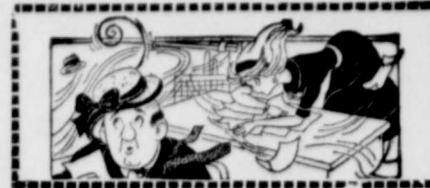

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS — Sheppard Air Force Base and the Wichita Falls community will join together for the Annual Armed Forces Day celebration and parade, to be held in downtown Wichita Falls, Saturday (May 18).

The parade will get underway at 10:00 a. m., when dignitaries from Sheppard and Wichita Falls are brought to the review stand in convertibles furnished by city car dealers. The procession will start at 11th and Ohio Streets and turn right on Scott Street, pass the review stand, and then turn right on 7th.

A fly-by, by T-37 and T-38 aircraft will highlight the parade as the Sheppard Color Guard passes the review stand.

This is the 19th Annual Armed Forces Day celebration, with this year's theme being "Forces For Freedom."

## May 13-17 Time To Vote On Cotton Allmt. Transfers

Upland cotton farmers will vote from May 13 through May 17, by mail, to decide whether they favor transfer of 1969 cotton allotments, by sale or lease, outside the county but within the state. ## Now Is The Time To Make Hay

The favorable statewide soil moisture situation, points out Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist, gives hay producers an opportunity to make large tonnages of high quality hay this year. He suggests starting with a soil test; fertilizing according to the test recommendations and harvesting at the right growth stage.

## World's Largest Plane to Take Test Flights



CANTON, OHIO — The U. S. Air Force C-5 Galaxy recently unveiled by the Lockheed-Georgia Company is scheduled for test flights in June of this year. Gross weight of the Galaxy is 728,000 pounds. By using 28 Timken tapered roller bearing-equipped landing wheels under safe low tire pressure, this massive plane can utilize airfields classified for medium to heavy loads without causing any critical runway deterioration. Almost 85 yards long, it has a wing span of 223 feet and towers 65 feet into the air. Carrying a maximum payload, the C-5 Galaxy can cover 2,500 nautical miles in less than 6 hours.

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**THE MOVING FORCE****PEOPLE PROBLEMS**

More imaginative solutions for "people problems" are essential in industry not only to improve business operations but also to help assure the renewal of society itself.

This need was stressed by Daniel Parker, Chairman of the Board of the National Association of Manufacturers, at the 40th NAM Institute on Industrial Relations held in Puerto Rico.

"While technology is leaping ahead, our knowledge of how to deal with people is barely creeping along," Mr. Parker, Chairman of the Board, Parker Pen Company, said. "It is people, not things, that make the economy go."

The impact of technological advances on people, he said, must be carefully assessed by industrial relations experts as a major corporate activity.

"This is partly because of growing awareness that the talents and commitments of people afford the most solid base upon which to build a company, and from which to achieve a long-term competitive advantage," he added.

Mr. Parker pointed out that a larger voice in management's councils is being accorded to the man who knows how to solve the "people problems."

"Industry is dedicated to re-emphasizing the importance of the individual," he said. "In the recent copper strike—or whatever coalition bargaining is dominant—no individual rights were being protected. Rather these rights were laid on the line as a sacrifice to the goals of the international union which has quite outgrown any need for protection as an underprivileged institution."

"The growing focus on organizational effectiveness concepts give promise of releasing individual potential at a time when individuals generally feel alienated, frustrated, depersonalized and lost in a mass society," Mr. Parker concluded.

The California Taxpayers' Association reports that the California Assembly in 1967 provided an additional \$145 million for state school support. "Although it was not mandatory that the money be used for property tax relief, it was 'understood' this was to be the only immediate form of relief given the property taxpayer," according to YOUR TAXES, published by Oregon Tax Research. "A survey by the State Department of Education of the actual use of this money has been released to legislators showing the great bulk of the money went for regular classroom instruction, to restore programs which had been eliminated earlier, and to give salary increases."

To control the effluents of an affluent society, millions of dollars are being spent by the oil industry, which for some 20 years has been developing air-conservation practices in systematic form. The American Petroleum Institute is now funding 26 separate projects at a cost of more than \$2 million a year and others are contemplated.



## From The Office Of SENATOR JOHN G. TOWER

**DOLLAR CRISIS**

Most Americans are currently aware that our federal government is in a serious fiscal crisis.

We've had a federal fiscal crisis for years. You've heard me talking about the need for reformed fiscal sanity for a long time now. I made some strong recommendations about it in 1966. You and I worried about it considerably in 1967. And, now in 1968 the alarms are again being sounded about the stability of the dollar. About the imbalance of American national bank accounts; and about continuing Administration unwillingness to do anything.

What's at stake here is quite simply the future worth of our dollar.

Mr. William McChesney Martin—who's chairman of our Federal Reserve System, and essentially our top federal banker—calls the current situation the "worst financial crisis since 1931." I think he knows what he's talking about.

Each Texan who spends dollars can understand what inflation is doing to us. It has made our dollar of three years ago worth only 82 cents. It has made our ten-dollar bill lose nearly a dollar in purchasing power in those same three years. It means that if a Texas family had 500 dollars in savings three years ago and has left it there, it has depreciated in buying value to only 460 dollars worth of savings.

It means that Texans who retired with an annual retirement in come of 25-hundred-dollars three years ago have lost more than 200 dollars of that annual income to inflation.

This inflation is perpetrating the greatest dollar robbery in the history of the world. It's picking the pockets of every American, cheating workers, looting the thrifty and penalizing the poor and elderly.

This fiscal inactivity permitted by the federal government is the very worst thing a government can do to its people—it is destruction of the buying power of the people's money.

It's obvious to me then, that our number one national task today is the saving of the dollar. Unless we can maintain a solvent society our society will be neither secure nor great.

What's basically wrong?

It's federal deficits.

They are just out of hand. We face a 20-billion-dollar deficit this fiscal year. Next year it will be at least 10-billion more. In five years it is 50-billion. The total indebtedness of our nation now is more than 352 billion dollars.

That's our debt. It's growing by leaps and bounds. We keep spending more than we can raise. Our interest rates are marked up to the highest levels since the Depression.

And unnecessary federal spending goes on and on. Congress was actually asked in this year's budget to spend 60 billion dollars to study Blackbird Social Organization. Instead of the habits of blackbirds, we'd better devote attention to federal banking practices.

and bringing in more tax revenue. It's a distasteful medicine—but it is a very sick patient we have on our hands.

The American dollar is not going to be saved by cutting down on what tourists spend abroad, or by cutting what corporations can invest to seek returns from overseas, or by talking about something called "paper gold." It makes no difference if our money is gold or silver or paper unless our economy is healthy and run properly.

The trouble with the American dollar today is the management of our budget by the Federal Government. This is the heart of our problem. This is where we must make changes.

We have got to cut spending, increase taxes and restore something at least close to balanced budgeting in the very near future or inflation will ever-more-swiftly drive our dollar toward 25-cent status.

The Senate has taken a lead in making budget cuts. As much as we need national defense expenditures we have even cut our national defense budget by nearly a billion dollars. The House of Representatives needs to act too.

And, Congress can't do the job alone. The President controls the Bureau of the Budget. He, too, needs to do more expenditure cutting.

We are a national family faced with potential bankruptcy. We have worried and talked for nearly a decade now. If we don't act promptly the next decade will be a very one indeed, for our nation.

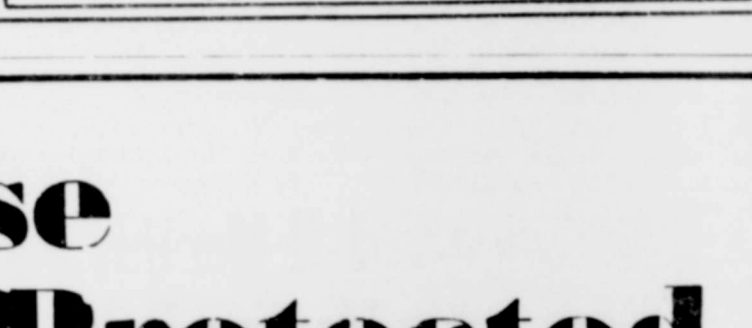

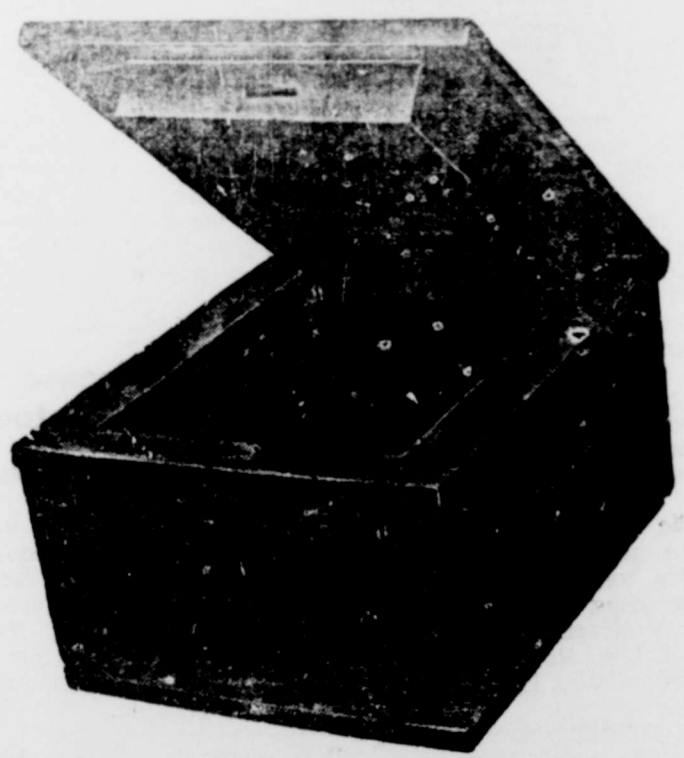

### The Logic of Investing

No formula yet devised has been able to turn the stock market into a neat package of logic. The reason is simply that conditions affecting the economy, individual companies and stock values generally, are in a constant state of flux.

Just to stay abreast of these changes requires broad facilities, numerous sources of reliable information, the ability to evaluate the effects of change and, of course, the time necessary to give to the job.

For instance, in a single week recently, there were headlines regarding the gold situation, federal budget cuts, dollar deficits, a tax increase, and peace negotiations vs. escalation. The average reader barely has the time to read all the news, let alone the expertise to determine the impact of each new development upon the market and the securities traded there.

That may be why over four million investors today have chosen mutual funds. Mutual funds, which have been a part of the American investment scene since 1924, provide a pooled, long term, diversified investment account under the constant supervision of professionals.

Thus, with an investment of, let's say, \$100 in one popular mutual fund, the investor receives a piece of as many as a hundred or more securities, or as many of the stocks and bonds represented in the fund's portfolio at the time.



Mutual fund managers assume the task of selecting individual securities, keeping up-to-date on changes in the status of these securities, and handling all the details of buying and selling, collecting and distributing income, tax analysis, and so on.

According to the Investment Company Institute, the fund shareholder last year bought nearly \$5 billion worth of mutual fund shares, and today has some \$42 billion at work for him in the stock market.

## Music Fit For A Chief



When Los Voladores Flying Indians perform at HemisFair '68, the music that accompanies them will be fit for a chief—for José Villanueva de la Cruz, the Totonac chief, plays a reed flute and small drum while

dancing atop a 114-foot pole. These authentic Totonac tunes are the accompaniment while the Flyers descend from the top of the pole at the Frito-Lay/Pepsi-Cola Pavilion in a series of 32 revolutions. Secured only by the ropes around their waists, the Flyers eventually fan out to a radius of thirty feet before reaching the ground.

For more than 400 years this ceremony has been performed, because it has a religious as well as agricultural significance for the Totonacs. The climb to the top of the pole symbolizes their desire to be closer to the male god of the heavens—whose essence is fire and earth. Their descent represents the union of this male god with a female god of the earth who is water and cold—resulting in a pleasant climate and a good harvest.

The costumes of the Flyers, too, are symbolic. They wear both pants and shirts trimmed

with birds' feathers, because they believe that the spirit comes back to earth in the form of an eagle or another bird.



At HemisFair '68, the sound of music will come from the most unexpected places—when Chief José Villanueva de la Cruz raises his flute to his lips and begins the Flying Indians Spectacular.

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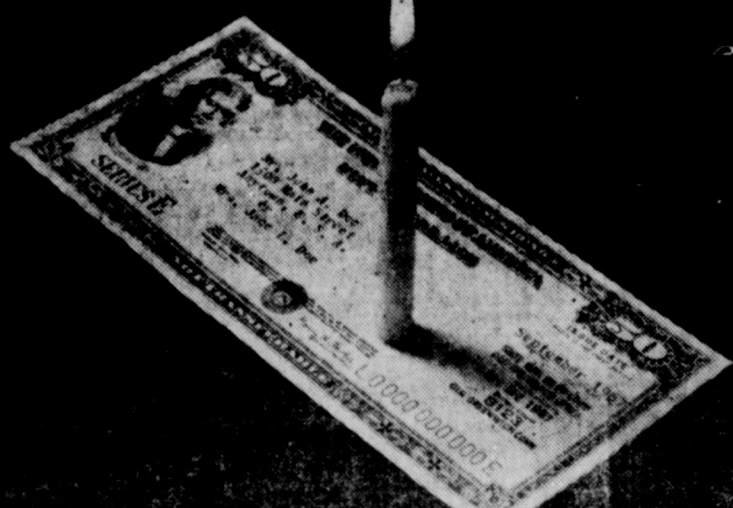

## Unusual Cabbage Casserole

There's nothing plebeian about this cabbage casserole. Serve it with corned beef, if you like, but be prepared for it to steal the show.

## Creamed Cabbage Casserole

1 medium head cabbage, cut in wedges  
1/4 cup margarine  
2 tablespoons corn starch  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
2 cups milk  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts (optional)  
1 cup shredded cheese

Cook cabbage in 1/2 to 1-inch lightly salted boiling water about 7 minutes or until just tender. Meanwhile, melt margarine in saucepan over medium heat. Remove from heat. Blend in corn starch, salt and pepper. Gradually mix in milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to boil.

Drain cabbage well. Arrange alternate layers of cabbage, walnuts, if desired, sauce and cheese in greased 1 1/2 quart casserole, ending with layer of cheese. Bake in 425 degrees F. (hot) oven until heated and cheese is lightly melted, about 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
