Glider School Construction To Get Underway

Victor J. Nelson, building contractor, for the Lamesa Glider School has arrived in Lamesa and construction is expected to soon get underway. Monday morning building materials were being hauled to the field and as soon as enough material arrives actual building will be started.

Mr. Nelson's construction foreman and superintendent have not arrived, but are due this week. Local labor will be used as much as possible in the building work stated John H. Wilson, operator of the Glider School.

The constructions will be all frame, Mr. Wilson said, and of ranch type. The contractor has guaranteed that the school can operate out of the buildings in 60 days. Practically all building materials will have to be shipped in as local yards cannot supply the need.

Glider training was started last Thursday and is continuing, and it is hoped that the student pilots will be graduated on schedule, this depends on the arriving of other

"TONY"

The following article was written by Paul W. Bittinger, editor of the Old Colony Memorial at Plymouth, Mass., and has caused quite a bit of comment. We clipped it from the Publisher's Auxiliary, and pass it on to our readers.

If you are one of those persons who chisel on the rationing program on the dim-out regulations, go on strike in war industries, seek a soft job as a commissioned officer in the military services, and put less than your full effort into helping to win this war of survival, we want you to think a moment about Tony.

Fifteen years ago there came into the Memorial Press office a young, virile, energetic, boy, exuberant with the fire of youth. He had a ready smile, attended to his work with care and thoroughness, and was what an employer would call an ideal employee. He was more than that, for he was one of our own Plymouth young men, of Italian family, and every inch an American. He liked his work and was a good printer, but there came a day when he felt the call of the outside and he enlisted in the United States army. Frequently he would come into the Memorial office, filled with enthusiasm for the work he was doing in the service of his country. Then his personal visits stopped and we would hear from him by letter, his note being pinned on the bulletin board for all his former friends in the Memorial office to read.

Late last year his mail came from Hawaii and then from the Philippines. Then came Pearl Harbor; our country was at war and Tony's letters stopped. The attack on the Philippines made us think about Tony. We felt within our hearts that Tony was out there with the same ready smile, more grim perhaps, but nevertheless smiling, his head held high, fighting for the ideals he had been taught to love and respect. Bataan fell, then came the siege of Corregidor and we knew that Tony was probably fighting grimly on that isolated rock in Manila bay.

This week from the war department came word that Tony, on the Island of Corregidor, had given his life in the defense of his country. His life is the first to be given from this town. There are sad hearts in the Memorial office today and there are sad hearts throughout Plymouth, for Tony represents all that is fine and the best of our Plymouth youth.

No words can heal the aching hearts that Tony has left behind. A life has been given for our country and for us here in Plymouth. The least that we can do is to prove that Tony's life was not given in vain. We must prove this. We must do the little or the much that we are asked to do, for no matter how much is asked of us it will be puny in comparison with what Tony and those who mourn him have given.

There will be other Tonys everywhere throughout the land. They are the symbols of the price of victory. Their lives are being given for us here at home.

Each man and woman within his own heart knows whether or not he is worthy of Tony and all the others like him who in all parts of the world ask for nothing except that those back home will do their share in winning this war.

Those who chisel and lie about the rationing program, who half-heartedly blackout or dim-out, who seek special privileges, who seek to profit from the war, are betraying the Tonys of our country.

The guns of Corregidor are silent. Tony, too, is silent in the stillness of immortality.

Within every heart should be heard the soundless words of all the "Tonys"—that we who remain at home, work, fight and sacrifice to preserve the ideals and liberties for which Tony and thousands like him are giving their very lives to defend.

Rubber In All Forms Needed By Defense Plants

The scrap rubber drive ordered by the president in a special appeal last Friday got underway in Lamesa this morning, Monday, and will continue two weeks. Citizens are urged to gather all scrap rubber around their homes and turn it in at once.

All major oil companies are accepting the rubber and will pay one cent per pound for it. Individuals are asked to take their scrap rubber to their nearest filling station where it will be weighed, and they will receive one cent for each pound. The filling station operators then will turn the rubber to the oil company which serves him and will be reimbursed for the money he has paid out.

What the President has to say:

President Roosevelt urges the American people to turn in "every bit of rubber you can possibly spare" to help remedy a serious shortage arising from war conditions, but he promised that there was going to be enough of the vital elastic to "build" the planes to bomb Tokyo and Berlin, to crush the enemy wherever he is found, and "to win this war."

The chief executive spoke to his countrymen by radio as a preliminary to a nationwide campaign to collect every bit of spare scrap rubber in the country in the period from June 15 to June 30.

Essential Rubber Not Wanted

"I know," the president declared, "That I don't need to urge you to take part in this collection drive. All you need to know is the place to take your rubber and the time to take it there—and the fact that your country needs it."

"We do not want you to turn in essential rubber that you need in your daily life — rubber you will have to replace by buying new things in the store. We do want every bit of rubber you can possibly spare—and in any quantity . . . We want it in every form . . . If you think it is rubber take it to your nearest filling station."

Will Plan Later

"Once the rubber is in, we will know what our supplies of used rubber are and we will make our (Continued on Page Five)

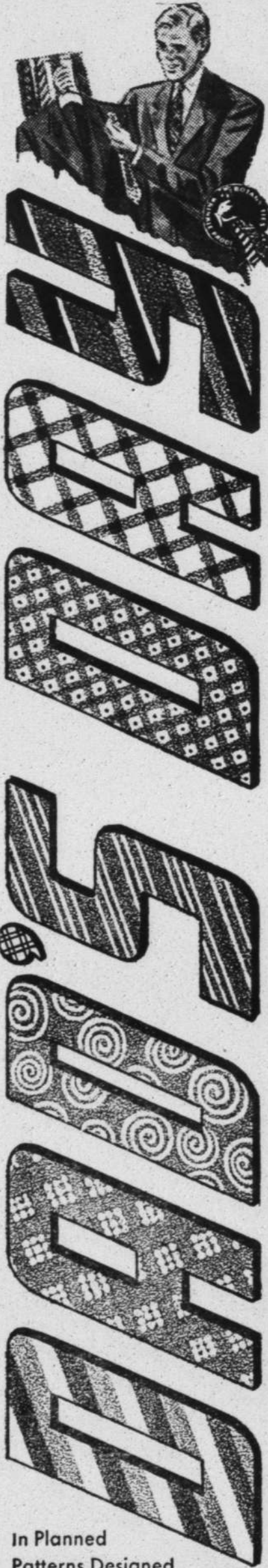
Mr. Dahnke will make his formal announcement at a later date.

Lowly Onion Has Many And Varied Uses

One of the largest crops of mature onions ever produced at this time of year is now on the market, according to B. J. Baskin. Local merchants are cooperating in the nation-wide campaign to feature onions, which Secretary Wickard has designated a Victory Food Special.

Clever cooks who know the chief value of the onion is its flavor will not fail to take advantage of the plentiful supply of onions which are being sold at such reasonable prices. For with a little ingenuity, onions can prove their weight in gold by varying the flavor of nutritious foods which are served from day to day, he said.

But Vitamin "Z," a make-believe vitamin that adds zip and zest to your meals, is not the only value of onions. In their raw state they have a little vitamin B1, riboflavin, vitamin C, iron and calcium. Young green onions are fair sources of carotene, which the body can change into vitamin A.

All onions fall into two classes: the strong and the mild. The typical mild type of onion is the Bermuda, which is on the market only during the spring. So it's now or not until next April if you want to buy all you want of Bermudas.

If you're buying mature onions, look for those that are dry, bright, clean, hard and well-shaped. Avoid onions that are moist at the stem end of the bulb as moistness here may mean the onion is decaying inside. Buy green onions that have fresh green tops—and medium-sized, well-bleached necks for at least 2 or 3 inches up the stem, Mr. Baskin explained.

The following suggestions regarding the use of onions are based on material prepared by the Bureau of Home Economics, USDA:

"Now that onions are plentiful, try them in soups, serve them with meat, mix them with other vegetables in all sorts of dishes. Most families consider them a 'must' in vegetable salads. Favorite salad partners are cucumbers, finely chopped salad greens, radishes, tomatoes.

"For a quick onion and potato soup, use this method. Dice 3 tablespoons of onions, and 2 cupfuls of potatoes. Add 1 quart of milk. Cook slowly until the potatoes and onions are tender. The starch from the potatoes will thicken the milk somewhat. Thicken more if you like a soup with a little more body to it. Season to taste.

"For a dish that's worth the little extra time it takes—try onions stuffed. Skin large onions and cut them in half, crosswise. Simmer these onion halves in salted water until they are almost tender. Remove the center rings without bothering the outer layers of the onion. Chop the onion centers fine. Cook some celery or parsley in fat for a few minutes. Add bread crumbs, salt, pepper, and the chopped-up onion. Bake in a moderate oven for about 30 minutes—until the onions are tender. For a more filling dish, use chopped meat or fish or baked beans in place of the bread crumbs."

The following suggestions on the preparation of onions and onion recipes will aid local homemakers in preparing "something different" in the way of onion dishes:

Onion Cookery Notes

To peel, put onions under cold water and remove skins. Cut off root and stem ends under water. Strongly flavored vegetables, such as onions, are best boiled in an

Wheat Insurance Can Be Had On Installment Plan

Take out all-risk crop insurance and pay for it on the installment plan.

That's the new feature of three-year crop insurance contracts being offered Texas wheat growers for the first time this year. Previously, contracts were written on a year-to-year basis, however no one-year contracts will be written on the 1943 crop.

Premiums may be paid for in annual installments or growers may make one payment covering installments for the first two of the three years covered in the contract. Under existing law, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is not permitted to accept payments for more than one year in advance, according to E. R. Duke, state wheat crop insurance supervisor.

Each installment on the premium will be payable in wheat or cash equivalent on or before the date each installment is due. Dates on which

uncovered kettle. Steam or boil onions 20-45 minutes or until tender. Boil onions in water sufficient to cover. Boiled onions have a milder flavor. White onions will have a better color if salt is added the last minute of cooking. Steaming onions, instead of boiling, saves more of the mineral and vitamins. To steam onions, place in an open pan or on a rack in a large kettle partially filled with water. The onions should not come into contact with the water. Cover and boil until the kettle is filled with steam. Cook 20-45 minutes.

Steamed or Boiled Onions

6 medium-sized onions
1 cup milk.
Serves six
Remove skins. Cut off stem and root end. Cook slowly 20 to 45 minutes until tender but not broken. Drain onions, quarter or leave whole, add milk, and cook 5 minutes. Season with butter, salt and pepper.

Glazed Onions

3 cups small onions
2 tablespoons sugar
3 tablespoons butter
Serves six
Steam or boil onions 15 minutes. Drain. Melt butter, add sugar and onions. Cook slowly 25 minutes or until browned. Watch to keep from burning.

Onion Omelet

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 tablespoon flour
1-4 cup water
1 cup finely chopped onion
1-4 teaspoon salt
Serves six
Melt butter, add onions and water. Cook until onions are golden brown. Add flour and seasoning. Cook for five minutes, stirring well.

To Make Omelet

4 egg yolks, beaten until thick
4 egg whites, beaten until stiff
2 tablespoons milk
Salt and pepper

Add milk and seasoning to egg yolks. Fold in the whites. Pour into well greased pan. Cook slowly until set. Turn on plate. Note: Place hot onion mix on one half. Fold over other half. Serve at once.

Onion Ring and Green Bean Salad
4 or 5 large Bermuda onions
1 pint green beans
1 cup salad dressing
Serves six

Slice the onions 1-4 inch thick and separate the rings. Use small whole canned or fresh green snap beans. Coat with salad dressing and salt to taste. Arrange on lettuce leaf.

payments are due vary from state to state but generally are at approximate harvest time.

If installments are not paid when due, the insured grower, under terms of the contract, allows the Corporation to deduct the amount of installment from indemnity payments, if made; from payments due him for cooperating under the AAA program; or from any commodity loan he might obtain under loan programs administered by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Although the contract specifies insurance protection against all unavoidable hazards such as drought, wind, flood, insects and other similar hazards for three years, growers may cancel the last year of the insurance provided local AAA committees are advised in writing on or before final date for accepting contracts during the second year of the contract period.

Col. Thompson Speaks At Rally In Edinburgh

Every man, woman and child in the United States stands to lose everything if this nation is not victorious in the war, Colonel Ernest O. Thompson, Texas Railroad Commissioner, said last night in a speech at the Rio Grande Valley Wide Patriotic Rally held at

Edinburgh.

Each person stands to lose the same amount — everything Colonel Thompson said, "No man can lose any more than what he's got."

Colonel Thompson, a veteran of the first world war and only recently retired from active army duty, urged patriotism, hard work and good humored sacrifice as means to the war's end.

The war must be won, he said, and "a last peace must be written." "To do this," he said, "We must have every man and woman, every boy and girl, working constantly toward that end. Winning the war must become uppermost in our thoughts. It must overshadow small grievances against the government for such things as rationing, depriving us of our little pleasures and luxuries to which we have grown so accustomed. If it takes rationing to win the war, let us have rationing, let us accept it with good spirit, because if we do not win the war what would come afterward would be worse than rationing."

Colonel Thompson urged his audience, and all others, to take part in the war bond and stamp campaign, to invest their savings in the government bonds freely; otherwise, he said, "the government will be forced to require them to do it because we must have the necessary funds" for winning the war.

Sightless Convict Finds 'Eyes' In Prison

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — To a negro convict in Tennessee's main penitentiary a mongrel dog has meant the difference between hope and despair.

For the past two years Queen, a mixture of German police and bulldog, has been Albert Craven's "seeing eye" and constant companion inside the prison's walls.

The Georgia Negro, blind for 14 years, found and trained his "eyes" within the prison where he is serving a 10-year sentence after being convicted of rape at Chattanooga in 1937.

Craven, with Queen leading the way on a leash, met Record Clerk James Glidewell and the reporter at the fifth locked gate — which shut 1,500 prisoners from the outside.

"Let's go to the post office, Queen," said Craven. Without a moment's hesitation the dog complied. From the post office it was to the prison store for a box of cookies, which Queen carried lightly in her mouth to Craven's quarters.

"Took me only a few weeks to teach her the names of places here where I go," said Craven. "Queen leads me over every walk and through the lines."

On the way to the prison hospital Queen glanced back every few steps to see if her master was following properly. She paused at each curb and once refused to mind Craven when he was wrong in his directions.

"Bought Queen when she was a puppy two years ago. Paid another prisoner \$3 for her. I could tell she was a good dog by the way she felt," the proud owner went on.

"I stumbled 'round this here place for four years with a cane before I got Queen. She's my eyes now and I don't mind being confined here at all."

Queen has never once left the prison grounds. Her Negro master is to leave Main State Prison for freedom next year, and when he goes, so does Queen.

"I'd be lost without my dog," said the Negro whom Glidewell described as a model prisoner. "She's given me something to live for and we're both going back to Rome. 'Jawjaw,' next spring. Gonna lease me a place and raise chickens, ducks and turkeys."

Craven served twice with the U. S. Army. He didn't see overseas service during the last war, but re-enlisted after that conflict with the Tenth Cavalry at Fort Raleigh, Kansas.

It was in line of duty at Fort Raleigh when he lost his eyesight.

Tomatoes Should Be A 'Must' At Every Meal

Tomatoes can be prepared in so many ways and so easily, homemakers will do well to make them a "stock item" in the refrigerator for the remainder of the summer.

With tomatoes available throughout the state now, Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, suggests that homemakers plan to use them "morning, noon, and night."

As a beginner, tomato juice is always refreshing, or it can be made into a cold congealed consommé. Use baked tomatoes plain or stuffed, scalloped or stewed tomatoes, the specialist advises. Tomato sauce goes well with all kinds of meats, fish or beans.

There is no end to the number of salads which can be made with tomatoes. Whatever the salad, choose tomatoes with a deep red color, Miss Phipps suggests. Attractive salads may be prepared by cutting the tomato in fourths or sixths and spreading it apart in flower-like fashion. Then the center may be filled with cottage cheese, salmon, tuna, raw cabbage, or any food which combines well with tomatoes.

plans accordingly. One thing you can be sure—we are going to see to it that there is enough rubber to build the planes to bomb Tokyo and Berlin — enough rubber to build the tanks to crush the enemy wherever we may find him—enough rubber to win this war."

Rubber is a problem, he asserted, because modern wars can not be won without it, and because the Japanese have cut off 92 per cent of our normal supply. The situation would be more serious, he said, if we had not built up a rubber stock pile before the war began and if we were not now building a great new synthetic rubber industry.

Responsibility for the rubber salvage drive was placed primarily with the nation's petroleum industry.

Accepting "the assignment with enthusiasm," William R. Boyd, Jr., head of the petroleum industry war council and president of the American Petroleum Institute, announced that 1,000,000 men and women engaged in the oil industry, 400,000 filling stations and the industry's automotive equipment "and cash," would be put to work on the salvage campaign which will continue through June 30.

Mr. Roosevelt urged individuals throughout the country to search their basements, attics and back yards for all items of the precious rubber scrap, pieces that have been or can be discarded. Offices, factories and farms were asked to cooperate.

The oil industry has made available its 400,000 filling stations as collection depots. The station operators will pay one cent a pound for the rubber brought in, and then will be reimbursed by the government.

Items Are Listed

Among the old rubber items wanted are tires, inner tubes, crepe rubber soles, boots and overshoes, hot water bottles, tennis shoes, rubber belting, rubber gloves, rubber sheeting, pads and matting, raincoats, rubber heels, bathing caps, sample tire sections, rubber ash trays — and hundreds of other articles containing rubber.

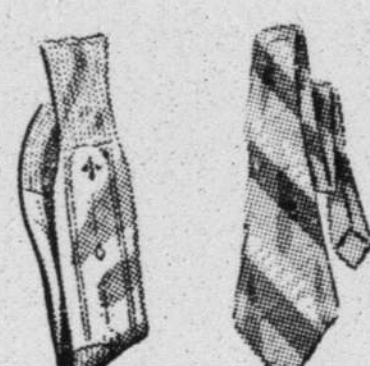
