dr. Leberman estimated the entire operation would take four or five days. He said the patient, who now weighs 354 pounds, had a fair chance to survive. She is in fairly good health and has a satisfactory pulse.

The Texas Centennial Commission Will Underwrite Cost of Water Wells

(The following article is the substance of a talk made before the Lions Club Tuesday, October 23rd by Secretary J. T. Garrett.)

In February, 1924, about 1,000 delegates met in Austin, Texas and resolved that Texas should have a Centennial Celebration, one bold enough for the stilled hearts of her early heroes and large enough to mirror her developments. This we believe is the first move towards getting the Centennial in motion.

Let us now refer back to that early period in our state's history when those events were happening that made living pages in its chronicles. Prior to 1836 colonists from the states had been flocking to Texas, settling mostly in the southeastern part of the state. Fort Worth and Dallas had not been heard of; Houston was a small village under another name. San Antonio was a small town known principally because of the Alamo and other missions, which had been built near. These Colonists were having plenty of trouble with the Mexican Government; so on March 2nd, 1836, delegates assembled near the present city of Houston, declared themselves free of the Mexicans and proceeded to set up a provisional government.

Events then began to happen and mostly against the Colonists. In a few days after the Declaration of Independence the Alamo fell with every defender slain by the Mexicans, and about one week later the small Texas army at Refugio surrendered to a superior force of Mexicans. In less than a week later Fannin and his band of over 300 men also surrendered and were shortly marched out and shot by order of Santa Anna, the Mexican President and Commander-in-Chief of the Mexican armies. In the meantime the Texans called for a volunteer army and put Sam Houston at its head, but before Houston could get his men organized properly the Mexicans under Santa Anna were hot after him. Houston retreated. Santa Anna pursued, dividing his forces as he went in order to try to trap Houston and his men. The time came when Houston was ready and the time was ripe; so on what is now the famous battle field of San Jacinto, Houston destroyed the Mexican army under Santa Anna, captured that wily ruler and thus ended the war and gained Texas' independence. These are some of the main events to be celebrated. However it should be mentioned that this land called Texas has been under six different flags, first the Spanish, then the French, the Mexican, the Lone Star, the Stars and Stripes and the Stars and Bars of the Confederacy.

In this time of depression, drouth and hard times, can we afford to have a celebration like this? Our state is sparsely settled and its resources hardly touched, and what we need most is more people with more money. To get these we must in some way first show our wares; that is, we must get people to come to Texas looking for these things. What would be a greater pulling event than a Texas Centennial and World's Fair. The Chicago Centennial in its first year entertained several million people, but Chicago and Illinois do not approach Texas in romantic glamour with its background of historical deeds. The depression is letting up gradually, and people are slowly losing their fear of investing money. By 1936 we will be able to draw millions of people within our borders by offering first the Centennial, and then after they are here many will want to see various parts of our State not at the location of the Centennial, hence all parts would benefit. People looking for investments and those looking for locations for new homes and new businesses would find such places in some part of our great State.

These are changing times, so we must change with the times or be mere followers. Let's keep in the forefront, let's put on the greatest World's Fair and Centennial that has ever been staged.

Program of furnishing water for those Coleman county communities badly in need of that aid will be accelerated with the action taken by the commissioners court in session at the county courthouse Tuesday afternoon.

Members of the court are to underwrite 25 percent of the cost of digging wells in the communities making applications for such projects while the state relief commission are to pay for 75 percent of the cost.

Here is how the plan will work: Gouldbusk will make application, for example, for a well. Carl Lohn, commissioner for the precinct in which Gouldbusk is located will guarantee the payment of Gouldbusk's 25 percent of the cost. The survey will be made and the project will begin when the community furnishes its part of the money. It is reported Rockwood already has \$400 raised and that a well will be located at that place at an early date. —Democrat-Voice.

In connection with the above, we wish to set aside a current report to the effect that farmers living in the vicinity of Santa Anna are to be cut off from using water from the City Lake. We don't know who started such a report, but it has reached considerable proportion, and is being used in a way calculated to create a feeling of unrest toward the people of Santa Anna. So long as there is sufficient water in the lake to divide, no restrictions will be placed upon people living outside the city limits who need the water and come here for it. Water is getting low and all waste should be restricted, but water for use in the homes must and will be supplied so long as water is available.

SCHOOLS TO GET OVER \$3,200 SOON

Schools in this county will be \$3,287.50 richer when they receive fifty cents per scholastic from the state department of education within the next few days.

The fifty cents is the last of the \$16.50 apportionment made by the state department of education for last year.

Last census figures show there are 3,859 students in the common school district, 1,959 students in the Coleman independent school district, 179 students in the Rockwood independent district, and 578 students in the Santa Anna independent school district—or a total of 6,575 students in the county.

At fifty cents per scholastic this county will receive \$3,287.50.

Charity Urged By Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP).—President Roosevelt says every good citizen should ease Government relief burden by giving what he can to private charity.

The President made a radio appeal Monday night in behalf of the 1934 Mobilization for Human Needs, headed by Newton D. Baker. He stressed two points.

"The first," he said "is that the Federal Government, state governments and local governments are all of them bearing an unusually heavy load of expenditures for relief and employment purposes—a load so heavy that every good citizen should seek to lighten it in every way possible."

"The other point I would make," he said, "is that none of us wants to eliminate the personal factor in taking care of human needs. Surely none of you wants to centralize the care of relief, either in Washington or in your state capital or in your city hall."

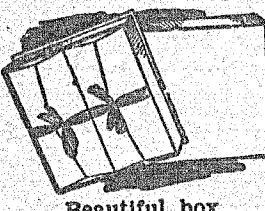

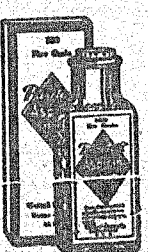
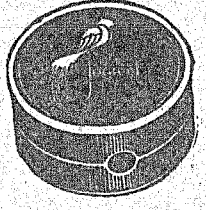
